

Closure process grinds into gear

BC teachers union funding phone survey of Clarksville households

The Bethlehem Central School District's Board of Education wants to make sure any benefits from closing facilities would make it into the 2011-12 budget.

Superintendent Michael Tebbano had

set a date of April 6 to make a decision on whether the board would like to close down Clarksville Elementary School and/or the Central Office Building this year, delay it for another year or two or nix the idea altogether.

At a recent school board meeting, board member Laura Ladd Bierman made the suggestion to come to a decision on closure by March 30 because she said it would help the board realize any savings before releasing next year's budget.

Vista funding to be reworked

Meeting lacked proper notification under state sunshine law

Town officials on Thursday, Feb. 10, discussed the future of the Vista Technology Campus in a workshop at Town Hall that was not properly noticed under the state's open meetings law.

Much of the meeting involved the construction of Vista Boulevard, the 3/4-mile road that will lead into the heart of the Vista Technology Campus. Joe Nicolla of Columbia Development said the project must move ahead quickly to satisfy the schedules of potential tenants — something he has said on several previous occasions. One party has to have a 110,000-square-foot building ready by Nov. 15.

"We have to be able to respond to that person," he said.

Once infrastructure is in place, he continued, his self-described role as the project's salesperson will become much easier.

"This is going to fill up so fast it's going to make people's heads spin," Nicolla said.

Also discussed at length was how that road will be built. It had been proposed that the Bethlehem Industrial Development Agency issue tax-exempt bonds to the builders and the town form a special taxing district so tenants would pay the cost back.

It now looks like that taxing district will be abandoned for another plan, but it's tough to say what mechanism might replace it.

Tie vote in Elmwood Park referendum

Land buy heading to voters will see another vote in April

A public referendum taken last week in the Elmwood Park Fire District ended in a tie, prompting officials to schedule two public hearings on a proposed land buy before again putting the issue to voters in April.

A Tuesday, Feb. 8, vote to bond \$315,000 to purchase a 6-acre parcel of land next to the North Bethlehem Fire Department firehouse on Russell Road came out 47-47. The outcome was delayed a few days because two of the paper ballots were questionably marked. One was thrown out.

That's a fairly high turnout for fire department referendums, said North Bethlehem Fire Department Chief Paul Fuino. Some clearly felt strongly about the issue.

"One person said to me, 'I wish this firehouse would burn down,'" Fuino said. "It was something I don't think we've ever seen before."

Chairman of the Elmwood Park Board of Commissioners (the district that funds the fire department) John Mahoney said people may

see a rise in their tax bills. The district's budget went up 2.5 percent this year, but due to the way assessment values impact the three-town district some residents saw their taxes increase by more than 6 percent.

He said a large part of North Bethlehem is comprised of the Beverwyck Nursing Home, which pays a PILOT fee to the town instead of taxes.

"We have no control over that," Mahoney said.

He added Beverwyck accounts for 30 to 35 percent of all the department's fire and EMS calls.

In addition to holding public hearings on March 8 and 29, the fire district's Board of Commissioners has decided to use a portion of its building repair fund to offset the cost, lowering the amount that needs to be borrowed.

When asked why the district hadn't scheduled public meetings for the first vote, Mahoney said the district hadn't expected much interest due to past history.

"When the fire department went to vote two years ago to purchase a fire truck...I don't know, 20 people voted," he said. "The fire truck before that, it wasn't a big issue."

Department officials have said the land is being sought to keep a buffer

Town OKs member dues

The debate over exactly how much the Town of Bethlehem will pay for its employees' memberships in professional organizations ended with a whimper rather than a bang Wednesday, Feb. 9, when the Town Board unanimously approved a \$12,345 list of dues.

That's a \$327 reduction from the list the board has considered at its last meeting, when there was insufficient support to adopt the list.

Since then, Supervisor Sam Messina trimmed a memberships to the state Recreation and Parks Society, the American Society of Notaries and the Society of Resource Management.

Councilman Mark Hennessey objected to the late release of the revised dues schedule. It was not included on the meeting agenda or released as part of the information packet made available to the public.

Sam Messina said he didn't have time to review the matter and make the reductions until over the weekend, when the meeting agenda had already been put in place. He brought the matter up under the "New Business" section of the agenda.

The membership dues became a topic of discussion when several board members at the organizational said the list should be pared down. Including the latest cuts, about \$2,500 was removed from the dues the town pays, a roughly 15 percent reduction.

A session with the masters

BC High student plays with, composes for, New York Philharmonic

It is the goal of thousands of musicians to play in a group like the New York Philharmonic. Not many accomplish it during high school.


But Bethlehem High School senior Eric Segerstrom earlier this month not only sat in with those world-renowned players, they performed a piece he wrote just for them.

The Philharmonic played Segerstrom's "From the Catacombs," a haunting, but also bold, exposition running at about two minutes and focused on the marimba. It was written as part of the New York Youth Symphony's "Making Score" program and performed on Wednesday, Feb. 2.

Segerstrom played the piece's marimba solo at Avery Fisher Hall in Lincoln Center Plaza.

"It's really like a once-in-a-lifetime kind of thing to play a solo part with the New York Philharmonic," Segerstrom said. "It's really incredible and amazing."

The opportunity came to Segerstrom through his participation in the Julliard School's pre-college program. Every

Saturday, he travels to the city to the exclusive program, which also offers unique connections to the music world. Through his mentor

there, a philharmonic member saw Segerstrom's compositions and invited him to write a piece for the young composers program.

A percussionist, Segerstrom levitated to the marimba, though he had the option of writing to any instrument.

"Rhythm is a huge focus in a lot of my pieces," he said. "But I've written for almost everything."

The BC High School senior's work has also been performed at

Boston University by the music ensemble The Fourth Wall and at the Percussive Arts Society convention in New York City.

His Philharmonic performance was almost hampered by a snowstorm, but Segerstrom stayed overnight in the city from Tuesday to Wednesday to be available to perform. His family, including his sister, who studies violin performance at New York University, were able to attend.

Segerstrom is now focused on auditioning for college. He plans to continue his musical studies and has applied to prestigious institutions, including Julliard. His senior recital at Julliard is also coming up on April 2.

BC administrators to take wage freeze

Teachers union says 'significant' proposal in the works

Bethlehem Central School District administrators will be taking a pay freeze next school year.

Altogether, 26 employees, including school principals, department directors and upper administrative staff, will take no pay increase in the 2011-12 school year budget. That should yield a \$65,000 savings, which is still a long way from closing an estimated \$5 million budget gap.

