

Glenmont biz debuting two new salsas

New recipes await in the kitchen

GLENMONT — Larry's All Natural has recently added two new sauces, Medium and Mild Chunky Salsas, into its growing line-up of products.

Each new sauce, but with a different spice level, is a combination of fresh tomatoes, green chiles, onions, jalapeno, cider vinegar, garlic, kosher salt and fresh cilantro.

These are vegan, glutenfree and have no added sugar.

They also will give customers more options, along with the three original sauces: Ranchero Sauce, Mole Sauce, and Chipotle Sauce.

While the two new sauces technically first

became available to customers this past December, Glenmont resident Larry Sombke — who co-owns Larry's All Natural with his wife, Catherine Herman — said that they are appearing in many more local stores in the past few months.

"They are great local and all-natural products because we use fresh ingredients, unlike many other similar products, and they are much more homemade and flavorful," said Sombke. "Many customers have said to me that our salsa does not taste like it's processed like those from big manufacturers with cheap ingredients."

Sombke added that the whole product line-up is available in many local stores like Hannaford, ShopRite and Price Chopper across the Capital District, as well as smaller venues like the Delmar Farmers Market and McCarroll's.

They can also be seen in many upstate New York universities' cafeterias and online via Amazon.com and Foodlyn.com.

Depending on which store a customer purchases it from, the new sauces have an average price of \$5.99

Sombke also said that he personally helps to deliver his products to local stores where he has been able to interact with interested customers.

"It's been a rich and rewarding experience and the response has been so positive," he said. "I also help fulfill the Amazon orders and deliver them to my post office. In fact, the delivery process does not affect the salsas at all."

He added that he has forged friendships with

store owners too who also enjoy serving local products to their patrons.


"Our new sauces are delicious, versatile and easy to use, and I hope everyone tries them," he said.

Looking ahead, Sombke revealed he has plans to craft a new salsa product soon and has preliminary ideas for at least three more potential products.

Town Board debates on local grant vote

Addressing concerns of potential impropriety

BETHLEHEM —

The Town Board approved two local small businesses, Bake for You and Dorsey Sign Company, to receive a grant of \$35,000 each on Wednesday, April 10 after both applications were reviewed by the Microenterprise Grant Application Review Committee last month.

Dorsey Sign Company, however, was the subject of a debate among the Town Board members as they acknowledged concerns related to alleged political affiliations. The business, located on 750 Delaware Avenue in Delmar, has been solely run by Heather Dorsey since it first opened in January 2016 and it creates signage and lettering for its clients.

Heather did not attend the Town Board meeting. However, she said that when she found out she received the grant money, she was "thrilled because it's a big deal for my business and I never had any funding like this before. Part of it just seemed surreal but ultimately, it's everything I've worked so hard for."

She also expressed hopes of expanding her business and she plans to use her grant money to purchase specific machinery and equipment.

The controversy

Heather is the brother of Marc Dorsey, the Democratic candidate running for Town Highway Superintendent this year who was endorsed by the Bethlehem Democratic Committee, and the daughter of BDC member Leo Dorsey.

The Town Board is made up of one Republican and four Democrats, the latter three of whom — Town Supervisor David VanLuven, and Town Board members Joyce Becker and Dan Coffey — were recently endorsed by the BDC in this year's election too.

Citing the above family and political connections, Jim Carriero, the Bethlehem GOP-endorsed Republican Town Board candidate, appeared before the Town Board to voice his concern that VanLuven, Becker and Coffey should not be voting at all on whether Dorsey Sign Company should receive any grant money or not.

"It has the appearance of impropriety. So I understand it's a fine operating company and et cetera, but there's clearly a connection between members of this board and the Democratic Committee and the people that are applying for the grant, so

I ask you to please recuse yourselves from this vote," he said.

The process

Elizabeth Staubach, the town's Economic Development Coordinator who also appeared that night, explained that the Microenterprise Grant Program aims to award grants, from \$5,000 to \$35,000 each, to rising and existing small businesses that plan to be located in or will expand within Bethlehem.

The program has awarded grants every other year since its inception in 2014 and is offered by the state Office of Homes and Community Renewal.

For this year, the town had received \$200,000 in state aid this past December which would help at least 10 businesses. Half of the grants must at least go to start-up businesses that began operations less than six months ago, at the time of their application.

In a follow-up phone interview, Staubach said that qualifying small business owners were able to start applying on Feb. 25 to Town Hall where the Department of Economic Development and Planning staff looked through and determined which were eligible, before they were further reviewed by the town's Microenterprise Grant Application Review Committee in March.

Staubach confirmed that this Town Board-appointed review committee consisted of seven local residents with comprehensive experience in law and finance, as well as some who were grant recipients themselves in past years.

After the committee reviewed the applications, they made recommendations to the Town Board members who would then either approve or reject giving part of the grant money.

BC autistic student left behind

BETHLEHEM — A Bethlehem Central School District bus dropped off student Michael Seavey at his work site on Monday, April 1 at around 11:15 a.m. As he alighted, the bus left while he approached the building, only to discover it was locked and

there was no one nearby to

help him.

