How are we doing?

BCSD receives its climate survey results back

large majority of Bethlehem Central School District students reported feeling safe, happy, and supported by teachers and extracurricular activities at school, according to a district-wide survey's results published on Friday, Feb. 1.

Almost 2,700 students across grades five through 12 took the survey back on Dec. 13, 2018, which asked 72 questions relating to school safety, how attentive teachers were to students' problems, population diversity, sense of belonging, whether extracurricular activities were welcoming, alcohol and drug use, school discipline, and interactions among other students. First created by the U.S. Department of Education in 2016 as part of the Every Student Succeeds Act, the survey was meant to understand how students perceive the overall school climate and to help develop the district's five-year strategic plan — to be revealed sometime this month which would outline goals and objectives through 2024.

Parents and school faculty were also given surveys with similar questions to complete between Dec. 6 and 20, which resulted in 3,784 people answering them overall.

UAlbany photo club taking action

Student organization opposes campus order to move its offices

ALBANY — When University at Albany's Photo Service president and senior student Sabrina Flores learned last month that her organization had to vacate its office, studio and darkroom by Feb. 15, she was initially shocked at how sudden the notice came.

But that shock turned into determination.

The University Photo Service, which documents campus life for over five decades, has long kept its original office at Campus Center Room 305 since the organization was founded in the late 1960s. While it has become a longtime hub for photography enthusiasts, it also provided important resources for students through the years who used them for finishing projects, and practicing their camera and lighting skills.

It also used to regularly craft annual physical yearbooks called TORCH, a tradition that stopped in 2014 due to low demand and the rise of social media and the internet — there has been interest in starting a digital one.

"This is a place that's stress-free where people can have fun, enhance your skills, and no one's judging you, and everyone's so supportive and helpful," said Jarron Childs, a junior student and UPS' vice president. However, University at Albany's Campus Center Management gave the notice for the organization to move to Campus Center Room 337 down the hall, which is much smaller and cannot house even half of the current photography studio's equipment.

The UPS office would then house two new campus initiatives: Purple Threads and a university food pantry. The former is a new program that will house new or gentlyused business attire which students can use for professional environments like internships or job interviews.

Jordan Carleo-Evangelist, University at Albany's director of media and community relations, wrote in an email on Tuesday, Jan. 29 that CC Management was under the "understanding that [UPS'] darkroom has not been used for quite some time at least several years, if not longer," and that University at Albany is facing the challenge of balancing the "competing demands" over around 300 student organizations.

Flores and her colleagues immediately organized a social media outreach campaign to raise awareness of the issue, held an emergency meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 29 which even attracted some UPS original founders and past alumni, and started a petition which has drawn over 700 signatures so far — Flores said that it received 600 on its first night alone.

"If we were to move to that new small office, we would be losing our darkroom because we can't even relocate it since it's a physical structure of this room," Flores explained. "Our current office can hold 40 to 50 people at a time, with people working on lighting, on all angles, being photographed subjects and so on. This room is such a perfect amount of space for everything we need to do."

She added that the room has a rich history since it was the same exact room the club's founders had used back in the 1960s, "I know that's not a concrete reason for the university to necessarily care, but they should care because so many of our alumni, who were here 30 or 40 years ago, are angry when they heard about the move."

As Flores reached out to such alumni, she described it as an "eyeopening experience" as she has learned that some have gone on to work for companies and publications such as the Washington Post, Facebook, Instagram, J.P. Morgan, New York Daily *News* and the *New* York Times. Speaking of history, Flores and Childs provided a personal tour of their office, flipping through old TORCH yearbooks, dating back to the 1960s.

Flores also presented the university's 1920

yearbook — a fragile thin booklet with black-andwhite photographs and sayings — which predates TORCH's existence; when the University at Albany was called New York State College for Teachers at

Albany. She explained that UPS coincidentally received this yearbook in a mail package from a Texan woman whose father, Louis Talwin Masson, was photographed in it, and who was noted as being the only Physics major graduate that year on Friday, Jan. 25. "It was on the same day we met with Campus Management to discuss the moving issue. We thought that this is a sign," she said. "We don't get packages from anyone

ever. It shows that people care, even by people from halfway around the country whose father graduated here almost 100 years ago."

