# Bridging the gap

BCSD to grapple over \$1.5M difference between income and proposed spending

ethlehem Central School District Chief Financial Officer Judith Kehoe noted in the 2019-2020 proposed budget that there is a baseline budget gap of around \$1.5 million between \$99.5 million in revenues and \$101 million in expenditures, which would be addressed in the coming months.

# **Arrest warrant**

BETHLEHEM —

Bethlehem police arrested a 39-year-old Manhattan man on Wednesday, Feb. 6 at 8:17 a.m. in relation to an out-of-state indictment warrant.

William Sanchez had been driving a tractor-

Upon checking his driver's license, he was identified as being already wanted by the Hudson County Sheriff's Department in New Jersey on felony charges of kidnapping, aggravated assault, and unlawful possession of a weapon.

Sanchez was taken into custody and transported to the Bethlehem Police Department; he was then arraigned at the Bethlehem

Town Court as a fugitive from justice and for disobeying a traffic control device.

He was remanded to the Albany County Jail without bail by Judge Ryan Donovan and is scheduled to return to court on Tuesday, March 5, at 4 p.m.

Sanchez also faces an extradition hearing in Albany County Court.

# Buying iPhones fraudulently

GLENMONT -

Bethlehem police arrested three people who allegedly tried buying iPhone XS Max smartphones under fraudulent pretenses at the Glenmont AT&T store on Tuesday, Feb. 5, at 4:39 p.m.

Police first responded to the scene after the store reported suspicious activity regarding the three individuals: Morgaine E. Mitchell, 30 and Melvin J.K. Clarida, 31, of Wallingford, Vermont, and Mark C. Hamilton, 19, of Bennington, Vermont.

They had allegedly tried opening accounts

and buying four brandnew iPhone XS Max, the latter of which the police recovered.

The exact nature of their "fraudulent pretenses" was not disclosed in the press release provided by Bethlehem police.

All three were each charged with a grand larceny felony, and a conspiracy misdemeanor. Clarida, in particular, was also charged with aggravated unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle for having 24 active suspensions and revocations of his driving privilege. Clarida also had an active felony warrant out of New York City Police, too.

The three were arraigned in Bethlehem Town
Court before Judge Ryan
Donovan.

Mitchell and Hamilton were remanded to the Albany County Jail in lieu of a \$3,500 bail, whereas Clarida was remanded there too in lieu of a \$15,000 bail.

The three are scheduled to return to court on Tuesday, March 5, at 4 p.m.



# Injured driver pulled from serious car accident site

Rescue from her silver Toyota after a serious car accident occurred sometime on the morning of Saturday, Feb. 9. Her car was discovered near an undamaged utility pole and in a small ditch off the road, near River and Corning Hill roads in Glenmont. The Selkirk Fire Department, Delmar-Bethlehem EMS and Albany County Paramedics had responded to the scene. While the extent of her injuries remains unknown, the woman was transported to the Albany Medical Center for treatment. Bethlehem police are investigating the cause of the crash.

# Local land conservation success stories

Speakers warmed by impressive turnout

BETHLEHEM — Adam Zaranko, the executive director of Albany County Land Bank, discussed during a Feb. 7 conservation-themed event at the Five Rivers Environmental Education Center how the Town of Bethlehem will take one formal step closer to acquiring an ACLB-owned eight-acre parcel of land in Glenmont in its Feb. 13 Town Board meeting.

ACLB had previously approved an application from Bethlehem to buy the parcel, located by the intersection of Wemple Road and Route 9W, on Nov. 27, 2018 for \$1, which the town hopes to preserve to protect its wildlife habitat and water quality, as well as potentially foster recreation for future residents.

Zaranko connected this with how working with a local municipality can help support the overall conservation cause. "We're pretty excited about this," he said. "I look forward to working with more municipalities and other non-profits to help accomplish their visions."

Zaranko was among the dozen speakers who shared their land conservation stories in the two-hour event, titled "Meet the People Making Local Conservation Happen: Talks, Tastes, and a Tour! - Part One: Forests and Fields," which was organized by Bethlehem's Open Space Coordinator Karen Shaw.

It also included locally-grown food and apple cider from Field Notes and Indian Ladder Farms. A guided outdoor tour of the Five

Rivers area happened after the event.

