



Town's bid was \$75k short

Normanside now owned by quartet of local business owners

The Normanside Country Club has officially changed hands, and the cards have been laid on the table.

The new Normanside ownership is actually a team, made up of Rafael Flores, owner of the Mohawk River Country Club in Rexford and the Hiland Park Country Club in Queensbury, and three members of the Hostig family, relative newcomers to the golf business and owners of Smith's Restaurant in Cohoes.

The two interests went in 50/50 to purchase the course for \$1,575,000 in a sealed bidding process with the Bank of America.

The Town of Bethlehem had submitted its own bid after much deliberation by town leaders. With the closing finalized, Supervisor

BC adopts \$86.8M budget

Tax levy hike at 2 percent, 14 faculty positions would be cut

The Bethlehem Central School District on Wednesday, April 6, adopted an \$86.8 million spending plan for the 2011-12 school year.

The proposal, which will go to voters May 17, calls for a 2 percent increase in the tax levy. The budget is \$1.5 million less than the current year's budget.

The school board has been approving various cuts for weeks now, including the closure of Clarksville Elementary School. Four teachers will be shed in that controversial move, but another 10 faculty positions will be cut elsewhere, in addition to other staffing reductions.

The assumed number of layoffs was much higher before the Bethlehem Central Teachers' Association offered a partial pay freeze in the coming year. Other unions made similar concessions. The district also recently saw \$465,000 in aid money returned in the final state budget, though it will still take a significant revenue hit year-to-year.

"Anything helps, but we are still at a loss

RCS adopts \$42.5M budget

Ten teaching positions would be cut under plan to go before voters in May

The Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk Central School District Board of Education on Tuesday, April 5, adopted a \$42.5 million budget for the 2011-12 school year.

That's a 0.8 percent increase from this year's budget. Under the proposal, the tax levy would increase by 3.4 percent. The budget will go to voters on May 17.

District officials identified \$900,000 worth of cuts in the budget, including eight teaching positions (10 if you count retirements that will not be refilled). Clubs, building operating funds and other items are also reduced, and several staff positions will be cut.

The school board adopted the budget in a 5-2 vote, with two members not present.

Local business owners, community members to be honored

Bethlehem Chamber's 26th Annual Awards Dinner set

There will be four people lining up for three awards at the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce's Annual Awards Dinner at the end of the month.

Clutching the Business Person of the Year Award will be Brendan McCann and Daniel Casey, co-owners of Perfect Blend Cafe and Make Me a Cake Next Door, both at the Four Corners in Delmar. Receiving the Community Spirit Award will be Derek Martin, executive director of the Bethlehem YMCA, and the Citizen of the Year Award will be given to Melissa Stewart for her varied community involvement.

This will be the Chamber's 26th Annual Awards Dinner, but the first for new President Jennifer Kilcoyne. Though her tenure is just getting underway, she said she's excited to present to this slate of award winners.

"I think that each of them has definitely made a significant contribution to the Bethlehem community," she said, adding that there was a fair amount of interest

in the awards this year during the nomination process.

A Perfect Blend for success

Casey and McCann have been involved with the Chamber since opening Perfect Blend in late 2008, catering breakfasts and the like. Since then, the coffee shop has flourished even in this dicey economy by offering the community what it wants: good food, good coffee and a relaxed atmosphere.

One of the two owners can usually be found behind the counter, greeting customers and slinging fair trade coffee.

"We look at it as everybody is family," Casey said. "We don't look at them as customers anymore."

For the past year, the two have also been spending time at their spinoff business, Make Me a Cake Next Door (located adjacent to the Perfect Blend). They scooped it up after another bakery operation vacated the premises.

Now, the business is ramping up for a busy wedding cake season, but it also satisfies drop-in customers with treats like cake pops.

"Now that we've been here a year, people know about it," McCann said.

Perfect Blend is also undergoing some minor renovations. There are plans to have outdoor musical performances this spring and summer and to continue making changes to the menu. Perfect Blend already offers a wide range of gluten-free foods and other unique concoctions.

First months fruitful at Y

When Derek Martin left his job in financing last November to take over as head of the Bethlehem YMCA, he had big plans. Now, just five months later,

he's already ticked off some major achievements.

"I took the opportunity to take this position at the Y and really went at it with vigor," he said. "The board and the staff really kind of bought in to our vision here, and we've really been productive in the short time that I've been working here."

Martin has collaborated with the Guelderland YMCA (where he has been involved for years) to bring the Circle of Champs program to Bethlehem, which works to bring special programs to children with conditions

like leukemia. Recently, Circle kids attended an Albany Devils game in a luxury box donated by the Bank of America.

The Y is also coordinating with the BC School District to run an "I Can" program, a combination of athletic and academic training for high school students.

But Martin still has plenty to do. He wants to greatly expand the branch's reach-out to youth and raise \$90,000 this year to bring programs and memberships to those kids who can't otherwise afford them. Last year, \$64,000 was raised and helped 3,500 people.

