BCSD facing \$3.3 million budget gap

Preliminary budget overview and State of the Schools address

BETHLEHEM — During its initial budget overview presented on Thursday, Feb. 8, officials with Bethlehem Central School District anticipate that it will face a baseline budget gap of more than \$3.3 million in the 2018-19 school year, after approximately \$97 million in revenues fails to cover more than \$100 million in expenditures.

The \$3.3 million gap is larger than the \$1.4 million deficit that was projected in last year's multi-year budget forecast, said BCSD Chief Financial Officer Judith Kehoe.

"Every year, we look ahead three years using data and reasonable assumptions of what to expect," said Kehoe. "However, when we put our projections together last spring, the expenditure projections were well below the actual growth in fringe benefit costs, and the revenue projections were also lower, primarily from reductions in actual state aid. These two factors combined put us approximately \$1.9 million below where we had hoped to be in beginning our budget development discussions for next year.

"Fortunately," she said, "we have several tools to address the gap so that we can continue to provide exceptional educational programs to our community. But we certainly have some work to do in the coming months.'

National Grid delays

Utility company to review study before further pursuit of variance for proposed substation on Van Dyke Road

DELMAR — National Grid has asked to delay reintroducing a stalled proposal to build a substation at 109 Van Dyke Road near the Delmar Bypass Extension, next door to the Bethlehem Central School District's bus garages and not far from Bethlehem High and Eagle Elementary schools. The substation would take electricity from existing power lines for distribution through the Delmar area and to Vista Technology Park in Slingerlands.

Instead of going back before the Zoning Board of Approvals this month, National Grid has asked for more time in order to review an independent study, requested by the ZBA and paid for by National Grid, that only became available in January. Representatives of the utility company hope to go back before the ZBA in April.

"We just got the report back in January," said National Grid spokesperson Nate Stone. "So we need time to evaluate it and look it over. So that's the reason we asked to switch to April."

The study, which took almost two years to complete, is what held up the application after it was met with public opposition at ZBA meetings in November 2014 and March 2015. By unanimous approval of the five-member board, Power Engineers Consulting was hired to provide a technical analysis of the need for the substation, review National Grid's assessment of potential alternative locations, and review environmental studies provided by National Grid of the Van Dyke Road location.

In 2015, eight residents spoke against construction of the substation proposed for that location and an Eagle Elementary student submitted a petition with 105 signatures opposing it. In addition, the board received 11 emails in opposition, three that conveyed concern, and just one in favor of the project.

Because the town zoning for that area does not permit a substation, National Grid has had to apply for a variance from the ZBA. Under state law, the standards for public utilities like National Grid are different from those for other projects because they are presumed to be operating in the public interest. To qualify for a variance, National Grid must demonstrate that 1.) The variance is needed for the utility to provide safe and adequate service to the public and 2). There are no other feasible sites for the substation.

The ten-page Powers report seems to generally back up the National Grid proposal, agreeing that "there is a need for upgrading the electrical infrastructure that provides power to the Town of Bethlehem community," and that it "appears to meet the intent of the Town's plans for future population growth, support for the increase in technology based businesses (specifically the Vista Technology Park), and consideration for environmental impacts, community character, and quality of life."

Of the ten sites currently owned by National Grid that may have qualified as alternate sites along the transmission line, the consultant agreed that none were feasible locations for the proposed project. Of 15 additional sites, including one proffered by a town resident opposing the



proposal, only one was deemed potentially feasible: the property that is currently home to a dog park and water tank near the Delmar Bypass. That location, however, presented a host of its own difficulties, which would add to the cost of construction and ultimately place the substation next to a public park rather than a school. Also, said Stone, the parcel of land is not large enough to accommodate the size of substation that is required.

"To provide the most up to date review" of National Grid's application, the report requested further information from the company regarding: updated usage data and growth; photometric calculations for security lighting; and approved electromagnetic field (EMF) studies associated with the 115 kV transmission line and 13.8 kV distribution feeder circuits.

In addition, the consultant requested that National Grid provide validation that the existing calculations and associated values provided are applicable to the new line's anticipated loading and/or maximum line rating.

Stone seemed unconcerned about electromagnetic fields. "Substations are designed to have zero EMF at the property line. That's a standard that all substations have. It's required by law." He said National Grid would be able to present EMF findings in April, and that there had been some further discussion about releasing regular monitoring reports following construction to assuage any residential concerns.

