Hearing set for noise law

Ordinance would set decibel limits

The Bethlehem Town Board will be listening to residents on Wednesday, Dec. 9, when a public hearing will be held on a proposed noise abatement and containment ordinance that would make it a punishable offense to be too noisy during certain hours.

The drafted law, which is available for review on the town's Web site, would prohibit "unreasonable noise" between the hours of 11 p.m. and 7 a.m., seven days a week.

Unreasonable noise is defined as "any noise which either annoys, disturbs, injures or endangers the comfort, repose, health, peace, safety or welfare of a reasonable person of normal sensibilities," and is further defined as noise in excess of 75 decibels when measured from the property line of the offender, or from 20 feet away if the noise is occurring on a street.

Specifically mentioned in the law are motor vehicles (including the "spinning and squealing of tires" and revving of engines), power tools, construction noise, amplifica-

BC expects enrollment to decline

Distribution of students has implications for upcoming budget process

The best guess from administrators at the Bethlehem Central School District is that enrollment districtwide will level off and then decrease in the coming years, and that will not necessitate the hiring of new teachers.

In the 2009-2010 school year, however, enrollment ended up being notably higher than the projections called for — as of Oct. 2, districtwide enrollment stood at 5,068 instead of the 4,920 predicted — a fact Superintendent Michael Tebbano attributed to the start of fullday kindergarten and the economic recession, which have both brought an unanticipated wave of students into public schools.

"We did not know in November of last year that the economy was going to affect people's decision of where to go to school," Tebbano said.

Guilderland Superintendent of Schools John McGuire announced Wednesday, Dec. 2, he will retire at the end of the school year.


"It's a big decision," he said. "I've been in education for 40 years."

McGuire, 63, will have been with the district for two years and seven months when he leaves in July. His


salary was most recently listed as \$174,000.

Slingerlands man allegedly struck deputy



I zipped to the library and luckily found a family pass there (a worthwhile thing to do before you head out to any area museum.) If you haven't been, it's a contemporary art museum over in North Adams, Mass. The drive is fine, less than an hour and is pretty no matter what time of year you go. Spending time in this museum as part of my 40th celebration seemed perfect. Years ago, when I was in art school, Paul and I spent a lot of time in galleries and museums, wandering and talking. Twenty years later, we still like to go when we can. And our kids are great sports, loving a big, open museum. Not the fussy ones where you have to be silent and the guards give you

Chocolate Mousse Cake with Vanilla Whipped Cream

9 ounces good quality dark chocolate, chopped

1 stick butter

7 eggs, separated

1/3 cup sugar

Pinch of sea salt 1 teaspoon cinnamon

1 pint heavy cream

1 tablespoon vanilla

2 tablespoons confectioner's sugar

Preheat the oven to 300 degrees. In a sauce pan, melt the chocolate with the butter. Allow to cool and stir in the egg yolks, salt and cinnamon. Use an electric mixer to beat the egg whites, adding the sugar, until white peaks form. Gently stir the egg whites into the chocolate mixture. Grease a 9-inch cake pan, pour the batter in and bake for 45 minutes. Test the cake, and bake for 5-10 more minutes if necessary. Puncture any bubbles with a fork. Whip the cream with the vanilla and sugar until soft peaks form. Serve slices of cake with a scoop of whipped cream on top.



Bethlehem police release annual report

Document outlines 2008 department statistics

The Town of Bethlehem Police Department has released its annual report for the year 2008, which officials say reflects a fairly typical year for the department statistically.

The department has been compiling annual reports since the '80s and keeping track of records electronically since the early '90s.

The department's budget in 2008 was \$6.8 million, an approximately \$170,000 increase from the previous year's budget. The 2009 budget—which was adjusted mid-year—ended up at about \$6.9 million and the 2010 adopted budget is \$7.2 million.

The vast majority of these expenses went towards personnel.

The report offers a brief overview of the structure of the department as well as biographical information on department and division leadership.

One area of operations that saw a marked increase from previous years was in the Detective Office, whose four detectives investigate major offenses and unattended deaths. In 2008, detectives attended to 553 cases, up from 393 in 2007 and 280 in 2006.

The largest increases were in the categories of assault (from three to 31), weapons offenses (two to 14), larceny (122 to 172), controlled substances (13 to 24) and fraudulent checks or business records (12 to 36). Activates in and the areas of criminal mischief and robbery dropped, though (from 33 to eight and 17 to five, respectively).

According to Deputy Chief Timothy Beebe, the number of cases handled by detectives does not represent an increase in the

incidence of crimes, but rather the number of cases in which the assistance of a detective is needed.

Incidence figures are recorded and compiled for report to the state Division of Criminal Justice Services, and indicated that the total number of offenses in Bethlehem went down in 2008. from 2,773 to 2,594.

The department's patrol division, the largest and most visible arm of the organization, saw small increases in some categories and decreases in others. Patrol conducted 8,320 traffic stops in 2008, down from 8,787 the previous year, but also made slightly more arrests for DWI, violations, misdemeanors and felonies.

DOT: Work on Route 9W nearly complete

Department of Transportation workers have completed the majority of the work needed to solve a drainage problem at Route 9W in Glenmont, and will be soon finish repaying the section of road that had to be removed, according to the department.

Spokesman Peter Van Keuren said that workers installed an underdrain system at the location where water was routinely on the roadway.

"We've done the majority of the work, the water is off the road now," he said.

Town and state officials said

the persistent water was probably related to ground water and not a leaking pipe. The underdrain system should keep the water from seeping onto or through the roadway.

