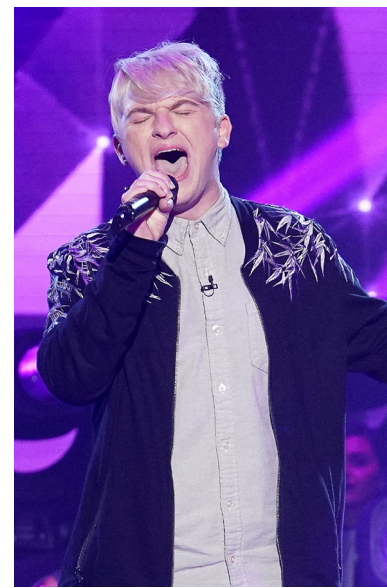

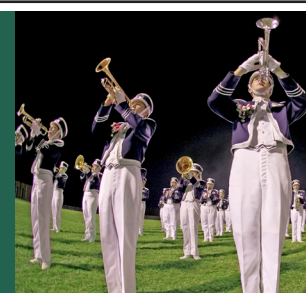

Man sought in connection with YMCA robberies arrested after traffic stop

DELMAR — When Bethlehem police pulled over a 50-year-old Romanian man, they found several disguises, lock picking equipment and manuals and more than \$10,000 in brand new electronic devices.

The traffic stop in Slingerlands on the rented vehicle driven by George Piha came after a month long investigation into thefts of lockers at the Bethlehem Area YMCA and similar thefts from across the state.

Also in the car police found several cut up credit cards he allegedly stole from lockers at the YMCA.

The investigation determined the Apple and Microsoft devices were purchased using credit cards Piha allegedly stole from lockers in West Seneca and Gates, the western counties of Erie and Monroe, respectively.

Piha initially said he lived in Middle Village, a neighborhood in Queens. However, the investigation revealed he recently came to the U.S. from Romania. While Bethlehem Police Commander Adam Hornick said that Piha is a U.S. citizen through naturalization, police are still trying to determine if he lives in this country or if he travels back and forth between here and Romania.

He is also suspected of having ties to similar incidents of credit card thefts from lockers—and subsequent high end purchases with the stolen cards — in Albany, Saratoga, Rensselaer, Erie,

Monroe, Onondaga and Oneida counties.

The investigation is ongoing and multiple agencies are involved.

Bethlehem police recently executed a search warrant in New York City as part of the investigation.

Piha stands charged with multiple felonies of criminal possession of stolen property and tampering with physical evidence as well as the misdemeanor of possession of burglar's tools and vehicle and traffic violations.

He was arraigned in Bethlehem Town Court and remanded to the Albany County jail without bail.

Schenectady man faces multiple charges

GLENMONT — A Schenectady man was arrested on DWI charges on Thursday, July 5.

According to Bethlehem police, Bruce Farmer II attempted a left turn onto Corning Hill Road from the right lane of Route 9W in his 2004 Mercedes C320, and not the turn lane, at approximately 1 a.m.

When Farmer was pulled over and asked to produce his license and registration, the 35-year-old allegedly told the arresting officer he did not need to.

“I do not have or need a driver's license to drive a car,” Farmer said, according to the police report. “The 12th Amendment states that if you're legit, then you don't have to have a driver's license to drive a car and I'm legit.”

Farmer allegedly refused to take a breathalyzer test after the arresting officer reportedly observed him to have glassy eyes,

slurred speech and alcohol on his breath. He later allegedly could not, or refused, to follow instructions to the field sobriety test. Farmer allegedly continued to be uncooperative after he was sent to the Bethlehem Police Department's headquarters for processing.

Farmer was arraigned and remanded to Albany County jail in lieu of \$1,500 bail, and is scheduled to return to Bethlehem Town Court on Tuesday, Aug. 7. Farmer faces misdemeanor counts of DWI, second degree obstruction of governmental administration, third degree aggravated unlicensed operation, and several infractions.

Third arrest made in Bethlehem home invasion

BETHLEHEM — Police arrested a third person in the ongoing investigation into a July 18 home invasion on Orchard Street.

Jon Murdaugh, 17, of Troy, faces the felonies of robbery, criminal use of a firearm and burglary.

Last week, police arrested 18-year-old Jevon Johnson and 21-year-old La-Tae Wells, both of Troy, and charged them with the felonies of robbery, criminal use of a firearm and burglary.

Murdaugh was arraigned in Bethlehem Town Court by Judge Andrew Kirby and remanded to the Albany County jail on \$30,000 bail. He is due back in court on Wednesday, July 25.

Wells and Johnson were remanded to the Albany County jail without bail. A preliminary hearing was set for Monday, July 23.

Since news of the burglary was reported last week, local residents have expressed their unease.

The known details of the crime painted a stark contrast between suspect and victim. All three of the suspects are reportedly from

the economically strapped city of Troy. The victims reside in a Slingerlands neighborhood where, according to Zillow.com, homes range in value from \$200,000 to more than \$400,000 each. Orchard Street stretches from an older suburban neighborhood, where it intersects with Cherry Avenue, to newer developments that extend towards the more rural country where the town borders New Scotland. The three suspects are black. Bethlehem, according to the 2000 U.S. census, is 95 percent white.

Bethlehem police responded to a report of an armed home invasion on Orchard Street on Wednesday, July 18, at about 4:54 p.m. Suspects had reportedly entered the Slingerlands home and attempted to steal property. At least one of the suspects displayed what appeared to be a semi-automatic firearm. The resident at home was not injured while the suspects allegedly ran off with an undisclosed amount of money. About two hours later, the suspect's silver pick-up truck, which resembled the one fleeing the crime scene, was located and stopped in Troy by city police.

Town resident Keith Wiggand took to social media with his concerns.

"I would like to know if this is

a result of increased gang activity in the area," he stated.

According to the U.S. Department of Justice, 3.7 million home invasion burglaries occurred each year between 2003 and 2007. Such crimes occur at a rate of 8 out of 1,000 households nationwide. In the same report, the Department of Justice stated victims are more likely to know the suspects; 65 percent of the

time.

Bethlehem Police Commander Adam Hornick said the burglary was not random. A resident at the Slingerlands home allegedly purchased drugs from the three suspects. The homeowners, Hornick explained, were innocent victims without ties to the three Troy men.

"These are facets of the drug trade that happens," said

Hornick.

The police commander pointed out that a random home invasion is "extremely" rare. The last random home burglary he could recall occurred more than a decade ago on New Scotland Avenue. "And, that was picked out due to the size of the house," he said. Since then, he said, there have been two home invasions, both were solved. Hornick was quick to praise the efforts of a joint effort that resulted in the arrest of two of the three suspects within two hours. The circumstances that lead the suspects to Bethlehem is still under investigation.

