

## Warriors of comedy

**Documentary hopes to prove** laughter heals all wounds

Bobby Henline always had a knack for comedy and a sense of humor that helped him keep sane while deployed in Iraq, but after sustaining devastating battlefield injuries his jokes became a lifeline.

In April of 2007, the Army-staff sergeant lost an arm and 38 percent of his body was burned. after an improvised explosive device struck his Humvee outside the village of Zaganiyah. For a while, Henline said he didn't want to live anymore, suffering through dozens of surgeries and medical procedures to help him live a semi-normal life, but back on our behalf and now they are about to comedy brought him back from the brink.

"A sense of humor helps us to heal. Not physically. We all know how the human body works. But mentally, humor really helps," he said. "It helps us and it helps our family to know we're still here and we're going to be all right."

- For the past two years, Henline has been touring as a motivational speaker and stand-up comedian, telling his story to others. Now, he and four other wounded veterans are part of a new project aimed to use humor as a method of rehabilitation.

'Humor is a great equalizer," said Saratoga Springs resident John Wager, co- producer of the new documentary "Comedy Warriors: Healing through Humor." "It can lift you through hard times and help you heal. ... These veterans have been through hell and



## Town Hall work coming



Work to repair Bethlehem Town Hall is nearly complete.

#### Final price tag for roof repairs is \$345k

Months after pieces of Bethlehem Town Hall crumbled onto cars parked below, town officials said the work to repair the building is nearly complete;

In March, a portion of the parapet wall at the town's headquarters crashed down onto several parked cars. No one was injured, but the town was forced to come up with a patchwork plan to keep more damage from being done.

The most visible repairs were

related to the crumbling parapet walls, and the clear damage that was done when pieces of the exterior broke away from the building. However, crews conducted a "rigorous analysis," according to Supervisor Sam Messina, to determine what else had to be done.

The town initially approved \$475,000 worth of work for the building, including the emergency repairs and additional work. However, Messina said the final total for repairs came in at \$345,000. The initial bid for the work at Town Hall was \$318,000, but when crews began their work on top of the building, the price tag went up.

## Images from the front lines

Exhibition at the Breathing Room shows soldiers' photos from Iraq and Afghanistan

Most times, the Breathing Room Wellness Studio in Delmar is an open space, a haven for yoga lovers.

But on Saturday, Nov. 19, the studio was filled with the photographs of four veterans who served in Iraq and Afghanistan. The photographs captured some of their perspectives on their time in the military without depicting graphic scenes from the wars in both countries.

Breathing Room co-owner Mikko Cook said the decision to host the exhibition was a personal one,

"One of the things that Breathing Room is about is trying to help people find new alternative ways to bring awareness and healing into their lives," said Cook. "As a result, and this is because of experience in our own lives, that we found that these things were very helpful for us."

The link was made through the director of the studio's yoga program, whose husband, Army Staff Sgt. Robert Spohr Jr., showed his photographs at the event.

"We are always looking for ways to just bring awareness to their experiences, and ways that they can communicate their experience," said Cook. "Because, just standing there and talking to somebody about what you've experienced in combat is not an opportunity that arises every day."

Spohr, Sgt. Nicholas George, Sgt. Sean Baxter, and Sgt. 1st Class Kevin Williams, who all displayed their photos at the event, all have ties to the Capital District. Each man served in Iraq, and Baxter served in both Iraq and Afghanistan. Both Baxter and George have served two tours of duty in the Army.

Stirring images at the exhibition included some of the most frightening sights that could be captured – the explosion of an improvised explosive device, or IED, from afar – and some that had a sense of simplicity, such as a picture of two army vehicles with soldiers inside, with a fading sunset and trees in the background, ~ I

Cook described the process of viewing photographs from a war as "surreal."

"It has that really familiar feeling of looking at someone's pictures, and a really foreign

feeling of looking at a man in full combat gear standing in a field with flowers," said Cook.

The hope for Cook is that the exhibit opened up another way of thinking regarding soldiers coming back from combat.

"There are a whole lot of people coming back from overseas who are desperate to find ways to fit back into the community and heal from what they've experienced," Cook said.