According to his parents, Michael could not call anyone. The 21-year-old autistic student, who is in his last school year, had not been allowed to bring his cellphone. He left his phone at the high school. Michael's mother also said he could not search for anyone nearby to help him as he struggles with his communication skills. Even if he had found someone for help, she said he could not communicate easily with them to explain what

happened.



In light of the incdent, the Bethlehem Central School District said it has improved its special needs transportation protocols but did not elaborate on its details.

Michael's parents requested this article omit the site's name and location — was where Seavey was supposed to continue his work-to-school program as part of his regular special needs curriculum. His daily schedule consisted of a few classes in the morning, lunch, then being transported off to his work site from 11:15 a.m. to 1:15 p.m., and returning

classes.

But with no help or communication device, Michael was left standing outside alone in 30-degree weather until a school bus returned two hours later to pick him up as scheduled.

Michael's mother, Tina, said, "He can't be alone. I mean, thank God nothing happened to him, but ever since the incident, he won't leave the house. I can't get him to go to the doctor so

his school psychiatrist had to come in and see him. He's also been having panic attacks and he thinks it's a heart attack. He's struggling with post-traumatic stress and he doesn't feel ready to go back to school or the

She explained that the work site's owner apparently had been out of town and one of his employees forgot to communicate that to her prior to the day of

work site."

the incident. While the owner eventually contacted and apologized to her, Tina reached out to the school district too and was especially concerned that the school bus left without waiting for Michael to at least try entering the building. She said it was a small bus that catered specifically to special needs students; there was also an aide who was supposed to physically accompany the alighting student onto the street level; and the bus was to stay put until the student safely reached his or her destination.

"I have not found out who the bus driver was that day but if I do, I may lose it," she said. "The bus was not supposed to leave while a special needs student is still getting towards their destination. But the bus just drove away from what I gather. In Michael's case, it should take him just two or three seconds to get to the work site's door."

Tina said that the

district's Special Education and Students Services director Kathleen Johnston and superintendent Jody Monroe answered her calls, and listened to her concerns. "But the high school principal has not called me once which is upsetting to my husband and I," she said. "You'd think the principal would care for him."

She brought up, however, that the district has plans to schedule a meeting between her family, Johnston and BCHS Principal David Doemel, Jr to further address the situation and discuss possible improvements in the district's protocols on safely transporting special needs students.

Spotlight News has reached out to the school district and relevant individuals for comment and to confirm details. The former provided an emailed statement, acknowledging it as an isolated incident and that it took "immediate

action to ensure it would not happen again."

"Something like this should never happen and is absolutely unacceptable," said Monroe. "We have put in place new transportation protocols for our work program students to make sure this does not happen again. ... Additionally, we are working to improve the communication with our business partners who host our students."

The statement, however, did not elaborate on the nature of the "new transportation protocols."

Tina, who believed her son was neglected that day, said she was "overwhelmed with fear for my son and I was scared that he was all alone for two hours. From a mother's perspective, I don't want this to happen to anyone else. It's heartbreaking and there was nothing Michael could've done in the moment."

She concluded that the district should keep to its word about changing its protocols and teach its bus drivers and aides how to better handle special needs students, regardless of the students' ages.

Vote on BCSD budget

BETHLEHEM — The Bethlehem Central District has proposed a \$100.8 million budget for the 2019-2020 school year, for which locals can vote on Tuesday, May 21 from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. at the BCHS gym.

This proposed budget — adopted unanimously by the district's Board of Education during its April 3 meeting — would increase spending by 2.06 percent and carry a tax levy increase of 2.03 percent, which would be below the district's tax cap for the seventh consecutive year.

According to a district's press release, the budget would cause an estimated 1.06 percent tax rate increase for property owners in Bethlehem, or an estimated increase of \$56 per \$250,000 in assessed home value. It would also increase New Scotland property owners' tax rate by 5.46 percent, indicating an increase of around \$285 per \$250,000 in assessed home value. The district noted that such tax rate changes are estimates for now and they are finalized in August.

"This budget was developed to honor the district's mission to educate and prepare all students to reach their potential," said Superintendent Jody Monroe. "The budget we have proposed and that the board has adopted, supports our academic programs and ensures healthy learning and development for all children who attend our schools."

Besides the proposed budget, the district is looking into decreasing its fleet of buses by one large bus, and is proposing a bus replacement referendum on the May 21 ballot. This proposal seeks to replace four large buses and 10 smaller, 30-passenger buses which have been aging through the years, at a cost of \$1,088,500. It is estimated that the final cost to local taxpayers is \$413,630 and the debt service cost is being reimbursed by the state at a rate of 62 percent.

Also, voters can elect two Board of Education members as Michael W. Cooper's and Jonathan Fishbein's seats will expire on June 30. Their seats are each for a three-year term to expire on June 30, 2022; nominating petitions are due this Monday, April 22 and the slate of candidates will be announced shortly afterwards.

