Our town plaza

In an e-commerce world, Delaware Plaza still thrives

BETHLEHEM — When Delaware Plaza first opened in 1973, it prided itself as being the only shopping center in town. But as decades passed, it has persisted through numerous challenges like competition from online shopping, its once-aging infrastructure, and tenant turnover.

But former state Sen. Howard Nolan, 86 — who helped first open the property on 180 Delaware Ave. in Elsmere and is still involved with its business — has remained positive. "Delaware Plaza has always been successful since the '70s so we've been here a long time," he said, adding that it is one of the few locally-owned shopping centers left

in the Capital District.

When asked why the plaza has stayed open, Nolan offered several reasons, "Number one, we've got a great location here on Delaware Avenue and being close to the city of Albany." Second, he said that the area has been undergoing renovations to help revitalize its aesthetic appeal and to attract new tenants and customers. Around \$1 million has been poured into such improvements since 2018, including having added new modern-looking storefronts while sidewalk and possibly parking lot work are expected to commence in the near future. Concerning the former, Nolan's daughter and Delaware Plaza's managing director, Debbie Nolan Murray, chimed in, "Yes, we updated some of our store signs because they're so old so we put them on LED lights now too so it's a lot brighter."

Structure fire in Ravena

RAVENA — Several fire departments responded to the scene of a building on 119 Main St. in Ravena on Saturday, Feb. 16 before noon to discover a stairwell engulfed in flames and thick smoke rising from the third floor.

A water main break also happened nearby on Central Avenue.

Ravena, Coeymans, New Baltimore and Coeymans Hollow fire departments were among those that tended to the fire and served as mutual aid. A Selkirk Fire Department engine arrived on standby at the Coeymans Firehouse while the Westerlo Fire Department was sent to cover for Coeymans Hollow.

Within minutes, the fire was hosed down.

While there was no one inside when the fire broke out, firefighters did rescue a cat from inside which was then cared for at the Ravena Firehouse.

While the cause of the fire remains undetermined, the building is known for having caught on fire once a few years ago, and a building next door still has heat damage from that. Marty Miller / Special to Spotlight News





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School lockout

RAVENA - Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk High School was placed in a lockout for just four minutes sometime on Monday, Feb. 11 but Bethlehem police found no credible threat.

This stemmed from how Bethlehem police had received a report the day prior on Sunday, Feb. 10 where a customer at an undisclosed Glenmont ammunition store thought they overheard a RCS student inquiring about firearms, according to RCS Superintendent Brian Bailey.

The customer then allegedly reported it to the store owner who then notified the Bethlehem police, who then informed RCS district officials.

Bailey described the Monday lockout as how students and staff were not able to leave their classrooms or the campus for security reasons, while police located the student in question. Bethlehem PD Commander Adam Hornick said that the department worked with district officials and an Albany County Sheriff Resource Officer to track the student. "Based on information sent to us, we found him and interviewed him," Hornick said.

Bailey said that the student and his contacted family were "very cooperative" and the police determined that the student actually neither purchased nor asked a store employee about buying any firearms. "We and the police seemed to be satisfied from our

conversation with him," he said, adding that the conversation occurred outside the school complex.

Both Bailey and Hornick agreed that although no threat was found, this was a case where the "see something, say something" mindset succeeded nonetheless. While Hornick confirmed that the investigation closed that same day, he was grateful that the public took precautionary measures and reported to the police.

"Unquestionably, the message about 'see something, say something' has found its way home with many, many people," Bailey concluded. "That has been a part of our world where I think it's a good thing that people are responsible, and not overreacting, are asking good questions and paying attention."

Walmart larceny

BETHLEHEM - Bethlehem police responded to the Glenmont Walmart store on Wednesday, Jan. 9 at 8 a.m. due to a report that a female employee was caught stealing money from her register for the past few weeks prior.

Shannon Lea McDonald, 42, of Ravena, was placed in custody after the store manager said they realized just in early January that one of the registers had been missing money. Police determined that McDonald took the money whenever she was closing the department, stealing \$2,556.67 in total. She was transported to the Bethlehem Police Department without

incident where she was processed and released on an appearance ticket.

McDonald was charged with a grand larceny felony and has a return court date of Mar. 5 at 5:30 p.m.

While interviewing Rachel M. Schaible, the officer noted a strong odor of alcohol from her breath, her bloodshot eyes and slurred speech. After explaining that she had one beer, she was told to exit the vehicle and agreed to do field sobriety tests which she failed.

She was then placed in custody and transported to the BPD where she was charged with operating a motor vehicle with a BAC of 0.08 percent or more, a DWI and having insufficient tail lights.

Police: more calls in 2017 than 2016

Bethlehem police released 2017 annual report

BETHLEHEM — The Bethlehem Police Department received around 23,300 phone calls in 2017, an increase of roughly 1,200 from 2016's 22,100, according to its 2017 annual report released in early February 2019.

The report offered statistical data and insight into what the BPD accomplished and how many incidents it worked in 2017.

When analyzing phone calls made each day of the week, Sunday saw the fewest at 2,420 while the rest of the week each crossed over the 3,000 threshold and averaged at 3,325 calls.

On each day of the week, the vast majority of phone calls, around 3,000, were made in daytime, but calls made on each weeknight remained just below 400. Furthermore, 48 percent of the total estimated 23,300 phone calls, or 11,184 calls, were made in the day; 40 percent or 9,320 calls were in the afternoon; and the remaining 12 percent or 2,796 calls were at night.

"Phone calls made to us are not just about crime, that's something most people don't recognize," said Bethlehem Police Chief Louis Corsi. "This is a full-service police department and day shifts are primarily for service-oriented calls mostly. Afternoons are complaints and nights are crimes in progress. So, you get a lot of work in the day shifts, supporting ambulance calls, various calls for service and traffic accidents."

He added that people usually make complaint calls in the

evening time since that's when people come home from work to find out something happened in the house, for instance.

BPD investigated 2,184 offenses in town in 2017, 183 more than 2016's 2,001 figure. Such offenses included kidnapping, robbery, arson, bribery, driving under the influence, drug/narcotic violations, and impersonation.

Among the highestcommitted offenses were 188 simple assaults, 177 shoplifting cases and 148 incidents of damaged or vandalized property.