Along with helping the soldiers to heal, the soldiers themselves were helping others by making the photographs available for purchase to those attending the exhibition. Half of all the proceeds from purchased pictures will be donated to the

local chapter of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and their Adopt A Family program. Through that program, families of soldiers currently serving in combat are chosen, and receive donations of gifts and clothing during the holidays.


It may seem like a clash of cultures to incorporate pictures of war and a yoga studio, but Cook said that alternative ways of healing might be gaining momentum.

"They're trying their best to figure out how to make it work, how to deal with the trauma of what they've experienced. The traditional methods are working, but not working as well as everyone would hope," Cook said.



## Grant to fund upgrades at RCS

#### Money part of LaFarge settlement

New York Attorney General Eric T. Schneiderman recently announced the creation of a nearly \$450,000 grant program to help the Ravena-Coeymans Selkirk Central School District transform district school buildings into "high performance" schools at no cost to taxpayers.

The improvements will increase building energy efficiency, improve environmental conditions in classrooms and reduce operating costs for the District. The program was created in partnership with the state Department of Environmental Conservation and New York

State Energy Research and Development Authority.


Funding for the program was obtained by New York as a result of a multi-state settlement with LaFarge North America, Inc. and its subsidiaries, one of the nation's largest cement companies, over alleged violations of the federal Clean Air Act related to emissions of sulfur dioxide and nitrogen oxides. The company operates 13 cement plants nationwide, including a facility in the Village of Ravena.

Interim RCS Superintendent of Schools Elisabeth Smith said, "This substantial funding will provide the District with the resources to undertake school improvements that will increase our energy conservation, save us money and, best of all, enhance the educational environment we provide for our students."


The RCS Central School District already has identified improvement opportunities. This work identified a number of potential projects for funding, including installing higherficiency lighting, boilers and water heating systems, as well as upgrading building ventilation and air filtration systems.

The RCS Central School District encompasses Coeymans and parts of the towns of Bethlehem, New Scotland and the Greene County town of New Baltimore.



## Lawmakers aim to close 'Penn State Loophole'

Legislation would mandate college staff to report child abuse

Allegations of child abuse at Penn State have spurred some lawmakers to close what they called a loophole here in the Empire State.

Assemblymen James Tedisco, R-Glenville, and George Amedore, R-Rotterdam, along with Sens. Hugh Farley, R-Niskayuna, and George Maziarz, R-Newfane, officially introduced the College Coaches and Professionals Reporting Act to the state Legislature on Thursday, Nov. 18. The bill would mandate college staff to report any alleged child abuse to the proper. authorities.

After being in circulation for a day, 11 fellow Assembly members from both major parties have signed on to sponsor the bill.

"It's clear from the bi-partisan support ... there is a real recognition that New York has an opportunity

to be progressive and close the 'Penn State Loophole' to help protect children," Tedisco said in a statement.

Former Penn Stateassistant football coach Jerry Sandusky allegedly sexually assaulted eight male children he met through a charity. program he created to help troubled young boys, according to a Pennsylvania grand jury report. The report also alleged many members of the Penn State community failed to properly report or attempt to stop the abuse.

Longtime football coach Joe Paterno was fired by the university's Board of Trustees in the wake of the scandal, as was Penn State President Graham Spanier. Though allegations of wrongdoing were reported to college officials, it is alleged they were not passed on to police. Sandusky faces 40 criminal charges.

Tedisco said the bill is a positive aspect to the "tragedy" unfolding at Penn State.

The bill would add a number of college and instructional titles to the list of mandatory reporters of child abuse, including college coaches, athletic directors, professors, graduate assistants. college administrators and college presidents. Also, paid staff members of children's camps, summer day camps and travel camps would be added to the list.

said there are already protocols on the SUNY campus for reporting such alleged crimes.

"We haven't had time to review it, so I can't' comment directly on the bill," said Luntta on Thursday, Nov. 17. "We do have protocols in place for reporting sexual \* assault. The university is committed to maintaining an environment here that supports our educational mission. ... We do not tolerate sexual assault."

He said there is a sexual assault prevention program on campus and there are "a couple avenues" for reporting sexual assault crimes.

Also, Luntta pointed to the Clery Act, which is a federal law passed in 1998, requiring the reporting of certain crimes occurring on a college campus.

Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act affects all colleges and universities receiving federal assistance and mandates the college community must be notified when certain crimes are reported to college officials or campus police. Coaches are considered to be college officials under the law.

