State of Bethlehem

Supervisor Clarkson talks projects and plans to preserve open spaces

BETHLEHEM — Expressing pride in past accomplishments and hope for future progress, town Supervisor John Clarkson gave his unscripted State of the Town address at Town Hall Tuesday, Jan. 10, marking his sixth annual address on the overall health and well-being of the Albany suburb.

Clarkson welcomed elected officials — including state Sen. Neil Breslin, Assemblywoman Pat Fahy, incoming Board Member Giles Wagoner and newly appointed Albany County Legislator Darrell Duncan (D-38) — various town employees, and thanked now-former Board Member Doris Davis for her service. Working from what he described as "rough notes," he then began his speech by wishing a happy new year to those in attendance and commenting on the success of the town's inaugural First Night event.

"It was a success and we are going


to do it again," he said, thanking his administrative assistant, Robin Nagengast, and a number of organizations that provided time, talent or resources. With approximately 2,000 participants, the event, which was Clarkson's idea, raised about \$3,000 for charity. The supervisor expressed a desire to improve upon future events, but called it "right-sized" and said the town is unlikely to grow them or extend the hours.

"Most important," said Clarkson of Bethlehem's first First Night, "is that I saw a lot of smiling faces."

Clarkson commented, generally, on the activist nature of Bethlehem residents and the state of political conversation at the national level, advising integrity and civility when engaging in that conversation and others like it. "In Bethlehem, we've avoided the sort of civic and public dysfunction you can see elsewhere," he said. For that, he credited those who work in service to the town, before going on to name a few of the newcomers who are expected to be



Cohoes man arrested in New Scotland for DWI

Coeymans man arrested for forging documents

NEW SCOTLAND

— On Monday, Jan. 9, New York State Police in New Scotland arrested Lawrence W. Black, 58, of Coeymans, for seconddegree forgery. Troopers reportedly stopped Black for failure to maintain his lane and having a license plate lamp out on Main Street in the Village of Ravena. Subsequent to the traffic stop, Troopers allegedly found a fraudulent New York State Inspection sticker on the front windshield and a pipe with marijuana on the dashboard. Troopers arrested Black for second-degree forgery of official documents, a felony, and unlawful possession of marijuana, a violation. Black was processed without incident, was arraigned in the Village of Ravena Court and remanded to Albany County Jail on \$5,000

bail. Black is due to appear in the Village of Ravena Court on Jan. 25.


Altamont man arrested for DWI and marijuana

An Altamont man was arrested following a traffic stop in Albany early in the morning on Sunday, Jan. 8. State Police from the Latham barracks reportedly found 25-year-old Quinn Murphy stopped in the driving lane of Interstate 90. Murphy was allegedly found to be intoxicated and was

arrested for DWI. Police report that he tested at a 0.14 percent BAC and that he was found with a rubber container, holding concentrated cannabis, known as "marijuana wax." He was also charged with criminal possession of a controlled substance in the seventh degree. Murphy was lodged in the Albany County Jail,

pending an appearance in the Albany City Court.

Town investigates multiple thefts

DELMAR —

Bethlehem Police are investigating a string of larcenies — including a car theft — that have victimized nearly a dozen residents.

In the past two weeks, Bethlehem Police have received calls of residents reporting thefts of CDs, GPS units and smaller items of value from their cars, said Commander Adam Hornick.

"These incidents have been in the area off of lower Kenwood Avenue, between Elsmere and Delmar bypass, and in the Old Delmar neighborhood, stated Hornick in an email to Spotlight News. "These thefts have all occurred in vehicles that were left unlocked in driveways and on the streets overnight."

Up until recently, the reports involved only small items, but that escalated when Bethlehem Police received the call of a stolen pickup truck Friday, Jan. 13.

According to Bethlehem Police, a 2016 Dodge Ram truck was stolen Friday between 1 and 8 a.m. while it was left parked on Ridge Road off of Kenwood Avenue in Elsmere. As of this time the vehicle has not been recovered and police are attempting to locate it.

The theft of a vehicle in New York state carries a felony charge punishable by up to four years in prison. The value of a vehicle can increase the severity of the crime. The price of a 2016 Dodge Ram truck is approximately \$32,000. For vehicles worth \$30,000

a criminal faces thirddegree felony larceny that is punishable by up to seven years in prison.

Hornick's reference to "Old Delmar" speaks of a popular residential area where turn of the century homes with rustic charms, award winning schools and lower propensity for crime have made for desirable real estate property. The newly opened Albany County Helderberg-Hudson Rail Trail has also become a selling point for recent residential development along Delaware Avenue. According to Zillow.com, the median home value in Delmar is \$255,000.

"We recommend that people always lock their vehicles overnight and keep all items of value out of sight," stated Hornick.

Landmark eatery closed, family illness

Community crowdfunding campaign helps popular ice cream parlor

- After three generations, a beloved ice cream shop is closed — indefinitely - and the owner who has struggled to keep the business afloat since his father's death is facing prohibitive hospital bills.

"It's really scary," said Toll Gate owner Rob Zautner's sister, Mary Zautner Smart. "It all just happened so fast."

According to Smart, her brother, the third Rob Zautner to own and operate Toll Gate Ice Cream since it opened in 1949, complained of not feeling well in the weeks leading up to his hospitalization. He was reluctant to see a doctor, she said, because he has been unable to afford health insurance.

Smart finally took Zautner to St. Peter's emergency room on Sunday, Jan. 8, to determine what was causing his stomach pains. Initially, doctors

believed it was intestinal cancer but ultimately diagnosed him with diverticulitis. A few days later, Zautner was rushed into emergency surgery after he went into septic shock due to a tear in his small intestine. According to his sister, his condition was still critical going into the weekend.

"Once my brother took over for my dad," said Smart, "he poured everything he had back into the business. The economy is different, you know, and

the business environment is different. There are less mom-and-pop operations. It's been difficult for him to keep up."The second Rob Zautner died in 2012, leaving the third Rob Zautner —who has worked there since childhood to take over the family business at the age of 50.

"He was there every day and he was managing everything," Smart said of her brother, "He was cooking, he was making the ice cream, he was managing the staff and buying all the

supplies."