The following speakers, including Zaranko, were each allowed around about 10 minutes to speak about their individual efforts to conserve local forests and fields:

- Katie Petronis, northern program director of Open Space Institute
- Mark King, executive director of Mohawk Hudson Land Conservancy
- Jeff Leon of Strawberry Fields in Amsterdam
- Lauren Axford, executive director of Pine Hollow Arboretum in Slingerlands
- Steve Downs, private landowner along the Vloman Kill
- Mike Knutson, senior land project manager of Scenic Hudson
- Kris Sigsby, private landowner in Glenmont
- Giles Wagoner, private landowner and forester in Selkirk
- Jim Bonesteel, executive director of the Rensselaer Plateau Alliance; Robert Davies, director of the state Department of Environmental Conservation, Division of Lands and Forests; and Francis Sheehan, DEC, Division of Lands and Forests

Petronis' speech, about how protecting forests, parks, preserves and trails yields multiple benefits, encapsulated the event's overall pro-conservation message.

She first discussed how conservation can lead to recreation like hiking, biking, cross-country skiing, going on

picnics, kayaking, canoeing and fishing.

Education is another resource from conservation, including how students can learn about the outdoors in an out-of-classroom setting, and creating interpretive trails.

Conservation would also protect natural resources, wildlife, and ecologies as well as fostering food production, forest products like sap and timber, and providing a source of drinking water.

Another highlight was when Axford spoke about the Pine Hollow Arboretum, a 22-acre, non-profit arboretum and nature preserve in Slingerlands.

According to the event handout, it contains more than "3,600 unique tree and plant specimens, 11 ponds, and a natural selection forest, all easily accessed by a network of walking trails and bridges." The arboretum, free to the public daily from dawn to dusk, is also split up into 20 themed areas, including Azalea Field, Magnolia Field and Locust Hill.

Axford explained that it was first founded over five decades ago by Dr. John W. Abbuhl, a local pediatrician, who privately owned a residence on the land.

"Dr. Abbuhl found great joy in learning about trees from around the world and became very passionate about nurturing the landscape that really encouraged the natural ecosystem while showcasing his hortical collection," she said. "After planting trees for 10 years, he began thinking of opening the property as an arboretum that the surrounding community can benefit from."

The arboretum became taxexempt in 2007 and was chartered by the state Department of Education in 2008.

Looking ahead, Axford said that due to its conservation success, Pine Hollow Arboretum plans to become more ADA-accessible, incorporate more tree plantings, increase its workforce, and continue being a place where people can learn more about the environment.

The overall topic of conservation in Bethlehem will continue with a second two-hour event, named "Meet the People Making Local Conservation Happen: Talks, Tastes, and a Tour! - Part Two: Farmland Conservation," on Thursday, June 13 at 6 p.m. at Indian Ladder Farms. A guided farm tour will precede it from 5 to 5:45 p.m.










# Eagles, Dutch compete in Raider Rumble

But Claire's true love was water, describing herself as a reincarnated duck, and demonstrated it by running out all the hot water taking showers. Claire seriously participated in synchronized swimming and for many years she and Alex participated in Red Cross WSI, were instructors at the kids' learn to swim programs and adult ed swim programs at the Middle School.

# Town receives \$200K in aid

The town announced it received another \$200,000 in state aid last December to continue its Microenterprise Grant Program this year.

The program, offered by the state Office of Homes and Community Renewal, will award grants, ranging from \$5,000 to \$35,000 each, to emerging and existing micro-enterprises in Bethlehem.

It began in 2014 with the state awarding the town \$200,000 every other year since, and in 2019, it plans to assist at least 10 businesses.

The grant money ideally would help businesses "purchase inventory, machinery, equipment, furniture, and fixtures, and to meet working capital needs." It also defines a micro-enterprise "as a commercial enterprise

that has five or fewer employees, one or more of which is the principal and owns the enterprise at the time of application."

Interested businesses can learn more by attending two public information sessions, on Tuesday, Feb. 12 in the Town Hall auditorium and on Wednesday, Feb. 20 in the Town Hall's Room 101, located on 445 Delaware Ave. in Delmar.

Elizabeth Staubach, the town's Economic Development Coordinator, said, "It is a much-needed resource to small businesses and Bethlehem has so many great ones. It would help people who are also thinking of moving into Bethlehem and it gives them that little push. ... It's such a great opportunity."

# Outside survey numbers

Superintendent shared survey comments within her address

ethlehem Central School District Superintendent Jody Monroe went outside the numbers and shared what was stated within the recently released climate survey while she delivered her State of the Schools address.

