# Farm family feud

Kleinke family is at odds with widow under contract to sell part of farm to developer

GLENMONT — While a large chunk of the Kleinke farm on Kenwood Avenue is in imminent danger of being developed, it's not a Kleinke who's selling the land.

After repeated attempts by the family to reacquire the land following the death of Peter Kleinke, the Kleinke clan is turning to the community for help convincing his former wife to abandon her plan to sell to a developer and, instead, return the property to the family to maintain as open space.

According to Ryan Kitchen, a fifth generation Kleinke by way of his mother, Deborah Kleinke Kitchen, the farmland has been in his family for more than a century, ever since his forebears moved to the countryside from Albany in 1915. Debbie and Ryan have a clear connection to, and love for, the land on which they were both raised, and the topic of its impending development is an emotional one for each.

"My great-grandparents and my great-great-grandparents lived there," Ryan said of the farmhouse at 65 Kenwood Ave.

"Three of four died there," said Deborah. She has fond memories of delivering fresh milk and eggs from the former Glensmere dairy farm with her father, ice skating in the fields, helping to bring in the hay after sunset and of myriad other moments spent with her family.

Over the years, ownership of the initial property at the border of Glenmont and Elsmere has been divided among the family, explained Ryan. "It was owned by three siblings until October 2015, when my grandfather's twin brother passed away. He owned the original farmstead, 70 acres, the dairy, the old barns. His wife was not a Kleinke and it doesn't mean anything to her."

Linda Dwyer is the newly remarried widow of Peter Kleinke, the twin brother of Deborah's father Paul. According to the Kitchens, Dwyer hasn't been interested in running the farm she inherited when her late husband died.

"So, she's decided that she doesn't want it anymore," said Ryan. "Which is fine. We just want our first refusal and we didn't get that. She went immediately to a developer and signed a contract."

The Kitchens said they have not only gone to Dwyer with a matching offer, but also offered to pay any costs incurred by breaking her agreement with the developer. Still, they said, she has consistently declined the offer.

At present, the land has been under contract...

## **Traffic stop** leads to DWI arrest

**BETHLEHEM** — Bethlehem police arrested Christopher F. Caspersen of Greenville just after midnight on the morning of Thursday, June 22, after an



on-duty officer reportedly observed him operating a jeep registered in North Carolina with a large crack in the windshield and without a working brake light. Caspersen allegedly exhibited signs of intoxication upon being pulled over, and

admitted to not having a valid license.

After reportedly failing all standard field sobriety tests and testing positive for alcohol on a pre-screening device, Caspersen was taken into custody. At the police station, he reportedly registered a 0.09 percent BAC and, due to having two prior DWI convictions in September and December of 2012, was charged with two counts of felony DWI; firstdegree aggravated unlicensed operation of a vehicle, also a felony; driving with suspended registration, a misdemeanor; and two traffic infractions.

## Man arrested for DWI

**BETHLEHEM** — Bethlehem police arrested Dennis R. McGraw, 56, of Albany, for a first-offense DWI at 4:42 p.m. on the afternoon of Sunday, June

25, on New Scotland Rd. in Slingerlands, after witnesses reported seeing him crash into a concrete median at the entrance to Hamlet Court Apartments with his Buick Century sedan. When an officer approached him at the

scene, McGraw reportedly stated that he was returning from a graduation party in Clifton Park and the officer detected a strong smell of alcohol.

McGraw failed three standard field sobriety tests and tested positive for alcohol on a pre-screening device, but refused to submit to chemical testing once he was taken into custody. He was charged with one count of DWI, first offense, and a traffic infraction for an improper right turn.

## Woman pulled over, arrested for DWAI

**BETHLEHEM** — Bethlehem police arrested Pamela J. Leibowitz, 55, of Cohoes, at 3:55 p.m. on the afternoon of

Satuday, June 24, after responding to reports of a vehicle operating erratically in the area of Kenwood and Delaware avenues. According to reports, the responding officer observed Leibowitz cross over into the oncoming lane twice

prior to activating his lights and said that it took her a few moments before she pulled into a driveway at 358 Kenwood.

Upon interviewing Leibowitz, she reportedly was observed to be lethargic and having a hard time keeping her eyes open. While she tested negative for alcohol, she failed standard field sobriety tests and was taken into custody. Leibowitz had to be transported to Albany Medical Center to obtain a blood sample after the medic at the police station was unable to do so.

Ultimately, Leibowitz was charged with two traffic infractions and one count of driving while ability impaired by drugs, a class E felony due to prior convictions.

## Third charged in check cashing scheme

**BETHLEHEM** — A third person has been charged in the CapCom fraudulent check cashing spree on Monday, June 19, which ended in Glenmont, at the third branch allegedly hit by Jah-Sief H. Tucker, 19, and Kayla N. Drayton, 21, of Albany, and their accused co-conspirator, a 27-year-old from Albany named Monaye R. Smith, who turned herself in

the following day, after security tapes placed her at the first two branches - in North Greenbush and Latham - and outside of the third in Glenmont at the time of the incidents.

While the incidents are still under investigation, all three have been charged with second-degree possession of a forged instrument and fourth-degree grand larceny, both felonies, and fifth-degree conspiracy, a misdemeanor.

## **Traffic stop yields** drug arrest

BETHLEHEM — On Monday, July 17, at approximately 3:33 p.m., state police reportedly stopped a vehicle on I-87 in



the Town of Bethlehem for a traffic violation. The driver of the vehicle, Victor L. Perez-Negron, 49, of Bronx, NY was allegedly found to be in possession of approximately 373 grams of cocaine, more than 13 ounces or a little more

than 80 percent of a pound. He was taken into custody, transported, and processed at the state police station in Albany, where he was charged with: criminal possession of a controlled substance in the first degree, a class A felony; criminal possession of a controlled substance in the third degree (narcotic drug with intent to sell), a class B felony; and a traffic violation.

