

# Flood of concerns over subdivision

**New Scotland residents pack** hearing to lament drainage board rebuts claims

Neighbors of a proposed 12-lot subdivision in New Scotland fear their existing drainage issues would only worsen with new construction, but town officials and the developer claim the opposite is true.

The crowd at the Tuesday, May 7, New Scotland Planning Board meeting

overflowed into the hallway as residents turned out to express their concerns about the project at a public hearing. The 31.4-acre parcel in question is zoned Residential Agricultural and is near the corner of Picard and New Salem roads. MJ Biernacki Builders, LLC, owns the parcel and is seeking preliminary plat subdivision approval.

Planning Board Chairman Charles Voss moved to keep the public hearing open and extend it to the board's next meeting on June 4 because of the large turnout at the meeting.

# **Guilderland police** contract cleared

**Two-year agreement** holds annual 2 percent salary increase

Less than five months after the Guilderland Police Benevolent Association's contract with the town expired, a new agreement has been struck that includes raises for the next two years.

The Guilderland Town Board on Tuesday, May 7, approved a new two-year contract with the town's police union, which has around 35 members. The agreement provides a retroactive 2 percent salary increase in this year, and the same increase for next year. made and no reductions were included in the contract. The new contract expires Dec. 31, 2014.

Runion said the town typically does one- or two-year contracts with the PBA. Negotiations started a "little late" in December, Runion said, but he thought the contract was negotiated "pretty quick."

Town employees were also given a 2 percent raise this year, Runion said, though they received no increase in the previous two yeas. PBA members also received a 2 percent raise last vear.

"We are comfortable with that," Runion said.

Only four changes were "We are trying to limit everything to 2 percent, because we have the 2 percent tax levy cap."

The tax cap doesn't expressly limit Town Supervisor Ken municipalities to a 2 percent tax property levy increase because several exclusions are offered when calculating its tax cap limit.

> In the new contract, changes were made to the shift bidding process after senior employees previously held up the process by waiting to select what work schedule they preferred, Runion said. Some senior employees had held up the process for a month, Runion said, and then other officers would scramble to make their shift selections.

"Some of the senior guys were holding up the bidding to the end, so nobody knew what their schedules were," Runion said. "We moved the bidding up to November and they only have 24 hours to pick their flavor and then it goes to the next one."

The bidding process would start on Nov. 15 with the senior most employee, and if an employee doesn't sign up on his or her designated day, he or she would be limited then to any available shifts.

A new provision was added allowing Youth Services Officers to tap any unused funds from their annual clothing allowance to purchase clothes worn during their plainclothes assignment.

The remaining amendments tackled retiree hospitalization and medical insurance. and the Empire Health Care Plan was deleted from insurance offerings, Runion said the plan was discontinued but remained listed in the contract.

# **Clark family keeps up fight**

Teen's suicide fuels push for legislation over school special education resources

Jerry Clark's grandmother can't fill the hole in her heart left by her grandson's suicide, but she is continuing her efforts to keep it from happening to other families by lobbying for state legislation.

"We keep the wounds fresh and why we do it is because it has to be done," said Mary Clark. "The Clark Family is not going to go away, especially old lady Clark."

Jerry Clark was 17 years old when he committed suicide by hanging himself on April 27, 2010, shortly after Voorheesville High School administrators suspended him for six weeks. Jerry was on prescribed antidepressants and mood stabilizers at the time. There is also a history of mental illness in the family, Mary Clark said.

Clark says children suffering from mental illness can't simply be disciplined and their misbehavior stopped. Before Jerry was suspended he had fell asleep several times in class, broke the school's dress code and acted out in other ways.

how much you punish them, they can't help themselves, so you have to judge them by a different set of codes," Clark said. "We really have to take that whole subject of suicide out of the closet. ... The real need is for schools to be sensitized to the issue."

Clark said Jerry "unraveled in a matter of five months" and "pleaded for his life" in his meeting with school administrators. Clark believes Jerry was pushed over the edge by being kicked off the wrestling team, where he excelled.

"For him to lose that was such a blow. He couldn't take it," Clark said. "The school psychologist said she feared for his life if he didn't wrestle."

The Clarks are still focusing on getting a law passed by the state Legislature that would require a parent or guardian of a student being suspended to be notified and given information on the Committee on Special Education referral process prior to the hearing. Any student facing suspension for more than five days must receive a hearing under the current law.


The information provided would include contact details for the chairperson of the school district's Committee on Special Education or another committee member in charge of referrals. As the bill is written, the law would become effective July 1. Mary Clark lobbied for the bill last year, but it didn't make it to the floor. She's hoping for better results in the 2013 session, which wraps up in June.

Clark claims she and other family members were not aware they could have gone to the committee for an evaluation of her grandson.