Water on this section of 9W, near Roberts Towing & Recovery Center, caused several accidents in early November, when freezing temperatures turned it to black ice. A DOT salt truck was sent to the location when temperatures dropped until the repairs could be made.

Tough choices ahead for Tebbano

The Bethlehem Central School District is facing a decline in enrollment numbers in the upcoming years, a drop that has Superintendent Michael Tebbano broaching a subject that brought about a tempest of angry parents and bad press before this school year began: multi-age classrooms.

Over the summer, a group of Clarksville parents worked themselves into a tizzy at the prospect of their children moving through the elementary school in a

succession of multi-age classrooms, a prospect that would be solidified by, wait for it, declining enrollment numbers. The parents contended that while a single, multi-age classroom experience may not be inferior to a standard class, being "looped through" one after another, would be inferior to a traditional education.

This school year, enrollment was higher than expected — 5,068 instead of the 4,920 that was predicted— but the district is predicting enrollment in the 2010-2011 school year will drop to 4,865.

Let's hope that they are as off as they were this year, because if the numbers hold up, Tebbano is suggesting multi-age classrooms as a means to streamline staff and the budget. The superintendent said at the Wednesday, Dec. 2, meeting of the Board of Education that by employing combination classrooms, the district could remove up to 11 elementary teacher positions for a maximum savings of \$700,000, without increasing class sizes.

This creates some trouble for Tebbano and the school board, who will no doubt take heat from all sides if that scenario comes to pass. Teachers and, more importantly, their union representatives, will decry the cuts in staff.

But worst of all, if last summer was any indicator, will be the parents of the children who wind up in multi-age classrooms, because they have seen their protest play out before, and have seen the school district essentially acquiesce.

We at *The Spotlight* won't use this space to debate the merits of multi-age classrooms—not this week, anyway. We will use it to ask that Dr. Tebbano make his decisions with the best interest of all of the district's parents in mind.

We'd also like him to think of this: Somewhere along the way, it became detestable for a leader to care about the bottom line. It has almost become derogatory to say that someone cares for the bottom line and it carries the notion that it takes precedence over caring for people.

But Tebbano should remember, caring about the bottom line ensures that you are able to care about people as best you can.

Snow-weary writer longs for southern comfort

This article was written before the generous dusting of snow on Dec. 5. Thanks to Mother Nature, the main point has been rendered moot as the reality of a "Green Christmas" is looking about as real as new, all-terrain tires on my Jeep.

Growing up in Arizona, the holiday season was very different from what people experience in the Northeast – cooking the Thanksgiving turkey on the grill, 75 degrees and sunny weather, watching the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade three hours later, wearing shorts in line on Black Friday, and most important of all, a lack of snow.

Since moving to the Capital District a mere eight years ago, I have had to endure the frigid winter months with the ever-present ice and snow storms that cover every inch of the ground, bring down tree branches, knock out my power and leave me without power (and "Mythbusters") for hours upon days upon weeks.

. Snow is the bane of my existence.

I still remember when we first moved from The Grand Canyon State to the Empire of Ice in 2001. It was late December and I was getting up for school when I saw nothing but white for miles from my bedroom window. It had snowed the night before and unlike other kids who jumped for joy at the idea of a school delay or outright cancellation, I saw only cold and white powderpuffs of pain.

I walked down the hallway to my father who was getting ready for work. The conversation, if my memory serves me right, went Point of View

something like this:

"I hate you dad," I stated in a deadpan voice only a 14-year-old could deliver.

"What? Oh. Well you get a delay, you can go back to bed for another hour," he said ever so kindly.

"I still hate you for bringing me to this awful place. This is hell."

My father laughed, "You'll get used to it."

Now, I was 14 at the time, so you can only imagine how much pent-up angst was surging through my body at that very moment. Since the age of seven, I had never had to experience temperatures below 45 degrees in the winter months. I came from the land of sun, fun, palm trees and rattlesnakes. The idea of four to five months of snow sickened me in only ways that a kid from the suburbs could be rightfully sickened. Two hours after that conversation, I would walk the mile-and-a-half to school, through the snow, to new friends who actually loved it.

After four years in the snowy Capital District, you would think that I would have looked at warmer climes when it came time to pick a college, but no. I set my sights on a school in New Hampshire, where temperatures parallel those of the Rebel base on Hoth in "The Empire Strikes Back" and you can make an igloo if you have: a) a really bad snow storm and b) the fortitude for such an endeavor. I was always expecting a group of AT-AT's to invade my snowy liberal arts college, but it was spared.

Now, I am able to go outside in a T-shirt in 32 degree weather, as I settle back in the Capital District and back to the unpredictable snow patterns that ravage this area.

To quote a children's classic, "I'm Mr. Green Christmas/ I'm Mister Sun/'I'm Mr. Heat Blister/I'm Mr. Hundred and One. They call me Heat Miser."

It's not that I'm against' the idea of snow, I find that I look great in a pea coat and cabbie hat, walking through a snowy park on a winter's afternoon with a gentlewoman by my side, but I dislike the actual reality that is snow. You know what I mean—the falling, the driving in it, the plows that rip up your front yard and leave a wall of snow in front of your house at 7 a.m. The snow blowing, the shoveling, the scraping of windshields—all that and a bag of salt.

I would be less inclined to hating the stuff if Snowspeeders were real. Most people I talk to get frustrated at the idea of a year without a "white Christmas," and I must tell them it's not that bad of a thing, really. After years and years of living in Arizona, the idea of being able to play outside with that brand new bike-roller blades football you got is a great thing.