Currently, there is no one else in the family with the time and energy necessary to run Toll Gate and so it has closed its doors for the foreseeable future. "He really is the heart and the soul at this point," said Smart.

"We're taking this opportunity to kind of go through some things and straighten up," she said. "Our first priority, though, is getting Rob healthy and back on his feet."

One major concern she has is how to pay for the care Zautner is receiving. To relieve some of the significant burden, she has started a GoFundMe page in hopes of crowd-sourcing financial help for the owner of the fondly regarded Bethlehem landmark. She said it wasn't an easy decision to make.

"It wasn't my first choice. I guess I'm old-school and

it felt to me like requesting charity," she said, explaining that she was eventually talked into starting the page by her husband and others after she felt as though she had no other options.

"So I figured we could see what happens." As of the morning of Monday, Jan. 16, the GoFundMe page had raised more than \$20,000 toward its \$50,000 goal — from 305 people in just two days. A number of donors have also left kind comments of support and reminiscence on the site.

"We are so grateful for the outpouring of love and support," Smart said. "The generosity is just incredible. I did not expect this kind of response.

"People that used to come here in the '50s have come back with their children, and then with their grandchildren and great-grandchildren," she said. "There really is a

tradition. I didn't realize how far-reaching it was until I wasn't working full-time and talked to more people out in the world and really started to realize how my dad and my brother have impacted the community."

Smart hopes that once the hospital bills are paid and Zautner's health has improved they will be able to turn their attention and — whatever finances remain — to the business of re-opening the family business.

"The employees," she said, "have been wonderful through all of this. We're really like a huge extended family and, even when they no longer work at Toll Gate, they like to come back and visit and reminisce....We hope that we can bring customers back in. Because they're not only customers; a lot of them have become friends and family."

Plans to improve Bethlehem Energy Center approved

BETHLEHEM — The New York State Board on Electric Generation Siting and the Environment has approved plans for energy efficiency improvements to Bethlehem Energy Center in Glenmont. The plant's owner, PSEG Power New York LLC, submitted the petition.

The initial certificate authorized PSEG Power to construct and operate the plant located at 380 River Road. The 750 megawatt dual-fuel fired electric generating facility commenced commercial operation on July 1, 2005.

The approved changes will allow for the replacement of certain components of the three combustion turbines and certain changes to related software programs. According to the Siting Board, the upgrades will result in very little, if any, impact on the environment or the surrounding community.

The only operational aspect of the proposed upgrades that required additional consideration, they said, is "potential operational noise level increases due to the additional output of the facility."

CDTA launches new payment system

ALBANY — Touting progress and partnership, the Capital District Transportation Authority (CDTA) launched its new \$10 million smart-card prepayment system, Navigator, on Thursday, Jan. 12, during a news conference at its headquarters. Employees, collaborators and officials gathered in the bus garage at 100 Watervliet Ave. decorated in blue and white for the event and snacked on popcorn and donuts as officials introduced Navigator and highlighted CDTA's tech trajectory.

"Over the past decade, CDTA's Board of Directors has set forth a vision for CDTA to be innovative, inclusive and to serve as an industry leader," said CDTA Board Chairman David Stackrow. "Today's announcement highlights one of the key projects in that vision. Our Navigator smart-card prepayment system is changing the way the Capital Region looks at

transit."

The Navigator system, which CDTA has been piloting for the last year, uses a durable plastic card onto which riders can pre-load bus fare. The card is waved over the bus farebox and the fare is automatically deducted. At \$1.30 per ride, Navigator users on the Pay-As-You-Go plan save \$.20 per ride and are only charged for a maximum of three rides per day. Alternately, Navigator users can choose to pay a flat \$65 for a month of unlimited riding under the Frequent Rider plan, which is essentially identical to CDTA's 31-Day Rolling Swiper card.

"We truly are a regional economy," said Mark Eagan, CEO of the Capital Region Chamber of Commerce, who noted that nearly \$30 billion has been invested into the region over the last decade. "CDTA has been a true leader and innovator in our community.

"Libraries are about the sharing economy," said Scott Jarzombek, executive director of Albany Public Library, which partnered with CDTA to test and retail the new system. "By partnering with CDTA to sell Navigator passes to bus riders, and giving numerous passes to our staff, the library was able to do social good while having a positive economic and environmental impact on the community.

"The fact that every one of our seven branches is on at least one CDTA bus line is important to our patrons," he said. "Many of the people who visit the library every day get there by bus. Allowing them to buy and replenish Navigator bus cards at our locations simply makes their life easier."

Currently, cards can be purchased and replenished at all Albany Public Library locations, as well as online, by phone, at CDTA's customer service center or at CDTA retail outlets, such as the Empire State Plaza Visitor Center and Gift Shop, Price Choppers in Bethlehem and Glenmont, and Regina Check Cashing locations in Albany, Troy and

Schenectady. Next fall, after pilot testing in the spring, CDTA expects to launch a smartphone app so that Navigator riders will be able to reload their cards from anywhere.

"We've come a long way in three decades," said CDTA CEO Carl Basile, who began his career with CDTA mapping bus routes 35 years ago. "The biggest change in my career at CDTA has been the infusion of technology and the way we've accepted it and rolled with it to help people who want our services and need our services." Gesturing around the spacious, well-lit bus garage, he said it hadn't always been that way. "Most of what you see around you is technology-driven.

"The diagnostic capabilities in our maintenance department are second-to-none in New York state, second-to-none in the country. The people here have an education

background, a technical background, a training background that we couldn't have even imagined 35 years ago."

CDTA now has more than 200 buses, each of which costs approximately \$450,000. "I'm often reminded," said Basile, "that, at the end of the day, this is still a business of tin cans on wheels. Technology drives it, but human beings are responsible for our success."

Basile concluded the press conference with a list other initiatives that CDTA users can expect to see in 2017: better bus

service; more bus service; a bike-sharing program; better oversight of local taxi services; transit centers in Troy, Schenectady and Albany; two BRT (bus rapid transit) lines to achieve their goal of 40 miles of BRT service throughout the region; new downtown shuttle service; more universal access partnerships and more.

"We accept the innovation challenge," he said. "I think our board relishes the innovation challenge. And I can tell you that our staff and employees are always looking to do more."