Voorheesville Central School District Superintendent Teresa Snyder previously said the family's claim about not being provided information is not accurate.

"Their information was not correct. People are made aware. That particular family, they were aware," Snyder told The Spotlight last year.

Clark was pleased to see the district place information on its website about the Committee on Special Education and she has since joined the school's task

force focusing on mental health issues. She believes schools in general are also more aware of mental health issues facing students.

"If we can help another

family, even one ... the students deserve it," Clark said. "They are our future."

He currently serves as director of the state Economic Development Council, along with sitting on boards for several area nonprofit organizations.





# Rock the (school budget) vote

Come Tuesday, May 21, you will get your annual chance to directly weigh in on your school district. It's a late-May annual rite that never seems to change – at least, not as of late.

It is fair to say we've settled into a new status quo when it comes to school budgets: residents should expect to pay more for less.

Those who keep an eye on both their school district and their tax bill would be hard pressed to come to any other conclusion. And come Tuesday, voters across the state will head to the polls to say something about it by voting on budgets, propositions and their school board representatives.

The reasons for the ongoing state of affairs are many-fold, and when it comes time for finger pointing almost everyone tends to have a valid point or two. Administrators in local districts are correct when they say their receipt of state aid has been on a steep downslope in recent years. And at the state level, it's been noted districts don't always handle schooling in the most efficient way possible. And while teachers tend to be underpaid in our opinion, they are also

beneficiaries of a pension and healthcare system that – like Social Security and every other age-dependent entitlement program in the land – is placing a tremendous fiscal pressure on government and taxpayers that is unlikely to alleviate anytime soon.

We wish all this pointed to a clear direction for voters to take when heading to the polls next week, but it really doesn't. These realities only demonstrate that change – major change – is needed should our educational system have a chance to become universally strong. Sadly, in many cases there isn't much of a choice to be had when it comes to school board elections. So what's most important is you get out there to show you care about that system.

Like every other time you visit the polls, how you vote should be a decision you reach yourself. You'll find the basic information on your budget vote in this week's edition. For more in depth information, we suggest visiting spotlightnews.com and using our handy search box to look at our prior coverage. For true numbers masochists, most districts post their entire budget online

these days, too, line by line.

It is important to note you do not need to be registered with the board of election to vote on the school budget or anything else on Tuesday's ballot. You only need to be a U.S. citizen of at least the age of 18 and a resident of the school district in question for at least 30 days prior to the vote. Make sure to have some proof of residency when you show up to the polls, but that's pretty much all the red tape.

The lazy, apathetic answer from those who stay home on any election day tends to be that their vote will not matter. That simply can't be said when it comes to these annual school budget votes. An incredibly slim percentage of the population comes out for these votes, sometimes barely 10 percent, and it is hardly unusual for the decision to be within a few percentage points of either passage or defeat. Do the math on your decision making power in that scenario.

So where will you be next Tuesday? We hope at one of the schools in your district, casting your vote.

## **Preventing Lyme Disease**

On Wednesday, May 22, at 6 p.m. an educator with the New York State Department of Health will be at the Guilderland Public Library to tell you how to avoid getting one of the banes of summer: Lyme disease.

# Tax district dropped for townwide plan to fix drainage

Guilderland GOP robo-calls residents, supervisor says change not political

The Guilderland Town Board is backpedaling on a plan to establish a special taxing district in McKownville in a favor of a townwide fund aimed at fixing drainage issues across the board.

Residents of the hamlet notorious for its drainage issues had petitioned for the establishment of a taxing district, but a public hearing on the matter scheduled for a Tuesday, May 7, Town Board meeting ended up being a moot point. Supervisor Ken Runion decided levying the new tax would be unfair because the town must tackle drainage issues throughout Guilderland.

Runion argued cuts in the town budget and increased sales tax revenues have helped fill town coffers, making infrastructure projects feasible.

"We have been doing a pretty good job finically here," Runion said Friday, May 10. "Rather than create a storm drainage district for McKownville alone, we created a new line in the highway budget for stormwater improvements and repairs."

The budget line approved by the Town Board will be \$100,000 annually, with plans to grow the account each year through unspent

funds to eventually help tackle a larger project, according to Runion. The town would have collected around \$50,000 annually from residents of McKownville for projects in that hamlet through the proposed drainage district.

Runion pointed to a number of drainage issues across the town.

"We have townwide issues — McKownville is not an isolated area," Runion said. "It would be unfair in my estimation to make them pay for their own and then have the town pay for all the other ones. It is either you do all of these drainage districts or you create a fund. ... I felt the best thing to do was create this fund."

Shortly before the board's Tuesday meeting, robo-calls were made by the Guilderland Republican Committee urging hamlet residents to oppose the "drainage tax" at that night's public hearing.

