BETHLEHEM — Police located a missing 13-year-old Glenmont girl at approximately 2:20 a.m. on Saturday, Aug. 18, in Chicago, Illinois.

Bethlehem Police officials are unable to reveal much more information on the case because it remains under investigation and concerns a juvenile.

Prior to being found in Chicago, Madison Mutziger was last seen in Glenmont on Wednesday, Aug. 15. After discovering her whereabouts, Bethlehem police have said that she had been undergoing medical treatment, the extent and nature of which were not disclosed.

Commander Adam Hornick did say that she was stopped while exiting a plane at Chicago O'Hare International Airport with someone she personally knew. Her missing person's report had just been filed the night before.

Helping local students in need

Children have one less thing to worry about as classes start

BETHLEHEM — While local students are making their final preparations to head back to school within the coming week, some students aren't able to start the new academic year off with the supplies they'll need to succeed. Fortunately, the Town of Bethlehem's Senior Services Department does what it can to alleviate that dilemma for some.

On Monday, Aug. 20, a crew of volunteers, including members of local churches and staff from the town's YMCA branch, filled backpacks with either new or gently-used school supplies including notebooks, binders, calculators, pens and pencils, in the auditorium at Town Hall for local elementary, middle and high school students in need. By the end of the day, the department helped provide supplies for 92 students.

However, the "backpacking day" is just one part of the department's overall giving-back mission. For nearly three decades, it has been collecting supplies and monetary donations on an annual basis to share with financially-disadvantaged families and students.

"I wasn't even here yet when it first

started but since then, we have tried to continue building connections with people here and the overall community," said Alice Parker, one of the department's outreach workers and organizers of the backpacking day.

The department easily referred to supplies lists that were provided by parents in need on school districts' websites and even in paper to the Town Hall, to give them an idea of what and how much exactly students would need for the year.

"This year, we were specifically able to buy several book bags and 26 L.L. Bean backpacks for kids entering sixth grade primarily, since sixth graders need more books and things to transport them in than students in lower grades," she said.

She did stress that this supply drive did not exclusively cater to Bethlehem families.

"We go by town lines, not by school districts," she said. "Families and students in the Town of Bethlehem can go to this supply drive as a resource, as well as for Selkirk people and some North Bethlehem people, since the latter falls under the Guilderland [Central] School District."

Director of Senior Services Jane Sanders said that supplies and monetary donations are generally received between

mid-July and late August, right as classes are set to resume. People may bring their contributions or donations to Town Hall, or to clearly-marked drop-off points across town, such as Bethlehem's YMCA Branch and area grocery stores. Fliers were also put up to inform the public about the school supply drive and backpacking day.

"A core of our senior volunteers would

pick up those donations from those places and bring them here to the Town Hall," Sanders added. "After gathering them all, we look back at the parents' lists and by August, we organize our inventory and actively purchase some more supplies if [we] need to."

Both Sanders and Parker noted that the sheer amount of donations and supplies exceeded their expectations this year.

"We had an overabundance so we were able to donate some to other regional organizations for students in neighboring towns," Sanders said.

Such organizations included the nonprofit Grassroots Givers in Albany, which accepts clothing, books and household appliances; the donationsreliant Mary's Corner in Cohoes which is based out of the Church of the Holy Trinity there, and provides nursing needs and children's products for Cohoes, Green Island, Watervliet and Waterford residents; and a church food pantry in Selkirk.

Bethlehem's Senior Services department also hosts a food pantry at the Town Hall which accepts non-perishable food throughout the year.

"We have 60 Bethlehem families who make use of our food pantry here, which in turn helps many of their small children,"

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Almost 900 locals have taken survey

Addressing the land conservation vs. development debate

BETHLEHEM — To date, nearly 900 town residents have completed a free survey which asks for their opinions on land conservation, maintaining open space, and local development. The survey, which aims to address the overall land conservation versus land development issue in town, will be available for residents to complete through Sunday, Sept. 16.

Those wishing to participate in the "Bethlehem Open Space and Farmland Conservation Opinion Survey" may do so online at www. surveymonkey.com/r/ openspacesurvey or go to either Town Hall or the Bethlehem Public Library to complete physical copies.

The survey, which takes about five minutes to complete, contains a mix of 15 multiple choice and open-ended questions designed to gather information about town residents' perspectives on conserving local farmland, the importance of locallygrown food, and protecting natural water resources.

The survey not only provides residents with an opportunity to name specific locations in town which they believe should be conserved, but also share how they feel about having scenic views.

The survey, which became available earlier this month, was also developed to raise awareness about an active conservation easement application. Back on May 2, 11 acres of privately-owned land located along Bender Lane had been recommended by the Conservation Easement Review Board to be preserved perpetually.

While the ongoing debate between conservation and development is a hotlycontested issue in town, curiously, no one spoke about conservation



easements nor the survey during the public hearing scheduled for the Bender Lane plot, held as part of the the Town Board Meeting on Wednesday, Aug. 22. Town officials had hoped locals would openly share their opinions about land conservation there.

