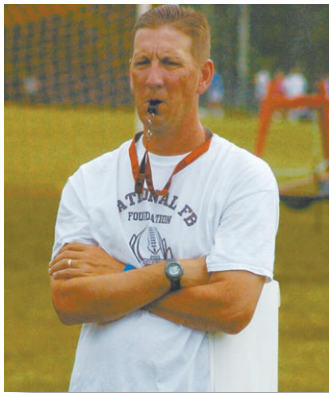

H'way job duties detailed

Bethlehem board tackles
worker vacation policy

A list of expected duties has now been
established for the Town of Bethlehem's
incoming highway superintendent.
A resolution was passed on Wednesday,
Aug. 28, by the Town Board after a lengthy
discussion over how specific the job
description should be. The duties and
assigned tasks were established through

the help of Interim Highway Superintendent
Erik Deyor, department staff and Town
Supervisor John Clarkson.
"Much like the shared services contract
we have with the Town of New Scotland,
these are things the highway superintendent
has been doing for years on a handshake
and understanding ... but it's far better to
do it officially through a resolution," said
Clarkson.
The supervisor said it is recommended
by the New York State Association of Towns
that such a resolution be in place. The list
was meant to remain flexible, so an incoming

highway superintendent would still be able
to run the department as he or she saw fit,
while still being held to certain expectations.
However, some board members felt portions
of the list were too specific.
"I appreciate what we are doing, and I
know there's a reason for it, but I also know
when you begin to make a list, you are bound
to leave something off and there is some
danger in that," said Councilwoman Joann
Dawson. She was also concerned that once
the list was passed through a resolution,
the town would be held responsible to

"We thought

said he has lived in Bethlehem for
years and always noticed members
of the peace group sharing their
message each Monday. Eames said
he likes to come up with new and
cutting edge ways to spread the
gospel, so he thought of making
some signs in a take-off of the
peace movement.
He introduced the idea during a
sermon he gave in July, and several

Bethlehem officials are
reopening the town Compost
Facility for several Saturdays
this fall after receiving inquiries
from residents.
Interim Highway

said he recommends opening
the facility for six Saturdays in
September

change is
expected
to cost the
town about \$600 per day for an

Steps taken with purpose

Delmar woman training for marathon walk benefiting Boston cancer institute

Terry Moskowitz is walking 10 miles every other day, and pulling 20 on the weekends, but her pace has more behind it than desire for a solid workout.

Moskowitz, a 64-year-old Delmar resident, is training for her ninth Boston Marathon Jimmy Fund Walk.

of information about it," Moskowitz said from the side of County Road 306 in Slingerlands.

Before she did her first Jimmy Fund Walk, she had just finished a 60-mile trek. The family member asked her why not do this new walk, and then she took on the cause. As Moskowitz become involved in the marathon, she said suddenly her friends starting being diagnosed with cancer.

Many of her friends were going to the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute in Boston to receive treatment.

"This was my way of paying back," she said. "I had tons and tons of friends that started going there and this was my way of helping as I can."

The Boston Marathon Jimmy Fund Walk benefits the cancer institute and helps fund adult and pediatric care and research to improve the chances of survival. This will be the 25th annual marathon and it's tentatively scheduled for Sunday, Sept. 8. Since the marathon began, it has raised a total of almost \$87 million. The course follows the same route as the 26.2-mile Boston Marathon.

On March 15, Moskowitz had a "tough surgery" and her doctor basically told her to take it easy. She didn't exactly stick to doctor's orders, though.

"(My doctor) is a sports person and he knows that I am crazy, but he didn't think that I was going to do

this," she said. "People ask me why I'm doing it, but it is because I can."

She recently started sending messages to her friends asking for help raising funds for the race. She's nearly reached her fundraising goal of \$1,500. Moskowitz said two friends' names would be on her back during the walk, one who has fourth-stage ovarian cancer and another who is fighting breast cancer.

The walk has new meaning this year after the Boston Marathon bombing. Organizers are letting anyone who did not finish the race in April to enter the Jimmy Fund Walk for free.

"Usually there are

around 10,000 people ... but two weeks into the open admissions they have allowed around 5,000 (of Boston Marathon participations) to be admitted," Moskowitz said.

Moskowitz gets to walk with different people each year. One year, she walked with a woman who had survived three bouts of cancer whose husband had left her because he couldn't take it anymore, Moskowitz said.

"The last two or three miles her son walked with us," she said. "She was just so excited about doing it and I was so excited for her."

There was another year when she walked with a woman whose husband

survived cancer, but he wasn't able to attend the marathon due to his health.

"She was there with her friends and I walked with her. She just cried almost the entire time," Moskowitz said.

Training for the marathon and other like it does help her feel "alive," but is also happy to give a part of herself to help someone else.

"Maybe they will be able to eradicate cancer someday," she said. "I am one of the lucky ones."

Walk aims to keep hope alive

Local Pancreatic Cancer Research Walk hits 10-year anniversary

Over the course of a 20-year period, Neil Piper lost his mother, sister, uncle and brother to pancreatic cancer. Genetically at a high risk himself, the Bethlehem resident is monitoring his pancreas through a study at the Johns Hopkins University.

But to find a cure for the deadly cancer takes time, hard work and a lot of research.

Neil Piper and his wife, Shari Piper, are hoping to speed that process up by holding the 10th Annual Albany Capital District Pancreatic Cancer Research Walk

on Sunday, Sept. 8, at the Elm Avenue Town Park in Bethlehem to help spread awareness, remembrance and raise money for the Lustgarten Foundation. One hundred percent of the money raised goes to the foundation, which seeks to find treatment and early detection methods for pancreatic cancer.

