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BETHLEHEM — Local officials cut the ribbon on the long-planned Delaware Avenue Hamlet Streetscape Enhancement project on Friday, Dec. 15.

Open Space, **Complete Street** plans approved

The Town Board unanimously approved two long-discussed municipal action plans during its last 2017 meeting:

• An open space plan outlining a conservation criteria plan to help the town identify land within its boundaries that are desirable for preservation as open space, and the tools that are available in the event that a preservation opportunity arises, and

•A plan to reconfigure Delaware Avenue between the Normans Kill Bridge and Elsmere Avenue as a "complete street," following a lengthy study, which will reduce lanes and add approximately a minute of travel time to those commuting through the corridor, but will provide easier access for other modes of transportation.

POLICE, FIRE AND EMERGENCY CALLS **Unattended bag prompts** evaucation of RCS High School

RAVENA — Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk High School was evacuated briefly on the morning of Tuesday, Dec. 12, after an unattended bag was deemed suspect.

Students were relocated to the middle school while State Police, the Coeymans Police Department and the Albany County Sheriff's Department investigated the bag and determined there was no threat.

The district issued a press release commending how students, faculty and staff responded to the situation.

"We are proud of how our students and staff responded today," said Superintendent Brian Bailey, in a post on the district's website, which characterized the occurrence as a successful test of the school's security protocols. "Their due diligence in adhering to our safety procedures was key to an efficient and safe response. We also want to thank the Albany County Sheriffs, State Police and Coeymans Police for their quick response and for assisting us in this matter."

Parents on the scene, however, voiced suspicion and concern that they were not alerted, and that the brief post was all the information made available by the district.

Danielle Pennick learned of the incident after her ninth-grade daughter contacted her by cell phone. From there, Pennick began making phone calls to find out what was happening. She said school officials told her that her daughter wasn't allowed to leave the premises and that authorities could not disclose exactly why.

Pennick said she felt she had been lied to, and didn't understand why a student's book bag became the focus

of a suspected threat. "What tipped you off?" she asked. "That's what I want to know."

"There was an unattended bag that was in the hallway," Bailey told Spotlight News. As a precaution, he said, students were initially told to remain in their locked classroom with their teachers as administrators and first responders assessed the situation, a response he referred to as "Shelter in Place," a common emergency response in New York state.

The situation began at around 7:45 a.m. Due to the fact that the district was waiting on various agencies to show up and assist with the investigation, said Bailey, the students were relocated to the middle school, which is located on the same campus, at a little after 9 a.m.

"It was just the location," Bailey said when asked what appeared suspicious about a book bag in a high school. "It was sitting in an area of the building where someone would not have ordinarily set a bag down.

"Everybody's so conscientious now in thinking about our student's safety," he said. "It's a heightened level of observation."

As far as notifying parents in situations such as this, Bailey said that while the school has a School News Notifier messaging system and posts information on the district website, he acknowledged that there was a delay informing parents about this incident.

"We wanted to get information to parents sooner," he said, but explained there were concerns about jeopardizing a potential investigation. "We wanted to ensure that the response was appropriate and waited for the lead investigator to help us with that."

Bailey also noted that parents who their classrooms by 10:30 a.m.

might "rush to the school en masse" could end up putting themselves and others in danger. He explained that emergency protocols depend on knowledge of where each student is, and said that it would be problematic if parents pulled them out of school suddenly or without informing the school.

Bailey elaborated briefly on emergency plans that the district has in place, noting even parents are rarely given the full scope of the plans for reasons of security. "That's sensible," he said. "You'll find that in any district."

While he said that safety plans are filed with the state every year, they are redacted for the public. "You don't want someone with ill intent to know all of the particulars of our response."

In a letter to parents sent out later that day, Bailey wrote, "The delay in communication on our part caused some unnecessary concern and, in the future, we will share information more quickly, even if initially incomplete, with updates as needed. Our goal is to keep you informed when we have activated an emergency response plan; ensuring the safety of all children."

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TOWN NEWS Making sense of dollars in 2017 town election

BETHLEHEM — Candidates for town office in 2017 were required to disclose monies raised or spent in service of their campaign at specified intervals during the year leading up to the election, with a last report due 27 days after the general election.

In Bethlehem, according to records kept by the New York State Board of Elections, campaign dollars were spent for lawn signs, literature, postage, fundraising events, advertising, Facebook boosts and, in one case, legal counsel. Individual donations were nearly all between \$25 and \$200, with family, corporations and other election committees sometimes contributing larger amounts. The largest influxes of money tended to come in the form of loans, often from the candidate to his or her own election committee.

The disparity in dollars spent was considerable.

According to filings, John "Tiger" Anastasi, who won the Highway Superintendent seat, spent the most on his campaign — \$17,482.97. His campaign also not only received the most donations — \$17,930.70, but also received the most donations from corporate donors: \$2,180 from 13 different donors, the largest of which was \$500 from Harrison & Burrowes Bridge Constructors in Glenmont.