Flores and her team's efforts seemed to have paid off though as CC Management relented and postponed moving the UPS office to the end of the current spring semester at the earliest.

Carleo-Evangelist wrote in a follow-up email on Wednesday, Jan. 30 that CC Management officials would meet with UPS members "to find out more about what they see as their darkroom needs moving forward." He reiterated that the darkroom is still not regularly used by its members in recent years.

But that doesn't still necessarily mean we're safe after this semester since the club would eventually die out if we don't get anything protected. We're trying to be as loud as possible but we don't know if they'll hear us."

She and Childs said they are working on a bill with the University Senate to guarantee UPS' protection in the coming years, in case CC Management continues threatening to force it to move offices.

When asked if they had one message to the public and student body about UPS, Childs said, "In this room, we're all one big happy family and we're able to build off each other's creative ideas and learn from one another. That's why I really appreciate this room and why I keep coming back in since I was a wee little freshman. Here, we don't want you to be the photographer people expect you to be, we want you to be the photographer you were meant to be."

Likewise, Flores concluded, "Here, we are free to create what we want to do. This club has a legacy and we need the university to value that. And also, to value us."

ALBANY — In New York state, high school graduation rates increased 0.2 percent to 80.4 percent in 2018, according to data released by the Education Department.

When August graduates are included, the 2014 cohort graduation rate improved to 82.6 percent, an increase of 0.5 percentage points over last year. The 2014 cohort graduation rate, meaning those who were in ninth grade four years ago, is 9.5 percent higher than a decade ago when the 2004 cohort graduation rate was 70.9 percent.

This year's graduation rate improved for black and Hispanic students, for students with disabilities and for current and English language learners.

And, the gap in rates between black and Hispanic students and their white peers narrowed again this year, according to the data.

"New York's graduation rate continues its steady, upward trend," said state Education Commissioner MaryEllen Elia in a statement. "We would, of course, like to see the pace of improvement accelerated, especially in our gap-closing efforts. But it's critical that we continue to maintain and build upon our gains, as we have done consistently."

Every ethnicity, American Indian, Asian, Black and Hispanic, had higher graduation rates with the exception of multiracial which dropped to 81.4 percent from 82.3 percent. The graduation rate for white students dropped from 89 percent in 2017 to 88.9 percent in 2018.

"When we provide students with high-quality learning opportunities, we give them a real chance at success in life," Board of Regents Chancellor Betty A. Rosa said in a statement. "By making equity the focus of New York's improvement efforts, we are well positioned to continue our upward trajectory."

Female students continue to graduate at a significantly higher rate than their male peers, with 2014 cohort graduation rates at 84.5 percent for females and 76.5 percent for males. The graduation rate for females improved by 0.4 percentage points over last year, while the graduation rate for males remained flat.

The percentage of students who dropped out of school remained relatively flat this year, declining from 6.2 percent for the 2013 cohort to 6.0 percent for the 2014 cohort.

Other statistics include: • The charter school graduation rate declined this year, from 74.8 percent for the 2013 cohort to 72.3 percent for the 2014 cohort.

• There were 3,400 more students in this year's cohort than

in 2013, the first increase since the 2005 cohort.
• Three of the "Big Five" school

districts saw a decrease, Buffalo (-0.1,) Syracuse (-2.2,) and Yonkers (-2.5), while two saw an increase in graduation rates, New York City (1.6) and Rochester (1.6.)

Local graduation rates reflect the statewide trend of ticking slightly up and more students graduating in 2018 than 2017.



New status report at Feb. 22 Bethlehem IDA meeting expected

BETHLEHEM — The town's Industrial Development Agency executive director Thomas Connolly said that "everyone on the board is concerned" about how solar installation company Monolith Solar still has not provided updates regarding whether it intends to resume construction of its unfinished Slingerlands headquarters building at the Vista Technology Campus.