Perez-Negron was transported and arraigned in the Town of Bethlehem Court and remanded to the Albany County jail in lieu \$50,000 cash or bond. He was scheduled to return to Bethlehem Town Court four days later.

# Bethlehem Democrats, County Board of Elections sued

**BETHLEHEM** — Democrats Dan Morin and George Harder, both running for town positions without the endorsement of the Bethlehem Democratic Committee, filed suit on Monday, July 24, to have two committee-endorsed candidates thrown off the ballot, saying committee leaders improperly filed paperwork naming the recent replacements to their slate of candidates.

The pair is arguing that BDC Chair Jeff Kuhn, First Vice Chair Dan Coffey and Second Vice Chair Pam Skripak, who also comprise the state-mandated "committee to fill vacancies," failed to sign their names on the affidavit section of certificates of substitution filed on July 12 — one naming Town Board member Giles Wagoner as the new candidate for Highway Supervisor, after Brent Meredith declined to run for re-election to the seat, and another naming Coffey himself as the candidate who would now run for Wagoner's seat on the Town Board.

All three signatures appear on the certificate naming Wagoner, in the candidate substitution section, but are merely printed in the affidavit section under a statement beginning: "We, the undersigned, hereby affirm...." The affidavit section of the certificate naming Coffey bears only the names of Kuhn and Skripak. In both cases, all names were clearly printed by the same hand.

While the documents were also signed by a notary public, Morin and Albany County Board of Elections Republican Commissioner Rachel Bledi both said that they believe the omission of actual signatures on that section of the certificate will be sufficient to remove the BDC-endorsed candidates from the ballot.

"An affidavit basically makes every document legal," explained Bledi. "And, it's required by law under election law, section 6-148, which deals with filling vacancies. It specifically says you have to have a signed affidavit.

That's basically the gist of the lawsuit. They're seeking to invalidate the certificates of substitution on the basis of the fact that they didn't sign the affidavit part at all."

Coffey and Kuhn said that they have retained counsel and were confident that they would be able to make their case to State Supreme Court Justice Roger McDonough at Albany County Courthouse at 1:30 p.m. on Monday, July 31.

Coffey, who is a lawyer, said, "The paperwork was properly filled out and was properly notarized. Any objections are insubstantial. The standard of the election law is substantial compliance. It was the intent of the committee to fill vacancies to make those two substitutions, and the petition filed by Harder and Morin is completely invalid. They're trying to deprive the voters of their right to choose in the September 12 primary and we feel confident that the judge is going to rule in our favor and deny the application."

Pointing out that Kuhn and the notary that signed the affidavit also practice law, he said that Albany Board of Elections Democratic Commissioner Matt Clyne also reviewed the documents before they were accepted. In addition, he noted that Clyne verified the signatures of Morin and Harder on the lawsuit while appearing as a respondent at the same time, which, he said, "seems to be a conflict."

Morin said the suit was, "pretty much a done deal," on Wednesday, July 26, and that there would be more to come. He said that he and Harder would release a statement after they go to court on Monday.

"Like I've said before," he said. "This is how corrupt people are and this is finally coming to fruition."

Following the July 12 announcement of the substitute candidates, Morin criticized the selection of Wagoner and expressed displeasure with the fact that he, like Meredith, was chosen from outside of the Highway Department. He said the committee had broken with precedent when it endorsed Meredith, of whose tenure he was highly critical, and that he doubted how well someone else unfamiliar with the department could effectively run it.

Bledi said while it is legal to switch candidates after petition deadlines have passed, such a move can often spark debate about whether it has been done ethically, particularly in cases in which the original candidate has not died, become seriously ill or offered some other unassailable reason.

"In this situation, they did a certificate of substitution because Brent Meredith got a job with the state," she said. "Incidentally, I'm sure he knew about it for a while. The state doesn't just issue jobs overnight.

"It could be perceived as a bait-and-switch," she said, pointing out that people who signed petitions to help a particular candidate get on the ballot rarely, if ever, have a chance to participate in the selection of that candidate's replacement in such instances.

Under state election law, the designating petitions for

primary races were required to be submitted between July 10 and July 13 this year. The last day to authorize a substitution was July 25.

As outlined in the lawsuit, BDC filed designating petitions naming Wagoner and Meredith as candidates with the Board of Elections on July 10 — a week after closing the interview process that had been reopened following Meredith's announcement in late June. On July 11, Meredith and Wagoner both filed certificates declining their candidacy for their respective positions. The same day, Kuhn, Coffey and Skripak had the certificates of substitution naming Wagoner and Coffey notarized. On July 12, those certificates were filed and Kuhn publicly announced that the committee had selected replacements.

If the suit is successful, Wagoner and Coffey will not appear on the Democratic ticket in the fall. They will still appear on the Working Families line, however, as they did not use the same state-issued documents available on the internet, but submitted something that appears to have been prepared by a lawyer instead, according to Bledi. "So that was done correctly."

Speculating that the situation could lead to a split party vote in the general election, she said, "Because you have one set of Democrats who are insurgents sitting on the Democratic line and you have the Democrats who are supported by the party itself on the Working Families party line. So, I don't know. If you're not paying attention, you might not realize who you're voting for."

Following the hearing, which took place immediately before sending this publication to press, Coffey said he felt good about the defense's argument, which referenced precedent from a similar case in Rochester. The parties expect to receive a decision by Wednesday. If appealed, a final decision could be delayed for another week, according to Coffey.

## Farm family fued

for at least a year and there are preliminary plans for two developments, one comprising more than 60 buildings — 31 single-family homes and 32 townhomes — at 65 Kenwood Ave. (an alternate plan consists of 53 singlefamily homes), and a smaller development across the street, at 48 Kenwood Ave., consisting of 11 single-family residences. Both projects went before the town's Development Planning Committee in September 2016, but, as of late July 2017, the Planning Department has only received a subdivision application for the larger development at 65 Kenwood. Nothing has been scheduled for review by the Planning Board as yet, but Planning Director Robert Leslie said that he could see that happening in the near future.

