First of several community forums scheduled

Events provide informal opportunities for officials, residents to discuss issues

BETHLEHEM — Town officials will be holding the first in a series of community conversations next Tuesday, April 24, at 7 p.m. in the North Bethlehem Fire Department located at 589 Russell Road in Albany.

“At Town Board meetings, people can share their views during the Public Comment period and at Public Hearings,” explained Supervisor David VanLuven. “But to keep the meetings flowing, we typically don’t respond (though we’re always happy to talk after the meetings or at other times). The result can be people feeling like they’re not being heard.”

VanLuven said the forums are deliberately intended to be informal

and will not follow any agenda.

“We’ll talk about whatever people want,” he said. “And though I want the emphasis to be on the Town Board and me listening, it’s a conversation so we can answer questions and ask questions back. Town government needs to be open to the public, and the community conversations will be one of many doors people can use to participate.”

According to VanLuven, every member of the Town

Board is enthusiastic about the opportunity to discuss town issues, ideas, opportunities, and concerns with residents in a casual setting.

“We’re planning to schedule community conversations through the year and throughout town so it will be easy for people to attend and we can get into neighborhood-specific issues,” he said. “I’m looking forward to it and hope people will come talk to us.”

Panel discussion focuses on Fair Housing Act

Landmark bill was passed into law in 1968

GLENMONT — The United Group of Companies, Inc. hosted a panel discussion last week on Thursday, April 12, at Glenmont Abbey Village, to recognize and commemorate the historic 1968 Fair Housing Act, which was enacted 50 years ago.

The panel included: New York state Assemblywoman Patricia Fahy; Earl T. Redding, Esq., a partner at Roemer, Wallens, Gold & Mineaux law office; Michael J. Uccellini, President and CEO of United Group, a real estate development company based in Troy and the manager of Glenmont Abbey Village. The discussion was moderated by United Group’s Chief Operating Officer Jeff Arnold.

Fahy, Redding and Uccellini shared their view on how the state of fair housing has changed during their respective careers and the impact the changes have had in the Capital Region. They discussed ways the Capital District can create more inclusive communities and also provide opportunities for residents to better understand the extensive rules and regulations of fair housing law.

Fahy said she is in favor of legislation (A7083) that would protect individuals who suffer from PTSD and other disabilities that benefit from therapy animals. Currently, those individuals may be denied or ejected from housing due to the presence of medically prescribed therapy animals. The legislation would

eliminate that loophole and provide more explicit protections.

“United Group takes fair and equal housing very seriously, and we felt that it was important to recognize and celebrate the significance of the 50th anniversary of the 1968 Fair Housing Act,” said Arnold. “It’s crucial for business and community leaders to understand and appreciate the proper policies, procedures and best practices surrounding the ever-changing fair housing laws. It was refreshing to see so many attendees from the housing industry take interest in our event, and we’re very thankful to Earl Redding, Assemblywoman Fahy, and Michael Uccellini for helping create such thoughtful discussion.”

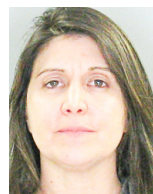

ALBANY — The 2018 Ceremony of Remembrance was held at the Albany County Crime Victims Memorial in the rotunda of the county courthouse on Thursday, April 12.

“The ceremony today shines a light on crime victims in Albany County whose lives have been shattered as a result of crime, and it serves as a reminder of the men and women who everyday put the needs of others before their own,” said District Attorney David Soares.

The theme of this year’s National Crime Victims’ Rights Week is “Expand the Circle, Reach All Victims.”

Speakers included Dorie Giovannetti, who was sexually abused by her chiropractor, and Tom Stock, who lost his sister Amy to a drunk driver.

The event also highlighted the efforts of law enforcement and community agencies in their support of crime victims throughout the year.

The Elizabeth Martin Outstanding Achievement in Victim Advocacy Award was presented to Erin Pierone, New York State Police victim witness specialist, for her work on the hit and run fatal of Raijene Martinez in Albany’s Washington Park, and Jessica Bellarose and the fatal impairment crash that killed teenager Paige

Ahearn on Route 7 in Colonie.

The Sheriff George L. Infante Outstanding Achievement in Law Enforcement Award was presented to Investigator Kevin Noto of the State Police for his work on the Edward Mero double murder case.

Special Recognition in Law Enforcement Award was presented to the Colonie Police Department Traffic Safety Division, for their work on two cases: The conviction of Brian Tromans in a fatal hit and run that killed Master Sgt. Rudy Seabron, and of Michael Carr, the driver of a car that crashed into Blessings Tavern, fatally wounding his passenger Niko DiNovo.

Aiming for change

This weekend, area students will return to the state Capitol to demand safer schools

ALBANY — This Friday, April 20, on the 19th anniversary of the tragic shooting at Columbine High School in Littleton, Colorado, hundreds of thousands of students will be coming together to, yet again, make their voices heard on the issue of gun control.

This Friday's demonstration, scheduled just days after the shooting at Marjory Stoneman High School in Parkland, Fla., was intended to coincide with the anniversary of the 1999 Columbine massacre, in which 15 people died and 24 were injured. It was one of the first in a seemingly continuous series of similar events that have sparked

national debate over gun control laws, high school social culture and bullying.

The event on Friday is being organized by Bethlehem High School senior Lydia Martell, who also helped to organize the March For Our Lives event, which took place on Saturday, March 24 and drew thousands of supporters. She has been working with students from other area high schools to organize speakers, which will include two students from Marjory Stoneman High School as well as local lawmakers and political leaders. There will also be a 13-minute lie-in to commemorate the thirteen innocents who lost their lives at Columbine, a march, voter registration and live music provided by Bethlehem High

School students.

It was an organizer from Columbia High School, said Martell, who reached out to Parkland students on Twitter to invite someone to come speak at the event. She was put in contact with two students who were available and expressed interest, and flight details were finalized in mid-April. A Bethlehem parent donated frequent flyer miles to fly them here for free, she said appreciatively. A gofundme page was set up to pay for the cost of lodging the pair, and had exceeded its \$1,000 goal by Monday, April 16. Both students have been actively speaking out against gun violence and advocating for more restrictive laws since tragedy struck their school on Valentine's Day of this

year.

On the west lawn of the state Capitol, students, teachers and advocates will once again gather, speak in favor of increased gun control regulation and demand safer schools. While the national plan calls for high school students to walk out of their schools on April 20 at 10 a.m. and for the remainder of the day (some gun control advocates have gone so far as to suggest that students walk out indefinitely, until more restrictive legislation is passed by Congress), Lydia said local students felt that bringing the fight to the seat of state government would amplify their message more effectively.