"I certainly couldn't do it alone, we really have a tremendous staff here, we have a tremendous board that's supported not just me, but our vision," Martin said.

Mom makes a little time for everything

Melissa Stewart, who later this month will receive the chamber's Citizen of the Year Award, is modest about her achievements, but her activities serve as a perfect example of what community involvement is all about.

A mother of two with a job at the information agency Thomson Reuters, Stewart spends her free time

co-coaching a Bethlehem Tomboys softball team, helping to organize the Eagle Elementary Lip Sync concert and working on the April Challenge, a monthlong personal health and fitness project for kids and adults that also raises money for charities.

She's adamant that despite her presence in so many facets of the community, she's just one part of a larger picture.

"There are many, many, active involved parents here in Bethlehem," she said. "I'm just one example of so many parents here."

Stewart said she's always thought the town is a great place to live, citing the involvement of parents in their kids' lives, going to far as to volunteer in classrooms.

"I think having so many parents actively involved makes Bethlehem a really great place for a kid to grow up in," she said.

This year's Awards Dinner will be held at the Cyprus Shrine Banquet Hall in Glenmont, from 6 to 10 p.m., on Friday, April 29. Invitations have gone out, but this year the event will be open to the public. Dinner reservations are \$55 per person or \$400 for a table of eight. Banding together

BC students organize, promote and play charity event with international rock act

It's not every day an internationally touring band stops by a high school to perform for students during their lunch period. It's even rarer that they come back to town to play a show organized, promoted and supported by those same kids.

Yet that's exactly what's happened at Bethlehem Central High School with the band Deluka, which is returning to the Albany area on Friday, April 22, for a charity show at The Egg. Three bands of BC students will open for the group, which hails from the UK, with proceeds from the show going to the American Diabetes Association and the Japanese Red Cross.

For Deluka, The Egg is not the biggest venue it will play this year (they recently played the South By Southwest music festival in Texas) but they're excited to collaborate with the students again after their March performance and Q and A sessions at the high school.

"We're really excited. We had such a good reaction from when we went in to the school," said Kris Kovacs, the group's guitarist. "It was one of the better schools we've been in."

About 75 BCHS students will either be playing the show, promoting it or working with The Egg's staff to pull it off. This has given kids in two specialized classes some unique opportunities.

"It's hands-on experience. They get to see what goes on behind the scenes," said business teacher Anthony Malizia, who is teaching the business of music.

His students have been poring over seating charts, canvassing businesses for advertising and brainstorming ways to bring in publicity, including working with WEQX-FM. In other words, they're directly engaged in the nitty gritty, not-so-fabulous aspects of the music biz. Most said they're enjoying it.

As any promoter knows, publicity has a lot to do with filling seats. It's fortunate, then, that practically across the hall from the business of music class is Joyce Jones' ad design class, where students have been making posters for the

show. They're being hung around the high school, the town and at The Egg concourse.

The class's work often sees the real world. Students recently created a logo for the Albany Rowing Center's Ice Breaker Challenge 5K race and perennially design the Teal Ribbon Walk's T-shirt. This project has been unique because of the volume of work and the subject matter, said student Jazminn Motley.

"I think it was more fun because it was towards our kind of audience," she said.

Jones said these projects provide a great opportunity for the students to become acquainted with the realities of the design world.

"They can use their creativity but they also have to fit the specifications of the job," she said.

Though the students are doing a lot of the heavy lifting, the concert is the brainchild of Assistant Principal Scott Landry. He organized the band's March visit and reached back out to the group's promoters with the idea of a charity show. The only date they could make it to town was April 22, when school is not session and facilities




wouldn't be available.

It was either go big or go home, Landry said, and the students have stepped up to make it happen.

"It's amazing to see what these kids have done," he said

The Egg doesn't come cheap. Between rental and staffing the cost is around \$2,000. The students are fundraising to offset some of that (the senior class has donated \$300) so the greatest amount possible will go to charity.



Says Moses to Horton: Oh, the matzah you'll eat!

I'm trying to focus on Passover, but I've got Dr. Seuss on my brain. My daughter was in her high school production of "Seussical the Musical" a few weeks ago and I managed to catch all four performances. Now most of the songs are stuck in my head.

We'll be sitting at the dinner table and I'll start singing:

"We're Whos here. We are Whos here.

Yadda-dada-dada-dee.

We're Whos here. Who-who-whos here.

I'm a Who and so is she."

OK, the melodies are stuck in my head, but only some of the words. But with Seuss-related stuff who would know the difference?

The show's plot revolves primarily on Horton-the-Elephant's quest to save the microscopic land of "Who-ville" which exists on a speck of dust that has landed on a flower. Horton, a sensitive fellow and a good listener, is the only jungle creature that can hear the people of Who-ville. When he's seen talking to a flower

everyone thinks he's out of his mind.