"It's very hurtful," said Deborah.

"It's mind-boggling," said Ryan. "It's my family's heritage and legacy."

"We've been working on a business plan," he said. "To keep it farming, open space, useable to the public. We're on the Rail Trail, we have access to Magee ballpark, we have so much stuff that we can do that isn't houses."

"We even drafted a purchase proposal, in the hopes that she would change her mind and sell to family," said Deborah, explaining that they have a vision to use at least some of the parcel for an agritourism business similar to Indian Ladder Farms. "It has a variety of different possible uses," she said. "There's a whole gamut of ideas in the business plan."

According to Deborah, the family has met with community members who have signalled support for their ideas, including at least one businessperson who reviewed the plan and pronounced it viable.

But none of that matters if Dwyer won't sell them the land.

"We asked her what the Kleinkes did to her to make her so upset," said Ryan. "I don't know."

"She thinks that farming is a hard life and that she's doing us a favor," said Deborah. "Or, at least, that's what she has said. And it's not easy. But, it's not her decision if that's what we choose. She didn't even give us a chance to save it."

Explaining that Dwyer is her godmother, Deborah called the situation "a little bit of a disconnect," and seemed uncomfortable with the conflict. Ryan, on the other hand, seemed more than ready to go to the mattresses.

According to Deborah, Dwyer initially cited high property taxes as the reason for selling to developers, but resisted attempts to connect her with the town's conservation easement exemption program, which could have reduced those taxes by as much as 90 percent. Then, Deborah said, Dwyer indicated that she was unwilling to break the deal she had made with the developer, Anthony Cardona, even after the family offered to pay any buy-out fees. Their last communication was six months ago, when Dwyer told her in an email that she expected the matter was

# Celtic singer to play Delmar home

— Delmar resident Susan Corcoran will be hosting an internationally renowned Celtic singer, Colm Keegan of the group Celtic Thunder, at her home this August, in an intimate al fresco performance for about 30 ticketholders.

As Keegan and his wife just had their first child, and the singer has been finishing his master's degree in education, he did not join Celtic Thunder on their last tour. For his 2017 summer tour, promoting his first solo album, "I'll Never Be Alone," Keegan decided he wanted to do a series of small, personal

performances held at venues such as churches, community centers and Corcoran's back yard.

Keegan's debut solo album was released last November, topping World Music charts. His Aug. 4 performance at Corcoran's will include songs from that album, as well as some of the performer's favorite Celtic classics.

Corcoran became aware he was soliciting small venues along the East Coast this summer — and was still seeking one in the Capital District. "So, I thought: Sure! That sounds like fun," she said.

She intends to set up a tent in her backyard but said, if the weather is pleasant, Keegan will play under the stars. "It's going to be great," she said. "The whole show is going to be one big meet-and-greet. ... With so few people there, he's going to be totally accessible."

"These VIP shows are a one-time opportunity for me to perform for small audiences and interact with people on a really personal level," said Keegan in a press release. "I'm so excited about this tour."

Keegan and his wife, Laura Durrant, a cellist with Celtic Thunder, will journey up the East Coast in a RV. "They're going to be parked in my driveway, right in front of my house," Corcoran said. "It's pretty exciting."

Corcoran said she limited the number of available tickets to 30, due to the fact she's never done anything like this before, but told the tour to let her know if they needed to add a few extra seats. Tickets are \$75 and are available online at www. colmkeegan.com/tours.

He also suggested that a town-wide effort to save the property from development might prove more successful.

Hoping also to connect with potential investors, Ryan has a GoFundMe page set up and ready to activate in the event that Dwyer becomes willing to sell the farm back to the family (the price tag is likely to be somewhere just north of \$2 million). Noting the current community conversation surrounding conservation of open spaces, Ryan said he believes town residents would be happy to invest in the conservation of the Kleinke farm. He has been encouraging people to send photos of the property to the town's Scenic Bethlehem project, which

is identifying open spaces in the town that residents value and feel are worthy of preservation. A 'Save Kleinke's Farm' Facebook page is likely to be up and running soon, as well.

Ryan, who earned his degree in Economics from Siena College in 2015, has three siblings, all of whom have their own individual ideas and talents they want to contribute to the future of their family's land. One is an artist, another an event planner. Even if they fail to save that parcel of land, Ryan said he might launch his GoFundMe page anyway. "I have great plans for the Kleinke Farm," he said, "But everything costs money."

If they don't succeed in acquiring the property,

Deborah worries that many of the ideas they've been hoping to explore will become untenable due to insufficient acreage. "Our land is currently being used for growing produce," she said, noting that their farm stand at 96 Kenwood Ave. is still open for business seven days a week. "But we would need more land to support multiple uses."

"It's been heartbreaking," she said, brushing tears from her eyes. "It's hard to describe what it's like watching something you've known your whole life disappear."

Multiple attempts to reach Dwyer for comment were unsuccessful.

clan and showed them his plans for the property. The Kitchens say he resisted entreaties to maintain it as open space and was unresponsive to a request to carve out seven acres, the minimum for an agricultural district, and keep the barns intact.

Disheartened and approaching desperation, the family recently decided to reach out to the community. "I think we've tried every respectful route," said Ryan. "I was hoping it wouldn't come to this point where we have to go public. But I just can't sit back and watch this happen." His new hope is that residents will show up at town board and planning board meetings in opposition to the development proposal.

# Give agritourism a chance

n June 2015, politicos and dignitaries gathered in Sharon Springs to officially open the Schoharie County Beverage Trail in an effort to coax tourism into the predominantly agricultural community.

"We are so excited to offer a trail that not only promotes local agriculture but creates a unique tourism draw," said Lori Wortz, owner of KyMar Farm Winery and Distillery and President of the Schoharie County Beverage Trail. The idea would be to bring people more people into a county that boasts a population of approximately 30,000 people (about 10 times less than that of Albany County).