What was shared in the Feb. 6 school board meeting were the general comments left by students, parents and school staff.

While the BCSD school climate survey results were initially released back on Friday, Feb. 1, the Feb. 6 meeting included more data and confirmed that a total of 3,784 people completed the survey -2,679 of which were grades 5-12 students, 729 were parents, and 376 were staff members. The survey, conducted in December 2018, included 72 questions which asked about school diversity, safety, communication, sense of belonging, attentiveness of staff, and helpfulness of school curriculum and extracurricular activities. Spotlight News covered the survey's statistical findings in a Feb. 6 article, the same day as the meeting but at an earlier time.

Among the concerns elementary school students had included wanting healthier food choices, cleaner restrooms, less bullying and more lunch/ recess time. For middle schoolers, they wanted less homework, nicer lunch aides and for school to start later. High schoolers

were concerned about parking lot improvements, wanting to start school later, how student vaping/ juuling is too common on campus and dress code fairness. One main concern across all grade levels was addressing favoritism/ bias in classes, particularly between girls and boys, and athletes and non-athletes.

Parents, regardless of their children's grade level, generally wanted more direct communication between them and teachers, and to confront favoritism/ bias in class. Notably, parents with elementary school children wanted school to start earlier but those with middle or high school children preferred a later school start time. School staff expressed desire for the district to fix any classroom heating and cooling issues, to maintain more communication with parents, to see more in-school mental health resources, and to address student behavior issues.

The survey was partially meant to better inform the long-term 2019-2024 Strategic Plan, which would outline goals and objectives for the district through the latter year.

Monroe's presentation included how the plan includes four main goals — Academics, Character, Community and Wellness. In respective order, it looks to develop a much stronger curriculum and instruction standards for students and staff; to instill positive model behavior and attitudes as well as embracing student equity

strengthen communication and relationships among parents, schools, staff and the local community; and to provide a healthy and positive learning environment in the schools where students' socioemotional wellness is more considered.

While Monroe added that all BCSD schools were "in good standing" since none has any academically underperforming student subgroups, K-12 enrollment has been projected to gradually decline from now through the 2023-2024 school year, according to the Capital District Regional Planning Commission, from 4,451 in 2018-2019 to 4,154 in 2023-2024

Monroe also mentioned that the 2019-2020 school budget will be up for district residents to

vote on Tuesday, May 21 at the BCHS gym from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. BCSD Chief Financial Officer Judith Kehoe presented the proposed budget, showcasing a preliminary baseline budget gap of \$1.5 million, between \$99.5 million in revenues and \$101 million in expenditures. From now through April, the budget would be tweaked to ensure equity between both sides.

Lastly, two seats at the Board of Education, those of Michael W. Cooper and Jonathan Fishbein, will be up for district election. Their seats expire on June 30 this year and would each be up for a three-year term that will expire on June 30, 2022. Nominating petitions will be available starting on Feb. 25 from District Clerk Brittany Barrett and all petitions are due by Apr. 22 at 5 p.m.

Raptor system interacts with local authorities

hree schools within the Bethlehem Central School District will begin using the new Raptor Visitor Management System, which increases school safety, within the next two weeks.

The Bethlehem Central High School and Middle School implemented it on Monday, Feb. 11 while the Glenmont Elementary School will follow suit on Monday, Feb. 25.

The Raptor Visitor Management System is a new identification system that will require visitors to provide a government-issued piece of identification to prevent random visitors from entering and to compare the information to a nationwide sex offender database. If a match comes up, the school administrators and local police would be alerted. But once the visitor is cleared through the system, he or she would receive a printed visitor badge.

# Bridging the gap

Kehoe first presented the budget at the Board of Education meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 6 at 7 p.m. in the BC High School Library. In a later phone interview, she explained that the district will figure out ways to either lower expenses or raise revenues so that they match. "The key point is closing that gap as we go through weeks of the budgeting review process," she said. "The gap is not anything to be alarmed about as we're pretty much right where we expected to be at this time of year. This is routine and there's always a baseline gap in every proposed budget."

The district looks to meet with officials of different areas or departments from now through spring to further determine how to rework the proposed budget. Examples include meeting with Transportation and Technology on Feb. 27; Athletics, and Operations and Maintenance on Mar. 6; and Instructional Staffing and Programming, Special Education and Student Services on Mar. 20.