“It’s a very, very warm and inviting walk. Fitness level is not an issue at all,” Shari Piper said.

The 1.2-mile walk around the park is handicap accessible as well as stroller and pet friendly. Participants can walk individually or as a team, each collecting funds through sponsors. Last year, more than 400 walkers hit the pavement and raised nearly \$100,000 for the foundation.

Yet if someone is not able to snag any sponsors, Shari Piper said they are still welcome to walk.

“We never turn anybody away, no matter what they can or cannot give,” she said.

This year, the organizers are hoping to collect \$125,000 for the foundation, which provides more than \$67 million in support of finding a cure. The Lustgarten Foundation was founded in 1998 after Cablevision executive Marc Lustgarten died from pancreatic cancer. Now, Cablevision has partnered with the foundation and ensures all the donations go directly to research.

Over the years, the foundation has worked on gene detection in order to target a drug for treatment of pancreas

cancer cells.

“Things are looking a lot better than when we started our walk 10 years ago,” Shari Piper said.

The walk first began with just 15 of the Pipers’ family and friends, and they raised about \$4,000. Though some just walk for support, many walk because they lost someone from the disease. Yet over the years, the organizers have made it a point to make sure the event is uplifting.

“As much as people are walking in memory of those lost, we want it to be the celebration of their lives and research and early cure and detection,” Shari Piper said.

This year, the walk will also feature entertainment and goodies. The family-friendly event will include

a pick-a-prize auction, a 50/50 raffle, face painting, live music by Code Blue and entertainment from the 501st Garrison Storm Troopers and the Schenectady Puppet People. There will also be complimentary coffee, tea, apple cider and donuts courtesy of Price Chopper and Dunkin’ Donuts.

Pancreatic cancer is the fourth most deadly cancer in the U.S., partly because it often doesn’t show itself until it’s too late, Neil Piper said. There are no effective screening tools or treatments, and the average survival time from diagnoses is about six to nine months.

Since 15 percent of pancreatic cancers are familial cancers, Neil Piper is keeping a close eye on his pancreas

through the Johns Hopkins study. Just a few years ago, he underwent surgery to remove a suspicious growth on his pancreas as part of the early detection study.

“That probably saved my life because the doctor said it was probably precancerous,” Neil Piper said.

The 66-year-old made a full recovery and will be walking next week.

The Pipers said they are very proud of the walk and the success it has made and will make.

“We’ll never get as many people as (the) breast cancer walks, because we don’t have survivors,” Shari Piper said. “But we’re hoping 10 years down the road, we can walk with survivors.”

Alleged bank robber caught in South Carolina

Police in South Carolina have apprehended the man who allegedly robbed a Slingerlands Trustco Bank. Victor A. Shear was captured by the North Myrtle Beach Police Department on Wednesday, Aug. 28. The Bethlehem Police Department announced the arrest “was the result of continuous efforts of the Bethlehem Police Department and New York State Police.”

Detective Sgt. Adam Hornick of the Bethlehem Police Department said based on a lead, police were able to come up with a possible address for Shear. Police in South Carolina

were contacted and apprehended him without incident. “We also learned he was contemplating surrendering himself,” Hornick said. “Sometime

in that close time period he took some efforts himself to be located, because I think he was feeling the pressure of us contacting all his friends and relatives.” Hornick said police will have be able to release more details on the investigation once Shear is transported back to New York. They’re also looking into who may have aided Shear, as well as his potential involvement in a bank robbery in Sharon Springs earlier this year. Police say Shear entered the Trustco on Wednesday, Aug. 21, displayed a handgun and demanded cash. On Tuesday, Aug. 27, Bethlehem police arrested Anthony S. Zumbolo, 40, of Amsterdam, and charged him with hindering prosecution in the second degree, a felony. Police said he provided information to Shear that he was being sought by police, and that allowed Shear to elude authorities. Hornick credited the arrest to thorough police work. He noted police were

able to identify Shear as a suspect within 24 hours of the robbery. “I think he was tired of running,” Hornick said. “We left no stone unturned.”

Other arrests

- Guilderland police arrested Andi E. Wilson, 21, of 897 Herkimer St. in Brooklyn, at around 3:10 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 10, and charged her with two counts of possession of a forged instrument in the second degree, a felony. Police said earlier that day Wilson entered the Verizon Wireless store in Crossgates Mall while possessing a forged Pennsylvania driver’s license with the name Elsie Jensen and a forged Capital One MasterCard with the same name. Wilson allegedly intended to purchase items at the store with the fraudulent card, police said. She was processed and arraigned on Aug. 10.

arrested Alison W. Brown, 34, of 65 S. Guilderland YMCA has a new executive director

Ryan Venter eyes increasing community outreach, fostering new programs

Ryan Venter believes most people don't really know everything the Guilderland YMCA has to offer, but as its new executive director he wants to tell them.

"I see it as a great opportunity and a great place to make a difference in the community," Venter said of his new position. "I have met a lot of great people. We have a lot of dedicated staff and volunteers within the community that really contribute to the positive atmosphere that we have at the Guilderland Y."

Venter started settling in to his new job in mid August. He said one of his chief goals is to disrupt the view that the YMCA is simply a workout facility.

"We are more than a fitness center and a pool," Venter said. "We do a lot of programming with

seniors. We do a lot of things in the community. We have programs for youth and other kinds of training opportunities for the community to take advantage of."

He said people have met lifelong friends through the YMCA, whether through

one of the book clubs or fitness classes.

The Guilderland YMCA also operates the organization's Adventure Camp, formerly known as Camp Nassau, which is located off Route 155. The location is host to unique recreational activities, such as a rock wall for climbing.

