DWI charges

GLENMONT —

Bethlehem police received a call complaint about an erratic driver who was traveling northbound on Route 9W in a green Chevrolet Silverado on Saturday, March 2 at 7 p.m.

The officer located the vehicle exiting the Sunoco gas station on 415 Route 9W and observed that it failed to use turn signals while traveling on the road. The officer approached the

vehicle once it entered a CVS parking lot on 416 Route 9W and immediately noticed the driver's red and watery eyes, and an odor of alcoholic beverage from his mouth. Identified as 50-year-old Martin Garcia of Ravena, he said that he had "six beers at home" and the officer noted his slurred speech and stumbling as he exited his vehicle. While his vehicle contained an open container of Budweiser and three open bottles of Southern Comfort,

Garcia failed all field sobriety tests, was arrested and transported without incident to BPD. He was found to have a BAC of 0.19 percent.

Garcia was charged with aggravated DWI with a BAC of 0.18 percent or more, a DWI 1st offense, failure to signal, an uninspected motor vehicle and having an open container in a vehicle. He had a scheduled return court date of Tuesday, March 19 at 5:30 p.m.

Colonial Acres golf course closes

GLENMONT — The Colonial Acres golf course will close after over 10 years of being run by the Town of Bethlehem.

While it will cease operations as a golf course, it would remain as a park and open space for residents to still enjoy.

Located on 15 Saybrook Dr. in Glenmont, it contains several walking trails and is next to a residential development.

Town Supervisor David VanLuven said the town has been meeting with local residents there about what type of future they may envision for the closed golf course.

A February community forum yielded ideas about having the park contain scenic and running trails, and family-friendly playground sets.

Saying that the golf course can no longer be

managed, he said that golf course management is more than just lawn mowing and instead, "it requires a specific expertise and you actually have to have professional experience in turf management in order to manage golf course grass and we don't have that. It just has not been working out so far and the course is in bad shape right now."

VanLuven added that managing this nine-hole golf course was no longer a viable financial route for the town since it had been partially affected by the recent opening of a newer 18-hole course, Hidden Meadows, which is located just 10 minutes away. The 2008 global financial crisis also affected the golf course, causing it to falter in recent years.

According to a memo provided by VanLuven, the Colonial Acres Golf Club had been in service since the 1960s and the property was saved from the risk of being developed in 2007, thanks to the Open Space Institute purchasing it.

In addition to its financial woes, it has suffered recently from its outdated equipment and a deteriorating irrigation system.

Since the golf course has not seen as many visitors too, "it thereby [makes] it difficult to justify spending an estimated \$100,000 per year to operate the property as a golf course." For these reasons, the town chose to not renew Colonial Acres operator Dale Ezyk's contract, who had last signed a three-year contract with the town in 2016.

The memo also included suggestions on how to best handle the park moving forward, like having volunteers oversee butterfly gardens within it, constructing a humble picnic pavilion by the pond, and adding more bicycle and pedestrian entrances to the area.

Revoked checks affect political scene

ALBANY COUNTY

 Politicians sending a monetary donation to a different political organization is a common practice, but canceling it soon after is not.

This was the case when Albany County Legislator and Bethlehem Democratic Committee Chair Joanne Cunningham (D-34 Delmar) and BDC member Jeffrey Kuhn each sent donation checks to the county's Independence Party for a fundraiser only to stop payment once endorsements were announced a few days later.

Background

Of the Bethlehem Democrats running for office this year, the county Independence Party endorsed town Supervisor David VanLuven, Town Board member Joyce



Becker, town Clerk Nancy Moquin, and Receiver of Taxes Alicia Roney. For the county Legislature, the party endorsed George Harder for District 34 and Sean Raleigh for District 35. Neither Cunningham, who is seeking her second term on the Legislature, nor Kuhn, who is seeking to represent the Legislature in District 35, received an endorsement.

Albany County Independence Party Chairman Paul Caputo said he and its Executive Committee interviewed candidates seeking the party's endorsement from late January through mid-

February. He said the party "has long been known to have the most arduous interview process of any political party." He said that during such interviews, an hour is devoted to asking all the candidates questions about what is going on in their respective communities and districts, their stance on issues like traffic and parking, fiscal responsibility, paid sick leave and more.

After the interviews, candidates were informed of a Feb. 25 fundraiser, for which attendance was not mandatory. A monetary donation was required to attend but the amount is

up to the donor's choosing. "Donations were generally \$150 but we've also sometimes received \$25, \$50 and \$75 donations from some people who were not able to attend the fundraiser," said Caputo. "It's okay if some people can't make it but their generous donations still showed their support."

Donations from representatives of other parties is commonplace. According to financial disclosure forms filed with the state Board of Elections by the Independence Party in 2015, donations were received by scores of candidates from both Republican and Democrat parties, including current Bethlehem Town Board member Jim Foster (R) who donated in 2015 and challenged then-incumbent Supervisor John Clarkson (D).

Clarkson received 4,733 votes on the Democratic line while

Foster earned 3,829 votes on the Republican line. Clarkson received 414 more votes on the Working Families line while Foster got 1,308 more votes on the Independence Party, Conservative and Reform lines. In the end, Clarkson edged out his opponent by only 10 votes which shows how important votes and support from minor party lines can still help a candidate.

In 2015, Kuhn was chairman of the BDC. Since taking the chair in 2011, he said he would try to convince party members to avoid contributions to the Independence Party. Clarkson did not appear on financial disclosure statements as a contributor to the Independence Party. Democrats Nanci Moquin, the Bethlehem town Clerk, and Bethlehem Town Board member Joyce Becker each appeared on the Independence line in 2015. Moquin and Mark

Becker each contributed to the Independence Party. Each won their respective

However, Cunningham earned her seat in the legislature on the strength of her party line. That year, the Independence Party had its own candidate in Thomas Cotrofeld. Cunningham earned 54 percent of the vote in District 34, to Republican candidate Douglas Shulz's 34 percent and Cotrofeld's 12 percent.

Nonetheless, of the 203,621 enrolled voters in Albany County, 10,516 are Independence Party members. It is the largest minor party in the county followed by Conservatives with 3,248 and 697 in the Working Families Party. There are 103,227 enrolled Democrats, 37,642 Republicans and 47,249 who are not enrolled in any party but have still



registered to vote, according to the latest enrollment figures at the state Board of Elections.