Superintendent Michael Tebbano, who is one of the employees taking the freeze, said the Bethlehem Principals Association and the Bethlehem Central Management Group approached the district.

"Their intent was to offer some savings because of the budget crisis," Tebbano said. "As far as I'm concerned it was a clean gift to the school district."

"As leaders of the district, we believe this is the right thing to do," said Slingerlands Principal

and President of the BPA Heidi Bonacquist. "As administrators we see the impact these tough economic times are having on the buildings we lead and on opportunities for students. This was an important step for us to take."

Tebbano acknowledged the freeze would not forestall the cuts administrators have been discussing. Staffing cuts are a part of those plans, including more than 20 teaching positions. If sizable savings are to be seen, they'd have to come from the much larger groups, like the Bethlehem Central Teachers Association. President Dave Rounds said "something significant" is being discussed within that union.

"Within a few weeks we will likely be putting a proposal forward to our members that would result in savings to the district," he said. "There's a lot of different pieces right now... what our proposal looks like in the end has yet to be decided."

Any change to the terms of the district's contact with the BCTA would have to be approved by its membership.

Walking around in a salad daze

The author is the food writer for the Spotlight Newspapers and the mother of three children: Lucy, age 10, Zoe, age 9, and Elliot, age 6.

The first time Elliot ate a salad, he was barely two years old. And the truth of the matter is: that salad is the only one he's ever had.

It was eaten one afternoon, long ago, when we were shopping for groceries together. It was way back in the day when Elliot and I would see the girls off to school, and have the whole day together. The good old days. He and I would go to the library, meet a friend to take a walk at Five Rivers, and then have a quiet afternoon before Lucy and Zoe arrived from school. On this particular day, we stopped to pick up a few things for dinner before heading home.

He was at that most beloved age, big eyes and pink, round cheeks. Elliot preferred walking to riding in the shopping cart. It's much easier to get into things that way. So he would toddle through the produce, causing apple avalanches and insisting on putting more onions than we would ever need in our cart. When something new caught his eye, I secretly put all but two onions back. It was after the onion incident that we saw her, in the back of the produce department. She was offering samples of Caesar salad, in little white cups. Even at the tender age of almost-two, he understood that the grocery is all about finding good things to eat, and tasting as you go along.

The nice lady offered him a little cup of salad. Being curious, he took the cup, and the little fork. This new thing required real studying, and therefore sitting. So I lifted him up to the seat at the front of the cart. First, he handed me the little fork. What ever would he want with a fork, anyway? And then

he used his little fingers to dig around in the cup, touching the lettuce and kind of smushing it around. Oh boy, I thought. And I got ready to pick it up off the ground, something we mothers are very practiced at.

But then he did the oddest thing. He ate it. And then he put his fingers back in for more. I watched him, shocked. And by golly, he ate the whole thing. "Mo. Mo. Mo," he sang, asking, begging, for more. You can be sure I swung my cart around and headed back to the salad lady. She filled up his cup, and gave us one more besides.

We walked through the produce department, me choosing the fruits and veggies I needed, and Elliot eating his salad. Yup, I thought, that's my baby. Eating salad. The ladies we passed by all exclaimed at this beautiful little guy, happy, eating a healthy green salad. I smiled, proud. There he is, I thought again, my little Elliot, eating his salad. I might have been strutting.

We carefully choose all the fixings for Caesar salad: a big, green, crunchy head of romaine lettuce. Lemon, garlic and a fine wedge of Parmesan cheese. We headed home, for Elliot to take a nap. Me, I had important things to do. Things like Caesar salad. Elliot snoozed, his belly full of salad, and I whipped up a batch of Caesar dressing. It had to be just right: creamy, with a bit of lemon tang and just a touch of garlic.

It's possible that I told my friends about it on the phone. "Did I tell you? Elliot eats salad now!" And my mother-in-law called, checking in and getting her usual grandchild report. I gave her an earful about how Elliot was the World's Most Incredible Caesar Salad Eater.

This, she listened to in great and glorious detail, soaking up every bit as only a grandmother will do. Every now and then she would toss in an "incredible!" and "I don't believe it!"

The girls came home, Paul pulled in around dinner time, and soon everyone was ready to eat. His sisters were ready to see this amazing salad eating. Paul couldn't believe it. Elliot wasn't the pickiest of eaters, but he didn't exactly eat greens with gusto. Sure and confident, I placed a bowl of my lovingly-made Caesar salad down in front of him. Without hesitation, he pushed it away. And he has never, to this day, eaten Caesar, or any other tossed salad, again. I have to admit, it was hard to accept defeat. I spent years saying, "But you love salad!" He just pushed the bowl away, again and again.

He's done the same with other vegetables. A few years ago, I made a roasted beet salad, and put a scoop on his plate. He ate heartily. I beamed. "Look," I told his sisters, "Elliot eats beets. Now, why don't you try them?" To no avail. I made beets again very soon after that, and gave him a generous helping. He looked at me, shocked. "I don't eat dat!" I couldn't believe it. I should have learned my lesson from the Caesar salad incident. But I didn't. And I continue to push vegetables and other healthy food on my family. Most likely, I always will.

Now, Elliot won't eat tossed salad. Of this I am sure. But, he will dip vegetables in dressing. He'll eat carrots, green beans and asparagus, all dipped in ranch dressing. He also discovered balsamic vinegar, which he has approved for dipping. I'm always looking for new things to dip. Because, well, the same old thing gets boring. Even if you are 6. A few weeks ago I bought a bag of pea shoots from the farmers market, with the intention of putting together some fancy-schmancy salads for Paul and me. Nothing I'd

balsamic vinegar watercress or pea shoots

Serve the greens on a plate with a small cup of vinegar to dip them in.

Salad for Everyone Else serves 4

1/2 head romaine lettuce 1/4 cup pumpkin seeds, toasted
1 handful watercress 1 small handful cilantro, chopped
1/2 green apple, cored and chopped 2 oz. crumbled goat cheese (optional)
1/4 cup pitted green olives, chopped

For the dressing: Combine 1/2 cup olive oil, 1/4 cup apple cider vinegar, 2 tablespoons chopped chives and 1-2 drops of honey in a blender and puree. Season to taste with sea salt and black pepper.

Wash and dry both lettuces. Tear the romaine into bite-sized pieces and put in a large salad bowl with the watercress. Add the other salad ingredients and toss with a bit of dressing, adding a little at a time so as not to over-dress. Give it a turn with the pepper mill and serve.

even offer to my picky son. But then, munching on one of the shoots and marveling at how sweet and tender they were, I decided to offer that up as a dipper. He took to them like a 2-year-old to Caesar salad. Now, it makes almost a nightly appearance at our table. I've had to replace the pea shoots with other tender greens, like watercress, because we just don't get to the farmers market that often in winter.

