Local fundraiser to support breast cancer awareness campaign

BETHLEHEM -Men. Pink. Money. Breast cancer. These four terms may not initially make sense together, but Real Men Wear Pink wants to educate people about how they can collaborate to foster change.

Real Men Wear Pink, a nationwide campaign that benefits the American Cancer Society, seeks to raise money and awareness about breast cancer, related resources and an avenue to find a potential cure. The Capital District has its own team of Real Men Wear Pink, where it has already raised over \$89,000 as of Friday, Oct. 4 with an ambitious goal of \$250,000 overall. In the

town of Bethlehem, people are encouraged to attend a contributing fundraiser at the Real McCoy Beer Co. on Saturday, Oct. 12 from 2 to 8 p.m.

Local longtime meteorologist Jason Gough, who worked numerous years at WNYT and now posts weather updates in the Times Union and his own website at JasonsWeather. com, is spearheading this fundraiser for the second consecutive year. "I thought it would be nice to have a fundraiser in a local place with good folks that run it and it's like a community event that brings a lot of people together," Gough said. "The location is great also for its proximity to the Rail Trail and many people already know about the Real McCoy. There's a lot of raise as much money as we open space and it all works out really well."

Gough added that while over 220 people attended

last year's fundraiser which generated around \$3,500, there "is no real goal amount this year but to can."This time, people can expect a small \$5 entrance fee and entertainment with food trucks, raffles,

a photobooth, live music from two local bands -Katsura and Rumble Kings - as well as glasses of beer. Numerous pint glasses come with a pink version of the Real McCoy's logo to help continue raising awareness of the campaign.

Mike Bellini, co-owner of the Real McCoy, said his business is no stranger to hosting fundraisers and it helps lower costs by providing outdoor space for more people to come by. "It's a way I can support the people that support me and anyone who's asked us to host a fundraiser here has always been a customer," he said. "I'm happy to do it for them."

Gough and Bellini agreed that breast cancer not only affects women but men as well. Contrary to popular belief, men can also have breast cancer although it is naturally rare compared

Employees first received a letter back on Sept. 24 that their benefits will expire on Oct. 24, giving them just a one-month notice. An emergency press conference was held in front of the facility on Friday, Oct. 4 at 10:30 a.m. where numerous employees held up signs expressing their demand for the return of their healthcare benefits and some also spoke about their dissatisfaction with their employer's, Lutheran Care Network — which operates the nursing home and the neighboring Kenwood Manor handling of the situation.

A press release by 1199SEIU United Healthcare Workers East, the employees' union, indicated that Lutheran Care Network has been undergoing "financial difficulty and [is] trying to sell the facilities" as well as lacking enough staff and supplies to meet the nursing home residents' needs. It also reported that Lutheran Care Network "hasn't been paying into the receive comment at this

employee's contractually required Health Benefit Fund" which explains the eventual termination of their healthcare benefits.

Fears about the unknown future of the employees, nursing home residents and even the facility itself permeated the aforementioned press conference.

"It's very important that the homes remain viable and most specifically, from our vantage point, that the caregivers that provide such quality care for folks in the home remain here or can afford to remain here," said Greg Speller, the union's executive vice president. "That's one of the mainstays and what keeps a lot of the caregivers here — the folks that know the residents of the home intimately because they've taken care of them for years in many cases. It's a key ingredient to keeping the quality care here."

Spotlight News has reached out to Lutheran Care Network but did not

now, expressed his concern that he would need to find a new job in order to get healthcare benefits again. "Most of us don't know what our futures are because with most of our full-time jobs, the first thing you look at is healthcare coverage and without that, we won't have a peace

of mind," he said. "If the nursing home will have no staff because of this, I don't know where the residents will go either. It's going to have a big

impact on the community."

Makoyi added that he hopes Lutheran Care Network comes up with a plan to support the employees at the nursing home. "We have our own families to take care of too and it's going to be hard for us to take care of the residents here if we can't even take care of our own family members," he said.

