Host of DWI charges

GLENMONT — A 58-year-old Chichester woman was arrested on several DWI-related charges on Thursday, March 21 at 9:01 p.m on 316 Glenmont Road.

After saying that she'd been traveling from Albany, she exited her vehicle and failed all field sobriety tests.

She was taken into custody and transported to the Bethlehem Police Department.

O'Connell was found to have a BAC of 0.26 percent, was arraigned before Judge Andrew Kirby

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and her licence was seized. She was charged with operating a motor vehicle with a BAC of 0.08 percent or more, having two previous DWI convictions, having two prior convictions of aggravated DWI, and failure to keep right.

She has a scheduled return court date of Tuesday, April 16 at 4 p.m.

Vehicular crash and DWI

DELMAR — A 61-year-old Delmar man was arrested for driving while intoxicated on Saturday, March 30 at 6:28 p.m. on 16 West Poplard Dr.

The Albany Business Review reported earlier this month that Pioneer, which provided a \$3 million loan towards the construction of a 16,000-square-foot administration building, a 10,000-square-foot building for warehouse and subsequent solar farm. At present, only a skeleton framework of a building remains on the site. Construction ceased last fall

just months after it began. The courtship between the solar company and the Columbia Developmentowned technology park started nearly five years ago. The 440-acre mixeduse development possessed several businesses, none of which fit the descriptions for technology. Monolith Solar was expected to fill that void and potentially provide energy to other

tenants, too. "I'm very disappointed to see Monolith not succeed," said Bethlehem Town Supervisor David VanLuven. "I thought they would have been a very good addition to our town." The bank's foreclosure

is just the latest in a string of events that spells a company in trouble. Monolith Solar failed to meet monetary

payments to the town in recent months; both in the form of a missed payment-in-lieu-of-taxes to the town for \$1,045, and

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approximately \$2,000, each was due in January. After several no-shows to recent IDA meetings, the board voted last month to rescind more than \$600,000 in tax break incentives originally offered to bring Monolith Solar to the town. This was preceded by several reports of complaints against the company, including one by Consolidated Electrical Distributors seeking \$1.19 million last September. All of which seemed to emerge once construction inexplicably stopped on the Slingerlands site.

New leadership replaced Monolith founders Steve Erby and Mark Fobare in late 2017, only for the company to name Chris Stroud as its new CEO last September.

"We have a financial restructuring plan for our organization already in place, not only of debts and obligations, but it's also the establishment of a very substantial construction financing pipeline, which can tend to be a weakness for other organizations that have to build and stop and build and stop as they obtain construction financing," Stroud told

Spotlight News last November. "But we're in negotiations in establishing that very substantial construction financing pipeline that will carry us for a year or more, without having to stop our progress or distract ourselves from our objectives of getting work done."

The Slingerlands location was expected to retain all 49 employees originally housed at its Rensselaer location, plus create another 76 jobs over the next five years. In January, however, Monolith and its affiliate SAE Sun and Earth Technology each announced it would layoff some of their employees. Monolith was to axe six of its 23 employees, while SAE was to reportedly lay off 47 of its 58 employees.

"I'm very hopeful that Columbia will see the construction through to completion," said VanLuven, "so they don't have a skeleton [left remaining]."

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
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Proposed pipeline

To stretch from Bethlehem to East and North Greenbush

BETHLEHEM — National Grid is proposing to build a 7.3 mile, 16inch diameter gas pipeline that would run from the Town of Bethlehem to the Towns of East and North Greenbush, crossing Albany and Rensselaer counties.

According to National Grid's website, the project is officially known as the Pipeline E37 Reliability and Resiliency Project. It would "allow for a more reliable and resilient natural gas system for our existing customers in New York's Capital Region" and it would complete the so-called Albany Loop, an existing horseshoe-shaped transmission main from Troy to Bethlehem.

In an email to Spotlight News, National Grid regional spokesperson Patrick Stella wrote that the project aims to improve National Grid's Eastern Gate which has been found to be "supply-constrained," which can be detrimental especially during its peak season in the colder winter months. It also hopes to limit the number of potential disruptions of natural gas usage to current customers and provide more natural gas options for Capital District residents.

Stella also wrote that National Grid has recently been working towards finding sustainable energy solutions like with its Newtown Creek Renewable Gas Project in 2015. In that project, the company worked to "inject renewable gas from wastewater and food waste into our gas system" in Brooklyn, New York.

The project would require numerous permits and have to be approved by several state and federal agencies including the state Departments of Agriculture and Markets, and Environmental Conservation. Construction is planned to commence this fall and end by 2021 or 2022.

The pipeline, running mainly in a west to northeast direction, will start around 885 feet north of the Bethlehem Gate Station on River Submitted photo

Road in Bethlehem to the Troy Gate Station on Bloomingrove Road in North Greenbush. It would be buried at least 36 inches from the ground level in general and at least 60 inches if under roads and bodies of water.

National Grid also plans to restore the lands to their pre-construction conditions as closely as possible, after completion of the project.

Bethlehem Town Supervisor David VanLuven said that this project "barely touches Bethlehem and I don't see an avenue through which the town can stop it, since it has such a minor impact in our town." While he said he has not spoken with the town supervisors from East and North Greenbush, he said that he is remaining neutral towards the project since it is not presented as bringing fracked gas through the town.

COMMUNITY Going geothermal

DELMAR — If you happen to be a neighbor of Delmar resident Matt Tangorre who lives on Huron Road, you have probably wondered why there had been ongoing construction work and a sign that reads "The Future of Heating and Cooling is Right Under Your Feet" on his lawn.

Tangorre is having a ground-source heat pump and underground pipes from Dandelion Energy installed which would provide geothermal heating and cooling for his residence. He saw this as a solution to how his furnace has already gone beyond

its 20-year lifespan and how he never had an airconditioning system. Dandelion Energy,

a company that was an offshoot from Google three years ago, has begun expanding its business of providing geothermal heating and cooling systems for residences across the Northeast region.

DE Senior Energy Consultant Nick Matthews explained that the geothermal cooling/heating

system comprises of two main parts. First, there are underground pipes below the frostline where water is circulated in a closed loop to naturally absorb heat from the ground which is then pumped into the system's second part the heat pump. Heat is then extracted and then compressed and circulated throughout the home for the resident's convenience. He said that this "is much more energy-efficient and it gets people away from using natural gas, oil and



propane."

Tangorre — who said he has a background in the hotel industry, housekeeping, facility maintenance and environmental initiatives - said he first became interested in becoming a DE customer after coming across an Instagram advertisement in early February. "From the hotel perspective, I was getting engrossed with learning

how hotels are trying to lower their environmental impact, everything from putting solar panels to the roof, to finding less toxic cleaning chemicals and more," he said. "So that's kind of how I got interested in Dandelion Energy for my house, both from a personal and professional level."