BPD conducted 8,166 motor vehicle stops in 2017, an increase of 2,277 from 2016's 5,889 figure. 3,606 traffic arrests were made in 2017, which was 1,245 more than 2016's 2,361 amount. Cell phone usage while driving also spiked up to 256, 172 more than in 2016, whereas DWI arrests rose slightly to 56 in 2017, just six more than 50 in 2016.

Also, 2016 and 2017 each saw BPD handling just one fatal vehicular accident.

BPD's Animal Control received 1,350 calls in 2017, a slight increase from 1,389 in 2016, which handled incidents including animal cruelty, lost animals and animal bites. In 2017, BPD had just one full-time Animal Control officer but has since hired an additional parttime officer to help. "You wouldn't believe how many calls for service that Animal Control takes, and it's a service that's in high demand in town," Corsi said. Corsi also said that while all the numbers may appear high, "They're not that high and I think that Bethlehem is a safe place to live in overall. But we're not immune to crime but we're fortunate we have a very well-seasoned staff. They

do an excellent job and we're

maintaining as great as we can." BPD had also continued teaching educational programs to elementary, middle and high school students in the Bethlehem Central School District, those in A.W. Becker Elementary School in the Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk School District, and at St. Thomas the Apostle Parochial School.

It had a Family Services Unit, consisting of three Detectives, two School Resource Officers and a Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) Officer, who were all assigned to specific schools.

This collective effort aimed to continue strengthening relations with the school communities, investigating family issues at risk, and showcasing numerous childsafety presentations. Examples of in-school programs concerned topics that included internet safety, bicycle and pedestrian safety, and Halloween safety.

BPD also held similar community presentations for Bethlehem residents which focused on subjects like crimes against the elderly, school safety geared towards parents, and fingerprinting.

Believing that maintaining communication with students and residents in town is invaluable, Corsi said, "There have been a lot of negative connotations nationwide now that come with police officers but we're just regular people and we like to interact with the people here. Openness, honesty and compassion are extremely important in this line of work. We strive to attain that with every opportunity."

When asked if he had one message to the public about the Bethlehem Police Department, Corsi said, "It's an honor to serve the community and we strive to do the very best as we can, within our budget constraints. The officers do a really good job and these are the finest group of individuals I've had the pleasure of working with and they're very talented. We're here for you and if you need anything, please don't hesitate to call us."

Bethlehem to buy eight acres of land

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BETHLEHEM — The Bethlehem Town Board voted unanimously during its Feb. 13 meeting to formally move forward with acquiring eight acres of land, located near the intersection of Route 9W and Wemple Road in Glenmont, from the Albany County Land Bank.

Town Supervisor David VanLuven was authorized to sign the contract and other relevant documents pertaining the purchase which costs just \$1. This does include recording and closing costs of \$762.

According to town documents, "the Town will place a deed restriction on the parcel so that it will never be developed for residential, commercial or industrial purposes, which will benefit the adjacent neighborhoods." This all connects with how town officials believe this is one way to conserve land while development continues throughout Bethlehem.

For now, the parcel comprises of 3.5 acres of constructed wetlands, 0.75 acres of natural wetlands, and 3.75 acres of upland forest and scrub. While it is landlocked, it is accessible by a 40-foot wide easement from Wemple Road. Plans for the parcel include protecting its wildlife habitat, ensuring water quality protection and possibly walking trails or recreational amenities for residents to enjoy.

Town Board member Dan Coffey wondered if there were any other plans for it but Bethlehem's Economic Development and Planning director Robert Leslie confirmed, "For now, we'll keep it as it is. At some point, if we have a desire to put in some trails, we'll have that conversation with the board and certainly the Parks [and Recreation] Department. But nothing to be had at this time."

ACLB had previously accepted Bethlehem's application to purchase it back on Nov. 27, 2018.

ACLB executive director Adam Zaranko had spoken about this in a Feb. 7, 2019 conservation-themed event at the Five Rivers Environmental Education Center, saying that the Town of Bethlehem had first reached out to ACLB about their interest in the parcel. He added that had this parcel gone to auction, it most likely would have gone to the highest bidder like a developer.

"Under our relationship with Albany County, we control the flow of the property to make sure we get the highest and best use or outcome for it, which is not always necessarily the highest bidder or a developer there is," Zaranko

said.

"When this opportunity first came to our attention, we jumped on it because it's mostly surrounded by agriculture today," VanLuven recounted. "In 10 to 30 years, there's a good chance it can be an oasis of nature and residential developments. Parks are a vital part of our town character and we need to be looking at developing them, not just for our needs today but also for our needs in the future." He continued by expressing gratitude for the \$1 figure and ACLB's co-operation.

Town Board member Jim Foster also recognized this as a financially responsible way to preserve open space and that it is a "win-win-win across the board." He correlated this with how the topics of conservation and development have long been discussed among officials and residents alike, and that this was a positive step forward.

Eagles falls short of perfection

The Brothers play the spoiler; Eagles look to post season

BETHLEHEM — On Wednesday, Feb. 13, the final game of the season, CBA handed The Eagles their first loss by a score of 65-54.

The previously undefeated Eagles came into Wednesday's game looking to put a cap on the regular season and complete the first undefeated season in program history.

Jordan King, who led all scorers with 27, and the rest of CBA's team were not backing down. The Brothers took a four-point lead into the half, and King had eight points in the third and went 10 for 10 from the line in the fourth to help put the game out

of reach.

"I just think our guys played their hearts out tonight and were able to overcome many weapons," said CBA Coach Dave Doemel.

CBA started the game strong with a quick three-point shot, followed by great defense, forcing turnovers and blocking shots.

The Eagles offense flowed through Eric Salo in the first quarter, as he converted three of three shots for six points.

Bethlehem's players were selfless on offense, sharing the ball and racking up tallies in the assist column, yet for every point Bethlehem converted, The Brothers retaliated with offense of

their own. At the end of the first quarter the game was tied at 18 points.

The Eagles could not get their offense into the game to start the second quarter, going scoreless for the first 3:24 until Michael Ortale converted a shot off the glass.

Junior Guard Zach Zonca kept Bethlehem in the game, hitting back to back three pointers for The Eagles. He followed those up with tough defense, forcing a turnover with one minute left in the half, which he converted for two points, to keep The Eagles within four points headed into the break.

Bethlehem started the third quarter strong. Forced turnovers led to quick points off fast breaks. Jake Laclair continued to find the open man for The Eagles, and after a three from Zonca, The Eagles were able to regain the

lead for the first time since early in the first quarter.