Which brings me back to Passover: Like Horton-the-Elephant, Moses-the-Shepherd talks to vegetation. Horton communicates with a clover and Moses gets messages from a burning bush. Horton takes on the task of keeping the people of Who-ville out of harm's way. Moses is sent to free the Jews from slavery in Egypt.

It's like they are living parallel lives!

However, unlike Horton, Moses was initially reluctant to take on a leadership role. It's hard to blame him. After all, he was living a comfortable life in Midian with his lovely wife and sons, and he had a good job tending his father-in-law's flock of sheep. Why risk all that to face the powerful Pharaoh?

Oh, right, because he heard the voice of God saying, "Just do it!" (If only Nike athletic apparel had existed back in Moses' day; a nice lightweight sweat-wicking tracksuit would have come in quite handy in the desert.)

Moses needed some pushing to get his self-confidence in gear. He



was self-conscious about his speech impediment. Horton, on the other hand, wasn't self-conscious at all. He wasn't worried about what others thought of him. Still, Horton wasn't without faults. In fact, he was a bit gullible. For example, he agreed to babysit Maizy La Bird's egg for "one afternoon" and ended up incubating the egg for more than 50 weeks.

Not to be outdone in the time commitment category, Moses spent 40 years leading the Jews through the desert on their journey to freedom. Apparently, with good directions, the trip from Egypt to The Promised Land would have taken less than two weeks. Still, it's difficult to manage large numbers of people, especially when a bunch of them start whining about how slavery was better than desert life. And so, everyone ended up wandering about until the folks with the bad

attitude were replaced by a new generation less inclined to turn to idol worship every time the going got tough.

This year Passover begins on the evening of Monday, April 18. Holiday festivities include participating in a Seder, a lively hands-on religious ceremony recalling the exodus from Egypt. During the Seder Jews read from a special book called a haggadah. The word haggadah means "the telling," referring to the obligation to tell the story of Passover to our children each year so the story will be remembered and relayed from generation to generation.

Each family has their own traditions and methods for relaying the story. Some families read the story straight from the haggadah. Others may read the story and then add personal commentary. We've participated in seders with friends where our children assembled make-shift costumes and performed the story as a play.

Which brings me back to "Seussical the Musical": Each time I saw the play I'd anticipate the arrival of my favorite scenes (including, but not limited to, any scenes with a certain circus-performing snake charmer). I'd also pick up on a little nuance I hadn't noticed before. I'd see some action happening on a different part of the stage, hear the punch line of a joke I'd missed, catch the expression on the face of a supporting player or enjoy the reaction of a young audience member.

The Passover seder, though not quite a toe-tapping musical adventure, does include a good amount of singing. Modern songs such as "Frogs on Pharaoh's Head" (best performed while hopping) can be mixed in with the traditional Hebrew songs. The recitation of the ten plagues can be accompanied by a variety of props (in our house we toss cotton balls across the table to represent "hail"). I'm always looking

for ways to keep the seder fresh and interesting.

I try out a poem on my 14-year-old daughter:

"Matzah, matzah in my gut.

Extra time on the toilet.

No bread, no pasta, not even rice

Just matzah, matzah: with butter it's nice."

I tell her I'm going to use the poem in my column. She just shakes her head like it's not a good idea. Then she says, "Ever notice how this couch looks like matzah?" At first I think she's stayed up too late doing homework, but then I take a closer look at the couch and I see that she is right. The design in the cushion resembles the ridges in a matzah cracker!

I decide I'm going to work the couch into the column. The couch AND the poem insinuating that matzah causes constipation.

As they sang in the musical: "Oh, the thinks that you'll think when you think about Seuss!"

Driver in police chase remains at large

The Bethlehem Police Department is seeking a man who led police on a high-speed chase Sunday, April 3.

The unidentified suspect fled from a traffic stop at about 7 p.m. and drove up Route 9W, eventually reaching the Van Allen Senior Apartments complex in Glenmont. He then drove into a wooded area and apparently abandoned the car, taking off through the woods on foot, according to police.

Police were unable to apprehend the man at the scene and are in the process of identifying and locating the driver, said Sergeant Robert Helligrass of the BPD. It's not clear why the suspect took off in the first place.

"It was just a traffic stop and the guy fled once the officer approached the car," Helligrass said.

Police said an investigation is ongoing.

Other arrests Colonie theft leads to three-county chase

A 45-minute high-speed chase ended in two blown tires and an overturned car on the

evening of Tuesday, April 5, according to New York State Police Troop G.

The chase began at 10:45 p.m. on Tuesday, after Joseph Wagner, 44, of Albany allegedly stole a car in Colonie. He then headed west on Western Avenue with Albany police officers in pursuit before reaching Guilderland, according to Troop G Spokeswoman Trooper Maureen Tuffey.

Both the Guilderland Police Department and Albany Police

Department were not able to stop the vehicle before it began traveling west on Route 22 into New Scotland and the Town of Bethlehem.

The vehicle then began traveling on Route 32, heading into Greene County where the Greene County Sheriff's Department successfully deployed spike strips, taking out two of the vehicles tires.

