New Bethlehem HS principal talks about educating youth and his path to the principal's office

never meant to go into education," said David Doemel, " Jr., the interim principal at Bethlehem Central Middle School who will take over as the new principal at the high school at the

beginning of next year. Initially, he said, he intended to be a journalist. For those who have seen him in his natural habitat, however, it's hard to imagine that Doemel could have ended up anywhere other than where he is or doing anything other than what he's doing. For those of us who remember middle school as a social torture chamber overseen by a bored and demoralized faculty, it's nothing short of revelatory to see how education has evolved at the hands of passionate educators like Doemel, who considers it his responsibility to help his students develop strong characters, in addition to the more common goals of gaining knowledge and learning life skills.

"Kids have so much pressure," Doemel

community once they're out in the world."

Doemel, 37 years old, attended elementary school in North Colonie in the '80s and went to high school at Christian Brothers Academy (CBA), where Doemel Sr. is a guidance counselor and coach. By the time he graduated from St. Bonaventure University in 2001, he said he thought he would find a job in advertising. In the chaos following 9/11, however, he had a difficult time gaining entry into the field and began helping his father coach basketball at CBA to keep himself occupied and stay active.

That, he said, is where it all began. Everyone in Doemel's family is in education: his father; his mother, an art teacher at Holy Names; all four siblings, three sisters and a brother; and his wife, a teacher at Slingerlands Elementary School. It was a reason he gave for eschewing that particular career track earlier in life. "I wanted to not do what my parents did," he said. But it was while coaching with his father that he found he had not only a love of working with kids, but an innate knack for it.

Making the rounds

Bethlehem board votes to recollect

DELMAR — Bethlehem homeowners can expect property appraisers, sent by the town, to come calling at their door some time during the next four years — exactly when they should expect it depends on where they live.

The appraisers, from GAR Associates out of Amherst, will want to come in and confirm the square footage of any habitable structures, as well as the number of rooms, bathrooms and half-bathrooms (three-quarter bathrooms, it seems, are no longer recognized for purposes of assessment.) They will also want to take a photograph and create a "digital sketch" of the property.

According to Town Assessor Laurie Lambertsen, Bethlehem had 12,551 residential properties on the rolls in 2016, but can't be entirely sure what those properties are worth. "Our inventory is off," she told board members at the March 22 Town Board meeting, before they voted 4-1 to approve her request to undertake a town-wide "residential assessment inventory recollection project."

"The last time the [residential] inventory was re-collected, measured, was in the '91-'92 reval[uation]," said Lambertsen. "So, it's been a long time... Our residential really should be done and brought up to speed. We're now going into digital sketches and we can't really move forward with that based on old inventory."

The inventory update plan would utilize GAR, already under contract to do assessment work for the town, to accomplish the town-wide valuation in four regional phases over four years — North Bethlehem would be completed in 2017, Old Delmar in 2018, Glenmont in 2019 and South Bethlehem/Ravena Coeymans Selkirk in 2020. Each region has a little more than 3,000 residential properties, with the most — 3,313 parcels — in North Bethlehem.

"Does assessing this data require going into every house," asked Supervisor John Clarkson.

"Well, that the goal," said Lambertsen, explaining that qualified appraisers are more accurate and have a better grasp on the necessary terminology than the typical homeowner. "People think they still have three-quarter bathrooms," she said. "Either it's a full or it's a half. Three-quarter was an '80s term, I believe."

Board member Julie Sasso asked Lambertsen what the reappraisals might do to property tax assessments and questioned the four-year time frame, suggesting that immediately adjusting taxes to erroneously assessed properties could result in an unfair advantage for some property owners — for instance, undervalued properties in South Bethlehem would pay lower taxes four years longer than residents of North Bethlehem.

Agreeing that was a valid concern, Clarkson noted that it cut both ways — North Bethlehem residents with overvalued property would be able to lower their tax rate four years before South Bethlehem residents.

"I was under the impression that the process was going to be to get the data in correctly, but that changes weren't going to happen until there was a townwide reassessment so it was equitably distributed," said Sasso.