Saying that Dandelion Energy's products are environmentally-friendly,

Tangorre said it has a great return of investment since it requires little maintenance except for a quick filter change once or twice a year, and how its system is said to last over 20 years, more than the standard 15 to 20 years for a furnace. Matthews said it helps to remove the risk of carbon monoxide presence in a household and there

will be a monitoring system which provides real-time data on how the heat pump and pipes are functioning.

While Matthews said the installation process can range from five days to two weeks, he said new customers need to be aware that parts of their lawn will have to be dug up first so that the underground pipes can be installed. "It's going to be messy but Dandelion Energy has been very forthright with what you should expect," he said. "There's no disadvantage to all this except that there will be a brief disruption to your property. There will be actual drilling and entrenching. We would then put back the soil afterwards."

He added that most homeowners are financing the system's payments through 10 to 20 yearloans, "These have stable pricing so you know what exactly to pay as opposed to the fluctuating price that comes with natural gas, for example. Very few customers have bought the system in a lump sum."

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Speaking of customers, Tangorre said that his system's installation process has literally attracted several curious onlookers' attention who have begun asking about Dandelion Energy and geothermal heating/ cooling. "The interest has been positive so far and I know for certain that one neighbor has approached the company about it," he said. "And for me, I'm looking forward to having the system up and running, it's gonna be fantastic."

Tangorre also believed that New York residents could benefit from having a geothermal heating/cooling system installed in their residences. "I really think it makes a difference for people who've long used gas or propane. I think it will be beneficial for communities and it makes sense for the environment too," he concluded. "Don't hesitate when learning about all this technology. I mean, I enjoyed learning about all this but in the end, you're just gonna go up to your thermostat and adjust for hot or cold. You don't need to be mired in all the technical details."



Truly an old song

Old Songs lives up to its name

VOORHEESVILLE — "Hey, I'm looking for an old fiddle. Know where I can find one?"

This seemingly small conversation in the minutiae of life is what Old Songs Inc. is all about. It was no different on a Monday morning when a friendly resident stopped by for some guidance. Joy Bennett, the establishment's executive director, took three minutes to talk with the customer.

"I can ask around," she said. "Let me take down your info." A long pause gripped the air. "I got you," she continued. "I will see what I can find! Thanks for stopping in!"

Many know Old Songs from the Old Songs Folk Festival that camps out in Altamont each summer. Bennett, who was hired as the new executive director only seven months ago, found Old Songs through the aforementioned festival and has been attending for 27 years. "My good friend once told me there are only a couple of festivals that she will attend every year without getting compensated, and Old Songs is one of them," Bennett said. "I feel exactly the same way."

Bennett has performed at the festival for years. She has been a singer in the Johnson Girls, a maritime chanting group, for the past 23 years. Bennett explained how the group broke the glass ceiling for its genre in 1997.

"This is truly a male-dominated genre," she said. "People thought we would be just a flash in the pan, but we became a novelty. Part of the reason we've been so successful is because we're not together 24/7."

Bennett got her start when she was younger. She volunteered at the South Street Sea Port Museum in Manhattan. She quickly grew to love the chants and was hooked. She took a 10-year break from music entirely but found herself coming back and realizing she never wanted to leave again.

"The Folk Music Society of New York is really what brought me back," she said. "I love what I do and I can never imagine

leaving again."

Bennett's own trials and tribulations are partially what have made her go from fan to employee. Being a performer, she knows what other performers need. Having been in her position and been a part of planning shows, she can also easily organize shows and be the voice of the venue.

"Something I'm proud of with my work

here is how I am able to help performers because I know both sides of the fence in this industry," she said. "The sheets say one thing for a group, but I'm able to talk to them more personally and really think about what they need to be successful."

It's this type of attention, even from the workers before Bennett, that has kept Old Songs going. Kay "Andy" Spence

started the business out of her garage. In 1977, the organization became a nonprofit. The website states, "Our mission is to present a diverse menu of traditional, folk, Celtic and world music to the public and encourage live and participatory acoustically-based music."

Bennett explained that in the 38 years it's been in business, the organization developed over a period of time — until 2003, it didn't even have a place to call home. This all changed when the Spences bought the Old Songs Community Arts

Center, a special location that hosts a performing studio, office spaces and classrooms. With all of the classes it offers, the organization needs the space to accommodate and the space to grow.

The staff sticks true to the roots of their employer — Bennett said all staff members have a love for music and an appreciation for the work that goes into it.

"I think part of the reason we are so successful is because we are there for the performers," she explained. "We are able to



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work around schedules and be flexible. The biggest thing you want for any act is a full house."

While sometimes it's hard to avoid conflicts entirely, Bennett said she makes sure the venue does whatever it can to go that extra mile for its guests. It seems to be working; each year, the venue hosts names you know, names you don't know and names you definitely should know.

"I grew up on pop," she said. "I love all kinds of music. However, I love how folk music is participatory."

The festival each summer is just that participatory. The three-day festival has everything a music lover could want. Taking place from June 28 to June 30 at the Altamont Fairgrounds, Bennett promises there will be "something for everyone" at this year's festival. Joining the lineup are groups like Emma's Revolution, Bill Staines, John McCutcheon, Poor Man's Gambit, Magpie and Mulebone, just to name a few. Parents can kick back and sing along to their favorite tunes while children can join the Great Groove Band if they want a chance to get on the main stage for themselves.

"The Great Groove Band is for children 18 and under," Bennett explained. "No experience is necessary. We rehearse for two hours a day. On the last day, the students perform a concert on the main

stage."

Bennett said the concerts are often a hit. By the end of the weekend, the students not only perform a concert, but they've learned new skills most of the time and they work together to create something. No stress, no competition, just music.

The adults have their own party too. A nighttime dance is hosted from 11 p.m. to 1 a.m. on festival nights. Bennett said some people come just to attend that, albeit with a nominal fee.

"Music is a tough thing to get an audience in," she continued. "However, when I go to the festival, I see people of all walks of life coming to hear performers of all different origins. All are enjoying the music and having a great time. The performers listen to others when they're not on. It's hard to find that environment in the world these days."

The feelings of friendship and closeness that the festival — and organization in general - offers is what keeps Bennett coming back year after year.

"Think about a gathering of 1,500 to 2,000 of your closest friends," she concluded. "These people might not know each other when they walk in. But once you leave, that feeling of community stays with you for a long time. That's the best thing we have here."

NEW SCOTLAND - You would think the center of town would actually be the physical center of town. However, the Capital District isn't your traditional area.

In New Scotland, there is only one area that's truly zoned to be a commercial and retail area. That little area is at the intersection of Routes 85 and 85A, a perpendicular meeting of two roads that house some of the biggest businesses in town. Staples like Falvo's Meat Market, the area's premier destination for choice cuts, are joined by the cute and quaint Something Olde, Something New, which calls the beloved Stonewell Plaza its home.