Committee seats filled

ALBANY — Last Wednesday, Albany County Legislature Chairman Sean Ward (D-16) announced a handful of personnel changes to the body's standing committees to fill vacancies resulting from the election of L. Michael Mackey to the state Supreme Court.

Mackey, a Democrat representing District 38 in Bethlehem and New Scotland, took his seat on the state bench Jan. 1. He was replaced by Democrat Darrell Duncan of New Scotland, a former Albany County public works commissioner who was appointed to the vacant seat and approved by members on Jan. 9 by a vote of 30-3. (Democrat Joanne Cunningham of Bethlehem

voted no. A resolution to appoint Republicanpreferred nominee Tim Stanton failed by a vote of 25-8.)

Ward announced the following committee changes would be effective immediately:

- Democrat Bryan Clenahan (D-30) has replaced Mackey as chairman of the Legislature's important Law Committee. Clenahan, an attorney, has represented residents in Guilderland since 2007. "Bryan is an extremely active and dedicated member of the legislature whose legal background makes him a strong choice to lead our Law Committee,"Ward said.
- Duncan was appointed to fill Mackey's seats on the Public Works and Court Facilities committees.

"Duncan's past experience leading the Albany County Public Works Department and New Scotland highway garage made him an ideal pick to serve on the two committees, and we look forward to benefiting from his expertise," said Ward.





TaxAide volunteers can't do estate or partnership returns, returns with rental income or returns requiring Schedule C (business returns with a net loss, inventory, employees, or expenses over \$25,000). Both taxpayers must be present if filing a joint return, except in case of illness or infirmity.

Disregard, for a moment, the town supervisor who announced this claim at a recent State of the Town address. January marks the time for each community leader to assess the successes and opportunities of the previous and present year, respectively.

Bethlehem Town Supervisor John Clarkson is to be attributed to the above statement. Whether the zip code on your incoming letters state Delmar, New Scotland, Colonie or Latham, we all benefit from living in a community with excellent town services and nationally recognized public schools. Nevertheless, it's not a time to rest on our laurels. To Clarkson's credit, he followed his observation with just that very statement.

She, too, oversees a town with award winning town services and admired public parks, but is nonetheless faced with the challenges of addressing traffic and continued development. Colonie's central location between the four cities of the Capital District — Albany, Schenectady, Troy and Saratoga Springs — forces the town to accommodate the needs of its residents, and a portion of the 200,000 people simply passing through. Still, when a town is able to wave such a flag that labels it the best community, it draws people to

Development has been an issue in Bethlehem. Residential projects are cropping along Delaware Avenue, Wemple Road, and everywhere else in between. Open land long appreciated by residents who have spent decades growing up and raising their own families here, have grown concern with losing what they consider home. More residents bring in more tax money into town government, but it adds stress on community services that enrich our neighborhoods, too.

The vocal majority is concerned about the preservation of our fortunate communities. New neighbors are welcomed, but town officials need to remain diligent preserving the character of our towns, and doing the best it can to maintain open space and public parks. The nuances of well-maintained sidewalks under mature trees that have lined our streets, is not an obstacle to progress. Being able to keep what generations of our townspeople have enjoyed and have come to expect from living in our hometowns is the definition of progress in an ever changing world.

10 years ago: a state wide pay raise

CAPITAL DISTRICT — Ten years ago, the minimum wage in New York State went from \$6.75 to \$7.15 an hour, and was considered to be the last stop in a process that hiked up the wage incrementally over a time span of three years.

According to a *SpotlightNews* article published in January of 2007, pending legislation federal legislation would have further bumped minimum wage up to \$7.25

The discussion then, as it is now with minimum wage increases, is whether or

not small businesses and restaurants will be adversely affected by the wage hike.

In 2007 however, local experts contended with the idea that a minimum wage hike would hurt establishments such as restaurants

"There doesn't really seem to be any evidence that the increase in the minimum wage has hurt the food service industry," Trudy Renwick, senior economist at the Latham office of the Fiscal Policy Institute said. According to Renwick, during the same year as the previous wage

hike in 2005, New York's small businesses experienced a 1.6 percent job growth, and the food service industry experienced a 2.7 percent job growth.

Further studies showed that job growth occurred much more quickly in certain state, such as New York, where the minimum wage was above the federal level.

But restaurant owners maintained that the wage hike would ultimately hurt their

Rick Sampson, then president and CEO of the New York State Restaurant

Association, said that when a wage increase affects the industry's bottom line, the only solution is to raise menu prices and, ultimately, cut back on the hours that are available to staff.

"The only thing that's important to us is not only the minimum wage going up, but that the minimum wage is going to the wrong people in the industry," Sampson said in the 2007 article.

Recently, the minimum wage went up to \$10 in Westchester County and Long Island, and \$9.70 in the rest of the state.

approved at tomorrow night's organizational Town Board meeting.

Financially, said Člarkson, the town has "achieved and been able to maintain structural balance." He pointed out Bethlehem enjoys the most comfortable financial position in the Capital District and said, while town finances may not be interesting, neither are they easy to manage. "It's about being able to do things," he said, "things like building sidewalks."

He discussed the various efforts made by the town in recent years to develop and implement a fiscally sound, transparent government — including securing two \$200,000 microenterprise grants, the first of which helped to support, or open in some cases, nine Bethlehem businesses. (The town is currently accepting applications from microenterprises, businesses with fewer than five employees, old or new, who are in need of additional capital or new equipment.)

"Agenda-setting," Clarkson said, however, "is really only a part of governance. In fact, it's not even the majority. Things happen that you didn't plan on, things happen that you have to take care of." Confessing a lack of experience in the area, Clarkson acknowledged, for example, that town residents are concerned about traffic safety, especially as it concerns cyclists and pedestrians. In response to that concern, he said, "now we have a group that meets that includes our police department, our planning department, our highway superintendent, a lot of other people."

Now, whenever an issue regarding traffic

safety is brought before the town, he said, "We get together and we try to look at it rationally. It's not always a 'yes.' People can ask for a stop sign and we may say, 'well, the engineering shows that it does not belong here." He pointed out the town has been responsive to speed limit concerns in some areas, saying that they were continuing to look at others for the same purpose.