If the Van Dyke proposal goes forward, National Grid plans to close and dismantle the Delmar substation, located off Adams Street next to the Albany County Rail Trail, as well as the Juniper substation, which lies to the north of Elm Avenue Park and south of the Delmar Bypass. Neither site is able to support the additional infrastructure needed for the project, Stone explained.

"The reality here is that it's not a matter of if a substation is built, it's a matter of where and when," he said. "We're at capacity now, especially with the Vista Technology Park." Vista has not grown as quickly as anticipated, he explained, but is quickly nearing a point where it will require an alternate source of power distribution.

"We're still going through the report, so it's too early to tell what might be changed," said Stone. "There has been some discussion of improving optics by planting more trees."

A taxing disparity

Following unexpected rate hikes due to state equalization rate, legislators propose laws to relieve Guilderland taxpayers, notify others

GUILDERLAND — In the fall, some Guilderland residents were shocked to find out that their property tax bills had increased by hundreds or thousands of dollars due to a new state-determined equalization rate.

On Monday, Feb. 5, the state Senate passed two pieces of legislation, sponsored by Senator George Amedore (R, C, IP-46), that would not only offer relief to Guilderland taxpayers outside of the Guilderland Central School District (GCSD); but also require timely notification to any state municipality when the equalization rate change exceeds five percent. Similar bills, sponsored by Assemblywoman Pat Fahy, (D-109) are reported to have left the Real Property Taxation committee and are now under review by the Ways and Means committee.

Guilderland's equalization rate — the ratio of total assessed value, determined by the municipality, to the municipality's total market value, which is determined by the state - plummeted from 88 percent to 75 percent last year, causing town residents who live outside of Guilderland Central School District to see double digit increases as they were made to pick up a larger share of the levy in their respective districts. (For comparison, rates climbed 11.8 percent in the Voorheesville, 12.3 percent in South Colonie, 16.8 percent in Schalmont, and 18.8 percent in Mohonasen school districts.)

When it learned about the new equalization rate, GCSD took \$300,000 out of its excess funds to ensure that it would not need to raise taxes any higher than the 1.6 percent promised to voters. Officials from other affected school districts said at the time that, due to the fact that a majority of their residents live in a different municipality (such as the Town of New Scotland, which had a 2017 equalization rate of 98 percent), bringing the overall levy down with the use of reserve funds would result in little impact to Guilderland residents.

The purpose of calculating the rate each year, according to the state, is to ensure that, in instances where municipal assessments vary widely, taxpayers in taxing districts that span multiple municipalities are still paying equitable taxes. Equalization is meant to allow school districts to determine the market value of communities in their jurisdiction and tax them accordingly.

An equalization rate of 100 percent means that the municipality is assessing property at 100 percent of market value and an equalization rate of greater than 100 percent means that the total assessed value for the municipality is greater than its total market value. An equalization rate of less than 100 percent means that the municipality's total market value is greater than its assessed value, and neighboring taxpayers may be shouldering a heavier tax burden. (There would be no need for equalization if every municipality assessed all property at 100 percent of market value every year.)

Because municipalities are allowed to set their own levels of assessment and because annual assessments can be costly, towns and cities often go years without updating assessment rolls.

Guilderland, which used to conduct property assessments every few years, has not done so since 2005. During an October 3 Town Board meeting, town officials approved authorization for the town assessor to solicit consultant services for a "proposed reassessment or systematic analysis for the 2019 assessment roll."

According to Town Assessor Karen VanWagenen, the reassessment, which should take approximately 18 months, will begin in earnest this summer, following public information sessions expected in June. Residents and businesses will receive surveys, which they will be expected to return, confirming or amending property information, to bring assessed values to 100 percent of market values.

Critics of the state assessment, including Town Supervisor Peter Barber, have said that assessors did not get a comprehensive picture of town property values.

At a September 19 Town Board meeting, President of Industrial & Utility Valuation Consultants Laurence Farbstein, who was hired to represent the town, told residents that the Office of Real Property Tax Services (ORPTS) used a sample of commercial properties - Stuyvesant Plaza, the Hampton Inn, and three apartment complexes - that "virtually ensured that high-priced properties would be weighted more than the low-priced ones." He said that the state could have used smaller, more independent businesses if they wanted to accurately represent the town.