"I've seen Stonewell Plaza grow substantially," said New Scotland Town Historian Robert Parmenter, who has served since 1974. The plaza once housed Falvo's before it moved to its new residence a little up Route 85A in 1974. Falvo's

owner Joe Robilotto is now selling the meat shop. Something Olde, Something New has held shop since 1997. Stonewell Plaza merges the old New Scotland with the modern, jazzy new era of fast retail and expansive development.

Stonewell Plaza has had its own growth spurt. Plazas can't have growth spurts, right? Wrong.

The plaza site was a simple delicatessen

and snack bar. Owned by Herb and Dexter Davis, the 1950s-era store sat sleepily on what would eventually be the town's most populated retail center. The Davis' must have known the potential; in 1955, they opened an Italian-style restaurant. As the plaza expanded, so did the offerings. Eventually, a grocery store joined the ranks. Soon, the Italian restaurant was gone, overtaken by the

grocery store. The grocery store was then followed by its trusty sidekicks — small businesses like restaurants and retail stores.

Stonewell Plaza got its name from the well that used to be out front. Now covered by a parking lot, the name serves as a reminder of simpler times.

Parmenter noted that the famous corner also once held a convent training center for nuns right before the intersection headed toward Delmar, which has since been several sports bars. All have closed. That lot is now vacant.

New Scotland wasn't always its own little slice of heaven. The town broke away from Bethlehem in 1832. The first town meeting was held right across the street from the plaza site, at the sincedemolished Raynsford House. Named for Edmund Raynsford, residents met on April 19, 1833 as their own town. The Raynsford House continued to serve as a town center until it burned down in 1898, when the King House was built in its place. The King House is known for cows on the front porch — no, seriously.

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"The King House was known as this abandoned, creepy place where people thought there were ghosts," Parmenter said. "When it was up, you would often see area cows walking up on the front porch."

The King House was eventually torn down. The vacant lot is now green, with several trees blocking the view and shielding the excessive sunlight.

Across the street from the now vacant lot where the houses once stood, an old gas station sits quietly.

Believe it or not, Parmenter said this once was a hotel. Built in 1830, it was owned by John Reid until it was sold to Edmund Raynsford. The hotel also served as the town post office for quite some time.

The hotel days came to an end with the help of Charles Bender, who owned the Bender Melon Farm a little past Falvo's Meat Market.

Bender has purchased the hotel as a means of necessity. At the time, his workers would drink at the hotel in excess.

Getting frustrated with his help, he decided to buy out the hotel and turned it into three apartments, closing the bar. Eventually, the hotel itself was torn down in the late 60s, and the gas station was put in. The gas station is now out of business.

Ready for summer

John Boyd Thacher State Park expecting large crowds soon

NEW SCOTLAND

— The John Boyd Thacher State Park is ready to welcome even more visitors this year as some of its programs, amenities and facilities are planned to open soon to cater to the expected large crowds.

Park Manager Nola DalGallo said that the state park's 8,240 square-foot Visitor Center, which first opened on May 4, 2017, has greatly helped attract visitors in recent years.

Costing \$3.8 million,

she said, "It has become a focal point to welcome incoming patrons and to showcase the beauty of the park itself. We've seen so many familiar faces pass through there too and there's definitely a repeat of business since we have a cast of regulars who come."

The Visitor Center contains geological and historical exhibits about the Helderberg Escarpment, and also provides engaging family-friendly activities.

According to the state park's website, it also has a conference room for groups under 25 and the Helderberg Room which boasts scenic views and an ideal space for social gatherings like weddings, birthday parties, receptions and anniversaries. While she was not able to disclose how many visitors came to the state park in 2016 and 2017 for comparison, DalGallo said that around 542,000 people visited in 2018 and is hoping for more this year.

"Summer is definitely our busiest time of year but lots of people still come for the fall to see the leaves fall," she said. "But we are a year-round facility and although we're obviously not too busy in winter since people don't generally want to leave their warm houses, we've never worried about the winter. Regardless of the seasons, the views are still beautiful and fantastic."

When asked what people can expect in the coming weeks, DalGallo said that the state park's





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Wild Play Adventure Course, which first opened in 2017, will commence operations this year from May 3 through October 27.

This showcases 15 zip lines, 60 aerial games, rope swings, wobbly bridges, log ladders, cargo nets and more — to bridge the connection between engaging youth and enjoying nature.

DalGallo perceived this as a "wonderful addition to help us continue to be a family-friendly facility."

She also brought up that the Thompson's Lake Campground will open on the first weekend of May which consists of 140 wooded campsites, a beach, forests and open fields.

Families can take advantage of this summerready location to go on nature trails, fishing, children-appropriate playgrounds and more.

She added that the Emma Treadwell Thacher Nature Center, an allyear operational facility, is planned to welcome many school field trips and host informational programs.

Connecting this with how the state park offers education on local, cultural, and geological history too, DalGallo said that mainly local schools have come for trips and "this is an amazing resource in their backyards. I'm very happy they've taken advantage of that."

She also said that the state park welcomes numerous out-of-state colleges too.

When asked what is the state park's most popular attraction, DalGallo did not hesitate.

"Oh my goodness,

without question, the Indian Ladder Trail," she said. "It's so iconic because it's one of the few trails to take you under the escarpment and it's been here for such a long time."

She added that while the trail is presumed to open this May or early June, it is closed annually for inspections and based on weather conditions.

"It has been known to also get too icy in the winter as it does not get enough sun as the other trails do," she said.

With all these in mind, DalGallo concluded, "We all have a love of nature and it's good for your mental health like smelling fresh air and enjoying the environment. Everyone should visit state parks in general and the turnout here has been really great."

The Thacher family legacy

ALBANY COUNTY - The best known Thacher family legacy sits atop the distinctive Helderberg Escarpment in New Scotland.

Thousands of people visit the John Boyd Thacher Park every year to enjoy the view, hike the trails or just have a picnic. Three Thachers were mayors of Albany: George Thacher, his grandson John Boyd Thacher, the park's namesake, and his nephew, John Boyd Thacher II.

Then there was Ebby, as he was known, or, more properly, Edwin Throckmorton Thacher. He was John Boyd Thacher II's brother.

Ebby Thacher was born in 1896, and wasted no time becoming the family's black sheep. The man just could not stay sober, according to historical

accounts, and spent his entire life in an endless cycle of drying out and soaking in a bottle, only to repeat the cycle again and again.

With the help of what was known as the Oxford Group, Thacher did get a stretch of sobriety based that organization's fundamental formula for living: honesty, purity, unselfishness and love.

Drinking to oblivion has no place in those four behavioral characteristics, so it became a lifestyle that helped Thacher stayed sober, even though the group's purpose was not designed with alcoholism in mind.

