# Highway Rebuttal

Bethlehem Highway Superintendent counters claims made by board candidate

**BETHLEHEM** — Town Highway Superintendent Brent Meredith called *Spotlight News* on Friday, Aug. 19, to counter recent claims made by Roland Graves, one of two Democratic candidates for the soon-to-be-vacated town board seat currently held by Doris Davis.

Graves, in a recent interview with Spotlight News, said that he decided to run after several frustrated attempts to get public officials to respond to issues in his neighborhood and elsewhere in town. He specifically cited the recently completed repairs on Krumkill Road near the Albany border that required residents to find alternate routes for several months, saying that he was unable to find out from the town when the project would be completed.

# High CO levels trigger evacuation of Price Chopper

GLENMONT — The Price Chopper on Route 9W in Glenmont was evacuated the morning of Wednesday, Aug. 17, after a carbon monoxide (CO) alarm registered dangerous levels at the back of the store. The Selkirk Fire Department responded and found the cause to be a blocked stove pipe in the bakery, which caused dangerous CO levels—particularly, according to Asst. Fire Chief Joe Michaniw, in the walk-in coolers used by employees.

"Inside some of the walk-in coolers, levels were over 200 parts per million (ppm)," he said, before explaining that most home alarms will trigger at 5ppm. "5ppm won't kill you," he said, "But it is dangerous if you're in your third trimester. At 5ppm, it's a warning and you should probably get out of your home." Levels in open areas near the store bakery registered 50-70ppm, which Michaniw said is not deadly, but is certainly not recommended. Closer to the coolers, it was 150. "Basically the fans were sucking it out of the air and pulling it into the coolers and freezers."

No one in the store reported any symptoms, such as nausea or dizziness, he said, and the store was completely evacuated while they investigated the source of the high CO levels. "We shut it down," Michaniw said. "And, after searching, we found a stove in the bakery, with a stove pipe that vents through the roof. That stove pipe was rotted off and so the carbon monoxide was settling in the roof and then being pulled out by the

force of the fans attached to the coolers. In those confined spaces, there was no way for the air to get out, so that's where we saw the highest levels."

National Grid and the Town of Bethlehem were notified and the natural gas line to the stove was cut off until it has been repaired and inspected. The store was ventilated and able to reopen around 10:15 a.m., a little less than two hours after Selkirk FD responded to the alarm around 8:30 a.m.

"Everything else in the store is operational, nothing was damaged," said Michaniw, adding that positive and negative pressure fans were used to circulate the air and remove the CO in less than two hours. "There were no injuries. If one of the employees had gone into one of those coolers, though, and the door had shut behind them and they had become overwhelmed, they could have passed out in that cooler. You can't smell carbon monoxide. There's no way of knowing it's there."

# Taxi!

CDTA gains authority to coordinate, improve taxicab service in the Capital District

ALBANY - On Friday, Aug. 19, Gov. Andrew Cuomo signed into law a bill that could pave the way for ride-sharing services in the Capital District and, more generally, is intended to improve taxi service in the region. The legislation allows local municipalities to enter into agreements with the Capital District Transportation Authority (CDTA) to share certain administrative responsibilities as well as to "coordinate and standardize" regulatory and administrative procedure with respect to taxicab services, which will include the implementation of a "unified complaint process."

"Customer complaints have abounded in recent years," wrote the bill's senate sponsor, Neil Breslin (D-44), in an appended memo. "In a region that is so reliant on travelers being able to move quickly and comfortably between, for instance, the Albany International Airport or the Rensselaer Train Station to their destination, taxi service must be of the highest quality and consistency. This has not been the case.'

Calling this a "critical point in the region's history," he pointed to the new convention center in Albany, the new casino in Schenectady and the potential for ride-sharing in the region, saying that the goal of the legislation is to "give local governments and CDTA the ability to work cooperatively" to improve taxi service for

those who visit the Capital

While CDTA will not be making licensing or registration decisions for the municipalities, it would allow drivers to obtain their medallion from a central source, whereas they have previously been required to be licensed by individual municipalities with varying requirements. Additionally, the centralized administration will make it easier to regulate a ridesharing industry—should it ever come to the region, as many hope it will.

In the Assembly, the bill was sponsored by John McDonald (D-108) and introduced by himself and co-sponsors Patricia Fahy (D-109), Phil Steck (D-110) and Angelo Santabarbara (D-111). Steck, who opposed other legislation directly relating to the establishment of a potential ride-sharing program—thus coming under fire from at least one prominent local Uber supporter—explained that he wanted first to see a centralized regulatory agency in place to oversee such a program. "I'm not against it," he said. "I don't want to ban them from operating. The question is the conditions under which they operate." Under the recently signed bill, he said, CDTA will function in much the same way that the New York City Taxi and Limousine Commission functions, allowing it to work with municipalities to set uniform regulations and requirements.

The bill ultimately passed the legislature handily and became

effective immediately upon the governor's signature. "I am pleased the Governor has signed legislation I cosponsored," wrote Senator George Amedore (R-105) in a press release that evening. "With this new law, municipalities will have the option to use CDTA as a centralized administrator in an effort to reduce the regulatory burden on local governments, streamline the process, and create a more uniform set of standards across the region. CDTA already has a proven track record of improving transportation systems in the region, and this new law has the potential to greatly improve service for all customers in the Capital Region.