Town Supervisor David VanLuven, who attended the Aug. 22 public hearing, said, "People rarely show up to speak about their opinions because they'd much rather do it safely from the comfort of their homes. At public meetings, there's this feeling of being immediately judged by people who don't agree with you and that's unfortunate that residents may feel that way. But I do highly encourage people to contact us directly though."

Meanwhile, the town's Open Space Coordinator Karen Shaw similarly believed that the survey is a safe way for locals to have their say on the conservation versus development debate, without drawing negative attention from fellow survey-takers who have different perspectives on the issue.

This belief was backed by numerical data.

"I've been really impressed with having [over] 890 responses so far," said Shaw, the number of which clearly contrasted from how no one spoke their opinions at the aforementioned public hearing. "It tells me people are paying attention which is amazing! We want to be constantly engaged with the public, know what they think. I feel really encouraged."

The survey complements the Conservation Easement

Exemption (CEE) Program which seeks to "conserve open space lands, help maintain the character of the Town, and provide financial incentives and assistance to those landowners willing to forego development and maintain open space." Shaw offered a number of reasons why land conservation can be beneficial for Bethlehem.

"One, it would mean we get to retain our natural systems as the forests would be left intact which provides clean air benefits



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answered the town's online survey concerning land conservation. Last year, the town had asked residents to submit pictures of locations in which they were interested in preserving as open land. One resident submitted a picture of a sunset over Mason Lane while another captured Kleinke's Farm where it runs along Oakwood Road.

Nearly 900 residents have

and ensure wildlife habitat. Two, it increases the value of community character, in that it gives our town a distinct look and human aspect, as people have moved here just because of how the town looks in conjunction with nature. Three, it would connect well with the Albany County Rail Trail as it connects our spaces and encourages locals to walk and bike around more.

"Four, it'd help contain high traffic from continually growing which relates to the development debate. Five, this is something we don't really bring up as much, but it's how great our soil in town is, too. We still have lots of farmland soil across open space and good soil is crucial for farming, growing and cultivating.

Varying degrees of satisfaction

Poll reveals that majority of New Yorkers aren't happy with the direction the world is headed

COLONIE — Forty-four percent of New Yorkers are more satisfied with their life today than they were a year ago, according to a poll released by Siena College Research Institute.

But, overall, people are not as satisfied as they were a decade ago, and 17 percent say they are less satisfied than a year ago while 39 percent are as satisfied today as last year.

"It's been 10 years since we asked New Yorkers these questions about life satisfaction," said Siena College Research Institute Director Don Levy. "We were surprised to find that the overall score in eight of the eleven areas were lower today than in 2008. Given that 2008 saw a recession, we expected satisfaction with personal finances to be higher today than 10 years ago but it has fallen."

Of the 11 individual categories:

- 90 percent are completely or somewhat satisfied with their familial relationships
- 88 percent are completely or somewhat satisfied with their life partner or significant other
- 99 percent are completely or somewhat satisfied with friends, acquaintances and other contacts
- 79 percent are completely or somewhat satisfied with their community
- 86 percent are completely or somewhat satisfied with where they live
- 80 percent are completely or somewhat satisfied with their health
- 84 percent are completely
- or somewhat satisfied with their

- religious or spiritual life
- 73 percent are completely or somewhat satisfied with their job • 70 percent are completely
- or somewhat satisfied with their recreation activities • 29 percent are completely or
- somewhat satisfied with the direction the world is headed with 70 percent reporting they are not very or not at all satisfied.
- 65 percent say they are completely or somewhat satisfied with their financial condition with 34 percent saying they are not very or not at all satisfied.

In order to compare the degree of satisfaction across the 11 areas over time and today between various groups, the Siena pollsters computed scores based on whether respondents said they were completely, somewhat, not very or not at all satisfied.

A score of 100 means every person said they were completely satisfied and a score of zero means every person said that they were not at all satisfied. The total score is the percentage of possible scores across all 11 areas.

"The two lowest scores in both years and in every group are satisfaction with finances and satisfaction with the condition of the world. While we expected to see financial satisfaction up in 2018 relative to 2008 given a more vibrant economy today as compared with 2008, we find that financial satisfaction is slightly lower overall," Levy said. "Satisfaction with the political and economic condition of the world is dramatically lower than satisfaction with every other aspect of life and varies very little across time and demographics." He said young people, between 18-

34, are less satisfied with every aspect of life than those 65 and older except when it comes to health and vitality.

More money does seem to help, he said, as those earning more \$100,000 were generally more satisfied than those earning less than \$50,000 in every category except one - religion and spirituality.

The poll was conducted by making phone calls to 807 New York state residents from June 12 through June 27. It has a margin of error of +/- 4.3 percent

Remediation planned for Tobin's

The once-bustling meat packing plant has languished for over three decades

ALBANY — The state Department of Environmental Conservation is accepting public comment on the early stages of a plan to clean up the site of the former Tobin's First Prize meat packing plant.