One day, in November 1934, shortly after Thacher found a God could help him stay sober, his longtime drinking buddy Bill Wilson was on an epic bender that would eventually land him back to a hospital or sanatorium and Thacher was, uncharacteristically, on the wagon and in good health and spirits.

At the end of any

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bender, health and outlook are at their low points.

Wilson, after the initial upset about his drinking partner not joining in his misery, was intrigued as to why Thacher was so happy without a drink in him. And more importantly, how?

Thacher told him about the Oxford Group and the four principles that would become the bedrock of Alcoholics Anonymous.

In the Akron, Ohio hospital, Bill Wilson and Dr. Bob Smith, himself a chronic alcoholic, began formulating the structure of a peer mentoring group with the sole purpose of helping other alcoholics stay sober.

At that time, according to the AA General Services Office in New York City, there were two members.

In 2017, there were more than two million but, admittedly, it is difficult to keep an accurate count because an expectation of

membership is, as the name implies, anonymity.

What is known as the "Big Book" of Alcoholics Anonymous was published in 1939 by Wilson and Smith, or as they were known for years simply Bill W. and Dr. Bob.

It expounds on the Oxford Group's teachings in a number of ways, but one Bill W. credits as the key to long term sobriety — helping other alcoholics get and stay sober.

Prior to his program, Bill W. is described as craving the center of attention.

But as per the tradition of anonymity, he refused an honorary degree from Yale and did not allow his photo to be taken, even from the back, when Time magazine named him one of the "Top 100 Most Important People of the 20th Century."

The AA program has since been modified and applied to a number of addictions and disorders such as narcotics, gambling and eating, but the fundamental 12 steps remain unchanged, and while there are critics of the program, it has worked for millions of people around the world.

And that is not including the countless millions who have their lives impacted by the active addict.

Indeed, that number encompasses society as a whole.

When Ebby Thacher died in 1966 he was, it is believed, sober.

But, while Bill W. and Dr. Bob did not touch another drop from 1934 to their deaths in 1971 and 1950, respectively, Thacher kept spinning in the revolving door of sobriety and active alcoholism.

To this day, while AA and its founders are widely known, only those interested in AA history know about Ebby Thacher's critical role in its formation.

His inability to live a truly sober life, to this day, serves as a reminder of how chronic alcoholism is, and how a deadened compulsion can rekindle with unbridled fury after just one sip.

Just a trot down 85 to the right, across from New Scotland Presbyterian Church, the town hall sits on the right side. Parmenter explained the rich history of the town's offices.

"The town hall was built in 1804 and was a schoolhouse," he said. "The school ceased in 1953 and the old schoolhouse is built somewhere into the current town hall."

These renovations took place in 1957. Several additions have been built since then. The town hall has now stood there for 62 years.

While businesses like Falvo's, Something Olde, Something New, Studio 85 and Pizza by Dominick hold steady, Parmenter chalks the evolution of businesses up to the particular needs of each business.

"There really hasn't been any one reason for people going out," he said. "It's subjective. That being said, we know people here do not want big box stores."

Much of the area around the plaza is up for sale. After the big box scare in 2010, when Sphere Development was looking to get approval to build a 750,000-square-

foot retail shopping center. After significant public outcry, the plans were scrapped.

Residents still have a reason to be nervous, too.

In April 2016, the Hilton Barn, a 100-year-old landmark and one of the oldest barns in the Capital District, was moved due to pending development.

The old barn was moved to the other side of Route 85A, nestling next to the Albany County Rail Trail. Nearly 100 residents gathered to watch the barn move. The barn used to sit on the land of the The corner was once the home of a hotel. The hotel was started by a person named John Reid in 1830. The building survived until the 1960s.

Colonie Country Club. If it wasn't moved, the historic structure would have been demolished.

Parmenter said there is no rush for development, especially if the proposals are not right for the area. Residents want the small town feeling the center intersection offers, while still having the choices that the several businesses offer.

"This has always been the center of town," Parmenter said about the intersection. The center that isn't a center, but is highly regarded as the town's retail metropolis.

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

Truly an old song

Old Songs lives up to its name

VOORHEESVILLE — "Hey, I'm looking for an old fiddle. Know where I can find one?"

This seemingly small conversation in the minutiae of life is what Old Songs Inc. is all about. It was no different on a Monday morning when a friendly resident stopped by for some guidance. Joy Bennett, the establishment's executive director, took three minutes to talk with the customer.

"I can ask around," she said. "Let me take down your info." A long pause gripped the air. "I got you," she continued. "I will see what I can find! Thanks for stopping in!"

Many know Old Songs from the Old Songs Folk Festival that camps out in Altamont each summer. Bennett, who was hired as the new executive director only seven months ago, found Old Songs through the aforementioned festival and has been attending for 27 years. "My good friend once told me there are only a couple of festivals that she will attend every year without getting compensated, and Old Songs is one of them," Bennett said. "I feel exactly the same way."

Bennett has performed at the festival for years. She has been a singer in the Johnson Girls, a maritime chanting group, for the past 23 years. Bennett explained how the group broke the glass ceiling for its genre in 1997.

"This is truly a male-dominated genre," she said. "People thought we would be just a flash in the pan, but we became a novelty. Part of the reason we've been so successful is because we're not together 24/7."

Bennett got her start when she was younger. She volunteered at the South Street Sea Port Museum in Manhattan. She quickly grew to love the chants and was hooked. She took a 10-year break from music entirely but found herself coming back and realizing she never wanted to leave again.

"The Folk Music Society of New York is really what brought me back," she said. "I love what I do and I can never imagine

leaving again."

Bennett's own trials and tribulations are partially what have made her go from fan to employee. Being a performer, she knows what other performers need. Having been in her position and been a part of planning shows, she can also easily organize shows and be the voice of the venue.

"Something I'm proud of with my work

here is how I am able to help performers because I know both sides of the fence in this industry," she said. "The sheets say one thing for a group, but I'm able to talk to them more personally and really think about what they need to be successful."

It's this type of attention, even from the workers before Bennett, that has kept Old Songs going. Kay "Andy" Spence

started the business out of her garage. In 1977, the organization became a nonprofit. The website states, "Our mission is to present a diverse menu of traditional, folk, Celtic and world music to the public and encourage live and participatory acoustically-based music."

Bennett explained that in the 38 years it's been in business, the organization developed over a period of time — until 2003, it didn't even have a place to call home. This all changed when the Spences bought the Old Songs Community Arts

Center, a special location that hosts a performing studio, office spaces and classrooms. With all of the classes it offers, the organization needs the space to accommodate and the space to grow.

The staff sticks true to the roots of their employer — Bennett said all staff members have a love for music and an appreciation for the work that goes into it.

"I think part of the reason we are so successful is because we are there for the performers," she explained. "We are able to



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work around schedules and be flexible. The biggest thing you want for any act is a full house."