"There's always an outside nexus that leads to these home invasions," said Hornick. The opioid crisis is one such factor. "If they try to buy their drugs or narcotics from the wrong group of people, it could lead to some type of incident like that happening. ... That's what draws people out here, or anywhere."

Dog rescued from Thacher Park ledge; reunited with owner

NEW SCOTLAND – After being stuck on a Thacher Park ledge for nearly a week, Khaos was reunited with his owner on Monday, July 23.

The German shepherd from East Berne took off from his owner, Laurence Wolfe, as a

thunder storm rolled in on Tuesday, July 17, while the two were walking along the Overlook.

"He is doing phenomenal," said Wolfe when reached at home on Tuesday, July 24. "After six days and six nights and a couple 90 degree days and a couple torrential rainstorms. He is doing phenomenal."

He lost about seven pounds and has a small cut on his forehead, but other than that, Wolfe, who was giving Khaos a bath, said he is "phenomenal."

A woman heard Khaos barking on Sunday, July 22, and the Sheriff's Department brought a rescue crew up and picked him off the ledge.

"This pup gets a second chance thanks to our search and rescue team," Sheriff Craig Apple tweeted on Tuesday. "He wandered away and fell off a cliff days ago. Someone heard him and we picked him off the ledge. Great job team and how he's reunited with his owner."

Wolfe could not offer enough praise to everyone involved in the

search and the rescue of his dog.

"I would like to thank everyone for their love and support in this most trying of times. You are truly an amazing set of friends! I won't be able to list everyone so please know that the list is truly endless," according to a post on a Facebook page under the dog's formal name, Khaos Ixos Von Bad-Boll.

Dems hold caucus

Judge Napierski edged out by 21 votes for party line

GUILDERLAND — Bryan Clenahan won the Democratic Party caucus on Thursday, July 26, and is the party's nomination for town judge.

He beat incumbent Judge Christine Napierski 153 to 132 in what was a secret ballot cast by registered party members at Tawasentha Park.

Napierski, though, remains on the Conservative line and will appear on the ballot in November's general election. She will also run primaries in September against Clenahan for the Independence Party and the Women's Equality lines.

"I love being a judge. If I would not do it if I didn't like it and I think I am the right person for the job," she said. "The town deserves the most qualified for the candidate and I feel I owe it to the town to stay in the fight and keep moving forward"

The Republican candidate is Stephen Chesley.

While the Democrats did appoint her to the bench, Napierski, claimed the party was railroading her off the bench in an effort to

secure the seat for her opponent.

In a federal lawsuit, she claimed Tawasentha Park discriminated against the disabled because the pavilion was not compliant with the American with Disabilities Act and as such should not happen.


U.S. District Court Judge Glenn Suddaby ruled the caucus could take place, though, provided accommodations were made to ensure the disabled could cast a vote.

Rather than a show of hands, the 285 Democrats who showed up cast their ballots by secret vote by writing their chosen candidate's name on a piece of paper and putting it in a cardboard box.

"It was a circus," said Andy Holland, Napierski's attorney. "It was anything but an orderly primary. We are disappointed with the result of the caucus and we will have to decide what to do going forward."

Napierski said she will decide in the near future whether or not to challenge the results in court.

"It was a great night. I came up a little bit short but we made the democratic party notice us. I was not crushed, and I am still standing and I had a great show of support," she said. "I hope this shows the Guilderland Democratic Party this caucus system is antiquated and the town deserves better."

Back to the drawing board, yet again

Planning board members request additional changes in proposal for Wemple Road Apartments

GLENMONT — During its July 17 meeting, the Planning Board requested additional revisions on July 17 to a proposed 96-unit apartment complex that would be located on the north region of Wemple Road and around 600 feet west of U.S. Route 9W. The complex would take up 30.18 acres in area, as part of a larger region of 37.78 acres.

The Wemple Road Apartments proposal comprises of nine, four-unit buildings and ten, six-unit buildings, all designed like townhouses. These would cater to people looking to rent in higher-end, condo-type apartments. These are all rental and have no age restrictions.

What currently lies on the proposed site is a corn and agricultural field, which was wide open and still contains much tree growth. It was commented during the board meeting that “a whole treeline [would] need to be torn down for water and sewer lines and multi-use paths” for the complex.

In a community where school enrollment has fallen while property development has risen, there is some concern about whether this complex would truly strengthen the local community. Concerns included how the townhouse-style apartments may not necessarily attract families and are designed more for upper-middle class urban professionals, for instance.

Board members spoke about how the overall designs of the buildings, planting, roadwork and orientation could be improved. They also looked into the recent reports and evaluations to see whether the complex would benefit the community in regards to traffic and functionality.

David Ingalls of Ingalls & Associates appeared before the board to discuss the designs’ recent revisions and acknowledged how concerned residents’ and board members’ comments were considered when continuing to finalize the designs.

The proposal was recently found to meet guidelines under the Bike and

Pedestrian Priority Network and Zoning Law of the Route 9W Corridor Design Guidelines, that dictate it can efficiently serve pedestrians and cyclists. There was a request to have a 33-foot right of way for the complex’s residents that would complement a multi-use path, sewer and water lines.

The New York state Department of Environmental Conservation had granted construction to happen within the state and federal wetlands there, which are present along the planned property. A multi-use path located by the wetlands there would cost an estimated \$44,140, which would stretch from the intersection of Wemple Road and Route 9W, to the west side of the apartment complex.

Furthermore, Creighton Manning Engineering (CME) evaluated that future driving residents would use the Route 9W intersection 80 percent of the time whenever they would leave the proposed complex. While it would also lead to increased traffic around the area, it was determined the intersection would greatly accommodate the expected traffic around

the complex.

Roads expected to be heavily used by future residents there include Route 9W and Bender Lane; Elsmere Avenue; and Feura Bush, Glenmont, Wemple, Jericho and Clapper roads.

In terms of architecture, there was concern among board members the complex would look just like a long line of garages, which was not as visually appealing as they’d hoped. Suggesting that the garage doors for cars be relegated away from the front of the buildings, they also requested different designs, wanting the complex to look more “homelike.”

The board also acknowledged the complex currently has no plans for any internal amenities like clubhouses or swimming pools, something they felt would limit the residents from becoming a true community. For a better chance of residents interacting with one another, they suggested designing more benches, open space and areas where more trees and plants can grow.