This past weekend, at the same time as the Albany March for Science was taking place at the Capitol, hundreds of demonstrators also gathered

to express support for Second Amendment freedoms and the right to carry weapons. Armed with signs reading, "An armed woman is a safe woman," and opposing the SAFE Act, marchers called for Cuomo's ouster and insisted that the issue is about more than guns. According to the Second Amendment advocates, less gun control regulation is about things like civic duty, protecting one's family and resisting government oppression.

"Let me remind everyone that it was America's youth that led the fight for civil rights," Martell said to a crowd of thousands during the March For Our Lives event. "It was America's youth that protested for peace in Vietnam. And it's America's youth that is fighting for gun control."

BCSD Board of Education unanimously adopts proposed 2018-19 budget

BETHLEHEM — On Tuesday, April 10, the Bethlehem Central School District Board of Education unanimously voted to adopt a \$98.8 million budget for the 2018-19 school year. The budget not only increases spending by 1.7 percent but also carries a proposed tax levy increase of 2.4 percent, which will net the district an additional \$1.5 million while remaining below the state-mandated tax cap. It is BCSD's sixth consecutive budget with a tax levy increase that has remained under the calculated cap.

The tax levy, the total

amount of money the school district collects from property taxpayers, essentially determines the tax rate, or how much a homeowner will pay in school property taxes. That rate, however, is also affected by town-wide assessed property values and state-determined equalization rates in districts serving more than one municipality.

Both the towns of Bethlehem and New Scotland, 90.74 percent and 9.26 percent of the district respectively, saw decreased equalization rates in 2018 and an increase in total assessed property values. Based on those factors, BCSD estimates that New

Scotland residents will see a 1.29 percent decrease in school taxes, to the tune of approximately \$27 per \$100,000 in assessed home value, while Bethlehem residents would pay 1.78 percent more, or about \$37 per \$100,000 in assessed home value.

As tax rates are finalized in August, after town assessment figures are finalized and new equalization rates are set, the district stressed that the aforementioned figures are merely estimates.

After preliminary budget calculations identified a \$3.3 million shortfall, a series of considered modifications and a \$161,000 boost in state aid

brought that number down to \$1.5 million by the end of March. During the April 10 board meeting, members were asked to consider three possible options to cover the remaining deficit. The option they chose increases the tax levy by the full \$1.5 million and would require no additional spending reductions.

No real consideration was given to raiding the district's fund balance, expected to be just under \$20 million at the end of 2017-18, to make up the shortfall, which BCSD said is, "consistent with the district's long-term fiscal planning."

"This budget presented more challenges than we have seen in the last few years," said BCSD Superintendent Jody Monroe. "Despite the volatility we experienced with some of our mandated costs, the budget we have proposed and that the board has adopted, preserves the instructional program we have been carefully rebuilding in recent years after a prolonged recession and related budget cuts."

The district has credited large increases in mandated pension, health care and special education costs (for students receiving services outside of Bethlehem)

with the bulk of the \$1.67 million budget increase. Officials were able to identify savings in several areas including: utility costs; transportation overtime and gas costs; and "breakage," decreased salary costs as newer employees replace longtime employees who earn more. (According to the district, a total of 27 faculty and staff have announced retirement this year.)

Overall staffing numbers will be reduced as well, based on decreasing enrollment projections and student needs, according to the district, with reductions to be accomplished primarily through attrition and reallocation of staff.

If approved by voters in May, the budget would: maintain educational programs and services; reduce approximately seven full-time staff positions; move 3 full-time Special Education staff (where enrollment has also declined) to the elementary and middle schools; provide elementary science kits; restore a Friday late bus for middle and high school students who want to participate in after school activities; increase security at the elementary and middle schools; and provide a \$200,000 buffer to accommodate for potential

variations in Special Education costs.

Also on the ballot in May, there will be a proposition to replace 15 aging school busses, for a cost not to exceed \$1.2 million.

Voters will also elect two new members to the Board of Education, as both Lynne Lenhardt and Charmaine Wijeyesinghe have decided not to run for reelection. Candidates will be announced after the April 16 deadline for returning candidate petitions.

The budget vote will take place on Tuesday, May 15, between 7 a.m. and 9 p.m. in Gym "A" at Bethlehem Central High School, located at 700 Delaware Ave. in Delmar. Voters can meet the board candidates on Tuesday, May 1, in the BCHS cafeteria at 6:30 p.m., and there will be a public budget hearing on Wednesday, May 2, in the BCHS library at 7 p.m.

Parks administrator retires after 30 years

BETHLEHEM — After 30 years of service with the town's Department of Parks and Recreation, more than half as its administrator, what recently retired Nan Lanahan says she will miss most are the people.

Whether her own staff, other town department heads or community members, Lanahan said that the most rewarding part of her job was the people with whom she worked to improve town parklands and provide recreational programming to Bethlehem residents.

"I had a great staff in my department and, at Town Hall, all the department heads pitch in and help each other," she said. "I've gotten a lot of support for them over the years, from planning to computers. All of them have been great. We can't all do it alone, we're definitely not working in silos."

"I learned a lot from Nan during her tenure," said Acting Administrator Jason Gallo, describing Lanahan as "very thorough in her work and passionate about providing quality parks and recreation services."

According to Bethlehem Supervisor David VanLuven, a national search is underway to find a permanent replacement for Lanahan, whom he said "laid a foundation for long term success, meaning that we'll be able to continue enjoying our parks and programs for at least a generation."

That "foundation" includes the Parks and Recreation Master Plan, released in late 2015, which provides a framework for what the department hopes to accomplish in coming years. It also includes the establishment of the Friends of Bethlehem Parks and Recreation, a nonprofit group dedicated to improving recreational programming at and access to the town's parks, by raising funds, organizing volunteers and increasing awareness.

"Since Nan suggested that we start a Parks and Recreation friends group six years ago, I have worked with Nan on an ongoing basis," said Joan Gavrilik, president of the Friends' Board of Directors. "What never failed to impress

me are the high standards and attention to detail that Nan applies to everything she does. This is reflected both in our beautiful Bethlehem town parks and our strong Parks and Recreation Department."

Since she began working for the town in 1988, the number of parks has grown from six to eight, play areas have been improved, and new technologies have allowed residents to register for programs or reserve park space with greater ease. In her early days, department activities revolved primarily around the town pool complex at Elm Avenue Park, which was built in 1973. Programming, said Lanahan, has grown dramatically since then.

"There are camps for everything now," she said. "In the old days, we offered half-day summer playgrounds at the elementary schools ... and that was pretty much the only game in town. There are camps for every sport now, there are camps for music and art and drama and religion."