Reducing excessive overtime is another area in which he touted success, noting that overtime costs, especially in law enforcement, were down, "dramatically," for the third consecutive year, due to successful contract negotiations and changes in management practices. "Sometimes some feathers are ruffled, "he said, "but we work through it."

At this point in his address, Clarkson began to look forward. "If we're not moving forward, we're not doing the job," he said. "We have a big year ahead."

He chose to highlight three major focuses going into the year: the town waterfront revitalization program; the Delaware Avenue enhancement project; and the preservation of open spaces.

Plans such as the Waterfront
Revitalization Plan enable the town to
receive funding for certain projects and,
said Clarkson, ensure that state and federal
government will consider the wishes of the
town when moving forward with projects
of their own. "I don't know what the final
waterfront plan will include yet," he said.
"We have a great group that's working on it
and they're doing a lot of interaction with
the citizens."

The planning process for the waterfront is expected to wrap up by this summer. As for the enhancement of Delaware Avenue, Clarkson warned this highly anticipated project will present its share of headaches He said construction will involve reducing traffic to one lane and additional disruptions.

"We're going to work with the state, who is overseeing this project, and with the merchants and do the best job we can, but there will be some interruption," said Clarkson.

The enhancement, said Clarkson, will include the rebuilding of the street and the infrastructure that lies beneath. "We will have a brand new street, brand new sidewalks — in some cases, where there weren't really sidewalks. We'll have parking bump-outs, we'll have pedestrian crossings, new lights, new street trees."

The town will do its best to keep affected residents informed regarding the project timeline, he said before moving on to the topic of open space preservation.

"Planning only works when the public is involved," Clarkson said moments later. "And open space planning and the discussion over what we should do is very much an interaction between the public and the town. We have a long history on this of not actually reaching a full consensus.

Clarkson cited conversations with not-for-profit groups such as Mohawk-Hudson Land Conservancy and Scenic Hudson, but Bethlehem has never opted to buy development rights to preserve open space. He said the town has come close to taking that step several times in the past and suggested the town would be taking bolder steps in that direction.

"We're one of three communities statewide, for example, that has a conservation easement program," he said, noting that Breslin and Fahy worked to make that possible. "That allows us to lower property taxes for owners who are willing to

give up development for at least 15 years," he explained. "It hasn't been a great success yet because of the 'opt-in' from the other taxing jurisdictions." Bethlehem Central School District opted in this year and Clarkson said, in the coming year, former Town Board member and current county Legislator William Reinhardt will be sponsoring the legislation that would allow the county to opt in as well.


"It won't cost county taxpayers anything," said Clarkson. "All it will do is just very, very slightly redistribute the amount that Bethlehem residents pay. We are willing, I think, to give up a very, very minor amount in our taxes to help landowners preserve their land and this does it without us paying out of pocket or raising the budget.

"But we also want to look at spending town money," he continued. "We've chipped up right to the edge of it and we want to look at going further." The town hopes to utilize the Community Conservation Act, Clarkson said, to adopt an open space plan that would include a local property transfer tax levy — subject to approval by voters. "So it would give us, not only a mechanism, but also a fund to deal with this, if we choose to do so

"We will pursue the legislation as we pursue the conversation with our residents," he said, before briefly mentioning the usefulness and fluidity of the town's comprehensive plan and recent changes to town zoning law.

"We're a fortunate community," he said in conclusion. "I think we all know that. And from those who are fortunate, much is and ought to be expected... We should never rest on our laurels or stop striving. I can promise you that I will not and I don't believe that this town ever will."

Living in a dream

Josh Carter explains the maturation of Phantogram's sound

osh Carter has been traveling the world so much that he dreams of being on the road. "My girlfriend said to me the other day that I was sleep talking, and I was saying something about being in Singapore," said Carter. "I've never been to Singapore."

Give Carter and Sarah Barthel — better known as fast-rising alternative electronic pop group Phantogram — enough time and they may yet reach Singapore.

The duo from Greenwich recently wrapped up five months of constant touring in support of its new album, "Three," with a series of East Coast club shows, including a sold-out show Saturday, Jan. 14 at Upstate Concert Hall in Clifton Park.

"I used to go to Hatebreed shows at Northern Lights (what Upstate Concert Hall used to be called,)" said Carter in a phone interview from Los Angeles, where he now lives. "I was really into hardcore back then."

There is a harder edge

to Phantogram's songs than when Carter and Barthel started out as Charlie Everywhere in 2007. The breathy vocals and electronic soundscapes featured in early songs such as "Mouthful of Diamonds" and "When I'm Small" have been replaced with big beats and in-yourface vocals, as found in more recent hits as "Black Out Days," "Fall in Love" and "You Don't Get Me High Anymore."

Carter said the change to a more aggressive sound was fueled in part by audience reaction to the band's shows early in their career.

"I can't cite a specific moment, but I remember people saying to us, 'I love the music, but I can't understand any of your lyrics because they were so buried in the mix," said Carter. "So, I think it's a combination of playing live shows and gaining confidence."

Carter also said collaborating with other artists helped Phantogram grow. A guest appearance on Big Boi's 2012 solo album "Vicious Lies and Dangerous Rumors" led to a full-blown side project with the Outkast rapper called Big Grams that led to an EP in 2015. Phantogram also appeared on The Flaming Lips' tribute album to The Beatles' "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band" - 2014's "With a Little Help from My Fwends" where Carter and Barthel tackled "She's Leaving

"It's been so much fun. It's also been a learning experience," said Carter. "Collaborating and playing music with others is always a good thing because you learn so much."

Having the chance to work with Big Boi on Big Grams has been a dream for Phantogram, said Carter.

"We were heavily influenced by Outkast. In fact, Sarah and I call ourselves Aquemini (a title of a 1998 Outkast album) because Sarah is an Aquarius, and I am a Gemini," said Carter. "We loved Outkast because it seemed like the sky was the limit for them. They could do something like a gangsta rap on one song, and then they'd have this cheerlead-y pop song like

'Hey Ya."

Phantogram's own discography maps out the direction the band has been heading. "Eyelid Movies" in 2010 — their first release for indie label Barsuk Records was an expansion of its self-released EP from the previous year, which included "Mouthful of Diamonds." In 2011, they released the EP "Nightlife," which saw the beginning of the band's transition from shoegazing electronic music to more sampleheavy hooks, as found on "Don't Move."