Those concerns stemmed from the lack of Monolith Solar officials attending the IDA meeting back on Friday, Jan. 25. Board members remarked that Monolith Solar owner Steve Erby had sent an email on the previous day, indicating that he was planning to come.

His appearance had been anticipated as the IDA previously requested him to come with updates about the company and how

In a phone interview on Friday, Feb. 1, Connolly said that he did receive an email from Erby during the Jan. 25 meeting, stating that he was unable to make it due to the subfreezing weather and unsafe driving conditions outside that morning.

Erby apologized and allegedly asked to reschedule but Connolly explained that the IDA meets only monthly, with the next one happening on Friday, Feb. 22, at 8 a.m.

"The last time Erby came to a meeting was at the end of December but since then, we haven't heard much from their end," Connolly said. "Back in December, they said they'll complete the building but since nothing has happened, that makes us wonder if they really mean it."

The building's site plan, which was issued in March 2015, expired on Thursday, Dec. 13 after receiving two 90-day extensions. The building permits expired on Thursday, Jan. 31.

If Monolith Solar intends to resume construction, it must reapply to the Bethlehem Planning Board for re-approval of both documents.

Monolith Solar has been facing other numerous issues, too.

First, it has been dealing with three lawsuits from other companies, including Solar Foundations USA, alleging that it has not paid its bills. Second, over 50 Monolith Solar workers had been furloughed and the Slingerlands building halted construction in September 2018, although a small yet undisclosed number of them have been called back since. Third, Monolith Solar was undergoing a transition period as Chris Stroud was named its new CEO in late October 2018 after his predecessor, Mike Hickey, left

after just a year to work at Siena College. Monolith Solar has declined to

comment for the time being. Despite all this, there has been

one confirmed update though: BBL Construction installed a fence to surround the incomplete Slingerlands building site sometime on the week of Jan. 13.

Bethlehem Planning Division director Robert Leslie reported this to the IDA at the Jan. 25 meeting.

"We'd like to see the building be built but we've gone through no construction since September, and with each passing week or month, it makes us more nervous that they won't complete the building," Connolly concluded, "But Erby is confirmed to come to meet us at the end of February so we'll see."





Eighty-nine percent of students agreed that they felt safe at school and that teachers are available when they feel the need to talk to them. Eightytwo percent of students reported feeling happy at school and feeling socially accepted, whereas 94 percent reported that extracurricular activities are very welcoming, while 92 percent felt that they feel confident in participating in class discussions or activities. However, 55 percent reported that they do not believe students talk enough about how important it is to express and understand both their own and other students' feelings, and 65 percent do not believe that the school is a comfortable experience all year round.

For teachers, 97 percent reported feeling safe at school, 96 percent agreed that students feel encouraged to join extracurricular activities, and 95 percent said that people at school do care about them as people and not just as teachers, and they feel like they belong. Also, 92 percent wrote that they feel responsible to help one another do their best and 91 percent agreed that the district has adequate programs and resources for students with special needs or disabilities. However, just 51 percent of teachers reported that they think cyberbullying is a major issue among students.

For parents, 97 percent agreed that the schools looked clean and pleasant, 92 percent reported that the district effectively notifies them or other guardians whenever there is a schoolwide emergency, 90 percent said the district ensures that students feel safe, and 85 percent agreed that their child do feel safe there. However, just 30 percent of parents reported that they hear from the school whenever their child does something good, 64 percent reported that school staff care about what families think, and 71 percent wrote that the district offers helpful programs for children with special needs or gifts.

"We were pleased by the response to the School Climate survey and the largely positive results we received," said BCSD Superintendent Jody Monroe. She later added that "the numbers definitely tell a story. The student survey, in particular, sheds light on areas where we need to direct greater focus and resources. For instance, the data show students feel supported by faculty and staff but are feeling less confident when it comes to student-to-student relationships."

The surveys also found other general concerns among students, parents and staff, which include favoritism in class, gender bias, student vaping, requests for high school to start at a later time, and for more direct communication between teachers and parents.