"Normally a car would stop after that," said Tuffey. "In this case, the car didn't stop."

New York State Police Troop F became involved as Wagner continued on Route 32 until heading West on Route 23 and then Route 145 heading back to Albany County. Wagner then entered Broome County on 145 and lost control, driving off the right side of the road and flipping the car.

Wagner was taken into custody and then transported to the Cobleskill Hospital and transferred to Bassett Hospital for treatment of bruises, abrasions and a possible drug overdose.

Wagner was charged with criminal possession of stolen property, reckless endangerment in the first degree, driving while intoxicated and impaired, a felony, fleeing police officers, criminal possession of a controlled substance in the seventh degree, unlawful possession of marijuana and other vehicle and traffic infractions.

The chase stretched about 50 miles through the three counties at various speeds, according to police.

More than a feel-good program

Ballston Spa High School hopes to be the first International Baccalaureate school in the Suburban Council. If the high school is successful in getting the designation this fall, the Ballston Spa School District will be the first district in the Suburban Council to offer IB courses.

It's interesting to note that outside of the Suburban Council, Ballston Spa will join the ranks of Albany and Schenectady high schools, which have been IB World schools since 2005 and 2000, respectively. And although the two city schools struggle or fail to make adequate yearly progress in most areas on their state school report cards, their IB programs remain competitive. IB students attend classes similar to Advanced Placement classes, most times as a group, and other venues for study are open to them, such as the use of university libraries.

So what's the difference between this and AP courses?

"Advanced Placement courses as they stand, it's very set curriculum and doesn't give students the opportunity to investigate more thoroughly things that might interest them," Ballston Spa Principal Kris Jensen tells *The Spotlight's* Alyssa Jung. "IB has more breadth and depth" and attracts students who are willing to take more risks and learn better in unconventional environments, she said.

To obtain a typical IB diploma, students take on classes from each subject group for a total of six: English, world language, individuals and societies, experimental sciences, mathematics and arts. In addition to those courses, students complete the IB core classes; a theory of knowledge course; extended essay; and usually at least 150 hours of something the IB calls "Creativity, Action and Service."

That last requirement is the one that we at *The Spotlight* find most interesting and most promising. It's true that many lab school and participation in government classes make students attend functions or engage in community service outside of the classroom, but not to the extent that IB does.

In order to attain the IB diploma, the 150 hours must be spent performing services that are creative, physical, personally challenging and have a "significant outcome."

This is the type of character building that young adults need. We applaud the Ballston Spa High School for attempting this and hope other districts try the same.

Iditarod educators event not pure as driven snow

Editor, *The Spotlight*:

This letter is in regard to Charles Wiff's article, "Local Educator Mashes Forward" (March 16 and online at www.spotlightnews.com).

When I first read the article I was very enthusiastic about the mushers and the Iditarod race. I have always been fascinated with Alaska and the natural environment, including animals. Ms. Aosta Edelman (of the Bethlehem Central School District) sounds like an excellent teacher and enthusiast; it piqued my interest to learn more about this race.

Unfortunately, since reading the article, I found a few too many negatives in my search about this race and the dog sledding industry in general. For one, I was appalled at the sheer amount of animal cruelty that has been perpetrated over the years since the race started in 1973. I recently received a letter from animal rights charity, Animal Legal Defense Fund (ALDF), regarding the dog sledding industry and information about the process of 'culling' in which dogs who don't make the grade for racing for whatever reason are rounded up and shot or just tied out and abandoned.

I'm not accusing everyone in this race of cruelty, as I am sure Ms. Edelman and other educators are

not involved in this aspect of the race, but my feeling is that there should be some recognition that this race and the industry that supports it is not all purity and "white as snow." This information is especially vital when it comes to educating young people.

Here's a comment from Stephen Wells; Executive Director of ALDF:

"To many of us, the most familiar face of the sled dog industry is Alaska's Iditarod, an annual race in which teams of dogs are forced to pull a sled 1,100 miles across the Alaska wilderness, often running at a grueling pace of over 100 miles per day for ten straight days. The race has become a big money maker, bringing tourists and sponsors to Alaska.

The Alaska media and the 'mushers' seem to glory in the race, but animal protectionists and advocates see a different side of this so-called 'fun' event. To us, it is yet another way that human beings amuse themselves and make big money abusing and exploiting animals.

Since the race began in 1973, over 130 dogs have died during the event. We don't know how many dogs have died during training or immediately after the event, because no one

is keeping statistics. Causes of death have included heart attacks, drowning, hemorrhaging after being impaled on a sled, muscular arrest and strangulation. There are multiple claims that dogs have been beaten during the race when they were too tired or otherwise unwilling to continue running. And, there are many examples of dogs suffering injuries, exhaustion and other illnesses.

Alaska's anti-cruelty law specifically exempts 'generally accepted dog mushing or pulling contests' from the protections given to other animals in Alaska."