This summer, the department is offering a variety of adult fitness and athletics programs, such as yoga, tennis and softball; kayak and canoe eco- and history tours and rentals; gardening for kids; sports; swimming; Shakespeare; and more. There will be weekly children's entertainment, biking events, and a senior health and fitness day.

One of the goals of the department is to stay aware of current fitness and recreation trends, and Lanahan has worked to offer

an up-to-date variety of athletic, aquatic, cultural and leisure activities to town residents.

Finding space for activities can sometimes be a challenge, she said, explaining that, while a community center has been on her "bucket list" for most of her career, the idea simply hasn't gotten any traction since residents voted down a proposal to build one more than 20 years ago. While Lanahan said she doesn't anticipate that changing any time soon, she explained that the department manages with the help of the school district, Town Hall and the Bethlehem YMCA.

Of all the things she did at the parks department, Lanahan said her favorite moments were when the community came together to accomplish a goal. She spoke with pride of the new playground at Elm Avenue Park, which was funded with grant money procured by Assemblymember Pat Fahy and built by more than 100 volunteers last summer.

"People were really excited about it. We had an old one that was in bad shape and falling apart," she said. "That was a huge undertaking. The Elm Ave Park playground is, in my opinion, the best in the Capital District."

"Nan built the best parks and recreation

system in the Capital Region," said VanLuven, "and I'd run it against any other municipality in the state."

Having served under eight town supervisors, Lanahan declined to pick a favorite. However, she noted VanLuven's support for the new community gardens at Elm Avenue Park, said she's confident "he's going to be a great supervisor."

Lanahan, who spent her first day in retirement with her grandchildren, said she's looking forward to playing golf more often and spending more time with her family. She also said she has left the department in good shape and in good hands.

"Nan has been an amazing co-worker," said Bethlehem Director of Economic Planning and Development Rob Leslie. "It has been a joy to work with someone so passionate, calm and professional all at the same time." Noting their work together on the Parks Master Plan, as well as the Local Waterfront Revitalization Plan update, he added, "Nan was always engaged and had a focus on the details. The recreation opportunities Bethlehem has today are a result of her years of leadership and dedication to the Town. I wish Nan an amazing retirement with years of enjoyment to come."

UAlbany receives \$2M to study weather

ALBANY — More than \$2 million in new federal funding from the Office of Naval Research is further solidifying the University at Albany's position as a national leader in atmospheric and environmental sciences.

The funding will support three projects led by Department of Atmospheric and Environmental Sciences (DAES) faculty in an effort to improve Arctic weather forecasting. Total support is expected to be \$2.37 million over the next five years.

"This latest federal funding highlights the variety of experts we have to address significant weather and climate issues," said Chris Thorncroft, DAES chair and professor. "In this case, our faculty will shed light on variability and

predictability of weather in the Arctic, a particularly sensitive part of the Earth climate system that is warming due to climate change."

A project headed by faculty members Lance Bosart and Daniel Keyser will consist of analysis and forecasting, along with real-time monitoring, of Arctic weather regimes. Findings will support an ONR research initiative on the dynamics of Arctic cyclones and their relationship to the tropopause polar vortex.

Faculty member Andrea Lang heads another project with the goal of quantifying the relationship between Arctic weather and the polar vortex. This will help to make more informed seasonal forecasts. And, Ryan Torn is leading a project

to better understand the predictability of Arctic cyclones. This will be done through a combination of analyzing past cyclone forecasts and generating large numbers of new forecasts using a numerical weather prediction model.

The University at Albany is home to the largest concentration of atmospheric, climate and environmental scientists in New York State, and one of the largest in the nation, with close to 120 faculty, researchers and staff.

In fiscal 2016, DAES and the University's Atmospheric Science Research Center generated \$17.1 million in combined research. That's an 82.3 percent increase from the previous year and ranks among the top 50 in the industry.

Now, a committee dedicated to completing the project, which is expected to require several months and around \$100,000, is asking the community for help raising the funds to make that happen.

Town Historian Susan Leath said that she has been aware of the need to restore the vault, which holds four generations of the prominent Slingerland family, for years but that “the stars began to align” only last summer.

“I knew we had a new supervisor and a new highway superintendent coming in. There was a new owner for the adjoining property,” she said. “And I knew I couldn’t do this alone.”

Leath approached Sue Virgilio, a Slingerland descendent, and Kathleen Bragle, who lives in the old Slingerland home across the street from the vault, and a few other residents she knew would be interested in the project and the Friends of the Slingerland Family Burial Vault began meeting in the fall. “We knew that, with the new administration coming in in January, we wanted to hit the ground running.”

The family that occupies the vault, which has been deteriorating for decades, has a long and influential history in the region. The first Slingerlands on record owned land in Beverwijk as early as 1663 (the name was then spelled Slingerlandt). During the Revolutionary War, part of the family remained loyal to the crown and moved to Canada after the territories

became independent. (That side of the family founded the Slingerland Drum Company in 1913, initially producing marching drums, but quickly becoming a favorite with jazz musicians.)

John I. Slingerland was a former congressman who worked to ensure that the Susquehanna line of the D&H Railroad would run through Slingerlands, was a dedicated abolitionist in the years before the Civil War. So was his brother William Henry, Slingerland’s first postmaster and a civil engineer who created a water system that served four towns in Albany County. Both brothers are buried in the vault, along with their father, John A. Slingerland.

The burial of the father alongside his sons may have been the cause of a rift in the family around that time, according to Bragle and Virgilio. He died before the vault was built in 1852 and the question of whether he should be moved from his original resting place (in what is now Bragle’s backyard) was put to the family for a vote, according to documents that were discovered several years ago. Two family members opposed the move, said Virgilio, who was uncertain of the exact reasons for the disagreement.

Ultimately, the father was buried with his sons, but the family apparently never recovered from the disagreement.

A former town historian, Ed Mulligan, came across the documents at Bragle’s home years ago

(while the old Slingerland home is the oldest in the area, the Bragles are only the third family to own the property since it was occupied by its original family, and subsequent owners have taken care to preserve historical items that were left behind).

“He called us up at 7:30 in the morning,” Bragle said laughing. “He was just so excited that he finally figured out why the family had split like that.”

“It’s really a fascinating family,” said Leath, pointing out that Virgilio only recently found out that she was related to the historic Slingerland family, when she took a DNA test her mother bought her.

“There were always rumors that there was a famous congressman in the family,” she said. “But it was never clear how he was related.” Since discovering she is a Slingerland, Virgilio has made contact with a number of newly-found relatives and enjoys untangling the stories of how they’re related.