The Anastasi campaign spent money on lawn signs, advertising and fundraisers, including more than \$600 on Facebook ads and more than \$3,000 for a fundraiser at the Normanside Country Club.

Comparatively, outgoing Town Board member Giles Wagoner, who entered the race for Highway Superintendent late, spent \$3,682.54 on his campaign and received \$1,125 in donations. The majority of his campaign expenditures seem to have been on a multi-media marketing firm.

Dan Morin, the other unsuccessful Highway candidate, did not file anything with the state Board of Elections. State law does not require disclosure of amounts under \$1,000, and Morin said that he spent a total of \$910 on lawn signs and flyers and "footwork."

Andy Kirby, who retained his seat as Town Justice, spent \$16,110.19 and received \$14,369 in donations. His primary expenditures were on advertising, primarily in Spotlight News, payments to Staples (presumedly for production of promotional materials), and more than \$2,000 on fundraisers at Normanside Country Club and Roux.

Kirby's competition, Colin Dwyer, appears to have spent only \$3,983.83 of the \$7,885 he raised, \$1,500 of which



was on fundraisers at Twisted Vine and Normanside Country Club, however his committee appears not to have submitted any reports for the periods immediately before and after the general election.

Both town justice candidates received donations from local law firms.

Dan Coffey, who lost the race for Town Board after abdicating his positions on the Zoning Board of Appeals and as an officer for the Bethlehem Democratic Committee, spent \$13,185.64, after raising \$9,108.50, including \$500 from the Capital Women Political Action Committee.

One of Coffey's biggest campaign expenditures was to the Working Families Party, which was the only party line the Democrat ran on. He paid the party more than \$3,500 for literature that it supplied and mailed. Other big expenses were lawn signs and mailers. He also spent more than \$1,500 to retain the legal services of James Long when Democratic opponents brought a lawsuit against Coffey and Wagoner.

Maureen Cunningham, who won the most votes in the four-way competition for the two seats on the Town Board, spent \$9,055.98 on her campaign and received \$10,976 in donations, including a \$5 donation from her husband for the purpose of opening up a campaign bank account. Cunningham, who also received donations from Senator Neil Breslin and Assemblywoman Pat Fahy, spent on advertising, mailers and a communications consulting firm.

Jim Foster, who won the other Town Board seat, reportedly spent \$4,608.71, after raising \$4,663.44, including \$250 from the Independence Party. He spent primarily on printing, mailing and lawn signs.

George Harder, the fourth candidate in that race, raised \$5,438.31, the majority of which seems to have been at a fall fundraiser, but spent only \$1,478.81, mostly on a fundraiser and mailing costs.

Supervisor-elect David VanLuven made more use of Facebook than any other town candidate. He raised \$13,742, without any corporate donors, and spent \$11,435.39, including: \$1,600 for a fundraiser at Twisted Vine; more than \$1,000 paid to

the Bethlehem Democratic Committee; thousands to a multi-media marketing firm; and money for coffee from Perfect Blend for his campaign volunteers — in addition to multiple payments to Facebook for ads and boosted posts.

VanLuven's opponent, Gary Fish, reportedly received \$4,506.17 in contributions and spent \$3,279.18 on his campaign, primarily on lawn signs and fundraising events, however his campaign hasn't filed anything for the period following the general election.

As a point of comparison, Paula Mahan, who won the race to retain her seat as supervisor in the Town of Colonie, spent nearly \$70,000 on her campaign.

In the race for county legislator, Democrat Victoria Plotsky of Clarksville won her campaign after spending \$9,948.38 and receiving \$11,539 in donations, including \$2,000 from the Capital Women PAC, \$250 from Albany County Executive Dan McCoy's election committee, and \$1,050 from committees for Breslin, Fahy, Assemblyman Phil Steck, Albany County Sheriff Craig Apple and four other county elected officials.

Her opponent, Tim Stanton, appears to not have filed any campaign finance reports with the state.

Look, listen for God in the ordinary

Local author publishes religious devotional encouraging people to find the Lord in their daily lives

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
BETHLEHEM — Local author Robert LaCosta believes that people can learn to see and hear God. As someone who works in an industry helping people to actually hear, he sees his other vocation as doing the same work in the spiritual realm. A prolific writer of spiritual allegory, inspirational storytelling and songs, he recently published his latest book, a daily devotional meant to remind people to look for those opportunities to encounter God on a daily basis — even on a busy schedule.

LaCosta, noting that devotionals have become popular for the very reason that the average schedule simply doesn't allow for spending an hour or two with one's chosen scripture every day, said that he believes his is unique in that it is not inspired by scripture, but by his own experiences. A member of Bethlehem Community Church in Delmar, LaCosta was raised a Roman Catholic. He says he's always able to find a Bible passage that exemplifies the experiences he shares in his book, Portals to Heaven.

"Portals to heaven are these little daily metaphor-du-jours, or that's what I call them," said LaCosta. "And they're ways of beginning to interpret what's before you, right before you in the now, as an opening to heaven — a portal or a gateway to heaven."