BCSD has had the last straw

BETHLEHEM — BCSD will reduce plastic straw usage in its cafeterias from Monday, April 29 onwards.

BC Food Service Director Allissa Eiser said in a press release that students and staff will have to consume their beverages from their containers or bottles, without plastic straws, to be more green. This protocol, however, will not apply to students and staff who need to use a straw/cup for specific reasons, and a straw/cup would be available for use.

"We certainly believe that reducing our bulk use of plastic is good for the environment, but we do not want anyone who needs a straw to go without," said Eiser.



She added that BC wants to help "protect the world's oceans and wildlife" since plastic straws do not biodegrade and are often mistaken by animals for food. Straws are also hard to recycle since they are physically small although they do naturally break down under sunlight, a process known as photodegradation.

"On average, each straw is used for only 12 minutes but its damaging effects on the environment can last hundreds of years," said Eiser. "A growing number of cities and businesses are doing away with straws. As a community of more than 5,000 students and staff, we can make a significant impact right here."

could begin spending their grant money the day after being approved by the Town Board, Planning Division director Robert Leslie said they must keep a record of their expense receipts to later submit to the town to begin state reimbursements.

According to town documents, grant recipients must also attend Entrepreneurial Assistance Training classes beginning on June 20 at Town Hall where they will learn more skills and information on better managing their businesses like taxes, accounting, advertising and marketing.

The deliberation

Town Attorney James Potter, who sat with the Town Board members, explained the code of ethics associated with potential conflict of interest.

He said a recusal is required by a board member "if they have a direct or indirect financial or material benefit that accrues to the board member or a relative of the board member."

He, however, said that a board member's recusal is not required "if the majority of the board would be disqualified and effectively, you can have no action. So in this case, the concern is apparently political affiliation. If three members of the board had political affiliation, you wouldn't have enough for a majority so a recusal would not be required under those circumstances. But regardless, the political affiliation under the ethics law is not a basis for recusal here because there is no direct or indirect financial benefit for any board member."

VanLuven said that he believed business owners also have the right to express their political views and "patronage politics is dead in Bethlehem. It's a great scare tactic to get someone whipped up on a campaign season but those implications are flat out wrong and I have real problems with them."

He added that regardless of Heather and her family's political views, Heather's business has been successful which "is something we want to foster in town, not tear them down for political affiliations."

Town Board member Maureen Cunningham said she was not aware of the political controversy until the day of the meeting.

"I think it's sad if we start to bring that partisanship into the Town Board because we are really all trying to do the best job we can for the town," she said. "I really don't think it's a partisan issue"

She also brought up how she and fellow member Jim Foster, the sole Republican Town Board member, first came onto the board at the same time and she could not recall a voting decision they had done that was related to their party lines.

Foster, however, announced his recusal from voting but he explained that it was due to having "personal relationships with members of the Dorsey family," instead of any possible political affiliations.

He said he wanted to avoid any appearance of potential impropriety for the aforementioned reason although he acknowledged that his recusal was not required by law.

Fellow Town Board member Joyce Becker asked Staubach what type of people and how many served in the Microenterprise Grant Application Review committee.

"The review committee was established by the Town Board to serve as an objective body as applications come in," Staubach answered, adding that the program had not witnessed any political-related controversy in past years. "Politics was never involved in this process and we've

been using our original program protocol since 2014."

Fellow member Dan Coffey said that he saw the Microenterprise Grant Program's application process as "fair."

He also gave an example of how he had recused himself from voting on board decisions before due to knowing applicants personally during his time in the town's Zoning Board of Appeals previously, to indicate he had been through a similar type of deliberation before.

Following the discussion, VanLuven, Becker, Cunningham and Coffey voted in favor of approving the grant money to Bake For You and Dorsey Sign Company, while Foster abstained.

Looking ahead

Heather said that such political controversy "have no merit whatsoever. There's no credibility and there's no political concern here. The grant was determined by a grant committee of seven professionals, which exists to keep politics out of this process. I received the grant because my business is deserving. I've worked very hard to get to where I am now."

She also encouraged other local small businesses to take advantage of the town's Microenterprise Grant Program.

She brought up that had she

known about it sooner, she would have originally applied for the program back in 2016, the year her business first opened.

She also said that she is looking forward to the Entrepreneurial Assistance Training classes and "in fact, several professionals have reached out to me already to want to guide me and my business plan, because they see what my business is capable of."


She added that she felt honored to be the program's 21st grant recipient and she is eager for her business to potentially hire employees and grow more efficiently.

"This all means so much to me and nothing can take that away," she concluded. "I'm excited."

According to Staubach and Leslie, the Microenterprise Grant Committee is still reviewing five more applications and interested small business owners can still apply.

"It's always best to come meet with me first," said Staubach. "So you can take advantage of this great program."



Evaluating and systematically solving problems was the essence of Bob's personality. He was an engineer to his core, always embracing new technologies, and challenging himself to constantly learn and grow.