"This law requires that sports and the athletics program that certain crimes, including sexual assault, when witnessed by a member of the athletics program, by law must be reported directly to police."

At UAlbany, campus security is handled by sworn police officers, so reporting crimes to campus police would count as reporting directly to police.



## African youngsters grateful for Albany's Coach Banda

A September Sports Illustrated article titled "Sports Saves the World" charted the progress of several organizations around the world helping combat poverty, AIDS, malaria and a host of other social issues through sports. Though not featured in the article, Albany's Kalekeni Banda and his Guilderland-based Banda Bola Sports Foundation can be counted among those grassroots efforts. And for Coach Banda it's personal.

As we celebrate our American Thanksgiving, 10 pallets of sports equipment and school supplies donated primarily by Capital Region residents are scheduled to arrive in rural Chituka Village in Malawi, Africa. Coach Banda will be on hand to accept delivery and assist with the distribution of the donations to underprivileged children of all ages in the sleepy little African town without electricity and running water.

"It will be as if I am giving them gold," Coach Banda, who left the village in 1965 to come to the United States, said before departing for his trek across the Atlantic.

He would know because this is not the first time he has delivered supplies there. He was raised in the village, so he is familiar with its people and their needs.

It was December 2007 when he first brought soccer equipment and school supplies to the children there, as well as to young people in surrounding villages. It was then that the idea of the Banda Bola Sports Foundation and the Chituka Village Project was hatched.

Children in Malawi face many adversities including extreme poverty, famine, drought, and diseases such as cholera, malaria and HIV-AIDS. Moreover, education is not mandated. While primary and middle schools exist, many of these schools lack the basic supplies and resources such as pencils, pens, notebooks and textbooks. As a result, many children do not have the

opportunity to become engaged scholastically.

A typical class in a Malawi primary school has 60-100 students and one teacher. Most students have no shoes. During the rainy season many kids skip school because they don't have dry clothes to wear.

Banda Bola Sports Foundation With his effort, Coach Banda plans to effect change by working to provide the necessary resources. Phase one has begun and involves after school sports and education mentoring. His foundation has already partnered with local organizations, secondary schools and soccer clubs to secure volunteer mentors and coaches for the school children. Other partners will be cultivated now that Coach Banda, who lists UAlbany among his coaching stops, is back in Africa.

Before taking the field, participants are required to participate in additional scholastic exercises. Reading, writing and arithmetic are emphasized, and each child receives, at minimum, a pen, pencil and notebook. According to Coach Banda, the children feel blessed to receive these gifts, with the smiles on their faces revealing their joy.

"We want to ensure these children receive a basic education so they will have the tools to break the cycle of adversity they face," Coach Banda said. "The goal is to stimulate young boys and girls to visualize, comprehend and even marvel at the opportunity for growth in their personal lives. We want to make an educational impact that lasts a lifetime."

The Banda Bola Sports Foundation is a 501(c)(3) taxexempt nonprofit organization. Among its many supporters is the Jack Brewer Foundation, which

Lucas Geller has traveled all over the world and even had a secure job in Washington D.C., but all of that seemed to be getting in the way of his true passion: teaching Chinese martial arts.

Geller began attending the Chinese Martial Arts Academy on Central Avenue when he was 13 years old, and took classes under his instructor Shifu Jian Jianye. Now 27, Geller is now better known as Shifu Master Lucas Geller at the Chinese Martial Arts Academy.

Though he's young, Geller has traveled to China, where he trained in martial arts at the Beijing Sport University for four years. He returned to the states and attended college at Ohio State University, where he ended up getting his Master's in Chinese. He

soon got a job working for a defense contractor for the Navy in Washington D.C., which he admitted was a different career path than what he was expecting.

"It is a stable industry and there is a lot of interesting things going on in the military," Geller said. "It was cool getting a security badge and being involved with interesting work. It had its perks but, for me, it was not the path I could see myself on."

A conversation with his parents over whether he wanted to do something new or different was cut short because he had to head off to martial arts training. That's when it hit him that he could turn his passion into a career.

Geller said he had always taught classes at the academy ever winter and summer break when he could, but he didn't have a very close relationship with the facility. When he decided he wanted to come back to the Capital District to try and set up his own shop, he gave Jianye a call for some advice.