"I still believe that Upstate communities desperately need ridesharing services, like Uber and Lyft, and will continue to work toward that goal," he said. "But this is a big step forward to improve the quality of existing transportation options."

# Historic house may soon be occupied

#### BETHLEHEM

— Bethlehem Chabad, a Hasidic Jewish organization, has expressed interest in converting the historic Adams House — a 7,320-square foot building — into a house of worship.

According to town documents, additional uses for the building include office space, holiday programming and adult education, as well as weddings and bar mitzvahs. The facility would be used seven days a week, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Bethlehem Chabad is currently located at 395 Delaware Ave.

For more than 30 years, the historic site had served as the operations center for NYSARC, after the non-profit organization purchased 393-394 Delaware Ave. from the town in 1983. Prior to that, Adams House was Bethlehem Town Hall for

several years before the town moved to its present position in 1980.

The Greek revival house was built in 1838 by Nathaniel Adams, who had bought the lot to build a hotel off the then-Delaware Turnpike. In all, Adams had purchased more than 500 acres of land, including what is known today as the Four Corners and parts of Normansville. Prior to being named Delmar, the hamlet had been named Adamsville in his family's honor. The Adams House ceased to be a hotel in 1920 when it was eventually sold to the Delmar Fire Company.

Adams Street, the side street that abuts the corner lot property, still carries the family name.

Bethlehem Chabad is scheduled to meet again with the town's planning board next month to determine the proposals impact against New York state's environmental impact assessment.



#### **Project Growth Grads**

On Tuesday, Aug. 16, six teens graduated from a training and classroom program geared toward at-risk youth offenders, becoming the third class to graduate from the unique program known as Project Growth—and the first to benefit from a recently announced partnership between Albany County and local trade unions. Under the restorative justice program run through the county, graduates completed four weeks of classroom learning and practical hands-on training with trade union workers, after which they received stipends for their work to help pay restitution to the victims of their crimes.

"This program can really help our kids get back on track and deter them from re-offense," said County Executive Dan McCoy last month, when announcing the participation of unions in Project Growth. "It will help them learn from their mistakes and guide them in the right direction."

"It's the perfect blend between offender justice and offender rehabilitation," said Acting Albany County Probation Director Bill Connors.

# Delmar priest receives probation for videotaping woman in fitting room



COLONIE — The Delmar priest who was arrested after he recorded a victim changing her clothes at the Salvation Army Thrift Store in Latham was sentenced to three years probation last Wednesday, according to police.

In May, Rev. Adam Egan, 36, of Bethlehem, pleaded guilty in Colonie Town Court from an incident involving him taking a video of a woman as she undressed at a local thrift store.

Egan was arrested by Colonie Police at approximately 3:40 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 23, on two felony charges of unlawful surveillance and tampering with evidence after he allegedly recorded the victim changing her clothes at the Salvation Army thrift store at 350 Troy-Schenectady Road in Latham.

At the time of the arrest, Egan served as rector of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Delmar. He was originally facing two felony charges, including one for tampering of evidence. Egan pled down to one count of attempted unlawful surveillance

in the second degree. The misdemeanor charge carries three years probation and would require he follow sex offender conditions during his probation.

Colonie Police had reported Egan held his cell phone over the dressing room divider, taking a video of a woman as she changed from her clothes. The victim caught him and snapped photos of him with her own cell phone before calling police. Police located Egan on Aragon Avenue about 10 minutes later, where he was arrested and his electronic devices confiscated.

Egan was also ordered to pay \$255 in fines, said a police spokesman.

Due to a prior DWI conviction within the last 10 years Manning was subsequently charged with felony driving while ability impaired by drugs, and criminal possession of a weapon in the fourth degree; a class A

misdemeanor. He was arraigned before the Town of Guilderland Court and remanded to the Albany County Jail without bail.



Bethlehem Police arrested Matthew J. Consler, 41, of Wemple Road in Glenmont, at 10:41 p.m. on Sunday, Aug. 7, after responding to a call from the owner of a Honda Civic, stating that his car had been sideswiped by a white Chevrolet Trailblazer and was traveling southbound on 9W.

After reportedly informing Consler that he had just left the scene of the accident, he denied any involvement until the owner of the Honda provided his driver's side rearview mirror as evidence and officers reportedly determined that the damage to both vehicles were consistent with the reported incident. When Consler was asked to exit his vehicle, officers report that he showed signs of intoxication. After allegedly failing standard field sobriety tests, he was placed under arrest and officers report that a subsequent chemical analysis showed his BAC to be 0.15 percent. He was processed and was scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on Aug. 16.



# Big league reality

Jeff Hoffman gets the call from the Colorado Rockeies

wo years removed from Tommy John surgery on his pitching elbow, Latham native Jeff Hoffman made his Major League Baseball debut with the Colorado Rockies Saturday, Aug. 20.


The former Section 2 baseball star cruised through the first three innings before struggling against the National League Central Division-leading Chicago Cubs. Ultimately, he took the loss after allowing seven runs – six of them earned – in four-plus innings in the Cubs' 9-2



victory over the Rockies in Denver.

Still, Hoffman had the support from a large group of family members and friends who made the trek to Denver for his debut, as well as his former high school coach, Steve Frank, who watched the game from his home.

"I thought he did a lot of good things," said Frank. "I did see the command and the poise that I saw in him five or six years ago (when he pitched for Shaker)."