“Bethlehem has a rich history, and the Slingerlands family was a central part of it,” said Town Supervisor David VanLoven. “Learning about their lives and work from the mid-1800s to the present can help us not only understand key moments in history, such as slavery and the Civil War, but also where we are today and how we can make history too.”

Bragle mentioned legislation written by John A. Slingerland during his time in Congress, a Homestead Act bill that never passed. According to Mulligan, historian Henry Christman, author of *Tin Horns and Calico*, has said that if Homestead Act legislation authored

by Slingerland had passed Congress, it may have prevented the Civil War. Regardless, when he died just before the war began, Slingerland willed some of his land to a former slave.

The history of those buried in the vault, and its significance to local history, is reason enough to restore the site, say advocates. But, added Bragle, it’s also a matter of safety. Near to the Albany County Helderberg-Hudson Rail Trail as well as Slingerlands Elementary School, the integrity of the site is important for safety reasons.

“Teachers used to take their classes down there for a little lesson on local history,” she said, noting that one teacher has set aside \$1,000 to provide a sign for the site. “It would be nice if they could do that without having to worry about the safety of the students.”

Now that trees have been cleared, the committee is working to raise money to pay for the project. They have set up a gofundme site at gofundme.com/SlingerlandVault and are accepting checks made out to The Slingerland Foundation, which can be sent to Susan Leath at Town Hall. Because the town owns the property, money raised will be conferred to the town, which will set the money aside in a dedicated fund and coordinate with the committee to contract the technical engineering, masonry, and related services necessary to stabilize and restore the vault.

“It’s great to have residents come forward to work with the town to advance a project,” said VanLoven. “Often, people just identify needs and then look to the town to do it alone, which we usually can’t because our resources

and staff are already stretched thin. So it’s refreshing to have a group that is not only pushing us, but is also collaborating with us to make good things happen.

“The Town took responsibility for the vault decades ago,” he continued, “and it’s important that we meet our responsibilities. My guess is that past efforts to maintain then restore the vault failed because we didn’t have a motivated group of residents ready to push the project forward. Now, we do, and I’m grateful to them and the Slingerlands family for working so hard to restore this historical gem.”

“I’d like to have people working on it by this summer,” said Leath. “I really don’t want to lose this momentum.”

“I’m relentless,” said Virgilio. “Even if it doesn’t happen this summer, it will happen.”

Building a hydroponic garden

Hydroponic gardening can change people’s perceptions of what’s needed to grow vibrant plants. Rather than soil, all you may need for a hydroponic garden is water to grow a variety of healthy, strong plants.

Although it seems like a futuristic concept, hydroponics — or growing plants without soil — actually dates back many centuries. The hanging Gardens of Babylon and The Floating Gardens of China are two of the earliest examples of hydroponics.

According to Fullbloom Hydroponics, hydroponic gardening is a method of growing plants in a water-based, nutrient-rich solution. Instead of soil, roots are supported by an inert material, such as pellets, perlite, or vermiculite. Some people use coconut fiber, sand or gravel as well. The key is that the substance not supply any additional nutrition to the plant. In

some instances, the roots grow in water alone.

Hydroponics works so well because the person doing the gardening can directly control the nutrients, oxygen and light according to what the plant needs. A nutrition-based water delivery system delivers food to the roots in a highly soluble form, rather than the roots having to search through the soil and extract the same nutrients. Absorbing food with very little effort means the plant can divert its energy to growing and flower production.

This method of no-soil growth can be used just about anywhere. Although it has not yet edged out traditional farming methods, hydroponics is gaining popularity among entrepreneurs and hobbyists. An added attraction to hydroponics is its efficiency. The gardening resource Maximum Yield says hydroponics is ideal where traditional farming is not an option, such as in large cities where there is little to no access to

agriculturally amenable land. Hydroponics can even be merged with vertical farming methods, helping to save space and increase output. Hydroponic gardens can be placed anywhere there is access to water and natural or simulated sunlight. Empty warehouses, rooftops, old shipping containers, and much more can be turned into hydroponic garden locations with minimal effort.

Scientists say that there can be drastic differences in growth rates and yield from hydroponic and soil plants. The group Greentrees Hydroponics says the growth rate for a hydroponic plant can be 30 to 50 percent faster than a soil plant grown under the same conditions. Environmentalists tout that hydroponic gardening is also beneficial to the environment because the plants require considerably less water than those produced with soil gardening and require fewer pesticides or other amendments to thrive.

Confidence in vision: An interview with Leah Busque

In a recent Shine Together conversation with TaskRabbit founder Leah Busque, former White House senior advisor Valerie Jarrett said, “There’s a difference between having an idea and executing on it, and you executed it to perfection.”

Jarrett was responding to Busque’s comment that TaskRabbit, the online mobile marketplace for matching freelance workers with local jobs, wasn’t a novel idea. In fact, Jarrett joked that she and a friend had talked about the idea many years earlier. However, as Jarrett noted, she and her friend went back to work the next day. Busque started coding and reimagined the way people could work—becoming an early, transformative leader in what is now known as the “gig economy.”

On Friday, May 18, Busque will share the path she took from IBM engineer to high-tech entrepreneur with more than 300 attendees at the 17th Annual Key4Women Forum. Here, the TaskRabbit founder, venture capitalist and co-founder of Shine Together talks about having confidence in her idea, learning from her mistakes and accepting less than perfect on her way from start-up to sale to IKEA.

April Ulrich: You did most of the coding for the first release of TaskRabbit. How difficult was it to transition from programmer to business owner?

Leah Busque: There was a steep learning curve. I remember thinking, “Can I really do this? Do I know all the things I need to create a company and make this product successful?”

As I thought about it, the answer was no. No, I don’t know all the things I need to know. But I also realized that if I just had enough confidence in myself, I could figure it out. I was willing to work smart and hard and surround myself with great people who could help shed a light into the dark, black box of entrepreneurship that I didn’t know how to navigate. And that’s exactly what I did.

In the end, I learned as a person that what really drives me is constant learning. I love to learn. As an entrepreneur, that’s what you get to do every single day. It was a really fulfilling journey for me.

Ulrich: One of the characteristics of TaskRabbit under your leadership was that it was relentlessly agile. Can you explain what this means and why it is important?

Busque: I wouldn’t be surprised if most people who know me describe me as being personally relentless. It’s just in my nature. So my team learned that saying no or that something isn’t possible wasn’t an acceptable answer.

