On the road again

Superintendent of highways presents road maintenance plan, new sidewalk procedure

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BETHLEHEM — Highway Superintendent John "Tiger" Anastasi presented the Town Board with the 2018 road maintenance program during its meeting on Wednesday, June 27.

During the course of his presentation, Anastasi talked about how the road maintenance program was developed based on a pavement condition assessment that was conducted in the spring of 2017.

Explaining that seemingly small defects in the roadway can quickly become larger and more expensive problems if left unaddressed,

Anastasi said the town uses a scale — from one to 10 — to quantify the extent and expense of potential maintenance projects.

Currently, most of the town-owned roadways — a total of 99.79 miles — are rated a six or seven, meaning that routine maintenance or preventative treatments are likely all that is needed. A smaller percentage — 62.32 miles — are rated eight or nine, meaning they require little or no maintenance. The remaining 24.47 miles are a five or lower, meaning that more expensive preventative treatments, structural work or full reconstruction are needed. (Only about three miles have been deemed in need of full reconstruction.)

For example, before reconstruction, he noted, Borthwick Avenue was rated a three.

"The goal," said Anastasi, "is to find and fix problems early." He said it's preferable to address roads before they reach a rating of five, as a rough winter could cause them to quickly deteriorate by a full level or two. Right now, he said, the department is working on roads rated six and seven.

This week, crews are working north of the Delmar Bypass, on Parkwyn Drive, Pheasant Lane, Jordan Boulevard, Catherine Street and Woodstream Drive. Also targeted for work in 2018 are Bethlehem Court and Salisbury

Local protesters call to end ICE

COLONIE—About two dozen people protested outside the federal Department of Homeland Security building on Route 7 on Friday, June 6, and called for the elimination of Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

"I'm terrified for my country and the way we treat people who are coming here and the people who are already living here as part of our communities," said Miriam Tell, of Albany. "I think this is a first step towards some even more terrifying things like what we saw in Germany in the 30s. We are imprisoning babies in concentration camps already and we are talking about questioning people who have been naturalized citizens. They come for the most vulnerable first and then they can come after anyone."

She said ICE has become a "rogue agency" that is no longer "following

They are showing up on private

property and on farms to pull away workers. There is no humanity left in the way it is operating," she said. "It is acting to terrorize people. We need to start over with an agency that is running with a different mindset."

The day held no particular significance as to why the protesters showed up, but there was a sign on the door saying the building was closed for the day. The protest does come as the national outcry over the practice of separating families at the border gets louder as too does the outcry by some Democrats in Washington to disband ICE.

Steve Downs, an attorney from Selkirk who made national news in 2003 for getting thrown out of Crossgates Mall for wearing a "Peace on Earth"T-shirt, was on the scene as a legal observer. While he was part of a program established by the Civil Liberties Union and other organizations to keep an impartial eye on protests — and the police should they opt to intervene — he does have strong personnel reasons for being there, too.

"Nobody should be treated the way people are being treated. Families are being separated and immigrants are being abused," he said. "I've re-settled a number of immigrant families in this country and all of them have gone on to live productive lives — they have jobs, they pay taxes, they have gone to college and they have done exceptionally well. I can't tell you how distressed I am the way we treat people who are trying to build our country."

Pete Looker, who grew up about a mile away from the protest, was wearing a shirt that said "Homeland Security is Sustainable Energy."

"If we were not hooked on foreign oil, we would not be invading the Middle East and creating all these refugees and all these terrible problems," he said. "My grandparents came here from Scandinavia to avoid World War II, and I am here to protest the unfairness of our immigration system today as it relates to our empire."

Still time to register for CBRC road race in Ravena this Saturday

RAVENA — Officials with the Capital Bicycle Racing Club (CBRC) remind area cyclists that there is still time to pre-register for its 17th annual NY Capital Region Road Race, which takes place this Saturday, July 14, online at https://www.bikereg.com/Net/ ny-capital-region-road-race. The race features a 20 mile rolling loop, with several steep climbs and an elevation gain of 1,500 feet per loop, with a maximum grade of 16 percent; (39x25 gearing is recommended.