It can be anything, he said, sharing several examples. In once instance, he was at a public swimming pool in New Jersey and could see the Atlantic Ocean beyond a wall bearing all the necessary pool maintenance apparatus. He said it made him think about all the labor humans put into maintaining things that are often pale copies of their naturally made, self-sustaining originals. Every morning, LaCosta is fortunate enough to see the sun rise over the Hudson River from his home and says that, in itself, is its own daily affirmation for him.

"What I thought the Lord was showing me was, very simply, that there are metaphors in virtually everything I'm seeing," he said. "From watching squirrels and birds fighting over the bird feeder while I'm sitting on my back porch, and we have plenty of seeds, we'll fill it back up, but they're fighting over it. And that reminded me of war and mankind's insecurity that God's not going to take care of them."

years, and says that putting them into a print version spanning a year —

print version spanning a year portals written by LaCosta on Monday through Wednesday for 53 weeks, and do-it-yourself portal exercises on the weekends — was surprisingly difficult.

"I didn't start doing it to write a book," he said. "I had to turn a 400to 600-word blog into a 250-word portal, and the constraints are much more severe with print." To edit more than 360 portals, he said, "was crazy."

It all came together, however, and his book went on the market on the morning of Black Friday. "That, in and of itself, was kind of a portal," he said laughing. "It went through so many edits and had some problems and by the time CreateSpace released it, it literally hit on the morning of Black Friday. It was amazing. I've been editing that book since February."

LaCosta, who has been a regular columnist for the Senior Spotlight, has also published three novels and has an online devotional site, called Awaken (at sonrisen.com), where he publishes longer Portals to Heaven posts alongside other

Clarkson commended town planning staff and the engineering and construction companies that worked to complete the project so quickly, even while running into a series of unexpected delays after digging up several unexpected objects during construction.

"I believe the construction term is substantial completion," he said, acknowledging that there are several elements yet to be completed. New road signs and flashing pedestrian beacons are expected to be installed by next week, while decorative brick-style crosswalks will have to wait until next spring, as they require warmer weather. Replacement overhead streetlights are also expected to be installed in the spring, working with National Grid. Finally, a giant mural will be installed when delivered by the manufacturer in the next couple of weeks.

The mural, which will be mounted on the abutments on either side of the Delaware Bridge, between Hudson Avenue and Oakwood Place, will stand seven feet tall and 33 feet long on each side, according to Planning Director Rob Leslie. It highlights each of the neighborhoods and hamlets throughout the town, depicting images of daily life in Bethlehem.

The streetscape project also installed pads for three transit shelters, located at Main Square, St. Thomas and the Delmar Reformed Church. "The actual installation of the shelters will be done by CDTA," said Deputy Commissioner of Public Works Paul Penman. "We are coordinating with them and expect them to be completed over the winter."

The full streetscape project involved the implementation of multi-modal and streetscape enhancements along Delaware Avenue, from Elsmere Avenue to Adams Street, as well as portions of Kenwood Avenue and Adams Street. These enhancements consisted of new sidewalks, crosswalks, curbing, on-street parking, street trees and decorative lighting fixtures. The total project cost \$3.1 million, with \$1.9 million provided by the town and the other \$1.2 million through a grant from the New York State Department of Transportation.

"This effort goes back at least a decade, probably more," said Clarkson. "There were two citizens groups that were involved. One was the Delaware Avenue Enhancement Committee that produced the first study on this and that was followed up by the work of the Delaware Avenue Improvement Group, which is a public/private group still very much in existence, which the town co-chairs with the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce."

He noted several new businesses that have opened along that corridor in recent years, and a few that are set to, such as the Bliss Smoothie Bar that will be located right next to the Albany County Helderberg-Hudson Rail Trail. Clarkson credited the multi-modal nature of the improvements and walkability for at least some of that new development.

State Senator Neil Breslin, who lives not far from Delaware Avenue in Delmar, was on hand to commend Clarkson and town staff. "This is fantastic," he said. "These are the kind of events that I love to be at, because it's a win-win-win for our downtown. And all of us who live here know that it's the finest community in the Capital District.

"To everybody involved in this," he said, "congratulations. Job really well done. I thank each of the restaurants and bars for being patient, because you're going to be rewarded. We're going to have people walking these streets and shopping and," he chuckled, "pleasing the Chamber of Commerce."

"This, this, this is how you build community," said Assemblywoman Pat Fahy. "These types of public investments are what leverage the growth of businesses, but it's not just the businesses. It really is that sense of community, aside from the safety aspect of it with the schools so close by. People want walkable communities."

Breslin and Fahy both commended Clarkson for seeing the project through, noting that talk doesn't always lead to action.

"I know that that work will absolutely continue under David VanLuven," said Fahy of the town's supervisor-elect.

"We know this has been a challenge for some of the businesses here," said Jennifer Kilcoyne, president of the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce, "but there have been much-needed improvements." She noted that on-street parking and easier vehicular access to businesses made the project beneficial to drivers as well as pedestrians, cyclists and those who use public transportation.

Landscaping and other finishing touches have been completed, according to Penman, and may be touched up in the spring.