"Having this level of insight allows us to better identify and prioritize the most pressing needs of students, faculty and staff," Monroe concluded.

BCSD to start budget talks

State of the District tonight

BETHLEHEM — Superintendent Jody Monroe will present the State of the Schools Address during a board meeting at its high school library on Wednesday, Feb. 6 at 7 p.m.

Planned to outline certain goals and action items that BCSD plans to achieve through the year, it is expected to also reflect on the past year and discuss updates regarding the district's finances and infrastructure. It would bring up the results of the BCSDwide school climate survey too that was conducted back in mid-December 2018, which asked students, parents and staff about whether they feel safe and connected in the schools, and if the school programs and curriculum are beneficial.

BCSD Chief Business and Financial Officer Judith Kehoe will also present the the district's proposed 2019-2020 initial budget, which will outline how expenses and salary figures would be allocated across the schools. Kehoe will also compare how the proposed budget would compare with those of 2017-2018 and 2018-2019.





He's ours

ASO's David Alan Miller eyes his second Grammy Award, and calls Albany home

hen the red carpet is rolled out in front of Los Angeles' Staples Arena for the 61st Annual Grammy Awards, at least one special guest will not be there. The allure of Tinseltown just isn't strong enough to tear David Alan Miller away from making music.

The Grammy Award-winning conductor will hear his name announced as a nominee for the third time this Sunday, Feb. 10, but he will be in Troy conducting before his Albany Symphony Orchestra — where, Miller said, he'd rather be.

Miller was named among the list of notable nominees for Best Orchestral Performance last December. He shares this nomination with the National Orchestral Institute Philharmonic for its recent recording of works by John Harbison, the late Steven Stucky and Carl Ruggles. The recording was released by NAXOS Records in June 2018 as part of its acclaimed American Classics series.

In 2014, Miller earned a Grammy Award for Best Classical Instrumental Solo with Dame Evelyn Glennie and the Albany Symphony. Miller received his second nomination in 2016 for Best Solo Vocal Album with Talise Trevigne and the Albany Symphony for the recording of Christopher Rouses' Kabir Padavali.

Miller's affable demeanor and passion for music make him a welcoming personality to various circles within the orchestral world. People within that world have long since recognized his talent. I spoke with him about the upcoming Grammys and what the Capital District has to do to ensure we keep him here.


Michael Hallisey: I imagine travel would be in your immediate future with the Grammys coming up.

David Alan Miller: Actually, it's not in my future. At least, not to the Grammys. Because, that Sunday, Feb. 10th, I'm on stage at the Troy Savings Bank Music Hall conducting a beautiful Albany Symphony concert. So, I'm sadly missing the trip to L.A. this year. They'll have to have the Grammys without me.

I was going to ask that because I saw the schedule and wondered 'Are you still doing that?'

No. No. I can't be in two places and I'd much rather be making music than anything else in the world. So, even though I'm sad to miss it, I'm delighted to be able to be home conducting a beautiful concert with the Albany Symphony.

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That's great to hear because we'd love to have you here. Now that this is your third go around, is it becoming old hat for you?

It's never old hat. It's always a real honor. But, I have to say, the first time we were nominated we won, and that was incredible. It never even occurred to me that we would ever be nominated, let alone win. The second time we were nominated and didn't win, and I must say that, even though my mother told me winning is not the thing, it was much less fun not to win than it was to win. So, this time the odds are very challenging because it's a lot of really major, major orchestras I'm up against. So, I have no false hopes, I'm just honored to be considered. It's really nice.

I noticed some of the names of the orchestras within the category in which you are nominated — I see Pittsburgh is represented. I believe San Francisco, as well.

Boston. Boston Symphony. Very bigname orchestras.

You've been a guest conductor for some of those symphonies, have you not?

Yeah, at various points. Sure.

So, do you have any interaction with some of these folks you are "competing" against?