"I called up my teacher

and he said, 'Do it," Geller said. "I asked if I came back to Albany to start a place would he support it and he said, Do it. Come back and I'll do whatever you need."

The conversation soon turned into what exactly Jianye and Geller could do together, which led to Geller taking over at the academy. Geller said this is something that Jianye wanted, as he was starting to get older and not able to handle the business like he used to.

Geller began adding different classes such as a kids program, Wushu (a form of Kung Fu) and even a fighting program, which is referred to as Sanshou -- all things he said Jianye could not invest his time in as he started getting into his 60s.

"He got tired and started turning kids away," Geller said. "It's good to have new energy in there to revive what I think were the heydays of the Chinese Martial Arts Academy."

Taking over the academy also meant Geller would now be handling the business side of the facility.

"I called up my teacher and he said, 'Do it.' I asked if I came back to Albany to start a place would he support it and he said, 'Do it. Come back and I'll do whatever you

as he had to pay various bills and get out advertising. Geller said that this is what Jianye wanted but it is also fulfilling a dream of his own.

"It's really a dream come true," Geller said. "Right now we are going through a transitional change where we are getting new programs started."

Geller said he was initially scared because he wasn't sure how many of the people Jianye used to teach would feel about him taking over. He said he is thankful, though, to have their support as he said it is a testament to the spirit of the school.

"It is such a positive place," he said, "Everyone

has so much respect for him. As long as he is smiling, people will be OK with it."

Jianye will still be teaching Taichi, a more slow-moving, meditative style of Kung Fu. He said that while he came to America to fulfill his dreams, he is happy to be he ping Geller fulfill his.

"I came to American and made my dream come true," he said. "For 20 years," I have promoted and taught an important and wonderful legacy of Chinese culture Taichi and Kung Fu, the fighting and healing arts. I am very happy to see Lucas take over. I am very proud of him."

## Counties pool resources to offer help to seniors

Coordinator hopes to spread word about protection program

Edie Sennett was ouched by the reaction of seniors during a recent peremony held in Delmar to nonor veterans who served as far back as World War II.

It's a common reaction for Sennett, who is the coordinator of the Long-Term. Ombudsman Program in Albany, Schenectady, Montgomery, and Washington counties. The program, established through the federal Older Americans Act, is mandated for each county in New York.

The Sennett's job is to work with residents of long-term senior care facilities

throughout each county. c. "We represent the resident," Sennett said following a ceremony at the Kenwood Manor home. "We don't represent any of the facilities. We represent them, so our allegiance is only to them." Through the ombudsman position, Sennett is esponsible for helping residents to understand heir rights within facilities. Phose rights include being reated with respect and lignity, being able to manage their own finances \*

and being able to voice grievances without fear of retaliation.

recognized," said Sennett.
"I think that what we see every day in our business as

"There's not a lot of money attached to the program," Sennett said. "We get federal money, and we get some state money."

More than \$67,000 is made available for the program yearly in the four counties. The federal government grants \$40,000, with the rest picked up by the state.

The Red Cross of Northeastern New York has sponsored the program in Albany, Schenectady, Montgomery and Washington counties since July 2010. By combining the programs, enough money was available to hire Sennett full-time.

Sennett estimated that she serves about 5,600 long-term care residents in the area. Forty certified volunteers provide Sennett with assistance by also speaking with residents.

In Rensselaer County, ombudsman Rich Haldeman started a program to recognize veterans of all military branches who now live in long-term care facilities. It's the type of program that Sennett hopes to expand throughout the areas she covers.

"Look at the people's faces who are being


recognized," said Sennett.
"I think that what we see every day in our business as ombudsmen, many of the seniors, you know, there's nobody that comes to see them. They feel forgotten. So, here's an opportunity to recognize them."

The numbers indicate that the biggest problem is reaching all the elderly residents that Sennett represents. New York State ranked second in the nation in number of certified volunteer ombudsman, but ranked 43rd in the number of paid long-term care ombudsman program staff per long term care beds.

With the temptation by state and federal lawmakers to scale back on funding for many programs, Sennett pointed out that volunteer hours associated with the program saved New York close to \$6 million in 2010. However, Sennett is removed from the politics of the program.