"The tax was unnecessary and it didn't solve a problem and it should be opposed," Matthew Nelligan, chairman of the town Republican Committee, said.

Nelligan, who lives in McKownville, agreed repairs should be made to address drainage issues in the neighborhood, but disagreed with the approach to levy a new tax on hamlet residents.

Don Reeb, president of the McKownville Improvement Association, previously said more than 400 of the hamlet's 600 residents signed a petition asking for the drainage district. Of the people reached, Reeb had estimated around 25 people expressed opposition.

Nelligan claims when Reeb had visited his home he had pitched the idea to his wife, but didn't make it clear the petition aimed to levy a new tax. Once Nelligan read the petition and realized what was being proposed he opted to not sign it.

"It is completely false to say the McKownville residents wanted to tax themselves," Nelligan said.

Reeb could not be reached for comment before The Spotlight went to press.

Nelligan claimed if the town raised \$50,000 annually through the district it would take 124 years to complete repairs outlined under the town's plan.

A Delaware Engineering report estimated completing all needed repairs across four target areas would cost \$6.7 million. The town also has \$500,000 available for McKownville projects through a member item from Sen. Neil Breslin.

The plan chiefly involved creating new catch basins, adding residential sump pump connections and methods to redirect stormwater to several downstream detention basins. Some streets would also be milled to lower its elevation to improve drainage.

The drainage district designation was also said to allow the town to apply for additional federal and state grant opportunities.

Even if the town used the full \$100,000 allocated for stormwater repairs, Nelligan contested it "would not fix the problem for many years."

Runion said his change

to approach repairs wasn't politically motivated and it was the fairest solution for residents. He said hamlet residents were pleased with the decision.

"There are people would like to make this political," Runion said. "This shouldn't be a political thing. We have people that are losing

their basements. We have people with mold in their house. We have people with swamps in their backyards. ... This is something that we ought to all be working together to help people maintain their quality of life and keep up their property values."

# New part-time position discussed

Bethlehem, IDA would partner to form economic development job

The Town of Bethlehem and its Industrial Development Agency may soon be partnering to hire a new, part-time employee to work on economic development.

Supervisor John Clarkson discussed the idea with the Town Board at a Wednesday, May 8, meeting after previously getting the preliminary approval of IDA members. The individual would act as a "single point of contact" for developers looking to bring new projects to the town.

"Mike Morelli is the director of both economic development and planning, and as you can tell ... he has many, many things on his plate," said Clarkson.

Although Morelli constantly promotes the town's economic activity in his daily duties, Clarkson said, there is no staff member solely responsible for economic development within the town. Morelli acts as the contact person for developers, but Clarkson said he and the IDA would like to see a more proactive campaign.

The IDA had gone before the Town Board last year with a plan to hire a consultant to work in a similar capacity. Clarkson said at the

time he supported the concept. However, after interviewing several individuals and groups, the IDA tabled the idea after not hearing a proposal that would fit the town's needs.

Clarkson outlined the idea of hiring a part-time employee to work on economic development in his State of the Town address. The cost of hiring an additional employee would be paid for mostly through closing costs collected on IDA projects. It is expected through the partnership, the town would pay about \$10,000 of the person's salary, but the exact details of the contract still have to be worked out by the town and the IDA.

Clarkson said the position is not expected to be permanent and the employee would serve at the will of both the Town Board and IDA. The person's contract would be reviewed each year, and if either entity felt the person wasn't working up to their potential, the position would be eliminated.

Town Board members were generally in favor of the plan, but said they would like to see more specific details before it was approved.

Councilman Jeffrey Kuhn asked whether after five years without a person dedicated solely to economic development, if the town has seen a lack in development to show that filling the role was needed.

"I'll answer it this: the economic professionals within the town ... feel we're not doing enough," said Clarkson. "It's hard to say during those five years what happened because it also coincided with an economic downturn."

Councilwoman Joann Dawson said the details of the person's duties should be in place before moving forward so one entity does not take up the person's time more than another, especially since the IDA would be paying a greater share of the salary.

Councilman Kyle Kotary suggested it might help if the person could focus his or her efforts on developing certain areas of town, in order to measure how well they've done.

Clarkson said the employee would serve under Morelli, but would also attend IDA meetings. He did not feel the partnership would result in a struggle over the person's time. He also said he brought up the subject merely to get a consensus from the board before the IDA and town staff did the work to seek out candidates.

The supervisor said the plan my not be able to go forward, or may take some time, if no one deemed qualified applies for the position.



# Improvise your way to better negotiation and leadership skills: An interview with Karen Hough

hen business leader and author Karen Hough left the stage to pursue a career as an executive in information technology, she was sure of one thing—she didn't know what she was getting herself into.