The project added 118 new trees to the Delaware Avenue corridor, said Clarkson. "And that doesn't include the 60 street trees through our regular program," he said. "So, all told, there are 178 new trees, which is something we're very proud of."





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

Billions of gallons of toxic sewage enter state's waters each year

Environmental Advocates of NY issues disturbing update to its Tapped Out report from 2016

ALBANY — Environmental Advocates of New York has released an addendum to a report published last year analyzing sewage pollution in state water bodies used for drinking and recreational activities, caused primarily by poor wastewater infrastructure leading to sewage system overflows.

At the time the analysis, Tapped Out, was released, information gathered by the New York state Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) revealed that there had been 2,696 reported sewage overflows between May 2013 and June 2015. More recent data from DEC shows that there were an additional 7,991 spills reported between June 2015 and July 2017 bringing the total volume of spilled sewage to nearly four billion gallons.

While the increase in reported spills is significant, 273 percent since data collection began in May 2013, EANY said the DEC database still indicates significant underreporting and, in many cases, a complete lack of reporting.

"The total volume, in combination with the fact that one-third of reports have no reported volume," states the addendum report, "reveals that only a fraction of true discharges corresponding volumes statewide have been reported." It has been estimated by the environmental watchdog Hudson Riverkeeper that New York City's combined sewer system discharges approximately 28 billion gallons of sewage into local waterways each year — equal to 12 times the volume reported statewide over four years.

Gov. Andrew Cuomo signed the Sewage Pollution Right to Know Act in 2012, which requires that discharges of untreated or partially treated sewage are to be reported publicly owned treatment plants and sewer systems within two hours of discovery to DEC and within four hours of discovery to the public and adjoining municipalities.

"If any untreated sewage were to be discharged into the Hudson River from our facility, our staff is required to notify the NYS DEC," said Bethlehem's Commissioner of Public Works George Kansas, explaining that staff at the town's wastewater treatment plant monitors all flows into and out of the plant. In Bethlehem, he said, the storm water sewer system is separate from the town's sewage collection system, which makes toxic discharges far less likely when there are heavy rains. Many neighboring municipalities have combined systems, which are more prone to discharge.

"The Act was meant as a proactive means of disclosing sewage overflow information to potentially impacted people," wrote EANY's Elizabeth Moran, "and drew the spotlight on the root cause: a wastewater infrastructure in dire need of investment." Moran said the "failing system" is discharging an estimated tens of billions of gallons of raw sewage into local water bodies every year.

Reported overflows, while often incomplete, cite a number of causes, the most common of which are heavy rains and melting snow, which can overwhelm aging combined systems. Other causes include: equipment failure; blockage of pipes; proximate construction projects; human error; and "toxic die-off of biomass."

A 2004 report by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) estimated that there are as many as 5,000 cases of illness at state-recognized beaches each year that can be attributed to recreational exposure to the waterborne pathogens, parasites and other disease causing organisms found in untreated sewage. EPA also acknowledged those numbers are likely conservative.

EANY said a lack of adequate regulations for implementation was one cause of the severe underreporting during the early years of the Act, and noted that reporting increased by 153 percent the year that final regulations were adopted in November 2016. Those regulations require immediate reporting, no exceptions, from all publicly owned wastewater treatment facilities and publicly owned sewer systems.

"The implementation of the law has revealed important consequences of our failure to invest adequately in wastewater infrastructure, and environmental law and enforcement," wrote Moran. "The Sewage Pollution Right to Know database illustrates the consequences of a lack of investment: New York's wastewater infrastructure is in crisis."

In 2014, State Comptroller Thomas DiNapoli released a report in which he identified an \$800 million annual funding gap for wastewater infrastructure needs alone, funding for which EANY is advocating. In addition to bringing WIIA (New York's Water Infrastructure Improvement Act) funding to \$800 million annually, EANY is also advocating for increased staffing at DEC to enforce the Sewage Pollution Right to Know Act as well as financial support for municipalities to improve their monitoring and reporting practices.

Gov. Andrew Cuomo announced this month \$623 million in regional economic development grants, including \$85 million for 110 projects here in the Capital District. More than \$10.2 million has been allotted for wastewater treatment and discharge mitigation systems, including:

- \$5 million to the City of Albany to build two "Floatables Control Facilities" to collect floatable debris and materials associated with several combined sewer outfalls;
- \$487,000 for two projects in the City of Cohoes that would reduce stress on the city's combined sewer system;
- \$30,000 each to the City of Watervliet and the villages of Menands and Hoosick Falls to conduct studies related to improving wastewater systems;
- \$1 million to the Village of Corinth to replace an existing main and make sewer improvements to support the new River Street Pump Station and Wastewater Treatment Plant;
- \$2.5 million to the Village of Lake George to upgrade its wastewater treatment facility; and
- \$977,000 to Washington County Sewer District Two to relocate a combined sanitary/storm sewer main from private property to a public right of way, separate sanitary and storm sewers and install new sewer lines.

In 2017, Albany County also received more than \$10 million in WIIA funding to upgrade wastewater treatment systems.