For TaskRabbit, being relentlessly agile was about figuring out a way to bust through the walls, to go around the barriers that got in the way. This is what allowed us to achieve the large vision we had—the vision to reinvent the future of work and revolutionize the labor market—into smaller pieces. It helped make the tests we ran, the theory we had and the agility to solve problems our daily focus. And it facilitated an understanding that these agile moments every 24 hours, every day, could be strung together to achieve our larger overall vision.

Ulrich: You once said that old models of building a business may not apply to TaskRabbit. In retrospect, that is probably true of many disruptors. Do you still feel this way?

Busque: I’d take it even a step further now, given how markets and consumer mindsets have changed. Any new business or innovation that is making a broad impact like TaskRabbit has done is going to have to make its own rules about how they build and scale.

At TaskRabbit, I think the key differentiator was the flexibility we gave a workforce. We gave people the ability to set their own schedule and hourly rate. We let them opt in to clients they wanted to work for and jobs, categories, and locations. We gave them complete control over everything they did. It was a new way of thinking about work, because the traditional way was to sign

up for a company and have a boss—or have five to ten layers deep of bosses, depending on the size company you worked for—but you didn’t typically have a lot of control... over what you were working on or the flexibility of your schedule. So we really had to come at TaskRabbit from that standpoint, about creating a flexible job marketplace for our Tasker community that worked for them, was scalable and sustainable for the long term.

Ulrich: Can you talk a little about failure? Many would-be-entrepreneurs never get over this fear. What words of inspiration would you offer them?

Busque: Overcoming fear is incredibly important. For me, I go back to that moment when I realized I didn’t know anything about building a company. But I had to have enough confidence in myself to figure it out. So many of us, as entrepreneurs and founders, are perfectionists. We want things to be perfect. But perfection can be paralyzing at times. The fear of not being perfect, not having the perfect product, not having the perfect team...you just have to move through it and learn. Learn from the mistakes you are going to make and know that the flipside of a mistake is a learning through which you, your team and your strategy get stronger.

Ulrich: Can you talk a little about the importance of advisors for start-ups and what role they should play in developing the business?

Busque: You can never have too many smart people around the table. My advisory board was very wide ranging, from the CEO of ZipCar, Scott Griffith, who taught me how to be a CEO, to marketing experts who were CMOs at other companies and investors who had invested in hundreds of companies and could help me think about how I was benchmarking against the portfolio.

What I found is that when you bring in a broad group of advisors, you’re surrounded by a lot of smart people with different ideas. You can go to five advisors with the same question and get five different answers, and they are all good answers.

At first, that was a shock to me. I thought, “How is this possible? There has to be a right answer, and one of these five people should know what that answer is.”

The truth is, there is no right answer many times, and you as the founder and entrepreneur are going to have to make the call that is right for you and your business. Because at the end of the day, you know your business best. So getting comfortable in a space where I could gather perspectives from a wide range of people and then make a deci-

sion was the skill or lesson that was most important for me to learn early on.

Ulrich: If you could join that conversation with your husband during dinner, when you were first discussing the idea for TaskRabbit, what would you tell yourself?

Busque: Don’t get paralyzed by perfection. Don’t be afraid of failure. Learn from

your mistakes. Surround yourself with great people. And ultimately, have the confidence in your vision and that you can execute on it.

New Democratic leadership team vows to repair fractured party

ALBANY — County Legislative Majority Leader Dennis Feeney (D-Guilderland) named his chosen deputies on Tuesday, April 10, completing an abrupt change in party leadership from earlier this month.

After rumors surfaced that members were seeking to replace Majority Leader Gary Domalewicz (D-Albany), who had lost the confidence of Chairman Andrew Joyce and other party members after failing to implement certain systemic reforms, Domalewicz resigned his position during a closed caucus on Wednesday, April 4—only three months after he was elected in a reformist coup that led to the toppling of longtime Majority Leader Frank Comisso (D-Albany).

In an effort to heal persistent internal divisions within his party, the newly elected Feeney has named two new deputy majority leaders: Gil Ethier (D-Cohoes), the longest serving member of the Legislature and a former deputy under Comisso; and Lynne Lekakis (D-Albany), a well-liked first-term legislator generally aligned with reformists.

"I chose Legislators Gil Ethier and Lynne Lekakis as deputies because I believe they will help me unify the Democratic

Caucus," said Feeney. "It's time to come together as Albany County Democrats and deliver strong and steady leadership. Gil brings tons of experience. Lynne has new ideas. It's a nice mix."

In addition to serving two years as deputy majority leader, Ethier has served on virtually every legislative committee and chaired the Public Safety and Public Works committees for several years. He currently co-chairs the Elder Care Committee and serves on the Conservation & Improvement and Mass Transit committees. He has been chairman of the Cohoes Democratic Committee since 2002.

"I want to thank the Majority Leader for the

vote of confidence to fix the caucus," Deputy Majority Leader Ethier said. "I want a caucus where input comes from membership and their constituents, not leadership. That will make a strong caucus."

Ethier also co-chairs the Legislative Rules Reform Task Force, which Joyce (D-Albany) charged with updating the body's rules of order. Over the last few months, he has already been working to reform the Legislature with Lekakis, who is co-chair of the Legislative Modernization Task Force.

Lekakis serves as vice-chair of the Personnel Committee, and a member of the Health, Conservation & Improvement and Mass Transit committees. In October, she introduced

an equity-pay law that prohibits employers in Albany County from inquiring about a job applicant's salary history before offering them employment. It passed unanimously, making Albany County among the first municipalities in the state to enact such a law.

Gov. Andrew Cuomo has followed her lead by proposing a law to ban private and public employers from asking applicants about their salary history.

Lekakis is a partner in a consulting firm that has worked with Equinox, United Way, the Women's Bar Association, Neighborhood Resource Center and other community organizations. She also serves as facilities coordinator at Upper Hudson Planned Parenthood and served four terms as a board president of the Honest Weight Food Co-op, leading the store through several governance changes.

"Changing and modernizing the Legislature is challenging, and I intend to help the process," she said on Tuesday. "Democrats in the Legislature are eager to move forward together and it's time we got to it."

This is Albany, the seat of our state's government. So, of all the people in all the counties — 62, to be exact — who feel like they are not being heard, they come here. Just about everyday.