Hough admits: "I had no background or education that prepared me for it. But every single day the behaviors I had learned as an improviser on stage allowed me to think on my feet, ask the right questions and engage people. So I did really well, and I loved it.'

Today, Hough is founder and CEO of ImprovEdge and bestselling author of The Improvisation Edge: Secrets to Building Trust and Radical Collaboration at Work. She is also the keynote speaker for the 2013 Key-4Women Forum, "Negotiation and Leadership: For Women in Business and Life."

Here Hough talks about her path from improvisational acting to leading a successful business consulting firm, as well as what actionable ideas attendees of this year's Key4Women forum will walk away with.

Lisa Clifford: You went from acting to a career in IT. Then you founded a consulting firm. Can you tell me a little bit about that

Karen Hough: I kept thinking about how my improv experience was helping me in business, so I began talking with my eventual cofounders about really exploring this idea. One of them happened to be getting her MBA at Wharton. Wharton thought it was a neat idea for us to do a research project on the idea that behaviors from the improv stage can make you a more effective executive. We were able to use the MBA students as test subjects in our first workshops and applied psychology and organization development conlot of research. So ImprovEdge was really more of a hobby and feel about their part on the team. research project for us. We were all working full time, but we were fascinated with the idea and wanted to prove that the approach was real and scientifically based.

LC: When did it move to the next level?

LC: Why do you think your firm ImprovEdge has been so successful?

KH: Whether it's negotiations, inclusion and diversity, sales, creativity, or leadership training, the philosophies and the behaviors of improv are the core of how we teach it. It's fresh and engaging, and people look at their job and their actions

and behaviors in a completely different way.

LC: You've written about creativity and the widely held belief that it comes from an environment of boundless possibility. Can you explain why you don't think that's necessarily true?

KH: The great thing about boundaries within the context of creativ-

ity is that they create drive. They provide a challenge. And because there's a competitive nature in almost any human being, once we are challenged and there is something to overcome, we suddenly become very creative about how to work within that boundary instead of focusing on how to jump over it.

For promoting creativity within work teams, two things spring to mind. One of them is creating awareness about boundaries. If people can get on board with why boundaries are in place and understand that they are there for a good reason, then you can create a certain spirit about them that promotes creativity. The second thing is to create proper expectations about process. For example, if leaders have a decision to make, they can say to their team: "We don't want to do this in the bubble, because you guys have all the great ideas. So let's do some brainstorming together. Then when we have to go off and make that decision alone, we're going to feel so cepts to the work. And we did a much stronger and able to do that." # New Salem water project gets New Scotland's OK

\$3M extension hinges on agreement with **Bethlehem**

A long journey to bring municipal water service to New Salem has taken a major step forward, but more than 150 residents affected will have to wait a little longer before the tap is turned on.

The New Scotland Town

Board on Wednesday, resolution, which includes May 8, unanimously approved the boundaries of the New Salem Water District, which generally encompasses the hamlet of New Salem. The approval also includes the general plan establishing the infrastructure and system to transmit water to more than 150 homes and some commercial properties.

The cost of establishing the water system for the district cannot exceed \$3.05 million under the pre-construction costs already incurred by the town totaling around \$100,000.

"This is a very momentous occasion for about 150 people that live in the New Salem area," Town Supervisor Thomas Dolin said. "We are still a long way from turning on the water, but we have really made some major commitments here."

The push to establish the district started around eight years ago and Dolin building a booster pump volunteered to help see the district established. He said cooperation by Stantec project engineer, also helped.

"It was kept alive by these individual residents,' Dolin said.

The physical work required includes connecting to the existing Bethlehem Water District pipeline along Route 85, building a meter pit,

said many residents station, installing a 200,000 gallon water tank adiacent to New Scotland's highway garage, installing two Consulting Services, the pressure reducing values and running approximately 16,700 linear feet of 8-inch pipe.

The state Environmental Facilities Corporation is providing the funding to the town through an interest-free loan to be paid back in 30 years.

The final detail involves the water itself. Bethlehem Public Works Commissioner Erik Devoe said the town's attorneys have been working to develop an intermunicipal water purchase agreement to sell water to New Scotland.

"We have been trying to get the fine grain details of a water purchase agreement with New Scotland," Deyoe said. "There are a couple loose ends that the attorneys are working out."

Devoe declined to offer any further details since negotiations are ongoing, but said he hoped to have an agreement to present to the Bethlehem Town Board within the next few weeks.

"I was hoping to have this advanced sooner, but we just got some details to work out," he said.

New Scotland Town Attorney Michael Naughton said at the Wednesday Town Board meeting the main holdup concerns a 10-year-old spill" on a Bethlehem property. The state Department of Environmental Conservation has outlined steps needed for remediation on that property.