Why they first sent checks

Cunningham said she initially sent her \$150 check because she had first reached out to the party when talk of endorsements began earlier in the year. "Caputo then offered to me and the Bethlehem Democrats slate together to be interviewed and I thought that was great," she said. "So we went in together and knowing the history of the BDC's relationship with the Independence Party, I was looking for an opportunity to turn the page and I originally saw it as being part of a new era of perhaps having a more built relationship between the two party committees."

However, she added that she "was taken aback by how lacking the party was in its legitimate interviewing process" since she said it lasted no more than 15 minutes. She also said the party's committee did not have any lengthy discussions with her about

her stance on policies and issues, "and then [Caputo] handed out flyers of the fundraiser to pass around in the end. It all lacked any substance and process."

Kuhn said that within the past few months, he had heard whispers of a possible "rapprochement" between Bethlehem Democrats and the county Independence Party, saying that did not have a smooth relationship. Believing a rapprochement may not happen, he decided to go in to be interviewed by the Independence Party among 11 other interviewees and he wrote his \$100 check "in that spirit of being part of the team. I'd thought, 'Let's try and see if we can all turn over a new leaf.' ... If the party was offering an olive branch, I was willing to cautiously go along with that. But I could not bring myself to come to the party's fundraiser."

He then agreed with Cunningham about the interview process, he said, "it was a sham and they asked one question that was so generic, like 'Why did you want to run?' I spoke for 40 seconds and then they moved on to ask the next candidate. The entire

process was such a sham."

Caputo said that Cunningham's and Kuhn's allegations, about how their interviews were too short, were "false. I asked them questions about the county's plastic bag ban for instance and other issues in town." Cunningham is a sponsor of the proposed plastic bag ban law.

Why they then canceled checks

Cunningham and Kuhn each canceled their checks after the Independence Party announced its slate of endorsed candidates earlier this month. Cunningham said that did not factor into her canceling of the check. She said she had tried to call Caputo several times on the day following the fundraiser to ask about the slate of Bethlehem Democrats.

"He didn't call me back after several tries but when he finally called me back, he basically said I had two minutes to speak to him, and he was rude, belittling and demeaning on the phone," she said. "I was kind of taken aback and I'm the chair of the BDC

and he's the chair of his party so we were talking chair-to-chair. I thought it was disrespectful to the whole of BDC and me that he could not be bothered. As a woman, I saw it as patronizing too and I thought, 'You know what? I don't want to support that committee anymore."

Kuhn, who said he also did not like the interview process and how Cunningham was treated, expressed dissatisfaction with how the Independence Party had chosen to endorse George Harder instead of Cunningham.

"Mr. Harder has run for office for over a dozen times and he's never won. It was such an absurd thing on the Independence Party's side," he said.

"So I could not in good conscience financially support a political organization whose leadership appears to have no principles ... I also felt it was just an operation where they're trying to generate money for their line and it's all just transactional. So the fact that the party is so upset about a canceled check for a fundraiser I did

not even attend just proves the point that it's really just about the money," Kuhn said.

Kuhn said that for the above reasons, he canceled his own check, "If my small act of protest can finally turn the rock over and expose what I think is this very problematic system, then fantastic."

While reasserting that buying endorsements is illegal, Caputo said, regarding Cunningham specifically, that he "always returns phone calls" and that he and the committee were just disagreeing with her on the plastic bag ban issue. "First of all, it's not that we as a party don't support the banning of plastic bags, we just feel

that it's better suited for the statewide level. If it were on a statewide level, it creates a full playing field so all counties are on equal footing."

In addition, Caputo said he believed that Cunningham and Kuhn canceled their checks because the party did not endorse them. "It's a complete lack of their characters on taheir parts for giving a donation and then stopping them, it's insulting to our party and our process."

Caputo confirmed that his party did not pull any other endorsements from other Bethlehem Democrats because of their association with Cunningham and Kuhn in terms of being on the same political party, would be taking childish behavior and reinforcing it with more childish behavior."

V-Healthy Day

BETHLEHEM —

On Wednesday, March 27, approximately 300 students at Bethlehem Central High School got a hands-on lesson on the long-term impact of smoking, hypertension, diabetes, obesity, and genetics on vascular and heart health.

The custom curriculum was part of V-Healthy Day, an effort by area health providers to help students recognize and manage vascular risks and encourage the daily habits that can protect a healthy heart decades later. They also got an insider's look at a career in health care.

Throughout the V-Healthy Day, students cycled through several

stations designed to give them an up-close look at the progression of vascular disease. They engaged in patient diagnosis and assessment, discussed symptoms, treatment and post-care and had a chance to handle medical equipment including some of the stents, wires, and balloons that are used to treat people with Peripheral Artery Disease

As a follow-up to V-Healthy Day, students are able to qualify for one of three scholarship awards to be used towards postsecondary education. For those interested, students must identify one or two adults, and monitor their blood pressure and heart rate for one week and write an essay discussing

what vascular health is and why V-Healthy Day is important. This past fall, BCHS sophomore Stacey Lee received one of these scholarships after learning about the opportunity from participating in V-Healthy Day last year.

Pool concerns

RAVENA — On Monday, March 11, Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk School District staff were made aware of concerns about low-level electrical voltage in the pool area.

School officials immediately closed the pool and the district began working with an electrician, a third-party electrical engineer and National Grid to identify and correct any issues.

Although National Grid found no measurable stray voltage in the pool, the district is taking further precautions to ensure that there are no issues.

Once the district has finished its testing, the results will need to be verified by insurance underwriters and by the NYS Health Department.

"We know it has been a lengthy process," RCS Business Manager Joanne Moran said. "We are responsible to ensure public safety and will not reopen until we are satisfied with all remediations and reports."

Moran said the goal was to have the pool back in operation during the first week of April.

POINT OF VIEW

My father's memories of Delmar

remember Dad talking about his buddies: (First name unknown) Leonard who was an exceptionally brilliant man with a love of science or mathematics, Jesse Turner who was our Delmar mailman for years, and Robert Wright who founded Wright Trash Disposal. Years later the consensus was that Mr. Wright was the richest person to come out of BC during that era. I also believe Dad went to school with a George Butler who when I was in high school, could be seen on any given day riding his bike around Delmar.