Lambertsen initially implied that an immediate adjustment would only be necessary if the property was grossly mis-valued, but later said she would elect to follow recommendations put forth by the state Office of Real Property, which, apparently, advises timely reporting of erroneous property values. 
All-you-can-eat pancake breakfast

Kayak rental hub approved for Henry Hudson Park

GLENMONT -Henry Hudson Park will have kayaks available for paddling on the neighboring Hudson River this summer, after the Town Board unanimously approved a proposal put forth by Parks and Recreation Administrator Nan Lanahan. The unstaffed "rental hub," operated by Upstate Kayak Rentals, will be located near the park's new kayak launch, which was installed last August.

A new concept, the rental hub will consist of a rack of approximately six locked kayaks, with paddles and floatation devices, available to rent to the public seven days a week

May through October
 for two hour intervals
 (weather permitting).
 Renters reserve kayaks, two at a time, by contacting
 Upstate Kayak Rentals
 through their website or by phone. They then download an app to their smartphone that will unlock the kayaks
 when they are within approximately ten feet of

the hub. "It's kind of like Uber Kayak," commented Supervisor John Clarkson. "Or like a bike share," agreed Upstate Kayak

Rentals' Donna Larkin. Under the agreement, the vendor will provide a comprehensive insurance policy to protect the town against liability. Larkin assured the board that they were also creating safety signage to post at the site warning kayakers of potential dangers such as shifting currents and tides. The two-kayak minimum on rentals is also intended to promote safety by

discouraging kayakers from going out alone.

"Safety is a concern for everyone," said Larkin, who also currently operates a staffed kayak rental business in Waterford where the Erie Canal meets the Hudson River. "It is strongly recommended that you have some boating experience or at least watch some [informational] videos."

Upstate Kayak will be responsible for all rental equipment, but the town has reserved the right to inspect that equipment and remove anything suspected to be unsafe. "I think this will be a great partnership," said Lanahan. "It gives people an opportunity who don't own their own kayak to give it a try."

"We have all of these beautiful waterways," said Larkin. "And they're unexplored and untapped unless you own a boat."

Until now, that is.

Two-hour rentals will cost \$50, or \$25 per kayak. For larger parties of 10 or more, Upstate Kayak can also deliver kayaks to Henry Hudson Park or other Capital District locations.

he prospect of having a property appraiser knocking on our doors, we imagine, would go over about as well as an impromptu visit from our in-laws. Both are uninvited. Both cause stress. And, likely, both situations have little thought invested in you, specifically. Instead, it's addressing a personal need. Their want to come visit. You can go back downstairs to watch baseball. Just hope that appraiser has your "man cave" in thier records, or you may have to pair down on the amount of television packages you usually buy.

That's roughly the scenario Bethlehem residents are facing this year, and the following four years. Just a few short years after a town-wide reassessment, the town board approved a request by its assessor that will have a team of appraisers to go

door-to-door and confirm its books. Does the town have your information correct? The right number of bedrooms. The right number of bathrooms. How about that square-footage? You know why this information is important. After all, it's the same information that drove you to buy your house in the first place. It's the same metrics you used to compare different houses with your real estate agent, and how it ultimately drove the bottom line: your asking price.

So, that's what won't sit well with residents, this talk of money. The reassessment was only two years ago. Through that process, surveys were already distributed, asking the same information, and some were returned. Some were not, and that's where the town wants to pick up where they left off. But, in the public's

eye — in the homeowner's eye — it comes off as another reassessment.

The timing stinks. No. There is never a good time for a stranger to walk up to our doorsteps to talk money. And, with the reassessment still fresh in the minds of town residents, this smacks as an insult. You should have done this a few years ago. But, who is to say the town will receive any more success than from those surveys? you will, this is another reassessment. The town needs to cut it out.

We love our in-laws, and they are always welcome in our homes. The taxman, however, is not.

The timing stinks. No. There is never a good time for a stranger to walk up to our doorsteps to talk money. And, with the reassessment still fresh in the minds of town residents, this smacks as an insult. You should have done this a few years ago. But, who is to say the town will receive any more success than from those surveys? Just as with the unreturned surveys, the town's only recourse is to *estimate your property value if you choose* not to allow the appraiser in your home. Call it what you will, this is another reassessment. The town needs to cut it out.

Exceed the cap, or make cuts?

DELMAR — Five years ago, the Bethlehem Central School District was facing a \$4.2 million budget gap for the 2012-13 school year and considering whether to exceed the state tax cap which would require the approval of 60 percent of district voters — or make significant cuts to school programs.