"The fact that both towns have not formally adopted an agreement does get in the way of this town's ability to proceed with the final order," Naughton. "What this does allow the board to do is proceed with the short-term financing ... which is a good thing.'

Dolin said the town would be able to have survey crews complete fieldwork needed to design the project.

# Meet the new Colonial Acres at open house event

New golf course operator connects with Big Brothers Big Sisters

Business has been steady at Colonial Acres Golf Course during its first month open under a private operator.

PGA golf professional Dale Ezyk has been running the course since the beginning of April, after the town agreed to a three-year operating contract with the option to renew.

Ezyk said the recent "unspring-like" weather had him concerned, but as the days grew hotter the amount of play has increased.

"I have nothing to compare it to, so I'll just say I'm not yet ready to jump off of a bridge," he joked. "A lot of these kids wouldn't ever have the opportunity to learn the game of golf, so we're appreciative."

In order to introduce himself as the new owner of the golf course to the community, Ezyk has scheduled an open house weekend to begin on Friday, May 17. There will be raffles, golf contests with prizes and free lessons for new players.

"I intend to make CAGC a fun, activity-filled place to be, and I'll try to convey that," he said.

For the event, Ezyk will be partnering with Big Brothers Big Sisters of Albany. All of the proceeds from the weekend will be donated to the organization and through a new partnership, children enrolled in the program will now be able to golf for free at the course when accompanied by their "big."

"There are qualities inherent to the game of golf that will serve anyone well if practiced in their everyday life," said Ezyk. "Sharing a game of golf with a young person is a means of practicing and promoting these values by example rather than sermonizing about them. I think the 'bigs' are always looking for affordable activities to do with their 'littles,' and we are very affordable."

Jessica Mansmith,

director of development for Big Brothers Big Sisters of Albany, said she was excited by the new relationship formed between the organization and Colonial Acres.

"A lot of these kids wouldn't ever have the opportunity to learn the game of golf, so we're appreciative," she said.

Ezyk said the partnership is part of his long-range vision for the course to become a unique place for people both young and old to learn the game.

Depending on his finances, Ezyk said eventually he would like to replace the existing clubhouse with something bigger to allow for a small food area.

Recently, a "learning center" has been started at the golf course with a practice putting course, hitting nets and mats for honing ball striking skills. A third set of tees for younger players called "Wee Tees" were also added. The tees are closer to the greens, making it more fun for the 5- and 6-year-olds playing there.

"My goals for the club are to make a fun, welcoming environment for anyone to come and escape the everyday hubbub of life," said Ezyk. "Enjoy the sound of the birds, the fresh air and beautiful surroundings. I want to introduce new players to the game and help the seasoned player play better."

The town opted to no longer fund operation

of the golf course in the 2013 budget. Officials had previously projected the nine-hole, par-three course to run at an annual loss of \$40,000. Scheduled capital improvement projects could have seen the town spending up to \$270,000 in the coming years. Under the operating agreement, the town and the Open Space Conservancy will split some of the course's profits on a sliding scale.

The grand opening and ribbon cutting is set for Friday, May 17, from 4 to 8 p.m. at Colonial Acres. The Open House weekend is May 18 and 19 from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.

performed as part of several concert benefits to raise funds for the library.

The women also performed a portion of the 1898 play "What Became of Parker" by Maurice Hagerman, which was another fundraiser put on at the time that netted \$88, or \$2,040 in today's money.

The library began in a small room inside a former elementary school that is now the Masonic Temple on Kenwood Avenue. After raising money for three more years, the George C. Adams estate gave a plot of land to the library for a new building to be erected at what is now 90 Adams Place.

The land was sold to the library association in the summer of 1916 for \$1, with the stipulations that a \$3,000 building be erected within one year. The agreement also stipulated that "no liquor or other intoxicating drinks could ever be sold on the property."

The women of the Progress

Club ran the library on a volunteer basis until 1931, when operation was turned over to the school district. In 1972, the library moved to its current location.

Because of the ongoing partnership between the women's group and the library, the Board of Directors proclaimed May to be "Delmar Progress Club Month."

"I don't know exactly what to say about the ladies of the Progress Club, because I can't say enough," said Library Director Geoffrey Kirkpatrick at the Founder's Day celebration. "They started planning all of this more than a year ago and it came out beautifully. This group started the library and they're still working with us today."

A Centennial Committee was formed last year by members of the Progress Club, with Mary Richards doing much of the research and writing the script for the event.

Following the reenactment, Kirkpatrick opened a time capsule that was created by library staff to commemorate the library's 75th anniversary celebration.



"We heard a lot from the public, there is a lot of flooding concerns, and we have looked at this project from pretty much all angles," Voss said. "We agree there are flooding issues everywhere across the town ... our job is to ensure this project does not contribute to that."