No. Not really. I mean, I know some of them. I know some of the conductors. Not in particular. I've had various concerts with them in the past, but it's been awhile. It's all very friendly, especially in this category, which is a very big category in classical music. The Best Orchestral Performance is just an honor to be in that category. But, of course, I'm very sad that we had a wonderful Albany Symphony disc that was up in a number of categories, and this happens to not be with the Albany Symphony. This National Orchestra Institute, a wonderful summer training program at the University of Maryland. So, I'm delighted — it's the first time they've ever been nominated. So, they're very excited. It's great. Young professional summer festival orchestra. So, I'm delighted to be nominated with them, but I'm a little sad not to be nominated with my own incredible home orchestra.

We are very thankful that you are here, and we do love our symphony orchestra, which leads to my next question: How do we keep you? Because, you are such a hot commodity, I imagine there are people begging to have your services.

That's very kind of you. But, actually, Albany and the Capital Region are my home and have been for almost three decades. I have no intention of leaving anytime soon. I hope they don't have to carry me out, but I'm feeling that we are doing really evermore exciting work together. We have a great team at the symphony, our musicians and staff members. And the orchestra has never been in better shape, from every metric, than it is now. [...] I have no plans. I feel very privileged to be in such a community as the Capital Region.

Rock band brings the stories of women in history back to life





Warmup to this

earty meals are best on cold nights, when food can provide a warming effect after coming in from the cold outdoors. This recipe for "Boeuf Bourguignon" from Jill Lightner's "Edible Seattle: The Cookbook" (Sterling Epicure) is sure to provide such an effect.

Boeuf Bourguignon

Ingredients: Makes 6 servings

- pounds chuck roast, cut into 2
- 2-inch pieces (see note)
- onion, cut into large dice 1
- 2 carrots, cut into large dice 2 stalks celery, cut into large dice
- 2 dried bay leaves
- 4 sprigs fresh thyme
- 7
- sprigs fresh flat-leaf parsley teaspoon black peppercorns 1/4 bottle red wine 1
- Salt Freshly ground black pepper 1 tablespoon canola oil
- 1/4 pound slab bacon, cut into large dice
- 1/2 stick (4 tablespoons) unsalted butter
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
 - 4 cups beef stock
 - 2 large Yukon Gold potatoes,
 - peeled and cut into large dice pound pearl onions, blanched

and peeled

pound button mushrooms, 1 diced

Instructions:

1. Put the beef chunks in a large bowl and add the onion, carrots and celery. In a piece of cheesecloth, tie together a bouquet of garni of the bay leaves, thyme, parsley, and peppercorns and add to the bowl. Pour in the bottle of wine. Cover and let marinate in the refrigerator overnight, stirring the mixture once or twice over the course of the evening.

2. The next day, remove the meat from the marinade and dry the pieces in a shallow pan lined with several layers of paper towels. Remove the vegetables and reserve them separately, along with the bouquet garni. Reserve the wine. Season the beef with salt and pepper.

3. In a large Dutch oven over medium heat, warm the canola oil. Add the bacon and cook until browned and the fat is rendered, about 5 minutes. Remove the bacon from the pot and set aside. In singlelayer batches, brown the beef chunks on all sides, then set aside. Brown the reserved onions, carrots and celery, about 10 minutes. Add additional canola oil to the pot if there is not enough bacon fat to brown all of the beef and vegetables.

4. Return the beef to the pot with

the vegetables and add 3 tablespoons of the butter. Sprinkle with the flour and cook, stirring, for about 3 minutes. Add the reserved wine and deglaze the pot, scraping up all the browned bits from the bottom. Add the bacon and stock and bring to a boil. Skim off the scum that rises to the top; once the scum is removed, add the bouquet garni. Simmer, covered, over medium-low heat until the beef is very tender, about 11/2 hours. Remove the bouquet garni.

5. Toward the end of the beef's cooking time, bring the potatoes to a boil in a separate saucepan covered generously with salted water. Cook until tender, about 15 minutes.

6. In a medium sauté pan, melt 3 tablespoons of the butter over medium-high heat. Add the pearl onions and sauté for 3 to 4 minutes. Add the mushrooms to the onions and cook until both onions and mushrooms are golden brown, about 5 minutes longer. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

7. Serve the stew in bowls, garnished with the pearl onions, mushrooms and potatoes.

Better than BMI?