I often find Wmy Self

remembering those warm Arizona winters while I'm driving through the horrific storms of this area. Last November, I was driving back to campus after a relaxing Thanksgiving when I found myself stuck in the middle of a dangerous New England snowstorm. Lucky for me, I had my Jeep in second gear and was able to deal with the skidding and sliding down the Mass Turnpike. Others were not so lucky. I saw an army of tow trucks pulling people off of the road.

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Guilderland resident wants and end to Schenectady/ Guilderland zip code sharing

A Guilderland man is hoping to make deliveries to some Guilderland houses a little easier with a Web site he started.

Keith Sprague started an online petition to change the 'Schenectady 12303" zip code designation, as it is creates confusion for those living in Guilderland within that postal code.

Sprague, administrator of the Web site www. guilderland12303.com, said in 2002 a similar effort to have 12303 accepted as a viable designation failed,

but he wanted to pick up where they left off.

He said he started the Web site so he can "share some information about what to do and who to contact," if others feel the same way.

He said he has experienced a number of problems, including delivery people who have called him up asking where his house is in Schenectady. Sprague also said a mislabeled birthday card from his brother that cited his address as Guilderland, 12084, a common zip code in Guilderland, never made it to his house.

1-The Web states that there is confusion when searching for deliveries, restaurant searches, and business and that many computer systems do not erecognize the area code 12303 as being in Guilderland.

It also addresses the post 'office system.

Sprague acknowledges on the Web site having the zip code changed is unlikely, but other solutions are still possible.

"In the mean time, a more achievable solution is to allow the city name Guilderland to be used with the 12303 zip code," according to the Web site.

The Web site also lists a number of other municipalities, including Colonie, Rotterdam and Scotia, that have had success with similar issues.

The zip code designation is intended only to determine who is responsible for the

mail's delivery and the "123' designation indicates that a Schenectady County postal worker will deliver the mail.

Marion said to add Guilderland to the acceptable designations is a matter of how much room there is on the post office's database to store allowable designations for each code.

She said, for example, that 12303 has Schenectady, and "Schdy" attached to it, and that takes up two spots already.

She said that during the holiday season, pieces of mail addressed to "The North Pole, 12303" might be more prevalent than those addressed to "Guilderland 12303," so it would make sense for the post office, to put the North Pole as a higher priority for database

Guilderland Town Supervisor Ken Runion said emergency services operate with street names only, to avoid confusion, and an overlap of street names with other municipalities is avoided.

He said tattempts of county officials in recent years failed to yield a change for those supporting a zip code change.

"It's just the way the post office wants to operate," he said. "They're not very accommodating at all."

"We must work together to deliver a balanced budget that meets the needs of County property taxpayers and those we serve," Breslin said.

The Committee's proposed changes to the Tentative 2010 budget significantly increase spending, eliminates critical positions that would jeopardize County operations and does not address the ever increasing nursing home subsidy."

Commisso said the caucus is willing to negotiate with the number of beds in the nursing home, but Breslin must address layoffs included in his tentative budget.


Commisso said Breslin's budget calls for the elimination of positions in the nursing home, which is operating at capacity. He said Breslin's plan to cut 74 positions at the home is unwise.

Breslin's 2010 county budget proposal, released on Thursday, Oct. 8, increases the tax levy by 5.9 percent, features \$11.6 million in spending cuts and includes 109 layoffs in addition to the elimination of

130 vacant positions.
The \$71.9 million tax levy will represent a tax increase of \$19 to \$42 per year for the owner of a \$150,000 home, depending on the municipality, according to Breslin's office.

In addition to making cuts, the county would use \$6.6 million of reserve funds under the executive budget. The total proposed appropriations for the year would be \$571.4 million, an \$11.6 million decrease from this year's levels.





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Community helps family facing tough times

Guilderland groups raise money to aid Rodinos with expenses

Guilderland community organizations are coming together to help the Rodino family with expenses resulting from a life-threatening neurological disease that has struck the father and his youngest daughter. Sevenyear-old Rachel Rodino is not expected to make it through Christmas.

"The Rodinos are dealing with the dad and a child who both have Huntington's disease, a neurological disease that results in death," according to information from the Guilderland Chamber of Commerce, which has chosen the Rodinos for the adopt-a-family program.

Rick Rodino has not been able to work, and he and his wife, Lori, have been making ends meet off donations and disability income. The Rodinos also have two daughters who attend Guilderland High School.

Lori Rodino said the first sign of Rachel's Huntington's came three years ago, when she had a seizure while at school. Two weeks later, she had another, which came as a surprise because there is not a history of seizures in the family.

Lori Rodino said the doctor was "baffled" by her daughter's condition at first, but narrowed it down to a few ailments – one of them being Huntington's. It was describe as a very aggressive degenerative disease, and after a recent hospice stint, Rodino was not optimistic.

"I didn't think we were taking her home," she said.

Rachel was able to eventually come home, and hospice workers now come to the house to help with her care.

Rick Rodino, who has the adult form of Huntington's, has had symptoms for 13 years. "He's getting worse as well," Lori said. "It's very scary for

my kids. They're afraid."

She said because Rick has been unable to work, the family is hurting for money.

The community has already begun to rally, and by the end of the first week in December, a number of organizations have contributed.

"We live in a community like no other in Guilderland," Lori Rodino said. "So much kindness and generosity. I want to give a huge 'thank you' to the whole community. It's just amazing."

She said support from Christ the King Church, the Guilderland Chamber of Commerce, Sen. Neil Breslin, D-Delmar, friends, neighbors and all the businesses and organizations that contributed are helping to make a tough situation manageable.