"That's a popular programming option for youth in the area," Venter said.

The Guilderland Y offers various group fitness and healthy living programs, but some are targeted to certain individual needs like the Circle of Camps that is a program for families that have a child with a life threatening illness.

"We might take them on different programs or day

trips," he said.

Venter graduated from Bethlehem Central High School in 1999 and then Boston College in 2003. He returned to the Capital District and served as the director of athletics and recreation at the Albany College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences since 2005 until recently joining the Capital District YMCA.

As a nonprofit organization, Venter said the Y gives back to the community by offering different scholarships to take advantage of programming offered. Having a bigger impact in the community is also what drew him towards the YMCA.

"I was looking to make more of an impact in the community," he said. "I

certainly enjoyed my position at the college and liked what I did, but the Y wants to be seen as one of the roots of the community."

Venter said he believes the organization has made progressing becoming "a hub of the community" and continuing that effort was appealing to him.

"We would like to be more proactive in getting the word out," he said. "Our members know a lot of what we do ... but we need to get outside of the building and outside of the facility into the community more."

The three pillars of the YMCA's foundation are youth development, social responsibility and healthy living, he said, so everything it does ties into

those core values.

He said facility is offering new a different programming for seniors, which has been one of its growing member segments. Childhood obesity is also another target area for the organization. Making sure to tie its appeal to the whole family is also important.

"It is a family friendly atmosphere for sure," he said. "Being family friendly is certainly one of our drawing points that we hold dear."

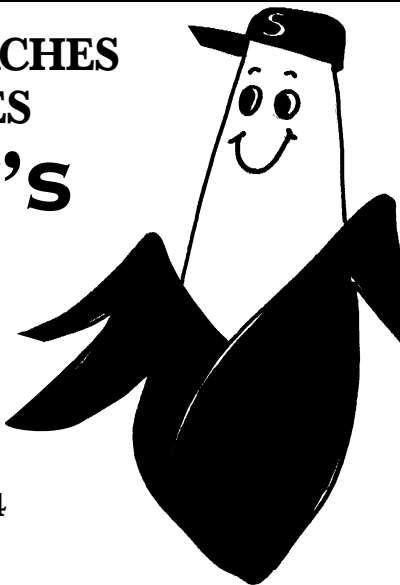

From the Editor's Desk

Keep a summer active attitude this fall

Good news! There's a better chance these days that when parents wave goodbye to the yellow bus on the first day of school, their kids will be ending up at a place that's structuring their day in a healthy manner.

That's the finding of a recent Centers for Disease Control and Prevention study. Over the past few years, schools have uprooted vending machines, overhauled menus, reexamined physical education and have cracked down on tobacco use.

Seeing as kids spend about a third of their time (and even more as a percentage of their waking hours) at school, this is welcome news, indeed. But what about the rest of the time?

You'll read this week about the Albany Pine Bush's after school program, Afterschool Adventurer, in which kids can come right after classes to take an educational tour of the preserve's unique environments. It's a great idea because it exercises both the mind and the body. It runs into December.

Environmental Educator Jacqueline

Citriniti notes it's a great way to get kids moving after they've been at a desk all day long. It's also designed to ideally get the whole family out of doors for the afternoon, which is a great idea, as well.

It's pretty easy to be active during the summer months. When the weather is good, there's practically no reason not to be up, out and doing, whether it's taking a hike, taking a bike ride, going for a swim or just taking a walk.

But as school shudders back into session and the days shorten bit by bit, it only hearkens the imminent arrival of colder weather and the busy holiday season. Keeping active and eating right can be a tall order under such circumstances.

Still, the CDC recommends children and adolescents get a full hour of physical activity every day. We urge parents to take a page from the playbook schools are using and make a healthy lifestyle part of their kid's home life, not just when he or she is at school. Recently, a study out of the Harvard School of Public Health concluded that kids don't naturally make up for time spent active at school by

being inactive at home, so don't assume because Jimmy had a raucous game of kickball earlier in the day he won't be up for activities with the family.

All this is good news and good information for kids. It's important that youngsters don't fall into bad habits early in life, because overweight and obese children are at a markedly higher risk of being similarly out of shape later in life. That, of course, leads to all manner of health problems that can cut life short altogether.

It is important to recognize a problem if you have one, too. A recent national survey found 15 percent of parents consider their child to be overweight, yet statistics indicate 32 percent of children are overweight or obese. The fact nearly 70 percent of adults are overweight or obese might have something to do with that perceptual disconnect.

So as you prepare to send the youngsters off to school this fall, along with notebooks and binders, also take stock of physical and mental health. It can make all the difference in your child's life.

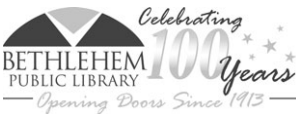

Fuller Road speed limit reduced to 30 mph

Guilderland approves change after residents air safety concerns

Residents living along Fuller Road, which stretches through the hamlet of McKownville, persuaded Guilderland officials to reduce the thoroughfare's speed by

10 mph in hopes of making the road safer. The Guilderland Town Board on Tuesday, Aug. 20, unanimously approved reducing the speed limit on Fuller Road to 30 mph from where the southern end begins off of Route 20 to the town line, which is approximately half-a-mile beyond Warren Street. The change effectively makes all of Fuller Road 30 mph, according to Town

Supervisor Ken Runion. "The residents would like to see it happen, but there is also a lot of activity in that area. We have a lot of walkers, a lot of bike riders and a lot of people that are doing destination shopping, so it is important to control the traffic," Runion said. "You don't want to have high speeds on a road that has a lot of pedestrian traffic on it. I think it is going to

make Fuller Road more pedestrian friendly." Judy Kavaney, of Warren Street, said the community is a "Rockwellian neighborhood" and still holds block parties. Fuller Road, though, is still a problem for the neighborhood, she said. "I have seen multiple pets sacrificed on the road," Kavaney said. "I know personally, because I am a bike rider and a walker, that it is very difficult to get across that road."