As per program guidelines, the first step is for Richbell Capital to submit a plan to find out what kind of contamination exists at the site.

Bill Hoblock, an executive vice president at Richbell, said it includes samples of soil and groundwater.

That plan is then open to public comment.

Once the DEC accepts, with or without modifications, that plan, the next step is for Richbell to formulate a plan to remediate contamination at the 35-acre site, which includes a plan to demolish the building and dispose of the rubble.

That plan will also be subject to a 30day public comment period.

While remediation could start before actual demolition begins, everything must be approved by the DEC.

"Once you investigate, and you find out exactly where and what contamination is there, the next step is to come up with a remediation plan," Hoblock said. "And just like [an] investigation work plan, which is reviewed and open to a public comment period after which the DEC may make some modification and changes, the next step is remediation and we clean the site. Everything is dictated by the DEC's brownfield remediation plan."

Tobin's opened in 1924 and during its heyday employed some 1,500 people. It was shuttered in 1981 and has

progressively become more dilapidated. In December 2016, Richbell

announced it was purchasing one of the Capital District's largest eyesores with a plan to re-develop the land with a mixed use of residential, retail and entertainment establishments.

The land on Exchange Street straddles the line between the Town of Colonie and the City of Albany.

The two municipalities have agreed to establish an overlay district, complete with a Planning Board, to oversee the redevelopment.

The investigation and remediation under the DEC brownfield program will likely last through the fall and most of the winter with remediation beginning next spring, Hoblock said.

Once houses are built over them, that's all gone. There are more reasons too, but those specifically come to mind now."

Reiterating that continued development is a "huge issue in town," VanLuven said so far, the survey found that "around 50 [people] had said that open space and farmland conservation in town are not important or somewhat unimportant.

And around 850 had said that those things are either very or somewhat important."

According to Shaw, while the survey has not received any genuine backlash yet, she has continued encouraging people to use their voice to share their honest opinions there. She believed that surveys are not necessarily always the best way to gain perspectives from the public

but that "it's a start. We were hesitant at first because it's always hard to know when the best time is to make the survey available."

Following the survey's Sept. 16 deadline, Shaw will collect all the responses and data to develop "a presentation and report online." Ideally, this document would "guide public meetings and hope to lead to a land conservation event or workshop with New Scotland and neighboring places, to help inform the public more about conservation-related topics, its costs and benefits."

She also envisions inviting

landowners to come talk about their properties' histories, how they kept holding onto them and even distributing their locally-grown foods during these potential events.

While there are still a couple of weeks to complete the survey, VanLuven also noted that there already is a "pretty strong agreement in town that protecting farms and undeveloped lands is a priority. Once we can have that common point of agreement, then we can talk about solutions moving forward."

Given how sensitive the land

conservation versus development debate can be for residents, Shaw plans to "take some time to ensure the survey's results are interpreted for the public easily so there's less room for misunderstandings and more for finding commonalities. Comments are enriching to any process and we really want to respect that."

It's unknown exactly how long it will take Shaw and her colleagues to complete this process.

Parker said. "We send letters to our pantry families to let them know they can have this supply drive as a resource to assist them too."

The supply drive and food pantry are two ways the Senior Services Department provides for locals who are not as financially steady. It also aims to encourage others in the community to donate, which then helps to inspire confidence particularly in students who do not have immediate access to supplies that are needed for their education.

"I think every child who goes

to school has the right to walk in with supplies they need and sometimes, that's not possible," said Parker. "With this program, we can supply them and help them and make it special in some way. We feel proud of it and we just want to thank the community for their generosity and help!"

How to navigate traffic jams

any drivers have found themselves traveling down the highway at a good speed when, seemingly out of nowhere, vehicles begin to slow down. In such instances, drivers assume there must be an accident ahead, only to ultimately see nothing before traffic once again begins to move. What just happened?

If this situation sounds familiar, it may be comforting to know you are not alone. Traffic is a big problem in many cities, and is one of the leading causes of commuter anxiety. A 2012 study from researchers at Washington University in St. Louis noted that long commutes cut into exercise time, which has the trickledown effect of high blood pressure, greater body weight and lower fitness levels. The study also stated that being exposed to the daily hassle of traffic can lead to chronic stress. Furthermore, traffic can expose drivers to air pollution, which the World Health Organization says contributes to 3.2 million preventable deaths worldwide each year.

Traffic jams occur because of accidents, distractions on the side of the road, vehicle breakdowns, roads in disrepair, and other obstacles. But "phantom accidents" also contribute to their share of slow downs. According to Berthold Horn, an MIT computer scientist, all it takes is one driver to create a traffic jam. It is similar to the ripples of tossing a stone into a lake, and the science of nonlinear dynamics refers to this as "emergent phenomenon.'