The Fredendell Funeral Home has offered to cover the costs Rachel's funeral, the. Guilderland food pantry is coordinating with the Chamber to donate food and Breslin is working to stall the foreclosure on the Rodino's home, said Kathy Burbank, executive director of the Chamber.

Breslin representative Kate Berry said when foreclosure proceedings began in August, Breslin sent out a number of e-mails to those involved and was able to work out a deal with a lender to make the mortgage more affordable, but Berry said even though the foreclosure proceedings were stalled, the family is not out of the woods yet.

"We try to help in every way we can," she said. "But the family still needs more fundraising if they are going to keep their home."

Doug Arnott, owner of several McDonald's restaurants will host a fundraising event on Friday, Dec. 18, from 4-7 p.m. at the McDonald's on Western Avenue. Jen Cornell, a neighbor of the Rodinos has been selling butterflies for Rachel and hosted a number of events bringing in several thousand dollars. There

are funds at both Key Bank and Pioneer Bank in Guilderland under Rodino Family Fund, according to the GCC. Cornell said there are still butterflies available for \$30 each, or \$50 for two. Through a partnership with Philip's Hardware, she said the butterflies were purchased below cost. They sold 800 "garden butterflies," more than were available from the manufacturers.

"It's been an honor to be able to help them. They are a wonderful family. It was a great fundraiser," Cornell said. "The community has helped out a lot."

Cornell said she has spent a lot of time trying to be "more or less the friendly neighbor," and be there to talk and listen to the Rodinos.

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



Project SOAR helps struggling students reach new heights

Bethlehem High School Assistant Principal Scott Landry has seen his share of hard-to-reach students, but after completing a summertime program combining physical fitness with alternative learning, he says that some of BHS's most frequent offenders are having a dramatically improved school year.

The impetus for Landry's Project SOAR—School of Academic Recovery—came from his own experience with a "boot camp" program at the Guilderland YMCA. He thought he might be able to apply some of those principles to some of the more frequent visitors to his office.

"I have these students who come in and out of my office as the assistance principal," he said. "A lot of them, I noticed this pattern that they had become used to failing, and it had become an expectation...I think some of them had just forgotten how to succeed."

His unique approach to this problem involved a summertime program that focused not only on specialized academic instruction, but physical fitness training and teambuilding exercises designed to boost the self-esteem of students.

Nineteen Bethlehemstudents and six students from the Berne-Knox-Westerlo Central School District gathered on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at the YMCA's Camp Nassau in Guilderland from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. for six weeks over the summer. Landry said the changes he observed were startling, and pointed to empirical data as well.

Ninety-two percent of the students who started the program finished, said Landry, and in the first five weeks of the school year attendance rates have improved by 22 percent for the BHS students. Many stopped smoking, are keeping out of trouble at school and have made strides academically, in part thanks to

the continued use of NovaNet learning software provided by Capital Region BOCES.

"I can't say enough about how hard these kids worked," Landry said. "I look at these kids and it was really amazing to watch the transition of where they were at the start to where they were at the end."

But beyond the numbers, Landry said he's seen a marked improvement in how these students approach school in general.

"I have a student who is actually now attending college writing workshops who, last year, we weren't even sure she was going to graduate much less move on," he said.

Verizon Wireless cut Landry a deal on the equipment needed to connect 10 laptops wirelessly to the Internet and Dick's Sporting Goods helped students buy uniforms. It was largely through such corporate and independent sponsorship that the program was possible in the first place—Landry estimated the cost of the summertime program at \$35,000, which included meals, transportation, uniforms and other expenses.

"I think in terms of the cost and the impact that it has, that's not a whole lot of money," Landry said.

Not only did the Guilderland YMCA provide the location, but instructor Shannon Pinkowski helped out with the physical component. YMCA District Executive Director Karen Hennet said that holding SOAR at Camp Nassau was also a big help.

"It was a great spot, because it was an outdoor summer setting, not a classroom setting," she sad. "The goal of the program was to, yes, to improve academically in the long run, but also to mainly build the self esteem for the students."

Hennet said that she'd like to lend the use of the park next year, and hopes other schools might take interest.


"My hope is that the Guilderland district would find value in the program now that the pilot has completed," she said.

The BC School District also pitched in by securing a federal grant, as did other area groups with grants of their own. But with fiscal concerns prevailing in the private sector and reaching crisis levels in the public sphere, Landry acknowledged that his goal of keeping the program rolling in the summer of 2010 would require continued generosity. But given what the program has achieved so far, Landry is hopeful that sponsors will continue to recognize its value.

"We want to keep it moving forward, small at first and then from there," Landry said.

Landry will present the program at the BOCES Northeast Regional Information Center Awareness Day on Friday, Dec. 11, and highlight how students worked with NovaNet. Administrators from area high school districts will gather for the conference.

Administrators at The College of Saint Rose are also interested in how SOAR can provide internship opportunities for their education students. Landry will be meeting with college officials in the near future.





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

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

Pair makes music for others

Bethlehem natives record 50th song for business venture

When Andrew Eckel and Colin Summers formed business venture/music project PoetryToMusic, they weren't sure if they'd find a single customer. But now, 50 songs in, they both expect their business to continue to grow.

Web site, Their PoetryToMusic.com, set up in 2006, offers to turn customers' including recordings with voice and one or multiple instruments. or sheet music. Recording in their home studios - Eckel in

Cambridge, Mass., and Summers in Brooklyn — the pair send the songs to customers as mp3s or CDs. Prices range from \$30 to

The project's 50th song, 'Girls of Sendai," was recorded by Eckel for Vince Craig, an-Australian living in Japan. Among the lyricists who've had songs made by PoetryToMusic are several international and returning customers.