So while Elliot sits and eats his greens dipped in balsamic vinegar, the rest of us eat real, tossed salad. This one I made a few weeks ago, while dreaming of warmer days. Sometimes, I like to leave behind the root vegetables and stews of winter and cheat, just a little bit. Having a simple piece of

chicken and a beautiful salad makes me feel like spring is just a little bit closer than it is. Elliot even helped me make this one, whipping up the dressing and using a butter knife to chop apples. This recipe is for those who like crunch and flavor in their salad. The green apple adds tartness, followed by salty olives, nutty seeds and the fresh taste of cilantro.

There was a time I thought Elliot would sit beside me every night, grinding fresh pepper on his mesclun greens and asking for more gorgonzola. What I have is a boy who will eat veggies, a few of them, and dip greens in vinegar. It might not be enough to call my mother-in-law and brag about, but still, I'm proud.

Police: Traffic stop yields cocaine bust



Technical foul

If you've read Charles Wiff's story on the restructuring of the Vista Finances, you know that there was some hubbub about the town giving proper public notice of the workshop, at which all members of the Town Board were present.

The Thursday, Feb. 10, meeting was advertised in the Feb. 9 edition of The Spotlight, as required by law governing the convening of a public body to discuss official business. So, in that regard, they were in compliance with open meetings law. But the meeting was not posted on the town's website or outside the Town Clerk's office on the public notice bulletin board.

"I am not sure why the notice was not put up online," Town Supervisor Sam Messina told Wiff Thursday afternoon. "I wish it had been there. ... It's our intent to get the word out there as far as we can."

Fair enough. We could use this space to bust a governing body's rocks because they failed to notify the public, on two of the venues on which they can do so, of a meeting during which the town's finances were discussed, but this is less of a "gotcha" moment than it is a teachable one.

Let's go to the chalkboard:

- Number of dollars required to construct Vista Boulevard: 7 million
- Number of square feet in the first building at the end of Vista: 40,000
- Number of square feet in the largest proposed building: 110,000
- Number of months they have, according to developers, to construct that building: 9
- Number of days between the notice published in *The Spotlight* and the meeting at which these numbers were discussed: 1
- Number of concerned residents at that meeting: 1
- Number of days until the IDA discusses this again (if you're reading this on Wednesday, Feb 16): 2

The point is this — notices aren't posted to satisfy some facet of New York state law, they're posted to keep the public informed. And when you're discussing the financing of a \$7 million road into something that is being held up as an economic savior in the Town of Bethlehem and only ONE person shows up, you've got a problem.

Regardless of how well-intentioned the board was in making the public aware of this meeting, they are faced with one of two harsh realities. Either they didn't advertise this meeting well enough and the electorate lost an opportunity to educate itself or the town adequately made notice of the meeting and the electorate just doesn't care.

Either scenario should make the members of the Town Board think about their roles as leaders of the community.

Be on the lookout for all types of cancer

You probably already know that cancer is the second leading cause of death in the United States each year. You're probably familiar with the fact that half of all men and one-third of all women in the US will develop cancer during their lifetimes and that many of these cases are preventable or, at the very least, treatable when caught early. But do you know what types to look out for?

There are certain types of cancer that everyone seems to know about. Lance Armstrong is almost more famous for having testicular cancer than he is for winning the Tour de France. Eighth-graders can tell you all about lung cancer and the dangers of cigarette smoking, and it seems like every teen magazine has run a story about skin cancer in the past few years. Breast cancer awareness has spiked thanks to foundations like Susan G. Komen for the Cure. It's become routine to find pink ribbons and packaging on everything from bags of SunChips to yogurt lids, and the color pink has, for many people, become synonymous with breast cancer.

While there's no doubt that it's a wonderful thing to be able to raise awareness for any variety of a disease that kills millions of people each year, breast cancer and other well-publicized types, like lung, testicular, skin and cervical cancer, are only a few of the many varieties of this disease. Some types are easy to prevent, detect, and even treat, but go unnoticed until they have caused irreversible damage, spread to other organs or reached an untreatable stage. By raising awareness for the lesser-known but equally dangerous types of cancer, we can help focus on prevention and early detection instead of relying solely on finding a cure. After all, prevention is the best medicine.

We can start right now, by educating ourselves. Eating healthy foods, exercising regularly, limiting sun exposure, not smoking, and paying attention to sudden, unexplained illnesses or bodily changes are the best ways to avoid or detect cancer of any kind. Be vigilant. See a doctor if

you notice odd changes or symptoms. Urge friends and relatives to do the same. Once you've protected yourself, become active in your community and schools by spreading the word about the dangers of little-known cancers and the easy steps that can be taken to prevent them. Get friends and family together to start an event or a fundraiser and raise awareness for the types of cancer that people aren't looking out for. With over 200 types of this disease, it won't be too hard to find one.

Point of View

Though they get a lot of attention, breast and lung cancer are only two of the ten deadliest kinds of cancer. Prostate and ovarian cancer, also on the list, get some media billing, but liver and esophageal cancer are rarely ever mentioned, though they take 79,773 and 66,659 lives per year, respectively. Pancreatic cancer is known to be one of the deadliest forms of the disease, but it receives very little media attention anyway. To compound the issue, most of the risk factors for pancreatic cancer remain unknown. There are no blood tests available, and because the pancreas is located deep within the body, a doctor cannot see or feel abnormalities during a physical exam until a tumor has grown so large that it begins to disturb the organs around it. Jaundice, weight loss, pain, digestive problems, and in some cases, diabetes can be signs of pancreatic cancer, but because these symptoms are so vague, the disease frequently goes undiagnosed until it has spread and the chances of recovery have slimmed. Many people think that Leukemia and non-Hodgkins lymphoma only impact children; while it's true that leukemia causes more deaths than any other cancer in children under the age of 20, it does still impact adults, and 9 out of 10 cases of non-Hodgkins lymphoma occur in adults.