"We certainly advocate for laws that benefit the seniors, but we don't really get involved in all of that," Sennett said.



## CDTA wins \$2.5M federal grant to purchase hybrid buses

#### **New BusPlus features** also rolled out

The Capital District Transportation Authority (CDTA) has \$2.5 million to spend on new hybrid electric buses in 2013 courtesy of a grant awarded by the U.S. Department of Transportation Clean Fuels Program.

"We are extremely grateful for this award, which will allow us to stick with a planned purchase program for buses. New vehicles are the centerpiece of our efforts to attract new customers to our system," said CDTA CEO Carm Basile in a statement.

U.S. Sens. Charles E. Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand worked to secure the grant, which

they announced on Monday, Nov. 14.

"The Capital Region is growing through green jobs and new technologies and our public transit system must be ready to handle the load," said Schumer.

The Clean Fuels Program was developed to "assist non-attainment or maintenance areas in achieving or maintaining the National Ambient Air Quality Standards for ozone and carbon monoxide."

"This will help us continue the replacement of the buses," said Janack. "About one twelfth of our fleet will be purchased.".

vehicles once they're past their prime is important for safety and customer satisfaction.

"We want to make sure our buses on the road are safe and comfortable for the Capital Region," said Janack. "After a while if you go beyond the 12 year span they break down all the time, which becomes more costly to even fix than it would be to get new buses in."

The Clean Fuels Program grant was competitive and Janack said the CDTA was. "pleased" to have secured it, especially given tight budgets.

Implementing green initiatives and promoting sustainability across its services has become an important cornerstone of CDTA's mission.

'We've made it a point

Janack said the CDTA keeps the environment in mind when making changes beyond actual buses.

"That extends to our solar powered shelters and istop signs we have on the BusPlus route,' said Janack, adding the BusPlus route is an environmentally friendly project in itself because it makes limited stops. "We also have plans to install a solar panel roof on one of our facilities so we always look to head in that direction to help our environment."

Even without the sustainability measures. CDTA's growing ridership (about 14.5 million riders annually) was already doing its part for the environment.

"Public transportation itself helps reduce the carbon footprint in the region," said Janack. "There are 42 seats on a bus so that's 42 cars taken off the road."

announcements on to install 22 real time Tuesday, Nov. 15, arrival signs, new shelters, CDTA had more introducing new amenities on the BusPlus service to "expedite travel time, improve customer -communications and ease! congestion on Route 5."

Besides customer convenience services like complimentary WiFi. real time passenger information (RTPI) at select stations that will provide riders with "upto-the-minute arrival information" using GPS satellites to determine bus location. Riders can then access that information through a smartphone app, email and text message alerts. There's also a new measure to prevent road clogging.

Queue jumper and traffic signal priority systems allow buses to essentially "jump the line" of waiting cars at congested intersections using "bus only" lanes. The queue jumpers have been installed along Route 5 at Wolf Road Westbound, New Karner Road westbound and Nott Terrace eastbound.

"Route 5 is the Capital Region's busiest travel corridor and BusPlus is helping ensure it remains a vital connector," said Town of Colonie Supervisor Paula Mahan in a statement.

CDTA will also use \$5.5 million in federal funds it was awarded in October security cameras and 911 blue light phones along Route 5 in 2012.

## Slingerlands Fire Department makes case to expand

Public meeting on \$1.8M proposal brings cautious support

Walk into the bays at the Slingerlands Fire Department's headquarters on New Scotland Road, and the smell of diesel fumes is powerful.

"Every time we're out here getting dressed, and firefighters are getting their gear on, they are inhaling diesel exhaust while the trucks are running, because they load in the station," said Ryan McConky, a commissioner for the Slingerlands Fire District.

It's one of the many reasons that department leaders have proposed a \$1.8 million expansion project. The fire station was opened in 1966 and contains much of its original infrastructure. Stained walls and ceilings from a leaking roof are visible in many spots and tight quarters make for dangerous conditions for the 40 volunteer firefighters that belong to the department.:

McConky led a tour of the station during a public meeting held Wednesday Nov. 16. He showed members of the department and the public where exhaust systems would be placed. Right now, makeshift changing stations are situated between the department's fire trucks. They would be moved into a "ready room," and exhaust systems would be located between trucks.