On site registration and staging begin at 8:30 a.m. at Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk Junior Senior High School on U.S. Route 9W. Different race divisions will depart from the Finish Line located on Jarvis Road 0.2 miles north of its intersection with Bushendorf Road every five minutes from 10:30 to 10:55 a.m.

Prospective racers should be aware that registration is capped at 100 or 75 cyclists depending on the race. With the exception of the Juniors race, which has a \$10 fee, all other races have a \$65 fee through Friday, July 13, increasing to \$75 on race day. Racers are also advised that USAC Road Racing rules apply; helmets are required while aero-bars and sleeveless jerseys are both prohibited.

Proceeds from race fees will be distributed to the fire, police and EMS organizations that provided their professional services during the event.

12 illegal weapons found near **BCHS**

Marijuana-growers and stash of weapons found near BCHS

DELMAR—On Friday, July 6, the Bethlehem Police Department, assisted by the Albany County Sheriff's Department, executed a search warrant pursuant to an on-going investigation. They searched a home near Bethlehem Central High School on Longmeadow Drive in Delmar and discovered a small marijuana growing operation and multiple weapons.

Also located inside the house was evidence of a larger growing operation that had been recently removed, as well as five cane swords, metal knuckles, 13 Kung Fu throwing stars, two sets of "chucka sticks," a metal knuckle knife, numerous daggers and a bullet proof vest.

Joseph J. Martin, 42, and Daniel S. Johnson, 48, both of Delmar, were arrested. Each has been charged with 12 misdemeanor counts of criminal possession of a weapon, as well as misdemeanor counts of criminal possession of marijuana and unlawfully growing cannabis.

Both Martin and Johnson were arraigned in the Town of Bethlehem Court by the Judge Ryan Donovan and were remanded to the Albany County Jail in lieu of \$5,000 bail. A return court date has been set for Tuesday, August 7 at 4 p.m. The investigation was led by Bethlehem Police with the assistance of the Albany County Sheriff's Department Criminal Investigation Unit.

need of repair or repaving, the Highway Department coordinates with other town departments to identify public works projects, capital projects, new developments and pedestrian/bicycle

across our main roads with water, sewer, gas or whatever," Anastasi said. "So we try to coordinate and it saves us a lot of money down the road. We may not get to certain roads as quick, but it works out cheaper and is a better job in the long run."

Noting new developments in town and the age of the roads, Anastasi said that it will be important to keep an eye on certain potential problems, such as roads that show evidence of structural weakness in areas where heavy materials will be transported and traffic volumes are expected to

It costs the town \$6K to mill a mile-long stretch of roadway that is 24 feet wide and \$50K for just the materials to pave the same area, according to Anastasi. An eight-person crew, as well as two flagmen and three or four truck drivers are also needed. Of the town's approximately 187 miles of roads, an average of 11 to 13 miles are replaced each year.

"This is why the assessment is so vital," he said. "Some roads weather better than others. Otherwise, in rotation, it would take 18 years just to do the full rotation if we just went in order.'

In 2018, the highway department will also reassess sidewalks.

"We maintain approximately 56 miles of sidewalk," said Anastasi. "And 700 curb ramps. About 60 percent have ADA compliant detectable warning plates and 40 percent do not," he said, referring to standards set by the Americans with Disabilities Act.

According to Anastasi, per the town's allocated budget for sidewalk maintenance in 2018, \$50K, approximately onethird of a mile would be able to be replaced at the contracted rate. "At that rate," he said, "it would take 155.6 years to replace all existing sidewalks. He added that does not include the cost of the ADA compliant plates, which cost \$500 each.

So, rather than paying a sub-contractor to do the work. Anastasi was able to outfit his own crew with all the equipment needed to replace or construct sidewalks, which he anticipates will cost the town 50 percent less than hiring someone else. He explained to the board how sidewalks, such as the new one along New Scotland Avenue, are constructed by town crews and showed photos of the finished results.

Noting that this is the first time town highway crews have fully constructed town sidewalks, Anastasi said, "They did a really good job. I'm very proud of them."