Regarding the latter, they recommended some deciduous trees and more types of

trees of varying size to be planted within and surrounding the complex, to make the complex and living experience there more visually appealing.

“Between the buildings, there might be some options ... that could be beneficial for the community and to keep the aesthetics up,” said Brian Gyory, of the planning board.

The board wanted more easily-understandable building layouts and renderings than those presented during the July 17 meeting, with more color, dimensions and landscaping details.

This was echoed by Stephanie Ostrowski, a Wemple Road resident, who wanted more renderings of the egress and region around the narrow parts of that same road there, for safety reasons. She was also concerned of the westernmost region of the complex which would be right across from properties on 281 and 291 Wemple Road, due to the road’s dangerous narrowness there.

“[It’s] not only the undulation of the road but the narrowness of that road,” she said. “For reference, there is no shoulder to the road and in fact, the white lines outlining the road are on the grass.”

Kevin Dougherty, a Delmar resident who also appeared at the meeting, said he wanted the board to look at the development project, like other local development proposals, “together, comprehensively and holistically.” He feared the town does not fully consider the concepts of open space and residential development.

The overall proposal was initially presented back in August 2016, which has since been updated. It was originally among four other local proposed property projects, which collectively would have been 346 units and 7,750 square feet of commercial space, with planning dating back to 2008. These projects would help increase traffic along Route 9W.

The board voted to table the overall project, after exchanging comments about possibly improving the designs and requesting for more detailed renderings of the complex.

Debate over fire department's proposed electronic board sign rages on

ZBA encourages fire departments to align its dimensions with existing town regulations

NORTH BETHLEHEM — The Zoning Board of Appeals once again deliberated on July 18 over the introduction of an oversized electronic board sign that would serve the Elmwood Park Fire District and North Bethlehem Fire Department, which previously was brought up during the June 20 board meeting.

Located on 589 Russell Road in Albany, the fire department hopes to replace its current 30-year-old sign. For now, its messages can only be changed manually, something that is perceived as being unsafe, time-wasted and too old-fashioned.

The potential electronic sign was argued by the fire department to be more efficient, informative and keeping in time with modern technology. It could also be used to easily display more event information, messages, public service announcements, the number of annual emergency calls to the fire department and most importantly, traffic alerts.

While initially sounding helpful for the local community, a main issue is the electronic sign's dimension; it would stand at 8.5 feet high and occupy an area of 42 square feet. This would be 2.5 feet taller than the permitted 6 feet limit and 32 square feet larger than the allowed 10 square feet.

These permitted dimensions

are under the Town Zoning regulations for Signs under VI, Section 128-59E, which aim to oversee all manners of Bethlehem signs. They have guidelines online that publicly show how they determine signs' effectiveness, ease of visibility by drivers, preservation of the surrounding nature, and their aesthetic appearance within the community. In this case, it concerns the latter two as the sign would be oversized and its electronic means contrasts from Bethlehem's natural surroundings.

Attorney William Young reappeared for the July 18 meeting to represent the Bethlehem volunteer fire service,

after having also appeared to speak during the June 20 meeting. While he appeared alone on July 18, he had been accompanied by Commissioner John Mahoney and Fire Commissioner Richard Maura on June 20. All three spoke in defense of the proposed electronic sign, on behalf of the North Bethlehem Fire District.

On July 18, Young reaffirmed his support for the electronic sign despite its violation of the town's Signs regulations, and how it would genuinely benefit the local community.

"Thirty years ago, [the North Bethlehem Fire Department] moved from their former site to its present location on Russell

Road ... Shortly thereafter, they constructed a sign," he said. "That sign is lit and that sign has served the fire department well for 30 years. But now it's past its time and what we're seeking to do is to replace that sign with another sign."

He also told an anecdote about how right before speaking to the ZBA board members, he noticed a picture of a firefighter "handing a small child to a woman" beside the ZBA's bulletin board outside.

"That's the people I'm here representing: the volunteer fire service in this town of Bethlehem, the North Elmwood Fire District and the North Bethlehem Fire Department," he said, conveying how moved he was upon seeing the picture. "In your deliberating process, if you would take that into consideration, that would be very much appreciated."

Conversely, John Googas, a local resident, submitted a letter regarding the electronic sign's debate on June 11 to Kathleen Reid, the Planning and Building assistant for the Bethlehem Planning Division and the Zoning Board secretary. However, he was not present at the July 18 ZBA meeting.

Citing that the oversized electronic sign is "certainly inconsistent with the nature and character of the North Bethlehem area," he wrote that its "size and lighting would be more of a distraction to motorists [than] a benefit to pedestrians and others

in the immediate area."

He also appreciated how the ZBA considered locals' opinions on this matter but noted that Bethlehem is becoming too overly-developed recently, and this electronic sign would feed into that movement.

However, a positive letter came from Thomas Coffey, a Slingerlands resident, who was unable to attend the July 18 meeting. He had met with local neighbors and learned they were concerned about public safety and the fire department's response time for emergencies too.

He believed that the electronic sign "will greatly enhance our community in being connected to the needs/concerns of our neighborhoods... [and] will greatly improve our communication network with our North Bethlehem community."

Furthermore, he strongly appreciated the local firefighters for greatly serving the community and the sign would "keep all of us informed and our families safe."

Despite the divisive reactions to the electronic sign proposal, the ZBA had encouraged the fire department to find alternative sign designs that would meet the town's Signs regulations back on June 20.

It concluded by voting to defer the case on July 18 and wait until the Albany County Planning Board makes a determination, hence still leaving the debate open for now.

TU Center to host 2021 NCAA Women's basketball tourney

ALBANY — The NCAA has awarded the 2021 Division I Women's Basketball Regional to the SMG managed, Times Union Center.

Jobs growing across region

Area unemployment drops to 3.9 percent

ALBANY — The immediate Capital District's unemployment rate fell from 4.3 percent a year ago to 3.9 percent in June, according to the state Department of Labor.

The Albany, Schenectady, Troy area has the second lowest unemployment rate of metro area in the state with Glens Falls and Nassau and Suffolk counties leading the way with 3.8 percent.

Statewide, unemployment for all metro areas dropped in the past year to 4.2 percent from 4.6 percent.

The highest metro areas are Elmira with an unemployment rate of 4.9 percent, down from 5.4 percent a year ago.

The unemployment rate for Non-metro counties is 4.6 percent, down from 5.2 percent a year ago.

In the past year, the state's private sector job count increased by 132,400 to 8.2 million. The state's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate remained unchanged at 4.5 percent according to a payroll survey of 18,000 New York



employers, which was conducted by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

By county, Albany's unemployment rate, not seasonally adjusted, is 4 percent, which does not put it in the top 10 state wide.