Cancers that are not listed in the top 10 killers are still dangerous and, often, more easily treatable if they are caught early. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness of these types of cancer means preventative measures are

rarely taken and symptoms not easily recognized until it's too late. Thyroid cancer, for example, often goes undetected because the symptoms are not terribly different from that of a cold; most common include cough, difficulty swallowing, hoarseness, and neck swelling. The thyroid controls proper metabolic function, is responsible for producing the building blocks of cells, and is elemental in keeping the body temperature and energy levels regulated, as well as sending hormones to various organs to stimulate their proper functioning. If the thyroid is overtaken by cancer, the body will shut down. Most types of thyroid cancer can be treated, but some are caught too late—in large part because people aren't looking out for the symptoms. Risk factors for other types of cancer will skyrocket with age. Stomach cancer, which at one point was the leading cause of cancer deaths in the United States, can grow for years undetected. Bladder cancer shows symptoms that are commonly confused for those of a urinary tract infection. While smoking is one of the most significant risk factors for almost every type of cancer, age comes into play here: over 70 percent of people with bladder cancer and 2 out of 3 people affected by stomach cancer and are over the age of 65. Help loved ones find information on cancers that affect older people, and they may discover a crucial symptom before it's too late.

It might seem hard to differentiate between symptoms of cancer and things like a bladder infection or the flu. It's true that not every sore throat or stomachache is a sign of cancer, and shouldn't be treated as one. But it is important to be aware of these lesser-known and less-noticeable types of the disease, to pay attention to your body, and to spread the word to others. Cancer prevention isn't limited to the month of February, and the threat of the disease isn't limited to a handful of types. Make it a goal to devote part of each month to fighting cancer, whether it's an hour of talking to your kids about healthy habits or a weekend participating in or organizing a fundraiser. Next time you reach for a package of string cheese with a pink ribbon on it, remember that it's not only breast cancer, but all cancers that kill.

Closing Clarksville would be a continuation of bad decisions

Editor, *The Spotlight*:

In the face of a \$4.8 million budget deficit and citing a projected decline of the student population district-wide, the Bethlehem Central School District Board of Education has charged the Superintendent with conducting a feasibility study examining the potential closure of Clarksville Elementary School. The results of this study are due to be released in conjunction with the Superintendent's budget on Feb. 16.

In 2003, in order to meet the needs of a then projected population growth, the District began a \$93 million dollar Capital Construction and Improvement Project which included upgrades to existing schools, including a significant investment in Clarksville, but elected to construct a new elementary school, Eagle Elementary, to provide the classroom space needed for that growth. The projected population growth has not occurred.

By electing to build

a new school instead of modernizing and expanding existing schools sufficiently to address the projected population increase and then re-districting students away from those existing schools to populate the new school, the district in effect turned away from its commitment to the five existing community based elementary schools which had served it well for decades. Now, with a new, sixth elementary school in place, Clarksville has been targeted for closure as a result.

Built in 1948 and added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2008, Clarksville Elementary provides a safe and community-service oriented learning environment for its students, which is, in many ways, unique. Serving the western portions of the Town of Bethlehem and the areas of the Town of New Scotland located within the district, it is the only district school located outside the Town of Bethlehem.

The benefits Clarksville

Elementary provides its students are worth making great efforts to preserve. These benefits are not readily expressed in terms of dollars and cents and therefore do not lend themselves to a simple cost vs. benefit analysis. This school is important to the community and the impact of its closure will extend beyond those families whose children are students there. By paying a higher tax rate than District residents from the Town of Bethlehem, Town of New Scotland residents living within the school district do their part to support the District financially. Closing the school will throw away the investment the District made to upgrade and modernize Clarksville during the Capital Improvement project.

With the potential for development in the areas served by Clarksville acknowledged in the District's own 2010 Long Range Planning Report, any decision to close the school could prove to be short-sighted and fiscally irresponsible should

additional classroom space be required when future development does occur.

The District's academic programs are, and must continue to be, the budget priority. The culture and environment of each individual school is a critical component of those academic programs. Closing any successful and effective school should be a last resort.

I encourage the Board of Education and Superintendent Michael Tebbano to avoid placing the burden of the budget deficit unfairly upon a single school, its students and the community it has served for over sixty years. Do not allow the negative impact of past decisions to be magnified today. Find savings elsewhere. Our children and community will thank you.

The Bethlehem Central School District wants taxpayers to spend anywhere from \$3 million to \$8 million over the next five years to train and equip students with laptops.

College professors [I am one] have already concluded that technology may have produced students who don't care to or cannot read entire books. Parents know that their kids already may be spending too much time tied to "devices."

The federal government has cut its allocation to the states, the states have reduced support of localities; our tax burden is sure to rise, along with unemployment and foreclosures.

There may, in addition, be many people in the town who would find this latest expenditure a burden. Until we know precisely how it would affect the tax burden, now is not seem the time to increase spending on an untried experiment in education.

Group protests cell tower approval

Board to vote Tuesday night, visit spotlightnews.com for updates

A group of concerned parents and students gathered at Eagle Elementary School on Sunday, Feb. 13, to protest a cell tower proposed for construction nearby.

"We're concerned for the safety of our students and school employees," said Kim Strosahl, one of the event's organizers. Strosahl said she and other protesters are concerned not only with the tower's construction, but the fact that so few Bethlehem residents seem to know about it. "We're here to raise awareness," she said.


The group was joined by a handful of elementary, middle- and high school students who, after the protest, went into neighborhoods surrounding the elementary school to hand out red balloons and cards with anti-cell tower messages.

"The cell tower would affect the health of everyone around it," said 12-year-old Jeremy Luzinski, in seventh grade at Bethlehem Middle School.

Strosahl also said she is concerned with the impact the tower will have on surrounding properties' values.

"The fact is, when towers go up, prices go down," she said.

When asked if the lack of cell phone coverage could also drive property value down, Strosahl said arguments for more cell coverage in town are valid, but said the proposed tower on Van Dyke road

wouldn't fully alleviate the need for better coverage.

"What concerns me isn't spotty cell reception keeping people out of Bethlehem," said Strosahl, "it concerns me that this cell tower would keep them away."

Last June, a poll conducted by the Siena Research Institute in conjunction with *The Spotlight* showed that Bethlehem residents are largely in favor of a cell phone tower being built in western Delmar.

Among the 500 residents polled, 14 percent of respondents said a tower proposed — but since abandoned — by Independent Towers Holdings LLC should be built on school district property,

18 percent favored an application by ESCO Towers to build on private land off Van Dyke Road, 30 percent said either would be fine and 30 percent said no tower should be built.

Guillermo Martinez, another organizer of Sunday's event and chairman of Parents Against Cell Towers, said he was pleased with attention the protest received and planned on organizing another. He and other members of PACT plan on attending the Planning Board meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 15. A vote on the construction of the tower is scheduled for that evening. 

I've just adopted a rabbit and I have concerns about *E. cuniculi*, what is this?