But Horn notes there may be a way to prevent phantom accidents. Horn says trying to maintain a distance halfway between the car ahead and the car behind you can ease traffic somewhat and produce improvements in commuting time, though everyone on the road needs to do his part for this to work.

Accepting that traffic can occur, leaving extra time to reach destinations, having relaxing or your favorite music at the ready, and realizing that the traffic wave will end eventually can help motorists cope with traffic.

During the warmer months, numerous worried residents generally call the County Health Department regarding the possible exposure to rabies after encountering bats in their homes. Bats typically roost-settle or congregate-away from people's initial line of vision, in areas such as inside attics, behind shutters and other sheltered places.

The Federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) defines rabies as "a preventable viral disease of mammals most often transmitted through the bite of a rabid animal," such as a bat, fox, skunk or raccoon. This virus attacks a human's central nervous system, which can damage the brain or even be fatal. Symptoms include fever, weakness, discomfort and headaches. These symptoms can worsen to phenomena including "insomnia, anxiety, confusion, slight or partial paralysis, excitation, hallucinations, agitation, hypersalivation

(increase in saliva), difficulty swallowing, and hydrophobia." Death generally occurs in a matter of days after such symptoms first show up.

According to the Albany County Health Department, while bats are rarely infected with rabies, they can still be dangerous to humans, especially if they physically contact them through biting, scratching, or dropping their saliva into one's eyes, nose, mouth or an open wound. Only a bat's brain, spinal cord and saliva specifically have the virus: humans cannot contract rabies through encounters with bats' fecal matter. blood or urine.

Furthermore, bats have little sharp teeth and their resulting bite marks may not be easily visible, so getting tested for rabies is paramount.

Dr. Elizabeth Whalen, the health department's commissioner, said that so far this year, it has administered 89 injections To "batproof" one's home, residents should "use polypropylene bird netting, fly screening, sheet metal, wood or various caulking compounds to close or cover openings that allow entry for bats to roost," according to the Health Department. **Residents should also** note that bats can easily travel through extremely tiny or thin openings.

to concerned residents who feared they got rabies.

"In over 90 or 95 percent of these cases, we would not need to administer injections in the first place if we were able to test the possibly rabid animal in question for rabies, and eventually find out if it comes up negative," she said. She stressed the importance of capturing and submitting a possibly rabid animal to the department for rabies testing. "Especially for children, seniors, the mentally impaired and



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those who just consumed alcohol, if they are in a situation where it's possible they were exposed to a rabid animal, they should still get tested just in case."

Noting that rabies testing is free of charge which the Health Department would coordinate, she also said that the department has received roughly over 100 phone calls from concerned residents, though it's "uncertain how many exactly. It could even be up to 200 possibly."

She reiterated that encountering bats indoors is normal during the warmer months of the year, while sightings typically decrease in the fall and winter.

"I just don't want people to fear that this is something new and different, it's annual," she said. "But just know that residents can capture the bat which saves a lot of time and concern in the end, especially if the bat is eventually tested negative for rabies."

During the month of June, while the New York State Department of Health examined nine potentially-infected bats, none were found to positively have rabies. These bats were among 20 animals in Albany County that were tested for rabies that month. Others included two dogs, five cats, one skunk and a raccoon. While the state's official report for July has not yet been released, Albany County's precautionary measures hope to keep the number of animals testing positive for rabies at zero again.

The county health department encourages residents to not only actively "batproof" their residence, but also be prepared to catch a bat should they discover one inside their home. To "batproof" one's

home, residents should "use polypropylene bird netting, fly screening, sheet metal, wood or various caulking compounds to close or cover openings that allow entry for bats to roost," according to the Health Department. Residents should also note that bats can easily travel through extremely tiny or thin openings. The use of chemicals or pesticides to eliminate the creatures is strongly discouraged.

When a resident does discover a bat indoors, he or she should ensure all windows are closed, room and closet doors are shut, while the lights are left on. Once the bat lands, capture it using an appropriatelysized container, such as a bucket or a pail. After the resident carefully inserts a sheet of cardboard under the container, he or she should contact the Health Department to discuss rabies testing for the bat and any human who potentially encountered it.

Also, if a sleeping resident wakes up to find a bat in the room, which Dr. Whalen said is a common situation, they are urged to go through rabies testing and possibly rabies post-exposure treatment themselves, by contacting the department. Unfortunately, a bat's bite does not necessarily awaken the resident from slumber.

In most cases, Albany County residents can also receive rabies vaccinations at the Health Department's headquarters at 175 Green St. in Albany.

The Albany County Health Department's

website has additional facts and video tutorials on how to safely capture a bat indoors, accessible at www. albanycounty.com/health.

Dr. Whalen said of the 215 animals county residents submitted to the department for testing in 2017, only 13 were found to be rabid, one of which was a bat. In 2018 to date, while there have not been critically dangerous cases regarding exposure to rabies in Albany County, "we don't want to take a chance, even if the risk is so small. This isn't a critical issue but yes, it's still precautionary," said Dr. Whalen.