"Every time there are heavy rains, New York's most precious resource, its waterways, get hit with sewage overflows," said Moran. "Our new analysis shows that New Yorkers are starting to get a clearer picture of the state of their water thanks to much improved sewage overflow reporting. Unfortunately, that picture shows billions of gallons of raw sewage plague our waterways. Until we see a sustained, annual investment of at least \$800 million to fix our pipes, rampant sewage overflows that threaten public health and quality of life will only continue."

COLONIE — The Lady Raiders basketball team held off The Lady Eagles for a Suburban Council win on Tuesday, Dec. 12.


It was a back and forth game, and Bethlehem was within one point with just under three minutes to play. However, Colonie went on to win the game 53-48 following an 8-4 run.

hrough the course of the 20th century, our cities and communities grew exponentially without consideration for the environment, let alone the riverfront property we are now making strides to reclaim for recreation and living space.

Each city within the Capital District is reclaiming riverside property in an effort to beautify each cityscape with a mix of parks, music venues and desirable housing. There is the fight to fill the void left behind by the demolition of Troy's City Hall, a hole that provides a view from Monument Square. There is also Rivers Casino and Resort that replaced a half century old abandoned rail yard with a multi-million dollar recreational center. And, Albany, which now regrets the construction of the spaghetti network of highways that severs its ties to its Riverfront, continuously attempts to expand upon Jennings Landing to return Albanians back to the river.

In Bethlehem alone, an effort to revitalize the 10-mile stretch of waterfront along the Hudson River has been an active plan since the town last adopted a comprehensive plan more than a decade ago.

Millions of dollars and several businesses are investing into the idea of returning back to the Hudson River. One only has to look at the joint application between Albany and Rensselear, attempting to lure Amazon to bring its headquarters here with a campus along both sides of the Hudson.

The river has long been the joke of local residents as a continuous cesspool for the industries and communities that dumped waste into it. Though it seems the awakening of a now environmentally conscious community sees the need to take care of the Hudson, there is still a lot of work ahead before we can say the job is done.

Toxic discharge through aging sewage systems in the cities upstream from our town needs to be addressed. Heavy rains, snow melt and other factors are amplifying the inadequacies of their infrastructures and leading to already harmful situations the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency estimates cause as many as 5,000 illnesses at state beaches.

Our town needs to knock on our neighbors' doors to the North and hold them accountable for these events, as well as informing us of when these events take place. Even better, hasten efforts to fix the problem entirely.

"... Handel delcared that he 'saw heaven opened and the great God himself' while writing the famous chorus. Evidently, Handel learned heaven's lesson. For how else could he have written the timeless masterpiece in just 24 days?"

"The best art is created when an artist puts himself in a position to borrow from heaven and lend it to earth." Isaiah 6:1b, 2, 3, 8 (NKJV) contributions from guest writers. FEDERAL GOVERNMENT ENY releases congressional environmental scorecard

NEW YORK — Environment New York (ENY) released its federal scorecard, which evaluates how the New York 115th congressional delegation voted on clean air, clean water and other issues of environmental protection, on Dec. 7.

"The country is terribly polarized these days on all sorts of issues, including the need to protect our environment. It shouldn't be this way and it didn't used to be," said ENY Director Heather Leibowitz. "Unfortunately, the New York delegation is no exception."

According to Leibowitz, members of the U.S. Senate voted to support the environment 48 percent of the time on bills regarding things like incentivizing sustainable energy, confirmation of federal appointees, wildlife refuges, mining of national forests, methane emissions and more. In the U.S. House of Representatives, members voted with environmental advocates only 45 percent of the time. "The two senators from New York averaged 100 percent," Leibowitz said of Senators Chuck Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand, "and our house members averaged 73 percent. So, New York is well above the national average." (Absences were counted against a member's score.)

Twelve congresspeople from New York voted with environmental advocates 100 percent of the time: Representatives Kathleen Rice (D-NY-4), Grace Meng (D-NY-6), Nydia Velazquez (D-NY-7), Hakeem Jeffries (D-NY-8), Adriano Espaillat (D-NY-13), Joseph Crowley (D-NY-14), Jose Serrano (D-NY-15), Nita Lowey (D-NY-17), Paul Tonko (D-NY-20), Brian Higgins (D-NY-26), as well as Senators Charles Schumer (D-NY), and Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY).

"We also had a few members who were willing to part with their Republican colleagues to protect the environment. Representatives Elise Stefanik (R-NY-21), John Faso (R-NY-19), and John Katko (R-NY-24) voted against limiting EPA's ability to curb methane emissions," said Leibowitz. "But, unfortunately New York also had seven members who voted with us less than 25 percent of the time, including Lee Zeldin (R-NY-1), Peter King (R-NY-2), Dan Donovan (R-NY-11), John Faso (R-NY-19), Claudia Tenney (R-NY-22), Tom Reed (R-NY-23), and Chris Collins (R-NY-27).

"The New York delegation is a mixed bag when it comes to the environment," she said. "Here's hoping our Congresspeople uniformly start to show the kind of strong and effective leadership we need to reflect the core environmental values so many of us share."