Plans include the addition of two bays, more storage areas for equipment and files, the construction of a radio room in the front of the building, and the addition of a decontamination station, where firefighters can wash off harmful substances. from fire scenes or from work on equipment at the station.

The department serves over 1,800 residential and commercial properties, but a little more than ten people showed up for the public meeting, not including members of the department.

## BC projects another TCBY opens in Guilderland enrollment decline

**Tebbano says** district has plenty of classroom space

Bethlehem Central School District. Superintendent Michael Tebbano gave his projections regarding enrollment for the 2012-13 school year during a Board of Education meeting held Wed. Nov.

The report looks at matters regarding enrollment, student teacher ratios, the amount of people moving into the district and what all that will mean for future years.

"This sets the momentum for some of the decisions you may have to make, especially as you look at staffing and sectioning," Tebbano said to the school board.

According to his. projections, Tebbano believes enrollment will be down among students : in kindergarten through fifth grade. He told the the next five years. board that the estimate > is for 1,947 students next year, about 50 students less than in this current school year. It's a trend Tebbano predicted would be seen throughout the district.

"What we're looking at is approximately 100 students less for next year, if this inflated. adjustment projection comes out to where we: think it will place out," Tebbano said.

Tebbano's report

showed an ongoing trend of decreasing enrollment for the entire district. The superintendent's projections indicated that enrollment numbers peaked during the 2006-07 school year and have decreased progressively since the start of the national recession in 2008. That number, according to superintendant's trends, could dip to as low as 4,758 students district wide by 2019. A gradual decline of students is a declining enrollment; projected to occur over

While warning that these are only projections, the outgoing superintendent discussed staffing levels, giving board members an idea of what to consider, decisions.

Att the district's or the amount of classes and teachers at the five elementary schools. Tebbano said that number, with projected

declining enrollment, could dip down to 84 next year.

"If we are going to lose that many kids, and we really don't know how. many we are going to have, we are estimating 84 sections," said Tebbano. "Potentially," vou could cut four elementary teachers. I'm not saying you should do that. I'm only pointing out what the numbers. are saying."

Tebbano showed what could happen if the numbers were inflated and hit the high levels of projections.

"Even with the adjusted projections, I can get the staffing and sections up to 86, not to the existing 88 sections," Tebbano stated. "Which means that will make the student-teacher ratio 22or 23-to-1.".

Last year, the district closed down Clarksville Elementary School in a cost-cutting effort, with the decision based on numbers. Even with one less building for elementary school students, Tebbano said there's much more room in the district's open schools should enrollment grow.

"Within the district," when making budget, you have 25 available classrooms to expand enrollment," Tebbano elementary schools, told the board. "There is there are 88 sections, no need to worry about building classrooms in the future.



It's Thanksgiving Day and our kitchen is crazy, we all work together and no one is lazy...

"We always had that environment where you were encouraged, not pushed," said Haugh.


When she's not writing, Haugh gives piano lessons.



## **Housing developments** moving along slowly

**Planning Board** reviews Wemple Road, **Glenmont projects**

The Bethlehem Town Board will be the next body to review a draft scoping document regarding the proposed Wemple Corners hamlet project.

On Tuesday, Nov. 15, members of the town's Planning Board listened to a presentation from an outside consultant from the Chazen Companies regarding the document.

Common issues were discussed regarding the multi-use project, including traffic impacts, the need for apartments in the town and to what extent the developer of the project should study such matters.

Board member John Smolinsky said he'd like to see more forceful language in a final scoping document to ensure that developers provide the best information possibly their own study - regarding the need for housing and apartment •Songs from the Piano units in the 'Glenmont

> 'Sometimes it depends how hard you look," said Smolinsky, who was concerned about a phrase in the document calling for the "best available analysis."

"Bring forth the best analysis that you can of the housing market, why there's a demand,' he said.

That demand, and

more importantly, how to measure if it exists. was debated between the developer and the board. Andy Brick, the attorney for developer Milltowne Plaza, said he was concerned about the quantity of specific studies to measure housing demands for the town.

that we can find regional studies, but I took that language (in the draft scoping document) to mean that if there is sufficient data specifically for Bethlehem, then we would provide that analysis," said Brick. "If that data exists, I don't know that it does, but we would gladly do that analysis."