"I've never really thought about sidewalks before," said Town Supervisor David VanLuven. "And, seeing the crews working on them, they're truly handcrafted. They're done entirely by hand. That many miles is truly backbreaking work and they do a fantastic job."

Summer Yard Waste Collection

BETHLEHEM — From May to October, properly prepared yard waste is picked up by the Town of Bethlehem Highway Department and is composted at the town's compost facility.

Yard waste must be placed in reusable containers or paper bags. Brush and branches under four feet in length should be piled neatly along the sides of the road, not so high or so wide as to obstruct roadways or line of sight and not in the roadway itself. Placing debris into the roadway constitutes a violation of vehicle and traffic law and creates a hazardous situation for pedestrian, bicycle, and vehicular traffic. Please make sure that storm drainage inlets are also kept clean of leaves and branches to ensure proper drainage.

Acceptable Items

Acceptable items include leaves, grass, and hedge clippings placed at curbside in

reusable containers or in biodegradable paper bags (not over 50 pounds per container), as well as brush and branches under 4 feet in length stacked neatly at curbside. No other items or materials are accepted, and all non-conforming items will not be collected. No brush or trees from private contractors will be accepted.

There was one more round of games on Monday, July 9, before the top four of seven teams play for the championship beginning on Thursday, July 12, at a field yet to be determined.





Siena to install giant telescope

COLONIE — Siena College will soon be home to the largest telescope in the Capital District.

A crane hoisted the 2,600-pound dome onto the top of an observatory, which sits on top of Roger Bacon Hall on Monday, July 2, that will eventually house a \$210,000, 27-inch telescope.

The telescope will be used for a range of purposes, said Rose Finn, chair of the Physics and Astronomy Department at Siena, from allowing the public to come and take a peek to research projects.

"This is a new capability at Siena," she said. We had very small portable telescopes but this is a completely new facility for us so this is a game changer not only for our majors, but a third of our students take astronomy and they have never had a chance to look through a telescope like this," she

"It's been something the physics department has been trying to do for 30 years and there was an opportunity to apply for a grant and given the number of students who pass through the

program we decided this was a good use of the funding.'

The telescope will see "millions and millions of light years" into space and it's hard to describe what that actually means. But, Finn said, the moon would be too bright – or too close – to examine through the telescope.

"You will get a great view of nearby galaxies and different planets and that is what you can see with your eye," she said. "If we put a camera on the back, it's totally different, and we can do integrating for a long time and you can see deep sky objects like distant galaxies.'

How the telescope will

ultimately get used is still up in the air, said Finn, who has chaired the department for eight years. There are rudimentary plans to show what is seen through the telescope on social media or other websites and allowing the public to do astrophotography is also being discussed.

"There is so much interest in astronomy that we can do a lot with our students and with the community," she said, adding that when the college hosted an "eclipse night" around 500 people showed up.

The dome is very basic, and is made out of simple tin. It's by design, though, because for

optimal viewing the temperature inside the telescope must be the same as it is outside. There is an entire field of science dedicated to optimizing such equipment and if there is that drastic of a temperature change, fungus and other imperfections could distort the high-tech, high quality glass and mirrors. If it's 10 degrees below zero or 90 degrees outside the dome, it should be the same

The dome has a trap doortype feature that opens so the telescope can see outside, and spins depending on which direction the user wants to view. Once everything is up and running, most everything can be done from a remote location via computer.

It took a carpenter with the construction company BBL, and his apprentice daughter, just two days to build and that was after a week to build the base. There is about another week of work left to finish everything off. The telescope should be up and running by the time students return for classes in the fall.

"It's been an interesting job, said Brian Gordon. "I've been doing this for 28 years and I've never done anything like this

before and probably never will be again," added the Schenectady resident who is a member of the Carpenters Union Local 291. "It's odd and it's different and you only get one chance to get it right."

He said it was somewhat nerve wracking knowing the media and some 40 to 50 people would be watching the crane hoist the dome he built on the ground onto the circular base he built on the

"On Friday, I triple checked this thing five times because the last thing you want to do is pick it up, with these people watching, and find it doesn't fit," he said.