Encephalitozoon cuniculi (*E. cuniculi*) is a parasite which can affect the central nervous system, eyes and kidneys of infected rabbits. Most rabbits are infected with *E. cuniculi* from their mother during pregnancy. Adult rabbits may become infected by ingesting or inhaling the urine of an infected rabbit. The infective spores then spread to other organs throughout the body. In some individuals the organism can colonize the brain, kidney and eyes. Some individuals may never show signs of disease. Others can show dramatic clinical signs. Neurologic signs include a head tilt, seizures, paralysis, aggression and behavioral changes. Ocular signs including cataracts can also be observed. Symptoms consistent with renal disease can occur which include increased thirst and urination and urine scalding. If you suspect that your rabbit may be infected with *E. cuniculi* go to your veterinarian. Diagnosis can be difficult as the blood tests available only indicate that your bunny has been exposed to the parasite and do not indicate active infection. The main prognostic indicator for a rabbit infected with *E. cuniculi* is the severity of clinical signs. People can become infected with this parasite; however the clinical significance remains unknown unless that individual is immunocompromised.



"The bridge that's there now is obsolete," said William Anslow, civil engineer for the county Department of Public Works. "Generally, 50 years out of a bridge built at that time is really outliving its life."

The county is studying two options for the new bridge design. Both would

actually raise the level of the bridge's freeboard, or height above the water. At times of high water, the river can nearly reach the bridge, said Anslow, and the county would like to see some extra room there. The problem is that raising the bridge requires work on the road leading up to it, adding to the replacement cost.

One option would involve raising the bridge by 1.7 feet and cost an estimated \$1.7 million. The second scenario would raise it 1.3 feet at a \$1.4 million cost.

"We're probably leaning toward option two at this point, but we're not going to decide that until we hear from the public," Anslow said.

The replacement would be funded through a federal aid project, with 80 percent being paid by federal funds, 15 percent by the state and the county covering the remaining percent.

The replacement would likely occur in 2012, with construction starting in the spring and ending in the fall. During construction, traffic normally using the bridge would have to detour. Pictuay Road connects routes 396 and 9W and is about 1.5 miles long.

"I don't think that this road generates a real high volume of traffic," Anslow said.

The public will have a chance to hear a presentation on the project from county planners and to provide comment at a meeting scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 17, at 6:30 p.m. at A.W. Becker Elementary School on Route 9W.

Town mulls smoking restrictions in parks

The Town of Bethlehem is considering excluding smoking from at least some areas in its parks system.

The Town Board on Wednesday, Feb 9, heard a presentation from the Capital District Tobacco-Free Coalition detailing how such a plan might be implemented. According to the group's Theresa Zubretsky, the coalition can provide signage for municipalities that pass resolutions adopting tobacco-free policies in their parks, reducing or eliminating any costs to towns.

She said a survey conducted by the Siena Research Institute indicates 80 percent of those in the Capital District think smoking should be banned from playgrounds. Considerable support also exists for taking smoking off of beaches

(55 percent) and out of parks altogether (48 percent).

"There's tremendous public support for it. It explains why this has just taken off," Zubretsky said.

Thirteen Capital District municipalities have adopted some form of tobacco-free policies in their parks. Most aren't laws—the City of Schenectady is the only place you can actually be fined for lighting up. Elsewhere, signs announcing tobacco-free zones are the only enforcement mechanisms.

"They rely on voluntary compliance with the policy. Social norm changes are really our best ally," Zubretsky said. "The municipalities that have implemented this today are very pleased with their decision to do it."

The Town of Bethlehem does restrict smoking in the pool facility at Elm Avenue Park and in any indoor areas.

Zubretsky said the benefits of restricting smoking are numerous, from limiting exposure to secondhand smoke to cutting down on litter (cigarette butts).

Not everyone is bound to be so enthusiastic about the idea. Several residents at Wednesday's meeting said it would be improper to restrict an activity that is legal and could easily be avoided in the open expanses of a park.

The Town Board made no decision Wednesday, but officials said they would be looking into the idea and speaking with other municipalities that have adopted a tobacco-free policy.

Book to tell Bethlehem's story through pictures

Bethlehem will be the latest Capital District area to see its pictorial history included in the Images of America series of books, which are recognizable by their ubiquitous sepia-toned covers.

Town Historian Susan Leath has been gathering photographs and writing captions for the book since last summer, when she agreed to author the paperback with Arcadia Publishing.

"It's definitely been a work in progress," she said. "I've always loved the old photographs, and people really enjoy the pictures I've put up at Town Hall."

Arcadia first contacted Leath when she assumed the position of town historian in 2007, but at the time she was wrapped up in Quadracentennial planning and couldn't commit to the project. Now, she's been able to take stock of what a photographic history of the town might look like, and to spend plenty of time with the town's archives and records of the Bethlehem Historical Association.

Leath has compiled about 170 pictures for the book so far (the publisher requires 180 to 240). She's

still looking for new submissions, including pictures of houses along the Hudson, the North Bethlehem area and of Bethlehem Center in Glenmont. All pictures have to be pre-1960.

Besides compiling the dozens of photos, Leath has authored captions and introductions to the book's sections. She's divided it up by hamlet.

"When I think of Bethlehem, I think of all these hamlets and crossroads, and how it all weaves together to make the Town of Bethlehem," she said.

As author, Leath will draw royalties from the book, but she said she will donate them to the Bethlehem Historical Association.

It looks like the book could have an early October release, which would coincide with a historic photographs exhibit Leath has planned at the Bethlehem Public Library.

Other local areas with titles in the Images of America series include the City of Albany (with three different books), Schenectady, Niskayuna and Clifton Park.

Devils players, teens take a slap shot at life

Hockey players meet Hope House youths at Bethlehem YMCA

Doing what you love at a professional level is a great reward, but it takes hard work, perseverance and sacrifice.

That's the message four members of the Albany Devils hockey team delivered to teens from the Hope House in Albany at the Bethlehem YMCA on Wednesday, Feb. 9. They also took the time to play a few rounds of floor hockey with the 20 youths, who come from all over the state to the Hope House to enter an immersive program aimed at combating alcohol and drug abuse.

For Hope House residents aged 13 to 18, hearing about how the players not much older than themselves had made it to the top of their game was a valuable learning experience, said Hope House Recreational Therapist

"They said everything in the message we're trying to teach and preach to our kids," he said. "That's what we're really pushing for the kids today."

For many upper echelon athletes, success comes with payoffs. Most of the Devils

players said they left home at 15 to play hockey and make a name for themselves. That involved missing a lot of traditional youth experiences like going to prom and hanging out with friends, but it also proved to them that perseverance can pay off big.