CBA continued strong play throughout the entire second half with excellent defense. Peter O'Toole had a strong third quarter with seven points including a clutch three to stop Bethlehem's run.

King went 12 for 12 from the free throw line while O'Toole had 14 points and Drew Signor had 13. Mike Murray had five, Hagen Foley had four and Vincent Tirino had two to round out scoring for The Brothers.

Salo had 16 points to lead Bethlehem, while Zonca had 13 and Ortale chipped in a dozen. Pat Ryan had seven, Will Davis had four and Justin Barnes had two for The Eagles.

'We had to execute and we did not play well," said Bethlehem Coach AG Irons. "We learned what

Hopelessly defining Delmar and its boundaries

f your zip code is 12054, you may live in Delmar. Excuse me if Jeff Foxworthy's voice crept into your head while reading that. The truth is, people around here are quick to say they live in Delmar when, in fact, they may not.

For many residents, it's the go-to answer for when they're asked, "where do you live?" Geographically, Delmar is the center of Bethlehem. Demographically, it's the largest hamlet with a zip code.

Therein lies the rub.

settle for Glenmont. We've done that, too.

The crux to this identity crisis involves two factors; zip codes and elementary schools. We either associate ourselves with our mailing addresses or the schools in which our children attend. Slingerlands has both a zip code and an elementary school, as does Glenmont. Selkirk doesn't share its name with an elementary school, but it does with Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk School District. Delmar carries the distinction of owning a zip code, but no school. Conversely, Elsmere has an elementary school which stands prominently in the center of town on Delaware Avenue. However, it has no zip code. See what I did there? Residents of "Old

School House as references. Bethlehem," a term reserved for those whose Out of frustration, you may

families trace back generations before the turn of the 19th century, can and will correct you on the boundaries of this town's many hamlets. It's a trait Bethlehem Town Historian Susan Leath detailed in the prologue of her first book. The rule of thumb; when measuring out where one hamlet begins and another ends, don't depend on the U.S. Postal Service. She remembers when Haswell

Farms was developed off of Feura Bush Road, developers wanted it to fall under the Delmar zip code.

Leath said the lines that separate these pockets of town are less defined than those stitched onto your blue jeans. They are ambiguous, except to those who wish to find them. Her Elm Estates home has a Selkirk address, though she's more than a ten-minute drive away.

Physically, she said, she's closer to Delmar. She shrugs her shoulders and smiles.

'Dull'mar no more

The sleepy little hamlet has developed a nightlife of its own

DELMAR — The rise of a few key pubs, restaurants and bars around the Four Corners in Delmar within the past four years has helped to contribute to the town's nightlife scene, a sentiment shared across each establishment's owners.

The surrounding Four Corners area, located at the intersection of Kenwood and Delaware avenues, witnessed the openings of Twisted Vine Wine & Tap, the Real McCoy Beer Co., and O'Slattery's in 2015. These businesses, among others like Swifty's, have

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attracted customers both from within and out of town, with the help of their central locations and being near the Albany County Rail Trail.

However, when asked if Delmar has a flourishing nightlife scene, responses varied slightly.

"I think Delmar does have a great nightlife scene because there are a lot of activities going on around town," said Liam Slattery, who co-owns O'Slattery's with his wife, Jackie. He said that O'Slattery's, an Irish pub and restaurant on 318 Delaware Ave., offers multiple events and activities to attract customers throughout the week, like Paint and Sip on Monday nights, Trivia Night on Tuesdays, and live music from Wednesdays through Saturdays.

"Our side of it is about entertainment and activity around the nighttime and I think people in Delmar feel done by midnight which is fine too," he said. "If you're busy from 5 o'clock til midnight, it's just as good as being busy from 9 at night to 4 in the morning."

Alex Scher, co-owner of the Real McCoy Beer Co., a brewery located on 20 Hallwood Road, said he believed that the Delmar nightlife scene is "still growing because the places around here are relatively new like O'Slattery's and Twisted Vine." He added that the brewery's space expanded in 2018 by annexing the building next door which previously belonged to a woodworker, "We took over and connected the two buildings, so now we're a

bit bigger. So that's helped with accommodating much larger crowds."

Co-owner Mike Bellini said another way it has attracted customers was the creation of the Mug Club, similar to a loyalty program where members who join receive larger beers, which he believed has created a sense of community there.

Brendan McCann, co-owner of Twisted Vine Wine & Tap on 384 Kenwood Ave., believed that Delmar has a "communityoriented nightlife. The establishments here share a lot of the same customers. The nightlife scene — or dinner scene or restaurant scene, or whatever you wanna call it — has probably prospered because of having three or four

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restaurants located close together. When you walk into O'Slattery's, you'll probably recognize some people and if you walk to another place in town, it's probably the same deal." He added that when looking at nearby nightlife bars or restaurants, he does not view them as competition but rather as "an asset to each other's business and we've said that community is our philosophy."

Co-owner Daniel Casey brought up how one way Twisted Vine has contributed to Delmar's nightlife is having special events like "A Night in Italy" back on Saturday, Feb. 16, which includes a five-course meal with Italian food and wine, with presentations on each food and wine type, and desserts from Perfect Blend Cafe & Bakery

— McCann and Casey co-own this establishment too next door. McCann also said they change the establishment's menu "probably four or five times a year to keep it fresh" and showcase live music at least once a week whenever the weather warms up.

The three establishments also take part in celebrating certain major annual events like St. Patrick's Day and Oktoberfest. Slattery said that O'Slattery will observe Parade Day and St. Patrick's Day on Saturday, Mar. 16 and Sunday, Mar. 17 respectively, "and on both days, we have live music and entertainment, as we also will do our traditional Irish food."

McCann noted that Twisted Vine has their annual SpringFest and FallFest which he said are a lot to put on and stem from both his own and Casey's personal love for music. "It's been getting bigger every year and just the support we've been getting is a lot of fun," McCann said.

When planning for annual or special events, Scher said that the Real McCoy Beer Co. has continued to try communicating with other local businesses to coordinate events on similar days and to also not clash on other certain days. "Oktoberfest is probably one of our biggest times here and we changed our normal sales procedure by selling beer tickets so that when people finally came to the bar, it'll be an easy transition because if you had a ticket, you'd pick up a beer," he recalled from last year. "And it was really nice weather, we had all the doors open and tables out. We had some food vendors like Cider Belly Doughnuts too."