The Schoharie County Beverage Trail followed in the footsteps of the Adirondack Craft Beverage Trail, which had opened the previous summer. And, other such concepts followed suit in a concept commonly known as agritourism.

Successful business ventures are born

through niche markets. Agritourism is such a market. It's not a new concept, as you can witness several local farms running stores from beneath the shadows of their barns. But the the recent push for "farm-to-table" produce has made the business en vogue to a younger millennial generation determined to educate themselves on the products they purchase, including the food that they eat.

For example, Indian Ladder Farms has allowed visitors to pick their own apples, and purchase produce from its on-site store for years. However, it's also stepped up its game by taking advantage of recent state legislation that allows the farm to produce and sell a craft alcoholic beverage, too. This is another trend to help boost business in an industry that often times squeezes out the non-commercial, familyowned farms.

This week, we have a Dickensian tale of two communities. The Colonie

Spotlight features the story of a familyrun farm that is finding success through agritourism. In The Spotlight, we have another feature on arguably the most familiar of farming families in Bethlehem fighting to keep a portion of its land in the family. If it fails, there is already a proposal to subdivide and develop it into scores of residential housing. Such are the two fates commonly experienced with local farms today: entice consumers onto the land to buy direct, or give up the farm to collect what could be a comfortable retirement.

We ascribe to the "farm-to-table" trend and hope it continues to develop beyond a passing fad and into a common practice. Our local farms have and will always need the support from the community. And that support pays off. After all, it's always best to know where your food came from. Knowing the people who grew your food, and having trust in them, only assures you of its quality.

Successful business ventures are born through niche markets. Agritourism is such a market. It's not a new concept, as you can witness several local farms running stores from beneath the shadows of their barns. # 214 acres of land is preserved along the Bozenkill

**GUILDERLAND** — Dr. Milford Becker spent the last years of his life trying to preserve some of the land he owned, but he did not see his vision realized. Almost seven years after passing away, his wish came true.

Becker, who was a Guilderland veterinarian, reached out to Mohawk Hudson Land Conservancy 18 years ago to inquire about preserving his land. Becker died in August 2007 at 91, and his wife, Mary, also passed away before a deal was finalized. The Becker family, however, kept pursuing preservation efforts and MHLC recently purchased the 156-acre Becker property.

Milford Becker's daughter, Linda, said her family lived at the corner of Bozenkill and Westfall roads for 42 years and they would walk the property almost every day.

"My parents loved the land and especially the birds," said Becker. "My mother knew the call of every bird, and my father knew every tree on the property."

Mark King, executive director of the MHLC, said conservation efforts usually involve a long process.

"Land protection and conservation efforts tend to take a long time. They are expensive, and it is hard to get people to agree," said King. "Sometimes it seems like a miracle when it all comes together."

MHLC also acquired 27 acres of neighboring land several years prior, which expanded the preserve to 214 acres, including more than a mile and a half of stream

"It is a good amount of land, and it is really the conglomeration of three different acquisitions," said King. "It is a remote and very intact natural area."

The Bozenkill is one of the major tributaries of the Watervliet Reservoir, which supplies water to Guilderland and the City of Watervliet. The preserve includes heavily forested areas, steep wooded slopes, small fields and extensive stream frontage.

"These acquisitions will eventually allow access to a beautiful stretch of the upper Bozenkill and Bozenkill areas that were inaccessible to the public," King said in a statement. "We look forward to adding

parking and trails that will make this an outstanding nature preserve within walking distance of the Village of Altamont."

The Open Space Institute provided significant financial support for the project, according to King, and holds a conservation easement over the property ensuring its permanent protection.

The Nature Conservancy also supported the project through the Doris Saunders Plant Strategic Acquisition Fund, which the late Henri Plant and his family created to help protect the upper Bozenkill area. Henri Plant was closely associated with another preserve along the Bozenkill, the Christman Sanctuary, which spans 120 acres in the Town of Duanesburg.

The MHLC paid approximately \$110,000 for the 214 acres of land, with an additional \$40,000 set aside to care for the property, according to King.

Still largely inaccessible, approximately a mile of trails, easy to moderate in difficulty, have been made hikable within the preserve to date.





**TROY**— For a place where many movies have historically been filmed at, the city of Troy strangely lacks a proper movie theater for locals to enjoy.

The city's Planning Commission recommended to Bonacio Construction and the development team behind the potential Bow Tie Cinemas that could open in Troy in 2018, that they should genuinely consider local residents' concerns, and possibly revise its overall design. This meeting was the first item on the agenda at Troy's City Hall at 6 p.m. on Wednesday, July 26, even going on to last for almost two hours.

Renderings of the cinema were presented, depicted from various angles and in both day and nighttime. 10,000 people a week are expected to visit and there will be only roughly 105 parking spaces—this became a recurring concern among residents. The complex will be handicap-friendly, its transparent lobby would be 35 feet and contain 11 movie

screens within. Its design is mainly borrowed from the Bow Tie Criterion Cinemas at Saratoga Springs.

Vic Christopher, vice president of Clark House Hospitality and entrepreneur, strongly defended this project, believing it would truly boost Troy's image to become "a top entertainment destination in New York State for travelers traveling through upstate New York or New York City residents."

"It'd be the catalyst for so many things and we're talking to the Bow Tie guys right now about launching this thing up along with a film festival in Troy very soon," he said. "We've come to the point where we want people to come to Troy for a weekend—like go to the Farmer's Market on Saturday, catch a movie, have a dinner at one of many amazing restaurants—and just have an unbelievable walk through the city of Troy."

The main concerns that attending residents had were that the cinema's design looks far too modern (as compared to the Victorian style downtown Troy is known for), that it blocks the view of the Hudson River and does not come with adequate parking. Other issues raised was that its logos and signage would cause light pollution, that the cinema's back side (which is simply a blank wall that faces the Hudson) looks ugly, and that its intended location on 1 Monument Square is not ideal.