A couple of years later, Phantogram moved to Republic Records — a division of Universal Music Group that features artists such as Ariana Grande, Nicki Minaj and Drake, among others. The group's first album for Republic, 2014's "Voices," brought their music to a more mainstream audience around the world. They started making regular appearances on such shows as "The Tonight Show with Jimmy Fallon,""Jimmy Kimmel Live" and "The Late Show with David Letterman."

"Three" marked another

transition for Phantogram. The band exclusively worked with an outside producer for the first time, as Ricky Reed took the controls on the album. Outside songwriters including the-Dream and Tricky Stewart also collaborated on the album.

Reviewers had mixed feelings about "Three," but Carter said the album is part of Phantogram's continued growth.

"We're not David Bowie. We're not as brilliant as he," said Carter. "But if we can have that one moment like David Bowie had with 'The Thin White Duke' and 'Ziggy Stardust,' that would be awesome."

And as it edges closer to mainstream success, Phantogram is proving that a Capital District band can have an international following.

"I'm proud and happy to represent our home area," said Carter. "It's a testament that you don't have to be from New York City or Los Angeles or Austin or San Francisco to be successful."

Young phenom in control of icon

Teenager drives famed Grave Digger truck this season

ALBANY — At 19, Tyler Menninga is realizing a dream that few can claim.

The Monster Jam series driver entered his second year on the circuit earlier this month, yet it's the first time he will climb behind the steering wheel of the sport's most iconic vehicle, Grave Digger.


"Grave Digger has always been a favorite of mine," said Menninga, speaking about growing up as a fan of Monster Jam.

Today, Grave Digger is a household name. That's due in part to the longevity of the Anderson family, the team's owner, who celebrates their 35th anniversary this year. Another factor that led to the brand's success is the tenacity of

its original driver, Dennis Anderson.

Anderson built the first Grave Digger by adding tractor wheels to the body of a 1951 Ford panel truck for mud bogging. As the story goes, Anderson was often on the receiving end of verbal jabs from other drivers who incorporated modern and, for competition sake, lighter truck models. He supposedly said, I'll take that truck and dig

your grave with it. Whether he said that or not, Anderson style of driving supports the claim. In a sport that demands speed, power and a penchant for auto-mechanical acrobatics, Grave Digger earned the crowd's admiration. Anderson's aggressive style often produced spectacular crashes, and short-lived runs during shows. Nevertheless, Grave Digger earned a following that rivaled



"Dennis [Anderson] has created what Monster Jam is," said Menninga. "This sport wouldn't be without Dennis Anderson. He's created such a legacy. This




being the 35th anniversary and me hopping into the Grave Digger truck this year, it's a tall order. We've got quite the fan base to keep happy this year. We want to do good for them each and every time we go out there on that track."

This year, Albany is going to see something different out of the competition when the tour roars into the Times Union Center Saturday, Jan. 21 and Sunday, Jan. 22. The tour promises to test the versatility of each driver as they go head-to-head in seven different competitions, driving three different vehicles — trucks, speedsters and ATVs. Drivers battle for points in both racing and freestyle events, and the point leader from each tour receives a bid to the Monster Jam World Finals.

Nevertheless, the entertainment still

involves the famed trucks, altered in both size and strength to such an extreme they're called "monsters." Custom built engines that bristle and growl burn up to 10 liters of methanol per 80 meters, providing 1,500 horsepower. With each vehicle required to be on tires no shorter than 66 inches in height, drivers operate vehicles equivalent to the size of a two-story detached garage. When that garage holds years of Monster Jam accolades and 35 years of brand recognition, it can be daunting for a young driver

"[I'm] a little bit nervous," admits Menninga. "So long as I can go out there and put a smile on every fan's face every night, that's all that matters. Win, lose or draw, if I can get out of that truck happy, I know the fans are happy."

Music to move you

Amy Helm wants to see people dancing in the aisles when she returns to the Cohoes Music Hall Saturday

COHOES — Amy Helm has a wish for her return to the Cohoes Music Hall Saturday, Jan. 21, at 8 p.m.

"We want the dancers to come out," said Helm in a recent phone interview from her home in Woodstock. "We had a handful of dancers last time, so I'm hoping for more this time."

Helm was the first musician to play a show at the Cohoes Music Hall when it reopened last year, after the Palace Theatre took over operating the Vaudeville-era theater on Remsen Street.

"I loved it," said Helm of her first experience in the 300-seat, two-tiered theater. "It's a very interesting space."

Helm is embarking on a short tour around the Northeast that will take her from Cohoes to New York City, Plattsburgh and New Jersey over the next seven days. Among the shows on this short tour is a performance at a Leonard Cohen tribute concert on Jan. 24 in Brooklyn alongside such performers as Josh Ritter, Lucy Wainwright Roche and Teddy Thompson.

For her Cohoes show, Helm will be joined by her band, the Handsome Strangers, and opening act Eastbound Jesus, a Capital District-based Americana group.

Helm said she's been observing the music scene in both the Capital District and the mid Hudson River Valley for a while, and she's been impressed with the depth of talent.

"Not long ago, I went down to Quinn's in Beacon ... and I watched Connor Kennedy, Andy Stack and Lee Falco — with a special guest — do a set of music that would blow you away," said Helm. "And they're all young and from around (the Woodstock region)."

These have been interesting days in Helm's life, too. There has been a revival of interest in The Band — which featured her late father, Levon Helm, on drums and lead vocals — on the 40th anniversary of the release of "The Last Waltz," the album and documentary film about

the group's final concert in 1976. A super group featuring guitarist Warren Haynes, keyboardist/vocalist Michael McDonald, former Radiators lead singer Dave Malone, Dumpstaphunk leader Ivan Neville, pianist and Hudson River valley resident John Medeski and more will be playing Feb. 2 at the Palace Theatre. (An interview with Medeski will be featured in an upcoming edition.)

"I think it's wonderful, I think it's fantastic and I think it's important for this music to be reintroduced to the public," said Helm.

Helm doesn't shy away from playing her father's music from his days in The Band during her shows.

"I always try to do a few songs that dive back to my father," said Helm. "My father is very present in my shows because some of my songs are ones that he taught me how to play when I was younger, and some are The Band's songs."