Dad said there were plenty of pretty girls at BC back then, including my aunt Jeanne Paige and her best friend, Janet Flume Jones. Dad talked about a Betty Barker and Snookie Lansing. I also recall the names Hicks, Hafley, Ardizone, McCormick, Bennett and Weaver. He told a funny story about taking a classmate Eva Marie Saint (yes, the actress) to a dance with her perched on the handles of his bicycle. He said her sister Adelaide was a beauty and that she tried out and was selected for the senior play while her sister Eva didn't make the cut. Later, Eva won an Academy Award for her unforgettable performance in "On the Waterfront."

Dad always talked about

his high school friends as if it was yesterday. His class remained extremely close over the years due to Delmar's relatively small size and also the shared experience of war. Dad was a "5 Year Man" in high school, graduating a year later than he should have due to lengthy absences from school to play competitive tennis. He was an accomplished player (his father was a tennis professional), and he was very active on the regional junior circuit. I have his postcard marked 'The Sagamore' written to his parents when he was in high school telling them he had just won his tournament. The family tennis trophies and related memorabilia were donated to the Albany Institute of History and Art.

I recall Dad talking about shooting darts in the backroom of the DT (Delmar Tavern) — later Brockley's, then Beff's, and now Swifty's. He and his buddies liked to have a few beers, and one night his friends thought it would be funny after Dad had a few too many, to leave him in a shopping cart on his front porch. They rang the doorbell and took off leaving Dad to face the consequences. Another "prank" I heard about was "borrowing" a Delmar policeman's gun and running it up a flagpole in town. There

was another story too about Dad and some of his friends turning on a garden hose and sticking it in an unsuspecting Delmar resident's open cellar window. I am not sure what the outcome was there. All of this seems pretty innocent by today's standards.

Another popular hangout for teenagers was Pop Libby's, which I believe was a soda fountain near the Four Corners. Movies were very popular then and kids would go to the Palace in Albany or Delmar's own theater ("The Stink" as Dad said it was nicknamed), located near where D. A. Bennett's was.

Mom grew up at 15

Roweland Ave. playing in the wooded lots with neighborhood pals Scotty Rowe and Earl "Buster" Iones. Scotty's dad was Alton Rowe, Delmar businessman, for whom Roweland Avenue was named. He founded Delmar Lumber and was the builder for the Killough family home. The Rowes lived on the corner Wellington and Roweland across from a large wooded corner lot. I remember my maternal grandmother, Harriet Abriel Killough, talking about taking the United Traction bus with her friend Mildred Rowe, Alton's wife, into downtown Albany to enjoy a chicken salad lunch and whiskey sour at the vulnerable

Keeler's Restaurant.

Mom was focused on sports in high school, especially field hockey. One of her coaches, Miss Johnson, was a mentor and lifelong friend to her. The students called her "Mike." Mom's best friends were Connie Conroe, Ruth Cassavant and Ginny Arnold. Ginny later married my dad's good friend Jack Van Zandt. I remember Dad telling me Jack's brother was one of the first casualties of World War II, dying in a training mission. I met Jack and Ginny's lovely daughter a few years ago when she made the trek up to Pennsylvania to research the Arnold and Van Zandt family histories.

Dad told me that when the war came, he and his friends were far from home. Any news from or about Delmar boys was filtered through Agnes Leonard, who lived on Adams Place. He said she was much beloved and everyone called her "Ma" Leonard. There is a wonderful picture of Dad and a group of his high school buddies all dressed up in sports coats, posing together just before they went off to war; I donated the picture to the Bethlehem Town archives.

Mom and Dad's high school classes remained close throughout the years. On the occasion of Dad's 50th class reunion (1991), he wrote a beautiful piece as a tribute to his class. He

continued to see a few BC friends throughout the rest of his life, but he was always drained and saddened to see his buddies getting old. It reminded him too much of his own mortality. He preferred to remember his BC classmates the way they were back when, with all the exuberance of young kids with futures stretching out before them like an endless horizon.

We buried Mom and Dad in the Bethlehem Cemetery at Kenwood and Elsmere on a knoll overlooking the athletic fields of what was their beloved Bethlehem Central. We visit them often.

Walk-in closet

"It's time to purge the winter clothes anyway so we're going to do it in conjunction with the anniversary," said manager Linda Martin. "We have mountains of summer clothes to put out

The non-profit all-volunteer-run store is filled with donated goods which offers clothing, accessories and bags for men, women and children. Overseen by around 20 volunteers, it is open on three days so far: Sundays and Thursdays from noon to 4 p.m., and Wednesdays from noon to 7 p.m. It was originally opened as a 500-squarefoot space on April 10, 2016 in the lower level of the nearby First United Methodist Church of Voorheesville and it then moved to its current location sometime in late February 2019 — it is on a three-year lease

She explained that she did not want to have a grand reopening then because she was not initially sure whether the location's parking lot can accommodate the crowds and she believed that since it was still too cold, it may deter some people from coming.

Martin said that one reason for the move was to have a more central location where she and her volunteers can collect donated clothes, sort them and store them, all without having to drive back and forth between her own home and the church like before. Another reason was because of the lack of adequate space at the church where she recalled how the clothing racks



were so tight there to the point that some racks had to be moved out to the hallway and foyer. "And even for the volunteers, it was such hard work because the space was so small and they were tripping over each other," she said. "So here in our new space, we have a little office kitchen, our little microwave and our refrigerator, and we're making popcorn and tea, and we're laughing and having a good time."

She brought up how the store had housed an automotive repair shop prior which caused much noise and traffic; she joked that the residents would enjoy having a "very quiet neighbor now. There's no lights, there's no big trucks, no dramatic tools being used now.

When asked why she thinks this thrift store would benefit the local community, she said that there has been a "surprising need" for a store like this and she appreciated the store's more intimate nature, as compared to larger shopping malls in the Capital District. "People are willing to come down here and not necessarily have to drive all the way to Albany or Schenectady to obtain low-cost clothing," she said.

Smells like tulips

Tulip Fest 2019 announces stacked live music lineup for both days

ALBANY — The Capital City's annual Tulip Festival marks the beginning of summer and the area's outdoor music season, which always leaves fans wondering who will step up to play the two-day event's entertainment?

El Modernist was named on a short list of entertainers to play this year's main stage at Tulip Festival at Washington Park in Albany, on Saturday and Sunday, May 11 and 12. Mayor Kathy Sheehan announced a partial setlist on Jeff Morad's WEQX morning show "Early EQX" on Thursday, March 28.