"One of my top priorities as County Executive is protecting the health and well-being of residents and keeping them safe," said Albany County Executive Daniel P. McCoy, in a press release issued on Monday, Aug. 20. "Though only a small percentage of bats have rabies, unfortunately you cannot tell one has the disease simply by looking at it, and if contracted, it could be fatal. Therefore, we are urging everyone to take every precaution."

Earlier this month, a rabid, feral cat bit a male resident in Selkirk before Bethlehem Animal Control captured it on Maple Avenue. The man has since been receiving treatment. Anyone who may have come in contact with the grey, short-haired cat is strongly encouraged to get medically tested for rabies.







The two-day, multi-band event will feature several of the premiere touring bands currently on the festival circuit, including headliners Twiddle and Pigeons Playing Ping Pong, each of whom will perform two sets at this year's festival.

Pink Talking Fish will return, joined on the lineup by Keller Williams. Badfish: A Tribute to Sublime will bring a West Coast vibe to the show. "This is really big," said James Woods, bass player for Formula 5. His jam band has a unique perspective on playing in front of the Queen of American Lakes. Not only did the band throw its second "Rock the Dock" festival on the piers of Lake George, it has performed with nearly all the acts playing at this year's Adirondack. "We have all these bands. It's going to draw a lot of people. It's a really good production."

Woods called this year's lineup a "powerhouse" set. Factor into the mix Hartley's Encore, which plays as part of this year's festival. The band only just opened for Los Lobos at Cohoes Music Hall last month. The funk and soul band out of Albany plays to a free audience on Monday at Shepard's Park.

"Another dark horse set that people are going to see is Back to School Special," said Woods. It will be the debut performance by this funky supergroup featuring saxophonist Sam Kininger, of Lettuce and Soulive; drummer Michelangelo Carubba and guitarist Craig Brodhead, of Turkuaz; and keyboardist Beau Sasser, of Kung Fu.

"Never miss a Sunday show," said Greg Ormont, dropping an oft-referenced phrase among Phish fans. The lead singer for Pigeons Playing Ping Pong is a Phish fan, himself. He knows, too, how the jam band reserves the best sets for the final, Sunday night performance. Ormont's band is Sunday's headlining act.

Pigeons Playing Ping Pong, brings end-of-the-world enthusiasm to its high-energy psychedelic funk. The band's infectious electro-funk grooves, undeniable live energy and contagious smiles have its rabid fanbase "the Flock" growing exponentially. Based out of Baltimore, Maryland, this animated quartet has been scorching up the country with its explosive performances and danceable peaks.

"When you walk out on that stage, it's a really incredible opportunity," said Ormont. "Our fans reflect that energy to us. ... That's why we work hard while we're home, so we come out and just have fun, and do our best."

For those wishing to make a full weekend of it, there will also be a free multi-venue kick-off party on Friday, Aug. 31, starting with the Funky Dawgz Brass Band & Capital Zen at Shepard Park in downtown Lake George, at 6 p.m. That show will be followed by Sophistafunk & Half Step at King Neptune's, at 9:30 p.m.

The festival wraps up with another free show on Monday, Sept. 3. Shu, Hartley's Encore and multiinstrumentalist, Rich Ortiz plays sets at Shepard Park from 1 to 6 p.m.

Tickets to the festival are just \$80 in advance for weekend tickets and \$45 for day tickets and are currently on sale at www.eventbrite.com. 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



ootball is back, and with it comes all of the delicious foods served at parking lot tailgates and viewing parties at home. Perhaps no food is more synonymous with football than chicken wings. Sports bars make names for themselves based on their chicken wings, but football fans need not visit their local pubs to indulge in wings worthy of gameday. The following recipe for "Chicken Wings with Bacon Barbecue Sauce" from John Holl's "The American Craft Beer Cookbook" (Storey) is simple and sure to please foodies and their fellow football fans this season.

Chicken Wings with Bacon Barbecue Sauce

Ingredients: Serves 12 wings

- 1 cup roughly chopped applewood– smoked bacon
- 12 large chicken wings
- tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
 1/4 cup diced yellow onion
- cup dark brown sugar 1 cup New Albanian Bob's Old 15-B Porter, or similar robust porter
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter
- 2 cups veal or beef broth
- 1/2 cup Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tablespoon puréed chipotle in adobo
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- *1 teaspoon dried thyme*
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

Instructions

Preheat the oven to 400°F. Put the bacon in a heavy skillet and cook it in the oven until crispy. Transfer the bacon to a paper towel-lined plate, reserving the fat in the skillet. Reduce the oven temperate

Sign-up starts at 8 p.m. Putnam Place is located at 63 Putnam St. in Saratoga Springs. to 350°F and move the skillet to the stovetop. Toss the chicken wings in the olive oil, arrange them on a baking sheet and bake for 1 hour, or until crisp and cooked through.