Kavaney said motorists use the turning lane down the middle of the street as a passing lane. Other residents claimed to have seen "near misses" as a result of this behavior. "I think it is perfectly reasonable to reduce that speed to 30 mph," she said. "It is only a matter of time until some person ... goes down on that road."

Don Reeb, president of the McKownville Improvement Association, had asked the Town Board at its previous meeting to consider reducing the speed limit. Reeb said about a dozen emails were sent to the town in support. "If you have ever been in that situation where a car is coming towards you and you are sitting there waiting to turn, it's scary as hell," Reeb said. Martin Gnacic, an Elmwood Street resident, said he wasn't aware of any near misses but knows Fuller Road "is a speedway." He uses the Fuller daily to turn onto his street. "Reducing the speed limit to 30 mph would be a blessing," Gnacic said. "It always has been a sore spot on Fuller Road. It is a good idea now; it was a good idea a long time ago."

Runion said the town has been "very proactive" in reducing the speed on several major roads. The board recently approved reducing the speed limit within Guilderland Center to 35 mph, and directed special enforcement details in that area and other locations aimed at slowing people down, Runion said. "We will have increased enforcement (around Fuller Road) and I think once you do that it alerts people to the change," Runion said. "Once they are aware of the changes I think they will slow down and follow the speed limit." Charles Klaer, who lives near Guilderland Center, said the reduced speed limit seems to be working in that area. Klaer recommended the town temporarily place a radar displaying motorist's speed on Fuller Road.

Teaming up to help

Delmar native travels the country in disaster relief program

In the wake of a natural disaster, the focus is rarely on those working behind the scenes getting basic necessities to the most vulnerable.

Zhibek Tosi, a Delmar native who graduated from SUNY Plattsburgh in 2011, said that's how she felt until she became one of those workers.

"It made me thankful for what I had, because (Tropical Storm Irene) hit so close to home," she said.

After graduating with a degree in global supply management, Tosi opted to join a new program within the AmeriCorps National Civilian Community Corps. The Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency and the Corporation for National and Community

Service have partnered to form the FEMA Corps, a residential service program for those 18 to 24 years old who act as part of first response teams during natural disasters.

Tosi said she was attracted to the program because of her educational background. Global supply management involves tracking inventory and the logistics of shipping goods throughout the country or world.

"Our team works to get supplies from warehouses to natural disaster areas," said Tosi. "We get the office up and running as fast as possible, and get supplies to those who need them."

F E M A C o r p s participants commit to working with the organization for 10 months, with the option to sign up for a second session. Members work in teams of eight to 10 people, and are given a \$4,000 stipend, housing, meals and medical care. According to AmeriCorps, the program is expected to

save taxpayers about \$60 million a year.

Lizz Gatzunis, a media representative for FEMA Corps, said the program has eight different branches, each providing support to disaster areas. After applying for the program and being accepted, participants are surveyed to see which track they should be trained in. Once surveyed, those in the program are trained for up to five months before

being deployed.

Tosi said her team spent four months being trained in general field operations at an AmeriCorps facility in Denver, before spending time in New Mexico being trained in logistics. They were then sent to New Jersey to downsize a field office that was helping with Hurricane Sandy cleanup.

"It's been a really great way to see the country," she said.

separate.

“We thought we’d ask people to stop protesting God,” said Wray. “Just as the peace group is asking soldiers to put down their physical arms down, we thought we’d ask people to put down their arms and surrender to God.”

Eames said the first week, participation was small, but now by the seventh week up to 30 church members may show up to hold signs.

The group said the signs are not meant to be overly distracting, just something to catch people’s eyes. If traffic looks backed-up, or if it looks like they are causing a nuisance, Eames said members will move out of the way or may even help direct traffic. “They’re almost like large bumper stickers,” he said of the signs.

Wray said the group isn’t looking to attract people to their church, or necessarily convert people. The hope is people will think about their internal

peace, so they can achieve external peace.

“I always ask people, if everyone acted like Jesus Christ, would we have wars and crime? They all say no. And that’s what Jesus came to do, was to change us from the inside out,” said Wray.

When people stop to talk to them about the group, members engage them in a conversation about Jesus. They also hand out a booklet called “Steps to Peace with God.” Eames said the aim is not to annoy people, so they typically only strike up a conversation with someone if they are approached.

“We just want people to know there is an answer if they feel emptiness inside,” said Wray. “There can be real meaning and purpose in life and that’s through knowing their creator, which is Jesus.”

If people want to know more, Wray said the group recommends the Bible, particularly the four gospels Matthew, Mark Luke and John. Those interested can also visit Bethlehem Community Church at 201 Elm Ave. in Delmar, or bethlehemcommunitychurch.com.

fund everything included because only a certain portion of the Highway Department’s work is paid for through the highway fund.

Deyoe said everything included on the list were duties already being performed by the Highway Department and the list was meant to formalize those expectations. Any changes needed in the future could also be

made through another resolution.

Some board members thought it was unfair to include specific items, such as “assisting the Bethlehem Garden Club in planting and assist with the maintenance of their projects along state, county and town rights of way in the town.” Although the town would like to see this practice continue, Town Board members felt there could come a time when the funding and resources would be needed elsewhere.