# They walk among us

Top Five 'super human' abilities possessed by people in real life

prevalence of superhero mania in our culture, the phrase "human abilities" may bring to mind superpowers: sci-fi dreams absent from reality. But while we have a few years until people can move things with their minds, or transform into hideous beasts, there are still people with impressive abilities within the realm of possibility right in our backyards.

Perfect/absolute pitch: For those familiar with reading music, you'll know notes are designated with a letter, A through G. If you asked most people to sing an A out of the blue, they might look at you as though you've lost your mind. However, individuals with perfect pitch can do this with ease, informing you the note of the car horn that just passed is a C while they're at it. People with perfect pitch can also let you know when you're singing the latest song from the radio in the wrong key. Researchers haven't come to a consensus on whether this ability is genetic or learned from a prolonged exposure to music at crucial developmental stages. It is more common in those who are blind from birth, have William's Syndrome, or have an autism spectrum

Hyperthymesia:

disorder.

Imagine remembering the best and worst days of your life with perfect accuracy. For those with Hyperthymesia, or

Superior Autobiographical Memory, this is their reality. Only defined in 2006, these people have the ability to remember the events of any given date, usually back to puberty, with incredibly accurate detail. There may be detrimental effects to individuals' thought processes due to the constant flow of memory during daily activities. A 60 minutes report on hyperthymesia with Leslie Stahl indicated that people with this talent have a difficult time with relationships; perhaps because it's hard to argue with someone

who remembers everything you've ever said on the subject.

**Super Recognizers:** If you're able to put the name to any face you've ever seen, no matter how much they've changed or how long it's been, you might fall into this next category. The skills of these "Super Recognizers" do not seem to be linked with IQ or memory for objects, yet they claim to recognise faces which they have only briefly been seen before, or have changed dramatically. On the other hand, there is a disorder on the other end of the spectrum, where the individuals

can no longer recognize faces. Some people acquire this prosopagnosia, or face blindness, following damage to the face recognition areas of the brain. Eye-tracking technology has frequently been used in research on face recognition, and has shown that typical people tend to focus on the eyes, suggesting they carry important information. Some people with prosopagnosia avoided the eye region, and instead looked at the mouth, while super-recognisers spent more time viewing the



Tuscan Little Neck Clams

e're heading into August and we haven't broached the subject of clams.

There's nothing like a big clam bake on the beach under a starry night sky. And, if you're a fan of seafood, clams give you a little something to do.

Taking your fork and digging in to claim your reward.

This dish gives you a little something to conjure up that beach night setting for you and your date. Just be careful. If a clam hasn't opened its shell, it's under cooked. When in doubt, don't eat it.

#### Ingredients

24 little neck clams

3 oz vegetable oil

8 cloves fresh garlic (smashed)

1/4 cup Spanish onion (finely diced)

1/3 cup celery (finely diced)

2 ths fresh chopped parsley

1ths fresh oregano

6 leaves fresh basil

2 cups fresh plum tomatoes (diced)

1 cup white wine

3 tbs butter

#### **Directions**

In a medium size saucepan over medium heat, add the oil. Once the oil is warm, add the garlic. Saute garlic for one minute then add onion and celery. Continue to cook until onions and celery are translucent. Add the clams, herbs, tomatoes, wine and butter. Simmer everything until all the clams are open. Season with salt and pepper then serve with fresh bread.

# Summer workouts

s we head into the Dog Days of summer, the heat is rising and the humidity along

with it.

The other day, my
wife Laurie and I were
out training for an
upcoming triathlon. It was
approaching 90 degrees
with nary a cloud in the
sky. Now, we could have
used that as an excuse not
to train, but we didn't allow

ourselves the out.

Let's be honest. Most people would not only skip exercising on that day but for most of the summer.

While we say we are going to go outside and exercise, when the temps are approaching 90, the last thing most of us want to do is exercise. We use the heat as an excuse to avoid our workouts. But, you can beat the heat by making a few small adjustments.

Here are my top 10 tips to beat the heat in the summer.

Change your workout time - When it's hazy, hot and humid it's not a good idea to be working out at lunch time. Instead, set your alarm clock a little earlier and get your workout in while the sun is rising. Or, if you just can't get up early, then evenings before sunset may be your time.

Take breaks - Your body can only do so much in extreme heat. As the thermometer climbs you need to take breaks more frequently, and longer in duration. Listen to your body, and when it tells you to rest, DO IT! It is not a sign of weakness to take a break. It's the smart thing to do

Watch your heart rate

- As we mentioned, heat
places additional stress
on the body, and with it a
tendency to increase your
heart rate. Keep tabs on
your heart rate (that's what

your Fitbit is for) and if it rises too quickly or stays high give it a rest. And, stop if it's much higher than normal.

Choose the right clothing – While we all want to look good in summer, making a fashion statement can backfire, big time. Wear clothing that will move sweat away from your body, and allow it to evaporate quickly. "Wicking" fabrics are great; cotton, not so much.

Choose the right clothing Part II – Opt for white or light colored clothing to help reflect the heat of the sun away from you. Avoid darker colors, which will absorb the sun's rays.

Find some shade- If you're a runner, biker or swimmer (or in Laurie and I's case all 3) try to move your workout to a shaded area. We have a lot of walking and biking trails in our area. Choose one that has shade. Laurie and I love

to use the bike path along the Mohawk River this time of year for that very reason.

Stay hydrated – Water, water, water before, during and after your workout. If you're dying of thirst, it's already too late. It's a sign you're dehydrated.

Avoid caffeine – While it's all the rage, to drink a cup of coffee before you work out may not be a good idea when working out in the summer. Coffee and other caffeinated drinks act as diuretics and force water out of your system. The exact opposite of what you want. Save the coffee for after your workout.