Teneisha Addison, a fellow employee who has been here for almost six years now, became emotional during the press conference and said, "We have families, like [Makoyi] said, and I have a husband who's sick who needs medical attention and we can't afford to pay medical bills, you know, if we don't have insurance. We can't afford to pay them. We care about our residents, we care about our jobs." feel unsafe working at the nursing home without health insurance, bringing up a hypothetical example where she may accidentally injure herself on the job but cannot even visit a doctor because she is not covered. Addison added that the nursing home has been struggling with inadequate resources for over a year now and brought up how Lutheran Care Network's financial difficulties had led to many rental beds to be removed from rooms inside the nursing home. "It's really sad. It's the residents that I'm really concerned about and they paid their money to be here and they can't even get treated right," she said.

She connected this with how she herself would

brought up, both Makoyi and Addison agreed that their situation's timing makes things harder for them and their fellow colleagues. "That's the time to be more with your families and kids but at this point, we're going to be worried about what is next. If something happens to my kids or myself, what will happen?"

Addison concluded, "I just really hope they know we're serious about our health insurance, that's all. We just want to be heard."

Let's keep nutrition in mind

New private practice offers counseling on nutrition and more

BETHLEHEM — LGC Nutrition, a new private practice just off the Four Corners in Delmar, wants to help clients understand that having a relationship with food does not always have to be a negative one.

LGC Nutrition owner Lindsey Cumoletti, a registered dietitian specializing in medical nutrition therapy, said she offers both oneon-one and family counseling regarding nutrition which can touch on topics including food allergies, obesity, diabetes, chronic kidney disease and hypertension. She said she can also help people question and change their eating behaviors as well as develop healthier eating habits.

"What's the reason for having a bowl of ice cream every night? Are you stress eating, for example?" she said. "Trying to fix those underlying factors can help people lose weight, if that's what they want, or help them eat healthier overall." She added that people should not expect a one-and-be-all cure but instead receive assistance with treatments, potential meal plans and disease management.

Located on 125 Adams St. in Delmar, LGC Nutrition originally opened on Aug. 30 and now accepts insurance from CDPHP, MVP, UnitedHealthcare and Medicare and is looking to include Aetna in the coming weeks.

It also had its ribbon-cutting ceremony on Wednesday, Oct. 2, which was attended by numerous

local well-wishers, town officials and the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce.

"As I've been in Bethlehem and I'm nearing almost a full year here at this chamber, I've noticed a lot of businesses with a focus on health and wellness and so your business has the right fit and your location, so close to the Rail Trail, also fits in with our healthy living," said Maureen McGuinness, the chamber's president. "Our chamber is going to be starting a strategic plan and one of the focuses we're looking at is maybe branding Bethlehem as a healthy community. ... And I think this business and what you're doing for the residents fits in nicely, so welcome to Bethlehem.'

Regarding the latter point, Cumoletti said she lives in Albany but grew up in Guilderland. She said she has long enjoyed traveling to Bethlehem for its features like the library, Swifty's and McCarroll's. She also said she has had a longtime relationship with the topic of nutrition both personally and professionally.

Cumoletti brought up how she comes from a family, from her father's side specifically, with a history of heart disease and high cholesterol although she "was lucky [she] did not get the cholesterol gene but some of [her] siblings did."This meant that she is neither at risk of heart disease nor has high cholesterol.

She recalled, however, that her father had his first heart attack at 30 even though he was in great shape and played rugby, and many of his family members died from that. Her father then became a Diego Cagara / Spotlight News

vegan which led to Cumoletti growing up in a more vegetablebased household and her mother was also health-conscious.

"I knew a lot more about nutrition and medicine than the average kid did and I knew why because of my family's history but I didn't know the science behind it then," she said. "When I graduated college, I started working at a doctor's office ... and I started training for a marathon. I then fell in love with nutrition because I loved how much nutrition everyday affected how I ran." Cumoletti studied human biology in college, and received a post-baccalaureate in nutrition sciences and a master's of science degree in applied nutrition.