Councilman Jeffrey

Kuhn asked how binding the list would be. He questioned if one entity could possibly sue the other if either the new highway superintendent wasn’t living up to their duties, or the town wasn’t providing enough funds in order for the listed tasks to be completed.

Attorney Jim Potter said that was a possibility, and it was ultimately advised the broadening of some of the resolution’s language.

The new superintendent of highways will be asked to “maintain existing service levels to the extent practicable,” and work with non-specific civic groups on projects

beneficial to the town “at the discretion of the highway superintendent,” among other changes.

Board tackles vacation policy

The Town Board also established a new leave policy for Highway Department and park maintenance employees at the Wednesday meeting.


Those working in the Highway Department will now have a vacation policy that more closely matches that of other town employees. Workers will no longer have their two-weeks of vacation established

for them, but can seek approval for specific time off based on seniority. The policy also states minimum staffing levels will be relaxed for one month during the summer and summer holidays “to provide employees greater opportunity to take vacation during these periods.”

Deyoe said it was only fair highway employees be given similar opportunities as the town’s other employees. Highway Department and parks maintenance employees will still be expected to be available during inclement weather and emergency situations.

The policy also

specifies when a highway worker can use sick time, compensatory time and personal time. Employees will no longer be allowed to use sick time for routine doctor visits, but may use up to four sick days a year to care for a sick child, spouse or parent.

instituted for shoveling material.

The projected savings from the changes was \$50,000.

Deyoe said total sales during this season totaled more than \$68,000. Accounting for labor and equipment, actual revenue was about \$5,000 less than projected.

After reviewing the changes, Deyoe said many

residents and staff found the new price structure too complicated; residents want more access to the facility; the \$2 fee was unpopular; and contractors want a place to dispose of waste. The department eventually placed a large receptacle outside so waste could be dropped off early without having it sit curbside until it was picked up by town staff.

Deyoe said department staff is looking into an automated kiosk for the future, which would allow residents limited access to the facility without needing to pay an employee. They are also hoping to get restrictions on the property

removed so the town can eventually compost food waste and create additional landscaping products.

For next year, it was recommended the town no longer charge residents the \$2 shoveling fee, simplify the price structure and eliminate the sale of wood chips due to the intrusion of the Emerald Ash Borer.

The facility would continue to operate three days each week through June.

Town Board members said they were in favor of these changes. Residents will soon be notified of the dates the compost facility will open this fall.

Gatzunis said team members become like family during the 10 or 20 months they spend together. They travel the country in a 15-passenger van and live together in either hotels or makeshift bases set up by FEMA.

“We’re with each other 24/7,” said Gatzunis. “It’s a whole different aspect for us, but it’s so much easier when we are out in the field working with this team because we know each other’s quirks.”

are stationed. Tosi said her team recently helped the people of Seaside Heights in New Jersey re-plant gardens, demolish homes and remove debris. She said the experience was humbling.

“I got to see these things first hand and it made me thankful for the

opportunity,” she said. Tosi’s team is now in Atlanta preparing for the hurricane season. They will take inventory of supplies and get them to distribution points along the coast. The team will then track trucks that come to delivery the supplies.

Tosi said besides making close friends, her work with the FEMA Corps has also provided her valuable real-world experience outside of college.

the backfield,” said Clas. “I also like running the ball more than catching the ball.”

Graves won’t be the sole contributor on offense, though. The Eagles are planning to throw the ball more this year, now that senior quarterback Dan Robeson is fully healed from a torn ACL he suffered midway through last season.

“Danny has had a great (preseason) camp,” said Leach. “Last year, he was really more of a one-dimensional kid, as he ran the ball a lot. But this year, he can run and throw the ball equally well.”

Robeson has several options to throw to, including senior receivers Austin Herrmann and Brendan Stempsey.

“We have a really solid set of receivers,” said Leach. “We have five or six kids who can catch the ball. We’ve never been that deep at that position.”

“Obviously the workload is going to be

less, which is going to be good for me because it will keep me fresh out there,” said Graves. “And, I can help out when I’m not carrying the ball.”

Defensively, Bethlehem has its top pass rusher back in Clas.

“That’s probably my favorite thing to do in football, especially in front of a big crowd,” said Clas. “There’s nothing better than the feeling I get when I sack the quarterback.”

The rest of the starting defense consists of first-time starters such as Herrmann and linebackers Vincenzo Ferrara, Ben Zonca and Brad Bettinger. But, Leach likes the effort they’re putting in.

“We went to the Union (College) camp, and we got to play Niskayuna early on. And, it was great to see how aggressive they were,” said Leach.

Bethlehem will need to show that aggressiveness out of the gate. The Eagles have a difficult three-game stretch to begin the season, as they visit Christian Brothers Academy and Schenectady before hosting Guilderland in

Week 3. All three opponents feature explosive offenses.

The rest of Bethlehem’s seven-game regular season schedule won’t be easy, especially with road games against Saratoga and Shenendehowa. But with several returning players on the offensive side of the ball and an aggressive defense, the Eagles are hoping to contend for the division title.

“I think the Empire Division is very balanced, and we have the talent to play with anyone,” said Leach. “I don’t think we’re heads and shoulders above anyone else.”

“The past two years, we’ve been rebuilding,” said Graves. “So, we feel the rebuilding is done, and we’ll show what we’re capable of.”

Bethlehem’s season begins Friday at CBA.

Following last Friday’s opener against Saratoga, Bethlehem travels to Guilderland Wednesday. The Lady Eagles’ next home match is Monday, Sept. 16, against Albany Academy for Girls.