The local four-piece band has garnered attention over the year as it incorporates elements of hip hop with rock. It first drew attention within the scene while winning a battle of the bands series that offered the opening gig to last September's Pearlpalooza, a one-day street festival on Albany's Pearl Street organized by WEQX. Plus, the four musicians are, "the nicest group of guys," said Morad.

Headlining the festival is the Kongos, four expatriates of England and South Africa who have settled in Phoenix to produce hard rock tracks like "Come With Me Now." The band recently played an invitation-only show hosted by WEQX at The Hollow Bar and Kitchen and will play the main stage on Saturday, May 11, at 4:30 p.m.

The Greeting Committee will make a return visit to Albany after playing at last year's Pearlpalooza.

"We have absolutely fallen head over heels in love with this band," said Morad on his radio show. "We hear this a lot from bands who are not from this area: They say, Albany is their home away from home, and that's true with this band."

The band put on a memorable performance last September as lead singer Addie Sartino took the show to the crowd,

leaping off stage and singing along with the throngs of fans gathered on Pearl Street.

El Modernist released a four-track EP, "American" just last month. The band will play Tulip Festival with a set on Saturday at 1:30 p.m.

Hasty Page, a local three-piece band that opened Pearlpalooza in 2017, will start music on the Local 518 Stage following the Tulip Queen Coronation.

The Tulip Queen will be crowned at noon on Saturday, May 11. Hasty Page will take the local stage at 1 p.m.

List of acts to play Saturday on the Local 518 Stage includes C.K. & The Rising Tide (Saturday, 2:15 p.m.), Sydney Worthley (Saturday, 3:30 p.m.) and Wild Planes (Saturday, 4:45 p.m.).

Girl Blue will kick off music on the main stage on Sunday, May 11, at 1:30 p.m. The solo independent artist continues to tour regularly and record her own music while planning a full-length album for release.

Moriah Formica continues to hustle after national television appearances on both "The Voice" and "American Idol." Her voice reminds many of Ann Wilson of Heart, thanks in part to her rendition of "Crazy on You" during her audition performance on "The Voice." She will take the stage at 3 p.m. on Sunday.

Marshall Charloff will remind Albany of Prince as he brings The Purple Xperience to the main stage at 4:30 p.m.



Kids on social media


How parents can discuss social media with young children

arents of young children tend to have a lot on their minds. While social media may not be moms' and dads' foremost concern, it's a topic that today's parents must discuss with their children eventually.

Social media is largely uncharted territory for parents. Many parents of young children did not grow up with social media. As a result, they might not know what constitutes appropriate usage, and how to convey that to kids growing up in a world where social media is so prevalent. Parents tasked with discussing social media with kids can consider the following tips.

Recognize today's kids are the most connected **people in the world.** UNICEF notes that young people between the ages of 15 and 24 are the most connected people in the world. Seventy-one percent of people in that age group are online, while just 48 percent of the total population across the globe is online. Parents won't be able to eliminate the internet or social media from their kids' lives. So discussions about social media usage should be about responsible usage, which should include limits on how much time kids spend online each day.

Don't view social media as a villain. While social media gets its share of deserved and undeserved criticism, UNICEF, in its "The State of the World's Children 2017" report, noted that digital technologies can serve as positive forces in the lives of young people. For example, digital technologies allow children to access information on issues affecting their communities. Some youngsters may use that access as inspiration to change their communities for the better. In addition, social media allows young people with conditions such as cerebral palsy to interact with their peers in ways they might not have been able to interact in decades past. When discussing social media with their children, parents can emphasize these positive aspects while also noting the negatives associated with social media, using the combination of both as an example of why social media must be used in moderation.



Address the elephant in the room. Everyone on the internet is not who they say they are, and parents must address this with their kids before youngsters open social media accounts. Point out to children that they should never "friend" anyone who they do not know. A 2015 report from Pew Research found that 41 percent of Facebook users are connected with people they have never met in person. While adults who connect with strangers may not be in danger, kids may not be mature or savvy enough to recognize cyber criminals or others looking to prey on their inexperience and trustfulness. Explain this to children and use it to illustrate why mom and dad want to know who they're speaking to online. Emphasize that your goal is to protect them, not invade their privacy.

Social media can be a difficult topic for parents to discuss with their children. Maintaining an open and honest dialogue that recognizes the pros and cons of social media can make such discussions more fruitful.





A reunion in Waterford's Chrome Food and Spirits will welcome the memories of Saratoga Winners this Saturday

t was 10 years ago this month that Saratoga Winners, one of the Capital District's favorite live music venues, burned down in an early morning fire. This Saturday, a reunion is to be held to remember it and the people who made it special.

From the outside, Saratoga Winners wasn't much to look at. It was a two-story roadhouse nestled between the Mohawk River and the Town of Colonie Landfill. There was no pretense surrounding the place, other than having Saratoga in its name, which was technically across the river. Nonetheless, in the years before it closed its doors in 2006, it hosted an A-list of musical acts that rivaled the more polished and refined Saratoga Performing Arts Center.

And, that's where the comparisons end.

"I went to a 'hardcore' show there at the very end when they weren't even selling alcohol anymore," said Ali Hibbs, former *Spotlight News* and *Metroland* reporter. "The lead singer in the last band broke his ACL on stage and no one even knew he was hurt for a moment because he was already screaming!" Someone then realized the situation; the singer's mother. Hibbs said she stopped the show and called for an ambulance, "but the kid refused to let them take him until he finished his set."

From the inside, Winners was structured like a barn. Vaulted ceiling, and an exposed wooden frame, including pillars and support beams, reminded one radio personality of a "wagon wheel." With an open floor layout, patrons had a good view of the band regardless of where they stood.

David Byrne, the Ramones, Melissa Etheridge, Ben Folds, the Black Crowes, Wilco and Paul Westerberg were just a few of the names of established stars and up-and-coming artists who drew crowds through the doors.

"It changed personality considerably act to act," said Ivan Rodat, a former reporter for *Metroland*. A stereotypical rock venue that wasn't pigeon-holed into an exclusive genre. He recalled seeing R.E.M. frontman Michael Stipe in attendance once as Fugazi performed on stage. "Great, weird place."

Towards the end of its lifespan, Winners became a home for punk and heavy metal music.