The 1s and 0s in local history

Titled "Latent Self Closing Diary for 1871," the diarist's identity was not jotted down although the library believed it belonged to a New Scotland farmer at the time named Derrick Van Schaick Raynsford, based on its contents. The diary contained numerous pages of handwritten notes and numerical calculations which Ward assumed that "it was keeping a notation of the money he had, what he bought and sold, and it pretty much showed what a day-in-day-out life was like in the area." Ward observed that much of the diary dealt with his farm work, what products he sold in Albany like veal and pork, when he attended funerals throughout the year, and mentions of enjoying county fairs.

From its contents, Ward learned that Raynsford grew hay, potatoes and carrots; owned an apple and pear orchard; had at least two farm workers, one of whom was his son. Albert; he and his crew worked on Christmas Day; and he attended the Reformed Church in Guilderland Center and the New Scotland Presbyterian Church. The diary also included an 1871 calendar which noted the moon's phases, when the moon rose, and the times the sun would rise and set this was all organized in a tightly-organized serif typeface.

Once Ward gently returned the fragile diary into its folder and box, he

returned it to the library's archives which he said comprised of at least 130 boxes of collected historical photographs, documents, postcards, yearbooks, letters, business records, church and family history, receipts and more. These items were mainly focused on Voorheesville and New Scotland's past, and mostly dated from the 1920s to 1990s.

Ward mentioned that the aforementioned 1871 diary and a photograph of a Civil War-era soldier are probably the library's oldest collected items. He also noted how the Voorheesville railroad station and trains passing by were among the most documented items in the library's archives, including an old photograph of engineers standing in front of a train, one of a train crash, and one that emphasized the railroads themselves.

'We have a lot of documented information about the trains because they were so central to the village, and we also learned that many people were hit by trains in the first half of the 20th century," he said. "This is a very rural area so people and even animals did not realize when there was an incoming train and it became a big thing to properly put up warning signals and lights for crossing.

While these items have been safely stored here, the library has begun digitizing them since 2015 in order to make them more accessible

to the public who may want to view it out of curiosity, for research or to reminisce about the past.

Ward said a program called New York Heritage was developed then which works with many statewide libraries to have digitized collections of photographs, documents, maps and more, to give people easy access to them for free. The New York Heritage is a combination of seven Empire State Library Network members, one of which is the Capital District Library Council which oversees the Voorheesville library. "I think that having free access in a searchable, indexable way online is great and that's how digitization helps us," he said. "With younger

generations, quickly looking because you could damage up items is what they can expect."

Ward explained the digitization process: placing the historical item on a flatbed scanner to develop high-resolution scans, crop the file and/or make any needed color corrections, preserve the master digital file, transfer it into a JPG file and put them in a reasonable resolution for people to view.

For now, the library has only the flatbed scanner for the process but Ward said it may not always be the ideal digitization mode, especially when handling more three-dimensional items like books, diaries and even an old Smith Tavern's cup. "You obviously shouldn't take a book and put it on a flatbed scanner

its spine, unless there are loose individual pages to scan easily," he said. "What I could do is instead maybe place the book on a table and have a camera on a tripod above that's far enough to take a picture of one page. Then, I can crop it and manipulate it for a digital scan."

Although Ward said the current flatbed scanner gets the job mostly done for now, he said it is slow - he could not recall how old the scanner is - and it wouldn't hurt to get a new and faster scanner perhaps one day. "It's something that I've definitely thought about," he said.

Regardless, he said that while the library is "nowhere near close to being done with scanning

all the two-dimensional items," people interested in accessing the physical archives should make an appointment with the library — he warned that not every librarian here is equipped to handle the archived materials though - and he would be able to present items to them. People would need to fill out some forms first so that the library can record who has been accessing the archives and upon arrival, Ward would be able to help them out.

"I would just remind people that these are our history and they could make the most out of them if they want to learn about their past or the village's history, if they find it interesting," he said. "It's partially why the library safely keeps them and why I do what I do here."

Reflecting back on the 1871 diary, Ward brought up how the writer most likely did not realize that his diary would become important decades later to showcase what local everyday life in 1871 was like, which is another reason why the library continues to digitize its archives.

"These things are irreplaceable and although they might not be copies of the Gideon Bible or the Magna Carta, they're things that we have very little knowledge about and we're certainly not taught about the history of everyday life then," he concluded. "We also don't really get to learn what everyday people thought in various periods of history, so it's stuff that will get lost if we forget or don't care about it."





Keep in touch with kids at camp

ummer camp is an exciting way for children to spend their extended vacations from the classroom. Camps cater to various interests, including sports, crafts and even technological hobbies.

Children who attend overnight camps may spend several nights away from home. Some kids take this in stride, while others, possibly away from home for the first time, may experience some homesickness. Staying in touch while the kids are at camp can help alleviate fears and show children their parents care.

Camps now handle communication issues differently than they might have when today's parents were campers. While it once common for campers to send

handwritten letters or short missives home to mom and dad, technology has changed that. Today's campers may have access to email accounts, or they even may be allowed to bring mobile phones along. This can facilitate communication, but it also may take away from the camping experience.