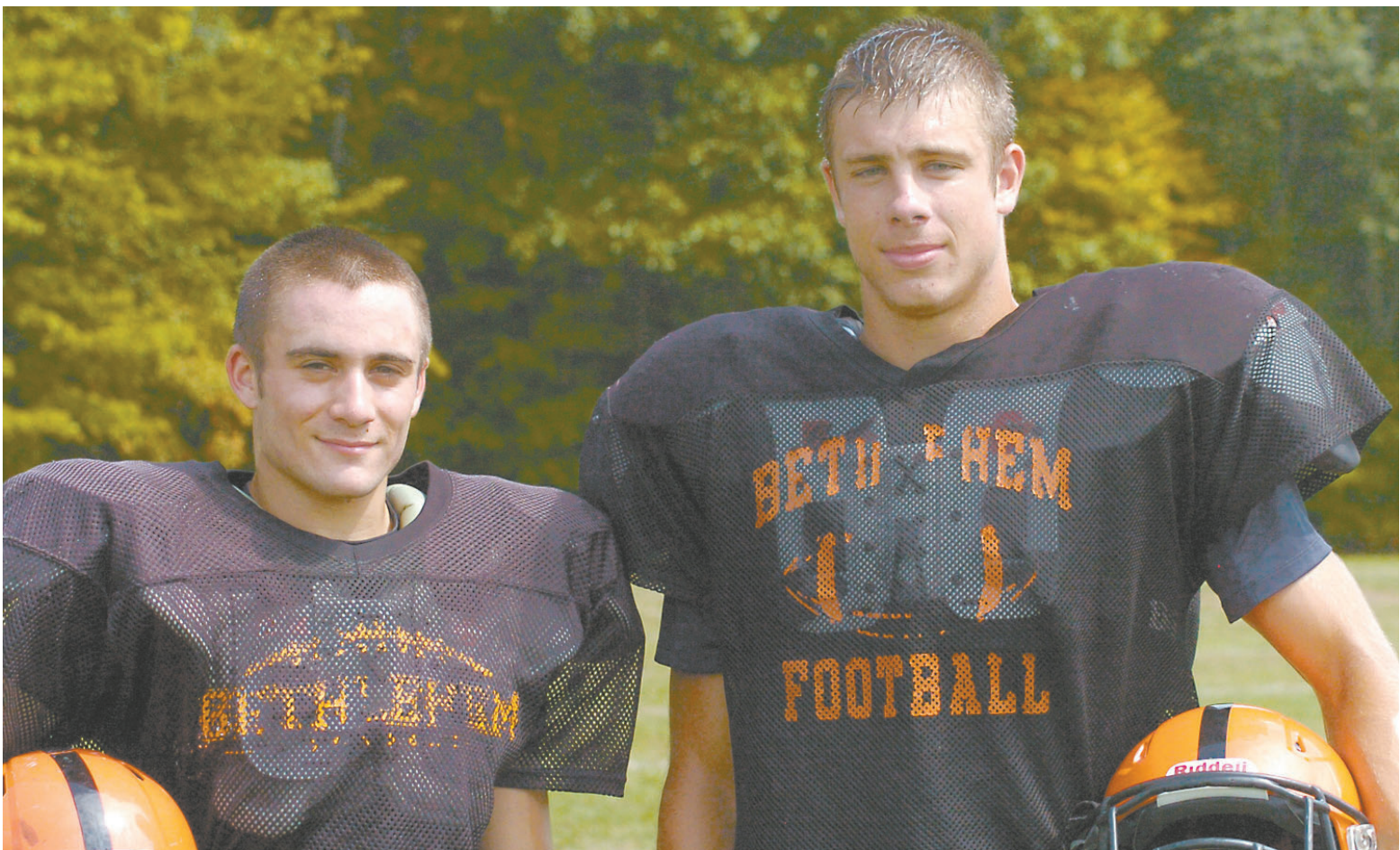

Eagles seek playoff berth

Better offensive balance at Bethlehem gives football team hope

The Bethlehem football team wants to leave nothing to chance this season.

After barely missing the 2012 Section II Class AA playoffs, the Eagles want to finish in the top four of the Empire Division to secure a postseason berth this time.

"It can only help us because it shows what we need to do differently this year if we're going to make the playoffs," said senior tailback/cornerback Mike Graves. "We also know the feeling of getting close to the playoffs, but not quite getting there."

"I definitely think this is the year for Bethlehem," added senior fullback/defensive end Jason Clas. "We've got four guys who've been on varsity for three years."

A poor showing in the Empire

Division was Bethlehem's undoing last year. The Eagles finished with a 2-4 divisional record, but they lost a playoff berth in a three-way tiebreaker with Ballston Spa. Bethlehem responded by winning its final three games of the season to earn a 5-4 overall record.

The Eagles have several players back from that squad this season including Graves, who rushed for 1,157 yards and 11 touchdowns in 2012.

"This is the best off-season he's had in terms of what he's

done in the weight room," Bethlehem head coach Rick Leach said of Graves. "I think he's ready to go. He's obviously one of the best running backs in the area."

Clas switches from tight end to fullback this season, and the senior said he looks forward to providing some blocks to spring Graves.

"I like it a lot more in the backfield. I'll get a full head of steam moving up to block from

A new era in Bethlehem tennis begins

George becomes third girls varsity coach in school history

A new era in Bethlehem girls tennis began last Friday when the Lady Eagles met Saratoga Springs.

Long-time coach Grace Franze retired after last season, so junior varsity coach Scott George was promoted to the varsity post.