"One of our favorite repeat customers," Summers said, "is words into songs, with options an Australian named Stephen A. Jeffrey, whose song topics have. included lost love, science fiction, Einstein and his home country."

Some PoetryToMusic

customers, unlike Jeffrey, never considered the possibility of writing poetry or songs before discovering the site. "Most of our customers don't consider themselves poets," Eckel said. "Many are first-time writers who want to make their friends laugh or are in love." Eckel noted that customers have written birthday and Christmas songs for friends.

The songwriters met in high school in Delmar and started PoetryToMusic after Eckel graduated from the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and Summers had one year left at Emerson College. The business, run by musicians with two arts degrees and no business training, had a slow start. According to Summers, "The 50 songs weren't spread out evenly over three and a half years. In fact, 20 have been recorded in 2009 and the year's not over yet."

PoetryToMusic is not yet a full-time job for either songwriter, but both are hopeful and say it would be a "dream job." "I love recording these songs and then hearing back from happy customers," Summers said.

The two are proud of their 50 unique songs and say they'll never be tempted to speed up the songwriting process by copying a formula or creating many similar-sounding songs. "We don't reuse melodies," Eckel said. "The whole reason we do this is that we like picking out chords and writing melodies. If I were going to cut corners and reuse melodies, I'd be better off just skipping the whole thing and becoming a computer programmer instead."

Slingerlands congregation looks to Delmar location

Young church must expand space for growing flock

A young United Church of Christ congregation that has grown out of its current space is looking to relocate from Slingerlands to Delmar, and its plan to do so is before the Bethlehem Planning Board.

Journey United Church of Christ was founded in April of 2008, and is looking to lease a space in the building that houses the orthodontic practice of Michael Parker at 500 Kenwood Ave. The new location should hold 70 or 80 persons after renovations, though the town must set an occupancy limit as part of its planning review.

Rev. Sandy Damhof said the congregation is unique in the area: the nearest United Church of Christ church is located in Albany.

'Our denomination does demographic studies," she said. "They have a goal of siting new churches where there are currently no United Church of Christ congregations.

The congregation started with 20 or 25 members, she said, and has grown to about 40. Their current place of worship on New Scotland Road will only hold 50 people.

If the planning process and work at the building goes smoothly, Damhof said the congregation could be relocated as soon as January of February.

There will be a public hearing at the Tuesday, Dec. 15, meeting of the Planning Board for the lease's special use permit. Though having the church relocate to this location fits within the town's comprehensive plan and the area's residential zoning, the Planning Board likes to have further review on a project of this nature, said Director of Economic Development and Planning Michael Morelli.

'Certain uses, you want to have the opportunity to take a closer look at," he said. "At a house of worship, typically large groups of people may gather at the same time, they all may leave at the same time."

Under state law, a public hearing must be held whenever a special use permit is being considered.

Damhof said that once relocated to Bethlehem, Journey would make an effort to connect with the town food pantry and other services. The congregation worked to provide holiday meals through the New Scotland food pantry this year.

The congregation has also adopted a village in Uganda and does work in the Pine Hills area of Albany.

Damhof said the United Church of Christ is "very peace and justice oriented."

"We're very active in the community in terms of helping out people who are poor or just in need of some help," she continued. "We're very much about living beyond our four

TD gives grant for housing efforts

TD Charitable Foundation recently donated \$35,000 in grants to support housing stabilization efforts in Albany through its "Housing for Everyone" competition.

Now in its fifth year, the "Housing for Everyone" grant competition offers housing nonprofits a chance to win funds for projects that help to stabilize the housing environment in communities where TD Bank does business. Grants ranged from \$10,000 to \$100,000. The Albany County grant recipients were two of 56 winners selected for funding out of nearly 500 applicants.

Albany County Rural Housing Alliance's mission is to develop. rehabilitate and restore buildings and residences in rural and suburban Albany County in an effort to increase the quality and quantity of housing available to citizens of low and moderate income status and to provide technical assistance and educational programs to citizens, organizations and local governments concerning housing programs and opportunities. The funds from the Housing for Everyone grant will be support ACRHA's Subprime Foreclosure Prevention Services program which provides intervention and prevention of foreclosures to predominantly low to moderate income households. The primary area that is served is throughout Albany County, but ACRHA reaches into Schoharie, Saratoga. Warren and Washington counties.

Homeless and Traveler's Aid Society is a point-of-entry human services agency that helps the poor, the homeless and others in need lead independent, selfsufficient and safe lives within the community. They are a resource for collaborative change. Serving the New York State Capital District since 1924, HATAS has served as the central intake, assessment, and access point for the Albany County emergency shelter system for over 20 years. Last year, HATAS served nearly 5,000 people including nearly 600 families and over 1,500 children. The funds from the Housing for Everyone grant competition will support HATAS' Pathways Project's mission to construct 60 units of scattered-site housing for homeless Albany County persons with disabling conditions. These households receive rental subsidies for affordable housing and case management services that help them thrive.

When notified about the award. Homeless and Traveler's Aid Society's executive director, Ira L. Mandelker said, "We are so grateful that TD Charitable Foundation has such a strong commitment to their community partners, and has again recognized our Pathways Project for support. Federal grants make our 60 units of scattered-site housing affordable for our family and individual households, but all of our residents have serious disabilities, nearly all live with mental illness and have drifted in and out of homelessness. For

them, 'affordability' is necessary but insufficient for them to retain their housing."