Add the onion to the bacon fat in the skillet and cook over medium-high heat, stirring occasionally, until golden brown, 5 to 7 minutes. Be careful handling the skillet; it will still be hot from the oven. Add the brown sugar to the skillet and cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until it dissolves. Add the beer, scraping the bottom of the skillet with a spatula to loosen any brown bits. Stir in the butter and simmer until the liquid is reduced by half, stirring occasionally.

After the beer has reduced, add the broth to the skillet and reduce until the jam is thick, stirring occasionally and being careful not to burn it, 10 to 20 minutes. Add the Worcestershire, chipotle, oregano, thyme, and garlic powder to the skillet and stir to fully incorporate.

Transfer the sauce and bacon to a blender, let cool for 8 to 10 minutes, and then purée until smooth. Remove the chicken wings from the oven, place them in a large bowl, and pour in enough sauce to liberally coat the chicken. Serve immediately.

Note: This recipe yields a bit of extra sauce. Leftover sauce is great on burgers, with other grilled meats, or as a dip for bread. Or simply make a double batch of wings!

A few beers to try with this recipe: Avery New World Porter, Bell's Porter, Deschutes Black Butte Porter, Great Lakes Edmund Fitzgerald Porter, New Albanian Bob's Old 15-B Porter, Sierra Nevada Porter and Smuttynose Robust Porter.



Cannabis and cancer-related pain

Studies show cannabis helps relieve pain from cancer treatments

he National Cancer Institute notes that, while more research is necessary, small studies have indicated the potential benefits of cannabis in helping cancer patients overcome the pain associated with their disease.

According to the NCI, a small study of 21 patients with chronic pain who combined vaporized cannabis with morphine experienced improved pain relief compared to patients who took only morphine. However, combining vaporized cannabis with oxycodone, a narcotic pain reliever and cough suppressant that is similar to morphine, did not produce significantly greater pain relief.

In addition, two small studies indicated that delta-9-THC, the main active cannabinoid in marijuana, helped to relieve pain as well as nausea and vomiting.

A second study indicated that delta-9-THC given in doses could provide pain relief similar to that provided by codeine, a pain-relieving drug derived from

morphine. The NCI also cites a study that indicated a cannabis plant extract medicine effectively relieved pain when sprayed under the tongue of advanced

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cancer patients whose pain was not relieved by strong opioids alone. That study also indicated that some patients were able to continue to control their cancer-related pain without needing higher doses of the cannabis spray or higher doses of other pain medications they were taking.

Living the '60s

Message-driven, lively cast brings 'Hairspray' to life

LOUDONVILLE — "Welcome to the '60s!" When the cast and crew of a Consortium Actors production of "Hairspray" delivered a strong performance on Thursday evening, Aug. 23, at 7 p.m., they wanted to not only showcase their theatrical prowess, but also to spread positive messages to the audience.

It was originally based on a samenamed 1988 dance-comedy movie, which then was adapted into a multi-Tony Award-winning Broadway musical in 2002, and subsequently translated to the big screen as a 2007 Hollywood film, and most recently, a live TV adaptation in 2016 on NBC. This sold-out performance took place at Siena College's Beaudoin Theater.

Set in 1962 in Baltimore, "Hairspray" focused on "chubby-faced" Tracy Turnblad (played by understudy Luca Verner) who dreamed to be a dancer on the Corny Collins, a popular almost-all-white teen dance TV show, which notably only has "Negro Day" once a month, where African-American dancers can shine. Tracy was initially supported by her comedicallyhyper best friend, Penny Pingleton (Claire Flynn), her weight-insecure and hesitant mother, Edna Turnblad (Matthew Coviello), and her business owner of a father, Wilbur Turnblad (Devin Canavally).

She was also later encouraged by a cast

of African-American characters, especially smooth skilled dancer Seaweed J. Stubbs (Josh Powell), the brief-yet-fierce Little Inez (Viktoria Pierre), and matriarch Motormouth Maybelle Stubbs (Rocky Tassie), who hosted the show's "Negro Day." Tracy later became emboldened to have the TV show celebrate integration, which was controversial at the time.

A main storyline was Tracy's crush and eventual romance with Link Larkin (Jon Maltz), the show's lead male dancer who dreamed of a recording career. However, Tracy faced opposition from Amber von Tussle (understudy Heather Frederick), a Caucasian fellow dancer who desires the in-show "Miss Teenage Hairspray" crown,

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
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and her racist and sizeist mother, Velma von Tussle (Kelly Sienkiewicz), who manages the show's TV station, WYZT.

Luca Verner triumphantly channeled Tracy's innocence, sheer optimism and bubbly attitude. In certain scenes, her voice notably grew feverishly excited when discussing her hopes of making it big on the Corny Collins Show, as well as becoming shiveringly-hopeful around her crush, Link. The audience could relate to her following her passion beyond her otherwise mundane everyday life at school and home, and she remained gleefully unbothered about the era's racism, and the von Tussles' dehumanizing remarks.