Farbstein said ORPTS needs to change its rules so that it more accurately reflects the distribution of properties, which it could elect to do itself, or which could be ordered by the governor, or by state representatives such as Fahy and Amedore, through passage of legislation.

"I will continue to push this bill to bring property taxpayers some relief and bring greater transparency to the equalization process," Fahy said of her proposed legislation. If passed by the Assembly, the bills would go to Gov. Andrew Cuomo to be signed and could be enacted in time for tax bills to go out next fall.

of Taxation and Finance to establish segment special equalization rates for the Voorheesville, Rotterdam and Schalmont school districts. The other, A08805/S06959, would require notification of residents within ten days of receipt or filing of the equalization rate, if it varies by more than five percentage points from local assessed values.

On county tax rolls, Guilderland residents will be classified as wealthier in 2018 than in 2017, although the change will be more diffuse and have less of an impact than with the 2017 school taxes. Fire districts will also be affected.

In New York state, the property tax is a local tax, raised and spent locally to finance local governments and public schools. While the state does not collect or receive any direct benefit from the property tax, it is the largest single revenue source for the support of municipal and school district services. More than \$26 billion is raised in local property taxes across the state annually.

DELMAR — On Saturday, Feb. 10, at 6:41 a.m., the Bethlehem Police Department responded to a personal injury crash at the intersection of Delaware and Cherry avenues.



Upon their arrival, the operator of a 2012 black Buick, Jason S. Nurmi, 33, of North Greenbush, reportedly displayed a badge to officers and informed them that

he was an investigator with the state task force. Further, the investigation allegedly revealed that Nurmi was in possession of a loaded firearm and his car was equipped with flashing red and blue lights. He was also reportedly

determined to be under the influence of drugs at the time of the crash.

According to BPD, Nurmi has a valid concealed carry pistol permit in five states, including New York. It has also been determined that Nurmi is not associated with any government agency or entity that would authorize him to carry a badge or display red and blue flashing lights on his vehicle. He was arrested for the misdemeanor counts of driving while ability impaired by drugs and criminal impersonation in the second degree, as well as the vehicle and traffic violations of following too closely and operating a motor vehicle with unauthorized colored lights.

Nurmi was arraigned in the Town of Bethlehem Court by the Honorable Judge Andrew Kirby and released on his own recognizance to reappear in Bethlehem Court on Tuesday, March 6.

The operator of the second vehicle in the crash, a 36 year old man from Wilton, was transported to Albany Medical Center Hospital by Delmar-Bethlehem EMS with minor injuries.

Traffic stop leads to DWI arrest



GUILDERLAND — On Saturday, Feb. 3, New York State Police from the New Scotland barracks arrested William F. Gergits for DWI. While on patrol, troopers reportedly stopped Gergits while he was driving on Western Avenue in the Town of Guilderland. Upon interviewing Gergits,

troopers reported observing that his speech was impaired and administered standard field sobriety tests, which they said indicated Gergits was intoxicated. Suspect charged in January bank robbery

SLINGERLANDS — Police charged a 30-year-old Greene County man on Tuesday, Feb. 6, with robbing the Trustco Bank last month.



Ryan J. O'Connor is incarcerated in Ulster County after Kingston police arrested him on Jan. 18 for a similar robbery, according to Bethlehem Police Commander Adam Hornick.

As part of the investigation into the Jan. 6 robbery of the Trustco Bank branch on New Scotland Road, Hornick said

police were monitoring other bank robberies in the Capital District and beyond. Detectives worked with the Kingston police and executed search warrants to gather evidence on O'Connor.

On Jan. 6, he allegedly entered the Trustco Bank at around 12:45 p.m. and demanded money. He did not display a weapon and no one was injured in the incident.

According to Hudson Valley News Network, the Kingston bank robbery was executed in exactly the same way. This time, however, police got a description of the vehicle O'Connor used to flee the bank and it was distributed to patrol officers. O'Connor was stopped and arrested without incident a short distance from the bank.

O'Connor was arraigned in Bethlehem Town Court last Tuesday by Judge Ryan Donovan and remanded to jail without bail. He is slated to re-appear in Bethlehem Court on March 6. He is currently incarcerated in the Ulster County jail, according to Hornick.

The investigation is ongoing and includes Bethlehem, Kingston, Albany and Rotterdam police.

Kehoe said baseline expenditures assume no changes to staffing or programs for the 2018-19 school year, and that baseline revenues assume no increase in the tax levy and are based on state aid projections included in Gov. Andrew Cuomo's proposed 2018-19 executive state budget.