Columbia County has the lowest unemployment rate with 3.3 percent, Saratoga County is second at 3.5 percent and Yates County is third at 3.6 percent. Washington County is ranked 10th at 3.8 percent.

There are a number of counties at 3.9 and 4 percent.

The highest unemployment rate in the state is in St. Lawrence County on the northern border with 6 percent.

It seems that new blogs are continuing to pop up on a regular basis, showcasing advice and opinions on everything from books and beauty to food and fun. This increasing interest in blogging has made it hard to differentiate between fame seekers and educated bloggers.

So, how did LaBar do it?

Without any previous blogging knowledge, LaBar opted to start with “a unique point of view. That’s what everyone needs.” Now, she has people reaching out daily, asking for advice on how to succeed with their own blogs.

However, she warns hopeful bloggers that maintaining a blog takes a lot of work. Behind each blog write-up, she must research, plan her outfit or beauty look, find a shooting location and take pictures for the post. Along with the blog write-up, LaBar also posts content across Instagram, Pinterest and Facebook, creating separate graphics for each platform.

As written on her blog, “my number one blogging tip is consistency... The cold hard truth of not being present in this day and age is that you’ll just be left behind.” She posts daily to Instagram and uses the Instagram Story feature to connect more candidly with her followers through videos and polls.

LaBar admits that while “it’s not easy being consistent,” her biggest growth resulted from posting everyday. Posting more enabled increased activity from followers, and eventually attracted loyal followers to her blog. She said, “the more people feel like they know you, they feel like they are your friend, and if you give advice, they trust it.”

Her growing success is further aided by brand collaborations. LaBar has recently worked with Almay (cosmetics), Daniel Wellington (watches and accessories), Maggy London (women’s clothing), Eastland Shoe (shoes) and more on advertisements featuring makeup,

Along with creating an agency account, LaBar recommends creating a business profile on Instagram. This allows you to check analytics to find trends and monitor growth. After all, “the numbers don’t lie,” she said.

To new bloggers and influencers, LaBar stresses genuinity. “You will have a lot of brands reach out — it’s exciting... but I say no to 90 percent of them. I don’t recommend anything to people unless I truly believe in the product.” She suggests collaborating with smaller companies to start and to “never feel that you have to do something because everyone else is.”

LaBar’s determination in self-starting her blog has certainly paid off. This fall, she will continue her work on the blog as she studies Fashion Marketing and Advertising at the Fashion Institute of Technology in New York City.

In addition to pursuing her own studies, she is also inspiring the next generation of bloggers and fashion lovers attending her alma mater: Bethlehem Central High School.

Melanie Painter, BCHS’s art supervisor, spoke about the high school’s Fashion & Apparel elective, which is being reinstated for the 2018-19 school year. The class, which only runs if enough students show interest, usually focuses on teaching students the creative aspects of fashion and incorporates projects such as designing and sewing their own clothes.

Beginning this academic year, however, the elective will change to include aspects of business and social media in relation to fashion. With inspiration from alumni including LaBar and James Charles, the YouTube sensation and CoverGirl’s first CoverBoy, Painter stated that the class will take notes from trends and expose students to the fashion industry.

“We teach [students] techniques on the sewing machines... but in the United States’ [workforce], we don’t sew the clothes. We build the creative economy.” Painter also said the students will have help in developing their own blogs and using social media to find trends and make predictions about the fashion industry. “The class will teach real world applications after working with art mediums... we want to focus on the kids and what they want.”

As for LaBar, she is “not at all surprised that Bethlehem is making an effort to make their fashion classes more well rounded for the students.” The combination of fashion with social media, business, marketing and more is not a traditional career choice, but LaBar is “thrilled” that now students can have new opportunities.

Using social media to turn her passion into a success that inspires others... “It has been so unexpected and surreal,” said LaBar. And as for her blog, “I’m not stopping any time soon!”

clothing and accessories. Collaborating not only helps the blogger reach more people but also provides the company with some inexpensive publicity. Usually, the company will send LaBar a product in exchange for a post featuring the product.

In many cases, LaBar reaches out to a company expressing interest in setting up a collaboration; however, sometimes companies will contact her first. Additionally, she uses influencer agencies, such as Fohr. Unknown to many, these agencies act as a middle man between the influencer and the brand. The blogger can make an account on the agency’s website and brands will reach out to the agency with their advertisement requirements.

The team of 8-10-year-olds were then eliminated by Penfield to finish third,

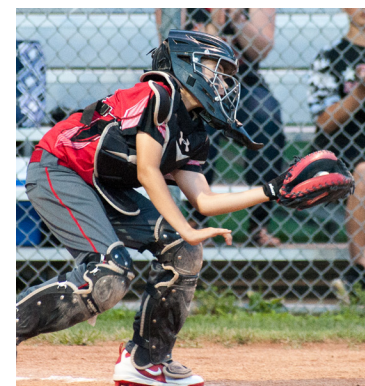
“We are proud of the

Beware of the company you keep

When we learn the news of violent crime occurring in our neighborhood, it has us stand up at attention and take notice. First, there is the natural curiosity as to who it was. Where did it happen and whether or not we know the victim. It's followed by trying to find the circumstances surrounding the crime, and those are the details that sometimes get withheld from the reports. But, it ultimately leads to us wondering how and why, and whether or not it will happen again.

We recently covered the story of a home invasion that took place in Slingerlands. It happened in a good neighborhood. Most of our neighborhoods are. So, we

imagine strangers slowly driving up and down our streets, looking over our homes and peeking through our windows. The thought is unnerving. Though we don't like to call this a bedroom community, many of us face leaving our homes to work. A few of us have security systems, but for the majority, the safety of our homes is left to a locked door and shuttered windows. Perhaps worse, what if it were to happen while we were home?

We looked into the statistics of home invasion burglaries, and spoke with Bethlehem Police Commander Adam Hornick. As members of this community, we wanted to help quell the concerns many of our readers expressed to us. After all, this is our neighborhood,

too.

Home invasions, we learned, are rare. Though no one can confidently say that such a crime will never happen in our community, the odds of it happening are slim. Accounting for the more than 120 million households in the United States, about three percent of those may fall victim to one this year. Factored into that figure are neighborhoods unlike the ones we have here in our readership area.

One common denominator to these type of crimes hinges on drug use. It comes down to what our parents taught us as kids. If we run with the wrong crowd, expect to find trouble. Drug abuse, it turns out, is not a victimless crime. What you may excuse as recreational

can take a 180 degree turn on you, or the ones you love. Such as the case with this most recent crime. Though we know this was no random act, that there was a relationship established, the person victimized by these events was a bystander. Guilty of being associated with someone who allegedly brokered with the wrong crowd.