One of the cast's strongest players was Claire Flynn as Penny Pingleton whose constant wide-eyed, unashamedly gumchewing facial expressions made for great comic relief. She even hilariously had to swerve out of the way when background cast members danced around her, and stared longingly at Seaweed's face, both of whom instantly falling in love upon first sight. Speaking of Seaweed, Josh Powell's street-smart slickness and staccato hip movements easily showed why Penny immediately ogled him.

Matthew Coviello's Edna Turnblad depiction won the audience over as she slowly overcame her shame with obesity, especially when she had a makeover during the much-celebrated "Welcome to the '60s" number and even threatened to fistfight with the ignorant Velma. Her onstage husband, Devin Canavally's Wilbur Turnblad, also shined particularly for being a crowd-pleaser and his neverending love for his family. Canavally was unafraid to push through with his purposely-low, almostgrowling diction which comically contrasted from his brightly-colored wardrobe. It was like Willy Wonka but with an attractively masculine husky voice, which delighted the audience. Hence, the couple's "You're Timeless to Me" duet was a joy to watch as their unorthodox chemistry went into overdrive while they danced together harmoniously.

The aforementioned actresses for the von Tussles truly played up their constant dismissive attitudes to Tracy and her gang, with frequent bouts of bitchiness that made them appear like tormented kittens in need of attention. While Heather Frederick acted out Amber's displeasure at Tracy's very presence—Tracy was once literally mocked as "an unblemished blackhead"—and her support of integration, it was Kelly Sienkiewicz who earned the audience's praise for her sheer vocals and exaggerated negative disposition when portraying Velma.

Despite the performance's energetic catharsis and hopeful message, it slightly struggled with a few missteps.

Production-wise, the stage appeared rather small to handle the cast as a few actors bumped into each other during two dance scenes, some flubbed their lines, one member dropped his prop—a red bell during the "I Can Hear the Bells" sequence—and another background actor bumped into a table prop while trying to dance his way through the stage.

In addition, Rocky Tassie who played

Pentatonix treated concertgoers to one incredible night at Saratoga Performing Arts Center on Wednesday, Aug. 22. The Grammy Award-winning a cappella group sang original and cover songs alike. Each song was packed with emotion, energy and enticement, with the five-piece group smoothly filling the two-hour time slot with harmonies to rattle fans to their cores.

Being a massive Pentatonix fan, I was so excited to see the group. Some of the group's songs have been staple pieces of my collection through both the happiest and hardest parts of the last three years.

The first song of the night was an original track "Sing," which started off a little shakily. I fully admit I prefer covers live with a cappella groups because originals, especially ones like "Sing," are so heavily overdubbed in the studio that the song itself falls flat live. While the track is easily one of my favorites off of the 2015 album comprised of mostly original songs, I felt like some of the group's originals were a little lackluster live to the wellloved covers.

As the night went on, the quintet performed a lot of early songs, which pleased fans who have been in the fandom since the beginning. "Love You Long Time" and "Natural Disaster" were some of the best performances of the night — with the ridiculously low notes required of bass singer Matt Sallee actually bottoming out the PA system.

I do think the second half of the show was much better than the first, as the group seemed to get into its rhythm and iron out any pre-show jitters. By the time we rolled into the post-intermission/ costume change, the songs began to sound more like they do on the albums as the five singers' voices had warmed up nicely.

I taped three songs for my own memory, one of them being "Bohemian Rhapsody." I had made it abundantly clear to my family we were going to stay for the encore, since I knew this song was the only one being performed. Being a huge Freddie Mercury and Queen fan, I was skeptical the band could do this one justice when it first came out. It's now my all-time favorite cover of theirs, and tears streamed down my face and I collapsed into audible



sobs as the song ended.

That was the third time I "ugly cried" at the show. I didn't even care what I looked like.

The show was preceded by a pair of incredible openers from Yorkshire-born ballad master Calum Scott and Californiabased alternative rock group Echosmith. Echosmith's set brought enough bass drum to make your heart vibrate while Scott's set was full of songs about love and heartbreak, and was the deepest, most emotionally charged part of the evening.

As I walked across the bridge after the concert, I thought, if I had to pay the \$69.50 just to hear 'Bohemian Rhapsody' one more time, I'd throw the money at whoever was offering.

MUSIC REVIEW **Circles** Around The Sun's **'Let It Wander'**

CATS is back! Circles Around the Sun released its second instrumental project earlier this month, shorn from the pretense of set break music like its first album, "Interludes for the Dead." The four-man fellowship is guitarist Neal Casal and keyboardist Adam MacDougall (bandmates in the Chris Robinson Brotherhood), bassist Dan Horne (Jonathan Wilson, Grateful Shred) and drummer Mark Levy (We Dream Dawn, Bonfire Dub).

The seven-track double album jumps right into the eight-minute "On My Mind" with comforting undertones CATS fans

adore, but shedding the lethargic nap time vibes to reveal energizing velocity.