Parents need to find a balance between what might be too little or too much contact with campers. After all, camp is kids' chance to grow independent for a few days or weeks.

Learn camp rules.

The camp will likely provide information regarding correspondence. Camps may permit parents to send one-way emails and regular mail, but limit campers to handwritten letters only. Determine if mobile phones are allowed or should be left at home. Knowing the rules can help parents and kids plan accordingly.

Pack correspondence supplies.

Send kids to camp with fun papers, stickers, pens, and other crafty items. This way they'll be inspired to write home once or twice. Provide brief lessons on how to address an envelope for campers who may not know how.

Check blogs and texts.

Some camps may blog about campers' progress, post information on social media or send out mass texts. These messages can reassure parents that their youngsters are doing just fine. Figure out which tech options are available from camp administrators.

Send a care package.

Treat the campers to some supplies from home. Pack camp-approved snacks and other reminders of home. Be sure to include enough for the entire cabin and your son or daughter will be the camp star.

Expect some silence.

If camp is going well and campers' days are fun-filled, they may be too busy for daily correspondence. Parents may get nervous when they don't routinely see or hear from their children, but chances are everything is going swimmingly.

The camp experience is often harder on parents than children, as campers have their friends and activities to keep them busy. Brief communication helps campers grow more confident and independent.

Getting out and being with nature

The six things to know about pitching a tent

amping provides the perfect opportunity to get in touch with nature and disconnect from the daily grind. Camping is a timeless tradition forged by cooking over portable stoves, foregoing indoor plumbing and sleeping under the stars.

A 2015 survey from Kampgrounds of America (KOA) said camping attracts people looking for an opportunity to explore the many wonders of the environment. The great outdoors affords people an opportunity to recharge in the peace and quiet of natural surroundings.

Results from the 2017 North American Camping Report found an increasing number of people say they plan to camp more, and camping is helping to add more balance to a person's life. Currently, 75 million households in the United States include active campers. Households in western Canada are likely to go camping, and data from Statistics Canada points out that camping rates increase with income.

Although there are many ways to camp, tents are often key components of camping trips. Learning to pitch a tent correctly is an important part of successful camping. Here's how to

become a tent-pitching pro.

Purchase a freestanding tent. While there are many variations to tent designs and ultralight backpackers may prefer a tarp or another non-freestanding device, tents that are able to stand on their own are easier to set up. Many tent designs have two poles and fabric that creates a dome shape and are relatively easy and straightforward to set up in just a few minutes.

Practice at home. Before arriving at the campsite, learn to recognize the parts and • instructions for your particular tent. Make sure all equipment is present and in working order.

Buy a footprint. Many tent floors are sturdy, but campers can always use a little extra • protection against the ground. Footprints are essentially a tarp that fits underneath the floor of the tent as an extra layer of protection, advises REI. They should be slightly smaller than the area of the tent.

Scope out the tent location. Avoid sites littered with sticks, stones, roots, or branches. Stav • away from low-lying areas that may get soggy in rain storms. Look for natural windbreaks, and place the tent so the side that has the strongest pole

structure is facing the wind.

Make it a team effort. Enlist a helper or two to set up the tent. Ensure all zippers are closed • when erecting the tent. Try to push poles through openings instead of pulling on them. Allow for some wiggle room when extending the poles. Guylines should follow the seams of the tent where possible, and lines should be pegged down back to front. Guylines help keep tents sturdy and also keep

a rainfly away from the tent body to minimize leakage, according to the Appalachian Mountain Club.

Use daylight to your advantage. Set up the tent while it is light outside, and outfit it with anything that will be needed in the middle of the night, such as a lantern and other gear.

Camping is easier when people can erect a tent swiftly and accurately.

Want that camp? Now is the time to act

Get prepared for summer camp season

ummer camp season is just around the corner. Each summer, millions of children depart for campsites around the country to swim, hike, craft, and enjoy the companionship of friends.

Summer camps in North America were first established in the 1880s and were attended by children without their parents for overnight stays. By the 20th century, summer camps had become an international phenomenon, and various organizations hosted traditional summer camps or camps geared toward religion, sports, music and other subjects and activities. According to the American Camp Association, each year more than 14 million children and adults in the United States attend camp. America is home to more than 14,000 day and resident camps (8,400 are overnight camps and 5,600 are day camps). Nonprofit groups are the largest sponsors of summer camps.

Many people put off summer camp planning until it is too late. Parents should keep in mind that camps begin registration early in the year and have specific cut-off dates for enrollment. Parents who want to beat the crowds this year can use this guide to help plan a summer camp agenda.



Start gearing up now for summer camp plans to guarantee kids attend the camps they prefer.

Attend an orientation seminar.

Take the time to visit prospective camps for a tour, and use this open house as an opportunity to learn more about the programs offered. If available, find a camp employee to discuss your child's eligibility for enrollment. Some camps may offer webinars for convenience.

Fill out the enrollment package completely.