There seems to be a proliferation of press on this subject and I'm just surprised that this is not even mentioned in *The Spotlight* article. A lot of these press clips and statements can be seen at <http://www.helpsleddogs.org/remarks-abuseinkennels.htm#SPCA> which is the 'Sled Dog Action Coalition' site.

I hope Ms. Edelman will consider the awareness of the negative side of this industry as part of her curriculum. Exciting as this race can be, the view should be balanced by the events that are causing so many animals such suffering.

Different towns, different rules

Communities have some say in residency requirements, but cannot supersede state law

A March 31 decision by the New York State Supreme Court Appellate Division decision ruled the Colonie Commissioner of the Department of Public Works must be a resident of the town, but it is unclear what effect that would have on other municipalities the area.

Following the decision, Colonie officials passed a resolution on Thursday, April 7, that would extend the commissioner's residency out to Albany County, allowing Department of Public Works Commissioner Jack Cunningham, a resident of Bethlehem, to be

reappointed that evening. Town Attorney Mike Magguilli said the town is relying on Municipal Home Rule law to amend a local law for municipal requirement. This requires the town to specifically cite in the local law the sections of the state law it intends to supersede.

There are some municipalities that have already made sure their town officials are residents, but others like Colonie have had to amend some of their local laws to make sure their appointees are still valid.

The City of Albany has a local law in place that requires every commissioner-level and chief-level person to be a resident of the City of Albany, according to Bob VanAmburgh, executive assistant to Mayor Jerry Jennings.

"They require confirmation by City

Council," he said. "It does not apply to deputies or assistants."

According to Law 62-1, "all department heads subject to confirmation by the Common Council hired after the effective date of the law shall be residents of the city during such employment or become residents of the city within 180 days."

In the Town of Bethlehem, James Potter, the town attorney, said there are certain residency requirements within the town law for some positions. For example, the town attorney, which is considered to be an officer's position, must be a resident of the town. This is bound by state law, which he said the town does not have the power to supersede. He said the town is allowed to supersede state law, however, if it is done in a specific way and the

intentions are clear.

"The town does have the power to supersede state law on matters that relate to the property and affairs of local government," he said.

Bethlehem Supervisor Sam Messina said that there are no residency requirements in the town and said after quickly looking over the appellate court decision that there are three or four jobs that would need to comply.

He also said that he does believe that positions such as the commissioner of Public Works, director of the Planning Department and the comptroller should be residents of the town. With such significant roles and a substantial staff, he said the people in those positions should reside in Bethlehem.

"I think it is good to have them in the town," he said. "Not just for recruiting purposes, but they will get to know the issue better on an ongoing basis."

Messina said he still has to go over the ruling with the Town Board and Potter before any decisions or votes are made.

The Town of Colonie's local law did not specify whether all commissioners or directors are required to be from the town. After an appellate court decision ruled the appointment of Cunningham was invalid because of his residency, the town tried to remedy the situation.

"This is nothing unusual in the state of New York," Magguilli said, adding that some municipalities limit it just to the county. "But you don't have to. You can do it statewide or countrywide. At least by doing it within the county, you're getting somebody that lives in the

general community and the like."

Doug Rose, an attorney for Tulley, Rinckey and Associates, PLLC, said that in most cases, New York State law supersedes town laws. But there are some provisions that allow towns to amend laws if it is stricter.

"If town law has more stringent provisions, then town law might apply if the state law allows the town law to apply," he said. "If it would make it less restrictive, state law would apply."

With the Municipal Home Rule Law, he said that would be the provision that would allow the town to make amendments to the local law.



Selkirk Scout brightens church space

James Buono plans renovations to community room as Eagle Scout project

James Buono, a member of Boy Scouts of America Troop 81 in Selkirk, received his Eagle Scout recognition recently after coordinating an effort to paint and repair a large community room inside the Church of Saint Patrick in Ravena.

The space, which is used for gatherings after masses and for religious education programs, had been deteriorating for years, but the repairs were too expensive for the church to make alone. Buono, a member of the church, noticed the problem and offered to renovate the room for his Eagle Scout project.

"When I went in there it hadn't been painted for over

30 years, and initially the wall was falling down and crumbling because it was water damaged," said Buono. "There were yellow stains and parts of the old paint were coming through because the new paint was coming off. It was bad."

Buono said that the National Honor Society at Ravena High School, the Boy Scouts, family members, and students from St. Patrick's religious education classes all pitched in. Together, the volunteers spent more than 500 hours transforming the "drab, yellow" space with shades of blue and white to give it what Buono calls "a more Greek look." He said that six chandeliers were donated to replace original strip lighting and brighten up the room as well.

Buono said that he came up

quite a bit of work.

"He came up with the idea, he planned it, he got all the approvals from the church and came up with the supplies and the way to supply the materials," said Brumsey. "It's getting him to take charge of the project and show his leadership skills, and plan and execute the project. It is a very Scout-oriented project. We just stand back and provide support, help him through the approval process and see how well he can lead and show his stuff."