Public hearing on new Elsmere fire station tonight

ELSMERE — A ballot proposition authorizing the financing and construction of a \$1.4 million, 4,608 square foot fire district substation at Feura Bush and Wemple roads, passed earlier this month by a vote of 272 to 180.

Commissioner Richard S. Webster was also re-elected to a five-year term on the district's Board of Fire Commissioners.

The new station was proposed to better serve those in the southern portion of the district, and has been contested by those who believe that the district should coordinate better with volunteers from the Selkirk and Delmar districts, both of which have a station within a mile and a half of Wemple and Feura Bush.

A meeting held on Wednesday, Dec. 6, to present the ballot proposal to district residents got heated at points, as members of the town's various fire districts voiced their opinions on the matter.

There will be a public hearing tonight, Wednesday, Dec. 20, before the Bethlehem Zoning Board of Appeals at 6 p.m. in the Town Hall auditorium at 445 Delaware Ave. in Delmar.



BETHLEHEM — Few elected officials go out with a bang like John Clarkson anticipates.

The town's First Night festivities this New Year's Eve will be his last day in office.

"First Night is my last day," said Clarkson. The Slingerlands resident announced he would not seek a fourth term at the helm earlier this year.

Buttons are \$10 for adults (\$15 the night of the event), \$5 for kids aged 12 to 18 years old, and free for children under 12.

Money from First Night Bethlehem button sales goes towards raising money for several different community causes: Bethlehem Community Fund, Bethlehem Opportunities Unlimited (BOU), Bethlehem Senior Projects and Friends of Bethlehem Parks & Recreation.

Beneficiaries

The Bethlehem Community Fund's mission is to raise money to fill the gap left by traditional social services. Teachers, nurses, guidance counselors, school social workers and area clergy make most of the requests for assistance. Children receive help with school supplies, tutoring expenses, eyeglasses, clothing, camp tuition and other needs. Seniors may find assistance with utility bills, small home repairs, medical costs, a personal emergency response system or pet care. Each December, over 100 Bethlehem families receive holiday baskets of food, clothing and gifts.

All First Night Bethlehem proceeds received by Friends of Bethlehem Parks and Recreation are held in a Scholarship Fund to assist local individuals and families in need participate in town Parks and Recreation activities.

"We love being a part of First Night Bethlehem – we help provide a safe and fun celebration and, at the same time, raise funds for our scholarship fund," said Joan Gavrilik of Friends of Bethlehem Parks and Recreation. "Through this fund, the Friends assist local individuals and families in need participate in town Parks and Recreation activities."

All proceeds received by Bethlehem Opportunities Unlimited will go to a scholarship fund in memory of boardmember Chris Porter.

"Christine Porter served as a Bethlehem Opportunities Unlimited board member for more than 15 years," said BOU President Cindy Ferrari. "During her time on our board, Chris filled pretty much every role we had. Her passing has been a huge loss to our whole community and we feel the best way to honor her memory would be for BOU to dedicate all our proceeds from First Night Bethlehem to a scholarship in her memory."

And, monies donated to Bethlehem Senior Projects, Inc., will either be used to help support the Bethlehem Food Pantry, or it will be added to an emergency heating fund, or it will be put towards the purchase of a new bus.



Roasted Red Pepper, Sun–Dried Tomato & Feta Topped Chicken



hicken is a versatile food that can be prepared and cooked in various ways and is capable of being combined with a host of tasty ingredients. In fact, cooking and serving chicken with certain foods can pack a flavorful punch, turning an otherwise bland chicken breast into a dish families won't soon forget. Such is the case with the following recipe for "Roasted Red Pepper, Sun-Dried Tomato and Feta Topped Chicken" from Laurie McNamara's "Simply Scratch: 120 Whole Homemade Recipes Made Easy" (Avery).

Ingredients: Serves four

- *4* boneless, skinless chicken breasts (6
- to 8 ounces each) 12 cup My Grandma's Greek Dressing (see below)

1/3 cup diced charred red bell pepper (see below)

1 tablespoon minced sun-dried tomatoes

1 tablespoon brined capers, rinsed and drained

- 1 tablespoon minced fresh flat-leaf parsley
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/8 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 3/4 cup crumbled feta cheese
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter
- 1 tablespoon olive oil

Instructions:

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Place the chicken in a medium bowl or large resealable bag and pour the Greek dressing over the top. Marinate the chicken on the countertop for 20 minutes. (Any longer and the lemon juice will start to break down, or "cook," the chicken.)

In a medium bowl, combine the bell pepper, tomatoes, capers, parsley, salt, black pepper and feta.

In a 12-inch cast-iron or other ovensafe skillet, melt the butter with the olive oil over medium-high heat. Remove the chicken from the marinade and let any excess marinade drip back into the bag. Place the chicken top-side down in the skillet and sear for 4 to 6 minutes. Turn the chicken over and divide the pepper and feta mixture over the top. Slide the skillet into the oven. Bake for 15 to 18 minutes, or until the chicken is cooked through. Carefully transfer the chicken to a platter and let it rest for 5 to 6 minutes before serving.