Helm also continues to run Levon Helm Studios in Woodstock — a venue created inside a barn where the audience sits around the

"It's got a very warm and inviting vibe, and the relationship between the performers and the audience is very intimate," said


But for Helm herself, there is nothing compared to the thrill she

Inally, it is January. The ✓ year is new. The hectic holiday excitement is behind us. We make resolutions and quickly forget them. Here are six changes you can use to increase your health, energy and positive attitude to help you stay the course and keep those promises that you've made to

Cultivate an attitude of gratitude

It is a tiny shift in perception, but seeing what you do have, as opposed to what you do not have, shifts your awareness from seeing yourself as a victim of your sad circumstances to feeling appreciative and blessed. Feeling that you are missing out, instead of realizing that you have enough, is a trap. Feeling gratitude is exhilarating. Being

in the present moment is being fully alive. Often we are stuck in a circling worrying, regretting past events and fearing the future. These obsessive thoughts are like thick smog that eclipses what is happening right now. It is as if you crawled under the covers and emerged years later — you realize that you missed mostly everything. 

ast week I talked about making New Year's Resolutions and how to succeed finally when you make one.

After reading it, a client sent me an email. In it she

"Every year, I make a resolution to lose weight and this year is no exception. Last year, I promised myself I'd lose 30 pounds. In the first couple of weeks, I lost about five and then I got busy and gave up. Instead of losing 30 pounds, I actually ended up gaining, and now I weigh about 10 pounds more than I did last January. It's so frustrating! I really want to succeed this year. What is the No. 1 thing I can do to help me stay on track and get the weight off.

You see, I've been there. At one time I tipped the scales at over 400 pounds and it wasn't until I got serious about getting it off that I actually lost the weight.

First off, motivation wasn't Nancy's problem. She knew she needed to get the weight off for health reasons, and she seemed determined to do so. I asked her what she kind of obstacles she struggled with in the past.

"I'm just too busy. I promise myself that I'm going to exercise and eat right but after a couple of weeks, I

end up being too tired to go to the gym, and I just don't have the time or energy to cook something healthy when I get home from work. So, I usually hit the drive thru or order something.

The truth is we are all busy.

Back when I lost my weight, I worked about 75 hours a week, raised a family of six, and played football. I could have easily said: "I'm too busy" and I told her that. I also said: "There are 168 hours in a week can you commit to giving just five of them to your health."

She paused, and said,

"Awesome," I replied. I then said: You asked me in your email what is the No. 1 thing you could do to help stay on track and get the weight off. You also said you struggle with energy and eating healthy — which is 80 percent of the battle when it comes

to losing weight. So the answer to your question is very simple. You need to meal prep. And it will only take you two of those five

Meal prep involves preparing all your meals in advance. It's something I started doing years ago and my wife and I continue to do so to this very day.

Here's what we do. On Friday or Saturday, we plan our meals for the week. Now that we've been doing this for years, we spend less than 10 minutes total doing it. Many people try to figure out the entire week in detailed precision. There is nothing wrong with that, in fact, I highly recommend that if you can do so. But, to be honest, it's not necessary. My wife and I keep it very simple. Most weeks we pick one or two recipes and decide what else we'd like to have during the week. In our case we decide on our proteins, and what veggies

we want.

From there we go buy what we need.

At first you should make a list and stick to it, but after a while you can get a feel for what you need and maybe even make an impulse purchase that falls into your meal plan.

Then on Sundays, we do all our cooking for the entire week at one time. We cook all our meats and side dishes at the same time, then portion them into meal containers. We find it helps eliminate the excuse of being too busy to cook. Now, instead of coming home and being too tired to cook, we just grab a container, put it in the microwave, and dinner is done.

Instead of trying to

find time to make a good lunch in the morning, grab a container and put it in a lunch bag. Too busy to make breakfast? Put the container in the microwave and have a healthy breakfast. No need to hit the drive-thru, no temptation to pick up the phone and order a pizza. No stressing over what to make for dinner. It's all done! Not only that, you'll be better equipped to portion control when you're making up the meals by weighing and measuring it all before you put it into the container thus reducing the chance of overeating.

As mentioned earlier, when it comes to getting weight off 80 percent of the battle is in the kitchen. And, in my experience, it's


the very first thing people give up on.

If you're truly serious about being successful on your fitness journey, you need to focus on your nutrition and the best way to do that is to plan. Try pre-making your meals and having them available to just grab and go and your chances of success will skyrocket!

Oh, one other bonus I forgot to mention. You'll spend less on food, because you won't be buying junk or spending money eating out. Laurie and I average less than \$100 a week on groceries for both of us!

Oblivion Saints' 'Songs of the Doomed'

blivion Saints is a hard rock trio out of Troy that sports the look of the Blues Brothers but evokes the sound of the late Lemmy Kilmister.

Certainly a music review should not involve, let alone begin with, a band's appearance, but there is a compliment to be shared here. Upon opening the jewel case for the band's debut CD "Songs for the Doomed," you lift the disk and are gifted with the image of Carl Schultz, Robo and Dave Wayne standing stoically together in black suit and tie, dark

sunglasses and fedoras (or top hat, in Wayne's case). With neck ties eschewed, the boys give you a hint that there's something more than meets the eye.

At first glance, "Songs for the Doomed" may mislead you as a bunch of heavy metal tracks dressed with the cover image of an anguished, outstretched hand thrust in front of what looks to be an artistically interpreted pentagram. Hard rocking? Yes. Metalcore? Thankfully, no. If you immediately start thinking of Lemmy on the opening track, "One Way," there's good reason. Though this is the newly branded group's debut album, the trio has spent the last six years covering Motorhead

under the name Motorhome. Whether you draw that connection or not, Schultz' course delivery of his vocals lends a welcoming touch to these original tracks

is a 23-minute sprint through eight, eighth-beat tracks. There is no flash or embellishment. Robo's guitar solos are kept brief, and there is only a slight variation from song to song. Nonetheless, Oblivion Saints sneaks a decent garage rock CD into the listener's hands, and there is some modest talent behind each track's lyrics. Listeners are treated with the

most variance at the meat of the album, starting with the third track "The Final Year." "Draw The Line" and "Outta Line" helps encapsulate the band's range in musicianship.