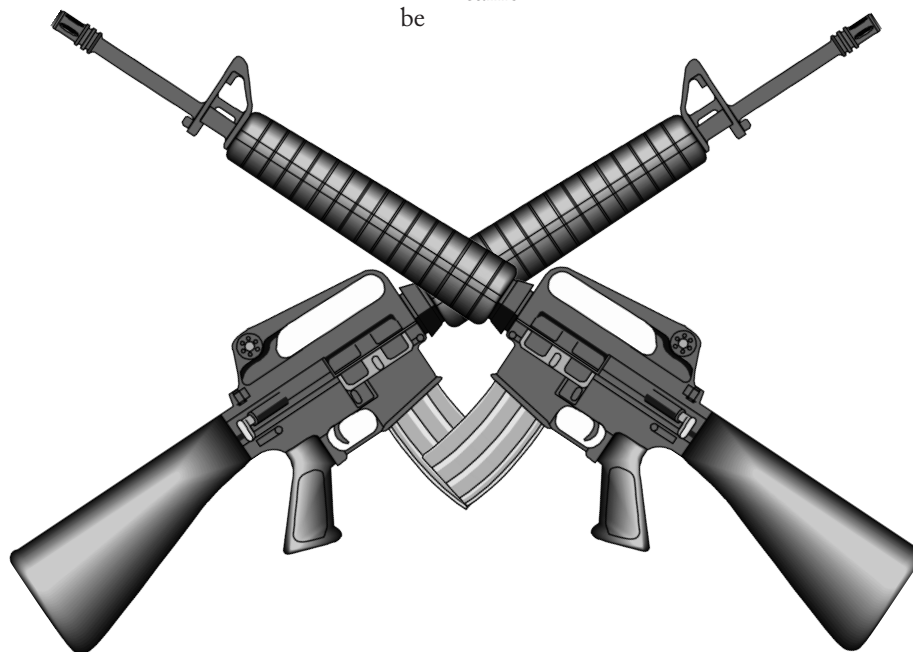
This Friday, we're looking at another rally. Local high school students are gathering on the west lawn of the Capitol, as they did last month, to bring up the topic of gun violence in schools. As was last month's rally, it's a local event that coincides with a nationwide effort. The hundreds of students who stood and chanted in unison in Albany, did so as thousands more did the same in Florida, Connecticut, Colorado and more. Those states just seem to come to mind, unfortunately, with relative ease.

Last weekend another rally assembled at the state Capitol, that of people speaking out to demand the preservation of our country's Second Amendment of the U.S. Constitution. Our newsroom learned of it through emails and messages from people outside our coverage area, so we treated it like the countless of other protests

in front of the Capitol. Though we're hyper local with our news coverage, it is a discussion worth at least a mention here. Because, no matter how loud the voice, or how popular the person who is speaking may be, there is a debate going on. In a debate, all sides must be

It was one year short of two decades ago that we were all shocked by the news of two, heavily armed students firing upon their classmates at Columbine High School. Here we are, 19 years later, and the mention of Littleton or Columbine is synonymous with the term mass murder. Go ahead and say Sandy Hook. Say Virginia Tech. Now, what about Marjory Stoneman? It's an ugly game of word association.

Let's play another round of word association and start with the National Rifle Association. How about Second Amendment preservation? Gun owner? How you stand determines how your answer is swayed, if swayed at all. If you hear yourself saying redneck, conservative or uneducated — to use family-friendly terms — you are standing too far from center. You won't be able to debate your side of the argument standing that far away from the podium, because you can't hear the other side.

If you can't listen, you're stonewalling any potential progress from being realized.

Troy to take the lead?

“The Enchanted City” aims to fill void from cancellation of World’s Largest Steampunk Fair

TROY — San Diego-based musical performance act Steam Powered Giraffe will headline a fast growing steampunk festival in Troy that aims to fill the void left by the cancellation of world’s largest Steampunk fair.

“We’re sad to hear The Steampunk World’s Fair will not be happening this year in New Jersey,” said Sue Dunckel, creator of The Enchanted City annual steampunk street festival in Troy. “But based on the interest we’ve had as result of that cancellation, we’re hoping to fill that void and satisfy the need for a spectacularly large steampunk event in the Northeast. And we’re ready for it, with one of the top steampunk acts in the country headlining our festival in one of the most amazing Victorian music halls in one of the most intact 19th century industrial downtowns in the U.S.”

Steam Powered Giraffe will play the Troy Savings Bank Music Hall on Saturday Sept. 15, at 7 p.m. (doors open at 6:30 p.m.)

Steam Powered Giraffe is a musical project from San Diego, Calif. that blends steampunk-styled pantomime, vaudeville and barbershop harmonies. The act formed in 2008 by twin siblings David Michael Bennett and Isabella “Bunny” Bennett. Together, along with a cast and crew filled with music and theatrical backgrounds, the group takes on the guise of singing antique automatons, more than a century old, and the fictional robotics company that made them.

The quirky act combines comedic sketches, improvised android banter, and original music fused with billowing steam effects and robot pantomime. As with any antique mechanisms, sometimes the performing “robots” experience mechanical issues during shows that require live on-stage upkeep — even a full system reboot — by human MC Steve Negrete and his blue matter engineers.

Steam Powered Giraffe’s unique songs have been described as “funky cabaret rock” and “heartwarming nostalgic melodies.”

“We’re thrilled that Steam Powered Giraffe is making one of their rare East Coast appearances on the stage of our historic music hall as headliners to The Enchanted City,” said Troy Savings Bank Music Hall Executive Director Jon Elbaum. “We think this act will draw many out-of-town visitors for the concert and festival which really showcase the creative vibe that is so much a part of Troy now. Troy is a fun cultural tourist destination.”

Troy Savings Bank Music Hall

A National Historic Landmark, the Troy Savings Bank Music Hall opened its doors in 1875. Its legendary near perfect acoustics have earned the Troy Savings Bank Music Hall a reputation for being one of the world’s great concert halls. The Hall has hosted performances by legions of first class artists, from legends including Dizzy Gillespie, Ella Fitzgerald, Isaac Stern, Sergei Rachmaninoff, and Vladimir Horowitz, to the best on today’s contemporary music scene, including Joshua Bell, Andrew Bird, Steve Martin, Lyle Lovett, John Prine and others.

Designed by architect George Post, Troy Savings Bank Music Hall is a pristine “Gilded Age” artifact from America’s 19th century industrial wealth.

The Hall was used as a setting for 1984 British film “The Bostonians,” based on the Henry James novel, starring Vanessa Redgrave, Christopher Reeve, Madeleine Potter and Jessica Tandy.

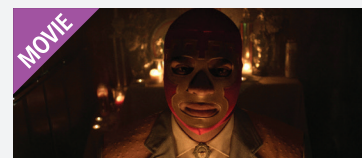

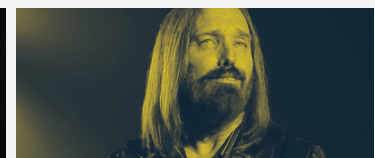

Grilled Salmon with Tomatoes and Cilantro Sauce

Tomatoes, onion, garlic and cilantro cook down to make the savory sauce for grilled salmon. Serve atop your choice of rice or pasta and add a side of bright vegetables or salad.