Cool down first! - Yep, you read that right. Do your cool down before you start your workout. Take a cold shower or bath, jump in the pool or put some cold cloths on your neck before you start your exercise. This can help lower your body temperature and improve your performance.

Hit the gym – When it's super hot, or if you are prone to overheating, your best bet is to take your workout inside. Not only will it be cooler, you'll likely have the gym to yourself. It's a great time to focus on your form, try new things or increase your intensity, and you don't have to worry about waiting an hour to get on a machine.

Summer, especially here in the Northeast, is a time to relax and unwind, but it can be a trap. As I've mentioned before, the summer months are when I see the most weight gain in people. Some of it is due to not eating properly, but much of it is also due to people not exercising.

Try incorporating a few
— if not all — of these tips
and you'll still be able to get
your exercise in.

At one point, she even stopped her band and coached the audience to sing "more convincingly," noting if they ever wanted to get what they really wanted, they needed to ask for

it.

"True Colors" followed and reminded anyone who may have forgotten that Lauper has been an energetic activist for LGBTQ rights. From writing and producing "Kinky Boots" to using her music to encourage kindness, Lauper's 30-year career has been inspiring. Audience members forgave the initial flat notes, and this writer even questioned if perhaps she was sick, as she had a slight cough. The last few songs of her set absolved all of the concerns about her earlier performance, even forgiving the cover of country hit "End of the World" and silly story about her time in Nashville.

Lauper left the stage reminding the audience to have a good summer and "be good to each other," and when the lights came up audience members were visibly moved by her gentle words.

Rod Stewart's stage was covered by a black and white checkered curtain, and his entrance was built up dramatically with classical music. His band members entered first, covered in gold glittering costumes, and he joined them crooning "Infatuation.' Stewart moved quickly through a high energy set, singing "Some Guys Have All the Luck," "This Old Heart of Mine," and "Tonight's the Night" with full audience participation.

Stewart was all smiles and spread his contagious joy singing "Forever Young." Mid-song he left for a costume change, and three percussionists entertained the

crowd with a mesmerizing and heart pounding trio. Stewart gladly promoted the drummers, fiddlers, harpsichordist, and saxophonist on stage with him, frequently offering opportunities for solos.

During a grouping of love songs, Stewart floated pictures of his wife and kids on the screens behind him. He smiled and admitted he had a great job as he sang a bluesy cover from Muddy Waters. With a nod to jazz blues, Stewart disclosed he owes a lot of those who inspired him.

Possibly the best moment of the night, however, came as he brought the crowd to their feet with "Downtown Train." At its close, the tenor sax's sweet round notes juxtaposed with high pitched screams demonstrated Jimmy Roberts' smooth jazz talent and breath support.

From that moment to the night's end, Rod Stewart and his fellow musicians only got more animated. "Proud Mary" gave Stewart time to again change costume, followed by faster and faster-paced songs. He kicked his characteristic soccer balls into the audience, reminding everyone he was a pro soccer player and danced at a high pace. The crescendo peaked when Stewart asked, "Do You Think I'm Sexy."

Clearly, the crowd does think Stewart is still sexy. At age 72, Stewart doesn't seem to be slowing down anytime soon. He still fills hearts with gladness and brings audacious musicians along for the ride.

# Andy Hall & Roosevelt Collier 'Let the Steel Play'

oosevelt Collier, the pedal steel player from the Lee Boys, and Andy Hall, the dobroist for The Infamous Stringdusters, forged a friendship aboard the Jam Cruise in 2012. Since then, they've managed to play together occasionally when their schedules aligned. The relationship grew and has finally borne fruit, in the form of their new release, "Let the Steel Play."

Collier was born into the church music of the sacred steel tradition while Hall's life has been steeped in the roots of bluegrass. Different musical worlds bridged by steel strings and glass slides. The resulting sound is a perfect blend of the heavenly and the down home, a religious experience happening casually from the porch of a country home.


The set opens with "This Little Light of Mine," a tune familiar to both gospel and bluegrass. It serves as the perfect introduction to the unique blended traditions present throughout. The melody flips back and forth between the two instruments flawlessly. Their version is wordless, but by the end you'll surely be singing along, "This little steel of mine, I'm gonna let it shine!" And shine they do.

The album borrows from the rich


traditions of both players with their takes on some more old traditional tunes, like the stunning beauty "Maiden's Prayer," a bopping run through "Reuben's Train" and the spirited "Power in the Blood." They also try their hands at a more modern classic with a version of The Grateful Dead's "Crazy Fingers" that will steel your face right off of your head.

Interspersed with the traditionals, the album includes a handful of original tunes the pair wrote specifically for this outing. Collier's steel sounds almost organ-like on the fun "Rosebud," while "Remington" is a great 'newgrass' tune where the part of fiddle is played by a pedal steel. It would be a surprising head turner were it not already in the context of this album. "The Darkest Hour" gets more deliberate and less freewheeling in a fairly sinister sounding turn. As an added bonus, the album closes with a threeway steel stringed jam, with Greensky Bluegrass's Anders Beck joining the duo on another dobro. A thorough exploration by two masters of their craft, this album is certainly a must listen for any pedal steel or dobro fan.

# Yoko Miwa Trio's 'Pathways'

pianist Yoko Miwa and her longstanding trio's newest album "Pathways" waltz you from the dance floor to the back alley with hints of everything from standards to show tunes and a few surprising renditions in between.

Released by Ocean Blue Tear Music, the album features pianist Miwa, bassist Will Slater (with Brad Barrett stepping in for one track) and drummer Scott Goulding (Miwa's husband). A highly affable experience featuring three seasoned and spectacularly attuned musicians, Pathways is a timeless album that goes down smooth from start to finish.

Things get rolling with a rare reprisal of Bill Evans Trio Bassist Marc Johnson's "Log O'Rythm" which is also joined by another one of Johnson's songs, "After You" on Pathways. Miwa also borrows from a page of Joni Mitchell's song book with a rendition of "Court and Spark."