Each camp has their own requirements for registration. Expect

to submit some personal information, including a medical background and proof of insurance, names and numbers of emergency contacts, and any other pertinent information as it applies to the camper. This may include allergies, fears, physical or mental disabilities, or even preferences in camp courses.

Establish payment schedules.

Summer camps vary in price. The ACA says camp costs range from \$100 to more than \$1,500 per week. However, many accredited camps offer some sort of financial assistance for children from families with limited financial means. If cost is a factor, be sure to broach the subject.

Prepare children for the physical challenges a camp may present. Summer camp activities may be rigorous, and campers may need to be cleared by a physician before starting. Be sure to schedule your child a physical and bring along any pertinent forms. Children also can increase their levels of physical activity compared to the often sedentary nature of winter. Such preparation can prevent injuries when engaging in outdoor and physical activities.

Shop for supplies.

Camps are likely to provide a list of requirements with regard to clothing and other equipment campers will need. Make sure kids have enough shorts, T-shirts, socks, athletic shoes, swimsuits, toiletries, and other camp necessities before they leave.

Keep children in the loop.

Engage children in the planning process to help alleviate their fears and get them excited about summer camp.

Summer camp can foster lifelong memories. Parents can help kids prepare in advance for the fun that's soon to arrive.



Camps can provide the opportunity to form lifelong friendships and discover rewarding hobbies that can enrich campers' lives for decades to come.

Choosing a summer camp is no small task, as the options at families' disposal range from overnight camps to weekday afternoon camps to camps that specialize in certain programs, such as music or dance. Cost also is likely to factor into families' decisions, as the American Camp Association notes, that cost can vary greatly depending on which camp families choose. For example, the ACA notes that the average daily fee at a resident camp is \$85, while the same fee at a day camp is \$43.

When looking for a summer camp for kids, families should make the decision together. Kids should be involved in the selection process, as they're more likely to have an enjoyable camp experience if they had a say in where they will be spending their summers. The following are some factors families should consider as they look for summer camps, courtesy of the ACA.

Kids' interests

The ACA urges parents to consider the child's interests and personality before choosing a summer camp. Parents might want their children to attend the same summer camp they visited as youngsters, but each child is

different. Just because mom and dad liked a particular camp does not mean their children will. The ACA notes that summer camps should align with children's interests and maturity level.

Locale

Locale may only be a consideration for families considering overnight camps. Kids will likely be familiar with the locations of local day camps, but overnight camps might be set in mountain ranges, near the ocean or environments less familiar to youngsters. Kids who love the ocean might benefit from oceanfront camps that focus on marine biology, boating or other activities synonymous with the water. In the same vein, youngsters who like camping and hiking might be more likely to embrace camps located in mountainous regions.

Session length

Camps may last as little as one week or up to a couple of months. Session length should be considered by families looking at both local day camps and overnight resident camps. Parents who want their children to enjoy a largely schedule-free summer might not want to commit their children to lengthy camp sessions, even if those sessions are close to home. Greg Haymes

"It's amazing, the hole that's going to be left behind in the arts community," he said of his friend

Greg Haymes died on Wednesday, April 10, at the age of 68.

However, It is amazing. To consider the depth in which one man's impact has had on a community, Haymes "touched so many people," said Eck. "He had a hand in all of it — his generosity. He gave and gave and gave."

On the following day, Jocelyn and Chris Arndt posted a tribute video on Facebook. Chris plays an acoustic guitar while his sister sings a melodic rendition of "I Wanna Be a Lifeguard." She sweetly echos the words Haymes first sang as lead singer to Blotto in 1981. The campy song was picked up by a radio disc jockey in New York City, and the video made its way onto the maiden broadcast of MTV.

"When I met him through a mutual friend, I was starstruck," said Greg Bell, of Guthrie Bell Productions. "He was one of the coolest people who I had ever met. He was talented, funny, friendly and handsome. His smile would light up a room and he had a wonderful laugh. We became close friends from that moment on."

Haymes started out in the local music scene as an undergraduate at the University at Albany with the band the Star Spangled Washboard Band. It garnered local success after landing a residency at, of all places, Gaslight Village playing daily shows to Lake George's summer crowds. Ultimately, the group disbanded. Haymes and some of his bandmates later formed Blotto.

"As a musician, he never failed to entertain. As a friend, he was always there if I needed him," said Bell. He credits Haymes for introducing him to the local music scene. And, as Haymes moved on to contribute news and reviews with *Metroland*, Bell said he would give his shows an extra push for help. "As far as I am concerned, there would not have been a music scene in the Capital District without him. I am pretty certain that there would be no Guthrie/Bell Productions without his influence."

Haymes wrote reviews for Albany's alternative weekly under his stage name, Sarge Blotto. For years, he'd cover a full array of events, from punk rock to opera. Nothing was out of his wheelhouse. He would later earn bylines with the *Albany Times Union* before starting out with his own online blog *Nippertown* in 2008. He was ever present, from concert events to open mic nights.