The proposed budget also assumes no estimated change regarding school taxes between the 2018-2019 budget and the 2019-2020 one for now—it remains at \$65.8 million. Kehoe explained that it connects with how it's "way too early" to fully determine the estimated impact on taxpayers yet, including what the new tax levy would be. "Whenever we first present the initial proposed budget, we opt to keep it the same as last year's level because we'll let the school board decide on how much of an increase," she said. "They won't know until they go through [the aforementioned departmental] meetings and decide whether to like seek more staffing levels or stop a school program or

For that same reason, the school district does not yet know if it would receive more state aid; Kehoe's presentation estimated that for now, it would get around \$28.2 million for 2019-2020, a slight increase from approximately \$27.9 million in 2018-2019.

The budget's expenditures side would mostly see a slight increase in numbers from last year's, including how salaries are estimated to increase marginally from \$49.7 million (2018-2019) to \$50.8 million; fringe benefits would rise a bit from last year's \$23.5 million to \$23.8 million; and debt service would go from \$11.9 million to \$12.6 million.

During the presentation, Kehoe said that the district's tax calculation would allow the property taxes in Bethlehem to be increased to a maximum of 4.08 percent without needing a super majority vote, although she noted that it does not necessarily mean it indeed would increase to 4.08 percent.

Looking ahead, the district's Board of Education has to adopt a proposed budget by Apr. 17; a public hearing is scheduled at the BCHS Library for May 8 at 7 p.m.; and district residents can vote on it from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. at the BCHS gym on May 21. "It's going to be a good budget year and we'll keep watching the changes at incoming meetings so that we'll have a balanced budget by April," Kehoe concluded.





Cars today, he said, are made better than in decades past. The mechanical parts like the engine and transmission are more solid and whereas cars used to require a tune


up twice a year, spark plugs today will last 60,000 miles





# Comfort in details







Men and women indulge their love of chocolate every February 14, but those who want to go the extra mile for their sweethearts this Valentine's Day can make their own delicacies. Homemade confections send a special message to loved ones on Valentine's Day, especially when they include chocolate, such as the following recipe for "Crochette di Ricotta con Salsa di Cioccolato (Ricotta Beignets With Chocolate Dipping Sauce)" from Michael White and Joanna Pruess' "Fiamma: The Essence of Contemporary Italian Cooking" (Wiley).

# Crochette di Ricotta con Salsa di Cioccolato

# **Ingredients: Makes 6 servings**

- 1 cup whole milk ricotta cheese
- 2 large eggs
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 3/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 cup finely crushed amaretti cookies (about 16 cookies)
- 1 cup chopped bittersweet chocolate

 cup heavy cream
 Vegetable oil, for deep-fat frying
 Confectioners' sugar, for garnish

# **Instructions:**

In a medium-size bowl, whisk the ricotta and eggs together until smooth. Add the sugar, flour, baking powder, and amaretti and stir until well blended. Cover and chill for at least 1 hour.

While the batter is chilling, put the chocolate in a small bowl. In a small saucepan, bring the heavy cream to a boil over medium-high heat, about 2 minutes. Remove the pan from the heat and pour the hot cream over the chopped chocolate, stirring until blended and smooth. Keep warm.

Fill a medium-size pot with at least 3 inches oil and heat until the oil measures about 360 F on a candy or instant-read thermometer. Carefully drop the crochette batter by the heaping tablespoon into the hot oil and cook, turning once, until brown on all sides, about 3 minutes. Using a slotted spoon, remove them from the oil and drain on paper towels. Dust with confectioners' sugar and serve immediately with chocolate sauce. If desired, serve with warm caramel and berry sauces as well.

# You are what you eat, kid



How certain nutrients affect your body

he effects of proper nutrition on the body are profound. When paired with routine exercise, a diet that's rich in nutrients can lay the foundation for a long, healthy life.

Many people are aware that their bodies need nutrients like protein and carbohydrates every day, but they may not know just what these and other important nutrients do for their bodies.

# **Proteins**

The online medical resource WebMD notes that the body uses protein to build and repair tissues. An important component of every cell in the body, protein provides the body with amino acids that help cells in the body perform various functions. Breastcancer.org notes that proteins help the body create hormones and enzymes and keep the immune system healthy. A diet that's low in protein may make people more susceptible to illness and result in longer recovery times.