Ingredients

- 4 salmon fillets, 4 to 6 ounces each
- 1 stick butter (4 ounces)
- 2 large tomatoes, chopped
- 1 onion, chopped
- 8 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 cup cilantro leaves, chopped (plus additional sprigs to garnish)
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- Salt and pepper to taste and other herb seasonings as desired
- Cooked rice or spaghetti (optional)

Directions

Have vegetables chopped and ready (see photos). Preheat grill, then begin making sauce: Melt butter in large skillet

over medium heat. Add tomatoes, onion, garlic, cilantro and lemon. Increase heat as needed to begin cooking, stirring occasionally; simmer uncovered until onions are cooked and sauce is reduced, about 10-15 minutes. Meanwhile grill salmon to be ready when sauce is reduced. To serve place cooked rice or spaghetti on each plate. Arrange salmon fillets on top. Spoon a generous portion of sauce over all and garnish with cilantro sprigs.

Ride for life

Reasons to embrace cycling now

As warm temperatures return, many people renew their interest in spending time outdoors. Spring and summer are peak times of year to enjoy the great outdoors.

A popular activity in spring, summer and fall, cycling benefits the mind and body in various ways.

Mind

One of the more common mental health benefits of exercise is that working up a sweat can help alleviate physical and mental stress. Reducing stress is important for overall health and can reduce a person's risk of developing certain illnesses.

Cycling is a great way to get outdoors, meet people and see the scenery. Getting outside to exercise also can reduce anxiety and depression.

A study conducted in 2007 by researcher Charles Hillman indicated that exercise boosts brain power and may be able to stave off Alzheimer's disease in the elderly. Dr. Phil Tomporowski has studied how children with ADHD may be positively affected by bike riding, and how control issues were improved without the use of medication.

Body

The Victoria State Department Better Health Channel said that cycling for health and fitness is a good idea. Riding a bicycle is a low-impact form of exercise for people of all ages. Cycling can be fun

and doesn't require expensive equipment. Cycling generally causes less strain on joints and other areas of the body because it is low-impact. However, cycling provides enough resistance to be an effective muscle workout.

People who want to improve their cardiovascular health and manage their weight can turn to cycling to achieve their goals. Cycling raises one's metabolic rate to help the body burn fat when combined with a healthy diet. *Cycling Weekly* said cycling burns between 400 and 1,000 calories an hour, depending on the intensity of a ride and the rider's weight. Individuals can modify the distance and intensity of a cycling workout to suit their fitness goals.

Disease risk and adverse health outcomes can be reduced by hopping on a bike. A study conducted by researchers at the University of Glasgow examined more than 260,000 individuals over the course of five years. The study found that cycling to work can cut a rider's risk of developing heart disease or cancer in half.

Those eager to get started on cycling are encouraged to begin slowly, especially if it has been awhile since they last exercised. It's also important to find the right-sized bicycle to reduce strain and injury. A full-service bike shop can help bike shoppers find one that is the right height and frame size for the rider's body. The height of the handlebars and the seat also can be adjusted for comfort.

Always consult with a physician prior to exercise to ensure that the regimen is safe. Those with prior injuries or health problems should be doubly careful, though cycling is generally safe for beginners.

Have you ever been surrounded by vinyl records? Boxes and crates occupying the area of the floor, with bookcases tracing the walls? An indie track playing faintly over speakers as dust dances in the light and a sort of musty smell hangs in the air.

Have you ever wanted to?

No better reason to visit one than Record Store Day, taking place Saturday, April 21. The day was conceived in 2007 as a way to recognize and celebrate the unique culture that is buying vinyl and has since grown to draw record enthusiasts from nearly every continent into their local stores.

The day uses special releases and promotions along with performances, meet and greets, cookouts, parades and more to encourage people of all ages to integrate into this unique community of record buying fanatics.

Within the past couple years there's been a revival of the music pleasures of the past with the sale of vinyl records hitting a 25-year high. Driven by an indie-alternative youth searching for a way to feel like it's 1977 again, what's old is becoming new again.

This 21st century boom in record sales is almost ironic given the amount of music streaming platforms that exist nowadays. There's no denying vinyl records are generally pricey and of a relatively poorer listening quality than what you download off iTunes or Spotify, so what exactly is the big draw?

If you ask me, one of the "alternative youth" who purchases vinyl fairly regularly, the draw to having records is that there's simply nothing quite like listening to it.

It's a funny thing, when you're raised on digital music, you grow used to the album art is meger little pixelated image existing only on your phone or iPod. You get used to looking up song lyrics on sketchy websites or YouTube videos in order to sing along to your favorite songs.

But, with records it's completely different.

The album art becomes tangible, a real thing you can hold and admire in your hands, even frame it on your wall if you'd like. Lyrics come in liner notes, picked straight from the artists brain that you can follow along with as you get lost in the music.

Even the songs, which used to exist only as a binary series of bits are transformed into grooves and waves carved into a vinyl disc you can trace with your finger tips.

When you listen to vinyl, you're not just listening, you're experiencing.

The same applies to shopping at a record store. Rather than simply looking up the title of a song or album, you get to sift through piles of records, maybe even finding something that you never intended to on the way. Something completely out of the box and maybe even out of this decade.

This Record Store Day I encourage you to go out to your local store, not only in support of these small businesses, but for a taste of the culture that has captivated generation after generation. You may even find yourself lost in a new experience, too.

So, until someone in closer proximity decides to participate in Record Store Day, I will likely be taking a ride to Toonerville Trolley Records in Williamstown, just as I did last year.