Proposed reductions to instructional programs at the elementary level included elimination of Challenge and Jumpstart programs and math academic intervention services and reducing the number of days each week students attend "specials" like music, art and physical education. Also up for consideration was the elimination of the fourth-grade strings orchestra, two

classroom teachers, a reading teacher and a librarian.

Proposed cuts to the middle and high school instructional programs included eliminating or phasing out the Chinese language program, eliminating two librarian positions and reducing the number of sections offered in some core classes, leading to larger class sizes.

Speaking at a school board meeting on Wednesday, March 28, 2012, Tara O'Keeffe, the mother of two students in Slingerlands Elementary, said she had come to feel a sense of hopelessness listening to all of the proposed cuts.

"What I have the power to do and say is please raise my taxes," she said.

"I'm willing to pay more taxes, challenge the cap, so we can keep essentially what Bethlehem is and not lose that. We can do without so many things but we can't do without a well-rounded education for our children.'

Voters turned out in record numbers on Tuesday, May 15, 2012, when district residents ultimately approved a 2012-13 school year budget that exceeded the state tax cap, even though the plan still contained significant cuts to district programming and staffing — including the phase-out of the relatively new Chinese language program, elimination of the gymnastics team and a 20 percent reduction to clubs at the middle and high

schools.

Nearly 63 percent of voters approved the \$88.2 million spending plan, which carried a 3.99 percent increase to the property tax levy, an \$81 increase on a home assessed at \$100,000. The budget passed with a final count of 4,035 voters in favor of the plan and 2,405 voters opposed.

"We are greatly appreciative to the voters of Bethlehem for recognizing that a BC education is one worth investing in," said Superintendent Thomas Douglas in a statement the night of the vote. "There were difficult decisions made during this budget process, and we thank the community for their support."

Doemel soon had the opportunity to fill an open position at the school, teaching English and Global Studies. "I fell right in," he said. "And fell in love with it." He soon realized that what he really liked was working with students outside of the classroom, "with the issues that they dealt with or helping them move on and advance to college." So he enrolled in Sage Graduate School to earn his master's degree in counseling. There, he fulfilled his internship working in the Counseling Center at BCHS, the school he will be running next year.

"When I left, I always said I would love to be back at Bethlehem," he said. "I wasn't even thinking in terms of administrative at that point." After years spent working as a counselor, Doemel went back to school to get his administrative Educational Leadership Certification from the College of St. Rose. In 2013, he returned to BCHS — this time as an administrative dean working with freshmen and juniors.

"The counseling that I've done," he said, "has helped me to meet kids at their level, find out what their interests are, what motivates them and what's getting in the way. I feel like it just kind of comes naturally to me."

"Anyone who has had the opportunity to work with Dave Doemel here in Bethlehem knows that he not only has a passion for education but for the community as a whole," said BCSD Superintendent Jody Monroe. "What makes him stand out is that he demonstrates this passion in an easy, understated way making those around him — students, colleagues or parents — feel comfortable turning to him for input or advice. He is a natural leader."

It was Monroe who approached Doemel about filling in as interim principal of the middle school when the

"We've done different activities throughout the year," said Doemel, adding that he invited Jared Campbell, an award-winning songwriter whose message focuses on overcoming obstacles, antibullying, respect, leadership and having a positive outlook, to perform his tweentargeted program for the student body.

BCMS has identified 24 "character strengths" that are displayed on banners hanging in the school's hallways. "Everyone has different strengths," said Doemel. "We use those to highlight positive character strengths in kids that might have a harder time with other things. Their strength might be humor or it might be perspective or kindness. It gives teachers another way to positively connect with the students."

Pointing to the wall behind him in his office, he drew attention to a pencil drawing taking shape on the wall. "This is something one of our is students working on," he said. "He was really having trouble connecting with what he was doing in the classroom, but we found out that he was this amazing artist and so we tried to find a way to pull him back in and get him excited. Those are all historical figures."

Doemel's philosophy extends to those on his faculty, who he believes ought to be modeling the behavior they're trying to instill in their students. He began his brief stint at the middle school by asking teachers to make a list of words that they felt described positive things about the school. He compiled those words into a visual "wordle" (basically a word cloud) that now hangs in each teacher's room. "I told them when the days are tough and the kids aren't listening, look up there. That's what makes this place special." Last month the teachers presented Doemel with a larger, framed wordle with words like 'compassionate,' 'understanding' and 'friendly' that they said were descriptive of him.