As more customers frequent their establishments, safety was another general topic brought up. While Bellini said

that customers find the



Real McCoy Beer Co. as a "very relaxed and supportive atmosphere," Slattery said he believed the Delmar nightlife scene is "safe 100 percent, and I've spent 17 years in New York City so Delmar is a very good community where everybody knows everybody." Both McCann and Casey also believed Delmar is "pretty" safe and walkable at night, and they confirmed that their employees were trained

last year to handle any suspicious activity within Twisted Vine, like signs of sexual harassment and unruly behavior.

When asked if they each had any messages they'd like to say to the public, positivity exuded across the table.

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Legacy in a catalog

Sears Moden Homes shaped towns a century ago, and draw todays' homeseekers

DELMAR — Judi Gabler looks over the website of a modular home manufacturer, admiring the modern fixtures featured in the picture.

"It's crazy," she said. "It looks like," she said, catching herself before saying *a house*. As silly as it would have sounded, no one would doubt her ability to recognize the value of a home, let alone to identify one. Gabler Realty, LLC, of which she is broker-owner, negotiated approximately \$58 million worth of real estate transactions last year. She was a top-selling realtor at one of the largest regional firms in the country before branching out on her own more than a year ago. Today, she sees the modular home as a way to sell land.

"It's easier for us to sell vacant land if we can show people what they can put on it, and how affordable it can be," she said. Another click of her mouse conjures a catalog of models ranging from one-story bungalows to two-story ranches. Each of the homes, regardless of the model, is built in

sections, then shipped off and assembled.

The principal concept of ordering a house from a catalog and having it delivered from miles away is not new. Sears, Roebuck and Company started something similar more than a century ago.

"It's very much like a Sears Home," said Gabler.

Sears

The Sears name was once synonymous with quality when it possessed a stronghold on consumer confidence with household goods. But, as more agile companies embraced e-commerce practices, Sears became less visible and less profitable.

Last year, Sears earned headlines when it filed for

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2001. Like Wards, Sears was founded at the dawn of America's consumer age of the late 19th century. The Chicago-based retailer developed a connection with people through its catalog, which included everything from sewing machines to automobiles. At more than 500 pages, the catalog ironically provided Americans a broad selection of items at a discount, challenging local store shops of the day. In 1908, the store included

Montgomery Wards in

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ready-to-assemble kit houses.

Kit Houses

Sears offered kit houses in its popular catalog in 1908 to address suffering sales in its building materials department. So, instead of selling parts by themselves, the retailer offered a kit: all the pieces you would need to build a house. In that first year, 44 different models were features, with a price range between \$360 and \$2,890 (or \$9,849.60 to \$79,070.40 in 2019 U.S. dollars). Four years later, Sears started offering mortgages.

Pieces for each home would be delivered in boxcars. Depending on the model, there would be 10,000 to 30,000 pieces that addressed everything but the kitchen sink. Indoor plumbing, heating and electricity could be purchased at an additional cost. According to

Rosemary Thornton, author in about 90 days." of "The Houses That Sears Built," Sears promised that, with the aid of a 75-page instruction manual, "a man of average abilities could assemble a Sears kit home

Sales of Sears Modern Homes peaked before the Great Depression. Sears jumped out of the mortgage business once it was forced to liquidate more than \$11

million of defaulted loans in 1934. By 1940, kit homes no longer appeared in the Sears catalog. In all, more than 370 different models

were offered, and more than 70,000 homes were built

throughout the United States, predominantly in the Northeast. Coincidentally, Sears offered a five-bedroom, one-bathroom two-story model in 1924 named "The Delmar."

"I know I have talked to folks who have said, 'oh, yes. I have a Sears House." said Susan Leath, Bethlehem's town historian. "They're proud of it. It's the concept of your house arriving [by train]. The whole thing, that you go in a catalog and fill out a form. I don't know if a salesman came in, but I find the whole thing intriguing.'

Several houses across Olde Delmar have been identified as Sears Modern Homes. A "Concord" model resides on Adams Place. A "New Haven" model, with its distinguished front door archway, can be found on Hawthorne Avenue.

However, Thornton states on her website that many people who claim they own a Sears Modern

Home may be misguided. Sears was not the only retailer to offer catalog ordered homes. Ward was just one of several other competitors who offered similar homes. There are a few features that distinguish a Sears Modern Home from others. You can look for unique column arrangements on the front porch or stamped numbers or shipping labels adhered to lumber. Grantor records at the local courthouse may reveal a Sears mortgage.

If a Sears Modern Home is listed for sale, Gabler said she will state it as such in the home's description.

"I think it's charming," she said. "People tend to know that Sears-built houses were good quality. They had a history. It's fun to be able to see the floor plan as it was ordered and the features they had selected. I think it's nostalgic."

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Best kept secrets

A ballroom under the former Bank of Bethlehem holds secrets of its own

DELMAR — Under a set of stairs quietly tucked away in a corner of a bank lobby, a hidden room has a story to tell.

Looking at the old Bank of Bethlehem, located at 343 Delaware Ave., it looks like a normal bank building. Having housed at least four banks since the building was assembled, the lobby boasts a bunch of counters, an empty, open bank vault and a place for waiting. Across the room from the counters, longvacant offices sit silently. The building is dark, dingy and abandoned. As Berkshire Hathaway continues to market the land, the doors remain locked.

However, I had the opportunity of getting into the building. The secret lies at the bottom of the hidden stairs to the left of the lobby, to the left, and down a cement hallway. Down a few more stairs, the realtor turned his phone flashlight on and looked at me. "This is it," he said. "This is where the ballroom was."

A checkered floor is hidden under a few inches of water. Five wroughtiron chandeliers hang from the ceiling, dusty but still functional. The walls are cement, but white adhesive is still attached methodically. The crusty paste once held mirrors to the walls, giving the room a taste of elegance.

There are no windows and no outside light; only the light from our phones gave us the ability to see around. An extra vault is on the far left wall. Long emptied, the door is open.

Another exit leads out the back. The room is not big, but not small; it lies underneath where the drive-thru now is.

The secret room gives no hints as to what it once was, however, it tells the story well; things happened here. This was a room that was used. This was a room that entertained people.

History doesn't lend itself too well. Records were not kept of this room. Most locals don't even know the room is there, and those who do are unsure what it was used for. We do know about the beginning.