There are steps to take to help keep your neighborhood safe. Watch out for your neighbors, and keep yourself secure. Our first line of defense is being a good neighbor to one another. Our second line of defense is to do what Dad always told us before going out — keep your nose clean.

Taking a step back

Women declining in workforce

At its peak in 1999, the American workforce was dominated by female workers. At that time, 76 percent of women, including those who had children at home, worked outside of the home, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. The tides have since shifted, and rates of female employment in the United States now fall well behind many European countries. Economic woes, a short supply of middle-class jobs and minimal family leave may have prompted the changes.

According to a study from researchers at Johns Hopkins University, single women without children have actually driven the turnaround. Technology and international

outsourcing have removed many low-skill, well-paying jobs from the workforce. Wages for work in healthcare services, laundry and social assistance — jobs dominated by women — have remained relatively stagnant for years. Despite this, the cost of living has steadily crept up.

Other households tout the high cost of childcare and the relatively small amount of maternity leave allowed in the United States as reasons why they haven't returned to the workforce after having children. The economic analysis resource The Upshot, powered by *The New York Times*, reports that many American companies give 12 weeks of maternity leave (largely unpaid), while most European countries give a year of paid leave and offer protections for part-time workers who want to return to the workforce.

According to data from the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, Canada, Japan, Switzerland, Australia, Germany, and France now outrank the U.S. in prime-age women's labor force participation.

The role women play as caregivers, not only for their own children or spouses, but for aging parents, also may be contributing to females dropping out of the labor force. A chronic-needs family member, such as a parent with dementia, can take away focus from employment. This can quickly result in a loss of a job.

Flexibility in schedules, mobile connectivity from home and lack of negative repercussions for needing family time can help keep talented female employees working.

More to do in Peru

Award-winning journalist shares details of her trip through South America

Climbing out of the sedan, an informal taxi that our Airbnb host in Puno had arranged to bring my friend Amy and I to the airport an hour from the Lake Titicaca community, I had to admit that our Airbnb host's daughter was right - the Juliaca airport was small, with just two gates in the entire terminal.

I had discussed what time we should leave for the airport with her the day before, since her English was much better than our friendly host Lucy's. My rule of thumb has been to always arrive two hours early for domestic flights - especially in foreign countries and especially after missing a flight in the United Kingdom a few years ago. But Lucy and her daughter were adamant that we didn't need to be there any earlier than an hour ahead. We compromised and left with enough time to be there with an hour and a half ahead of our afternoon departure for Lima.

After slipping a bit outside on the smooth pavement in the rain - a bit strange since we made a point to travel during the country's dry season - we were directed straight to a kiosk to check in and check our bags, assisted by a young woman with the LATAM airline. We were about to finish the process, and then the lights in the crowded airport went dark. The power in the airport went out.

It was just one of the things in Peru — good and bad — I had never experienced before in my two decades since getting my first passport as a high school freshman for a German Exchange program.

In an age of being able to Google anything — for travel, food recommendations, excursions, accommodations — Peru still surprised me, mainly in a

good way.

Machu Picchu

Like most people, it was the fabled Machu Picchu that brought Amy and I to Peru. The mountaintop ruins may not be as old as those in Italy, Greece, Egypt, or China, but people love a good mystery and if there's one word to describe the cloud-covered city at the juncture of the jungle and glacial peaks of the Andes, it's mysterious. Unlike many other civilizations, the Inca did not leave behind a writing system. Theirs was a culture that revolved around oral history. One archaeological find that could be a game changer with the understanding of the Incas are recording devices with knots likely representing the crop tallies for various seasons.

The purpose of Machu Picchu is still a mystery. Some believe it was built as a resort for a wealthy Incan. After all, the word "Inca" initially referred to the royalty of the civilization before it was used to generally label the people who, at their height, had control over much of the Andes and western coast of South America, spanning 2,500 miles — until the Spanish arrived in the 16th century. Another theory is that the complex was a university where people could learn about various topics, including studying the skies and movement of the sun and stars. Whether that was why people lived in Machu Picchu, it is now a reason many visit the site today. Peru's winter solstice in June (our summer) is a popular time to take the meandering bus ride up to the ruins from Aguas Calientes, where the train — the only transport to the area around Machu Picchu — comes right through the downtown area and drops off excited visitors, like students freshly off the Hogwarts Express in Harry Potter.

In the entirely pedestrian-based community of small streets and large alleyways, once we arrived in Aguas Calientes, I had just enough power on my phone to navigate to our hotel. Both of us carrying heavy backpacks, we were happy to arrive and to meet JC, who would be our guide the following morning for Machu Picchu. When he examined our tickets that we bought ourselves after a lengthy process online (not the typical way that you purchase Machu Picchu tickets but we wanted to make sure we got tickets and a time slot for one of the adjacent mountains which also requires a ticket), JC became the first of two guides to question the validity of our tickets.

We woke up around 4:30 a.m. the next morning to do the five-minute walk to wait in line for the buses. There were already over 100 people in line when we arrived