Even if you mistakenly judged Saints as a metalcore band, you'll find yourself banging your head by the time Schultz rips into the chorus for "The Final Year."

Theo Katzman's 'Heartbreak Hits'

LP titled "Heartbreak Hits," the follow up to his 2011 release, "Romance without Finance." This latest work oozes heartache, with Katzman's youthful vocals lamenting the loss of a lover. The songs evoke the agony of painful breakups, and might even open old wounds for some listeners, but they're delivered with such gripping soul, that most won't even think to press pause.

The album kicks off in rock ballad fashion, akin to the likes of '70s icons The Eagles. Katzman confirmed on his crowdfunding album campaign that the band did in fact lend inspiration. Wailing guitar on album opener "Hard Work" shocks the eardrums to life before Katzman's breathy pop vocals attempt to make sense of a failed relationship. People will go the extra mile for someone they love, and with pragmatically comical lines like "I held your hair back when you had too much to drink/ I used my bare hands to unclog that bathroom sink" and "When

you got depressed and your mind was on the brink/ I peeled you off the floor and drove you to a shrink" it's easy to see how a guy thinks he's earned his keep.

"Breakup Together" is sweet on the ears, but the melodic sing-songy quality carries Katzman's tenderly brooding words as he laments, "we used to make love together, now we break up together." Trilling backup vocals follow this somber sentiment. The silver-tongued harmonies call to mind that flock of helpful songbirds chirping away in Snow White, but instead of helping the fair maiden do laundry, they perch on Katzman's shoulders and chime in as he mopes (understandably) in a corner.

"Crappy Love Song" supplies some of the most gut-tickling harmonies on the album before "My Heart is Dead" goes nineties angst as Katzman pouts, "My heart is dead girl/ It doesn't beat no more." "Good to be Alone" presents a sobering, understated country folk charm replete with slide guitar. A more earnest tone on this number replaces Katzman's raspy pop attitude found throughout much of the album. Lyrics seeking the silver lining of reclaimed independence in the wake of a breakup, he attempts to convince himself,

"No one to scratch you down your back/ No one to cut you any slack/ You got to scratch it on your own/ It's good to be alone."

"Lost and Found" staccato style drums, guitar and vocals add a bouncy feel, revisiting the lively pop realm before "My 1-Bedroom" finds Katzman dreamily fantasizing about the prospect of sharing his small dwelling with a significant other, nearly whispering the lyrics with stripped down instrumental accompaniment.

Already the album has led the listener on a roller coaster ride, each song undulating along the spectrum of sadness and

resentment, lyrics spiced with cynicism. "As the Romans Do" injects some steam into the track list with powerhouse pop vocals and pounding drums. This song in particular demonstrates the skillful subtleties in Katzman's singing ability, especially through the lines "I bid a fond farewell to my bestest friends/ I packed my possessions in a Uhaul then/I sailed like a sailor to the promised land."

"Love is a Beautiful Thing" mellows the track list again with soft jazz guitar, muted drums and light piano laced with Katzman's delicate falsetto. The words convey a familiar scenario in breakups: the pain of seeing an ex-lover involved with someone else when you're still hurting. He sings, "Love is a beautiful thing/ Hugging, kissing, laughing, holding hands/ Love is a beautiful thing/ Unless it's you loving another man." After this song the listener almost surely feels as if Katzman has beaten them over the head with such relentless harping on the same themes of loss, yet by sticking so loyally to this theme, he has created a very real portrayal of the cyclical thought patterns one experiences in a breakup. "Plain Jane Heroin" rounds out the ten-track album on a somber note, ending the album on a bit of a cliché, comparing the allure of a woman to the addictive nature of heroin.

Katzman has crafted a string of songs that thoroughly display the breadth of his vocal ability. The rawness of the lyrics suggest Katzman might have actually had his heart recently ripped from his chest

by whichever woman called it splitsville. While profit from fresh heartbreak is a form of sweet songwriting revenge, it doesn't appear that a recent tragic breakup is the essence of inspiration. Katzman stated in his album campaign, "I started writing songs, and found myself exploring different angles of letdown/loss of expectation/heartbreak: My own personal experiences, as well as the extrapolation of those experiences into my imagination." Nevertheless, nearly anyone can empathize with "Heartbreak Hits" sentiments, and dance, rage or cry to the album at their discretion.

The album was recorded by Tyler Duncan at The Barber House, mixed by Duncan and mastered by Devin Kerr. Cover photo by Claire Marie Vogel and album artwork by Robert Lester. Musicians contributing to the album include: Joe Dart (Fender bass), Woody Goss (piano, Wurlitzer electric piano on "Break Up Together"), Laura Mace and Mike G: (omni backing vocals), Lee Pardini: (Wurlitzer electric piano), Drew Howard: (pedal steel guitar) and Brett Farkas: (additional electric guitar on "As the Romans Do").



quoting then-lead singer Peter Case. "I think it still stands up. It was a big blast of pain and alienation set to a rock 'n' roll beat."

The rest of the world would later hear the song featured on the Nicholas Cage cult classic film, "Valley Girl." The song seemed to fit well with the teenaged love story of a girl falling in love with the kind of guy of whom her friends would disapprove. You can even catch glimpses of the band performing the song in the movie.

"We were hugely popular then," said Plimsouls guitarist Eddie Munoz, adding the band had already amassed a following on the West Coast with lots of radio time, and was playing gigs throughout the Los Angeles music scene. Before the movie exposed the band to a larger mainstream audience, Munoz toured along with Elvis Costello and the Rockpile, and the band shared gigs with The Fleshtones. "We were looking to parlay that into a bigger thing."

In 1983, The Plimsouls signed a record deal with Geffen Records.

It seems like a million miles away, but the trajectory of the band's popularity climbed up steeply since forming in 1978. It helped define the power pop sound out of California that immediately followed the punk music that originated in England, and spread out from New York City.

Munoz cut his teeth playing guitar in the emerging music scene of Austin, Texas, developing that "hot guitar" sound Mednick had described. In the mid-'70s, punk rock was starting to take a hold on the underground scene, said Munoz. In a town where only two types of music - Country and Western played on the radio, records of the New York Dolls, Blondie and the Ramones started to influence on local musicians.