The project is the latest in a series of achievements Buono has made as a Scout. Now a senior at Ravena Coeymans Selkirk High School, Buono joined the Scouts with friends when he was in elementary school, and enjoyed the recognition that he received for it.

"I knew it made my family proud," he said. "When I got to middle school all the kids that were in it, my friends, started dropping out, but I stuck with it because I knew that it would

with the idea for the project when he was 15, but getting approvals and donations for such a large undertaking took time.

"I had to go before Council and make sure the project was Eagle Scout acceptable. I had to go to Sherwin Williams to talk to the guys and see if they would

cut the price back or donate," he said. "They cut the price back and donated some."

Paigo Home Improvement and others also contributed materials for the project, which required a significant number of supplies because of its scale.

"There were points where I just wanted to stop because it was such a big project. I knew it would take off in the end, but it was a lot of work," Buono said.

Former Scout Leader Terry Brumsey, who oversaw the project, said that Buono took on





of about \$2.3 million for our state aid funds," said Assistant Superintendent Jody Monroe.

The teaching reductions will mean fewer class sections and slightly increased average class sizes next year. Overall enrollment is projected to decrease, however.


The board did decide to return one teacher to the elementary level, making the total number of faculty cuts there seven. There was concern expressed by several parents at the meeting that class sizes at Elsmere Elementary would be too high, with classes of 26 and 27 students common. A combination classroom for grades 4 and 5 proposed for that school also drew negative comments.

"As an educator myself, those are high numbers...especially in the second grade," said parent Chris Jansen, one of several in the audience who protested the class sizes at Elsmere.

Though it's not definite what the exact effect of that teacher addition will be, Superintendent Michael Tebbano advised the board to adopt it.

"Adding the position will allow us to create a little more flexibility in the sections," he said.

The closure of Clarksville was clearly still on the minds of many, and some members of the public asked the board to reconsider its 5-2

decision to shutter the school for an estimated \$880,000 savings in next year's budget.

New Scotland Councilman Douglas LaGrange read a letter to the board he said was on behalf of the Clarksville community, and argued the changing state aid situation and union concessions warrant a revisiting of the issue.

"The determination to close Clarksville Elementary on budgetary considerations is no longer valid," he said.

The board also on Wednesday reviewed the technology department's budget for the coming year. It elected to restore \$125,000 of funding to the technology replacement fund that had been cut out of this year's budget (board members Matt Downey voted against this restoration, saying he'd prefer to see the item only partially refunded).

The district will not, however, be pursuing a "1:1 computing" program aimed at putting a laptop, smart phone or tablet device in the hands

of most students. It had earlier in the year proposed putting to voters a bonding resolution to spend \$8 million over five years to get that under way. That was pared back to a \$500,000 item and later eliminated altogether.

The district will, however, make planned upgrades to the high school's network over the summer and the school board will consider allowing students to bring their own wireless devices (like smart phones or tablets) to school next year.

"We do still need to upgrade our network... so we still will push forward, just in smaller steps, to have more technology access for our students and teachers," Monroe said.

A few audience members during a public comment period said administrators should be let go to save teaching positions. One administrative position — the Clarksville principal — is reduced under the budget.

The district has four principals at the high school, three at the middle school and one at each elementary school, Tebbano said. He argued that's fairly lean given BC's student population.

"Cutting out more administrators than we have right now will seriously jeopardize our ability to do our jobs properly," he said.

Voters will also see a referendum to purchase new school buses. This year's proposal is to buy six buses to replace old ones, at a cost of \$375,000 to be bonded over five years.

The budget was adopted in a unanimous vote.

Sam Messina revealed that the town's shot fell just short with a bid of \$1.5 million.

"I feel that the bid price that we went in at was a responsible amount and also realistic," Messina said. "The board felt, and I felt, that we would have only submitted a bid that would have enabled us to run this golf course at break even or better."

He said private enterprise keeping Normanside a golf course is really a winning situation for the town, as the property stays on the tax rolls.

The Hostigs and Flores plan to keep the course running much as before — indeed, since

the closing of the club occurred over the winter, not a single tee time will be missed. But there will be one notable change this year: the public will be able to play a round.

Non-members will pay \$50 for a round of golf during the week and \$60 on the weekend, which includes use of a cart. The new ownership will also be keeping a members program, though at reduced prices set at \$3,050 for individuals and \$3,600 for a family.

Those public fees are a touch higher than many other public courses in the area, including at Capital Hills, the City of Albany's municipal course right across the river. The owners don't see that as a problem, though, saying the caliber of golf at Normanside will mean

plenty of business.

"They won't have to worry about fighting the crowds and leagues. It will be a better value," said Dave Hostig, who is involved in the sale with his father, Joseph Jr., and grandfather, Joseph Sr.

Likewise, Flores said he expects business to boom at the banquet facility, not only from regular events coming back but from even more special occasion bookings.

"Our main goal is to go for a lot of outside weddings," said Flores, who makes nuptial events a business lynchpin at Mohawk River.