Jason Keller was an on-air personality for 103.5/103.9 FM The Edge. He'd take over the Albany airwaves to play classic rock and alternative music once Howard Stern was done with his syndicated broadcasts. He recalled hosting several shows at Saratoga Winners on behalf of that radio station.

The on-air host remembered Winners looking like a wooden "wagon wheel." Despite that observation, it didn't stop bands from using pyrotechnics onstage. Keller remembered feeling the heat of a "jet engine" ignited from the stage, as he stood across the room next to the soundboard.

"This can't be safe," he said, with an uneasy chuckle. Regardless, no one was hurt.

Keller is now Commercial Production and Station Imaging Director at 102.7 WEQX. You can still hear him on the air, too.





usy families often find it hard to serve fresh and quickly prepared meals. But before pulling up to the nearest drive-through window, family chefs should know that many homecooked meals can be whipped up in a pinch.

During barbecue season, burgers are often a go-to meal for their convenience and portability. But another bun- and beef-based option is readily available — and it could stir up nostalgia for comforting family meals of years past.

It's hard to beat the savory flavor and deliciously messy trappings of Sloppy Joes. As the name implies, this isn't a meal for someone who likes to keep things neat. In fact, part of the fun of Sloppy Joes, for adults and children alike, is the chance to get a little messy at the dinner table. Here's a recipe for "Classic Sloppy Joes," courtesy of the National Cattlemen's Beef Association.

Classic Sloppy Joes

Ingredients: Serves 4


- 1 pound ground beef (93% lean or leaner)
- 1 cup minced sweet onion
- 1 cup minced green bell pepper
- 1 can (141/2 ounces) unsalted tomato sauce
- 1/4 cup barbecue sauce
- 1/4 cup ketchup
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 2 teaspoons packed brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 4 whole wheat hamburger buns or 8 slider buns

Instructions:

Heat a large, nonstick skillet over medium heat. Add

onion, cook 3 to 5 minutes until golden brown. Add ground beef and bell pepper; cook 8 to 10 minutes, breaking beef into 1/2-inch crumbles and stirring occasionally.

Stir in tomato sauce, barbecue sauce, ketchup, Worcestershire sauce, brown sugar, and mustard; increase heat to medium-high. Bring to a boil; cook 5 to 10 minutes, or until sauce is thickened, stirring occasionally. Season with salt, as desired.

Divide beef mixture evenly among buns. Top with pickles, coleslaw and cheese, if desired. Close the sandwickes

Cook's Tip: Cooking times are for fresh or thoroughly thawed ground beef. Ground beef should be cooked to an internal temperature of 160° F. Color is not a reliable indicator of ground beef doneness.

Still not coming to a head

Clearing up adult acne

any youngsters develop acne during adolescence. Acne often disappears by the time adolescents graduate high school, but for some people, acne lingers into adulthood.

The American Academy of Dermatology says adults can get acne, which may persist as adults reach their 30s, 40s or 50s. Some people even develop acne for the first time as adults, a condition known as adult-onset acne. Although both men and women can develop acne, women tend to get adult acne more often than men.

Adult acne can be particularly frustrating for adults who had acne as children. Understanding what's behind the blemishes can help people get the treatment they need **Sugar** to banish breakouts.

Stress

Stress may contribute to adult acne. When stressed, the body releases certain hormones, most notably cortisol, to address the problem. Skin experts say that testosterone can accompany cortisol, which can drive oil glands to produce more oil. Stress can lead to more oily skin, which increases the likelihood of breakouts. Learning how to reduce stress can lead to clearer skin.

Hormonal changes

Fluctuations in hormones are normal for women. Estrogen and progesterone levels vary depending on the menstrual cycle. The Johns Hopkins Department of Dermatology says that acne is prevalent before one's menstrual cycle, and can also occur during menopause when hormones are in flux again. If acne is problematic, women can speak with their doctors about hormone therapy or birth control pills to see if either option can alleviate the hormone fluctuations that contribute to acne.

Family history

Genes also may be to blame for adult acne, as some people may have a genetic predisposition to acne.

Medication

Acne may be a side effect of certain medications. If medicine is triggering breakouts, women can discuss potential alternatives with their physicians.

Some evidence suggests that sugar can contribute to acne by raising insulin levels, which then triggers oil-releasing male hormones. Stick to foods that do not trigger a sugar (and insulin) spike. Australian researchers found that people who followed a low-glycemic index diet (which is low in refined carbohydrates like those found in white bread) had a 22 percent decrease in acne lesions, compared with a control group that ate more high-GI

Salt

It's not the greasy fries that cause acne, but it very well may be the salt on those fries. Some doctors suspect that sodium can cause issues with the skin because the iodine found in table salt and seafood can build up and make acne worse.



Dancing the blues on a spring day

Beau Sasser's Escape Plan brings induces Spring Fever in Troy

TROY — It was Funk Night at the Rustic Barn Pub. Beau Sasser's Escape Plan, featuring Albany's Justin Henricks, brought out the funk as they welcomed in spring at their return to the venue.

The Northampton, Massachusetts-based band features vocalist Beau Sasser double-timing on the Hammond Organ, guitarist Dan Thomas, drummer Jimmy "The Italian Stallion" Robitaille, vocalist Ali McGuirk vocals, and Justin Henricks on guitar and vocals. Together, this border-crossed band got their fans to dance and enjoy an evening of funk, blues and soul on a snow-covered spring night.



One Maniac in Troy

Lúnasa brings Troy Music Hall crowd to its feet

TROY — As Lúnasa winds up their North American spring tour, it would be remiss not to take an opportunity to sing their folk praises. The sextet had quite the

reputation to live up to, even as a first-time attendee, after being quoted by New York Post as the "Hottest Irish Acoustic Group on the Planet." With special guest Natalie Merchant, we would expect nothing less.

For those of you who have not heard of Lúnasa, they are an award-winning Traditional Celtic band from Ireland. Touring extensively over the course of the last 22 years, the band brings the highest level of musicianship.

Natalie Merchant, the former lead singer to 10,000 Maniacs, joins Lunasa on stage at the Troy Savings Bank Music Hall on Friday, March 15.

With Kevin Crawford on flute/whistles, Trevor Hutchinson on bass, Cillian Vallely on Uilleann Pipes/whistles, Colin Farrell on fiddle, and Ed Boyd on guitar, this group melds together perfectly, bringing a flawless sound to their audience.