It's been a wild ride for Hoffman. After impressing scouts while at Shaker, and then at both East Carolina and the Cape Cod League, Hoffman was looking at being one of the first selections in the 2014 Major League Baseball draft. Then, he needed Tommy John surgery to repair the ligament in his pitching elbow.

Hoffman's body of work up to that point still garnered him a high draft pick, as the Toronto Blue Jays selected him ninth overall. He sat out the rest of 2014 before beginning his pro career in Toronto's minor league system last spring. He graduated quickly from A ball to AA, which placed him on a fast track to the Major Leagues.

Then in late July 2015,
Toronto sent a group of
minor leaguers, led by
Hoffman, to Colorado
in exchange for All-Star
shortstop Troy Tulowitzki.
Now, Hoffman found
himself part of an
organization where the
commonly-held belief is that
its pitchers struggle because
of the fact that the Rockies
play half of their games every
year in the thin air of Denver.

Frank, for one, said he doesn't think Hoffman is fazed by where he's pitching.

"I think Jeff is not going to be concerned that his ERA is a quarter point higher than some other guy pitching for a different team. All he wants to do is win," said Frank.

Hoffman began this season pitching for the Albuquerque Isotopes in the AAA-level Pacific Coast League. For a long while, Hoffman bucked the trend of other pitchers in the offensive-minded PCL and posted a sub-3.00 earned run average. A couple of shaky outings in July raised Hoffman's ERA over 4.00.

Hoffman got the call-up he had been waiting for Friday, Aug. 19. The next night, he took to the pitcher's mound to face the Cubs — one of the top teams in the National League.

At first, the Cubs had trouble getting on base against Hoffman. Dexter Fowler's lead-off single in the first inning was negated by a double play, and Hoffman went through the rest of the lineup without allowing a hit through the third inning.

But the Cubs hitters got to Hoffman after that. They scored four runs on five hits in the top of the fourth inning, and then Kris Bryant blasted a three-run homer to end Hoffman's night in the fifth inning.

"I think he would tell you it's the big leagues everyone is going to be top notch," said Frank.

# Deserve a raise?

ew York lawmakers made headlines last week by proposing they receive a 47 percent raise, which would ultimately place them as the highest paid state legislators in the country.

Currently, lawmakers make \$79,500. That's an annual figure that has stood since they last received a raise in 1999. In comparison, the current salary places New York behind only California (\$100,113) and Pennsylvania (\$85,339). Right now, the proposal is left for a commission, tasked with deciding salaries for top government officials, to determine whether or not to proceed. Should the proposed salary hike go through, lawmakers would top the list at \$116,900 a year.

When in conversation, the topics of money and politicians seldom mix favorably in the eyes of the public. Perhaps that's why we're going two decades without hearing about pay hikes from The Capitol. The assumed annual increase of 2

percent seems reasonable, when compared to cost of living calculations at the American Institute of Economic Research, the proposal is on par at \$114,460.84.

The calculator takes into account present-day conditions for 2016, and can not calculate for 2017.

That \$2,400 should not be much to strike up your anger, especially if we are to assume the next raise won't occur for another 15 years. Nevertheless, some of us have not received annual raises. Looking back at the economic landscape since 1999, there have been many of us who have lost jobs, and taken new ones with a decrease in pay, the nasty effects from the Great Recession.

Now we're talking nickels and dimes, but the proposal does not reportedly do away with any travel stipends. Then, there is the public perception that the positions in question are part-time jobs. And, some of those part-timers have been caught in unscrupulous activity in this past year, alone.

So, taking a page out of the corporate world, the employee demanding a raise needs to step up to the employer and answer, "what have you done for me lately?" The employee not only must show that he or she has done what was expected, the argument needs to reveal that the employee has gone above and beyond. And, if such an argument can't be presented, there is no such raise.

Of course, that's not what happens. At least, not in such a piecemeal case for all 213 seats in Albany.

It's a move that deflects the heat of the situation away from lawmakers, having a commission decide upon the validity of the proposal, and to do it after the current term ends — it's pretty ingenious.

The commission will not issue a report until Nov. 15. Which turns the question upon you, the voter: Does your representative deserve a raise? You can answer that question in the ballot booth on Election Day.

So, taking a page out of the corporate world, the employee demanding a raise needs to step up to the employer and answer, "what have you done for me lately?" The employee not only must show that he or she has done what was expected, the argument needs to reveal that the employee has gone above and beyond. And, if such an argument can't be presented, there is no such raise.

# Five years ago: Irene slams the area

**CAPITAL DISTRICT** — Hurricane Irene was downgraded before reaching the area, but the tropical storm wreaked havoc with damaging winds and torrential rains, leading to historic flooding back on Aug. 28, 2011.

In North Bethlehem, emergency response teams were tasked with fishing two people out of a pregnant Normanskill after their car was submerged on Krumkill Road

North Bethlehem Fire Department Chief Paul Fuino said a driver removed the cones blocking off the road at the intersection of Krumkill and Schoolhouse roads at around 3 a.m. and proceeded down the road towards the bridge, which Fuino estimated was covered by as much as 20 feet of water at the time.

The car flooded and forced the man and woman onto the hood of the car, before both were swept away by the raging water. A local resident called authorities after hearing their cries more than two hours later. Emergency responders found the two clung to a tree and suffering from hypothermia before they were rushed to the hospital.

"They're fortunate they're alive," said Fuino.