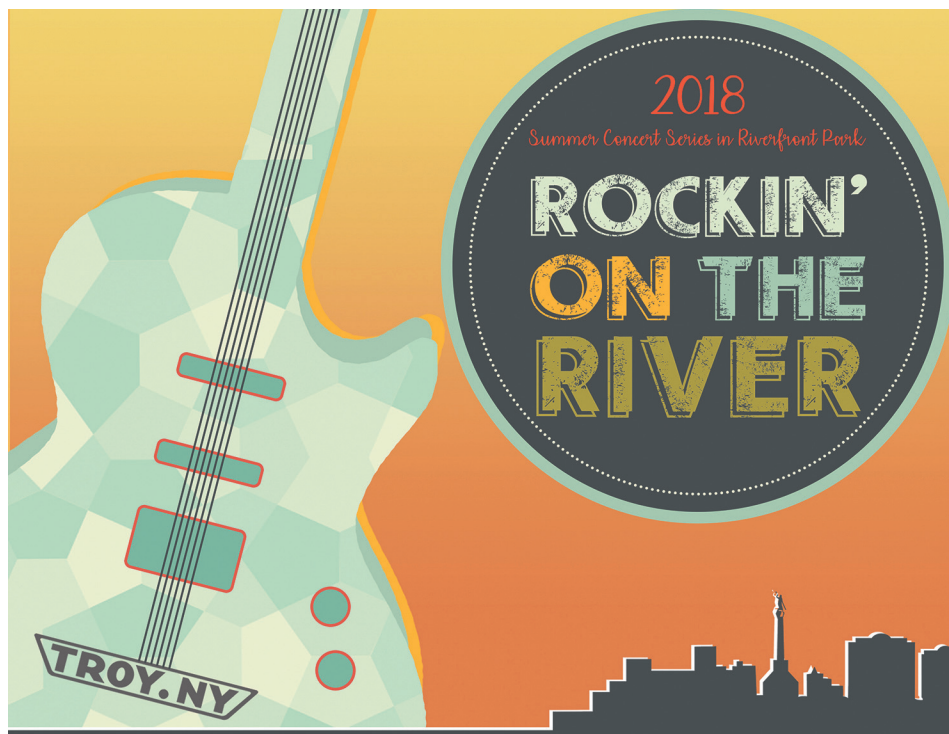

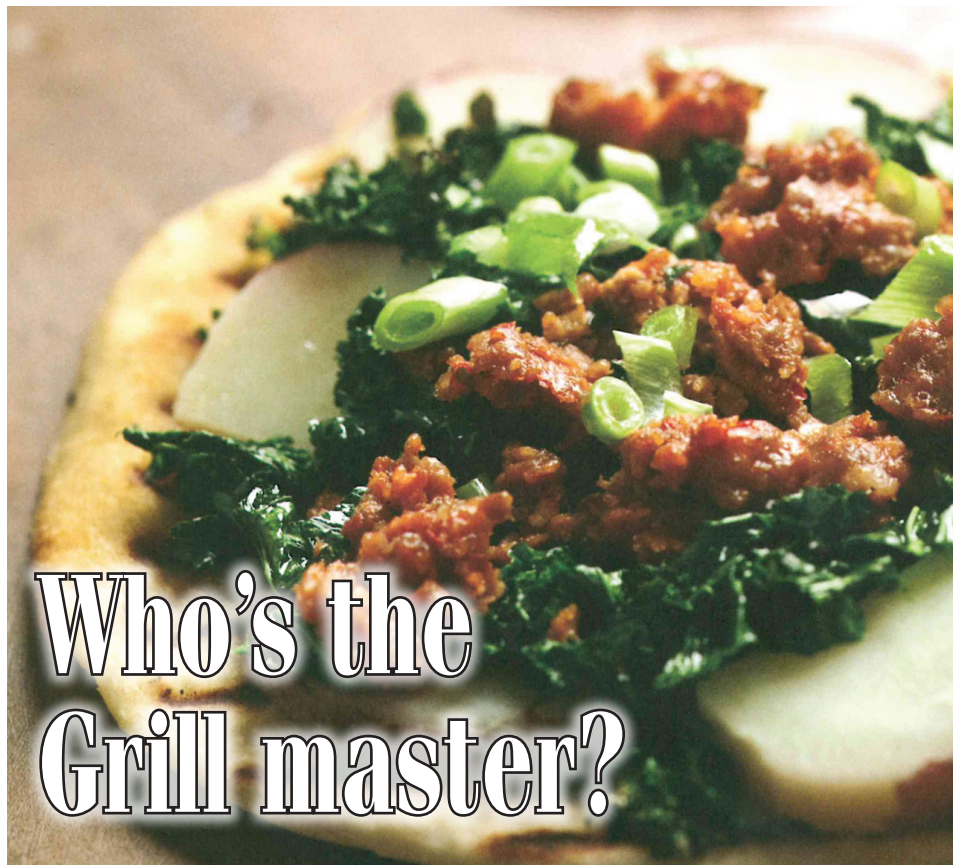

Who's the Grill master?

Though hot dogs and hamburgers might garner most of the grilling glory, just about any food can be cooked over an open flame. Even homemade pizza, such as the following recipe for “Kale, Potato and Chorizo Pizza” from Karen Adler and Judith Fertig’s “The Gardener & The Grill” (Running Press), can make for a unique entree at your next backyard barbecue.

Kale, Potato and Chorizo Pizza

Ingredients: Serves 4

- 1 pound frozen pizza or bread dough, thawed
- All-purpose flour, for sprinkling
- 8 kale leaves
- Olive oil, for brushing and drizzling
- 8 ounces cooked and crumbled chorizo, Portuguese or other spicy sausage
- 4 new potatoes, cooked and sliced thinly
- 1/2 cup chopped green onion (about 6 green onions, white and light green parts)
- Coarse black pepper

Divide the dough into four equal parts and press or roll each piece into an 8-inch circle. Sprinkle flour on two large baking sheets and place two rounds of dough on each sheet.

Prepare a hot fire on one side of your grill for indirect cooking. Oil a perforated grill rack and place over direct heat.

Brush the kale with olive oil. Grill leaves for 1 minute on each side, or until slightly charred and softened. Quickly trim off the bottom of the stalk and strip the leaves from the stems. Finely chop the leaves and set aside.

To grill directly on the grill grate, brush

one side of each pizza with olive oil and place, oiled side down, on the direct heat side. Grill for 1 to 2 minutes, or until you see the dough starting to bubble. Brush the top side with olive oil and flip each pizza, using tongs, onto a baking sheet. Quickly brush with more olive oil, then spoon on a fourth of the sliced potato and grilled kale. Sprinkle with sausage and green onion. Drizzle with olive oil and season with pepper. Using a grill spatula, place each pizza on the indirect side of the fire. Cover and grill for 4 or 5 minutes until the kale has slightly wilted and the topping is hot. Serve hot.

Release the hounds on cancer

Can diet prevent breast cancer from spreading?

Healthy diets that include plenty of antioxidant-rich fruits and vegetables that can boost the body's natural immune system can help people in their fight against cancer. While some foods, namely unhealthy, high-fat/high-caloric foods, are best avoided, women who have been diagnosed with breast cancer who want to prevent the spread of cancer to other areas of their bodies may want to cut some surprising foods from their diets.

Preliminary research now suggests limiting the consumption of asparagine, an amino acid, to dramatically reduce the ability of cancer to spread to other parts of the body. A study published in the journal *Nature* found that reducing asparagine consumption in laboratory mice with triple-negative breast cancer could dramatically reduce the ability of the cancer to travel to distant sites in the body.

Asparagine is found in foods like asparagus, whole grains, soy, seafood, eggs, poultry, beef, legumes, and more. While

reducing asparagine will not affect the original breast cancer tumor, it could stop cancer from showing up elsewhere in the body. Researchers suspect that many women with breast cancer do not lose their lives to the original breast cancer tumor, but instead they succumb to metastases or subsequent growths away from the primary site.