The setting for the evening was Troy Bank Music Hall. Living in Troy a short period of time back in the early '90s, I don't recall this charming neighborhood of brownstones, little pubs and shops with such grand architecture all around. It was the perfect setting for a perfect evening of music. The venue itself is a work of art, with the most amazing lighting and acoustics. You couldn't ask for a better place to see Lúnasa.

Performing two full sets of music from their extensive library, Crawford

would occasionally set up the songs with a personal story about who wrote the number, what inspired it and what the audience would be in store for. He was witty and charming, making the audience feel comfortable from the start. It was a personal insight that would invest you even more into the evening.


Later they were accompanied by the acclaimed Natalie Merchant, lead singer of 10,000 Maniacs. Her voice is sultry and smooth, with lyrics that speak to your soul. As she took the stage with the band, she spoke of joining them last year on a tour of Ireland, sharing how they came to work together. While working on a collaborative album, Merchant was looking for some of the world's leading musicians to join her, she did not hesitate to invite them, and the rest they say is history.

Ironically, it was fun to hear that the first time she ever saw Lúnasa was in this very venue, pointing to the row and seat she sat in. Unbeknownst to the band, she longed to join them on stage that evening. Fast forward a few years later and the chemistry they share on stage is a true synergy.

Louise's 'Unleash'

Katie Louise's debut EP attempts a break-out in all the right ways

ALBANY — When I first interviewed Katie Louise, it was hard to wrap my brain around her talent. A classically trained pianist who is now trying to break into the pop scene? How is that even possible?

Well, she's proved it's possible. She's even proved it's not only a formidable attempt, it's a smash hit.

The seven song EP, "Unleash," released March 15. Louise and her team kicked off the new album with a show at Jupiter Hall.

Before I heard the full EP, I spoke with Louise. I had listened to two songs before the interview. Even then, I knew she was onto something special. The sultry "Imprisoned in Paradise" is slow, but poignant and powerful. I could feel her

emotion throughout the song, and could identify with her rhetorical opener (Why would I//want to sit all day//and stare at only//black and white?). Louise's ability to speak about how she can see things and feel things those around her do not understand is phenomenal. I felt her pain. "Imprisoned in Paradise" is truly one of my favorites on the EP, which is hard to believe because I'm a die-hard rock 'n' roll, go as fast as you can music fan.

Another true highlight is "Broken," which Louise told me was one of the first songs she wrote. Another sultry, breathy ballad, Louise is able to use language as a medium to communicate the pain and sorrow the song is based on. A gentle piano melody supports her gentle but strong voice. "I need you to hear me//before we're fighting//because I don't want to lose you//

but I can't do this without you//I need you to love me//when I'm not broken" is by far the strongest lyric in the song written by Louise, with Louise's vocals bringing you to the scene of her pain, with a front row seat to watch it all unfold. I felt this lyric; I was able to relate my own emotional journey and feel the exact same pain. As the song picks up, the song becomes a little faster and is complimented with a drum beat that brings the element of pop into the forefront.

Louise talked about how this EP was a work of "baggage," as she used some of the harder parts of her childhood and earlier life as a vehicle for her songwriting. Each song demonstrates a different part of her journey, with "Damn Good" bringing a danceable beat and feel-good lyrics (I ain't gonna lie//life is pretty damn good//and

I'm sure as hell proud of it) to an album of raw pain and redemption. The guitar solo also gives rock listeners like myself something to latch onto, making sure almost any listener has something they like within the brief EP.

Louise's piano skills are not lost in this album. The solo in "Unleash" gives you just a taste of what this talent is capable of. I truly felt an old soul in this solo, as if I've heard this a million times, yet not heard it at all. Louise uses her impressive talent to introduce you to the world of piano in a way you might have never seen it before. As she's clearly demonstrated, piano doesn't have to be classical; it can be the melody and co-star of a modern pop album

Joceyln & Chris Arndt's 'The Fun in the Fight'

Album is a 'road map' revealing band's past influences and future plans

ocelyn and Chris broke into Billboard's Top 40 in the Adult Album Alternative chart with "Red Stops Traffic," the third single off the band's 2017 release "Go." The album as a whole was Jocelyn and Chris' most successful release. It peaked at No. 2 on the Relix Jamband Top 30, and it stayed there for three straight months. Perhaps what's most notable about the album is that it was produced while Chris was still attending

The Jocelyn and Chris team chase radio play. It involves networking, sending tapes, exchanging phone calls and logging in the miles between the more than 120 radio stations that fall under the AAA format. When "Outta My Head" debuted with Parade Magazine last November, David Bourgeois, the band's manager at Bridge Road Entertainment, said it caught the attention of different radio stations. And, that's exactly the point they're trying to make.

"The Fun in the Fight," promises to be a venture that will take the band into new territory. It's debut track "Outta My Head" starts off with Jocelyn singing over Chris' bluesy guitar riffs, but it then turns into something different. It swiftly progresses into a layered, contemporary production; uptempo and hook-focused. It is the most commercial-leaning song the two have yet to produce. And, that's just the beginning. Other songs within the 11-track album suggest Jocelyn and Chris could take aim at alternative radio in addition to the AAA and jamband genres they are accustom to playing.

The album's opening track sets the table for Jocelyn and Chris' styling of a new generation of classic rock featuring Danny Louis of Govt' Mule. "Witness" is a love letter to all the artists that have influenced the sister-brother duo since they were young children. A powerful guitar riff leads bread crumbs to a lyrical homage to Ozzy Osbourne, Prince, Pink Floyd and more.

Any given live Jocelyn and Chris performance is defined by both power and energy, and "Kill in the Cure" may



best capture that. It's a controlled burn with emotional vocals from Jocelyn and metronomic guitar play from Chris. It's an appropriate segue to "Outta My Head," which within itself, beautifully progresses from Jocelyn's lyrics to a craftily layered track worthy of its debut status.

Chris plays a mean blues guitar and it stands out on a track that also features Beau Sasser on the Hammond Organ. The two are paired well on this darkly powerful, midtempo groove.

"Don't Hang Up" is a stop-and-listen track. Dark lyrics reveal one side of an intimate phone conversation from someone desperate and contrite. Jocelyn's voice is front and center in a ballad that lingers on through the next track. A stark contrast to "Problematic," which follows

with a pure rock riff.