Board members stressed that a market study would need to be conducted, but it would not need to include an analysis of housing needs throughout the town.

The proposed project would include 526 housing units, including senior apartments and twin homes, along with 84,000 square feet of retail space, and would be located at the corner of Wemple Road and Route 9W.

Legends at Bethlehem

A long-discussed housing project on Jolley Road in Glenmont is going through another change, as the Bethlehem Planning Board considered a new application regarding the development.

An engineer and a developer speaking for the Legends at Bethlehem project detailed their proposal for a conservation subdivision, which would allow for a portion of the property to be conserved as open space.

Board members quizzed the two men about the layout of the 112-unit development. 22 townhouses, 28 twin-style homes, and 62 standalone single-family houses have been proposed. with a price range in the. mid-\$200,000s to upper \$300,000s.

**Engineer Tom Andress** disagreed with Board Chairman George Leveille about the amount of open space that would need to be in place for the project

"I strongly suspect to receive incentives from the town for conserving open space.

> "My interest is to learn how much developable land you are now setting aside to take advantage of the incentives that we offer for conservation subdivisions," Leveille said.

"It's a formulation that someone put together to just come up with what a minimal number of acres of open space is," said Andress.

Leveille said to receive the requested conservation designation, the developers must meet the minimum amount of non-constrained, or developable land, that needs to be set aside. Andress said that isn't what he reads in the town's laws on meeting the requirements.

Both agreed that about 40 of the 75 acres are considered constrained land. The argument is over the 35 acres left, and whether the developer must protect 40 percent of that usable space or 40 percent of the entire site.

Board members also asked about the possibility of the open space being donated to a not-for-profit organization. Andress said that was not in the proposal that is before the town.

There was also a conversation about the creation of a homeowner's association within the development, and how that would factor into the maintenance and upkeep of the open space.

The project has taken many turns, having first been proposed more than four years ago. Board members voted to table the application for a conservation subdivision pending resolution of the dispute over how much open land is needed.



Individual students and groups of students may submit projects to the contest. Eligible projects include computerbased entries, such as websites or PowerPoint presentations; exhibits, documentaries, performances, proposals for a historical marker, property or district and traditional research papers.

All students must use historical records, as well as other primary and secondary sources, in their research, and, each entry must be accompanied by an annotated bibliography that briefly describes how each source was used and how it contributed to the project.

Projects must be nominated by teachers or administrators in the schools students attend. Community members, such as municipal historians and public librarians, may also nominate students.

Three awards are presented each year; one for grades four to five, grades six to eight, and grades nine to 12. The awards consist of a framed certificate, a check for \$125, an invitation to an awards luncheon and ceremony in Albany, and a tour of archival treasures at the State Archives. Certificates of Merit are awarded to students, other than the winners, whose projects are exemplary.

"The Student Research Award program encourages students to go beyond textbooks and school libraries to access the real documents of history," said State Archivist Christine Ward. "These valuable historical resources can be found in every community across the state and in every family. Conducting research in historical records allows students to become real historians."



"We've got a lot of huge trees that are down, that are just blocking the channel of the (Onesquethaw) creek,' said Breen. "Whenever there's going to be another high water event, if we get another serious rain storm, it's going to cause flooding. There's no plan or strategy to deal with

Breen is working with Ciara Gannon, a senior from the New York City area who is taking an independent study course with Breen. 🔔

"The main goal is to have people listen to each other and have a common ground," said-Gannon. "My goal is to have a community effort where people work together, maybe on a Saturday, to go and volunteer, and clean up some trees that are blocking water flow, or clean out some things that might have flowed down

creek." Breen said that there is often a feeling of skepticism regarding help from the local or state level, and talked about the positives of getting people in a community more aware of what can be done without passing a piece of legislation. He cautioned that many people don't have the resources they need to make their own repairs along with the work to prevent major flooding.

"They're putting the resources back in to replace some of their items that they lost, or getting some structural stuff done on their houses," Breen said. "They don't have any money or resources or equipment to go into the creek and do creek restoration, let alone the technical expertise."

The community dialogue organized by the Onesquethaw-Coeymans Watershed Council will be held Wednesday, Nov. 30, at 7 p.m. at the CSX Auditorium in Selkirk. 