"They told me I'm like only the third coach they've ever had at Bethlehem," said George, who is entering his fourth year with the Bethlehem tennis program. "That's pretty amazing, considering how long they've had tennis at this school."

George isn't the only new face on the varsity team. He brought several of his JV players from last season up with him to help fill the gaps left by the graduation of 17

seniors from the 2012 Suburban Council championship squad.

"We're kind of embracing the role of the underrated team this year," said George. "Rather than being the hunted, we're the dangerous underdog who may surprise some people."

George has three seniors with varsity experience among his singles players – Aria Shi, Carly Bashand and Sam Fitzgerald. Shi and Bashand are the top two singles players, while Fitzgerald is slotted in as George's No. 4 singles player behind No. 3 Liz Buckley, who is entering her second season at Bethlehem.

"They are the last of that previous generation of tennis players at Bethlehem," George said of his three seniors.

Buckley said George's approach to coaching the players is different from Franze.

"Coach George makes more corrections and is more hands

Out of school leads to out of doors

Pine Bush's after-school explorations fuel for minds, good for bodies

In the age of technology, it might seem the "go play outside" credo is in danger of dying off. Yet with 3,200 acres of a globally-rare ecosystem in the backyard of the Capital District, kids are putting down the iPad and discovering what the outdoors has to offer.

The Albany Pine Bush Discovery Center at 195 New Karner Road in Albany will be holding its annual

"Afterschool Adventurer" program starting Sept. 19 and running through Dec. 5. Every first and third Thursday of each month, young explorers and their families can take guided tours through the Pine Bush's different trails and habitats and explore some of the region's unknown treasures.

‘Wonder Show’ a years-long labor for author

BC grad’s young adult novel all about seeking and giving, understanding

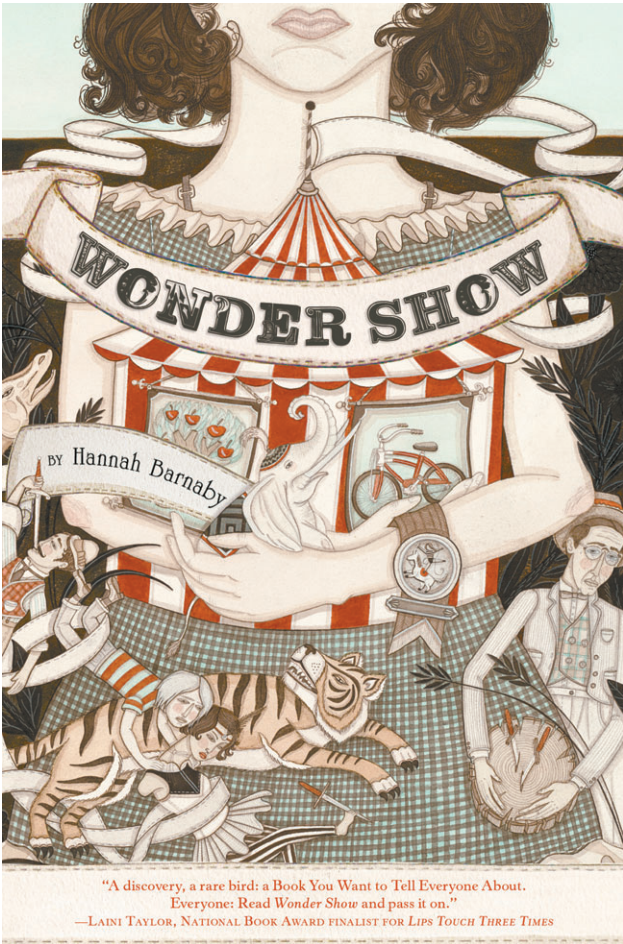

Hannah Barnaby has always been spellbound by the circus.

“I was fascinated with the whole show because it seemed so exotic,” she said. “As I got older, I learned whole generations of people worked in the business.”

As a little girl living on Long Island, a friend’s father owned a sporting goods store in Manhattan. Barnaby said she and her friend were spoiled because the store received free tickets to the circus when it stopped at Madison Square Garden. One year, she was picked to be “Queen for the Day” at a Ringling Bros. and Barnum and Bailey Show.

That up-close experience stayed with her, and when the Bethlehem High School graduate was given the chance to research her first novel through the Boston Public Library’s



Children’s Writer-in-Residence program, she began exploring circus culture.

What she found came as a surprise.

“I learned the difference between the circus and carnivals, and how those people didn’t mix with each other,” she

said. “They all had their own codes of conduct and it seemed like the social segregations that still exist. It was almost like cliques in school.”

It was around that point Barnaby altered her original idea, and began to focus her novel on carnival life.

The book took eight years to write, but the young adult novel “Wonder Show” was finally published last year through Houghton Mifflin Harcourt in Boston. The book was a finalist for the American Library Association’s William C. Morris Young Adult Debut Award, and has been reviewed by such authors as Daniel Wallace, who wrote “Big Fish: A Novel of Mythic Proportions.”

“It was a relief to get it out there into the world after so long,” said Barnaby.

The book is set in the 1930s and tells the story of Portia Remini, a young orphan girl who runs away from

“her life of misery” to join a traveling circus. Barnaby said the book is about feeling alone, even if one truly isn’t. It’s also about perspective.

When Portia first arrives at the carnival she is considered an outsider in a room full of “freaks.” Barnaby said she used the reversal to call attention to the fact how each of us will always be viewed as different depending on where we are in life.

Barnaby said when she began the book, her own experiences in middle and high school were still very fresh in her mind.

“I think the same thing is true for many young adult writers, which is why we write for them,” said Barnaby. “We have an affinity for that stage of life and that age group.”