On the expense side, she said, retirement and insurance costs are estimated to increase by \$1.6 million alone. In general, administrative spending is expected to increase modestly in most departments, with the exception of areas such as taxing, BOCES development and "selfsupporting" programs like continuing ed and drivers ed, which remain at current funding levels.

Under Cuomo's budget proposal, state aid to BCSD is estimated to decrease by \$155,000 over current year. Given growing deficits anticipated by the state, Kehoe said the district does not expect this to change as the state budget process moves forward.

During the presentation, Kehoe explained the district's tax calculation would allow the district to increase property taxes up to 3.95 percent without requiring a public referendum. If the board were to adopt that, she said, it would generate a little more than \$2.5 million in revenue for the district.

As the budget development process moves forward, said Kehoe, the district will look to identify cost savings, priorities and opportunities. Budget discussions will be held at regular Board of Education meetings according to the following schedule:

an update on the work of the district's Strategic Planning Committee, including a summary of the results of a community survey that was conducted in December.

The committee met to review the responses, she said, and will be drafting a mission statement next. More than 2,000 people responded to the survey — 1,401 students, 554 community members



and 226 faculty and staff members — and, according to Monroe, "the responses were very positive."

Around 90 percent of students and community members expressed satisfaction with the district, as did a full 95 percent of staff.

Of 17 areas, respondents rated their top priorities as: Quality of teaching

staff; Preparing students with life skills;

Respect for cultural and individual differences; Rigorous academics;

Social/emotional development; and Hands-on/project-

based learning. In the survey comments

received by the district, respondents asked for more foreign language offerings, school-to-career pathways, more arts programming, and a focus on "real life" skills. There were also requests for classes at the high school to begin later, and those at the elementary schools to begin earlier, in addition to increased flexibility. Monroe said she's looking at putting a committee together to look at school schedules in the coming fall.

Academically, BCSD ranks No. 1 in the Capital Region (per Albany Business Review) and No. 223 in the nation (per Niche). Monroe discussed the successful implementation of the Chromebook 1:1 initiative, noting that the district's student help desk, manned primarily by student volunteers at the high school, won national recognition from EdTech magazine.

The district's vocational job program, which will certify students in vocations earning more than \$60,000 a year, enrolled 43 students in its first year, said Monroe. She spoke about various district programs, staff training, special education, the K-8 iReady assessments and the new behavior intervention program.

"From the feedback I've received from Eagle and Slingerlands, it's really making a big difference at lunch and recess," Monroe said of the new program.

Looking toward the future, Monroe also talked about the budget, state aid and enrollment projections, as well as town-wide development.

"Obviously, our goal is to have our expenses equal our revenues, which is always a challenge," she said. "But, we're going to get there through the next couple months of planning."

In addition to the budget vote on May 15, two board seats will be up for district election, as the terms of board members Lynne Lenhardt and Charmaine Wijeyesinghe are set to expire on June 30. The positions are unpaid and the terms last until June 30, 2021. Nominating petitions will be available beginning February 26 from the District Clerk, Brittany Barrett. All petitions are due by April 16 at 5 p.m.

Devil's Food Layer Cake

hip up a devilish indulgence this Valentine's Day. Homemade desserts can be a great way for men and women to show their significant others how much they're loved on Valentine's Day. While the following indulgent recipe for "Devil's Food Layer Cake" from Elisabeth M. Prueitt and Chad Robertson's "Tartine" (Chronicle Books) takes a little effort, the results are well worth the work.

Ingredients: Yields 1, 10-inch cake Cake layers

- 1 3/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 4 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 1/4 cups cocoa powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 2 3/4 cups sugar
- 5 large eggs
- 1 1/4 cups full-fat buttermilk

Chocolate Ganache

- 24 ounces or 32 ounces bittersweet chocolate
- 3 cups or 4 cups heavy cream
- 1/2 cup plus 1 tablespoon caramel

Instructions:

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Butter and lightly flour the sides of two 9-inch cake pans, knocking out the excess flour. Line the bottom of each pan with parchment paper cut to fit exactly.