Has a more accurate way to assess obesity been developed?

B eing obese or overweight is cause for concern at any age. Doctors and fitness experts have long relied on body mass index, or BMI, as a method of determining healthy weight ranges based on a ratio of height to weight. However, BMI may not be the most accurate measure of fitness.

In May of 2017, a team of researchers at the Mayo Clinic unveiled the Body Volume Indicator as a new tool for assessing body size and health. Researchers spent 10 years in collaboration with BVI America LLC to lead an extensive study on fat distribution and how to better assess whether a person is within the healthy zone for his or her body type. Rather than look at height and weight, BVI looks more closely at abdominal fat concentrations, which proponents consider a more accurate way to determine potential health risk. BVI is considered to be a more precise means of estimating weight distribution and fat around the organs. This visceral fat in the abdominal area can impact a person's risk for diabetes and heart disease, offers Mayo Clinic researchers.

Experts at Harvard Medical School touted the dangers of abdominal fat as early as 2005, saying, "for health, the issue is not how much you weigh, but how much abdominal fat you have." It's unclear how visceral fat leads to negative health outcomes, but many believe this fat interferes with the normal functioning of internal organs.


Through a professional app, clinicians can more accurately estimate the body volume, percentage of visceral fat and distribution of body fat for patients. The app compares an image of a patient standing sideways to one of him or her taken head-on. This information will be



combined with age, gender and level of physical activity to paint a better picture of how individuals measure up.

Across North America, obesity remains a major concern. Data from the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, 2009-2010, found that more than two in three adults are considered to be overweight or obese. Furthermore, about one-third of children and adolescents between the ages of six and 19 are overweight or obese. Although these statistics may change now that BVI will be used in conjunction with other measures of body weight and personal health, they provide an eyeopening glimpse into the health of children in the United States.

Although there is no single cause of obesity, nor one ideal approach that can help prevent it, education remains a viable tool. Having more accurate means to identifying problem areas, such as visceral fat, can help the public in various ways.



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Are you prepared for a dental emergency?

Thousands of dental emergencies—from injuries to a painful, abscessed tooth—take place every day. Would you know what to do if your child broke a tooth or had a tooth knocked out while playing outdoors? What if you had a bad toothache in the middle of the night and couldn't get to the dentist until the next day? Knowing what to do can lessen the pain and save a tooth that might otherwise be lost.

Keep your dental office phone number and an emergency number where the dentist can be reached after hours with other emergency numbers, such as your family doctor, and fire and police departments. Some families post these numbers on the refrigerator or inside a kitchen cabinet door near the phone. Call the dentist immediately for instructions on how to handle a dental emergency.

Toothache: Rinse the mouth with warm water to clean it out. Gently use dental floss or an interdental cleaner to remove any food or other debris that may be caught between the teeth. Never put aspirin or any other painkiller against the gums near the aching tooth. This could burn gum tissue. If the



toothache persists, try to see the dentist. Don't rely on painkillers. They may temporarily relieve pain but your dentist should evaluate the condition.

Knocked-out (avulsed) tooth: Try to find the tooth! This may not be as easy as you think if the injury took place on a playground, basketball court or while skateboarding, so try to stay calm. Hold the tooth by the crown and rinse the root in water if the tooth is dirty. Don't scrub it or remove any attached tissue fragments. If it's possible, gently insert and

hold the tooth in its socket while you head to the dentist. If that's not possible, put the tooth in a cup of milk and bring it to the dentist. Time is critical for successful reimplantation, so try to get to your dentist immediately.

Broken tooth: Rinse your mouth with warm water to clean the area. Use cold compresses on the outside of the cheek to help reduce the swelling.

Tongue or lip bites or wounds: Clean the area gently with a clean cloth and apply cold compresses to reduce any swelling. If the bleeding can't be controlled, go to a hospital emergency room or clinic. You may able to reduce bleeding from the tongue by pulling it forward and using gauze to put pressure on the wound.