The clubhouse is already open for business and accepting engagements. A new website should be forthcoming.

The new owners said the transition process has

been quite smooth and the course is in excellent condition. In fact, in recent years, the country club replaced bunkers, built an irrigation system and upgraded storm drainage, all of which contributed to making the course turnkey ready.

The Normanside Country Club closed its doors in late January with just about 240 members on the rolls and \$4 million in debt. Many of those members have already expressed interest in renewing their memberships under the new management, said Hostig, though it's too early to give numbers.

"There's been some strong support," he said. "A lot of members have already said, 'We want to come back.' We expect a decent retention rate."

Board member Sarah Hafensteiner left the meeting early but said beforehand that she would support the budget if she were present.

Dissenting were Michael Robbins and John Vadney, both of whom at a special budget workshop a week earlier insisted there was still fat to be trimmed that could save teachers. At that meeting, the public came out in force to protest the proposed closing of the aquatics center (a \$77,000 savings), but Vadney called this proposal an emotional "smokescreen" deployed by administrators to distract voters from

educational issues.

"We voted to keep it open next year, when we never had a motion to close it," he said.

Robbins and Vadney stated before the vote they would like to see a more thorough budget process next year. Board member James Latter, a member of the board's Finance Committee, said, if anything, the board simply needs to better disseminate information next time around.

"We did go through individual line items at each of those meetings," he said.

A contingent of music

educators turned out at the meeting to ask the school board to reinstate the half of a full-time position that will be cut under next year's budget. Music teacher Lesley Lopez said that would drop the department's faculty under eight teachers districtwide.

"I am urging the board to find other monies in the budget that do not so directly impact students," she said.

Also speaking before the vote was resident James Allen, who a week prior brought a petition to the board urging cuts other than teacher

jobs to be sought. He said any larger budget is an unacceptable proposal.

"Our community has had a 10 percent decline in population, yet every year we have a higher budget," he said. "The community at large is asking the board to exercise restraint."

It had been assumed the tax levy increase would be slightly higher under the spending plan, but the district will use some of the state's \$350,000 aid giveback to help offset it. Some of the money was also used to save a teaching position in the foreign language program.

RCS will still see its state aid reduced by about \$650,000 from this year's level.

"I think with the money coming back, we have taken into account both our staff and the taxpayer," Latter said.


The district will also dip into its reserves to the tune of \$200,000. Superintendent for Business Lyn Derway noted that will leave the reserves at \$1.4 million.

"These are underfunded according to what our liabilities are," she said.

The district is operating off of a contingency budget this year, which was adopted after the public voted the original proposal down. District officials tonight said a 2011-12 contingency budget would be larger than the adopted proposal and carry a 5.5 percent tax levy hike.

Pieces of the past

QUILT Inc. holds its annual show to share members' creations

Peg Cerutti could not let go. She didn't even realize it, really. She had made the quilt with every intention of giving it away. But when the moment arrived that she had to hand it over, she hedged. Instead of stretching out her hands, she held the quilt close.

"It took me 10 years not to have separation issues," Cerutti says now with a laugh. "I used to hug the quilts and not want to let go."

Stitched into those quilts was a lot more than squares of fabric. They held pieces of family history. Memories of getting together with friends to quilt. Laughter, and sometimes tears. The satisfaction that comes with doing something creative.

"A lot of quilting is emotional," said Pat Coleman, who, like Cerutti, belongs to QUILT Inc., a Delmar-based group of some 200 quilters who meet monthly. The name stands for Quilters United in Learning Together, a concept that might seem strange given that many members have been quilting for decades. But this is a group that sees value not just in trading ideas and feedback about quilting, but about life in general.

"There's a community of support that goes way outside of quilting," Cerutti said. "You share things. You laugh and you cry. You come away stronger and not alone."

Once a year, the public gets a peek into that close-knit world when QUILT Inc. holds its annual show. The 2011 quilt show is Saturday and Sunday, April 16 and 17, at Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk High School on Route 9W in Ravena. Hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday.

Visitors can bid on items in a silent auction, watch demonstrations, buy tickets for a raffle quilt and listen to featured quilter and speaker K. Velis Turin. And of course, they will have the chance to see dozens of quilts, creations that are rarely put together quickly.

Quilting is a multi-step process. To put the wheels in motion, quilters first need to pick a pattern, fabrics and the stuffing, or batting, that makes up the middle of the quilt. They have to measure and cut the fabrics into blocks. They have to sew, by hand or by machine, the blocks together to create the top layer of the quilt.

They have to attach the batting to the top layer, making sure it doesn't spill over the edges. They have to bind the back layer to the front.

"I have never met a quilter who had time to be bored," Cerutti said.

Ardyce Elmore grew up watching her mother quilt. The process fascinated her, and she long dreamed of being a quilter herself. But as a math teacher, she figured she didn't have the time to dedicate to the hobby. Instead, she told herself, one of the first things she would do when she retired was take up quilting.