In Clarksville, however, flood waters claimed the life of a local woman who was apparently swept away by the Onesquethaw Creek.

High winds toppled trees and broke off branches, impacting power lines. Thousands of residents throughout the area lost power, including more than 30,000 in Saratoga County. It would take National Grid several days before power was completely restored.

#### In other news of the day...

State Police issued 1,2000 speeding tickets during a recent "Speed Week" enforcement effort.

The initiative coincided with the NASCAR race at Watkins Glen Raceway and saw stepped-up patrols on the lookout for speeding and other traffic violations during the week of Aug. 8 to 14. During the same time period the previous year, when there was no targeted enforcement effort underway, area State Police issued 966 speeding tickets.

# Airport gets \$3 million for upgrades

Passenger traffic has increased by 10 percent since January alone

ALBANY— Albany International Airport will receive over \$3 million in federal funding, allowing it to continue its run of recent infrastructure improvements.

The funding is a result of a combined effort from U.S. Senators Chuck Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand, and U.S. Representative Paul Tonko.

"Keeping our airport terminals in top-notch shape is crucial for traveler safety and for attracting business and tourism to the region," Schumer said. "With this funding, the Albany International Airport will be able to make the critical infrastructure upgrades to its passenger boarding bridges, which

will increase safety and efficiency for the passengers and pilots that fly in and out of the Albany area every day."

The total funding amount the airport will receive is \$3,036,119, and it will go towards the design and construction of three passenger boarding bridges to maintain the efficient movement of passengers at the airport. The funding was allocated through the U.S. Department of Transportation's (DOT) Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), according to a press release.

"This is a big win for Albany International. Our local airports are huge drivers of the local economy, and ensuring that they have the tools they need to provide safe and convenient travel to



the business community and leisure travelers is critical to achieve the economic growth that we are all working toward in our region. I applaud John O'Donnell and his team at Albany International for the important work they do each and every day,"

Tonko said.

Recently, the airport has seen a jump in passenger traffic, leading to such upgrades. During the first half of 2016, Albany International saw an increase of over 600,000 people.

Since January, the



#### Highway rebuttal

"I personally spoke with him during the spring while the Krumkill project was going on," said Meredith of Graves. "I told him that anytime he needed information to please call me."

Also, Meredith said, there was available, "regularly updated," information regarding the project that could be found on the town's website. "The updates that we provided are still online, under the news section," he said. "You can look for yourself."

"And every time we talked about this at a town board meeting," he continued, "we had an end date that we were shooting for, which was the end of July. That was a well-known date. For [Graves] to say that he had no idea what the date was is just untrue. It makes us look unresponsive at best, and incompetent at worst. We consistently had a date of July and it's a date that we met."

"I talked to him and I talked to other people in those neighborhoods and I gave them the best information that I could," said Meredith, adding that he was proud of the town's efforts to keep residents notified. "Believe me, we had a lot of complaints about why it was taking so long. Unfortunately, it was a more technically complex project than that which we normally do—so, there was a long design phase and it involved a lot of regulators—and I don't think there were many ways for us to shorten the time

frame. We even bought materials before we signed contracts to make this thing happen by July.

"I know Roland [Graves]," said Meredith. "I talked to him personally on several occasions and offered any information I had. So, for him to say that he talked to people from the town and nobody could tell him anything I think is just disingenuous.

Defending his position—and the town's—on a separate issue concerning a proposed vehicular roadway connection at the end of Fieldstone Drive through a potential subdivision that would be built between that neighborhood and Elm Avenue Park, Meredith said, "Having a dead-end street is not a great situation when it comes to maintaining and providing services on a street. When you have an opportunity like this, especially on a street that was always, according to the planning department, supposed to be a through street when that next development was done, I really do think it's in the best interest of all the town residents. It's not the best thing for Fieldstone residents, I get it, but it's in the best interest of the town because the long-term maintenance that we provide, and the services we provide are going to be more efficient on a through-street."

Residents unhappy with the potential cut-through feel that town officials have been unresponsive to their concerns about resident safety and disruption of protected wetlands, as well as their efforts to reach a compromise.





# Casino running on time

Rivers Casino scheduled to open next year

The \$330 million private investment project, undertaken by Rush Street Gaming, to build a hotel and casino along the Mohawk River in Schenectady is well underway, according to Rush Street's Vice President of Operations Joe Scibetta. While winter

weather could potentially delay the project, Scibetta anticipates that the casino will be open during the first quarter of 2017, and the hotel shortly thereafter.

On a recent tour of the construction site. Scibetta pointed out the large windows that overlook the river behind the new casino. an unusual feature for large-scale

gambling establishments, and noted that, per state law, there will not be any indoor smoking allowed. Beyond the windows, three outdoor patios-one outside the planned steakhouse, one outside the gaming area, and another outside the ballroom (another private patio is for employees only)-will allow patrons to enjoy the Mohawk

River behind the casino and the Mohawk Hudson Rail Trail, which will be diverted so that it runs on the along the river on the northwest side of the Stockade district.