The Delmar native said one of the most challenging and satisfying scenes to write is Portia’s first time leading customers through the freak show tent.

“I consider it an important moment because it is the first time she is seeing other people stare at the people who have become her family. ... It’s the difference between staring at someone as a stranger and seeing someone for who they

are,” said Barnaby. The author said the main message of “Wonder Show” is about encouraging readers of all ages to search out the people who understand them.

“And sometimes, people help you to understand yourself in a way you couldn’t,” she added.

Barnaby will be at The Book House in Stuyvesant Plaza on Sunday, Sept. 22, from 2 to 4 p.m. for a reading and book signing. Books will be available for purchase at the event, or can be ordered through any independent bookstore.

The bi-monthly adventure is completely free and is offered to students in first through fifth grades. Since this is a family-based activity, children must be accompanied by at least one parent or caregiver, though bringing the entire family along is recommended.

"I think it's a great experience if the whole family is learning about the environment and appreciating the ecosystem," Citriniti said.

Each week, Citriniti will lead the group on one of the many trails the Pine Bush Preserve has to offer, explaining habitats and how they differ from the others. The hikes last an hour and although it's nothing too strenuous, Citriniti said everyone must wear sturdy walking shoes and long pants and bring along drinking water.

The Pine Bush extends into parts of Colonie, Guilderland and Albany and works to protect and restore the historic and natural areas of the preserve. The thousands of acres of pine bush are home to 45 different species, including the endangered Karner Blue butterfly. Through the tours, children and families can learn about different animals and bugs, including caterpillars and spiders.

As the weather changes, the hikes will still continue outside, unless there's thunder and lightning, Citriniti said. If it snows, the Pine Bush provides snowshoes.

"As it gets colder, (I talk about) where things go in the winter and how do they change, adapt. Do they migrate?" Citriniti said. "I'm bringing awareness to their surroundings and

how other things in the world survive as well."

The program takes place at 3:30 p.m., right after school, which Citriniti said was part of her focus to get kids to go outside after sitting in school all day. Citriniti said sometimes the groups include home-schooled families, as well.

"Everyone's been very appreciative, excited, enthusiastic," Citriniti said. "They really enjoy it and get a lot of energy out."

Registration is required through www.albanypinebush.org but families can come to the Afterschool Adventurer program as many times as they want.

“Watching a tugboat go by is sort of like watching a circus train go by,” Beardsley said. “There is something about the people that live on board the boat, the work they do ... there is something romantic about it that stirs a little bit of wanderlust in a lot of us.”

Tugboats and Waterford go back more than 100 years, when Gov. Dewitt Clinton broke ground for the construction of the Erie Canal. Often referred to at the time as “Clinton’s Big Ditch,” the waterway was completed in 1825 and considered a marvel of its day. The canal was dug from Albany to Buffalo and allowed a less expensive way to ship goods.

Since the creation of the original canal system, Waterfordians have been familiar with the sight of tugboats floating by their backyards. The boats

were as common as a bike rider passing by. The canal became an exciting place in the 1800s. Not only did the boats carry cargo, but entertainment was popular on the canal.

The Waterford Wall was often packed with tugs and barges waiting to make their way up the canal.

For one weekend a year, the Waterford Harbor is a place to go back in time and celebrate the heyday on the canal.

“It came about just as a way for tugboaters to get together and have some fun,” Beardsley said. “All of

a sudden to the surprise of everyone, people wanted to come down and see these tugboats. It became not only fun for the boaters, but fun for the public.”

Beardsley said the goal is to renew an interest in the world of inland navigation in New York state.

Today, the majority of the canal system is used



by vacationers rather than workers. The waterway connects the Hudson River with Lake Champlain, Lake Ontario, Cayuga Lake, Seneca Lake and Lake Erie, and passes through 25 counties and close to 200 villages, hamlets and towns.

The event has grown tremendously since it began in 1999.

“The first year there were 10 tugboats and 1,000 people. Now we see 25,000 to 50,000 over the course of three days,” Beardsley said. “This year, we have about 35 boats, everything from mini-tugs to 140-foot real tugboats.”

The tugboats come from all over the state.

“There are more tugboats in Upstate New York than you think. We have boats that come up the Hudson from Kingston, a number that work for New York state, boats come from the central parts of the state, the Finger Lakes, and a few commercial that operate here in the Capital District,” Beardsley said.

Among the 26 tugboats that will be docked at the roundup is the John J. Harvey, a fireboat built in 1931. The boat has the capacity to pump 18,000 gallons of water per minute. The boat was retired by the New York City Fire Department in 1994.

The free event will feature tugboat tours; knot

tying, beard making and fender weaving seminars; line tossing; kid’s activities such as pony rides, face-painting and a bouncy bounce; fireworks; and live music all day long. Boat rides will be available for a nominal fee.

“We have quite a range of music, from basic folk music to Zydeco to an easy Rock ‘n Roll nonstop all the way through Sunday afternoon,” Beardsley said.

Beardsley added that the roundup piques the interest of a wide range of people.


“For those interested in engines, it’s amazing. For those interested in boats, it tantalizes that curiosity. And for those interested in travel on the canal system and seeing the boats come around the bend, pass by and disappear to some other destination that is left to our imagination.”

It all starts on Friday, Sept. 6, at 2:45 p.m. when the boats leave the Port of Albany to make their way to the Waterford Harbor. The boats are scheduled to arrive in Waterford beginning at 5 p.m. The band All Night Long will play on the Grand Erie tugboat at 8 p.m. Festivities continue Saturday, Sept. 7, and Sunday, Sept. 8. Fireworks will go off at 8 p.m. on Saturday night.