"Be That as it May" is an all-out jam that features Vulpeck's Cory Wong at lead guitar and Louis again, this time on the Hammond. It starts slow and busts out into a stomping, danceable track. "Original" is yet another track that's going to get you up and moving.

"Things I'll Never Know" is a retro ballad that, again, reveals the roots to Jocelyn and Chris' influences. More organ in the back, allowing Jocelyn to take the listener to church on this love song.

The album ends on two, fun tracks in "The Western" and "Weatherman." "The

Western" is a story, as one would imagine, with pistols and a climactic duel, complete with a trumpet that will place you into the middle of a spaghetti western. The flute play in "The Weatherman" accentuates yet another retro track that harkens back to the wistful ballads of Linda Ronstadt and Dan Fogelberg that dominated radio play in the 70s.

Jocelyn and Chris Arndt have shown some versatility, and "The Fun in the Fight" showcases an effort that should help push the band out in front of different audiences. It's a road map of where the two have been over the past several years, and it shows where they plan on going from here. Should you be one of those who has not yet picked up on this duo, pick this up.

Finding that voice

"I remember I once had a student who had a friend pass away and for whatever reason, she couldn't go to the wake," vocal coach and musical instructor Laura Beth Johnson said. "The student came in here and said, 'I want to write a song about this.' So, we put pen to paper and she was able to write through the grief and use her music as a way to channel that grief into something positive and productive.

"I was so grateful and honored to be a part of that process and help her find her voice," Johnson said.

Johnson (one of four members of the Johnson family who work at the studio) is amazed at how her student has grown since that day.

"She's writing all the time," Johnson said. "It has given her the confidence she needs and she has blossomed since that day into even more of an artist."

This is just one example of the way that Modern Day Music School is able to be there for its students. In music, you're vulnerable. You're open. You're bearing your soul. For some, it's incredibly intimidating at first. For others, it's a relief right away. For all, the studio is a sanctuary; a place where they can be free, vulnerable and most importantly, themselves.

"The students develop these incredible bonds with their coaches and teachers that makes them want to work even harder," owner Paul Benedetti said. "They come in for this 30-minute session. Sometimes, they only sing for about five minutes of that. They're working through something tough in their personal life and they feel safe enough to come in here and talk to us. We want them to feel safe."

These bonds were evident as our staff visited the studio on a rainy Friday afternoon. As pictures were being taken, Formica and VanDenburg were belting into a mic. Their vocal coach, Lesley O'Donnell, was standing outside the sound-proof booth. The doors were open, the vibe was good. As the girls tried to find their pitch, O'Donnell was offering encouraging words even though the girls were just goofing around.

"There it is!," O'Donnell exclaimed as the teen stars belted out an impressive harmony. "There we go! Awesome!" A smile spread across her face. "It's amazing," she said.

Benedetti started Modern Day Music School in 2011. The need for the school was a response to his own son's musical talent. When his oldest son was a teenager, he was playing drums and decided he wanted to start a band. The problem was, there was nowhere in the area that made it easy to coordinate young musicians who wanted to get together with peers. Benedetti said it was a "nightmare" because there was always curve balls thrown; some kids really wanted to play, while others weren't ready for the commitment it held. On top of that, where the bands would eventually play weren't kid-friendly. The teens would play in dingy bars and dives, where Benedetti didn't feel was a good place for these young musicians.

"I come from the studio business and I've been playing, teaching and singing "I had a thought during this time period; wouldn't it be awesome to create a space where these kids could find like-minded students, and even better, have a safe space to play?"

forever," he said. "I had a thought during this time period; wouldn't it be awesome to create a space where these kids could find like-minded students, and even better, have a safe space to play?"

The school opened with its well-known band program. Essentially, students signed up and are paired into a band with three to four other students with the same essential goal. Benedetti said these kids usually don't know one another at first, and even more, they don't always want to play the same thing or even like the same music.

"It's not only a music session, it's teambuilding," he said. "These kids learn that you sometimes have to work with people you wouldn't pick at first for whatever reason. That's something you'll run into regardless of where you end up in life."

It sometimes takes a bit for the band

to adapt. The band program is offered in three-month sessions. Despite the initial uncertainty, the kids not only learn to work well together, but they become friends and will often ask to play together again at the beginning of the new session.

"They'll want to do more, work harder and see where they could potentially go as a cohesive unit," Benedetti said. "If we feel it works as a whole, we will happily try to accommodate those requests.

The band program eventually was joined by music lessons when Benedetti realized how needed it was. Now, the studio employs at least a dozen coaches with all different abilities and talents. While those like Formica and VanDenburg are jumping into the mainstream, 7-year-old Ella Dane Morgan is a student with a different passion — performing on stage. At 5 years old, she was starring with pop sensation Sara Bareilles in the singer's smash hit "Waitress."

"I have reverse stage fright," Morgan explained. "I don't really like performing in front of friends and family, but I love performing on stage."

Morgan's mother Laura agreed, explaining she's had to physically carry a crying Morgan as she pleaded to get back on stage, long after the curtains closed. "We were bitten by the Broadway bug at a young age," Laura Morgan said. "Once she got the taste for it, she wanted in. We sometimes commute between here and the city three to four days a week for whatever she has going on."

The young Broadway star has learned so much from her three years of

instruction. Laura Morgan said they picked Modern Day Music School because of the school's command of music — they know what they're doing. There are not a lot of roles for children on Broadway, but the Morgans have made it work and the young star has been consistently in her element, doing what she loves most.

"I've learned to belt by opening up my mouth like a cave," Ella said. "I pretend I'm stuffing all of these marshmallows in my mouth. It's helped."

Another belter, 11-year-old Ashlynn Boyce, has been working on the same techniques. The two-time winner of Clifton Park American Idol has always known she could sing, surprising even her parents.

"I was shocked when I first heard her," Boyce's father Jesse said. "None of our family has this skill and she can command it so well."

Boyce has been attending Modern Day Music School for two years. Having just relocated from Pittstown, Boyce and her dad were passing through one day and she saw the sign for the school.

"I just knew I wanted to go here," she said. As shy as she is, she knows what she wants. "I had a feeling about it."

Jesse Boyce put all his trust in Benedetti. Soon Boyce, who was sent home early from Clifton Park American Idol the first year she tried out, was in command of

her talent like never before.

"She can be so successful at this," he said. "You just want the best for your kid. No place is perfect, but this is pretty close."