The casino itself will boast a 50,000 square-foot gaming floor with 1,150 slot machines and 16 poker tables, as well as a

2-3 cups crushed graham crackers 1/2 cup finely chopped almonds 1/2 cup butter, melted (unsalted) 3 scoops of butter pecan ice cream softened 3 scoops vanilla ice cream softened Hot fudge ice cream topping (at least 11 ounces)

16 ounce container of strawberries washed and sliced

#### **Preparation**

6 1/2 inch springform pan, lined at the bottom with parchment paper Aluminum foil to line the inside sides of the Set aside

In a large bowl combine crumbs with chopped almonds and butter, and press one cup on the bottom of the pan. Heat fudge until smooth, and spread over to cover the graham cracker crust. Place the cake pan in the freezer for 15 minutes, until the fudge is set. Once set, layer butter pecan ice cream, more fudge over ice cream. Place back in the freezer for 30 minutes, and once ice cream is set, layer

crumbs more ice cream, and fudge. Back in freezer, and repeat until all ice cream and fudge, and most of the crumbs are used. Once topped with the final layer of ice cream, spread with the rest of the crumbs (should be about 1/4 cup). Cover the top of the ice cream cake with wax paper, and place in the freezer until ready to serve.

When it's time to serve, top with sliced fresh strawberries.

# Diabetes hits kids, too

Genetics may play a part, but not always — look at habits

esterday, a mother responded to my article about diabetes. "Denise" took her 13-year-old son to the doctors for his annual physical. What she thought was to be a routine visit turned out to be anything but. She had only just read my article before her son was diagnosed with Type II diabetes.

The American Diabetes Association reports that over 208,000 American children have been diagnosed with diabetes and the number is rising. An estimated 5,000 new cases of Type II are discovered each year, according to a 2007 study done by the Journal of America Medical Association. This is especially alarming when you realize that about 20 years ago Type II diabetes in children was almost unheard of.

What is the main cause of this epidemic? Most experts agree its weight. The increase in Type II diabetes among children directly corresponds with the increase in childhood obesity. Studies have shown that more than 80 percent of all children with Type II are overweight with almost 40 percent of those being clinically obese.

Denise's son weighs close to 300 pounds. When I called her to discuss the situation she told me he had been overweight all his life and she blamed family genetics, as many parents do. But, as we talked on the phone the real reasons for his being overweight came to light. When I asked him how often he exercised she said, "never." In fact, he frequently didn't even participate in physical education at school because it was too difficult for him. She would write notes excusing him from it. When I asked how he had spent his summer she said, "Mostly playing video games."Then, I asked about his eating habits. She said he was a very picky eater and refused to eat anything healthy. His diet consisted mostly of fast foods,

cookies and "box after box" of macaroni and cheese." Her family doctor warned if she and her son didn't make changes soon, things would only get worse.

To the doctor's point, the effect Type II diabetes has on children lasts a lifetime. The data is still being studied as it is a fairly recent phenomenon but adolescents with Type II have shorter life spans, have higher risks of heart attacks, stokes, amputations of the legs and feet, as well as end-stage renal disease. Add to this the potential of a life sticking themselves with needles daily to check blood sugar and having to pay for medications or insulin to keep it under control.

The best way to help your child is to be proactive and take steps to lower the risk. As noted, the No. 1 cause for diabetes is obesity. If your child is overweight, you need to address the issue head on. While it may not be easy, it begins with making small changes that over time can make a big difference. Even a small amount of weight loss can help prevent or delay diabetes. And, in my experience, if the child is overweight, then most likely the parent is, too. So make it a family affair to start eating healthy and exercising on a regular basis.

Tips for Eating Healthy:

**Drink water** – Limit, or better yet, get rid of sugar-sweetened drinks, that would include soda, sports drinks, juices and coffee drinks.

Eat More Fruits and Veggies – Yes, it can be tough to get children to eat them, but often it's a matter of persistence and trying different ones until you find something they like. Often times, it's a matter of trying a variety of vegetables.

Keep healthy snacks in the kitchen and get rid of the crap – Put another way, if it isn't available to them the kids won't eat it. Keep bananas, apples, oranges on the counter and plain popcorn in the pantry. Get rid of the cookies, candies and other "goodies" people have lying around the house.

**Limit the fast food** — When I was growing, up a trip to the local fast food





# Pondfest at 10

**PERU** — For any festival to survive – let alone thrive – for 10 years is an impressive feat. Bonnaroo and Coachella are two names that immediately pop into mind, but now it's time to add **BRING THE** Backwoods Pondfest to

This past weekend at Twin Ponds Campsite Camping with funk in Peru, N.Y., Pondfest, which is put on by in the Adirondacks northern New York Photo by Chelsea Wright/ band Lucid, celebrated its 10th birthday by throwing a truly cohesive party melding the fun of camping in the middle of the forest with live music.

The lineup mixed the best that the Adirondacks was to offer, with some of the bigger acts of the festival circuit. Lucid, a band straight from the heart of the Adirondacks, has been a staple of the weekend since inception, and while this year was the same, it was also very different. Last year, the band announced it was taking a long break, but not officially breaking up and would continue to play events like Pondfest.

And just to put any rumors to bed, bassist Chris Shacklett gave me a brief interview on Saturday afternoon to discuss the state of the band.

'We are totally shifting our focus," Shacklett said. "Instead of continuing to hemorrhage money, we are being smarter about what we do. There's not going to be much in the way of touring anymore, but we're going to do more things like this (Pondfest).'

Along with Lucid, the other headliners were Melvin Seals and JGB, Pink Talking Fish (is Bowie), the Blind Owl Band and Twiddle's guitarist Mihali Savoulidis and his 'Frends', who brought the surprise of a Twiddle set.