"You have to trust in yourself!"

You have to work hard and bury your head," said Dan Kelly, who plays defense for the Devils. "If you put your mind to it and work hard, you can do anything."

The players also spoke of their own personal experiences with substance abuse. Several said they've had teammates who were talented but couldn't advance to the next level because of such issues.

Right wing Patrick Davis (who was incidentally traded later that day to the San Jose Sharks) said his own childhood was less than idyllic, but he found an outlet in the sport he loves.

"I always had hockey, that's why I never did drugs," he said. "I just focused 100 percent and tried to forget everything else."

Devils players Andy Thomas and Chris Murray also spoke to the Hope House teens, and answered enthusiastic questions ranging from fights on the ice to diet and exercise.

The Devils use the Bethlehem

YMCA's skating rink for practice time. That's been a beneficial partnership for the Y, said branch Executive Director Derek Martin, and he's happy to see it expanding.

"I think it's a great opportunity for the Devils and the Y to collaborate," he said. "They've been looking at ways to really get their name out in the community. It's also a great way for the Y to develop our social responsibility."

In March, the YMCA is planning to take kids in its Circle of Champs program for sick children to an Albany Devils game, and the team will recognize the group on the ice.

Teens at the Hope House generally undergo a six- to nine-month program in the 20-bed facility. Staff there try to instill a need for healthy choices that extends beyond substance abuse to healthy eating, exercise and education. The teens also travel to schools to speak to other at-risk youths.

Relationships and money: Finding financial harmony

when you're looking for approval on a mortgage you both decided you were ready for.

There's a saying about relationships: the best ones are the ones in which you can say anything but don't say everything.

For a relationship to be successful, money can't be a secret. Debt can't be a skeleton in your closet. So instead of ignoring it, sit down with your partner and write up a list of assets and debts. How much are your monthly obligations? Review your credit scores. Better yet, have each partner get a current copy of their credit report and review them together. Identify your short- and long-term goals

Enjoy a Flurry of song and dance

Annual festival returns to Saratoga Springs this weekend

Tamara Flanders doesn't dance at weddings. You won't catch her getting down at a nightclub. But she can't help but join in the fun at the annual dance and music Flurry Festival in Saratoga every year.

"There's just a wonderful energy there," she said. "You've got 5,000 people and everyone is so nice."

Flanders will make her annual trip to the dance floor this weekend, when the Flurry Festival is held throughout Saratoga Springs. Participants can take part in square dances, contra dances, swing dances, folk dances and all other kinds of dances. Music is also an important element of the weekend, with Irish, African, gospel and folk songs among the offerings. Workshops, jam sessions, chats and concerts round out the weekend.

The festival breaks the offerings down into four levels of experience: beginner (for instance, Cajun Dance 101), secondary (Changing Contra Choreography), experienced (Scottish Ball) and mixed (Honky Tonk Dance Hall). Some events are geared to families and others to teens; there are several programs on Saturday for young children, including "Action Songs and Stories" for ages 5 to 12 from 1:10 to 2 p.m.

Flanders got involved in the Flurry scene when her own daughter was younger. The Dance Flurry organization holds dances throughout the Capital District all year, and Flanders' daughter wanted to go to one a few years ago. So, even though Flanders wasn't much for dancing, she went, and the two had a ton of fun.

"It just opened a huge door for us," she said. "It was like, this is just going to be part of our lives, these dances."

The Flurry Festival, Flanders said, is the "grand Poobah culmination" of Dance Flurry's yearly events. Now in its 24th year, the Flurry is headquartered at the Saratoga City Center and the Saratoga Hilton. There will be free shuttle buses taking people from Broadway to festival venues on Saturday and Sunday, and Saturday will also feature a hotel shuttle bus.



The board then voted to switch the dates for the decision on closure and presenting the district's budget. Tebbano is slated to present a report on facility closure on Wednesday, Feb. 16.

Some provisions that must be included in the report from the board are it must be able to provide a balanced school enrollment between the six elementary schools and address transportation efficiency, according to Tebbano. School board member Lynne Lenhardt pointed out that it was made clear to the board that the schools cannot be too large.

"There is one school in Albany that had 700 students, and we don't want that in our elementary schools," she said. "We always have to think how our decisions affect student achievement."

There is a concern that if Clarksville closed, a charter school would be able to come into the community and rent out the building. Tebbano said it would be something he would have to check with the school's attorneys on, but added he had some concerns about that as well.

"My fear is the drain on the institution's tax base," he said. "We have to look at the impact of if the facility is closed, rented or sold, what is the impact of a charter school coming into the community?"

While the district collects data on a closing, other are doing their own research. The Bethlehem Central Teachers Association, the local branch of the state teachers union, has contracted the private Benchmark Polling group of Latham to canvass all households with a child in Clarksville Elementary to gauge opinion on the subject

Teachers association president David Rounds

of the school's closure.

David Rounds, president of the BCTA, said the group's goal is to make sure financial concerns don't eclipse the other factors involved in such a decision.

"From our perspective, if the Board of Education is going to make a decision on Clarksville ... we want to make sure that they have all the possible information and balance they need," he said.

Rounds said the results of the poll should be ready in the coming days, perhaps in time for the reveal of the district's feasibility study on closing Clarksville or the district offices.

"I think within the community there's some division over what is the best thing to do," Rounds said.

One parent, Lynne Cable, who has a child in second grade and another entering kindergarten, participated in the phone survey and said she was asked about her feelings on the possibility of the school closing.

"It wasn't only if we agreed with it but it also gauged our reaction to it," she said. "And then I was asked for suggestions for other ways to save money."

For her response, Cable said she doesn't want to see Clarksville close down and added that the survey should not only be reaching out to those with children at the school but to the entire community.

"Clarksville school is a community school," she said. "And it's the same as a school in the town of Bethlehem where other schools are closely situated. There's not a

lot in our town and part of the reason why people live there is because there is an elementary school nearby."

Also at issue is whether just the community of Clarksville or the entire district should be sent a mailer notifying people about the possible closing. Board member Matt Downey pointed out that it's not just the elementary school that is facing closure but the central office building as well.

"This isn't a Clarksville-only issue," he said. "I will only agree to send a note out to everyone."

Tebbano then introduced the idea of closing down Elsmere Elementary school instead of Clarksville, to which Downey said it would really have to depend on the amount of students in each building.

Some members of the Clarksville community in 2008 took issue with the school's multi-age classroom structure, which was in part implemented to deal with low class size. Then and now, criticism has been directed toward Eagle Elementary, which was built in 2008 when projections foretold elementary enrollment increasing in the district, which did not come to pass.