While sometimes it's hard to avoid conflicts entirely, Bennett said she makes sure the venue does whatever it can to go that extra mile for its guests. It seems to be working; each year, the venue hosts names you know, names you don't know and names you definitely should know.

"I grew up on pop," she said. "I love all kinds of music. However, I love how folk music is participatory."

The festival each summer is just that participatory. The three-day festival has everything a music lover could want. Taking place from June 28 to June 30 at the Altamont Fairgrounds, Bennett promises there will be "something for everyone" at this year's festival. Joining the lineup are groups like Emma's Revolution, Bill Staines, John McCutcheon, Poor Man's Gambit, Magpie and Mulebone, just to name a few. Parents can kick back and sing along to their favorite tunes while children can join the Great Groove Band if they want a chance to get on the main stage for themselves.

"The Great Groove Band is for children 18 and under," Bennett explained. "No experience is necessary. We rehearse for two hours a day. On the last day, the students perform a concert on the main

stage."

Bennett said the concerts are often a hit. By the end of the weekend, the students not only perform a concert, but they've learned new skills most of the time and they work together to create something. No stress, no competition, just music.

The adults have their own party too. A nighttime dance is hosted from 11 p.m. to 1 a.m. on festival nights. Bennett said some people come just to attend that, albeit with a nominal fee.

"Music is a tough thing to get an audience in," she continued. "However, when I go to the festival, I see people of all walks of life coming to hear performers of all different origins. All are enjoying the music and having a great time. The performers listen to others when they're not on. It's hard to find that environment in the world these days."

The feelings of friendship and closeness that the festival — and organization in general - offers is what keeps Bennett coming back year after year.

"Think about a gathering of 1,500 to 2,000 of your closest friends," she concluded. "These people might not know each other when they walk in. But once you leave, that feeling of community stays with you for a long time. That's the best thing we have here."

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I'll meet you at the intersection

The corner of 85 and 85A holds more than just retail

NEW SCOTLAND - You would think the center of town would actually be the physical center of town. However, the Capital District isn't your traditional area.

In New Scotland, there is only one area that's truly zoned to be a commercial and retail area. That little area is at the intersection of Routes 85 and 85A, a perpendicular meeting of two roads that house some of the biggest businesses in town. Staples like Falvo's Meat Market, the area's premier destination for choice cuts, are joined by the cute and quaint Something Olde, Something New, which calls the beloved Stonewell Plaza its home.

"I've seen Stonewell Plaza grow substantially," said New Scotland Town Historian Robert Parmenter, who has served since 1974. The plaza once housed Falvo's before it moved to its new residence a little up Route 85A in 1974. Falvo's

owner Joe Robilotto is now selling the meat shop. Something Olde, Something New has held shop since 1997. Stonewell Plaza merges the old New Scotland with the modern, jazzy new era of fast retail and expansive development.

Stonewell Plaza has had its own growth spurt. Plazas can't have growth spurts, right? Wrong.

The plaza site was a simple delicatessen

and snack bar. Owned by Herb and Dexter Davis, the 1950s-era store sat sleepily on what would eventually be the town's most populated retail center. The Davis' must have known the potential; in 1955, they opened an Italian-style restaurant. As the plaza expanded, so did the offerings. Eventually, a grocery store joined the ranks. Soon, the Italian restaurant was gone, overtaken by the

grocery store. The grocery store was then followed by its trusty sidekicks — small businesses like restaurants and retail stores.

Stonewell Plaza got its name from the well that used to be out front. Now covered by a parking lot, the name serves as a reminder of simpler times.

Parmenter noted that the famous corner also once held a convent training center for nuns right before the intersection headed toward Delmar, which has since been several sports bars. All have closed. That lot is now vacant.

New Scotland wasn't always its own little slice of heaven. The town broke away from Bethlehem in 1832. The first town meeting was held right across the street from the plaza site, at the sincedemolished Raynsford House. Named for Edmund Raynsford, residents met on April 19, 1833 as their own town. The Raynsford House continued to serve as a town center until it burned down in 1898, when the King House was built in its place. The King House is known for cows on the front porch — no, seriously.

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"The King House was known as this abandoned, creepy place where people thought there were ghosts," Parmenter said. "When it was up, you would often see area cows walking up on the front porch."

The King House was eventually torn down. The vacant lot is now green, with several trees blocking the view and shielding the excessive sunlight.

Across the street from the now vacant lot where the houses once stood, an old gas station sits quietly.

Believe it or not, Parmenter said this once was a hotel. Built in 1830, it was owned by John Reid until it was sold to Edmund Raynsford. The hotel also served as the town post office for quite some time.

The hotel days came to an end with the help of Charles Bender, who owned the Bender Melon Farm a little past Falvo's Meat Market.

Bender has purchased the hotel as a means of necessity. At the time, his workers would drink at the hotel in excess.

Getting frustrated with his help, he decided to buy out the hotel and turned it into three apartments, closing the bar. Eventually, the hotel itself was torn down in the late 60s, and the gas station was put in. The gas station is now out of business.

Ready for summer

John Boyd Thacher State Park expecting large crowds soon

NEW SCOTLAND

— The John Boyd Thacher State Park is ready to welcome even more visitors this year as some of its programs, amenities and facilities are planned to open soon to cater to the expected large crowds.

Park Manager Nola DalGallo said that the state park's 8,240 square-foot Visitor Center, which first opened on May 4, 2017, has greatly helped attract visitors in recent years.

Costing \$3.8 million,

she said, "It has become a focal point to welcome incoming patrons and to showcase the beauty of the park itself. We've seen so many familiar faces pass through there too and there's definitely a repeat of business since we have a cast of regulars who come."

The Visitor Center contains geological and historical exhibits about the Helderberg Escarpment, and also provides engaging family-friendly activities.

According to the state park's website, it also has a conference room for groups under 25 and the Helderberg Room which boasts scenic views and an ideal space for social gatherings like weddings, birthday parties, receptions and anniversaries. While she was not able to disclose how many visitors came to the state park in 2016 and 2017 for comparison, DalGallo said that around 542,000 people visited in 2018 and is hoping for more this year.

"Summer is definitely our busiest time of year but lots of people still come for the fall to see the leaves fall," she said. "But we are a year-round facility and although we're obviously not too busy in winter since people don't generally want to leave their warm houses, we've never worried about the winter. Regardless of the seasons, the views are still beautiful and fantastic."

When asked what people can expect in the coming weeks, DalGallo said that the state park's





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Wild Play Adventure Course, which first opened in 2017, will commence operations this year from May 3 through October 27.

This showcases 15 zip lines, 60 aerial games, rope swings, wobbly bridges, log ladders, cargo nets and more — to bridge the connection between engaging youth and enjoying nature.

DalGallo perceived this as a "wonderful addition to help us continue to be a family-friendly facility."

She also brought up that the Thompson's Lake Campground will open on the first weekend of May which consists of 140 wooded campsites, a beach, forests and open fields.