NYS Music contributor Chelsea Wright was in attendance and gives us a first hand account of how it went down:

Arriving just on time, I approached the stage and Mihali was just getting it started by inviting a few good friends up to join him. It was like revolving doors, including some of my favorite musicians;

Ryan Dempsey on keys, Jamie

Armstrong on Sax, Joshua West on drums, to Kevin Sabourin on guitar and vocals. At one point Brad Hester from Annie in The Water came up and had a back and forth match on a kazoo, with Jamie's sax. Then they switched it up to Chris Shacklett on bass, Lowell Wurster

on percussion and vocals, the beautiful Meadow on vocals, and then the big surprise of a total shift into a set by Twiddle. After Twiddle finished, Mihali remained, and invited members of Capital Zen up to join him. It was an all-around party, with special moments that no one could have anticipated."

Arriving on Friday, I was greeted by multiple ambulances and state police cars with lights flashing all over. I was not allowed to enter for nearly two hours as the entrance was blocked for any cars getting in or out.

When pressed for a reason, a State Police officer said, "We're here because of some overdoses. Make sure you're safe when you go in."

Derek Haviland, the press and marketing man for the festival, said there weren't any overdoses in the sense that you'd think of, but rather that someone had simply imbibed a bit too much and just needed a little help. He hinted at a bit of an overreaction by local first responders.

"Little towns like this aren't really used to stuff like this, so I think they just took any and every precaution while they

were here," Haviland said, adding that the individual was fine by the following morning. "We are safety first; we took all the right precautions."

With my delayed arrival killing any chance at seeing Hayley Jane and the Primates, Bella's Bartok, Thunder Body and Lucid, I arrived just as Melvin Seals was taking the stage. The longtime keyboardist for Jerry Garcia had a nice groove going for "Cats Under the Stars," before starting right up into a Grateful Dead regular, "Sugaree." "Strugglin' Man," "Rhapsody in Red" and "Money Honey" perfectly captured the essence of a JGB show, with swirling, noodly guitar and the big church organ sound. "Sisters and Brothers" and "Deal" were my personal favorites, with the latter coaxing an uproarious applause from the crowd of beards, sun dresses and dreadlocks.

I received a message from Lowell, letting me know that there would be a special surprise Thursday night. I made the last minute decision to travel the two hours from Vermont for the 'Mihali & Frends' show, knowing that if Lowell promised a surprise, it was bound to be extra special. Having seen Mihali & Frends the weekend prior as a part of Twiddle's first major event, Tumble Down, I knew that some amazing collaborations were going to happen – at his sold out Higher Ground show, he brought together musicians from Nahko & Medicine For The People, Twiddle, and the Kitchen Dwellers for two full hours of incredible jams.

Right after, on the Woods Stage, Syracuse hip-hop trio Sophistafunk took the audience on a positive mental trip with lyrics of encouragement, happiness and

Spiritual Rez then started the late night sets and there seemed to be a large

congregation of fans in attendance mainly to see this band. After a set with some sitins, Rez gave way to Tweed on the Woods Stage at around 2:25 a.m.

Tweed could be categorized as a jamtronic act, but I thought the set was more dreamy than anything else. Because of the downpour, I made the decision to hear the set from my tent which was about 300 feet from the stage. I drifted right off into blissful slumber.

Waking up in the woods when the weather is hot but still pleasant, is everything I want in a festival morning. This morning was special as some of my favorite live acts were slated to perform. Making my way backstage to interview some folks, I bumped into Formula 5's bassist and the young Gregg Allmanlookalike James Woods, who was energized and pumped for the band's set later that afternoon.

After grabbing a sausage, egg and cheese, two coffees and water (thanks to my editor), I made my way to catch some of Doomf#@k, a band with some of the Lucid guys. I can only describe this act as a talented, humorous joke band.

The Honey Smugglers were slated to perform on the smaller stage, but because the members of The Brummy Brothers, scheduled to perform on the main stage later, got into a car accident and were unable to make the trek, the Smugglers were asked to move from their slot and play on the main stage later.

Formula 5 comprises young men from the Adirondacks, led by guitarist Joe Davis who totes a red Gibson SG, a guitar he loves with all his heart. "This thing is a beauty," he said before loading in his gear.

F5's set consisted of some of the tightest jamming I have ever heard from the group. Matt Richards, who recently took over keyboard duties, displayed the energy and enthusiasm he brings to the band. Woods and Davis are a natural team, with Davis typically weaving his speedy licks around Wood's boisterous bass lines. The MVP, however, was drummer Greg Marek whose focus and precision shows with every bang of the drum. When he plays, he stares at one thing with a devilish facial expression, allowing sweat to roll off his skin and not bother him.

Mister F's insane pace and tempo made them perfect for the late afternoon slot before Lucid and The Blind Owl Band satiated the crowd's thirst for jams, before leading into Pink Talking Fish's set in honor of David Bowie. The band weaved in songs from Bowie, Phish, Talking Heads and Pink Floyd seamlessly while guitarist Dave Brunyak shredded uncontrollably.

Gang of Thieves, The Nth Power and Subsoil finished off the music with abandon and there wasn't an unhappy soul in attendance.

With 10 years under the belt, Pondfest shows no signs of slowing down, even a bit. Attendees often speak of the weekend as "going home" to see their friends and make new ones. With a great philosophy and positive outlook, Pondfest stands to be around and rocking the Adirondacks for years to come.