# Stormwater stokes worries

Under the proposal, there would be two lots to the south of Route 85A, with the remaining 10 to the north of the road. Seven lots would face Picard Road and the remaining five would face New Salem Road. There is also a small parcel of land Mike Biernacki is negotiating with town officials to acquire. This wouldn't become another lot, but would be added to an adjacent lot.

Development would be limited primarily to an inactive cornfield. The project was scaled down from 15 lots to 12.

Joe Bianchine, of ABD Engineers & Land Surveyors and representing the developer, said the homes would be set back to "take advantage of the views" and only one of the dozen homes would be located in the wooded area. Driveways would cut through the wooded area. No federal wetlands would be disturbed.

There are several methods proposed to control drainage of the lots, such as infiltration basins and grass swales. There would be four main drainage areas, with water draining to a stream along the north portion of the property or into wetlands, all branching into Vly Creek, then into the Normans Kill and finally the Hudson River.

# Public, officials diverge on impacts

Voss said the state Department of Environmental Conservation requires all stormwater from a site to be maintained or mitigated on site. Voss also said the state requires such a development to not increase the amount of stormwater runoff.

"We have been working very closely with this applicant on coming up with some creative solutions to make sure that certainly happens," Voss said.

John Kiernan, who lives on New Salem Road north of the proposed subdivision, said the state has been unresponsive to his letters about flooding issues on his property.

"If we get snow and

rain at the same time ... I end up with two-and-a-half to three feet of water in my backyard that comes right up to the deck of my house," Kiernan said. "Personally, I don't care how many houses they build. ... I am just tired of getting flooded out and I don't want more water added to my problem.

David Gibson, also a property owner on New Salem Road, confirmed Kiernan's remarks and added any addition to stormwater would affect wetlands.

Shane Gonyea, also of New Salem Road, asked who would be held responsible if his home flooded due to drainage issues created by the project.

"Literally, on the last hurricane, if the water moves one foot, exactly one foot, my house would be flooded," Gonyea said. "Who is to be responsible if my house does flood?"

Voss said the town's engineers have confirmed the developer's stormwater management plan is effective, but he said the culvert by Gonyea has had a longstanding problem. If the town was found to have caused flooding through approving the plan, then the municipality could be held liable.

"That's why we take a very careful review of the project," Voss said. "We are taking a long time to look at this ... we have been very careful."

Voss said when a devastating storm like Hurricane Irene hits the town, "everyone's systems will fail." Voss restated that the DEC "will not allow the project to create any additional problems" with stormwater runoff.

"The flooding that is occurring down near you folks is caused by multiple different sources. This in the past may have contributed to that because of the runoff from the cornfield ... a barren, plowed cornfield actually creates more runoff than a meadow or grassy surface," Voss said. 'As that cornfield stays in its current form it is literally contributing not only to increased runoffs ... it is also increasing the sedimentation and the nutrient loads to the wetlands, which are adversely affecting those wetlands."

# Most homes would need wells

Five homes, primarily along Route 85A, are approved to obtain water service from the Village of Voorheesville pipeline. The other seven lots along Picard Road would use private wells. All of the houses also would use septic systems.

Bianchine said two test wells were dug and produced "plenty of water," more than 20 gallons per

minute, and the quality was good. Town Building Inspector Jeremy Cramer said the area is known for holding a good quantity and quality of water.

Residents asked why the developer wasn't extending the village's water line to service the remaining homes and Voss said it was cost prohibitive. He added there is no concern about a loss of water to surrounding homes with more private wells in place.

Valerie Glover, of New Salem Road, said she "would be concerned" about her water supply if she were a neighbor of the development.

Bianchine said to extend water to the seven homes would roughly cost \$25,000 to \$30,000 per home and those homeowners would also pay higher rate, since they would be a town resident using the village's water.

"There shouldn't be any issue with water. There is plenty of separation between the wells and the

septic systems," Bianchine said.

# A touchstone for townwide conversation

If the Planning Board were to close the public hearing at its next meeting and approve the preliminary plan, then the final plan would still have to be approved and another public hearing would likely be held, Cramer said.

Documents are available on the town's website, www.townofnewscotland. com, under the Building Department's section. Residents were also encouraged to contact Cramer at Town Hall or by calling 439-9153.

Councilman Daniel Mackay, at the New Scotland Town Board's meeting the following night, said the town hasn't seen such a well-attended Planning Board meeting in years. He said he was encouraged to see

residents talking about watershed issues and is looking at how to create a "larger public discussion" in the town.

Mackay said he would also look into what public education can be done relating to stormwater and watershed issues.

"I just think there is an interesting opportunity to do some programming for the public in the community," Mackay said.

Town Supervisor Thomas Dolin said the town has been looking at how to perform community outreach as part of the Stormwater Coalition of Albany County requirements.