The building began as the Bank of Bethlehem, opening in 1928 at the height of the Prohibition era, according to Bethlehem Town Historian Susan Leath's book, "Historic Tales of Bethlehem, New York." Plans for the building were created by Galen H. Nichols, and construction was done by the C.V. Soule Company of Delmar in about five months. D.A. Bennett owned the land and was a director of the bank when it opened. Bennett and a business partner started the bank because there were no local banks at the time; all banking was located in Albany and was about a day's journey. "Historic Tales" cites the bank as a source of charming, historic ads for a local newspaper.

In 1937, the bank was acquired by the National Commercial Bank and Trust, according to "Historic Tales." NCB&T traces its history back to 1825 when it was chartered by Gov. Dewitt Clinton as the Commercial Bank of Albany. The bank adopted the KeyBank name in 1979.

The ballroom was possibly used as early as 1928 by a fraternal organization called the Improved Order of the Red Men. The Redmen, as they were commonly called, often put on dances at a hall once located at 10 Hallwood Road, right behind the bank building. The dances date back to 1890, Thomas Drake, the grandson of D.A. Bennett, said.

"The Redmen would use the dance hall on Hallwood for functions," Drake said. "We're unsure if they ever used the room under the bank."

Along with the dances, the organization would perform new member ceremonies, minstrel shows and banquets. While The Redmen did not have a Delmar chapter, there were several active ones in Albany at the time, David Lintz, Director of the Red Men Museum and Library, said.

"The use of the ballroom under the bank would depend on what it had that the other locations did not," Lintz explained. "It was very common for the group to hold private parties in rooms like these."

What these private parties consisted of is unclear. The Redmen, still in existence today, "are a non-profit organization devoted to inspiring a greater love for the United States of America and the principles of American liberty," according to the official website. "Along with our women's auxiliary, the Degree of Pocahontas, we support various charitable, vouth, and educational programs."

Dances and functions for the organization were well documented at the time in question, and a search will yield several events located in the area. None that we could find mentioned the room.

It's impossible to say if alcohol was involved in any of the functions during Prohibition; however, it would not be uncommon for this to happen in the area. The Home Lawn Hotel, once located in Slingerlands, was a known location for imbibing. The hotel was closed in 1922 after a local was killed by a drunk driver who drank at the hotel. After the death, residents called the hotel





a "public nuisance" and called for its closure, according to "Historic Tales." The judge agreed and ultimately ordered the proprieter, Albert Kientz, to shut the doors.

Former Assemblyman Jack McEneny called Delmar a "straight-laced, Protestant town" at the time, but did not know of the room. Albany historian and author William Kennedy did not know of the ballroom at all. Of the 15-plus sources we talked to, nobody could even venture an educated guess on what else the room could have been used for during the unaccounted-for years.

As the bank evolved, whispers of a "meeting room" float around, used by the bank for parties and meetings. Unfortunately, no concrete records of any functions at 343 Delaware have been found in the week of research done. Drake said he found the blueprints for the bank, dated 1955, which show the room.

Many years later the exact date is unclear — the room was used as a temporary home for a local church, Meyers Funeral Home owner Ben Meyers said. Meyers recalled the church used to call him for floral arrangements as needed. He also was a teller at the bank while it was under the KeyBank umbrella, the third bank to inhabit the space.

"It was a church for about a year," Meyers said. "There were mirrors on the walls and I remember a mural that used to be there. I believe that Glenmont Community Church rented the space until they got into their new building."

Drake recalls something similar to a church using the room but does not remember what church it was or for how long it was there.

Meyers added those who attended the services had to come in the back door, which leads right into the ballroom. Anyone who used the room could not use the staircase located in the bank lobby, he continued.

After the church moved out, the room seems to have been incorporated as storage. While Leath and other Bethlehem officials refer to it as a "ballroom," it's unclear how many, if any, balls were ever held there.

District, which stretches across the street. A 1930 insurance map, however, sheds light on another facet of our story. Sanborn Map Company defines a border that splits down the middle of present day Delsmere Avenue.

The former railroad helps define a portion of Delmar's Northern border as it cross over Delaware Avenue. Motorists driving to and from the Four Corners now see road signs before the old Delaware and Hudson rail bridge that depict which hamlet they are entering. From this intersection, Delmar's eastern boarder extends due north to the Normanskill where Bethlehem's town line meets Albany's city limit.

Delmar's western border is another point of contention. Sanborn, dependent upon the fire districts between Delmar and Slingerlands, dissects Kenwood Avenue just east of Homestead Avenue. The line runs southwest from the Normanskill to just beyond Cherry Avenue. The border splits Cherry Avenue nearly halfway between where it intersects with Orchard and Delaware avenues.

A look on Google Maps, however, indicates a more defined line between Slingerlands and Delmar. From the Normanskill, McCormack Road North separates the two hamlets until it intersects with Cherry Avenue. Delmar's western border then follows the length of both Cherry and Elm avenues.

Another border was established shortly after

the opening of the Delmar Bypass in 1963. When the highway was installed, it created a divide. Residents along Feura Bush Road continue to own a Delmar zip code. The Delmar Fire Department maintains a station near the intersection of Elm Avenue and Feura Bush Road. Online, Google Maps uses the bypass as Delmar's southern border as it extends from Elm Avenue back to Elsmere Avenue.

Leath doesn't agree with some of the borders, but she's not quick to correct it either.

"It's really how people use the name, modernly," said Leath. "Modernly, those people would say, 'oh, no. I live in Delmar. Even though our kids go to Glenmont [Elementary].' It's always vague. It doesn't matter. I don't think it does. The matter, the boundary of the town of Bethlehem, I think that matters."

Thirdly, Nolan brought up how he and Delaware Plaza have maintained a positive relationship with Bethlehem's government and residents alike. Nolan, a Democrat himself, was a state Senator from 1974 to 1994, being known for winning over the thenmostly Republican Town of Bethlehem in 1983 which had never seen an elected Democrat in 188 years prior.

Nolan said that up to around a decade ago, all of the town supervisors were Republican and yet, "We still worked with them and it never became a political issue between Democrats and Republicans. It's all because we were all interested in seeing the town do well for the sake of the people living here. We've always worked very closely trying to be good citizens, and by the same token, they've always been very fair to us, regardless of party. But we never got involved politically." He added that it would be detrimental to ever have a "confrontational approach" to the town government; instead, he believed in maintaining cooperation between the plaza, town officials and residents.