My Grandma's Greek Dressing

Ingredients: Makes 3/4 cup

1 large clove garlic

1 teaspoon dried oregano, crushed in your palm

1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

- 1/4 teaspoon coarsely ground black
- pepper

1/4 cup fresh lemon juice, strained of pulp and seeds

1/2 cup olive oil

Instructions:

Pass the garlic through a garlic press into a glass jar or resealable storage container. Add the oregano, salt and pepper. Pour in the lemon juice and olive oil.



The Five Dials

Help your diet take off with these pointers from our personal trainer

f you've ever flown on a plane usually you get a look into the cockpit. Have you ever taken a moment to really look at it?

There's a bewildering number of dials switches and other things. My thought was, "how the heck do they keep track of all that?"

One time I was waiting for a flight and a pilot happened to come sit down next to me. I struck up a conversation with him about his career and later brought up the quesiton above.

"How the heck do you keep track of all those dials?"

He smiled and said, "its not as hard as you think. There's really only about five that I pay attention to. Those five are the ones that keep the plane flying and get us to our destination safely and on time. The others, I only use if I see a problem on one of the five main dials. If I do see an issue I then know to look at the others to get more information about the issue and how to address it."

That was an a-ha moment for me. Why is this important and what does

it have to do with health and fitness? Well, think about the pilot for a

second. If the pilot had to pay attention to ALL the dials he wouldn't be able to focus on the most important task – Flying the plane.

So, let's translate that to fitness. Think about it for a second.

These days we seem to be on fitness overload. We wear fitness tracking devices that give us a wide variety of statistics. We're on social media where we are bombarded with information on what do to/eat/think to be healthier. The never ending stream of infomercials on TV pitching the latest and greatest new product that's going to help us lose weight and get in shape and so on. It leads to chaos and confusion for most of us and it's something I work on with my clients every day.

So, going back to my story about the pilot instead of trying to monitor hundreds of dials of information to measure our fitness lets strip it down to just five.

These are the same five I use myself to track how I'm doing health wise and ones I use with many of my clients.

My Five "Dials" are:

1. Weight & Body Composition a.k.a. Body Fat

2. Resting Heart Rate

3. Average Hours of Sleep per Night

Steps per Week
 Strength measurements (e.g., how

many squats I can do at x weight or how many pushups I can do in a minute)

Why do I use these? Because A) These have been shown to be a good guide to having a healthier life and when you see changes in them it indicates that there may be something askew that you need to look into further.

For example if you see sudden increases or decreases in weight, or perhaps your Resting Heart Rate suddenly goes up, you may want to try and figure out why or perhaps speak to your doctor.

With sleep and steps these are good indications of how much your moving and well sleeping.

As for the strength of these numbers, they give me an idea of how well I'm progressing with my workouts and how effective they are.

These are the basics that work for me and it should be noted that your dials may look a little different based on your goals and current health.

If, for example, you are a diabetic or pre-diabetic, you many need to monitor your blood sugar. Or you might want/need to monitor blood pressure, or any number of metric. What to measure and in what way is something you should speak with your medical professional about,

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Sun Parade's 'Shuggy Mtn Breakdown'

R elinquishing their debut fulllength album to the world, Sun Parade successfully tugs at familiar emotions to send listeners on a 12-track sensory highway. "Shuggy Mtn Breakdown" boasts airy pop-rock blended with vibrant psychedelia that comes crashing down in waves. The five-piece Northampton, Mass. outfit takes you on a journey through self discovery with thematic commonalities all humans endure love, life, questioning happiness and how to pursue it.

With infectious melodies and lighthearted vocals, Chris Marlon Jennings (vocals, guitar), Jeff Lewis (vocals, guitar), Max Wareham (bass, vocals), Karl Helander (drums, vocals), and Eli Salus-Kleiner (keyboard) are able to instantly grab a listening ear through their radioready sound while remaining comfortably candid. Reminiscent of elements of the White Stripes' prominent and punchy vocals. Tame Impala's airy singing and the Black Keys' american rock tone, the indie, power-pop album was recorded in a one-room studio on the fourth floor of an old industrial Brooklyn building. It's no surprise that Rubblebucket's own Ian Hersey sat in the producer's chair to extend a helping hand and trained ear.

The whimsical opening track of "Sleep Alone" warmly welcomes listeners into a dream-pop state of mind before launching into the cheeky "Cheer Up," which does just as its title implies with both tempo and mood simultaneously picking up. Distorted noise and spoken word vocals shine on "Steal My Thunder" while "Game Boy" brings forth an extremely relatable message, embracing hooks and easy-to follow lyrics.

A relaxed and slowed down "Braindrain" flips a genre switch as it walks away from the bubblegum sound and introduces a more delicate, soul-leaning attitude, complete with mesmerizing synth sounds and whistle-along tangents. The hard hitting and emotional rock track "Psycho" follows with wailing vocals and gritty grunge guitar breakdowns you didn't see coming but can't imagine the album without. "Shuggy Mtn" holds its own as the album's party anthem. The namesake song dives into sonic exploration and punk tendencies by blending psychedelic rock elements with wailing vocals and hard hitting on the drum kit.