Our intentions have power and energy. Intentions begin with thought, are expressed through words and acted out through deeds. Everything is consistent. A story from the book, "Autobiography of a Yogi" provides a great example.

A teacher and his pupil were on a retreat in a small jungle hut. The mosquitoes were biting and the pupil was being tormented. He raised his hand to swat and smash the insect, but then remembering his guru's teaching of non-harming, he restrained himself, suffering in silence. Moments later, the guru said, why don't you finish the job?" The boy was astonished and replied that he had stopped because of the teachings of non-harming, to which the guru answered that practicing non-harming had to begin with the removal of the desire to harm. Intention is born in thought and if we wish to follow through on our intention, then we need to start with our thoughts.

Starting with our thoughts is essential when creating new habits to replace old habits. When we first form our resolutions, we create a goal that is to our benefit. So we don't think of our new habit as a sacrifice, but that the new behavior will enhance and enrich our lives. Intention begins with removing desire. This is a mental commitment to change behavior.

B.K.S. Iyenger, a respected yoga teacher, puts it this way, "what is not fed, will wither." He points out that we all have three interconnecting segments of consciousness-

-the mind, the ego and intelligence.

The mind supplies memories, the ego watches out for us by navigating us towards pleasurable memories and avoiding painful one and our intelligence provides us with balance and discrimination. Whatever our ingrained habits might be, whether too much chocolate cake or not enough crack cocaine, the source is the same--the desire within your mental body. When we are holding our desired object in our hand, it may seem like magic, but it is not. It is the circle of dialog chattering with the mind, the ego and intelligence, except our intelligence was sleeping or we just were not listening.

How yoga helps is like this. Yoga provides principles to live by such as non- harming. When you accept the principle of non-harming, it follows that doing something harmful would alert both the mind and the ego to suppress the desire right at its starting place. The practice of yoga includes asana, or the yoga poses and breathe control. Both of these support greater awareness of the present moment, discipline and creative direction.

Ingrained habits are like mounds of garbage taking up space in our subconscious mind. Every move we make towards repeating habits are supported by our mounds of memory and emotions associated with the habit. We argue within our mental grooves, round and round, telling ourselves that we are in control, we have been very good, we deserve a little reward and on and on it goes until we have indulged ourselves. In the end, we feel anything but happy, not content, not satisfied and think, 'oh what's the use, I will drown myself in (fill in the blank). Another marathon is born.


The sorrow of consequence always follows.

As I stare into my laptop screen, I can see the image of a collective rolling of the eyes and the mutterings saying, 'it is easy to say', that yoga is like contorting like a pretzel and thinking about breathing is as exciting as watching grass grow. And I say to you, we all exist in body, mind and spirit and each and every one of us has divine energy and intelligence. We all act stupidly when we ignore our intelligence. So, it is helpful to be aware of the present moment and breathe before we act. When we want to change a habit, we should form an intention that begins in our minds—to purge the desire. Then, we ask ourselves what I need to do to actually follow through.

We need to remember our subconscious mounds. My mental image of my piles of habits is a cartoon like mountain of stinky manure. Every time we resist manipulation, we remove a big shovelful from the pile. Meanwhile, we create a new pile that says, 'I do not want you. I am free.' New habits involve a lot of digging. You can think of yoga, as if it was in a collection of shovels, of which you can choose some, and you give it a try.

# Heading back to Mario's

ario's in Niskayuna is back, and it is better than ever. Mario's which began renovations late last year, has finally reopened, and from the crowds we have seen, it appears much of Niskayuna is happy they are back.

Mario's has been a staple in Niskayuna for nearly 20 years, and for a variety of reason, they started from the ground up to create the new Mario's. Located in the same location, the new building and layout is much friendlier and easier to access. Previously, if there was a wait (which there almost always was), the line backed up into the doorway, causing an uncomfortable crowd to form. In addition, the bar area was open to the dining room, but was also blocked easily by patrons waiting on a table. Making it nearly impossible to have a drink at the bar while waiting on your table.

In the new set-up, there is a benched area to wait for a table, and the bar is also separated from the main dining room by a half-wall, making it easier to just sit and relax at the bar while you wait for your table, or choose to have dinner at the bar.

The boyfriend and I went on Thursday night, we called ahead (they don't take reservations) to get an idea on the wait and they said at that point it was about 30 minutes. I was close. I got there first. Put our name in and took a seat at the bar. Within minutes, I had an ice cold beer in my hand, and a menu to look over while I waited. The efficiency with the new layout was clearly working.

Previously the décor made you feel at home, but was dark and outdated. The new décor is simple, yet fitting. A rustic look, with exposed wood beams, and slate colored floors, it is fresh, but still has the homey feeling of the old Mario's.

The wait was probably exactly 30 minutes, and the boyfriend arrived only seconds after I was seated at our table. I had not eaten much all day, and was in full on "starvation feed me now" mode. We placed an order for wings immediately, as well as each ordered a soda. One beer was enough for me, I had to be out of the house early the next morning. I already knew what I wanted, simple, but my absolute favorite meal in the world, eggplant parmigiana. He decided

to go with a special for the night, bucatini pasta with a Bolognese

The wings arrived quickly, and each of our dinners came with salads and they arrived on the heels of the wings. Our server apologized that both came together, but we really didn't mind at all. The wings, did not disappoint. We ordered them mild, because as you may know from reading this column, I am a bit of baby about spicy things – and for my taste, they were perfect. Enough zing to have flavor, but not so much that I couldn't bear it. Now one of the things that I loved about the old Mario's was their blue cheese dressing, and I was really hoping that had not changed. As I dunked my first wing in the blue cheese, I could tell right away, that it had not. Thick chunks of fresh blue cheese, and a perfectly creamy dressing, I was in heaven. The salads were typical side salads, and the dressing was just as delicious.