"Lickety Split" takes listeners on a spin across the dance floor with fastpaced crescendos, spiraling into spontaneous jazz riffs. Like a rollercoaster ride,

the song has peaks and valleys, with appropriately placed drum and bass solos building anticipation which Miwa rises to meet.

Pathways' finale, a heartfelt rendition of the Beatles "Dear Prudence" could not be a more appropriate ending to a gorgeous piece of musicianship. A perfect blend of simplicity and beauty, the eightplus minute track unfolds gradually and deliberately, with some sections of improvisation dispersed among this familiar classic.

Yahama Pianos Artist, **IVC** Victor Entertainment recording artist and an assistant professor at the Berklee College of Music, Miwa came from Japan to Boston to attend Berklee in the late-1990s on a full scholarship and never left. With more than a decade and a half together, the jazz threesome holds down weekly residencies at several renowned Boston venues. This is Miwa's sixth album. Give it a listen and let Pathways bring pure beauty into your world.


# **Atomic Blonde**

Charlize Theron suave style evokes male counterpart James Bond, and embodies the 'Atomic Blonde'

hen packaged with raw sex appeal, an impeccable sense of style, whispery dialogue and a strong core of selfconfidence, leading actress Charlize Theron





fully embodied the "Atomic Blonde" title, proving that women too can headline an action spy movie. Released nationwide on July 28, this R-rated summer flick became quite the violent roller coaster, being an adaptation of the graphic novel, "The Coldest City" (2012) by Antony Johnston and Sam Hart.

Theron had already championed the don't-try-me-because-I'm-not-a-free-sample persona in films like "Mad Max: Fury Road" (2015) and "The Fate of the Furious" (2017). In this film, she was dropped into the streets of 1989 Berlin, before the wall fell, an arena that already evoked chaos and rebellion. Playing Lorraine Broughton, an MI6 agent, Theron both came across as intimidating with her towering height and feminine with her wardrobe choices, making her somewhat similar to her male counterpart, James Bond.

Teaming up with David Percival (James McAvoy), she must find a specific wristwatch that contains a list of Soviet agents' names and locate Satchel, an unknown double agent who's said to leak information from MI6 to the Soviet Union. The film also is presented in flashbacks as a visibly-wounded Broughton was interrogated about her actions in Berlin and the viewer watches on as more information emerged while facing a number of plot twists.

The filmmakers did a tremendous job in trying to transport the viewer into circa-1989 Berlin as graffiti often colored the buildings there, many young German adults were seen as always partying and drinking every night, and the Berlin Wall was facing imminent demolition. Something that deserves praise too is how the filmmakers managed to include many German and English music of the 1980s in the film, like that of The Police and the famous "99 Luftballons" song. While Berlin was evidently the epicenter of much civil unrest and intense emotion, Broughton and Percival had to deal with


a crisis on their parts which if they did not succeed, the Cold War was said to last another 40 years.

For the R-rated film enthusiast, "Atomic Blonde" is bejeweled with sex, nudity, profanity, action and violence. The film did begin with a nude Broughton having an ice bath and her sensuality was explored further when she met and shared a bed with French Intelligence agent Delphine Lasalle, portrayed by Sofia Boutella who is clearly trying to flex her acting career's muscles this year after appearing on "Kingsman: The Secret Service" (2015), "Star Trek Beyond" (2016) and "The Mummy" this year.

The film suffered from slow pacing at first, with scattershot brief action sequences, lots of dialogue and shots of Berlin's landmarks like the Wall, Alexanderplatz and Berliner Fernsehturm. Watching the characters, especially Broughton, constantly light and smoke their cigarettes as well as drink seemingly excessive amounts of alcohol personally got annoying although it clearly was part of the film's overall intended aesthetic.

"Atomic Blonde" really picked up when Broughton and Percival began trying to help an important defector named "Spyglass" and his family escape Berlin while a massive crowd of civilians were protesting against the Wall. This led to an intense and unforgettable fight scene where she fought off two henchmen, even becoming a punching bag herself as she became noticeably injured amid the kicks, punches, bone cracking and falls down the stairs. The fight continued into a room where Broughton grew more desperate and exhausted form the physical exertion, making the scene far more dramatic. All the while, a shot and bleeding Spyglass watched on helplessly, briefly trying to help her but to no avail.

This fight sequence was filmed all on one single take—or at least, it looked like one—which spoke to how professional and proficient the filmmakers and director



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David Leitch were. The sheer brutality also was emphasized by how Broughton constantly grunted and briefly screamed out loud as she pushed against her limits to fend off the henchmen. Productionwise, the camera remained perpetually kinetic, keeping very close to the combat like a demanding viewer longing for action and ensuring that one can not only cherish the violence, but also note the characters' frantic facial expressions.

It also bore huge similarities to the brutal staircase fight scene in 2006's

"Casino Royale" which had starred Daniel Craig as James Bond.

"Atomic Blonde" unfortunately got somewhat confusing at its end as the reveal of who the Satchel was felt convoluted. Herein presented the issue of who was considered a double or triple agent, and who the audience should trust.

But one thing for sure was that the wardrobe in this film was commendable.

The combination of Theron's impressive height and her outfits boasted both fashion and function. Notably, she wore

a pristine-white top coat which sadly got involved in a violent fight scene but miraculously, it appeared harmless by the end. Her seemingly endless array of coats, sunglasses, knee-high boots and the occasional fishnets communicated how much of a stylistic chameleon she was. In one scene, she oozed elegance, confidence and poise but in another, she appeared vulnerable and okay with taking fashionable risks. It all revolved back to how the wardrobe department of a film can be so vital to the production.

Kind of like how Theron's character endured physical abuse, trauma and betrayal, the film itself withstood its initial sense of slow pacing and finished with thrilling action despite a final perplexing plot twist. Its late-1980s Berlin setting also definitely gave the film an intriguing backdrop to operate on and with the intercourse among blood, rapid fight choreography and sensuality, the film can become a gem for R-rated movie lovers.