Through the "Housing for Everyone" program, the TD Charitable Foundation donated a total \$2 million in 2009, and has invested nearly \$5.3 million in affordable housing to date.



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
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

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Shakespeare without a net

BHS students to star in production of "As You Like It"

If it's true that all the world's a stage, a group of students at Bethlehem High School have been getting some real-world experience as they prepare for a production of William Shakespeare's "As You Like It," to be shown on eight occasions later this month.

This will be the 21st consecutive year that a Shakespeare play has graced the high school auditorium. Director James Yeara - who also directed the previous 20 — said that the bard's plays are not only recognizable to the cast and audience alike, but they offer students something beyond the typical high school theater


"It's the challenge," he said. "It's the greatest theatrical challenge and training you can have."

To pull off such a hefty task, the troupe has been practicing rigorously since auditions in September—some members even earlier than that-with rehearsals four days a week from 3 to 6 p.m. In the few weeks leading up to the show, rehearsal expands to six days a week and can go late into the evening.

The production has a 32member cast, including members of the Chorus, along with 20 students who are providing backstage and technical support to the actors. Most don't have to attend every practice, but Stage Director and senior Cathleen Owens is one student who's been at Yeara's side through the whole ordeal.

"It's a lot of work, having to fill out college applications and that senior year stuff' along with the theater work, she said.

For many of the students, acting is a hobby and it will continue to be so in the future. They know that the field of live

performance can be competitive and low paying, but in the sphere of a high school production it's fun and a great social experience.

"It's nice to do this in a lowpressure environment, where if we screw up we still eat," said senior Cormac McCarthy, who will play Touchstone, a clown.

"You can have a whole new experience up on the stage," said senior Meghan Seely, who will play Phebe, a shepherdess.

Others, though, feel that performance is a calling and plan to pursue it as a major in college, including junior Brittany Martel, who will play Rosalind.

"I just love acting and singling and all that jazz," she said. "Even though I'm just a junior, it's what I want to do.'

"As You Like It" is one of the more musical plays penned by Shakespeare, and was probably written around the same time as other well-known works like

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"Henry V." "Julius Caesar" and "Hamlet." It also contains the famous monologue, "All the world's a stage.'

It's more good-natured than the playwright's heavier, more dramatic works, taking place chiefly in the forest and comprised mostly of the comedic pursuit of love. It's also a lesserknown production, though critics tend to agree it's among Shakespeare's better works.

"It's a popular play for professionals, but for odd reasons it's a difficult play to do with high schoolers," Yeara said, adding that his players have risen to the challenge. "It's a good time, it's a funny play, it's a challenging play and there are some talented kids on the stage."

The troupe picked "As You Like It" by vote. Yeara gives them about 10 choices he felt were within their skill level.

"I personally prefer the

tragedy plays, but I wouldn't say this production is better or worse," said McCarthy.

Yeara added a few additional Elizabethan songs to draw upon the musical talents of the Chorus. BHS players will also employ the use of a Maypole on-stage for the final wedding scene that closes the play. The tall wooden pole still found at the center of many western European villages is used in the celebration of Mayday.

Yeara said he was struck by the presence of a Maypole in many Stratford-area towns when he spent a year of graduate

Francis said that making businesses more accessible will help retain customers with disabilities, make their friends and relatives more likely to do business there and will give a business a leg up on competitors who are not disabled friendly.

"The Community Empowerment Project is an extension of our continuing efforts to develop a comprehensive long-term care plan for the county that expands services and supports to enable older adults and disabled individuals to remain in their community to adapt to the elderly and ... for, as long as possible," said Albany County Executive Mike Breslin in a statement. "This first forum is specifically geared to businesses and organizations to offer simple

steps to become more aging and disabled friendly, and we will be holding future forums to educate and engage other community stakeholders as well."

The grant supports initiatives by Breslin to keep the elderly and disabled in the community, something he has pushed for during his administration. Breslin has said his longterm care plan includes more focus on keeping patients in the community and has cited that as one part of his reason for wanting to shut down the Albany County Nursing Home, something Breslin also noted is too costly.

Erin Stachewicz, the Albany County long-term care coordinator, said the forums are a good starting point as the Internet has become more popular and Web sites can be difficult to navigate for a number of demographics, including the elderly.

Stachewicz said there are plans for forums in 2010 dealing with planning and zoning as well a number of other target areas. Surveys and feedback complied from the forums will help quantify the work that has been done and guide future outreach and education.

"The Community Empowerment Project is consistent with our current efforts to develop a comprehensive long term care plan for the county that expands affordable and reliable home and community-based long term care services in our community," Breslin said in a written statement when the grant was awarded. "We must ensure our communities have the supports and services in place to enable residents to remain where they want to be for as long as possible."

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

He did predict that these two factors would be a "continued draw" in the future, though.

With 252.9 teachers in the district, there is a roughly 20-to-1 student-teacher ratio, which Tebbano said is right around where the district wants to be. This figure does not equate to class size, however.

While the recession caused a glut of students this year, it is likely that the slump will hasten a decline in enrollment numbers in the coming years due to a lack of development in the area. Tebbano said the district has met with administrations from Bethlehem and surrounding towns and determined that many housing projects have stalled or been abandoned — to date this year, just 13 applications for housing startups have been awarded, for example.

Because of the economic slowdown ... there's very little going on in new development in any of these areas," Tebbano said.