The time commitment isn't daunting to people who are passionate about quilting. Joe Wilson remembers seeing that in his two friends who were quilters before he was. The three of them used to go on road trips. The women were always stopping at quilting shops to look at fabric, to talk to the shop owners, to buy things they could incorporate into their next creations.

For Wilson, it wasn't fun. It got to the point that when the women called him to go somewhere, he'd ask, "Is this really just a quilt run?" If it was, he said, count him out.

Then one of the women told him that he could probably make a quilt if he tried. It was a challenge. Wilson accepted. He sat down and made his first quilt, and he was surprised.

He liked it.

Wilson has a background in stained glass, a craft that he says is similar in many ways to quilting. There's a lot of cutting pieces and fitting them together, of taking something old and turning it into something new.

That's a hallmark of quilting. The hobby's roots stretch back to times when there weren't fabric shops in every town. Pat Coleman grew up sewing

and wanted to try making a quilt. She used anything she could get her hands on: corduroy, cotton, denim.

"Talk about rudimentary," she said.

"That's where a lot of people's history is," Bauer said. Especially before the proliferation of fabric stores, she said, people would make quilts from scraps around their houses, scraps that each had their own story.

That spirit has prevailed even as quilting material has changed. When Bauer's grandson was born, he had to spend time in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. A quilt someone had donated to the NICU kept him warm.

Seeing her grandson bundled in the blanket that a stranger had put such care into creating warmed Bauer, too.

"You know that other people are there," she said.

MHLC Farm Preserve to hold grand opening

The Mohawk Hudson Land Conservancy is holding the official opening of its Schiffendecker Farm Preserve in the Town of Bethlehem on Saturday, April 23, at 10 a.m. Hikes through the property will be offered by conservancy staff.

This 39-acre property was donated to MHLC in 2007 by Nigro Corp. as part of the permitting requirements for the construction of the Walmart/Lowes plaza on Route 9W in Glenmont. Most of the land is wooded and has been abandoned for approximately 50 years. An unnamed stream, a tributary of the Normans Kill, flows through the property. There are wetlands on the property as well as an old hemlock grove along the stream. Volunteers for MHLC have built trails, stairs, and a kiosk at the preserve's entrance.

Parking and the kiosk are located on the left of Bender Road, 0.9 miles west of Route 32 in Glenmont. The preserve is open from dawn to dusk.

The Mohawk Hudson Land Conservancy is a private, not-for-profit organization, dedicated to preserving the distinct natural, scenic, agricultural, and cultural landscapes of the Mohawk and Hudson valleys. MHLC accomplishes these goals by owning and managing land, and by working with landowners to develop preservation agreements that assure their lands are protected for future generations. Of particular importance are areas protecting wildlife habitat, watersheds, scenic vistas, hiking and biking trails, working farms, and historic-lands and structures. Since its founding in 1992, MHLC has preserved more than 2,500 acres.

over New Hampshire (1-2, 6-6).

"I was just aggressive, and I love being near the ball," said Branchini, who has been UAlbany's top player on draw controls this season. "I've learned some techniques that help me get the ball."

Battaglino - a former Bethlehem Central High School girls lacrosse coach - said Branchini has been his most indispensable player.

"In terms of what she brings to the draw controls and in terms of what she brings in leadership, she's been my go-to girl," said Battaglino.

Leading scorer Taylor Frink had an off-day for UAlbany, as she found the back of the cage only once. However, she compensated by assisting on four other Great Danes goals to help her team beat New Hampshire for only

the third time in 13 career meetings.

"There have been times where she's guarded by the other team's best defender, and I expect her to make adjustments," said Battaglino.

The thing that has allowed UAlbany to remain one of four undefeated NCAA Division I teams is that when one attacker struggles, other players step up. That held true again last Saturday as Jodi Battaglia, Amanda Pollock and Kathleen Lennon all tallied twice to compliment what Burek and Branchini did.

"It's nice to know that if one person is having trouble [scoring goals], there are six or seven kids out there who can step up," said Branchini.

UAlbany jumped out to a 7-1 lead in the first half against New Hampshire. The Wildcats closed the gap to 9-6 by the early stages of the second half before the Great Danes went on their final spurt to

pull away for good.

Freshman goaltender Anna Berman stopped six shots for UAlbany to pick up her 11th victory.

"She's not afraid of anything," said Battaglino of Berman, who played for Section I's North Rockland last year. "She's got a lot of poise out there."

UAlbany has four games left in the regular season, beginning with Saturday's America East contest against defending league champion Boston University. And though the Great Danes know that they are beginning to garner national attention with their perfect record, they are not overlooking anyone.

"Honestly, I don't think about records," said Battaglino, who has guided UAlbany to its best start in the program's Division I history. "You get a couple of hours to enjoy [a win], and then you look ahead to the next game."






"It's pretty cool," said Schoppmann, a Long Island native who will be joining Robertson in the area once they are married this summer. "We're a nice, fast couple."


"I've always wanted to do this race, and now that I'm here I'm glad I got to do this," said Robertson.