Asked if it was going to fit, he and his daughter Brianna, without hesitation, said "of course ... absolutely."

"This is my first big project and this is super exciting because this is making history," Brianna Gordon said. "Before I even graduate and become a fullfledged journeyman I get to help make history. I've always enjoyed working with my hands and making something out of nothing. Money is nice, but the whole point is saying 'look what I did' when it's all done."

Put violent protests on ICE

Violence and destruction overshadows the message

As we write this today, we still have the right to peaceably assemble, we still possess the freedom of speech. The oldest of our country's laws remain as one of the strongest definitions of our democracy. It continues to be a shining inspiration for oppressed people who fight to change their own countries for the better.

In recent months, people have scrutinized over the practices of the Immigration and Customs Enforcement. The enforcement agency is a response to 9/11, established in 2003 under the Department of Homeland Security. It has served as an additional safety blanket. Whereas the United States Border Patrol is tasked with preventing undocumented immigrants from entering into the country, ICE takes that effort a step further. It investigates and ultimately facilitates the removal of illegal non-citizens from the

Then-presidential candidate Donald Trump made the topic of strengthening immigration laws and borders a part of his agenda before his election to office in 2016. A great deal of focus was placed on building a wall along our southern border shared with Mexico. And, in recent months, the his administration has established a "zero tolerance" on illegal immigrants with a policy that has separated more than 2,000 children from their families.

Trump also pushed for a ban on all Muslims during his campaigns, and followed through with an executive order. Though it is widely interpreted to be illegal to prevent people of specific origin or ethnicity from traveling into our country, his executive order was ultimately upheld by the United States Supreme Court, as it targets countries, not people.

Opponents have labeled the administration's practices as xenophobic to racist. Though, supporters will point out similar acts by President Obama.

While in office, Obama earned the nickname "Deporterin-Chief." The moniker, a play on the president's Commanderin-Chief role as head of the armed forces, was earned after a record 2.4 million immigrants were deported between 2009 and 2016. Obama, too, had ordered a similar travel ban in 2011; however, that was in response to a specific threat from Iraqi nationals living in Bowling Green, Ky. Trump's proposed ban did not follow an apparent threat to the country. Nonetheless, the act of separating children from their parents has drawn strong criticism from both sides of the aisle. The practice has since been curtailed.

The images of these children have remained in the circulation of national news coverage as the task of reuniting these families becomes reportedly more daunting. There are also reports of Border Patrol agents establishing checkpoints within 100 miles of our U.S. border, searching and verifying citizenship along our roadways.

The 100-mile buffer zone is supposedly within

the enforcement agency's jurisdiction, but there is the question as to whether or not it has the right to conduct such searches without probable cause. There is the matter of the Fourth Amendment of the United States, which protects citizens from random stops and searches. The American Civil Liberties Union is not considering this a trivial moment. It has recently established a page within its website to address these concerns. This scenario doesn't play out exclusively along what is perceived to be the MS-13 infested border to the south. The ACLU points out that two out of three Americans live within this 100-mile buffer zone. CNN and the New York Times each published articles on such checkpoints in both New Hampshire and Maine last month, states closest to the benign Canadian border.

Democrats and liberals have called for the abolition of ICE. Protests have gathered in pockets throughout the country, including two dozen local residents who gathered last week before the federal Homeland Security building in Colonie. Those who spoke with our reporter, Jim Franco, voiced their disdain as the enforcement agency raids local farms and gathers at area courthouses to detain illegal immigrants. One such protestor said, ""It is acting to terrorize people." The protest later escalated into acts of vandalism, with at least one writing his message to disband ICE on the building's facade.

Plausible threats to our

country and our people need to be addressed. Shortly after 9/11, our ability to defend ourselves against small, organized individuals with the training and resources to cause destructive havoc was in serious question. The climate of fear and weariness has never abated since the Twin Towers crumbled down nearly two decades ago. However, fear has also seemed to be used as a tool wielded by some more than others to garner support. That is something to be concerned over.