Families can take advantage of this summerready location to go on nature trails, fishing, children-appropriate playgrounds and more.

She added that the Emma Treadwell Thacher Nature Center, an allyear operational facility, is planned to welcome many school field trips and host informational programs.

Connecting this with how the state park offers education on local, cultural, and geological history too, DalGallo said that mainly local schools have come for trips and "this is an amazing resource in their backyards. I'm very happy they've taken advantage of that."

She also said that the state park welcomes numerous out-of-state colleges too.

When asked what is the state park's most popular attraction, DalGallo did not hesitate.

"Oh my goodness,

without question, the Indian Ladder Trail," she said. "It's so iconic because it's one of the few trails to take you under the escarpment and it's been here for such a long time."

She added that while the trail is presumed to open this May or early June, it is closed annually for inspections and based on weather conditions.

"It has been known to also get too icy in the winter as it does not get enough sun as the other trails do," she said.

With all these in mind, DalGallo concluded, "We all have a love of nature and it's good for your mental health like smelling fresh air and enjoying the environment. Everyone should visit state parks in general and the turnout here has been really great."

The Thacher family legacy

ALBANY COUNTY - The best known Thacher family legacy sits atop the distinctive Helderberg Escarpment in New Scotland.

Thousands of people visit the John Boyd Thacher Park every year to enjoy the view, hike the trails or just have a picnic. Three Thachers were mayors of Albany: George Thacher, his grandson John Boyd Thacher, the park's namesake, and his nephew, John Boyd Thacher II.

Then there was Ebby, as he was known, or, more properly, Edwin Throckmorton Thacher. He was John Boyd Thacher II's brother.

Ebby Thacher was born in 1896, and wasted no time becoming the family's black sheep. The man just could not stay sober, according to historical

accounts, and spent his entire life in an endless cycle of drying out and soaking in a bottle, only to repeat the cycle again and again.

With the help of what was known as the Oxford Group, Thacher did get a stretch of sobriety based that organization's fundamental formula for living: honesty, purity, unselfishness and love.

Drinking to oblivion has no place in those four behavioral characteristics, so it became a lifestyle that helped Thacher stayed sober, even though the group's purpose was not designed with alcoholism in mind.

One day, in November 1934, shortly after Thacher found a God could help him stay sober, his longtime drinking buddy Bill Wilson was on an epic bender that would eventually land him back to a hospital or sanatorium and Thacher was, uncharacteristically, on the wagon and in good health and spirits.

At the end of any

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bender, health and outlook are at their low points.

Wilson, after the initial upset about his drinking partner not joining in his misery, was intrigued as to why Thacher was so happy without a drink in him. And more importantly, how?

Thacher told him about the Oxford Group and the four principles that would become the bedrock of Alcoholics Anonymous.

In the Akron, Ohio hospital, Bill Wilson and Dr. Bob Smith, himself a chronic alcoholic, began formulating the structure of a peer mentoring group with the sole purpose of helping other alcoholics stay sober.

At that time, according to the AA General Services Office in New York City, there were two members.

In 2017, there were more than two million but, admittedly, it is difficult to keep an accurate count because an expectation of

membership is, as the name implies, anonymity.

What is known as the "Big Book" of Alcoholics Anonymous was published in 1939 by Wilson and Smith, or as they were known for years simply Bill W. and Dr. Bob.

It expounds on the Oxford Group's teachings in a number of ways, but one Bill W. credits as the key to long term sobriety — helping other alcoholics get and stay sober.

Prior to his program, Bill W. is described as craving the center of attention.

But as per the tradition of anonymity, he refused an honorary degree from Yale and did not allow his photo to be taken, even from the back, when Time magazine named him one of the "Top 100 Most Important People of the 20th Century."

The AA program has since been modified and applied to a number of addictions and disorders such as narcotics, gambling and eating, but the fundamental 12 steps remain unchanged, and while there are critics of the program, it has worked for millions of people around the world.

And that is not including the countless millions who have their lives impacted by the active addict.

Indeed, that number encompasses society as a whole.

When Ebby Thacher died in 1966 he was, it is believed, sober.

But, while Bill W. and Dr. Bob did not touch another drop from 1934 to their deaths in 1971 and 1950, respectively, Thacher kept spinning in the revolving door of sobriety and active alcoholism.

To this day, while AA and its founders are widely known, only those interested in AA history know about Ebby Thacher's critical role in its formation.

His inability to live a truly sober life, to this day, serves as a reminder of how chronic alcoholism is, and how a deadened compulsion can rekindle with unbridled fury after just one sip.

Just a trot down 85 to the right, across from New Scotland Presbyterian Church, the town hall sits on the right side. Parmenter explained the rich history of the town's offices.

"The town hall was built in 1804 and was a schoolhouse," he said. "The school ceased in 1953 and the old schoolhouse is built somewhere into the current town hall."

These renovations took place in 1957. Several additions have been built since then. The town hall has now stood there for 62 years.

While businesses like Falvo's, Something Olde, Something New, Studio 85 and Pizza by Dominick hold steady, Parmenter chalks the evolution of businesses up to the particular needs of each business.

"There really hasn't been any one reason for people going out," he said. "It's subjective. That being said, we know people here do not want big box stores."

Much of the area around the plaza is up for sale. After the big box scare in 2010, when Sphere Development was looking to get approval to build a 750,000-square-

foot retail shopping center. After significant public outcry, the plans were scrapped.

Residents still have a reason to be nervous, too.

In April 2016, the Hilton Barn, a 100-year-old landmark and one of the oldest barns in the Capital District, was moved due to pending development.

The old barn was moved to the other side of Route 85A, nestling next to the Albany County Rail Trail. Nearly 100 residents gathered to watch the barn move. The barn used to sit on the land of the The corner was once the home of a hotel. The hotel was started by a person named John Reid in 1830. The building survived until the 1960s.

Colonie Country Club. If it wasn't moved, the historic structure would have been demolished.

Parmenter said there is no rush for development, especially if the proposals are not right for the area. Residents want the small town feeling the center intersection offers, while still having the choices that the several businesses offer.

"This has always been the center of town," Parmenter said about the intersection. The center that isn't a center, but is highly regarded as the town's retail metropolis.

Powerful, one-woman play comes to town in honor of Labor History Month



1-Up your computer gear

Simple ways to extend the life of your laptop

omputers were once sizable investments. But much like the cost of high-definition televisions and entertainment systems has dropped considerably over the last decade, so, too, has the cost of desktop and laptop computers.


According to the Statistics Portal, which gathers statistics from more than 22,500 sources, by 2022, sales figures for laptops are expected to outnumber desktop computer sales by a margin of nearly two to one. Many working professionals prefer laptops, now widely referred to as notebooks, to desktop computers because of their flexibility. Laptops can be taken on the go, but also used at home or in an office, where they can be plugged into relatively inexpensive monitors to provide the same user experience as desktops.