A fourth reason is how Delaware Plaza has welcomed new tenants who have long stayed in the plaza over the years since Nolan said that most of the original tenants since 1973 have either left or moved to a new location within the property. Examples of current businesses include Delmar Bistro, Verizon, Yan's Chinese Buffet, Shalimar Restaurant, and Bruegger's Bagels. "That goes to show how much we value our longtime tenants here and how they value us as landlords," said Murray. "One of the first things my dad ever taught me was,

'If a tenant is successful, then you're successful.' So we pride ourselves with really working with our tenants and getting to know them, and the new facades also helped enhance their businesses and stay competitive."

"The more people that work here at the plaza, it provides more customers for the remaining stores so it's important that we keep it full of tenants," Nolan said. "If you also have a mix of different types of tenants, there are more services to the community." Murray also said that customers can find it convenient to park their cars and explore the stores since they are all located door-to-door.

Among the stores is The Paper Mill, a Hallmark Gold Crown store which offers Hallmark cards, gifts and ornaments, and is managed by Lauri Mendleson. Saying that her parents first owned the store three decades ago, Mendleson credited the plaza's central location, Hallmark's positive reputation as a company, and the support from Bethlehem residents for having kept her business running for so long.

However, she noted that online shopping has become one of Hallmark's bigger issues nowadays but she believed that "customers love to still come into

the store and feel the product and browse and look at the merchandise and get ideas. I mean, how else can you get ideas? I find from my conversations with many of my customers who also say, 'Please don't leave,' that it's harder to do that online." She said Bethlehem residents have realized that in order to enjoy local businesses, they need to physically come over. Todd Yutzler, co-

owner of Upstate Wine & Spirits Company, said that it has been at the plaza since 1967, and was then known as the Delaware Plaza Liquor Store, even predating Nolan and his business colleagues purchasing the overall property in 1973. The establishment then moved just two doors down into a larger location within Delaware Plaza in January 2016.

When asked how it faces competitors like online shopping and other similar businesses, Yutzler said that it keeps up by offering stellar customer service, having a rewards program — a member earns two points for every \$1 they spend - which has over 5,000 members now, setting competitive prices and it has recently launched a new website at www. upstatewine.com. "With this new website, if things start to get crazy, maybe we'll have to take over another area just for shipping but right now, no, we'll stay here," he added, also expressing gratitude to the loyal customer base so far.

These examples are how Nolan said he believes Delaware Plaza will continue to thrive. "The more supportive the tenants, the town and residents are, it was better for us," he concluded. "So it's a good marriage."

Money from nothin'

Understanding the bitcoin phenomenon

he going rate of bitcoins continues to rise. As of September 2017, one bitcoin was equal to nearly \$4,000 USD and \$4,900 Canadian, according to the CoinDesk calculator. Considering bitcoin is such a highly valued yet volatile form of currency, many people have questions as to how bitcoins were created and how they are used.

Bitcoin is a relatively new currency that was created in 2009 by an anonymous person (or group) using the alias Satoshi Nakamoto. Bitcoins are produced and traded in the virtual world. In a relatively short period of time, bitcoins went from being worth pennies to thousands of dollars. Unlike other forms of currency, which are controlled by a central authority of a particular country, bitcoins are completely virtual.

How to get bitcoins

Bitcoins are not acquired in the same way as other currencies. Bitcoins can be bought and sold in marketplaces called "bitcoin exchanges." These online trading areas enable people to buy and sell bitcoins using various currencies, says CNN Money. Similarly, people can send bitcoins to one another using mobile apps or a computer, much like one would make digital transfers at a bank.

Bitcoins are not based on gold or another backing currency, but rather on mathematics. Instead of a federal reserve deciding on when to print and distribute money, bitcoins are created as a reward for mining. "Mining" involves a special open source software that is designed to solve math problems. As a reward for solving these problems, people are rewarded with bitcoins. This creates an incentive for people to mine.

Bitcoin mining is designed to require exertion and take time so that the rate resembles the rate at which commodities



like gold would be mined from the ground, offers Bitcoinmining.com. According to ABC News, available bitcoins are hidden amid a complex encrypted computer program. Users' computers work around the clock to solve a complicated mathematical problem in order to release new coins. The system requires more work to get coins as time goes by.

How are bitcoins stored

Bitcoins are stored in a digital bitcoin wallet. Only 21 million bitcoins can be found by miners so the value of the system is preserved. To date, not all bitcoins have been mined. Every bitcoin transaction is completely transparent, which means they can be traced back to creation. The "block chain" is a public ledger where every bitcoin transaction that has ever taken place is registered.

Anonymity

Even though bitcoin transactions are recorded publicly, the names of buyers and sellers are never revealed. Only a wallet ID is recorded. This enables bitcoin users to buy or sell anything without it being traced back to them. While many legitimate businesses now accept bitcoins, bitcoins also are highly valued for black market ventures like purchasing drugs and illegal weapons.

Bitcoins are changing the way people see money and store their private wealth. The concept decentralizes money and makes the bitcoin exchange a relatively transparent process.

Michael Hallisey: You've got to be feeling strong. I'm going over your Twitter feed, and you have a lot of people coming out in support for you. How does that feel?

Dane Cook: It's so funny. Every time, as a comedian, you get past say, a special or an album, you're a new comedian again. It's basically going back to basics. Back to the open mic of it all. New ideas, new premises, and at the same time, an evolution in your life. Our tastes change. Our perspective changes. So, you're always a little bit — really — peeking out, because you're hoping that the comedy is going to be well-received, like, fortunately, it has been in the past.

So, last year, what I did a secret, underground tour. I didn't promote. It was just a lot of interesting locations that I never happened upon before. And, what I found was — what was so thrilling was — as I was approaching 29 years this year, people were coming up to me after these shows, or emailing or DMing me, and saying, 'hey, I've been a fan. [...] I was at Madison Square. I was at a show you did in Miami at The Improv.' And, a lot of them were saying, 'this show exceeded my expectations.' And, when you start hearing that, it really gives you the incentive to go out there, put a label on it, and do a largescale tour. And, after about two and a half years of working on this, we're ready to go.

Hallisey: You wrote this beautiful post on your Instagram account, and I'm picking up that you're being a little introspective. You admit you've been doing this for almost three decades now. Are you feeling old now?