"Sarge was a champion of creativity in all of its forms," said Paul Rapp, Blotto bandmate, and fellow *Metroland* columnist, "and his entire life was spent in pursuit of art and beauty.

I'll miss him every day."

Haymes' death comes within a month of another tragic loss within the local community, that of Caroline "Motherjudge" Isachsen. Earlier, she had announced that she had terminal pancreatic cancer. Haymes

performed with the Ramblin Jug Stompers at a fundraiser for her benefit held at McGeary's.

"He was a supporter of the arts," said Tess Collins, owner of McGeary's. "You would see him at plays, art galleries and exhibits. He nurtured people with quiet support. He would always show up."

Haymes performed with Eck at the fundraiser, despite that it was his birthday, and ignoring that he had felt under the weather. The night was a who's who of the local music scene. Isachsen, who could not attend, died days later. A few days afterwards, Haymes was diagnosed with stage 4 cancer, which spread from his lungs to his thyroid, kidneys and brain.

Haymes continued to regularly update Nippertown with news of upcoming shows and noted anniversaries. On April 2, he and his wife Sara Ayers reached out to Nippertown contributors to share his news. He and his wife had previously made plans to step aside from the blog after its 10th anniversary this May, but he hinted of an escalated situation.

Haymes died less than two weeks later. Ayers posted a thank you to readers and advertisers that night on Nippertown.

"Thank you for 9 years, 10 months and 15 days of sharing and highlighting the arts of greater Nippertown," stated Ayers. She accompanied the post with three videos: Tom Waits' "Somewhere," Marshall Crenshaw's "Somewhere Down the Line," and Tom Jones' "Somewhere Over the Rainbow." "See you down the line, or over the rainbow."

In the years that have since followed "I Wanna Be a Lifeguard," the Capital

District's music scene has blossomed. Just four days after Haymes passed away, Proctors hosted the Capital Region Thomas Edison Music Awards. The storied theater was filled with players, supporters, purveyors and patrons of the local arts in a setting reminiscent of the Grammy Awards. Several of them shared stories of Haymes during the pre-show party. Nippertown earned the award for Arts Publication of the Year. WMHT's Chris Wienk, who had shared on social media how Haymes helped advise him as the station launched, thanked him as he walked with the Radio DJ of the Year award. The Daily Gazzette's Michael Hochanadel, while at the podium to accept the Music Journalist of the Year, suggested renaming the awards to The Greg's. Individual accolades continued to be celebrated, but a fitting tribute was paid to both Haymes and Isachsen. A scene gave thanks to two of its longest serving champions, as they mourned the loss of open mics, intimate performances and their insight. Eck, who was also in attendance, said he'll miss, "everything."

Born Gregory Charles Haymes on March 3, 1951, in Buffalo, Haymes was the son of Charles Haymes of Covington, Louisiana, and the late Lynn Haymes. Haymes graduated from Kenmore West High School in suburban Buffalo and the University at Albany.

In addition to Ayers and his father, Haymes is survived by his sister, Yvonne Haymes of Covington.

Family cycling is an enjoyable escape

Check bikes before departing.


Make sure tires are inflated and everything else is in working order. Bring a small tool kit along in case a repair needs to be made.

Cycling as a family can be an enjoyable way to spend an afternoon and get some exercise.



Phan's sample Trey's 'Ghosts'

Albany welcomes Trey Anastasio and his newest project, Ghosts of the Forest, with open arms

hen Trey Anastasio spoke during the encore at The Palace Theatre on Tuesday, April 9, he said he hoped to play music for 50 more years, and given his workload – writing Kazvot Vaxt and Ghosts of the Forest nearly back to back – and his increasingly positive outlook on life, that

task is not out of reach.

This is Anastasio who is the unofficial celebrity spokesman for Light (now, with more brightness!). He's been dropping notes of light in songs for a decade now, and with Ghosts of the Forest, we may have hit a new peak with Anastasio's profoundly personal and positive lyrics. Anastasio spoke about Albany as being his second home, and close to those he loves in Burlington and New York City, and how excited he was to bring this new project to the Palace and a sold out 'hometown' crowd.

With a band consisting of fellow Phish bandmate Jon Fishman on the kit (sans muumuu, he looks like your

neighbor who side-gigs as a session drummer), a healthy Ray Paczkowski behind the keyboards, and Jennifer Hartswick and Celisse Henderson who provided gospel hued vocals that not only backed up Anastasio, but added a sonic layer to the group's psychedelic rock. Saratoga Springs'Tony Markellis took up bass duties, as he has in every side project Anastasio has had since 8 Foot Fluorescent Tubes debuted in 1998 at Higher Ground. Energy in the room was palpable, as many eschewed listening to the recordings of shows from earlier this month for a first-look experience that is otherwise hard to come by. Even the album won't be released until April 12, making this a nearly-virgin experience for the majority of fans in attendance.