Going back to the high school should be an easier transition, Doemel said, primarily because he has already established a rapport with the faculty and staff there. He thinks the most exciting thing — and the biggest challenge during his first year will be the anticipated roll-out of the district's 1:1 program providing every student in grades 3 - 12 with their own Chromebook.

Recalling how he used to envy classmates who owned laptops, Doemel said, "For me to now look at my school and see every kid on a level playing field with technology is an amazing thing." He also said that it was going to require "a lot of communication and collaboration.

"We're going to be putting together a stakeholder group to provide feedback and assessment about the process throughout the year," he said, speculating that lack of communication could potentially diminish or doom the nascent initiative.

Regarding the \$32 million bond project approved by district voters in November, the cornerstone of which is a \$7.8 million upgrade to the high school auditorium, Doemel said, "Those kids really deserve it!" Pointing out that the current auditorium was built in 1952, he described it as "dark and run-down" and said he hoped the new facilities would encourage more students to become involved with fine arts programming.

"Our community is so supportive," he said when asked to identify the district's greatest strength. "I think that whatever we need, whatever we're asking for from parents — whether it's support at home, whether it's support with an initiative we're doing within the school district they always respond." Praising BCSD faculty and staff, he said, "Having such talented people in the schools along with supportive people at home is really, I mean, that's the key with education."

At the high school, Doemel said he wants to continue to emphasize character education. "I want to continue that positive culture and community in the [high school] building. I mean, we really have all the rest: the academics; the kids that are willing to achieve at a high level; the work ethic; the educators; the parents. Now it's about maintaining focus on what the real purpose of education is — both as a student and as a person.

"What I would tell the community and the parents," Doemel said, "is that, to me, this is a dream job. I'm 100 percent invested in the community; I live here, my wife works here, my kids go to school here. I trust so many of the people within the district and so I'm going to give everything I have to the community and to the school to make it the best place possible for their students to get an education."




The group then went on to create dozens of dance

This will make you mad

That "relaxing" glass of wine could be killing you

A s a personal trainer and certified nutrition coach my job is to tell people the truth and hold them accountable for their actions.

As you can imagine there are times I tend to piss people off. If I'm doing my job, I'm telling them what they need to hear, and not what they want to hear. This contradicts what you see and hear in the media, where in an effort to get you to read their paper or to watch their television show, they'll tell you what you want to hear.

So, what topic of conversation am I approaching today, that will likely set you off?

Alcohol.

In this country, we have a serious problem with alcohol. Now, I'm not talking about being an alcoholic. (Although, in my opinion, that particular disease is far more prevalent than most people realize.) No, I'm taking about the average person who unwinds to "just one glass" of wine each night.

I can already see the blood starting to boil on some of you.

Here's the truth you don't want to hear: Most people are drinking far more than they'll admit. Our "just a glass" in most cases is actually two or three. The standard drink is roughly 14 grams of alcohol. At a restaurant or bar, that equates to one 12-ounce can of beer, four ounces of wine or one-ounce shot of distilled spirits.

At home, we're a little more liberal with our pours.

That "one glass of wine" most people pour is closer to 12 ounces. So, instead of filling our wine glass with just four ounces, we fill it to the top. That translates into an actual serving of three glasses. But, do we stop there? Nope. After enjoying a second glass of wine, we had something closer to six servings of wine.

How does this effect our diet? Let's take a moderately active, 120 lbs woman. Her caloric needs are somewhere between 1,200 to 1,500 calories a day. If we apply the drinking habits above, with a standard glass of wine is about 150 calories, she's drinking as many as 750 calories — more than half her recommended total caloric intake — in alcohol. And, getting zero nutritional value in return.

I think we can all agree that someone who is drinking half their calories each day in alcohol may have a problem. But, for someone trying to lose weight, that's not even the worst part. And, it's something I see on a daily basis.

Most people come to our studio because they want to lose weight and get in shape. The majority of them start in our beginner's program, which is designed for those who haven't worked out in a while and are looking to change their lives. As part of the program, we ask them to give up one bad nutritional habit for the following four weeks. Most give up cookies, chips, ice cream or some other treat.

We never hear someone say they'll give up alcohol, and when we ask, you'd think we'd asked them to drown a litter of kittens in the bathtub. Which speaks to how ingrained alcohol is in people's lives. It's the No. 1 reason people don't see real weight loss results. Most people

btaining the sound of a timeless recording is not an easy accomplishment. Writing those songs to make the heart flutter or trigger that emotion is another hill to climb. 