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

## They walk among us

Mental Calculators: This one is fairly self-explanatory. "Mental Calculators" can work out math at a much faster rate than the average person. The ability occurs most frequently in autistic savants (individuals with autism that have unusually extraordinary skills), at 10%, as opposed to less than 1% in the nonautistic population. There are many types of savant abilities, the most common being mathematical calculations, memory feats, artistic abilities, and musical abilities. Recent research has suggested one of the factors enabling this feat is a blood flow to the part of the brain responsible for mathematical calculations acting at six to seven times its normal rate. Examples of people with extraordinary calculation skills include Daniel McCartney, Salo Finkelstein, and Alexander Aitken. Daniel Tammet is one of few who are also autistic savants.

Echolocation: You might be surprised to see this entry on a list about humans. Although it is common knowledge how bats fly in the dark, emitting a sound and using the echo to navigate the world around them, fewer know of the limited group of humans who have been able to use the ability for themselves. The individual creates a noise like tapping a cane or making a clicking sound with their tongue, allowing them to determine the distance and density of the objects around them. If one ear receives much louder waves than the other, it shows the

sound bounced back faster, and thus took a shorter route—indicating the presence of an object or obstacle on that side. The ability is probably restricted to blind people, as it requires heightened sensitivity to sound. James Holman, Daniel Kish, and Ben Underwood have all been recorded as proficient at echolocation.

Though not quite superpowers, there are people everywhere with fascinating abilities. It could be a party trick or a part of their identity, but regardless, the abilities within humans remain delightfully mystifying.

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

## Not a pretty Bow Tie

"The building is beautiful but my biggest concern, however, is it doesn't keep with the architectural flavor of the city of Troy," said local resident Katherine Munson. "I just would like to see the exterior look more like the rest of Troy."

Fellow resident and movie enthusiast, Matthew Sekelick, similarly echoed her sentiment, "I believe in architecture, I believe it has a huge impact on the character of our city."

While he acknowledged that Bow Tie Cinemas and Bonacio Construction may want to maximize their profits with this cinema, they "need to be investing in the city of Troy too" and the 1 Monument Square site deserves a worthy building that satisfies locals.

Notably, he said he rents a place at a historical-looking building and he personally disliked how his view is of the back of the Troy Atrium which is windowless and plain to him. Hence, his own personal experience with how architecture personally affects someone was a focal point in his argument.

Tim Taney, owner of Slidin' Dirty, countered the architecture-concerned residents, "The moment we allow architecture, building materials and parking lots to define our city's character is the moment we've lost all the character altogether."

The general consensus was that there

should be a financially feasible way to edit the cinema's design but resident and artist Michael Lopez said, "I've heard a lot about money tonight but I haven't heard about our heritage," particularly plunging the entire room into reflective silence.

He brought up how not a single individual had concerns for the Hudson River before him and he wanted the cinema to be designed around it, perceiving the current design as a "barricade" and "a lot of blankness." Claiming that architecture does speak to who the people of Troy are, he wanted an improved design of the cinema's back side so that it complements the Hudson and even encourages locals to visit and gaze leisurely at the waters.

As a possible remedy to the locals' woes, the development team proposed it could feature movie posters or even sculptures there to give some flavor, even showing an artistic rendering which was received with a few approving nods.

Barbara Nelson, lead architect of the Breathing Lights at the Capital Region, suggested an alternate design, even handing out several copies, where the cinema would be elevated, the street level would have several storefronts and contain 70 more parking spaces—this could double as space for a flea market or parties. She argued that it would give people more reasons to visit the area and also appreciate the Hudson behind it.

However, the residents generally believed that a cinema would benefit the city's economy and tourism, being an inviting option for people from outside Troy to come visit. This could lead to boosting business in local neighboring stores or restaurants. Additionally, the residents want something meaningful to occupy the area that had once housed the old City Hall, having been torn down back in 2011.

"Troy has a feel that's somewhat intangible but it has that feel because of very tangible things, one of which is the architecture," said resident Kevin Carpenter. "The back [wall] could have a nod to [Troy's] maritime history. I do sort of disagree with some of the earlier comments that Troy's not about the architecture, I mean I moved here because of how Troy feels."

Other residents suggested a possible rooftop garden, patio, a more inviting back walkway to the Hudson, fewer than nine screens (deeming that the proposed 11 takes up too much valuable space) and even a more "viable" location for the cinema to be built.

Resident and business student Donna Su acknowledged that it is indeed hard to please everybody with such a huge project like the cinema but the modern design would have fared better in Saratoga Springs, Clifton Park and Albany, instead of Troy. She suggested that the development and construction teams could hold an online poll for residents to give their opinions to better inspire the design but not necessarily telling the architects directly what to do.

"Maybe each theater room could give honor to something very specific that's historical and meaningful to the residents of Troy or maybe naming a room, [it's just] rethinking how you're presenting this to the citizens," she said to the attending representatives of Bonacio Construction and Bow Tie Cinemas. "I feel like you're not putting [the citizens] well into your thoughts much and that's why people have to come out here and say that their voices aren't being heard."

After roughly 20 residents individually spoke up, the Planning Commission convened and advised the representatives to at least consider how the public felt and maybe adjust its design. They plan to meet again at a future date to continue discussing the proposal and eventually either approve or reject it altogether.

"We need to embrace opportunity and not discourage it," Vic Christopher memorably said who himself recognized how people will always have different opinions. He has said that new hotels could also appear in Troy soon, citing recent renovations downtown, to help draw people into the area.

Current Bow Tie Cinemas around the Capital Region are located at Saratoga Springs, Wilton Mall and Schenectady. Judging from how passionate the public was about Troy's proposal and how confident they were in how a cinema can rejuvenate the city's economy, a fourth one could exist as early as next year.

But its controversial design and location still hinders its ability to be approved, both by the Planning Commission and residents.

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
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
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