Laptop prices vary, but the tech resource CNET. com notes that various reliable budget laptops can be purchased for less than \$1,000, with some, such as some models of the Samsung Chromebook Pro, available for around \$500. But just because a laptop might not break the bank, that does not mean users won't want to get several years out of them. The following are some simple ways laptop users can extend the life of their machines.

Add more RAM. Low amounts of RAM on a laptop can adversely affect its performance. According to Laptopmag.com, adding more RAM can help a laptop overcome sluggishness and maintain its performance when users have several internet tabs open. RAM is the physical memory on a computer, and when there's not enough physical memory, which is often the case with older laptops, performance will suffer. Upgrading from four GB of RAM to eight GB can cost as little as \$30 and provide a lot of bang for the buck.

Replace an old battery. An old battery likely won't affect performance, but it can affect hardware that can shorten the laptop's lifespan. Batteries that don't charge well or discharge too quickly, which can happen with aging batteries, can threaten the hardware on a laptop. That's because, to operate effectively, hardware must draw a specific amount of amps from the battery. However, when the battery is old or operating inefficiently or ineffectively, the hardware will overheat because the fans do not have enough power to cool them down. Over time, such overheating causes damage to the hardware, shortening the life expectancy of the laptop as a result. A new battery won't break the bank, making this another inexpensive way to extend the life of a laptop.

Switch to a solid-state drive. A solid-state drive, or



SSD, is now included in many new laptops. But users relying on older laptops may still be using hard-disk drives, or HDDs. HDDs contain a lot of moving parts that can wear out over time, affecting the performance of the laptop. SSDs contain no such moving parts, allowing them to deliver much better performance, including fast boot speeds and improved app speed.

Laptop users whose have noticed a dip in the performance of their machines can try several simple strategies to revitalize their laptops.







hicken can be served in various ways, and that versatility no doubt contributes to the popularity of poultry. Some people love their chicken fried, while others can't get enough grilled chicken. Baking chicken may not be as popular as frying or grilling it, but baked chicken is no less delicious. For chicken lovers used to frying or grilling their favorite meals, the following recipe for "Home-Style Baked Chicken" from Laurie McNamara's "Simply Scratch: 120 Wholesome Homemade Recipes Made Easy" (Avery) may just make you a baked chicken devotee.

Home–Style Baked Chicken

Ingredients: Serves 4

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 11/2 teaspoons Poultry Seasoning (see below) 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- cup unbleached all-purpose flour 1
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- to 5 pounds skin-on, bone-in chicken thighs and 4 drumsticks

Instructions:

Preheat the oven and a 9-by-13-inch metal roasting pan to 375°F. Place the olive oil and butter in the pan and place the pan in the oven on the lower rack.

In a small bowl, combine the poultry seasoning, salt and pepper. Set aside.

Place the flour in a resealable bag. Place a few pieces of the chicken in the flour at a time, seal, and shake to coat. Remove and vigorously shake off any excess flour. Place the flour-dusted chicken on a clean platter. Repeat with the remaining chicken pieces.

Remove the roasting pan from the oven and immediately arrange the chicken skin-side up in a single layer over the bottom of the pan and then sprinkle with some of the poultry seasoning blend and paprika. It should sizzle.

Place the hot pan back on the lower rack of the oven and bake for 20 minutes. Remove, baste by spooning the juices that have collected in the pan over each piece, and then sprinkle the chicken with the remaining poultry seasoning blend.

Return the pan to the oven and bake for 20 minutes more. Remove and baste one last time before moving the chicken to the middle rack and baking for 10 to 15 minutes more to further crisp the chicken skin.

Let rest for 5 to 8 minutes before serving.

Poultry Seasoning

Makes 3 tablespoons

- 3 teaspoons dried thyme
- teaspoons dried marjoram 11/2
- teaspoon dried rosemary 1
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg

- 2 teaspoons paprika
- 2 teaspoons ground sage

In a spice grinder or using a mortar and pestle, combine 2 teaspoons of the thyme, the marjoram and the rosemary. Blend until finely ground. Transfer to an airtight container and add the remaining 1 teaspoon thyme, the nutmeg, the paprika, and the sage. Store in a dry, dark place for up to 6 months.

Itching to go out

How to identify poison ivy

poison ivy is an unwelcome guest on many properties. Unfortunately, many people don't recognize the presence of poison ivy on their property until it's too late and they've already fallen victim to the uncomfortable, itchy red rash that is the plant's hallmark.

According to Poison-Ivy.org, a website providing information about poison ivy, poison oak and poison sumac, the rash from poison ivy may first appear as just a slight itchy spot. But that spot will gradually get worse and can even cover your entire body with giant red sores if left untreated or if it goes undetected for too long. That only highlights the importance of learning to recognize poison ivy on a property and taking the appropriate measures to prevent anyone from coming into contact with it.

Is all poison ivy the same?

Many people may be surprised to learn that all poison ivy plants are not one and the same. Poison-Ivy.org notes that there are different types of poison ivy in different places, so curious homeowners should visit the site to determine how to identify the type of poison ivy specific to where



they live. Eastern Poison Ivy grows on the ground, climbs and sometimes appears as a shrub. And despite its name, Eastern Poison Ivy grows from the east coast to the midwest, affecting people in middle American states like Kansas and Nebraska. Eastern Poison Ivy also can be found in some parts of Texas and Arizona.

Some telltale signs of the poison ivy plant?

Eastern Poison Ivy is the most widespread poison ivy plant, and these are some of its characteristics. (Note: People



who live outside of regions where Eastern Poison Ivy grows can learn about the characteristics of plants in their area by visiting www.Poison-Ivy.org).

• Poison ivy plants always have leaves of three. No poison ivy plants have more than three leaves.

• Poison ivy always grow left, then right. That means that the stem/branch of leaves closest to the root of the plant will always lean left. Subsequent stems/branches of leaves can lean right. Stems/branches of poison ivy leaves are never side by side.

• Poison ivy plants never have thorns.

• The edges of poison ivy leaves are never saw-toothed or scalloped.

• Poison ivy leaves will appear differently depending on the season. In spring, Eastern Poison Ivy leaves will appear red. As spring turns into summer, the leaves will gradually appear more green. Come fall, the green leaves will look as if they were brushed with red, with some leaves featuring patches or spots of red.

The poison ivy rash can be very uncomfortable. Learning to identify poison ivy plants can help people avoid the rash.

Dumbo falls

Diego addresses the elephant in the room in remake of classic Disney film

here was some hesitation when approaching this new liveaction remake of Disney's 1941 animated classic, "Dumbo" which hit theaters last Friday, March 29.

First, the original was just 64 minutes long, being one of the animation studio giant's shortest films, so there was the question of how its 2019 version could expand from that with worthy storytelling. Second, the original has since suffered from allegations that it contained racist undertones, like having several singing black crows which some critics argued were perpetuating African-American stereotypes of the time.