The district is predicting enrollment in the 2010-11 school year will drop to 4,865. While that does not seem to be a significant difference, it can have a sizable impact on how the district budgets and organizes class sections for the coming year.

The topic of employing combination or multi-age classrooms was briefly discussed at the Wednesday, Dec. 2, meeting of the Board of Education, where Tebbano presented the longrange data. Tebbano said that by employing combination classrooms the district could remove up to 11 elementary teacher positions for a maximum savings of \$700,000, without increasing class sizes.

This would be a change the school board would have to approve and enter into next year's budget. BC is anticipating that state aid will decrease by \$2.5 million next year.

Tebbano explained that combination classrooms are similar to multi-age ones, but in combination classrooms the students don't necessarily move on to the next grade as a group. Instead, qualified teachers are used to level out class sizes temporarily.

The long-range report will be posted on the district's Web

Budget process looms

BC administrators also provided board members with specific answers to questions raised at the last board meeting, when there was a discussion about the impacts of the tiered reductions implemented last school year.

Those questions mostly dealt with the direct ramifications of certain cutbacks that saved to achieve good grades this year. the district about \$2 million last, year.

At both the elementary and middle school levels, for example, the district eliminated one AIS math teacher position, a program that many might know as remedial math. The result, said district officials, is that the number of students participating in the program dropped significantly—at the middle school, 25 students were enrolled, compared to 73 last year, for example.

"This is a sharp decline in what we've had previously," said Assistant Superintendent Jody Monroe.

The AIS program now only serving students it is mandated to enroll, she continued, instead of accepting students recom-

mended by teachers. There's a similar story at the high school, where the CORE program for sophomores at risk of failing multiple subjects was eliminated for a savings of \$62,500.

Last year, said Principal Charles Abba, 10 students who completed the program went on Without the program in place, administrators have identified 10 students they would have selected for CORE and tracked their progress. All are failing at least three subjects, said Abba.

"I'm not suggesting that CORE would have had that significant a difference with each of these kids, but this is clearly what we're missing," he contin-

Tebbano said that with many of the special education and alternative program cuts, the possibility exists that some students will miss out on learning opportunities that would better enable them to achieve graduation.

"Not all students can fit into the same mold we expect them to fit into," he said.

In the athletics department, deferring the replacement of uniforms may have to be reevaluated in sports where there is more wear and tear on equipment. At the high school, 679 students were enrolled in fall sports.

"By making the adjustments, we allowed these programs to continue," Tebbano said.

Cutting the equivalent of a full time music teacher at the high school for a savings of \$62,500 has resulted in larger lesson group sizes and the eliminations of a rotating chamber music program. Students are making attempts to reform this group, however.

The Board of Education will begin the budget process shortly, meeting on Saturday, Dec. 12, for a general strategy session and then moving into the first of three public budget forums on Tuesday, Jan. 12. Additionally, the district has posted a budget survey on its Web site.

tion devices (televisions, radios, musical instruments, etc.) and companion animals.

"No person shall allow a companion animal to engage in habitual barking, crying, or whining, and consistently disturb the comfort or repose of any person other than the owner of the companion animal," the proposed law reads.

According to the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association, sounds at 70 decibels

are equivalent to busy traffic or a vacuum cleaner, and levels of 80 decibels are equivalent to a busy street or alarm clock. Sounds in excess of 80 decibels are considered potentially dangerous to one's hearing.

A committee was formed in 2007 to study the possibility of a noise ordinance. The public demand for such a law has been strong, according to Supervisor Jack Cunningham.

When I first came into office, I was getting a lot of complaints from people about noise," he

We get a fair number of noise complaints," said Deputy Chief Timothy Beebe of the Bethlehem Police Department, who sat on the committee.

Without a law or ordinance, though, police can't do much unless the issue is disturbing and frequent enough to be considered criminal harassment.

"Other than politely asking them to turn it down, at this point there's a not a lot we can do," Beebe continued.

The committee did not recommend a decibel limit to the town, but Cunningham noted that the more successful ordinances do include one. He noted that all = parts of the law, including the decibel ceiling, could be amended if it did not work out.

"I don't want government to be too heavy handed here, I want to create something as a true tool of enforcement where enforcement is really needed," Cunningham said. "We constructed it [the ordinance] in a way that it doesn't really prevent anyone from doing their normal activities.'

Councilman Sam Messina, who chaired the eight-member committee, said the group had originally looked at recommending a decibel level but decided not to suggest one.

"Eighteen of the 20 surrounding communities have noise ordinances," he said. "They vary greatly in terms of their comprehensiveness and the approach used by the municipalities."

There are various exceptions provided by the drafted law, including government operations, firearms, aircraft, routine or emergency maintenance and construction, disaster recovery activity and manufacturing activi-

"Reasonable agricultural related noise" in an agricultural district or zone and activities in accordance with the New York State Right to Farm Law would also be exempt from the provisions of the law.

Messina wondered what sort of agricultural noise would be "reasonable."

"Whenever you use a modifier like reasonable, it gets you to the point of, well, what do you define as reasonable?" he said.

He noted that since noise complaints tend to come along with fair weather and not in the winter, there will be plenty of time to make amendments to the law depending on what the public has to say Wednesday. The board could vote to adopt it immediately following the public hearing, however, if it feels no amendments are needed.

If passed, police and the building department will enforce the law using decibel meters. The devices are not expensive, Cunningham said.

Under the proposed law, convicted violators, would be subjected to a fine of \$50 to \$250 for the first offense; \$100 to \$250 and/or up to 10 days imprisonment for the second offense; and a fine of not less than \$250 and/or up to 15 days imprisonment for the third offense and subsequent offenses.