"Our study adds to a growing body of evidence that suggests diet can influence the course of the disease," said Simon Knott, Ph.D., associate director of the Center for Bioinformatics and Functional Genomics at Cedars-Sinai and one of two first authors of the study. The research from this study was conducted at more than a dozen institutions.

Apart from dietary restrictions, metastasis also could be greatly limited by reducing asparagine synthetase using chemotherapy drug L-asparaginase.

More research is needed as to whether similar results can be produced in human trials, making avoiding asparagine currently a helpful but not entirely foolproof method for preventing the spread of breast cancer to other areas of the body.

More to do in Peru

and the first buses would leave at 5:30 a.m. There was some confusion for Amy and I about getting bus tickets and more confusion about our Machu Picchu tickets and then we were on the bus. There is a fleet of large tourist buses that bring visitors up the switchback roads to the mountaintop site, 8,000 feet above sea level.

When we finally made it to the top, I could not believe it. After two domestic flights in the U.S., an international flight, another flight in Peru, a tour bus through the Sacred Valley to Ollantaytambo, a train ride to Aguas Calientes, and a bus to what seems like the top of the tourism world, we were here. We could see the iconic Huayna Picchu (or Young Mountain) that guards over the so-called Lost City of the Incas. We were finally here, just steps away. And, as luck would have it, our ticket was indeed valid and we walked through with our guide soon after sunrise. Machu Picchu was worth the trip.

Knowing my love of hiking, many of my friends and family were surprised Amy and I didn't hike the Inca Trail or do another hiking trip to travel to Machu Picchu.

The more I researched our trip to Peru, the more I realized that as amazing as Machu Picchu is, a trip to Peru can — dare I say, should — include much more.

Lima

Ahead of the trip, I heard mixed thoughts on Lima, which has a population of about 10 million. Some people said that we should go straight to the Andes and others said that Lima was worth checking out. We ended up staying a couple days. I tend to agree that Lima is worth a visit. Food is a highlight with many internationally-recognized restaurants and chefs in the country's capital. Ceviche and Asian-influenced cuisine are quintessential Peruvian cuisine and delicious. Pisco sours are also a must-try. Restaurants we went to included: oceanfront Mangos and Amaz, which was visited by the late travel

documentarian Anthony Bourdain. One thing I enjoyed about the food is that a meal that would normally be over \$100 per person in New York City, was about \$70 total for two people. One really can't beat the food prices. On top of this, it was all fresh and flavorful.

As for sights, there are parks, museums, and beautiful areas to walk around. Must-sees include:

The San Francisco Monastery and Catacombs, where the remains of 70,000 are decoratively-arranged below a beautiful basilica. This is a UNESCO World Heritage site.

The Huaca Pucllana adobe brick pyramid site is right in the middle of Lima, in the Miraflores district. Built between 300 and 700 A.D., it is amazing and surprising to see the pyramid in the middle of a city neighborhood. "Huaca" in the native South American language of Quechua means something that is revered or sacred.

The Barranco District is a fun, hip, artistic neighborhood of Lima with quirky stores, cafes, murals, museums, and nooks to explore. It's a great place to wander and check out local businesses - like the Barranco Beer Company brew pub.

The Parque del Amor and Parque Kennedy are parks and community centers of the city where people gather. Parque Kennedy is known for the dozens of cats that call the park home. And Parque del Amor has love-themed sculptures, perfect for a sunset stroll along the Pacific coast with a loved one.

Cusco

At 11,100 feet, Cusco is the perfect jumping off point for trekking into the Andes. But at 11,100 feet, Cusco is also a place where many (well, most) visitors face some kind of altitude sickness. The local remedy for this is coca tea. Peru is one of a handful of countries in South America that grow the coca plant as a cash crop. Coca, by the way, is also used to make cocaine. I had read that chewing the coca leaves can give you a buzz but, from drinking the tea, I never felt anything more than confused that I was drinking a tea that tasted like actual leaves. I'm pretty sure giving coca tea to tourists is a big inside joke for Peruvians. But I still brought back a large box of the

tea as a souvenir and to drink here if I ever want a taste of the Andes, or its vegetation.

The city of Cusco may have a population of 350,000 but parts of it feel like you've gone back in time to a quaint European village in the mountains.

Must-sees in and around Cusco:

Plaza de Armas is a central square in the city with stores and restaurants. While in Cusco, you'll have to decide if you want to try the traditional dish of guinea pig. Residents of Cusco eat this during festivals. Just as Thanksgiving is not complete without a turkey, no celebratory meal is complete in this part of the world without guinea pig. The overall taste will depend on the spices used but the texture is similar to duck.

Sacsayhuaman are Inca ruins that were built around 1,100 A.D. and located in the northern end of Cusco. Like many Inca designs, it's particularly impressive to see how these large stones were perfectly placed to fit in the citadel even without mortar.

San Pedro Market is a large and diverse market where you can get everything from guinea pig to alpaca woolen items. It's impressive with some similarities to local farmers markets.

Sacred Valley sites are a day trip from Cusco. You can book a tour and then get a pass which will include many of these ruins. There's a pass that also includes sites in Cusco. Along the Urbamba River, which eventually leads to Machu Picchu, there are nearby ruins like Pisac, Moray and Ollantaytambo. Pisac had an impressive burial mound area, Ollantaytambo is a massive Inca fortress, and all of the sites have the famous Inca terraces.

In the distance from Cusco, you can see the glacial mountain of Ausangate, a nearly 21,000-foot mountain that is taller than any mountain in North America. In Peruvian culture, mountains are thought to have an "apu" or spirit. Before hiking a mountain, Peruvian guides will lay a rock down on a cairn and ask for permission to trek on the mountain.

From Cusco, there are day hikes with tours that bring you on one-lane, gravel, winding roads along cliffs to trailheads like the start of the Salkantay Trail, which is becoming a popular alternative to the Inca Trail. The start of this trail includes a short but steep ascent to Humantay Lake, a glacial lagoon with the Humantay glacier and 16,000-foot mountain in the background. The trail also has views of the 20,500-foot Salkantay Mountain.

Rainbow Mountain is becoming like the Mt Fuji of Peru — there's no way you can visit without seeing it. And it is a bit of a hike but entirely worth it. Our white,

15-person Mercedes Benz van traveled through picturesque alpaca farms to a brand new trailhead for the mountain. Rainbow Mountain has colorful sediment that resembles a rainbow. If that sounds familiar, it's probably because you've seen it on Instagram.

Desert, Plains, Mountains, Ocean

While Machu Picchu was certainly the keystone of the trip, the rest of Peru was unforgettable. I hope to go back to see even more of Peru.