Chuck D of Public Enemy introduces the second track "One For Chuck," after hearing CATS record at Castaway 7 Studios, digging its sound, and agreeing to make a cameo on the song. The ensuing low key dance groove offers effects with an uncanny likeness to cats meowing but still pleasantly tickles the ears. You don't have to like cats to like CATS.

"Immovable Object" embarks on a sultry trajectory, followed by the near 20-minute "Halicarnassus," which beckons the listener with another contagious

progression, slowly darkening in tone, possibly dragging some listeners into the rabbit hole of its own consciousness without drowning in the abyss. The constant gentle beat is the life preserver that keeps the listener afloat. Casual references to The Beatles love song "Something" add a comforting familiarity.

"Tacoma Narrows" hits hard with soulful guitar, while the sprightly nature of "Electric Chair (Don't Sit There) is accomplished with the addition of hand drums. "Ticket to Helix NGC 7293" (an actual nebula in our galaxy) rounds out the album with a feel good beginning that over the course of 20 minutes devolves into a plasmic soundscape fit for a horror film. Gentle guitar breathes life back into the song to end the album on a high note.

The experience start to finish is satiating. When jams can be overwhelmingly heavy or too loose and disconnected, CATS swiftly navigate the sweet spot in between. They create songs that have just the right amount of weird



to intrigue music junkies but still appeal to a wide audience.

"Let it Wander" is an album perfect for those looking to add more tunes to its chill party mix. The album title is a fitting name for the project which includes two near 20-minute tracks that truly allow space for the band to wander with its work, and for the listener to wander with them.



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

The summer kicked off with a jampacked performance at Troy's Rockin' on the River on June 6, with an electric, soulful opening from local musician Margo Macero. The show was the first of the Rockin' season. Formica performed her entire catalogue of music from her original EP, "Bring It On," as well as covers. She also performed her newest single, an empowerment anthem called "I Will," to the excited crowd.

"Over this summer, I've learned to interact with the audience more," she said.

"I like to tell personal stories, make jokes and dance.

"I don't care how stupid people think I look," she continued. "When I'm with my guitar, I like to move my body however it wants to naturally move." Formica also performed at Empire

State Plaza for the July 4 celebration with SmashMouth — and has headlined concerts at local venues including Freedom Park and Clifton Commons.

"Songs become hits for being different," she added. "I want to continue bringing rock back to the mainstream, but I'm going to do it as me."

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

Motormouth Maybelle Stubbs did not get to fully project the character's usual headstrong and fierce persona. Not playing up to her character's first name, her voice sounded gentle instead, which did not exactly inspire rebellion and justice in the other characters' minds.

It did conjure up the argument though that one does not necessarily have to be bombastic and extroverted to make change happen—Mahatma Gandhi and Rosa Parks being great historical examples. If that characterization was what Tassie was truly going for, then she excelled indeed.

But there's much more to celebrate with this performance. The musical numbers were a deluge of immeasurable euphoria.

Highlights included the hopeful introductory "Good Morning Baltimore" where Tracy introduced herself to be a happy-go-lucky and dream-pursuing teenager; the wistfully-romantic "Without Love" where much of the cast formed couples amid giddy smiles; the oh-sorelatable "I Can Hear the Bells" where a confused Penny watched as Tracy succumbed to her crush on Link; "Welcome to the '60s" where Tracy pushed her agoraphobic mother to embrace the changing times and fashions, which resulted in both having an applause-inducing makeover; and the finale, "You Can't Stop the Beat," where everyone rejoiced and danced with abandon till the stage went dark.

One heart-wrenching tune was the message-heavy "I Know Where I've Been"

where Motormouth Maybelle Stubbs organized a protest for racial equality through the Baltimore streets. As they sang in unison, a slideshow of real-life historical African-American individuals, who either fought for equality or suffered from racism, began which was hauntingly moving. Examples shown were photographs of the infamously-lynched 14-year-old Emmett Till, Little Rock Nine member Elizabeth Eckford, and activist Martin Luther King Jr.

Rocky Tassie herself was said to have "fought for Civil Rights and participated in sit-ins in the sixties," according to a note by the musical's directors, Antoinette Lawson and Sharon Zeto Paluch. "With courage and conviction, she and her fellow students shut down campus offices and demanded to have their voices heard. When she sings, 'I Know Where I've Been,' you better believe it — she does!"

The directors also wanted to dedicate the production to the African-American fighters for civil rights and victims of racism and intolerance.

Despite the musical's overall positive nature, it impeccably addressed raw socio-political issues like racism, sizeism, materialism, the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s, white privilege and interracial relationships. Along with Tracy achieving her dreams of being a dancer on TV and enabling integration, these themes still matter today which helped make the musical relatable on a personal level.

In keeping with honoring past African-American historical figures, the performance was preceded by a little tribute to the late Aretha Franklin as audio of her 1967 version of "Respect" played, with much of the audience singing along.