Cook: I don't know if we ever as comedians... I know I don't feel any different, from when I first started doing comedy. What's really incredible is, I've been friends with some of the legendary comedians from many, many years down the road. Jerry Lewis being one of them, who I was very close with. A mentor and a friend. And, here was a guy, 90 years old and still had a boyish enthusiasm. So, I think there's always a little fountain of youth element in doing stand up. I don't feel any different, but I've obviously have experienced different things. And, having been through high highs and low lows, I've got more to pull from in the minutiae of life to be able to observe and report. So, I feel great. I don't feel like... I'll tell you what. When I wake up in the morning, I'm as enthusiastic as I've ever been to face the day, and to get on stage at night, if that answers your question.

Hallisey: Obviously, just reading your posts and everything that's happened in the past week alone, I can pick up your attitude and how you're excited about the upcoming tour. Tell me a little about it. Because what I'm hearing is that people want to attribute the word 'comeback' for you. I know that's not how you want to define it, but I definitely see something more along the lines of a change. You made reference to a George Carlin act a recent *Hollywood Reporter* article, in which he made a change in his routine.

Cook: Yeah, it's kind of funny, because when people say, 'is it a comeback?' I say, 'if I had become a carpenter for the last five years, and had been nowhere near a comedy club, I would say that would be a comeback.'

Truth be told, it was more of a sit back moment. I just wanted to sit back. Live my life. Fall in love. Get past all the hardships I had experienced. About ten years I went through a lot of capsizing moments in my life. All in a row, like at a very strange time. I was reaching this superstardom, but at the same time, I was at this personal strife with my life. I lost both my parents to cancer. I lost my brother because I put him in jail. He had taken all this money from me. It was a terrible, spiraling time. Eventually, when I came out of that, and I started forming my stand up, I felt I had an obligation. Before I go out there and put my name on something, I want to make sure it's the best that I can be at this point right now.

So, two things, to answer your question. It definitely felt more like, for me, my trajectory. I always knew this was not going to be a quick run. It's going to be a marathon. And, also accepting the fact that a career, like life, is filled with times when the phone is ringing off the hook and times when it's not ringing at all. That's when it's your obligation to pick up the phone and start making it ring somewhere else, piecing together the new articles you need to present where you're at now in your life. So, going through all that, and

hicken is a versatile food that can be served in various ways. Many cultures have their own unique takes on chicken, and each of those takes gives poultry a distinct flavor.

Foodies who want a northwestern United States take on poultry can try the following recipe for "Chicken Breasts with Roasted Red Peppers, Hedgehog Mushrooms and Truffled Cheese" courtesy of Jill Lightner's "Edible Seattle: The Cookbook" (Sterling Epicure).

Chicken Breasts with Roasted Red Peppers, Hedgehog Mushrooms and Truffled Cheese

Ingredients: Makes 4 servings

For the roasted red peppers:

- 2 red bell peppers
- 2 cloves garlic
- 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil Freshly ground black pepper



For the stuffed chicken breasts: 4 honeless, skinless, chicken breasts

- 4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts
 3/4 stick (6 tablespoons) unsalted butter
- 1/4 pound hedgehog mushrooms
- 3 to 4 ounces truffled cow's milk cheese Salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 3/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 tablespoons olive oil

Instructions:

1. Move the top oven rack so it's about 5 inches from the broiler element. Preheat the broiler and line a baking sheet with aluminum foil. Place the whole peppers on the sheet and broil, turning them every few minutes, until their skins are entirely charred. Transfer to a bowl large enough to hold them, and cover the bowl with the foil. Allow the peppers to rest for 20 minutes.

2. Uncover the bowl and use a paring knife to remove the skins, stems and seeds, while capturing the juice and flesh in the bowl. Cut or tear the peppers into 1-inchwide strips. Using the flat side of a large knife, crush the garlic cloves and remove

says that food and supplements containing probiotics assist the good bacteria already present in your gut. When a course of antibiotics wipes out both good and bad bacteria, for example, probiotic-rich foods and supplements can more readily replace what's lost.

Dietary sources of probiotics include some yogurts, cheeses, kefir, sauerkraut, miso, kimchi, pickles, and beverages like kombucha, a fermented tea. Getting probiotics from foods is the most natural way to supplement good gut bacteria, as the foods meld with the probiotics in ways that doctors may never understand to deliver the most benefits.

The downside is it's impossible to measure just how many probiotics can be acquired from foods. That is what makes supplementation so handy. Capsules and tablets are loaded with a variety of different active bacteria and yeast cultures to aid the digestive system in measurable ratios. Some tout anywhere from one to 30 billion active colony-forming units (CFUs) per serving.

Side effects

Probiotics are generally healthy for people to consume in amounts found in foods, advises the Mayo Clinic. Most healthy adults can safely add foods or dietary supplements that contain probiotics to their diets. Introducing probiotics may cause temporary and mild flatulence, discomfort and bloating.

Probiotics can be another tool to improve health at any age, but especially for adults looking to minimize illness risk.

the skins. Add the garlic, olive oil and salt and pepper to taste and allow the roasted peppers to marinate at room temperature for 2 hours, stirring occasionally.

3. Preheat the oven to 350 F. If the chicken breasts are large, insert a knife with a 1-inch blade into the center from the end of the breast, creating a pocket. Be careful not to pierce the outside. If the breasts are small, butterfly them out flat, cover with plastic wrap, and pound flat.

4. Melt 2 tablespoons of the butter in a small sauté pan and briefly cook the mushrooms until they're soft, 3 to 4 minutes. Fill the pocket of each chicken breast with a strip of pepper, then some of the mushroom, then the cheese, and repeat until it can hold no more. Close the opening with a toothpick, season to taste with salt and pepper, and dredge in the flour.

5. Melt the remaining 4 tablespoons butter in a large ovenproof sauté pan, add the olive oil, and cook the breasts, turning until lightly browned. Transfer the pan to the oven and bake the chicken until cooked through, about 20 minutes. Serve immediately.

Still 'feels so right'

50 Years Of Mountain Music: Alabama still strong after all these years

labama brought its mountain music to Albany on Friday, Feb. 8. The Times Union Center celebrated with over 5,000 fans clapping along to Alabama's 50th Anniversary tour, complete with old favorites "High Cotton" and "Roll On Eighteen Wheeler." Band members danced and jumped along joyfully celebrating 50 years of country hits and friendship between cousins Randy Owen and Teddy Gentry. Their third cousin, Jeff Cook, sadly wasn't there. But the band played on with high energy, hopefulness, and a strong sense of family fondly connected to Alabama.