To make the cake layers, sift together the flour, cornstarch, baking powder, baking soda, cocoa powder, and salt into a bowl and set aside. In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, beat the butter on medium-high speed until light and creamy. Slowly add the sugar and continue to beat on the same speed light in color and fluffy. Add the eggs one at a time, mixing well after each addition until incorporated before adding the next egg. Stop the mixer and scrape down the sides of the bowl with the rubber spatula. With the mixer on low speed, add the flour mixture in 3 equal batches alternately with the buttermilk in 2 batches, beginning and ending with the flour mixture. Stop the mixer, scrape down the sides of the bowl and then mix again for another few seconds.

Divide the cake batter evenly between the prepared cake pans. Bake until the top springs back when lightly touched or a cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean, about 45 minutes. Let the cakes cool completely in the pans on a wire rack.

When the cakes are cool, turn them out by inverting the pans, and then turn the cakes upright. Using a serrated knife, slice off the domed portion from the top of each cake to make the tops flat. If you want to decorate the cake with crumbs as described in the headnote, reserve the slices for making the crumbs.

To make the crumbs, preheat the oven to 250 F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or a nonstick liner. Break up the cake slices and spread on the lined baking sheet. Place in the oven and toast until completely dry, about 1 hour. Let cool completely, then transfer to a food processor or blender and process until finely ground. Sift the crumbs through a medium-mesh sieve. (Don't use a sieve with fine mesh or the crumbs won't pass through.) Set aside.

Ampevene's 'Ephemagoria'

omplex isn't always good, but in Ampevene's case, it's raw, emotive and highly expressive. The Albany-based quartet just unveiled their latest live album, "Ephemagoria" at The Hollow Bar + Kitchen on Friday, Feb. 9 with the helping hands of their friends in Cousin Earth. Having teased fans along the way with the releases of "Valencia" and "Rometheu," the complete live effort commands attention from its earliest, distorted notes. Over a 10-track sonic highway, the prog rockers take listeners for a noisy ride as they blend blatant psychedelic rock influences with their own gritty flair and unique cocktail of spellbinding genres.

Branching off of Gabe Stallman's solo project as a guitarist, Ampevene is completed by Stallman on guitar and vocals, Mack Hogan on bass, Brian Fahey on drums and Ava Smith on keys. Seeing a minor lineup change, Fahey is the current drummer who took over for Darryl Kniffen, the recorded drummer on the album. The first few tracks come as an attack on your senses, kicking off with a myriad of sound and distortion as an 8-minute journey unfolds within "Florida." While the group is undoubtedly influenced by psychedelic rock before its time, (think Pink Floyd's Syd Barrett era) Ampevene channels those visceral tendencies and matches them with the gripping mood and scaling of metal progressions and often hard to compute math-rock.

Just when you get settled into a groove, it doesn't last for long before you're tossed into new kaleidoscopic arrangements and time signatures. The first half of the album relies solely on storytelling through music before a 12-minute "Rometheu" introduces the first glimpse of vocals on the album, although that's not the pinnacle of the track. While fleeting, Stallman's vocals are comparable to the tone and echoing of groups like Circa Survive and the Mars Volta, with the latter covered later on the album. With the first and fourth beats emphasized in each measure, the song picks up speed with compositional mastery as the foursome jerk the steering wheel into fresh segments, a common thread throughout Ephemagoria.

"Hill" comes as a hard-hitter with all the focus placed on tight drumming at the album's peak with an explosion of sound before introducing the first cover in a somber, slowed down version of Nirvana's "Smells Like Teen Spirit." With a new age take on a beloved classic, the warped arrangement and unique style almost makes the song unrecognizable at times, if not for the lyrics. A second cover comes as a crisp version of the Mars Volta's "Goliath," mimicking the song's natural sound and Omar Rodriguez-Lopez' distinct vocal inflections.

The live album as a whole features classic and never before recorded Ampevene songs as well as covers, capturing the feel of a live performance at The Recording Company in Esperance, NY, and mixed by Tim Lynch with mastering by Alan Douches of West West Side Music. Ampevene has the raw talent of making their multi-segmented tracks seem like effortless jams spliced together at all the right, unexpected times. With the ability to entice fans to try to follow along and eventually surrender to the flow, the quartet seems to have mastered their live presence and execution while diving deep into guitar solos, exploratory jazz segments and thrash metal elements.

MUSIC REVIEW The Wood Brothers' 'One Drop Of Truth' By BEN BOIVIN

fter nearly 13 years of touring the globe, writing their version of Americana music and picking up fans along the way, The Wood Brothers released "One Drop of Truth" earlier this month. Their newest studio album purposefully took a full year of studio hoping and concept swapping to complete and the finished product is the most realest, authentic, and Woodsiest release to date.