We live in divisive times where there is no longer a middle ground between political stances. Describing one's self as conservative or liberal has created the potential for each to wear a scarlet letter upon his chest, open to ridicule and mocking at an unprecedented level. It's akin to baseball fans who wear a rival team's jersey. Regardless of the person, his education or civility,

insults, barbs and fists are thrown at haste. The political realm is not a game. There should never be a devotion to the Democrat or Republican party. We, as citizens, do not pledge allegiance to a donkey or elephant. Party agendas change. Blind faith into a particular party, or person, leads us down a dangerous road. Our democracy demands we question our leadership and hold it accountable for its actions.

As for our own actions, as we protest, we need to do so without violence or destruction. Those acts only overshadow the message we try to convey. That message, as righteous as it may be, falls to deaf ears the moment we turn to violence. It only casts a shadow upon the light we try to shine out onto the world. Otherwise, a poor example of what this country once stood for.



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



Spin Doctors wheeling its way to Schenectady

— When it comes to '90s jam band success, the Spin Doctors are one of the biggest names.

Songs like "Little Miss Can't Be Wrong" and "Two Princes" first splashed across MTV airwaves in summer 1992, gaining the band commercial success. The group found itself on the lineup for the first H.O.R.D.E. Music Festival, sharing the stage with big acts like Phish, Widespread Panic and The Samples.

Twenty-six years after the MTV wave, the Spin Doctors are coming to Schenectady for one night of musical fun. Headlining the Schenectady County SummerNight 2018 concert, the Spin Doctors are performing with bands Lucy and Bendt.

This concert is free to

all and will take place on Friday, July 13, from 5 to 10 p.m on the Jay Street Pedestrian Mall, at 109 Jay Street. The Spin Doctors will take the stage around 8:30 p.m.

The Spin Doctors was formed in the late '80s, tracing its roots back to New York City. Originally called Trucking Company, the band changed its name in 1989 and released several popular records, including "Pocket Full of Kryptonite," "Turn It Upside Down" and "You've Got to Believe in Something."The band also recorded covers of other songs, including Creedence Clearwater Revival's "Have You Ever Seen The Rain?" for the movie "Philadelphia" and Iimi Hendrix's "Spanish Castle Magic."

"There was always something special, from the very first time we played together," Spin Doctors member Chris Barron once said of the band's longstanding musical chemistry. "Even if we don't see each other or play together for a while. It's like riding a bicycle. A bicycle that makes loud, very beautiful music."

Lucy, a Saratoga Springs-based band, was formed in 2014. The band maneuvers through indie pop and rock to form its unique sound. Lucy has performed with national acts Cold War Kids, Circa Waves and July Talk.

Bendt has formed a sound that has carved itself into modern day rock. Formed in Albany in 2015, its three members work to craft a unique presence, one that draws from their individual musicianship and shared love of hard rock, alternative, metal, and funk.







Fake it 'til you make it

arm-raised catfish is a great choice for diners who prefer healthy, sustainably sourced seafood. But as flavorful as farm-raised catfish can be, chef Kevin Gillespie, author of "Fire In My Belly" (Andrews McMeel), wanted to up the flavor factor even further, ultimately crafting this recipe for "Shrimp-Stuffed Pan-Fried Catfish."

Shrimp-Stuffed Pan-Fried Catfish

Ingredients — Serves 4

- 8 skinless center-cut catfish fillets, about 2 ounces each
- 1/3 cupFresh Shrimp Paste (see below) Canola oil for frying
- 3/4 cup fine-ground cornmeal Salt
- 3/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 large eggs
- 1/2 cup Avocado Puree (see below)

Directions:

- 1. Pat the fillets dry with a paper towel. Trim the fillets so that they are the same size and thickness. Set 4 of the fillets skin-side up (where the skin used to be) on a paper towel and spread each with 1 Tablespoon shrimp paste; you want a nice thick layer evenly covering the fillet. Top each with a second fillet, (former) skin-side down. Refrigerate to allow the shrimp paste to set and kind of "glue" the fillets together, about 10 minutes.
- 2. Heat the oil in a deep fryer to 325°F. Or heat 1 inch of oil in a deep skillet to 325°F. This frying temperature is lower than normal to allow the heat to reach the filling before the outside burns.
- 3. Line a baking sheet with a cooking rack. Season the cornmeal with salt.
- 4. Bread the fish using the 3-step fry prep with the flour, eggs and seasoned cornmeal. Fry the fish until it's golden brown, 5 to 6 minutes. If you are panfrying, fry for 4 to 5 minutes, flip over and fry for another 3 to 4 minutes, until all sides are golden brown. Transfer the fish to a rack to drain.
- 5. To serve, use a thin-bladed knife to cut each fish bundle in half cross-wise. Spoon a pool of avocado puree onto the center of each serving plate and stand the two halves cut-side up on the puree.

Fresh Shrimp Paste

Makes about 2 cups

- 8 skinless center-cut catfish fillets, about 2 ounces each
- 2 egg whites, at room temperature
- 12 ounces shrimp, peeled, deveined and diced
- 1 tablespoon Sweet Herb Blend (see below) Salt
- 1. Fit a mixer with the whisk attachment and add the egg whites to the mixer bowl. Beat on low speed until frothy, then crank

arm-raised catfish is a great choice it up to high and beat until soft peaks form for diners who prefer healthy, when the whisk is lifted.

- 2. Fit a food processor with the metal blade and add the shrimp to the work bowl. Pulse about 6 times, or just until the mixture is nearly smooth. Add the egg whites, herbs and a pinch of salt. Pulse to a smooth paste, about five 5-second pulses. Transfer to a bowl and refrigerate until ready to use. This is best used the day it is made.
- 3. To make the sweet herb blend, gather together equal parts fresh celery leaves, parsley leaves, tarragon, and thyme (stems removed). Mince and go.

Note: Leftover shrimp paste can be used to make shrimp toast as an appetizer. Remove the crusts from white sandwich bread and cut the bread diagonally into quarters. Spread each triangle with about 2 teaspoons shrimp paste and fry, shrimpside down, in an oiled skillet over medium heat until golden brown, about 3 minutes. Flip and fry the toasts for another minute to brown the bottom crust. Transfer to a paper towel to drain.

Avocado Puree

Makes about 1/2 cup

- 8 skinless center-cut catfish fillets, about 2 ounces each
- 1 ripe avocado
- 1 plump lime
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1. Cut the avocado in half from the north pole to the south pole and remove the pit. Cut the flesh into small chunks and transfer to a mini chopper or small food processor with about 1 tablespoon lime juice, the water and the salt. Puree until smooth, about 30 seconds. Press the puree through a fine-mesh strainer to make it even more velvety. Cover and refrigerate. If you are making and storing the puree overnight, squeeze some more lime juice over the surface of the puree before covering it so that it won't turn dark.

What to do after suffering a sunburn

Summer fun routinely involves days spent soaking up some of the sun's rays. Relaxing days at the beach, barbecues in the backyard or picnics at the park can make for fun summer activities that create lasting memories.

While spending time in the great outdoors is a great way to take advantage of summer weather, it's important that revelers take steps to prevent sunburn when spending days beneath the hot summer sun. Sunburns may seem temporary, but the Skin Cancer Foundation notes that sunburn can cause long-lasting skin damage. In addition, the SCF notes that a person's risk for melanoma, the most dangerous form of skin cancer, doubles if he or she has had more than five sunburns.

It can take several hours to notice the full damage of a sunburn, though some people may notice mild symptoms of sunburn more quickly than that. The SCF recommends that people get out of the sun at the first sign of sunburn, and then take the following steps to treat their skin.

Cool the skin down quickly

People sitting near cool water, whether it's the ocean or a backyard pool, should take a quick dip to cool their skin. Make this dip quick so your skin is not further exposed to the sun. After taking a dip, cover up your skin and get out of the sun, continuing to cool the skin with a cold compress. Do not apply ice directly to sunburned skin. Some people may want to take a cool shower or bath after suffering a sunburn. While that's alright, the SCF recommends keeping the bath or shower short, as long baths or showers can dry the skin, and avoiding harsh soap that can be irritating.