After we finished our salads, and had what we couldn't finish of our wings wrapped, our server brought over bread and we relaxed for a bit.





joint was an occasional treat, and not a weekly (or in many cases, daily) event. If you must go to a fast food place, order salads, fruit or other similar items. Avoid the burgers, fries or crispy chicken and opt for grilled chicken instead. And, instead of fries, choose apple slices or baked chips.

Tips for Getting Children to be Active:

Limit screen time - Today's' children spend on average 9 hours a day in front of a screen such as a TV, Computer, Phone, Tablet and of course Video Games. Limit them to no more than 2 hours a day and have them earn that time by first ensuring they get their "playtime" in.

**Set Goals** – Challenge your children by setting small goals for them to reach and then rewarding them with small items (NOT FOOD!). The goals can be anything such as hitting a number of steps per day, getting their chores done, or hitting x amount of "playtime"

**Get Moving** – Children and teens should get a MINIMUM of 60 minutes a day of exercise. While kids do take physical education in school, most school districts have curtailed the amount of time spent in gym class; many have either done away with it or are looking to. Add to it that "recess" time has been drastically reduced as well so that it is incumbent on the parents to make sure their children are active.



# Cosplay on Steam

is an alternative "futuristic past."

"It can be about the dark side of creation and contrast with that alluring elegance," said author Chris Stocking, whose books delve into the alternative universe. "It can be something like Cherie Priest's Boneshaker, which I believe takes place post WWI, to Joss Whedon's Firefly, which is some parts steampunk and other parts space western. Like I said, it's about pushing boundaries with specific criteria that really can't be defined. It's a baffling thing at times to have something so simplistic and

complicated all at once, but people have really taken hold of it and run with to create

> masterpieces and have exemplified true

craftsmanship."

Steampunk owes a lot of its aesthetic to "The Time Machine," said festival organizer Sue Dunckel, noting the Victorian era scenes from the 2002 Hollywood movie were filmed in the Collar City.

"This neighborhood where The Enchanted City takes place is literally the set for 'The Time Machine,'" Dunckel said. "It doesn't get much more steampunk than that. Troy, New York is steampunk."

Now in its third year, "The Enchanted City" is an urban street fair and spectacle of steampunk fashion, fantasy and fabrications that magically transforms the historic blocks of downtown Troy, N.Y. into a "cosplay" alternative reality where Victorian fancy meets modern technology. New additions this year include a "Troy Mini Maker Faire" and a \$4,000 Inventors' Challenge Prize.

"The Enchanted City is a real life fairy tale that you can experience and

even become a character in if you wish," said Dunckel of Sweet Sues sweet shop. "It's a steampunk Brigadoon that we wait for all year."

Attendance has grown with each year. One thousand revelers attended the first, rain-dampened festival in 2014., The following year, 4,000 people visited Troy to attend the festival. Now that word has started to get out to the steampunk community at-large, Dunckel said, she only expects that number to increase.

Fueling those aspirations is the festival's jump from late September to coincide with new student orientations at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and Russell Sage College.

A runway fashion show kicks things off Friday evening. The fashion show is part of a two-day collaboration with 2440 Design Studio to put the focus on designs for all occasions.

"As They Sew in France is a national-level premier Victorian and Edwardian

costume design house that was supplying opera houses and has now started to move more toward Victorian and steampunk festivals because the clothing is in demand," Aldrich said. "These garments are outrageous. You take the Victorian look, with a beautiful long gown, and you throw on a pair of welder's goggles from the 1920s, mix in a little Lolita, some cosplay and gear parts, and you crossover from Victorian to steampunk."

About a third of the designs for the runway show are men's clothing, but Aldrich notes steampunk is a fluid aesthetic that plays with traditional notions of gender styles.

"Women wear 'manly' vests and can look very feminine. Men wear ruffled blouses but they still look masculine," Aldrich said. "It's the perfect style for the now, because we are living in a society where gender fluidity is more in the forefront."

Dunckel said the popularity of the festival's costume contest in previous years prompted her to reach out to Aldrich to place a greater emphasis on high quality fashion.

"So many people come to The Enchanted City wearing incredible outfits that cost thousands of dollars. These are not just costumes meant to be worn once a year," Dunckel said. "There's a real desire for high quality steampunk styles that

can be integrated into the everyday wardrobe."

While Aldrich does not expect most people would sport the full steampunk look everyday, he said there are plenty of ways to work pieces of the style into one's wardrobe.

"You might not go to work decked out like our models, but you can take any one of the components -- the finger cuffs, the vest on the man, the corset on the woman -- and all the sudden you will have this elevated sense of style that is reminiscent of the steampunk aesthetic that can be worn in everyday

life," Aldrich said. "It's all about accessorizing to create a nod toward the look and lifestyle while still being able to function normally in everyday society."

The festival is free, and offers a family-friendly inspired day of music, games, performance, food and fantasy. Special events include a fashion show, historic tours, street performers and peddlers, storytelling, dancing, puppet shows, magic acts and more. 