Boyce said her warmups have completely changed her. They help her get ready for the big notes she loves to hit, ones she hopes to sing with Demi Lovato someday. Two years later, she still wants to go here. It's become as much of a sanctuary for her as anyone.

Students like Boyce are how the teachers summarized what they feel the school does for students. The initial intimidation of coming in and bearing a part of your soul that many are self-conscious about — even those who know they have talent — is overridden when they step into that studio and feel validation about something they've worked on for so long.

"It's music. That's what we know," O'Donnell said. "It makes sense for us to teach it. We are simply the vehicles for these kids to hone in on the thing they love so much."

Tony Garza, the jack of all trades of the school, agrees. Garza teaches guitar, bass and ukelele. He is the head of the school's Little Rockers program and is the rock school director. For him, it comes down to helping the students learn important life lessons, like they have to be ok with not being perfect.

"I always tell my students they are good, they are special and they are worthy," Garza explained. "I want to help them find their voice."

Katie Johnson, another vocal coach and the song writing teacher, agreed. "Music has changed the lives of these kids, and they've changed all of us," she said. "They come in not believing in themselves and they find who they are through the music." The teachers are assisted by the helpful Benedetti and Cailin Burke, the studio manager. Burke explained students are not just randomly assigned — rather, the studio takes the talents of each individual into consideration and pairs them with the coach that can address those specific needs.

"No curriculum here," was echoed by every single employee of the studio. Benedetti added, "We use music that the students want to learn about to construct our lessons. If they love Taylor Swift, we will visit her music and learn notes, harmonies and how the song is constructed. We want to make learning fun for these students. Curriculum is great, but we want to take an individualized approach to each student. This is not one size fits all."

Eighteen-year-old Formica, 17-year-old VanDenburg and 15-year-old Cassie Cenzano are on their way to superstardom. All three said they owe so much to their coaches; while it's taught them how to sing, it's also taught them how not to.

"I hate it when people come up to me and tell me how they've never taken lessons," Formica said. "We take pride in our lessons because they've taught us how to maintain our voices. Not taking lessons is great, but when you accidentally blow out your voice because you didn't maintain it, that's definitely not fun."

Formica and Cenzano landed at Modern Day Music School around the same time, right after the school opened. Formica is a rock powerhouse, effortlessly having both the voice and stage presence to make audiences question why rock went away. Cenzano is influenced by the sultry vocals of Adele and Stevie Nicks, a stark contrast to Formica. VanDenburg finds

her influence in singers like Celine Dion and once said she prides herself in the ability to sing ballads "decently well." As her recent appearance on "American Idol" has shown, she was maintaining the levelheaded kindness and humility all three girls embody

"Moriah was actually the one who encouraged me to come here," VanDenburg said. "I think that's what sets this place apart from everywhere else. It's welcoming, it's chill and our coaches genuinely want to get involved in our lives and provide the support we need outside of this."

Cenzano agreed. Her low, soothing voice articulates her gratefulness to the studio for its ability to reach out to her. She's in the studio too, working as hard as her peers.

"The key to these lessons is listening and taking it all in," she said. "We all practice a lot. We're open to what we're being told. We want to learn.

"Being a musician is always in you," Formica concluded. "True artists, like the three of us and those who are here with us, love music in all of its forms, and we love that we can make our own music."

Benedetti chalks up his impressive staff

and students to the "vibe" he puts out. While they frequently get applications for new employees, Benedetti said it's so much more than having the ability to sing or play.

"If you can come in here and you have the talent, great," he said. "But the vibe is so important. We want to create a modern, safe, welcoming space. We want to give our students an experience, not just a

Modern Day Music School is actually looking to expand its team, with Benedetti promising new staff members will have the qualifications, vibe and personality its

customers have come to know and love.

"When we are told by parents that their child is excited about that 30-minute lesson, I know we are doing something right," he said. "It's 30 minutes, once a week. Yet, the students long for the time here. They have siblings come and hang out while they practice, and we provide a space for them to grow too with whatever they need.

"I know we are doing something right when we see these kids so happy," he concluded. "We want things to make sense for each individual student, and we think we're achieving that."

From the ashes

Fire

In the early morning of April 30, 2009, firefighters responded to a call at Saratoga Winners. By the time they arrived, it was engulfed in flames. The original call came in shortly after 3 a.m. The Cresent Bridge was closed for about seven hours as eight fire departments battled the blaze.

At the time of the fire, Saratoga Winners had been closed for three years. Ownership had changed hands and a new owner reportedly showed interest in returning the venue to its former glory. Authorities later determined that the fire was caused by arson. Just over a month later, the owner was indicted for arson, insurance fraud and reckless endangerment.

Reunion

Holly Stah's memories of Saratoga Winners are more vivid than others. She worked there for eight years. First in the office, then behind the bar. It holds a special place in her heart. It's where she met her husband, Scott.

"You could see the bands. You could dance if you wanted to," said Stah. "All of our friends were there."

A big music fan, Stah has collected pictures of herself standing next to Alice Cooper and Billy Sheehan, among others. She likes hard rock Enough to recognize characteristics from just the band name, alone. For example, rock bands with an

acronym as a name play especially loud. That was proven one night while such a band performed a sound check. Stah was standing near the stage. As the bass player started, she heard a sound from across the room.

"Glasses were falling off my treys and shattering on the floor," she said. "I couldn't get down to the bar fast enough to stop them from falling off and shattering on the floor.

She later shared her observation of bands with acronyms to the owner. One day, the owner thanked her for the advice by sharing a decision he made. He turned down a request to have "D.I.O." perform.

It wasn't an acronym. The owner was referring to James Dio and the band he formed after leaving Black Sabbath in 1982, producing rock anthems like "Holy Diver" and "Rainbow in the Dark."

Stah was not happy.

"I thought I was going to cry," she said, with a laugh.

Stah has spent the past year organizing a reunion for people to remember Saratoga Winners and the music that once played there. Saratoga Winners Reunion #3: The Final Chapter will feature music from Untaymed, Divine Right, Maxx Thrust, Bone Box and Enertia at Chrome Food and Spirits on Saturday, April 6, at 4 p.m.

The lineup includes bands that had played Saratoga Winners, Stah said. It will capture the spirit of the old place. Something she said she is looking forward to.

"I'm going to see people I haven't seen in a very long time."