The production design by Abigail Holmes, who worked on Stop Making Sense and The Wall among many other shows, created a playground for her to color, using LED screens behind thin tapestries affixed with folded white paper in sweeping patterns. The symphony of light accented the music and was choreographed to each song



of the night. During "The Green Truth," a rainbow LED projection of Anastasio floated behind the band across the stage, while a stratified nighttime rainforest sky filled the stage during "Mint Siren Dream," bringing the audience to Pandora for a brief moment.

Ghosts of the Forest can be translated as deep memories in our mind, and throughout the songs, themes of loss, love and decade-long friendship were present. Anastasio lost close friend Chris "CCott" Cottrell to cancer recently, and the experience led to a number of the songs performed by Ghosts of the Forest. Anastasio spoke to Rolling Stone about playing acoustic guitar while CCott was in his final stages, and would play as he went in and out of consciousness. "Drift While You're Sleeping" draws from that, while having a mid-1970s psychedelic rock feel – think Derek and the Dominoes with space built in for Anastasio to stretch.

"Beneath a Sea of Stars Parts 1 & 2" was a fun Beatlesesque rocker, with



The Dirty Pennies' 'EP'

Washy guitars and repetitive lyrics leave listeners entranced

ith 2017's "Kick Out The Rocks," The Dirty Pennies blend blues with other styles of music, feeling out the boundaries of how far they could push the genre. Now with their new EP, aptly entitled "EP," they've mapped out their niche: grungy rust-belt garage rock, steeped in surf rock and blues.

"EP" is short, but sweet, containing only three songs. "I'm Giving Up" whets the appetite. The song starts off slow and surreal, but picks up by the end of the first chorus, effectively changing the song from an end-of-the-workday dirge to a happy-hour anthem. The music video for this song is a lot of fun, too. It features the band members breaking free of the drudgery of banal workaday life. "I'm a sad man, too. I'm your poor man's blues," sings Ryan Klem with a slight warble. "But I know, yeah I know it ends somewhere."

"Things You Say" is a heavy-hitter. Drummer Lucas Howe pulls no punches as he shows off with his ability to both unleash the beast and reel Kelm back in. Joe Mungo holds down the rhythm on bass, keeping the song grounded so Klem can let-fly some lofty guitar riffs.

"EP" ends with the five-plus-minute ballad "Kingpin." It's heavy and heady, with an undulating psychedelic beat. The washy guitar effects and the repetitive lyric "I get up/I get down" leaves the listener entranced. About halfway through, the tempo changes and they're injecting some good old fashioned rock and roll. The song comes full circle, winding back down. "You can't stop me. I'm not as easy as they come. Stuck in the same frame, I'm making my way out on my own."

The Dirty Pennies have come a long way since "Kick Out The Rocks." You can still hear elements the members' various musical interests (including Americana, hard rock, and alternative), but they've blended them in such a way as to make a sound all their own. Not some polished newly minted copper, but a sound that befits their namesake.

"EP" was recorded at Rochester's Wicked Squid Studios, where it was engineered by Josh Pettinger and mixed and mastered by Greg Thompson. Album artwork credit goes to Mike Turzanski.



Cellulite treatments: What works and what doesn't?

s long as women have been conscious of the presence of cellulite on their bodies, the search has been on to find effective treatments. People have gone to great lengths to eradicate cellulite. Gaining a greater understanding of what causes it and the treatments available can help women effectively address cellulite.

According to the American Society of Plastic Surgeons, cellulite affects up to 85 percent of adult women compared to only 10 percent of men. Many people think that cellulite is simply fat, but it is much more complex. Cellulite is caused by the fibrous tethers, known as septae, that run through fat and pull on the fascia that lies underneath the dermal layer of skin. Women's connective tissue isn't as tightly formed as men's, so their fat can push through more easily, creating the ridges and "cottage cheese" effect synonymous with cellulite.

The Mayo Clinic says that no single treatment for cellulite is entirely effective. Most treatments, at best, can only temporarily improve the appearance of cellulite. Doctors use a variety of techniques to help reduce cellulite — with results that can last a year or longer, states the American Board of Cosmetic Surgery.

Laser treatments

The ABCS says this treatment uses a

tiny laser probe inserted just beneath the skin through a small incision. The laser heats tissues beneath the skin's surface to release some septae, reduce thickness of the subcutaneous fat layer and stimulate the production of collagen. The procedure is typically performed using local anesthesia and down time is one to two days.

Subcision

This procedure involves a dermatologist or plastic surgeon inserting a needle just under the skin to break up the tough septae, states the American Academy of Dermatology Association. The results may last two years or longer.

Acoustic wave therapy

This features radio frequencies that can reduce the appearance of cellulite over the course of several treatment sessions. Some radio frequency treatments are paired with infrared light or electromagnetic fields, says ASPS. These energy-based treatments are delivered through the skin and are noninvasive.

Topical treatments

Topical therapies use rollers or vacuums to "knead" the skin and subcutaneous fat, helping to break down the tethers.

Creams and lotions may only boost up collagen to mask cellulite underneath. As a result, they're not typically effective at reducing cellulite.

Women are urged to speak to a dermatologist or plastic surgeon about their options in regard to treating cellulite.