Objects caught between teeth: Try to gently remove the object with dental floss. Never use a sharp instrument to remove any object that is stuck between your teeth. If you can't dislodge the object with floss, contact your dentist.

Possible broken jaw: Apply cold compresses to control swelling. Get to the hospital emergency room immediately

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Oral Piercing: Not as safe as you think

Piercing, like tattooing, is just one of today's popular forms of body art and self-expression. Piercing may seem daring, cool and totally safe because some celebrities use piercing to flaunt their particular style or attitude. But piercing the tongue, lips, cheeks or uvula (the tiny tissue that hangs at the back of the throat) is not as safe as some would have you believe. That's because the mouth's moist environment—home to huge amounts of breeding bacteria—is an ideal place for infection.



An oral piercing can interfere with speech, chewing or swallowing. That may seem like a mere inconvenience until you consider that it may also cause:

- Excessive drooling (something you won't see in hip fashion magazines!)
- Infection, pain and swelling
- Chipped or cracked teeth
- Injuries to the gums
- Damage to fillings
- Increased saliva flow
- Hypersensitivity to metals
- Scar tissue
- Nerve damage

These harmful effects can happen during the piercing, soon after, or even long after the procedure.

An infection can quickly become life threatening if it's not treated promptly. For example, oral piercing carries a potential risk of endocarditis, an inflammation of the heart valves or tissues. Bacteria can enter the bloodstream through the piercing site in the mouth and travel to the heart, where it can colonize on heart abnormalities. This is a risk for people with heart conditions and, in the worst of cases, results in death.

After a piercing the tongue may swell. There have been reports of swelling serious enough to block the airway. And it's very possible to puncture a nerve during a tongue piercing.

In addition, piercing jewelry can sometimes cause allergic responses to the pierced site. The jewelry can even get in the way of dental care by blocking x-rays.

Don't pierce on a whim. The piercing will be an added responsibility to your life, requiring constant attention and upkeep. Talk to your dentist for more information.



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Quitting Tobacco: You can do it!

o you smoke or use chewing tobacco? Rarely a day goes by without a magazine, newspaper, or TV news report carrying a message about tobacco-related medical problems — the dangers of lung disease, cancer, heart problems and low-birth weight babies. Perhaps you even tune out those messages because you don't want to quit just yet—or you think you can't.

Tobacco is harmful to your mouth, not to mention your social life. Here are just a few reasons why: Smelly breath, stained teeth, loss of teeth and jawbone, loss of taste, gum recession, outrageous cost, oral cancer, mouth sores and wrinkles!

Tobacco's negative effects on the body, particularly the mouth, are well documented. Smoking impairs the body's defense mechanisms and makes users more susceptible to infections like gum disease. Smoking also interferes with healing, a particular problem for patients who need treatment for periodontal disease. Once the ingredients in tobacco get into the bloodstream, they reduce the delivery of oxygen and nutrients to mouth tissues.

Chewing (spit) tobacco is not a safe substitute for smoking. It can cause oral cancer and lead to addiction. The bloodstream quickly absorbs the extremely addictive nicotine. Chewing tobacco users have similar or even higher levels of nicotine than the smoker who uses a pack or more a day. Chewing tobacco users are more susceptible to tooth decay due to the product's higher sugar content. And, chewing tobacco contains at least 28 known cancer-causing chemicals.

Remind yourself of the benefits of quitting. You'll reduce the risk of cancer. You'll taste and enjoy food again. You'll feel more relaxed without the jitters of nicotine. You won't be plagued by smoker's breath. Your sense of smell will be sharper. Your family and friends will thank you.

Here are some tips to get you started:

Get help from loved ones, friends and co-workers when going through the quitting process. Ask another smoker to quit with you. Call organizations such as the American Cancer Society for support groups in your area. Get ready by setting a date to quit. Get help by talking to your dentist or physician about nicotine cessation aids.