# **Carbohydrates**

The Cleveland Clinic notes that carbohydrates, or "carbs," are the body's main source of energy. Carbs are found in most foods, but not all carbs are the same. water also helps to energize muscles, which might suffer from fatigue if the body's fluid balance is not maintained. Water also helps the body maintain a healthy temperature.

People consume protein, carbs and water every day. And while they might not know it, people who continue to do so are helping their bodies perform essential functions that dramatically improve their health.

# Love 9 to 5

Barcroft, who is a virtuoso in the aforementioned topics, said she believed that "most concerns are about office romances between a supervisor and a coworker or subordinate," regardless of if it is consensual.

She went on to explain several scenarios that may occur. Other employees may see that the involved subordinate may receive preferential treatment like getting a bigger office, a promotion or larger paycheck; the supervisor may start constantly asking the subordinate out on a date or keep emailing them, which can lead to harassment; the supervisor and subordinate may display overt public displays of affection which can make other employees feel uncomfortable; and if their relationship sours, it can negatively affect their individual work performance and the overall office environment — or worse, result in a lawsuit.

Barcroft said that if a supervisor/ subordinate relationship forms, they should disclose it to the company and Human Resources with the help of a supervisor so that the company can take "proactive measures" down the road. She noted that New York state does not handle specific office dating policies and it's up to companies to individually regulate that. Helpful regulating ways include:

Crafting a company's handbook or list of policies related to office dating and sexual harassment

Having a sexual harassment seminar at work to educate all employees

Ensuring that the dating office couple still act professionally both on and off the clock at work

Subjecting the couple to a company's disciplinary policy if their relationship goes south

Barcroft added that dating office couples should sign a so-called "Love Contract" which further limits the liability of any romantically-involved employees, such as transferring a subordinate from under a supervisor in a lateral move.

Having an office romance is not out of

the norm though since a person is more likely to fall for someone whom they interact with on a regular basis, according to Barcroft, and companies should realize that office romances do happen. When reflecting on how the media projects images of movie or TV show characters, like those in "Grey's Anatomy" where coworkers are often seen getting into relationships, Barcroft said, "I think it's the reality that people will have workplace dating, and TV and film are portraying that reality. As an employer or company, you still should regulate that so that people know their boundaries. The media is not problematic though because as I've said, it shows reality in the workplace."

When asked if office dating policies apply the same to LGBT employees, she agreed, saying that it's the "same principle, regardless of if you're transgender or if it's a male-male or female-female relationship. You can't be discriminated based on your sexual orientation so the rules should not change. Dating is dating."

Overall, Barcroft said that companies, regardless of their sizes, need to be aware of the reality of office romances and tailor their individual policies regarding that and sexual harassment, so that any romantic relationship would not hurt the work environment. "Have a handbook, be proactive, disclose the relationship and always be professional," she concluded.

# Homer is America

Mike Reiss, writer of The Simpsons, spoke at UAlbany

**ALBANY** — Mike Reiss, the longestserving writer and producer for "The Simpsons," joked to a nearly-packed theater on Friday, Feb. 8 that they probably never heard of him before despite having played an essential role in ensuring the TV show's decades-spanning success.




"Bob's Burgers." Owing to the show's international success, he even told several anecdotes about how several countries have either frowned upon or banned the show. "Americans look at Homer Simpson and go, 'That's my dad,'" he said. "And foreigners look at Homer and go, 'That's an American.""

One example was how Japan was reluctant to welcome "The Simpsons" since the characters all have four fingers and the number four is considered bad luck in that country. Another example was how Venezuela canceled the show in 2008 because it allegedly presented "bad American values" but Reiss pointed out the irony that the country then replaced it with reruns of the TV show "Baywatch."

He reminded the audience of the show's

2007 feature film, even singing along to the iconic "Spider-Pig" song, which he quipped was something the writers wrote when they were high. He added that he does not envision more "Simpsons" films down the road although he joked, "I get the feeling that sooner or later, yes, we're going to make another one and another one, and I think we're gonna keep making more until they get loud and boring, and make two more — you know, like Shrek." However, Reiss did tease the idea of a live-action "Simpsons" movie, and said its ideal cast could include Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson, Tom Cruise and William H. Macy.

As the event ended, he smiled and concluded, "I write comedy because I can't help myself," before being received with further applause. He then met with eager fans, took photos and gave out signed authentic "Simpsons" script covers.