A presentation on the proposal to close down Clarksville Elementary School and the Central Office Building will be presented at the next board meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 16, at 7 p.m. Two public hearings on the topic will be held on Monday, March 7, and Monday, March 21, both at 7 p.m. in the Middle School library.

Joseph Scott, bond counsel to the IDA, declined to say what the new financing structure would be. If the special district does not have to be formed, though, it will also not have to garner approval by the state comptroller, which could be time-consuming.

Scott noted the financing plan has been through multiple iterations.

"What we are tinkering with is minimizing the involvement of the county and the town," he said.

Under the last proposal, Albany County would have been left collecting taxes if the loans had defaulted.

Councilman Mark Hennessey, who was the sole member of the IDA to vote against moving forward with planning the financing deal, said eliminating the special district is a definite plus.

"I think creating new government is not the direction the town wants to be heading in right now," he said.

Supervisor Sam Messina also said he'd like to see a model that guarantees the town is insulated from taking any damage should Vista go south.

"I am conceptually comfortable with what I've seen and heard," he said after the meeting.

Vista has already gained approval for the plans to build the road and one 40,000-square-foot building. Retail space is also planned for the project, including a 65,000-square-foot ShopRite grocery store. By comparison, the Price Chopper across the road is 80,000 square feet.

Though hints have been dropped, no high-tech tenants have been identified. Hennessey said that remains his chief reservation about the project.

"Show me the technology tenants, and then we're off to the races," he said.

The new financing plan is

expected to be ready next week, and the IDA will likely take the matter up at its Friday, Feb. 18, meeting.

Lack of notice on town website

The Thursday, Feb. 10, noontime meeting was advertised in the legal section of the Feb. 9 edition of The Spotlight, as required by law governing the convening of a public body to discuss official business (all members of the Town Board were at the session). It was not, however, posted on the town's website or outside the Town Clerk's office on the public notice bulletin board.

Those postings are required under the state's open meetings law, according to Robert Freeman of the state Committee on Open Government.

"The law says that when a public body has the ability to place the notice on their website, they must do so," Freeman said. "They might not have fully complied with the law."

The town regularly posts events on its web site, including dates of meetings of government entities.

Messina said the normal procedure for noticing a public meeting was followed.

"I am not sure why the notice was not put up online," he said. "I wish it had been there. ... It's our intent to get the word out there as far as we can."

The session was open to the public. It was a mostly an informal session, and no votes were taken.

"We had a much-needed public briefing of members of the Town Board and our IDA [Industrial Development Agency] and Planning Board, and, quite frankly, I think all our staff. There was notification given in the paper," Councilman Kyle Kotary said. "As far as I'm concerned it was a public meeting, and it certainly was done in public."

Among considerations are not only the value of the property (it's assessed at \$3.2 million, but most seem to think it could be had for much less) but also what the town would do with it. Many would like to see its continued operation as a golf course, but it's uncertain if that would be financially viable. The club closed after months of declining membership and a failed search for a private owner to carry on the business.

If the town were to buy the property, it could be run in a number of ways. It could remain membership-driven or be opened up as a purely public course. The banquet and restaurant facilities could be outsourced (the town does this with the concession stand at the pool).

Councilman Kyle Kotary said his initial impression is that Normanside could be a realistic and profitable asset to the town.

"Yes, it's possible, is the short answer," Kotary said. "I feel confident that in a short period of time that we could pay off the course and start making a profit."

The course struggled near the end of its life with declining membership (just 240 golf memberships

remained at the closing), but Kotary argued if people were able to pay per-round rather than pony up thousands for a membership, use would increase.

"As a private club, you demand a high dollar from a sort of high-end clientele. This economy has dried up that high-end clientele who can no longer afford those dollars," he said.

A key caveat: bids for the property are due to the Bank of America by Wednesday, Feb. 23, leaving precious little time for the town to make a decision. Messina said that could very well be the largest obstacle.

"Even if the town does determine we could buy and profitably operate the course, it may be very difficult for us to take action by Feb. 23," he said.

The public weighs in

It was clear at a recent Town Board meeting there are many residents who would like to see the club at least maintained as open space, including a coalition of neighbors of the property calling themselves Friends of Normanside.

Pam Skripak on Wednesday, Feb. 9, said they've collected more than 300 signatures on a petition urging the town to search for ways to save the course from development. She said that doesn't necessarily mean Bethlehem should aim to

buy it outright, though.

"Our position is not that this should be a money-losing proposition for the town," she said.

But some members of the public staunchly advocated against spending any public funds on acquiring the property. Others, like resident Linda Jazinski, said a public hearing should be held before any decision is made.

"I understand time is short, but this is the way it should be done," she said.

She added the Friends of Normanside should protect their own interests with their own bid.

Charles Kriss, a neighbor to the course, after the meeting rejected the notion public funds should not be used for a Normanside purchase. Under that logic, he argued, the town wouldn't have parks.

"There's value in a community of shared resources," he said.

The Friends of Normanside said the petition signatures that have been collected are not just from the area surrounding Normanside, but from all over the town. The petition also advocates for the town to engage in a discussion with Bank of America.

Colonial Acres, round 2?

The town is not a stranger

to the golf course business. In 2007 it took over operation of the Colonial Acres golf course in Glenmont when that business ran into tough times.

Today that course runs at a roughly \$20,000 yearly profit. But it is markedly different from Normanside. The scale is an obvious factor, with the country club dwarfing Colonial Acres' 9-hole, par-3 course. Colonial Acres also has just a small clubhouse.

Also, Bethlehem didn't actually buy Colonial Acres. The property was acquired by the Open Space Institute, a group that buys up land across the state with the goal of preserving green space. A state agency also chipped in money to meet the nearly \$1 million purchase price. The town leases the course for \$1 per year.

It remains to be seen if another such partnership could be struck. The Mohawk Hudson Land Conservancy, which owns 30 acres right next to the golf course, said it would love to see the land kept open but wouldn't be able to pitch in financially.

"We would definitely hate to see it turned into a housing development," said the group's Jill Knapp. "Unfortunately we don't have funds to purchase it, but we'd be willing to work with other groups."

The group does hold a

parcel of land in Colonie that neighbors purchased themselves then turned over for protection, but that land was sold for \$150,000, a fraction of what Normanside is worth.

Perhaps the most important difference is that the Colonial Acres deal was brokered without a deadline between parties who all had something to gain. The Normanside auction will be by sealed bid. Even if the town or other groups decide to put up money, they could be outbid.