The sobering and topical "River Takes the Town" opens The Wood Brothers' sixth studio album as Chris Wood's bass and Oliver Wood's acoustic guitar naturally flow into the track. Written prior to the devastation that swept the nation this past summer, the tune accurately describes the pain and terror that comes with overwhelming disasters whether widespread or personal. Artful lyrics with a smooth and crisp tone flood the song with emotion as Jano Rix adds the perfect amount of percussion and backup vocals. I would argue the most powerful opening track on any Wood Brother's album.

The second piece in the collection introduces Americana funk as the exclusive genre in "Happiness Jones." Chris introduces a silky bass line that invites the listener to kick their shoes off and dance on the grass. The muffled vocal effect along with the well-placed guitar solo is sure to start a sing-along during live performances. Rix offers a swirling organ that adds that extra funkified soul fans have come to expect from the Wood Brothers and the turn of phrase lyrics recognize the cross-contamination of happiness and lesson-learning. Similar to "Sing About It" on 2013's "The Muse," Oliver describes the power that singing can have on the mind and spirit during hard times. A fresh tune rooted in Oliver's talented and unique writing ability awards "Happiness Jones" a big smile and two thumbs way up.

After the haunting and supernatural qualities of "Strange As It Seems," the trio enters the realm of country twang with "Sky High." Not to be confused with the "sky high with chicken skin" lyrics from "Stumble In," or the 2012 live release with the same name, this "Sky High" is a sexy and seductive ditty just begging for an AMC television drama series to use it as the credit track. Oliver's chilling slide guitar sings along with the band and would echo nicely off the walls of any Nashville dive-bar where the track was appropriately written. More than halfway through the album, Oliver hands over lead vocal duties to his little brother Chris for "Seasick Emotion." Soaked in the sentiment of 2016's election, Chris uses the giant body of water to describe his inner fears and confusions while Oliver and Jano blow a slow wind into the sonic sails. Oliver's one and only voice has defined The Wood Brothers' sound for so long that hearing Chris sing displays a band freer and more supportive of each other than ever.

What is a Wood Brothers album without alcohol slipping its way into the lyrics? "Sparkling Wine" serves as the playful and boozy party track in One Drop of Truth before the ultra-bluesy title song hints at a dissatisfaction with the lies and deceptions of our current political climate. In a world of "fake news" and leaders that have billions and billions of the "best words," Chris sings, "Give me one drop of truth I cannot deny." A strong and forceful message is only outshined by Oliver's powerful and sophisticated chops. "Can't Look Away" is perfectly segued out of "One Drop of Truth" and the listener can once again image the title being somehow politically fueled. Oliver returns to lead and hovers on the spoken word side of the fence as he is narrating different scenes that appear to be acted out on a stage. A rich and powerful backing bass by Chris gives this inventive new track legs to shift

gears throughout. They pour the final drops of creativity into the closing number before the 42-minute eclectic collection of originals comes to an end.

With half a dozen studio albums under their belt, The Wood Brothers have once again proved themselves as outlaws of the mainstream corporate music industry while being fully capable of its praise. The trio's first five albums seem to tell a story based around the album title, while "One Drop of Truth" feels more like a portfolio of themes, sounds and spaces. The eagerness to grow, the commitment to change and confidence to experiment with truth in this album is exactly what this country needs. God Bless America and God bless the Wood Brothers!

Step foot in Saratoga Springs on any given Friday concert-lighting package or Saturday night, and you'll find yourself in the midst of a party unlike any in the Capital District. On the corner of Putnam and Caroline streets you are surrounded by the sounds of several live music venues. Patrons enjoying the Spa City even outside of track season. Putnam Street is, arguably, the heartbeat of the city.

For a decade, live music fans have identified with Putnam Den, a converted pool hall Albert bought and Albert, who just prior to the turned into a popular night spot for entertainment. Tucked behind the sprawl of Victorian Aged buildings along Broadway, it fit a certain attitude. While the socialites took in the "The Den" was where the young played and enjoyed up-and-coming bands from across the region.

Earlier this month, as part of an impressive overhaul, the "Den" was stripped away to reveal something more substantial. Instead of a room, or cave, as the former name implied, it is now a place. The Putnam Place.