"This is a step in the plan which we have really not done a good job on yet," Dolin said. "Your interest is going to be appreciated, because we do need to step up our game on the educational end of it. We have been doing a lot of the supervision and compliance part of it ... the state sees the educational part of the plan as important."

voters recently turned down a referendum to abolish the office and place its responsibilities with the commissioner of public works.

"I'm very excited about our slate of candidates this year," said Bethlehem Democratic Committee Chairman Jeffrey Kuhn. "We have a really qualified group of individuals who are excited about running for office and about contributing to the continued progress of our town."

Only one person stepped forward to be interviewed by the **Executive Committee** for the positions of supervisor, highway superintendent and town clerk. Those positions also only had one nomination brought forward, and were endorsed by nearly the whole committee.

Clarkson was tapped for members. reelection, a decision followed by a round of applause, as was sitting do things differently," Town Clerk Nanci Clarkson said. Moquin.

"To me, being a Democrat is really about good government," said Clarkson. "I know that can mean different things to different people, even among us Democrats, but I'm of the opinion that as long as we address those differences openly and honestly, and discuss them with one another, I think our party is in the right place."

The supervisor spoke of his commitment to consolidation and finding savings within the town, even if those choices seem controversial. He mentioned last year's decision to end the funding of Colonial Acres Golf Course and its existence under a private operator. He also spoke of the recent highway referendum vote, an issue

The party chose committee member Frank Zeoli as its candidate for highway superintendent. Zeoli said he felt confident in his ability to do the job after spending 15 years with the Department of General Services for the City of Albany, which he described as similar to the town's Highway Department, but much larger. He is now the city's director of recycling.

Two people were nominated for the position of town justice. Matthew Kelly of Roemer, Wallens, Gold and Mineaux was nominated, along with Andrew Kirby of Conway and Kirby. The endorsement was given to Kirby, who has served as a Bethlehem prosecutor since 2004.

In February, the Town Board appointed Michael Katzer to the position after the sudden death of former Justice Mark Jordan. The Town Board had previously asked that those applying to fill the position not seek the office in the fall.

For the two seats on the Town Board, four people were interviewed. Councilman Kyle Kotary said in March he planned to step down at the end of his term after eight years on the board. The committee's endorsements eventually went to current board member Bill Reinhart, who was not present at the meeting because of a family matter, and Julie Sasso of McSharry and Associates Realty.

"My decision to run came from the fact I'm a parent, a business owner and property owner in the town," Sasso said in a later interview. "I have a vested interest to help town grow and thrive, and I think I have talents that can

add to the current board configuration."

Sasso said she feels residents might be looking for a voice on the board that is a bit younger, and that people might be happy to see another woman serve. Her broad goals are to work to maintain the town's services at a reasonable cost and she would like to see more sustainable development occur throughout town.

"I'd like to hear what residents have to say before I get more specific," she said.

Democrat Dan Cunningham and committee member George Harder also interviewed for the Town Board endorsements.

At the meeting, Kuhn asked each person nominated if they would seek or accept the Republican line. Each person said they would not.

"I asked those questions because I'm committed to the twoparty system and I cannot agree with the prospect of one candidate for any elected office having every line on the ballot and thereby robbing the people of this town the right to choose their elected officials," Kuhn later said.

When Kotary ran for town supervisor in 2011, he secured both the Democratic and Republican endorsements, which rankled some members in both parties. Clarkson cited it as his primary reason for waging a primary challenge on the Democratic line.

"I wanted people on the record unambiguously," said Kuhn. "I have no objection to a primary for anyone, but I don't want someone to get all the lines or trying to run on both of the two major party lines. To me, that is not a democratic election."

# Pine Bush in bloom

## Lupine Fest celebrates the emergence of spring and preserve's rare species

olks at the Albany Pine Bush are gearing up to celebrate what's considered by many to be their main event of the year:

the blossoming of the preserve's most precious plant,

the Wild Blue Lupine.

Wendy Craney, the Pine Bush's communications outreach director, said May is an exciting and important time of year in the Albany Pine Bush.

"It's spring, the Lupine are in bloom and the Karner Blues are emerging," said Craney.

It's such a momentous occasion that the preserve has based a special event around it. Craney said the main goal of the Lupine Fest, now in its seventh year, is to raise awareness about the Pine Bush and the important role that the Wild Blue Lupine plays. As the only food source of the federally

endangered Karner Blue butterfly, without the Wild Blue Lupine, said Craney, there is no butterfly.

Both species are a tiny but important piece of a great big web.

"You don't know in the bianchid@spotlightnews.com grand scheme of things how things are all interconnected," she said. "The Lupine is the only

food source for the caterpillar of the Karner Blue. So if Lupine goes away, the Karner Blue goes away. If the Karner Blue goes away, maybe there is something else connected to the Karner Blue that might go away.'