Development tops list of concerns

The fear among many is that such a bid would come from a developer looking to build homes on the land. The Elsmere course is right on the city line and near the Delaware Avenue bridge across the river, making it an appealing location.

"I'd hate to see it go as another multimillion dollar development," said Connie Salisbury at a recent Town Board meeting. Her grandfather owned the land before it became a golf course. She's for the town putting in a bid.

"I think the town could really do something great there," she said. "It's been good, but I think it could be even better."

But besides its prime location, the land at

Normanside might not be attractive to builders, said town Director of Economic Development and Planning Michael Morelli.

"The Normanside Country Club has a lot of site constraints," he said. "Significant portions of the site are constrained by steep slopes ... some of the area lies within a flood plain. You're along the Normanskill, which has a history of slippage-prone soils."

By the town's estimation, only about 120 acres of the 278-acre property would be suitable for building, and some of that land would be challenging to provide access to.


Additionally, the land would have to be rezoned for any significant building to occur. It's zoned rural right now, which only allows for houses to be built on 2-acre lots or larger. Those economics would likely be unpalatable to most developers, who would also have to install utilities and roads. The Town Board has to approve rezonings.

The Bethlehem Town Board does not meet again until Feb. 23, which is the date bids are due, so it's likely it would have to meet in a special session if a bid is to be made. It has already held one such meeting, a closed-door executive session on Feb. 7.





Being the top seed could mean the difference between securing no worse than an at-large bid and staying home if things go sour in the league tournament. Last year, Yale won the ECAC regular season title but was upset by Brown in the quarterfinal round. Yet, the Bulldogs still got in with Cornell, while Union was denied an at-large bid despite its run to the league tournament final.

No matter what happens from here, Union had better do something to keep Leaman around for a long time. There is little doubt that another Division I school would pursue Leaman to take over its program, given what Leaman has achieved in Schenectady.

But unlike what happened with Fran McCaffery leaving Siena last year for Iowa, it's possible for Union to hold on to Leaman, since a school of any size can make a run at the NCAA hockey title. Just look at Rochester Institute of Technology, which made it to last year's Frozen Four before losing to Wisconsin. RIT had been at the Division I level for a far shorter period of

time than Union before making that run.

For all that McCaffery achieved at Siena, he probably knew that he wouldn't have a shot at the NCAA basketball Final Four unless he coached a school in a bigger conference. It's not a stretch to think that Leaman believes he can get Union to the Frozen Four as early as this season.

If the Dutchmen get that far this season, Union had better open up its wallet to ensure Leaman stays long enough to do it again.

I was privileged to see two fantastic indoor track finishes last weekend.

The first came in Friday's Division I boys 3,200-meter relay final. Shaker's Kyle Foster came from third place to pass Colonie's Matt Luizzi on the anchor leg, but Luizzi battled back into the lead on the final lap. Still, Foster made one last charge and nearly caught Luizzi before stumbling at the finish line. Luizzi held on to give Colonie a .07-second victory over Shaker.

The second came in Saturday's Division II boys 1,000-meter race. Niskayuna's Marshall Pagano - who had already won the 3,200 and finished second in the 1,600 - trailed Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake's Otis Ubricaco until the last 40 meters. That's when

Pagano made one last push and passed Ubricaco to win by nearly a half second.

The most impressive finish I witnessed was Mohonasen's Courtney Richardson in Saturday's Division II girls' 55-meter dash final. Without Holy Names' Klarissa Ricks in the field due to an injury, Richardson left the rest of the field far behind as she won by a margin of .56 seconds - an eternity in the dash.

Richardson is one of the best sprinters you've probably never heard of. She played second fiddle to Saratoga's Madalayne Smith most of last year (though Richardson defeated Smith in the 2010 Suburban Council indoor track championships). Now

that Smith has moved on to college, Ricks has taken over as the most talked about female sprinter in Section II, while Richardson continues to quietly go about her business.

Richardson should get her chance to defeat Ricks at next weekend's state qualifier at the University at Albany. If you're looking for something to see Sunday, Feb. 27, I wholeheartedly suggest going to see this race. It should be as exciting of a finish as the two races I began this segment of my column with.

Finally, pitchers and catchers report to Spring Training this week. If that doesn't give you hope that winter will soon end, I feel bad for you.

Eagles wrap up DI No. 3 seed

Bethlehem beats G'land/Mohon to end season

The Bethlehem hockey team got what it wanted - a home playoff game.

Things finally turned in Bethlehem's direction this season. The Eagles won their first six Suburban Council games and had sole possession of first place in the South Division until Mohonasen (12-3, 13-4) defeated them 46-41 Feb. 4.


"We're starting to play better," said Irons. "Instead of [their level of play] going down, the kids are starting to peak at the right time."

The Bethlehem boys basketball team can look forward to the Section II Class AA playoffs with the knowledge that for the first time in four years it won't have to go to Christian Brothers Academy for the opening round.

"Those years we've gone there, I felt we gave them a good run," said Irons.

that mean the drivers will shut off their engines and coast around the track? Just wondering. OK, moving on...

• If Union College hasn't already given Nate Leaman a huge contract extension, it needs to do so. Pronto.

Leaman has guided the Dutchmen to first place in the ECAC standings with four games left in the regular season. Union was the first team in Division I to reach 20 wins this season. A top-two finish and a first-round bye seem likely, not to mention an at-large berth in the NCAA Tournament if the Dutchmen don't fall on their faces.

When Leaman arrived in Schenectady several years ago, Union was still struggling with its transition to a Division I program. The Dutchmen were near the bottom of the ECAC standings, and any hopes of making the NCAA Tournament were remote at best.

Trying to recruit top-notch, Division I-caliber players also seemed remote for Leaman. After all, it's hard to sell a recruit on a program that hasn't won anything, plays in a small arena at a college with high academic standards located in a city trying to rebound from decades of decline and competes in the fourth-best league in Division I behind Hockey East, the CCHA and the WCHA.

But somehow, Leaman has managed to overcome those obstacles and build Union into a budding ECAC power. The Dutchmen's current seven-game winning streak is the longest since Leaman's 2007-08 team did the same thing. Last year, Union finished in third place and reached the ECAC Tournament finals before losing to Cornell. And now, the Dutchmen are leading the league.

The challenge for Union is holding on to first place with Yale breathing down its neck. The Dutchmen have to run the North Country gauntlet this weekend with games at St. Lawrence and Clarkson. If they pull off two wins up there, they still have to get past Quinnipiac and Princeton at home to hold off Yale and earn the top seed for the playoffs.