"Everyone was getting into the imports from England and The Ramones record kind of came out the year before that," said Munoz. "Everybody was getting excited about that stuff. So, we said, 'Hey, man. Let's do our own thing.'

It's right up our alley. It was kind of an organic movement. Of course, it was totally inspired by what people were doing on the East and West coasts, and overseas. Definitely a fun scene in Houston. Dallas had one. But, the really cool one was in Austin. That was a very coherent scene."

Munoz played guitar for The Skunks in 1978, where he earned the nickname "Fazz" Eddie, a play on Paul Newman's "Fast Eddie" character from the 1961 film, "The Hustler." The three-piece band debuted in February of that year, and quickly became a popular draw in the live music capital of the world. The band cut a record later in the year, just before "Fazz" Eddie hopped a ride to Southern California.

"Yeah, I spent a year and then I moved on out to California with my thengirlfriend and some other people," said Munoz. "At that time, I knew nothing was gonna happen in Austin for, really, anyone. Nobody from that club scene made it with their bands. Maybe with other bands after that. Austin started getting more attention, actually, after I left. But, the scene grew

really fast while I was there. It was pretty cool. It was way cool. There were some great bands. Great bands. And, even better bands came out after I left. It served its purpose. A lot of really great musicians came out of that."

The Skunks remained together, replacing Munoz at guitar and later became one of the first Austin punk bands to tour nationally. It would play in New York City's CBGB's and Max's Kansas City, opening for many of the bands that had influenced them. The Skunks were inducted into the Austin Music Hall of Fame in 2008.

Once Munoz arrived in California, he hooked up with Case, Dave Pahoa and Louie Ramirez.

"Actually, I was at the first Plimsouls rehearsal," said Munoz. "The band didn't even have a name, at all. We just bashed out some stuff. Then, I went out on the road with Elvis Costello and Rockpile. When I came back in September, we started to work out some songs and I played my first show in October. Actually, maybe late September."

The Plimsouls' popularity took off throughout Los

Angeles and, by 1980, it was signed to Best Records. That relationship produced a five-track EP titled "Zero Hour," which earned generous playtime on local radio stations. By the following year, the band signed with Planet Records, who had a distribution agreement through Elektra.

Through Planet,
The Plimsouls released
the 11-track album
"Everywhere at Once" in
1983, featuring its hit single,
"A Million Miles Away."

Despite the attention they were getting, or perhaps because of it, The Plimsouls broke up that same year.

"Unfortunately, wrong decisions were made," said Munoz. "Which is pretty common for young bands." Munoz refrained from pointing fingers and casting blame for the split, instead he explained it in terms of an attitude: "Just, certain people get bored and want to do other things. So all the attention drops from keeping the band together."

Case struck out on his own, releasing a solo album through Geffen Records in 1986, from which he garnered a Grammy nomination. He's since earned critical acclaim from Bruce Springsteen and Robert Palmer. When Munoz was asked about Case's current involvement with the band, he said "not at all."

"He more or less blew the whole thing off a long time ago," said Munoz.

Today, Munoz lives on the New Jersey coast. ("I met a Jersey Girl," he said.) And, when he's not playing reunion gigs as The Plimsouls Re-souled, he plays with his band, The Split Squad. Despite the years that have past, Munoz said he and the band continue to play the music "loud."

"This is the Second Coming of The Plimsouls," said Munoz, who now plays with Bryan Malone, Teff Walls and Rick West. (Dave Pahoa and Clem Burke, who occasionally play with the new line-up, will not be at The Hangar.) "It's totally different. . . . I can't go out there and do the Holiday Inn version of The Plimsouls. ... We're favorably in line with the mid-period of The Plimsouls, when we started really, really getting it together."

Finding energy

Deep breathing initiates rest and recovery. Deep breathing supports digestion. Deep breathing wakes up the brain and every cell in our body. So, as a practical practice try this: exhale as you pull in your belly button, a complete exhale invites a full inhale. Then, breathe in as if you were smelling the sweetest fragrance. A few deep and slow breaths can reignite energy and motivation. Yogis do not measure a life spans in years, but rather, in the number of breathes we take.

Stretch, stretch and then stretch some

Stretching increases flexibility and invites relaxation. Stretching is a natural reflex. It is strange that we do not stretch more often, but the sad truth is that we barely stretch at all. So take some time to lengthen your body, extend your arms and move to your full range of movement. Flex and extend your joints. A familiar and easy way to stretch is a short sequence called cat-cow. While on all fours, arch your back like a cat as you exhale and inhale as you reverse the movement and let your spine drop. This movement is grounding and calming. It both extends and contracts your spine and it creates deep breathing. Repeat five times counting each inhale, exhale to the count of four, and then extend to six. This will help with spine stiffness and back pain. Plan to take a few minutes, during the day and night, to stretch. You will release tension and feel extravagantly luxurious.

Reduce and eliminate judgment from your observations and thinking

We tend to get into what I think of as a rut in our thinking. That is, we are

always judging. We see someone and we immediately form an opinion, we think that this person is lazy, that politician is stupid, that boss is crazy and our relatives are hopeless. We think of ourselves as smart, efficient and responsible for the survival of our household and workplace, when in fact, we are not the prime mover. The earth will revolve and the sun will rise without our input and judgment. In our world of Facebook, Twitter and Instagram, we are bombarded with so many disturbing images. We do not need to comment on everything. We can reserve our judgment and our nervous systems will thank us.

The sympathetic nervous system has short neurons that make possible quick responses to perceived threats. The body becomes mobilized to fight or take flight. Breathing rate increases, the heart pounds, adrenaline increases, cortical is released and vigilance intensifies. Yoga methods reestablish homeostasis and return the body to a rest and restore mode by triggering the parasympathetic nervous system. Slower breathing lowers the heart rate and blood pressure. Balance and calm counterbalances the stress response.

Yoga is a process that helps because when the relaxation response is activated; neuro-chemicals are released that quiet the mind. The brain is hardwired to concentrate on one thing at a time. Concentrating on deep breathing or doing a pose resolve episodes in a shorter time. While, yoga is not an instant fix, the benefits are enormous. Yoga practice is not psychoanalysis or counseling, but it is a caring and non-judging environment.