However, keeping the Karner Blue around is no easy task. The Wild Blue Lupine plant needs an open, sunny and sandy habitat to grow, and that kind of habitat is on the decline due to development and invasion from different species of plants taking over the area.

That was in large part the reason the state Legislature created the Albany Pine Bush Preserve Commission in 1988 with the goal of protecting and managing the unique and endangered natural communities and species of the Albany Pine Bush.

"One of the ways we manage the habitat in the preserve is through prescribed fire," Craney said. "Fire used to be part of the natural fire in this ecosystem and now obviously wildfires cannot occur naturally here anymore, so we have to mimic that

with a prescribed fire." Craney said management of the preserve is an ongoing task and will never be complete.

In the 25 years since the commission was formed, 32,000 acres of pine bush has been protected.

"That's a huge accomplishment in itself," Craney said. "More recently, we have opened the Discovery Center. Before that, there was no place for people to go and get oriented about the Pine Bush or learn about it. Now there is a central location for people to come for educational programs, to get trail maps and for school groups to come."

On Saturday, May 18, the Albany Pine Bush Preserve will pay homage to the annual blooming of the purple flower and celebrate history and the anniversary of the formation of the Pine Bush Commission.

"The Lupine is up. Usually by our Lupine Fest, it is in full bloom," Craney said. "Usually the butterflies start flying anywhere between mid-May to the end of May. We usually post it on our Facebook when we first see them come out."

The flowers typically bloom into the middle of June, however the butterflies only live about two weeks.

Blues to the Pine Bush.

"You start to hear different birds who are coming back to stay here for the summertime. Prairie Warblers are back and the Towhees are back. That's another kind of exciting thing for us," Craney said. "We have a resident mockingbird who lives outside the Discovery Center and we always know it's spring when he comes back and starts singing on top of the flagpole."

Craney said the deer and coyote also tend to get more active during the

> The theme of this year's Lupine Fest is "Living History."

> > "We are focusing on celebrating all different kinds of history in the preserve. Not just the commission turning 25, but ancient history all the way back to the glacial age and cultural history," Craney said.

The day will feature something for all ages, including music by the Whippersnappers, a guided Storywalk, Shaker broom making, a Legends and Lore Walk and storytelling by nationallyacclaimed author Joe Bruchac and a

multimedia talk on "The Ancient Sport of Falconry" by Beth Bidwell from Wild Things Environmental Education featuring live birds of prey.

Cranev is particularly excited about the interactive historical hike.

"One of our guides takes people on a hike in the preserve to not only show how the Pine Bush was used as a corridor between Albany and Schenectady for travelers, but there will be stops along the way to meet those characters and talk to people who are in character from different time periods," she said.

The festival will be held from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, May 18, at the Albany Pine Bush Discovery Center, 195 New Karner Road, Albany. Additional parking is available in the Kmart parking lot at 1860 Central Avenue with a free shuttle to the center. Visit AlbanyPineBush.org for more information.





# Twilight League begins Wednesday

**Defending national champion** Albany Athletics kick off region's 83rd amateur baseball season

The Albany Twilight League begins its 83rd season Wednesday when defending Stan Musial League national champion Albany Athletics plays Waterford Nolan Propane at Bleecker Stadium.

The Athletics — managed by Guilderland High School graduate Joe Altieri — became the first Twilight League team to win four consecutive regular season titles when they defeated Nolan Propane in the championship series. Then, they advanced through regionals and got to the American Amateur Baseball Congress World Series, where they claimed the national title on a walkoff home run.

The Twilight League consists of eight teams: the Athletics, Nolan Propane, the Blue Slate Bluehawks, the Capital City Diamond Kings, the Troy Haymakers, Lids Team Sports, the Albany Senators and the Albany Thunder. Four teams have more than a decade of experience, with the Haymakers being the longest tenured team with 23 seasons.

The Athletics return 12 players from last year's team, including two-time Twlight League MVP Jason Martin and 2012 Pitcher of the Year JJ Pearsall. Bethlehem Central High School graduate Mike Fish is one of 10 rookies on the roster.

Bethlehem graduates Michael and Robby Bellizzi head up the Albany Senators. Michael enters his first season as the head coach after being a player and an assistant coach for the past seven seasons, while younger brother Robby will act as an assistant coach. Alex Bellizzi is on the preliminary roster as a pitcher.

The Twilight League will play a 107-game schedule between May 15 and July 19. Most of the games take place at Bleecker Stadium, with Clifton Common and Waterford's Kelts Stadium serving as secondary sites.

Albany is also hosting this year's AABC Upper New York State Tournament July 26-28 and the North Atlantic Regional.