"A lot of risk to [change] the brand," said Albert, "which is why we decided to keep Putnam. We wanted to indicate that we are thinking bigger, while keeping our loyal fan base happy.'

Putnam Place started taking shape late last year through a series of changes to its interior. First, the concrete slab of a floor was replaced with a wood and vinyl dance floor. The stage

was built out. An elaborate was installed. The sound system was upgraded and its soundboard moved from the middle of the dance floor to the back of the room. And, leather upholstered VIP sections that flank both sides of the stage.

"Upgrading our system, the green room and the interior, that will all attract the upper echelon of artists; who simply have things in their contract that they want to have and now we can offer those things," said interview had confirmed booking rapper Wyclef Jean for Friday, March 2. It's an early example of the caliber of talent she intends to attract.

Albert purchased Saratoga on its Main Street, Putnam Place ten years ago, moving on from Red Square in downtown Albany. In that time, the landscape surrounding the Spa City's Broadway has transformed. Several residential and hotel projects have blossomed throughout the city, fueled partly by the promise of an emerging Tech Valley.

"As far as Saratoga Springs goes, the quality of entertainment and what anybody can spend their money on has steadily increased," said Albert, admitting that the changes around Putnam Den helped influence change. "We wanted to remain competitive and appeal to a larger, broader audience base. Putnam Den was charming... but it was getting to the point that it needed a facelift."

Through her nearly 15 years of experience, she said

she's learned to expand the types of music and entertainment showcased on her stage. In addition to live music, she will feature theatre, host beer yoga, and introduce paint and sip classes.

"We want to offer them a more eclectic music line-up and more eclectic shows," said Albert. "So, we are really expanding the way we utilize this space, this place, to convey there's more to it than the Den offered."

Albert said she's not straying away from the local and regional musicians who have walked through her doors in the past. She hopes to create the opportunity to have local bands share the bill with larger, established acts. The changes to the venue have already impressed many familiar with "The Den." Formula 5's Matt Richards took to Facebook to voice his excitement prior to last weekend's show.

"Putnam Place really stepped up its game," he wrote. "Get out here and experience this incredible venue."

Nonetheless, Albert said she has heard the grumbles of loyal fans who grew concerned. "I think there's going to be a certain group of people who will always refer to it as The Den," said Albert, "and that's cool. I mean, it was The Den for a long time. I think our loyal fan base has expressed some concern over whether they're going to feel the same vibe, but the shows that we've had since the renovation, they've been blown away. They love it even more. Better sound. Better lights. Better bands."

To make the ganache, place the chocolate in a heatproof bowl, using the smaller amount of each ingredient if you will be decorating the cake with crumbs and the larger amount if you will not. Bring the cream to just under a boil in a small saucepan. Pour the cream over the chocolate. Let the mixture sit for a few minutes without stirring until the chocolate is partially melted, and then stir with a rubber spatula until smooth and shiny.

To assemble the cake, split each cake into 2 layers to make 4 layers in all. Transfer 1 layer to a serving plate. Using an offset spatula, spread 3 tablespoons of the caramel evenly over the cake layer. Spread a thin layer of ganache (about 1/4inch thick) over the caramel. Top with a second cake layer, and again spread with 3 tablespoons caramel and then a thin layer of ganache. Top with the fourth cake layer. Refrigerate the cake until the center seems firm, 1 to 2 hours. Cover the remaining ganache with plastic wrap and leave at room temperature for finishing the cake.

Remove the cake from the refrigerator. Using the rest of the ganache, frost the top and sides of the cake with the offset spatula. If you are going to coat the cake with the toasted cake crumbs, the cake must be evenly frosted and the ganache must be soft enough for the crumbs to adhere. If the ganache has hardened, use a kitchen torch to soften it slightly, or

put the whole cake into a 400°F oven for 10 seconds or so, just until the chocolate looks shiny. Sprinkle the crumbs evenly over the top of the cake, then tilt and turn the cake so that they spill over the sides, adhering to them as they fall. If you are using only the ganache and not the crumbs, the ganache will be thicker on both the top and sides.

Serve the cake at room temperature. To store, cover tightly and keep in a cool place for up to 4 days. It is not necessary to keep this cake in the refrigerator.

Homeownership without the woes of home maintenance at The Spinney at Van Dyke

DELMAR — The day to celebrate the grand opening of The Spinney at Van Dyke's new clubhouse fell on a blustery January day.