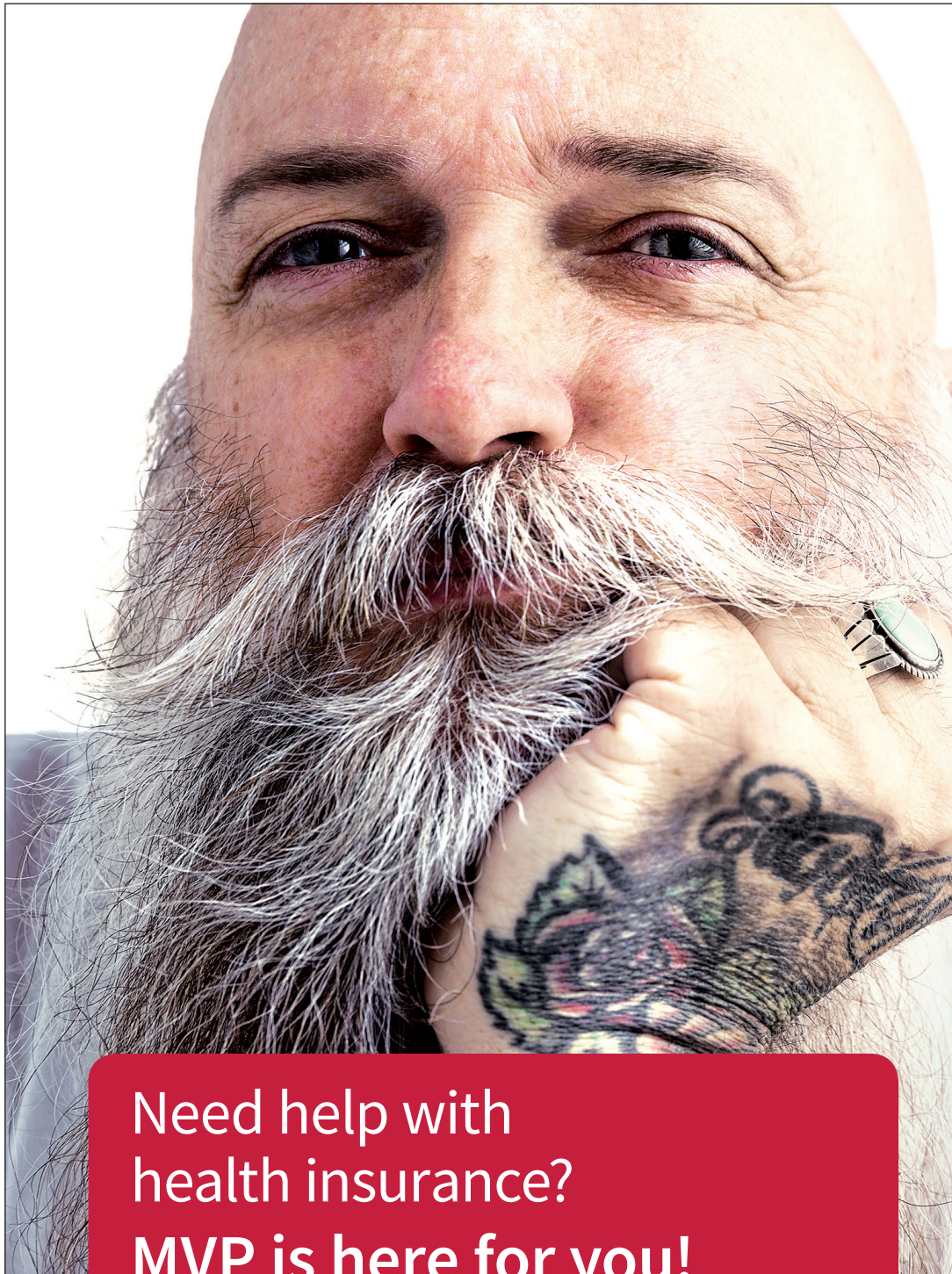

New bank experience coming to town

Credit union setting a new foundation on Delaware Avenue

DELMAR — The new Sunmark Federal Credit Union branch set to open on Delaware Avenue in Delmar will offer 24-hour services unmatched by most financial institutions in the Capital District, according to Sunmark CEO Frank DeGraw.

The new branch will offer ITMs—“We call them MyITMs,” said DeGraw—that features significantly more functionality than traditional ATMs and will be available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. The machines, already in use at the

Rotterdam and Broadway, Schenectady branches, can be used by members and non-members.

Sunmark was established in 1937 by GE as Schenectady G.E. Turbine Department’s Federal Credit Union #1884. As a credit union, it is different than a traditional bank in that it is a non-profit institution that passes profits on to its members. But, according to DeGraw, Sunmark’s most important defining characteristic is its employees.

“It’s pretty evident from the feedback we get from our membership,” he said. “Even though we have a lot of similar products

and services, it’s all about the experience the person has when they’re doing business with us that counts.”

DeGraw cited a recent employee meeting, during which employees were asked to stand if they had contributed time, resources or money to any one of the charities supported by the Sunmark Foundation (Albany Children’s Hospital, Ronald McDonald House and Capital Roots among them). “Every single person stood up,” he said with pride. “One hundred percent of our employees, even the newest ones, had gotten involved in some way.

“We take pride in being part of the communities that we serve,” he said, explaining that the decision to open the Delmar branch was a direct result of member requests. “That’s what our members asked us to do.”

Acknowledging that a full 93 percent of Sunmark transactions take place online, DeGraw said it was still important to the credit union to provide physical banking branches for those who prefer to see a face, have a question or need to complete a transaction not yet provided by the new ITM machines.

“Our vision is to be the trusted financial partner that provides value and convenience to our members,” he said. “There’s more to service than just a transaction. Members like to know that they have

somewhere close to their job and home where they can just walk in and talk to somebody.”

Sunmark now has nine branches in six counties, and plans to continue opening branches—with smaller physical footprints than a traditional branch building and ITM machines—to accommodate current and potential members.



DeGraw, who has been with the institution since before it rebranded, said that the business philosophy has remained unchanged.

“We didn’t change our philosophy of people helping people, which is the credit union philosophy,” he said. “We just made our services available to a broader spectrum of

people.”

The Delmar branch will be 2000 square feet, with a gabled exterior design and two drive through lanes, equipped with the new ITM machines. Inside, the building will be staffed by a manager, two consultants, and two “concierge” positions to help members who may need assistance with one of the four interior ITM machines.

ALBANY — "It's a simple story," said Peter Wall of Star Roofing, "we do what we say we are going to do every day."

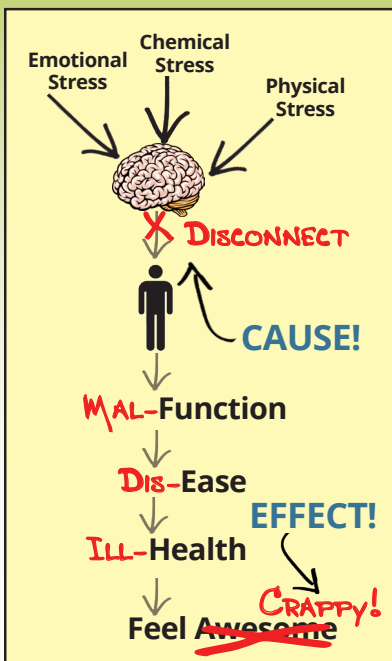