Psychedelic night in Capital City

Consider The Source, Felix Martin, Ampevene perform to crowd at The Hollow Bar + Kitchen

ALBANY — It was a night of pure psychedelic/prog rock heaven at The Hollow in Albany Saturday, March 18, as the musical explorations of Ampevene, Felix Martin and New York City's Consider the Source took the stage to an enthusiastic crowd.

CONCERT REVIEW

First to take the stage was Ampevene, a locally based quartet founded by guitarist Gabe Stallman. The band's roster includes Mack Hogan on bass, Darryl Kniffen on drums/percussion, and Ava Smith on keyboards. Their sound is a self-described eclectic mix of free form frenzy, jagged riffs, and hypnotic rhythms. Ampevene was formed in 2013 and since it's inception has played Albany's coveted Lark Street festival in 2015. They also have produced three EPs, the latest of which is entitled "Rometheu" which the band chose as the opener for the show. It was one of the only times throughout the night they blended lyrics with the incredible instrumental skills of the band. One of the high points of the hour long set in my opinion was the use of imaginative sounds that were crafted by talented keyboardist Ava Smith. They provided a beautiful sonic layer that enhanced the psychedelic musical experience that Ampevene created early in the evening.

After a brief break in the action the musical journey continued with the talent of Venezuelan guitarist Felix Martin whose claim to fame is being able to simultaneously play two guitars at once. His website describes his amazing skill in this way, "Felix uses his self-designed 14 and 16-string guitars, which are two regular guitars in one, in a way never seen or heard before." Felix and his band which is comprised of bassist Killian Duarte and drummer Victor Carracedo are currently wrapping up their 10 date tour with Consider The Source while promoting their newly released album "Mechanical Nations."

Martin and his band started their show with "Carnat," which showcased the slap style guitar playing Felix is renowned for on an instrument that looks like it was cooked up in Frankenstein's lab. Two separate guitars attached together at the neck in a most unnatural way, but yet yields wondrous results at the hands of guitar virtuoso Martin. Up next was newly released "Bom," which illustrated how tight the band plays as an ensemble ever pleasing the crowd with it's upbeat hypnotic tempo. Midway through the show bassist Killian Duarte aptly stated to the energized audience "Let's keep things heavy and proggy" and they did not disappoint. The tone of the show was aggressive with the three piece creating a wall of sound that was reminiscent to Primus, featuring lots of chest cavity pumping bass with head bouncing percussion.

Last on the bill were headliners Consider the Source, the New York City power trio, whose credits since their formation in 2004 include playing

Burning Man, Gathering of the Vibes, Catskill Chill, and numerous other nationally renowned music festivals took the stage. CTS is comprised of Gabriel Marin on fretless doubleneck guitar, bassist John Ferrara, and drummer/ percussionist Jeff Mann. Consider The Source's music showcases a Middle Eastern flair and features pieces with hypnotic melodies such as set opener "Aquarians." The sonic landscape that filled the room took the audience on a mystical journey into unchartered territory with pieces such as "Closer To Home" and "Abdiel." The enthusiastic crowd seemed transported to the desert with female spectators breaking out in impromptu belly dancing reminiscent of some ancient Bedouin tribe. The musical menagerie that is Consider The Source is deceiving in its sound, with multi-layered and complex rhythms; it easily feels like these sonic sculptures could have been created by a band twice its size. The craftsmanship and camaraderie of the band was obvious and while CTS was playing early in the set, both previous opening frontmen Gabe Stallman from Ampevene and Felix Martin stood by appreciatively taking in the show in the nearby wings alongside the captivated audience.



Lumo Run

So, we've learned that modern activity trackers are basically pedometers with GPS connectivity. Add a mathematical algorithm

or two, and it can calculate foot speed and the amount of calories burned. If we can agree to that definition, Lumo Run kicks it up a notch. With a sensor worn at the waist (and in tandem with a smartphone), the Lumo Run measures a user's cadence, time in contact with the ground, length of stride and pelvic rotation. This data is digested, analyzed and reported back in real-time with suggestions to improve the user's running form. As one Amazon.com reviewer noted, however, there is no treadmill mode for the application — so your foot speed will certainly suffer. Consumers have the option of purchasing shorts or capris for the Lumo, or to just go with the sensor and subsequent, free phone app.