Third, it was not known whether the remake will portray the infamous scene from the original where Dumbo and his ally, Timothy Q. Mouse, got drunk and saw hallucinations of pink elephants. Fourth, while the original has now been viewed as one of Disney's underrated gems with memorable animation sequences and a heartfelt plot, the remake is directed by acclaimed director Tim Burton who is famous for his dark and eccentric style.

So, when the cinematic circus opened


to showcase a CGI-developed Dumbo, the elephant was not only faced with the above concerns, but challenged to soar past them with its adorable large ears. The result was, unfortunately, an average takeoff at best.

The remake chronicled Dumbo's birth and rise to becoming a performer at the traveling Medici Brothers' Circus in 1919, led by the passionate Max Medici (played by Danny DeVito). Dumbo was looked after by widowed equestrian performer and World War I veteran Holt Farrier (Colin Farrell), and his two children, Milly (Nico Parker) and Joe (Finley Hobbins). The circus company would struggle with the public mocking Dumbo's unusually large ears; Dumbo's mother, Jumbo, being sold away; and the mysterious arrival of Dreamland amusement park owner V.A. Vandevere (Michael Keaton) and his initially arrogant trapeze artist, Colette Marchant (Eva Green).

Burton deserved credit for trying his best to bring Dumbo's story to life, which he attempted by incorporating the aforementioned original human characters in the remake.

It is DeVito who outshined the rest of the cast with his uproarious disposition,

intelligent dialogue and sometimes humorous slapstick comedy. DeVito, who previously collaborated with Burton and Keaton in 1992's "Batman Returns," portrayed a believable and sympathetic ringmaster, whom the audience could root for as he works to keep his business and workers afloat despite Dumbo's performing shortcomings and Vandevere's antagonism.

Despite having lost his wife and his left arm from the war, Farrell's character was a respectable paternal figure whose genuine kindness towards his children, his colleagues, and Dumbo made him a well-deserved leading man here. Keaton's character felt underwritten though as his motives did not initially feel clear and his background was murky. When he revealed that he wanted Dumbo only for his amusement park, the delivery was not as impactful as one would hope and the result on the audience's part was a feeling of indifference as opposed to what Burton intended: shock.

Parker's character, Milly, Holt's scienceenthused daughter, struggled the most with her performance though. It immediately became apparent that her acting felt stale, as whenever she spoke, it sounded like she'd just read them straight from her dialogue papers, without producing much emotion or pizazz. Her dull, sullen facial The remake did benefit from cutting certain controversial aspects of the original film. The drunken Pink Elephants scene was referenced by a brief sequence of pink elephant-shaped bubbles and the allegedly-racist singing crows did not appear at all. expressions also made the first half of the film falter as she contrasted from her more enthusiastic brother, Joe, and she could not make Dumbo's formative scenes work. Perhaps her character should add acting to her list of future classes, besides science, once she would grow up.

With special effects and an overall sympathetic look, Dumbo himself tried to be the leading figure here. Since Timothy Q. Mouse was not by his side in the remake, Dumbo learned to fly instead with the help of the Farrier children and literally, a feather. His endearing attitude, initial naivete and expressive trunk were aspects that reminded viewers of Disney's classic filmmaking age of the 20th century, where childhood innocence presided.

As audiences have long known Dumbo's



name and his iconic large ears for decades now, it ironically felt jarring during scenes in this remake when characters made fun of the petite elephant. It was also a cringe experience in a sequence where Dumbo first accidentally revealed its giant ears to the public who then hurled insults at him, mocked him and turned away in disgust. It came to a point where a moviegoer has to wonder to oneself what exactly is embarrassing or sickening if an elephant has big ears.

The remake did benefit from cutting certain controversial aspects of the original film. The drunken Pink Elephants scene was referenced by a brief sequence of pink elephant-shaped bubbles and the allegedly-racist singing crows did not appear at all. For an iconic Disney classic that was known for evoking sympathy and crying sessions as Dumbo struggled with reuniting with his mother and being accepted for his ears, this remake strangely lacked a much-anticipated emotional punch. Perhaps amid all the grandiose special-effects elegance and sets, Burton did not make much room for heartfelt impact.

While it was still a thrill to watch Dumbo fly around the circus and over the amusement park at night, he forgot to bring an appropriate package of enriched storytelling and emotion with him — which, in itself, was the film's overarching tragedy.

If anyone could pull it off, it's Pigeons Playing Ping Pong, who brought the flock to an upstate New York mall filled with buzzing Saturday night consumers. 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

"I wake up at 35 feeling sore in places where I didn't when I was 25, Moore joked. Within that decade, he emerged as a bright, young star in the country music world. He's garnered six No. 1 hits, off the strength either ballads or stories of a small town man with a chip on his shoulder. His latest No. 1 hit, "Somebody Else Will" off his 2016 release "Kinda Don't Care," was a bit of a gamble.

"I stepped out of my comfort zone and did things a little differently on the last album," explains Moore. "We recorded some songs that became big hits for me that I probably wouldn't have cut earlier in my career. It was a lot of fun to try something new like that in the studio, but afterwards, I really just wanted to just get back into writing songs and make the most traditional sounding record I could."

Moore said he wanted to go back to the beach. Back where he met his wife, the mother of his four kids. Back where he's established roots since moving from Razorback Country in Arkansas.

"Before I ever had a record deal, my producer and I used to pop down to the beach in Florida and write for three or four days at a time," he said. The two would hole up in a motel — "Motel, not hotel," he said — to change the scenery and concentrate on writing. "I wanted to reconnect with that spirit on this new album, so I said, 'Let's go work down there again like we used to 10, 12 years ago," he said.

Moore has grown from an aspiring songwriter forced to learn his craft because no one wanted to provide him material once he arrived in Nashville. His new album, 'Late Nights and Longnecks,'is his sixth studio album. It's equal parts celebration and reflection, showcasing his storytelling, complemented by an all-star band featuring Grammy and CMA Award-winning guitar icon Brent Mason

and ACM-winning pedal steel hero Paul Franklin.

Moore hinted that this new album will reveal a slightly more matured country singer. A little less of the beer-drinking hellraiser — "[though] there's still some of that," he said — and a little more of the matured father he has since become.

The album was supposed to be released this month, but last week Moore took to social media to announce a July release date. He later took the time to announce this year's Flora-Bama Sunset Beach Concert Series for September. That intimate concert series in Pensacola, Florida will also host fellow country star Easton Corbin. Once he takes to the beach by then, fans will have had the album in hand for almost two months. It's something, he said, that is worth the wait.

"Not only is this my best album," he said, "it was the most fun I've ever had making a record. That's the whole reason I got into this business in the first place."

Moore takes to the Albany Palace Theatre stage this Saturday, April 13, at 8 p.m.

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