Randy Owen entertained with stories between songs, shaking hands at one point with a farmer and identifying his trade "by the feel of his hands." The hominess and warmth toward farmers and veterans was heartfelt; fans cheered as Owen pumped his fist when the fan announced he was "a

veteran farmer."

Owen, wearing all black and a sweet scarf, a few times jumped up and down in excitement, only to slow himself, stating, "They tell me not to jump so I don't hurt my back." Fans would never guess Owen is 69 years young; his spry dancing, high energy clapping, and strong vocals defied age. His narrative,

though, gave a bit of a hint: he dedicated one song to his greatgranddaughter, Lucy.

Fans appeared to include many multigenerational families, including many mothers and daughters clad in flannel and cowgirl hats. When Owen noted they had to reschedule from January due to a snowstorm, he suggested the band should've come back in the warmer weather. Fans hooted and hollered, laughing



and clapping at his observations of upstate winters.

The band played "Roll On Eighteen Wheeler," a hit they admitted they hadn't played on stage in years. Additionally, they brought up their opening group, Exile, to join them for "Closer You

Burly's 'Self Titled Demon'

S low down, stay a while and unwind with something like you have never heard before. Troy natives, Burly, have created a lush, warm and plain relaxing collection sure to help you let go of the day's struggles – sinking into your chair for a spell. You won't find anything else like it, and it just might be your odd cup of tea you never knew you needed.

The album is laced with jazz, folk and indie influences with poetic lyrics layered over the top of each track. They're literally poems. The "Infinite Broken" lyrics are lifted directly from one of the non-performing member's own poems. Lyrically, it's intriguing. But what really sets this group apart is the instrument arrangement: jazz-inspired percussion, airy guitar, breathy saxophone, thoughtful bass and mellowing vibraphone. This ensemble is reminiscent of pivotal jazz groups and it's warming to see a modern revival of this setup. That being said, the group is still in their grassroots stages, so there is a lot of experimentation happening here. We find rockish songs, ones with a western feel and some that are plain melancholy.

We start out with "Branches of Blood" and to be honest, the whole song is perplexing. Highly interpretive lyrics, unique instrumentation and odd time signatures and tempos make the song intriguing, and a bit discomforting. But it's still very good. It's obvious that everything is done with intention and diligence. The fact that the group can evoke so many emotions within the songs is incredible. It's a great way to kick off the album, but as stated before, things keep changing.

Another one of their best is "Happy Birthday 2001," a song about a "halfremembered birthday party of a high school friend." Lyrically, it's pretty comical because we've all been to those awkward parties, finding the piano in the basement and "stabbing at the piano keys," playing video games and "smoking weed out of a corn cob pipe" and "talking to cousins, trying not to seem like a kid". Beyond that, we find a style that's high energy and rockish, a much different feel compared to the rest of the album. Yet, it still holds a



jazzy feel thanks to the vibraphone and sax. "Happy Birthday 2001" gives an otherwise cringe-worthy story, a light-hearted and airy feel. It's just fun to listen to.

"Kent Lame" brings the vibe down. Way down. We're told a story about, what we can only suspect, is drugs use and the effect it has on people. "I met crystal hazard... two days with two friends of mine confused on acid." One can only assume. It's accompanied by a very fitting tone — a soft bed of slow and deliberate instrumentation. This is the vein of the group and they've mastered it.

This is one of the most interesting albums I've heard in a long time. And although Burly has done an incredible job creating such a unique atmosphere, I would hope to see more work like

"Happy Birthday 2001" in the near future. And, whatever you do, don't get rid of that vibraphone.

working on this particular set the last ... it's been about three years since Troublemaker. I directed my last special, and from that said I would take a long break. I didn't know if it was going to be a year. Two years. Two and a half. Three years. But, I'm going to take a long break, and I'm really going to work on the Act II of my life and career. Act I was over, and it was time to take a look at where I wanted to take my fans that I've grown up with. You know, I grew up with a generation of comedy bits. I grew up with them. I was doing colleges to college aged-kids when I was collegeaged. I was headlining all these colleges all around New England. So, I felt like I had a great opportunity having grown up with this generation of fans. To speak to how I feel and see things, today. It was really,





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really great. As you can probably tell, I'm very enthused to get out there and share it with more people.

Hallisey: Absolutely. Now, it's no secret that when you came out you were one of the first acts to really embrace social media to help you get your name out there. Now, as you are getting ready for your tour, is it different. Are there more obstacles in your way? How is it different now versus when you were utilizing MySpace and other social media channels?

Cook: You know, it's interesting. It's actually more streamlined, and there are less obstacles. And, the reason for that is, when you're coming to fruition, young, green in the industry, and when you starting putting together a winning formula, people see that. And, suddenly, there's a lot of people impeding on that movement. You're not sure if everybody is there for the right reasons. Or, if they're giving you the best advice and you're taking more advice because you've never done it before. So, I was at the helm of my own career. I was the one dictating how

I wanted to be branded and perceived because I was having direct conversations with fans through this new thing of social media. But, it added way more hurdles because then I found I was encumbered and sometimes tied into things and people and contracts that, maybe, were not entirely the best fit at that time for me. But, I needed to learn that. I didn't know that. So, when I went through that era of hitting this magnificent high watermark in this industry, and then came down the other side and settled into some normalcy, I found that I can still have those spikes when I go out and tour. I can put my effort into a film role. But, I don't need to live up there. I don't need to have the machine with me always. The last five, six, seven years. It's a lot easier to map. And, when things do get big and broad, I know how to deal with it. I'm the old bull on the hill now. I'm not the young bull, and that's good. I've got a great perspective for people who I mentor. People who now come to me, young comedians and artists. I can tell them, 'hey, I've been through the wringer. I've been through it all. But, I can also tell

you what works.' At the end of the day, it's actually a simple equation and it leads to one word. There's just one word that defines this entire conversation. There's only one word that matters. There's only one thing that would have kept me in this position, and that's the word 'funny.' If I wasn't funny, I wouldn't be here. We wouldn't be talking. If I wasn't funny, people wouldn't come back and fill out an arena or a theater, 5, 10, 20,000 people, again, and again, and again. So, it's cool to be able to share this with the generation coming up. And, of course, what do I always tell them? Try to keep as few obstacles. Try to hone in on your voice and getting across the things you want to get across.