He said the district has used the assistance of the Board of Cooperative Educational Services, at no charge, to hire a superintendent in the past.


"I think we want someone who can be effective," he said. "[Someone] with a viewpoint about how we can improve ourselves."

It is clear to see that they have had a major influence on the contemporary titans of American painting, such as Nell Blaine, Mary Frank, Wolf Khan, Paul Resika and the early works of Richard Deibenkorn.

A history of Clark's collection is described in text, and to either side works by George Loftus Noyes (1864-1954) and Arthur Clifton Goodwin (1864-1924) set the pace for the show inside. The Noyes is a delightful snow-laden pathway, with wheel tracks carved into the shadows on the trail. The Goodwin is a twilight scene of a peaceful village edge in fading winter shadows.

Peppered throughout the show are other little gems, not to be overlooked, such as the Robert Wood (1889-1979) with a fields of blue flowers covering the foreground of a Texas range; or two perfect paintings of figures in the landscape, by Alan Dean Cochran (1888-1971) and Emile Guppe (1896-1978). The Guppe has two nudes bathing beside a white birch.

Other gems include:

A 1935 bold little painting featuring a brightly colored songbird on a solitary twig, above a freshly painted winter scene by Charles Curtis (1886-1950) called "Cockle-Tee-Tee."

"Precious tip of a sailboat" by Irving Ramsey Wiles (1861-1948) with pastels and brushstrokes that show complete sensitivity to the subject, evoking a soft, sensuous feeling of sailing in the wind on the water.

The Wiles sailboats are positioned above a precious landscape by one of the few female painters of the era, Margaret Jordan Patterson (1867-1950). This work has an understated style that succeeds in luring the eye to distant blue hills (made with just a very few simple brushstrokes) through the venue of a row of upright

trees. It is a sensitive, immediate and playful work.

The feel of spring and the smell of new grass comes to life as one takes in the John Jcseph Enneking (1841-1916) brightly colored meadow scene.

One of the walls contains several magnificent works inspired by the fresh clean harbors in and around Glouster, Massachusetts. A nearly pointillist approach to a shipyard is taken by Lillian Burk Messer (1864-1942) and a fauvist approach to similar subject matter is taken by Harry Aiken Vincent (1864-1931).


Along the back wall, anc by far the most astounding works on display, are the collection of winter scenes, clearly done in the open air (pleinair) style, where a somewhat uncomfortable hike in the wood, freezing fingers, and

rapidly moving winter sunlight were all battled by the painters as they emerge victoriously with some of the most provocative landscapes ever done. A favorite is the "Bucks County Landscape" by Walter Emerson Baum (1884-1956) and is featured on cards in the museum's store.

Each painting in the show will speak differently to each viewer, but for certain, this show is a rare glimpse into the insights of a masterful collector and a truly outstanding display of the teamwork of a brilliant curator and staff.

The Hyde Collection in Glens Falls is located at 161 Warren St. The paintings from the Clark collection will be on display unti March 28.

Relatives say it is important to remember all veterans

On May 24, 1944, 1st Lt. Paul Voehringer of Ballston Spa was flying over Berlin at 29,500 feet and counting down to bomb the financial district and war ministry. Suddenly, his lead aircraft was hit by German flak and crashed from a combination of fire, wing failure and uncontrolled maneuvers. The plane went down, and Voehringer died in the crash.

Nearly 66 years later, the U.S. government has awarded him a Purple Heart for his heroic efforts during World War II, and his family accepted the award and others at a ceremony at Baliston Town Hall on Monday, Nov. 30.

Paul Voehringer's nephew, Richard Voehringer, accepted the Purple Heart, World War II Victory Medal, European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal, Honorable Service Lapel Pin, Gold Star Lapel Pin and a flag that flew over the nation's Capitol, while family members, friends and town officials looked cn.

"It's an honor, surely, because I'know by the crcwd here and the people here and all my relatives here, that it signifies that they remember the veterans. That's important beczuse we would not be here if it wasn't for their sacrifices back in WWII," said Richard Voehringer, who served as a Navy Airman during the Korean War and on the Town of Ballston Planning Board for 17 years. "The real heroes in WWII were those that offered their lives and whose lives were taken to defend our country, our liberties and freedoms and our democratic way of life."

Congressman Scott Murphy presented the awards and was joined by Councilwoman Kimberly Ireland, Ballston Town Supervisor Patti Southworth, Judith Aronstamm from Congressman Murphy's office and Gene Corsale, who works on the deceased veterans ceremonies for Saratoga County.

"So many step up to serve our nation during difficult times. They are willing to put their lives on hold and many pay the ultimate price, their life. We should thank our veterans and those currently serving in our armed forces for their dedication and hard work protecting our nation," said Southworth."

Paul Voehringer was born in 1916, graduated from Ballston Spa High School and was a self-taught musician, artist and golfer. He enlisted in the Army in 1940 and served in Anchorage, Alaska, until 1943 when he received an honorable discharge. He then enlisted in the Army Air Force and served as a bombardier at an air station in Nuthampsted, England, where he participated in 12 bombing raids before the one that took his life.

Richard Voehringer said that over the years, he has located three survivors from the crash that killed his uncle and was able to learn exactly what happened that day. He said it was nice to finally know what happened to the "honest and good man" he grew up with.



Bethlehem won the regular season title with a 7-1 record.





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

Guilderland built an 18-7 lead in the first quarter and extended its advantage to 47-31 with a strong third quarter.