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
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

Wavy Cunningham and DJ Mercy's 'The Art Of War'

Albany-based hip hop artists collaberate for a second time

avy Cunningham and DJ Mercy, hip hop artists from Albany teamed up for their second effort, The Art of War, a ten-track album launched last December. Wavy wrote most of the lyrics in one sitting, matching them to hooks and audio samples he had on deck; DJ Mercy composed the instrumentals and fused the beats together.

The duo raised up a chilled out, yet confident, beach vibe to sit at the core of the album's sound. They included a lot of work in the percussion department – a welcomed and elemental foundation, since Mercy plays drums by trade. The beats and samples weave together with stitches by Wavy's urgent vocal style. The opening track, "Ain't About Me," claims, no collusion, but the chemistry between the two is too reactive. It can't be true.

"Lose Control" has modern, robotically tuned vocals, similar to Atlanta artists Future and Migos. At the same time, the title track and "4 The Gang," follow old school hip-hop traditions, featuring bouncy drums and turntable scratch tricks. "The Right Drugs," reminisces on a romantic relationship, lost and highlights the album with its atmosphere and narrative.

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The Art of War is solid, short, and sweet. It runs experiments on its genre without going overboard.

However, the mix and master deserve re-evaluation. Lyrical and instrumental subtleties get lost in limited production. Though the politics of how a project should sound are generally opinion based, one thing is for sure: the core writing and composition is an effort that will leave the listener with a smiling new impression.



Mike Reiss, acclaimed TV comedy writer and the show's longest-serving writer and producer, is scheduled to speak about his craft and "Simpsons" work on Friday, Feb. 8 at 7:30 p.m. at Page Hall on 135 Western Ave. in Albany at the University at Albany's Downtown Campus. This event is free and open to the public, and organized by the New York State Writers Institute. Reiss would also discuss his 2018 book and fan guide, "Springfield Confidential: Jokes, Secrets and Outright Lies from a Lifetime Writing for The Simpsons," which offers insight into the show's production team's creative process and includes interviews with his writing, animating, and acting colleagues as well as celebrity guests.

Reiss was born on Sept. 15, 1959 in Bristol, Connecticut and later enrolled at Harvard University, where he first encountered future "Simpsons" colleague and freshman Al Jean while working on "The Harvard Lampoon," the university's undergraduate humor publication — he

became its co-president. Later, when Reiss was 30, he and Jean were hired to become the first original writers for "The Simpsons." He would write at least 10 episodes with Jean for the show and they even became executive producers and showrunners for seasons three and four. Since leaving in 1993, Reiss has periodically returned to work on the show, even co-writing the screenplay for its 2007 feature film, "The Simpsons Movie." For his work, Reiss won four Emmy Awards.

"The Simpsons" has long remained a cultural phenomenon both nationally and internationally, even becoming known for predicting a few major events. A 1998 episode titled "When You Dish Upon a Star" foresaw Disney buying movie studio 20th Century Fox which happened in 2018; a March 2000 episode called "Bart to the Future" predicted that Donald Trump would become president; and a 2010 episode named "Boy Meets Curl" prophesied that the U.S. Men's Olympic Curling Team would win a gold medal and beat Sweden - this exact result occurred at the 2018 Winter Olympics in PyeongChang, South Korea.

"That's it, we've got three things right in 30 years, you get one thing right every decade and it makes us some of the best psychics in America," Reiss joked in an MSNBC interview, notably sporting a yellow tie, in late July 2018 while promoting his book.

He added that he recalled when the very first episode debuted on Dec. 17, 1989, the show's network did not have much faith in it, believing that it would only run for six weeks before cancelation. Reiss and his colleagues were holding a "Premiere Party" at a bowling alley where the episode was being broadcast on a TV screen above them, not yet realizing that critics had begun perceiving it as a "game changer" type of show. "The next morning, we found out that we debuted with the highest ratings in the history of the Fox network, so it took a half-hour to take America by storm," he said. The figure was a staggering 26.7 million viewers.

Despite since falling to an average of four million viewers per season now, Reiss' creative input has still helped "The Simpsons" reach its 30th season and over 650 episodes now while a second feature film is in the works.