The second to last track on the album, "Echoes of My Heart," softens the tone and slows the release's pulse with a quick, dreamy interlude before "Tear (Can't Stop Believing)," wraps Sun Parade's initial release and circles back to the album's blunt storytelling and hopeful tone.

Through airy vocals and melodic exploration, the quintet proved they aren't afraid to have fun and dip their toes in a pool of myriad genres while getting emotionally raw with their audience. "Shuggy Mtn Breakdown" aims to be timeless, allowing their hopeful and tender lyrics to appropriately contrast and offset its darker rock and roll musical elements.

Since 1993, when Americans took in 449 million gallons of wine, the number has more than doubled to 949 million in 2016. Today, it's common for people to buy two bottles of wine, one to pair for a meal and another for dessert. Cremeans book is for the latter.

"My husband and I really enjoy wine with meals," said Cremeans, who said she is not fond of beer nor other spirits, "but I've always enjoyed finding wine and food combinations. It's like a little puzzle for me."

While Cremeans is not a trained sommelier, she didn't go through her journey of drafting this book alone. First, she said, she would think of a dessert and identify what wines she thought would pair well with it.

"It's kind of like how I enjoy baking and trying different flavors, in the same way I've never been able to stick with the recipe," said Cremeans. "It always comes out of my own taste and I try to

discover what tastes best. I love trying to discover what tastes best with wine." Then, she went to her local store to speak with someone she trusted. "I would go through the desserts and imagine what flavors of wine would enhance the flavors of the dessert, and then I would go to a local wine shop. A local wine expert that I would work with either confirm or deny putting those desserts with the wine. It definitely helped me along the way."

The process later evolved, Cremeans said, as she would reach out to the wineries themselves, "because those producers know exactly what they are making, and have a vision of where they want to see it go. I shared my idea and the dessert I wanted to pair it with, and they were on board."

Cremeans, and her husband, Devin, are both of the millennial generation credited with a the surging wine business. The demographic, as a whole,





is oft described as tech savvy, information hungry and wine thirty. The Wine Market Council recently reported that 42 percent of all wine consumed in the United States was by Millennials.

"I know Millennials see it as kind of a bad rep: we've been given so many resources to learn," said Cremeans. "Even with just the smartphone, we don't even have to think twice before finding the answer to a question we're curious about. So,

I think having all these resources at our disposal, and with the internet, I think it enhances that learning muscle and prompts that desire to learn."

Submitted photo Cremeans, 25, said she's been baking, "ever since I could hold a spoon. One of my biggest frustrations growing up was making a beautiful cake and then having it dry out." Something, she said she feels intimidates others from trying new, elaborate recipes. So, each dessert is meant to be presented in a Mason jar. When the lid to the jar is kept on tight, Cremeans said the dessert can last up to ten days. "And dryness has never been a problem. ... I think Mason jar cakes taste even better

the second or third day, when the frosting and cake have locked in with one another."

Cremeans end product is a six-chapter book with 30 different recipes. Chapter titles include Orange Treats, Party Time, Date Night, Classics, Summertime Sweets and Cozy Holiday. Each recipe is paired with a wine, a picture and a story, aesthetic enough to be a coffee-table book and practical in purpose

to be found in the kitchen. "I did my best to make the book a 'fool proof,' so people Alyssa enjoys a of all baking bottle of wine with



you're regularly looking at that give you the information you need to to get your "destination."

Oh, and of course, the question of having more than five dials tends to come up..

Basically, through trial and error, five seems to be the sweet spot of what you can focus on and what should give you the big picture that you need to make the right decisions to achieve your goals.

Any more than that can leave to information overload and often paralysis

by analysis.

Plus, at least in my experience, most people aren't regularly monitoring any dials, five is plenty.

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
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

Shake. Pour. Swoon.

Store the salad dressing in the refrigerator, but pull it out 10 to 15 minutes prior to using to warm up the solidified oil, or run the jar under warm tap water. Store in the refrigerator for three to four months.

Charred peppers:

Grill: Heat a grill to medium-high. Place a pepper (or peppers) on the grates, close the lid and let it char for 5 minutes. Rotate and repeat this process until all sides are charred. After 12 to 15 minutes, the skin should be black and blistered.

Gas stovetop: Using metal tongs, hold the

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pepper over a medium-high flame, rotating it to create an even char.

Oven: Preheat the broiler to high and crack the oven door. Place a washed pepper on a foillined, rimmed baking sheet and slide it under the broiler, rotating it every few minutes until it is charred.

Pairing:

Almaden 'Pinot Noir' Almaden Winery California

A sauvignon blanc or charadonnay would usually go best with chicken, but with the feta cheese topping, you want to go with something like a pinot noir. This wine from Almaden Winery is said to provide a "soft and elegant, bursting with fragrant fruit and spice character" according to the winery's notes.




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
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