Moisturize skin while it's still damp

Apply a gentle moisturizing lotion while the skin is still damp, and continue

doing so to affected areas for a few days. Avoid petroleum- or oil-based ointments, as they can trap the heat and make burns worse.

Decrease inflammation

A nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory (NSAID) like aspirin, ibuprofen or naproxen can help sunburned men and women manage the pain and discomfort associated with their sunburns. Symptoms such as redness and swelling may be mitigated with a 1 percent over-the-counter cortisone cream applied as directed for a few days.

Wear the right clothing

Tight clothing can rub up against sunburned skin and irritate it even further. Until sunburned skin returns to normal, wear loose, soft and breathable clothing to keep irritation to a minimum.

Make a conscious effort to stay hydrated

Sunburns draw fluid to the surface of skin, taking it away from the rest of the body. So it's important that men and women who have suffered a sunburn make a conscious effort to drink more fluids until their skin heals so they can avoid becoming dehydrated.

Report severe sunburns to a physician


Symptoms of severe sunburn include blistering of the skin, fever, chills, wooziness, and/or feelings of confusion. Report such symptoms to a physician immediately, and avoid popping blisters, as doing so can lead to infection.

Sunburns can always be avoided. Men, women and children planning to spend time in the sun should take every measure to avoid sunburn, which can produce long-lasting damage to the skin.



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

Taylor Doesn't Disappoint Fans In Timeless Concert

LEE, Mass. —

Berkshires resident and world-loved music legend James Taylor crooned to a sold-out crowd at Tanglewood on Tuesday, July 3, the first night of his traditional two nights at the rural venue near his summer home. The crowd filled every inch of the manicured lawn with blankets, tables, chairs and fine dining accessories, clearly reflecting that this wasn't the first JT concert attended by most fans. Inside seats were filled as the crowd sat in high humidity and heat, waiting with anticipation for the first set.

Taylor was the first artist to set foot on the stage a little after 8 p.m., and he was met by cheering fans who quickly forgave the brief tardiness. The 70-year-old star appeared in his long pants, dress shirt and cap, and after brief waves, he slung

Taylor transitioned through both well-known pieces and some lesserknown songs in the first set. The light show, coordinated with the chorus and highlights of "Country Road," seemed intent to remind the audience that they are indeed at a rock concert, not a folk concert.

It would be a bumpy

first set, though, marked by amp problems, some pacing issues, and low energy from artist and crowd alike. At one point after "Frozen Man," seasoned Taylor matched the key of the reverb from the amp and joked, "Do we have any songs in that key?" Using humor and his incredibly flexible vocals, Taylor kept the crowd engaged through some slower moments. He introduced band members throughout the first set, and indeed the band members, including two percussionists, a trumpet player, flute and saxophone player, three backup singers, pianist, fiddle and of course the customary guitar and bass, are an allstar band. Taylor turned to look at each artist as he or she performed, and genuinely reflected an appreciation for sharing the music with the artists.

Folksy and dancing little jigs, Taylor covered "(I'm a) Road Runner" and danced around the

stage. This seemed to wake the audience back up, but there was a bit wrong with the rhythm section and the band seemed off the pace with one another. "Copperline" saved the set, though, with Taylor's infallible voice finding its vertical pitches with beautiful ease. They rolled into "Handyman" and "Mexico," bringing the crowd to its feet.

Before breaking for intermission, Taylor looked at the setlist and joked with the audience, pacing them for the 20-minute break and promising "a lot of hits" in the next set. In between, he was on stage, signing autographs and taking pictures with fans.

The second set delivered on the hits, and more than compensated for any troubling moments from earlier in the night. Fans sang along to the most famous James Taylor tunes, swaying in the heat to "Something in the Way She Moves. Taylor impossibly made

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himself even more human and relatable with a song about his dog, Sunny, and shared adorable pictures of the pug. Each song in the set related to the human experience: loving someone, losing someone, having a dog, being a friend.