In 12 days, Amy and I strolled through the streets of Lima, rode a dune buggy and watched the sunset over a desert oasis, almost got airsick while flying over the immense Nazca lines, took selfies

It's a word you'll say a lot in Peru, but it's not quite big enough to describe all of the beauty and surprises discovered in the South American country.

Like many people, I was drawn to Peru because of Machu Picchu, ruins I was first introduced to in one of my favorite childhood shows, PBS' "Where in the World is Carmen Sandiego?" It was put back on my travel radar with its addition to the New 7 Wonders of the Modern World. But, as I learned at first from research and then first-hand, there is much more to Peru than Machu Picchu.

The Food: From the Michelin star rated Central Restaurant in Lima to fresh ceviche, Peruvian food is a special thing.

Humantay: A short but steep hike at high altitudes but you are rewarded with a glacial lagoon and views of glacial peaks at 16,000 feet to 20,000 feet.

Huacachina Oasis: One of the only such oasis sites in the Americas, you get

unique views of the desert yet are not far from the coast.

Ballesta Islands: Known as the Poor Man's Galapagos, these islands are off the Peruvian Coast where you can find whales, dolphins, penguins, seals, sea lions, aquatic life like starfish and thousands of birds that excrete enough guano that it is harvested approximately every seven years.

Nazca Lines: These mysterious lines, only about six inches deep and up to 1,200 feet long, have survived nearly 3,000 years due to a lack of erosion and rain in the Nazca desert, which is about 250 miles south of Lima. This is a UNESCO World Heritage site.

Rainbow Mountain: A must-see for avid Instagrammers, this 17,000 foot mountain features colorful sediment of copper red, light green, gold and purple.

Puno along Lake Titicaca: In the southern part of the country near Bolivia, Puno is perfect for getting to the Floating Islands and has views of the lake, the highest navigable lake in the world at 12,500 feet.

with seals at the Ballestas Islands off the Peruvian coast, kayaked through tall reeds on Lake Titicaca, hiked through alpaca farm country and near glacial mountains, and had a taste of the jungle at Machu Picchu.

In the *New York Times*' "52 Places to Go in 2018," it includes the pre-Incan ruins of Kuelap in Northern Peru. It's hard to see all of the highlights of a country in one week, the usual American vacation. For my part, I hope to go back and see the northern areas of Peru — which have some even taller peaks than the ones we saw — maybe visit the beaches in the north as well and the 10,700 foot deep Colca Canyon area in the south.

Choose Your Own Adventure

In Peru, you have a Choose-Your-Own-Adventure of places to visit. There's a reason director Steven Spielberg began the popular Indiana Jones films with a story that started in Peru. There's an irresistible mystery and appeal of the country, its people and their history. You are all but

guaranteed to new experiences — some good, some bad, some amazing and will leave you awestruck. And even if you end up in an airport that temporarily loses power during a freak rainstorm, it'll all work out in the end. You'll come away with a great story.

Things of note — AKA things I wish someone had told us going in.

Like other Latin American countries, you don't flush the toilet paper down the toilet. There is a designated basket next to the toilet.

You will see a lot of stray dogs and cats. It's a bit heartbreaking but a reality of many countries that don't have advocates like Bob Barker to constantly remind people to spay or neuter their pets.

Hot water is not a given and not reliable, even when staying at a hotel.

Museum employees and store clerks either don't have change or hate giving change.

The altitude really is no joke. I'm glad my doctor prescribed altitude sickness medication. Drink lots of water and try to avoid alcohol, of course, making the exception for Pisco sours.

Prior to his nationally-televised appearance on "The Four," which aired the night of Thursday, July 19, it had been nearly a decade since Gargiula last sang on television. Now 19, he initially gained fame by performing on The Ellen DeGeneres show 12 years ago. Since then, he's opened for several international touring acts, including the Jonas Brothers and Lady Antebellum, and performed the National Anthem for several national sports teams. After graduating from Bethlehem Central High School in 2017, Gargiula relocated to Orlando, Fla., where he currently works as a performer at Universal Studios.

Gargiula's fast-paced adventure began on June 10, when show producers first reached out to him to see whether he would be interested in auditioning. Soon, he was off to LA to perform for the show's producers and judges. "[They] really liked my audition piece," recalled Gargiula. "The producers were into it, the judges were into it... they really liked me and told me that they would love to have me be a part of the show." Yet, he readily admits that he didn't expect to be selected to perform. Just a few days later, after receiving the phone call he never imagined he'd get, he flew back out to LA to work with vocal coaches and the house band to prepare two songs for his upcoming appearance.

After a long wait on taping day, Gargiula finally took the stage, and performed his rendition of Shawn Mendes'

"In My Blood." Reminiscing on his performance, he describes how the studio audience made him feel so loved and so supported. He said it's the first time that he's had a crowd react that way; audience members were actually chanting his name at the end of the song. In addition, Mendes not only started following Gargiula on Twitter, but also tweeted that he liked his performance. After some deliberation, the show's judges, Sean "Diddy" Combs, DJ Khaled, and Meghan Trainor, decided to have him challenge finalist Ali Caldwell. Following her performance, Gargiula poured his heart and soul into his rendition of Sam Smith's "I'm Not The Only One." While he believed that he was the audience favorite to win the challenge, technical difficulties in the studio prevented the audience from voting for their favorite contender. Instead, the judges voted, and Caldwell retained her seat.

According to the show's website, "The Four" begins where most competitions

end: with the four finalists," handpicked by its three judges. During each episode, all four finalists are challenged by new singers who are determined to both outperform and replace him or her, with the hopes of winning the grand prize: not only being mentored by the judges, but also participating in iHeartMedia's "On The Verge" Artist Development Program, which will provide the rising star with airplay on its nationwide network of radio stations.

While Gargiula may not have unseated Caldwell with his two songs, he is extremely proud of his performances and considers his appearance on the show as a win, as it provided him a chance to show the world how much he's grown professionally since his last television appearance. "I'm really thankful for the whole opportunity," said Gargiula.

While it may be hard to believe, Gargiula admitted that the show was the first time he'd ever performed backed by a live band, an experience which he described as "incredible. I'd love to do that in the future," he said, adding that, "I can see myself doing this somewhere down the road."

Since his appearance on the show, Gargiula has found that at least several people recognize him after each of his performances at Universal, and says that he's doing mini-meet and greets after his shows. He also realized that the experience has introduced him to a much larger audience. "The more people who hear, the better. [Plus,] I got the chance to get some really cool exposure. ... It's unlike anything I've ever experienced before."