The customary ribbon cutting ceremony, usually held for photo opportunities standing in front of new businesses and storefronts, was moved inside the spacious, 4,000 square-foot community center. The move turned out to be for the best. As 50 or so local dignitaries and guests stood inside its spacious living room in front of the fireplace, the photographer captured why everyone was so excited about the new clubhouse.

The clubhouse is the "epicenter" of The Spinney community," said Samantha Raynor, director of leasing and marketing at The Spinney Group. The group has a similar one across the river in Schodack, where residents can come in and host book clubs and card games, she said.

Raynor said their event coordinator, Constance Holden, has already taken advantage of the clubhouse for new ideas. With January being the month to focus on health and wellness, The Spinney partnered with Revive Wellness in Delmar to teach residents how to use exercise equipment, and coach them on what exercises to do based on their individual abilities. The also class on how to cook for a healthier diet.

"She's been doing a great job in producing a robust offering for our residents to take part in," said Raynor. "Which has, obviously, enhanced our clubhouse space. It's new because we didn't have the space to do it before. But, we're looking to continue to do events such as that. [Holden] comes up with amazing ideas while working with the residents. They are very thankful for her, and all the effort she is putting into creating these events that really work for them. Everything she's put out, they've loved so far."

The Spinney at Van Dyke is a neighborhood of its own, designed for the 55-and-better community that has retired into their next phase of lifestyle, or working professionals working towards that goal.

What makes The Spinney so unique is its one-story living approach. All of its buildings are built this way so residents do not need to climb stairs in their homes again, allowing them to age in place. Another reason for this building technique is for the convenience of privacy. No one will ever live above or below them, unlike apartment buildings that are built floor on floor. To add onto the attractiveness of this concept, most unit types have attached, direct-access garages and private front porches and back patios, further mimicking the feel of a single-family home.

The neighborhood is also designed like a typical residential development. Each home given a distinct character, and in some cases, tree rows lining the side of the road. The aesthetic that often times mirror the neighborhoods residents leave behind, tends to coax back the sense of community they once had in the past. Raynor shared the story of how one resident developed a friendship with a neighbor. That compassionate neighbor drove her to daily medical treatments for a month. Something, Raynor said, you don't often see in neighborhoods anymore.

While Spinney cottages' amenities may make residents feel as if they're living in a single-family home, they will no longer feel the woes associated with homeownership. Think about regaining all the time spent on mowing the lawn, shoveling snow and fixing the plumbing, so you can focus on family, friends and hobbies — hobbies which can be further fostered by the group's community events calendar.

With the clubhouse now opened, residents still have more to look forward to in the near future. The Spinney at Van Dyke expects to open an outdoor lap pool and accompanying wade pool this spring. The group also anticipates a community garden, complete with raised beds, that will allow residing gardeners to plant and grow their favorite plants that can later be planted by the group's grounds keepers.

"So, if we have a resident with a green thumb who still wants to have their own home grown tomatoes, they can still do that."

Changes in Tax Law Impact Divorce

DELMAR — Tax issues are of great importance when negotiating a separation or divorce for your client. Certainly any separation or divorce involving children means a multitude of tax issues.

First, there is the mundane question of which parent can claim the child as a tax deduction. Then, there is the childcare credit. Further, payments made as child support are clearly non-deductible to the payor and are not includable in the recipient's income.

On the other hand, alimony or maintenance is currently deductible to the person paying it and taxable to the person receiving it. Under the new tax law, 2018 is the last year this will be true. The current interpretation is that the payor will no longer be able to deduct the payment of alimony or maintenance for separation agreements executed, and divorce decrees issued after Dec. 31, 2018.

will subsequently increase the cost of making those payments. Assuming a combined marginal tax rate of 39.5 percent (25 percent Federal, 6.85 percent state and 7.65 percent Social Security and Medicare), or typical rate for a person earning \$100,000 a year, the payor spouse would need to earn \$1,652.89 in order to pay \$1,000 in child support. After 2018, the same will be true of alimony or maintenance.

When dividing marital property, careful attention also needs to be paid to capital gains, tax basis and other tax issues.

They don't carry any appliances or anything that plugs in – outside of a maybe a cool looking lamp or two.

They have nurtured a loyal following, and many of their customers and cosigners come back again and again to purchase, sell or just browse the merchandise.

The two don't sell merchandise on eBay, or any other online marketplace, but rather rely on a website – somethingoldenew.com – to urge people to come to the store.