And that's really why people go to see James Taylor – the articulation of their own very human experience. We go to be reminded that we aren't alone in these hard emotions, and in fact everyone struggles with sadness, joy, and how to show love. "Shower the People You Love" brought the crowd to its feet, singing along and encouraging folks to do just that – show the love to those around you.

From "Sunny Skies" and "Walking Man,"the set transitioned to the faster, more intense rock feel of "Steam Roller." Playing on a baby blue electric guitar, Taylor's only electric guitar song featured some

impressive riffs by the pianist, bassist, and sax players. Taylor waved his cap over the instruments, and jumped on one leg like an old time rock star, bringing gasps of joy and screams of love from the audience.

Filled with folks who had traveled long distances to get to Tanglewood, the crowd talked to each other with civility, gentleness, and a genuine interest in one another in the shed. Couples surrounding this reviewer came from New Haven, Rochester, and even Philadelphia. It had become an annual pilgrimage for many of them. When asked why the same smile crossed their lips, heads shook a bit in disbelief, and no one could really articulate a specific reason beyond loving the music. But with the encore of "You've Got a Friend," fans were truly speaking their hearts. James Taylor is their friend, their company in easy and hard times alike.





The number of specialty sport camps have blossomed in recent years.





including free interments for veterans and their spouses at Gerald B. H. Solomon Saratoga National Cemetery in many

"Some counties are more difficult than others to work with," he explained. "Other counties, it's just a phone call and you can get a confirmation the next day. But, as long as we know the process is in order, we can go ahead and work with the families."

Meyers said he probably goes through that process four to six times a month, often with families from the various nearby counties.

"We have a very flexible policy," he said. "No two people are the same, and so no two funerals should be the same. We can meet needs at both ends of the spectrum and everything in between."

Joking that he could write a book about the funerals he has directed, Meyers declined to share any of those stories out of respect for the families.

"Remember that is someone's loved one that you're taking care of," he said. "So I always use the utmost professionalism and



AC buying guide

Bigger is not always better

Window air conditioning units help people who do not have a central cooling system stay cool when temperatures rise.

When shopping for window air conditioners, consumers will no doubt encounter the acronym BTU. BTU stands for British Thermal Unit, which is a traditional measurement of heat. defined as the amount of heat required to raise the temperature of one pound of water by

one degree Fahrenheit at sea level. While BTUs may make sense when determining heat output of gas grills or the warming capacity of a heating appliance, just what do heating units have to do with air conditioners?

According to Compact Appliance, when BTUs are used in relation to air conditioning systems, the measurement expresses how many BTUs can be removed from the air per hour, essentially reflecting how well heat can be extracted from a room and cooled by the unit.

While it may seem like having the highest BTU rating would always be ideal, this isn't always the case. Cooling a room too quickly with an oversized unit may result in the appliance having to cycle on and off frequently, eventually overworking the air conditioner's compressor and potentially shortening its life span.

Similarly, using a unit that doesn't have enough BTUs will prevent the air conditioner from making a room comfortable, potentially compelling users to run the appliance in excess.

Instead, consumers need to find the right unit for their needs. Measuring

the square footage of a room and then comparing it against BTU guidelines for particular air conditioner units is a great way to ensure you find the right window unit. According to the home improvement experts at Lowes, the following are the advised BTU ratings matched up with room sizes:


- 150 to 350 square feet: 5,000 to 8,000
- 350 to 550 square feet: 8,000 to 12,000 BTUs
- 550 to 1,050 square feet: 12,000 to 18,500 BTUs
- 1,050 to 1,600 square feet: 18,500 to 25,000 BTUs.

Other factors will influence cooling capability as well.

Consider whether a room gets a lot of sun or shade, and then adjust the BTU rating accordingly.

Second-story rooms may have more ambient heat. Also, the number of occupants in a room may drive up the temperature, which may require purchasing a larger unit.

That's how Crupi starts to describe Pizza By Dominick. The pizza joint he runs with his brother, Dominick DeLeo, has been the go-to place for families.

"A lot of our customers, mom is at one place and dad is at another, so they walk in needing a quick bite to eat," said Crupi.