The path to making LGC Nutrition a reality began a year ago. Cumoletti said she "I'm trying to make people feel comfortable while still eating healthy and maintaining a normal and sustainable lifestyle. Food and nutrition are not as hard as it seems. Think basic. A little bit of everything and everything in moderation helps. Everything's a balance."

understood the importance of insurance in relation to medical nutrition therapy after doing her own focus group. She recalled going to a dietetic and entrepreneurial retreat in New York City this past March that was led by a dietician who owned her own private practice there. It was there that Cumoletti said she learned how to start her own business. She eventually developed LGC Nutrition's website and found a location in Delmar to set up shop.

Looking ahead, she wants clients to also feel educated in a sense on nutrition when coming to LGC Nutrition. "Nutrition is something we all do. We eat all the time and we have to in order to survive but it's not something we're all educated in," she said. "Most of us know our proteins, fats and carbohydrates but when it comes to managing disease states, we don't really know how much we should have and there's a lot of misinformation on social

ALBANY COUNTY A case of crime on Lifetime

ALBANY-

Christopher Porco, the man convicted of killing his father and maiming his mother with an axe in 2004, lost a legal round against Lifetime television network but the case will proceed.

According to his attorney, Alan J. Pierce, of the Syracuse law firm Hancock Estabrook, the Appellate Division did dismiss the case but essentially "punted" the issue of whether the 2013 movie chronicling the notorious killings violated Porco's privacy and that of his mother, Joan Porco, who was added to the longrunning lawsuit in 2017.

In 2006, a jury convicted Porco killing his father, Peter Porco, a popular law clerk, and trying to kill his mother while the couple slept in their Brockley Drive home. In 2012, Lifetime began making a movie about the killings

and in 2013, Porco sued in an effort to stop "Romeo Killer: The Christopher Porco Story" from airing.

He lost the first round, which included a request for an injunction, his case was dismissed and the movie hit the airways in March 2013. Porco, acting as his own attorney, appealed and the decision to dismiss was reversed. In 2017, his mother was added to the case, which is ultimately asking Lifetime to stop airing and selling the movie and monetary compensation for damage already done.

"What they did to Mrs. Porco in his movie is horrendous. She is in 12 scenes and all but one is completely fictional. They have her as a liar and a perjurer. They have her remembering the attack and she testified under oath she did not," Pierce said. "Christopher Porco is convicted of killing his father and seriously injuring his mother and they made him look worse than that."

The issue of joining Joan Porco to the suit is barred by the one-year statute of limitations — the clock for that begins ticking at the premiere. The court rejected Pierce's argument of a "relation back doctrine," which can allow other parties to be added after the original filing and beyond the statute of limitations.

But, the ruling said, the statute of limitations could begin at the movie's 2013 premiere and again each time it is aired or sold but that won't be fully known until the discovery phase of the proceedings is complete so the case will continue with Lifetime scheduled to file paperwork later this month and Pierce slated to file his final volley in November, he said.

The movie — which stars Matt Barr as Christopher Porco, Erin McCormick as Det. Sullivan and Lolita Davidovich as Joan Porco — was aired on a number of different television stations and is currently for sale on Amazon.

The court only ruled that Lifetime had a right to appeal an earlier decision that denied its motion to dismiss the case. It did not rule on the merits of the appeal, or if Porco's original claim that his right to privacy was violated is valid.

Basically, the law states a business must get a person's permission to use that person's name, photograph or story for a profit. Porco claims the film was based in fiction rather than fact and thus the company needed his permission. If the film were fact based, according to the court' earlier ruling, it would have been exempt from privacy laws.

"Mrs. Porco is being victimized all over again," Pierce said. "If we prevail in this case, and I think we will, the longer it is available increases the damages."

It was one of the most sensational murder cases in the history of the Capital District that involved a well-known, successful family living in the quaint suburb of Delmar. Peter Porco was a law clerk to Anthony Cordona, the presiding justice on the Appellate Division, Third Department, and the trial to determine if his son murdered him was moved to Orange County.

Prosecutors painted Porco as a spoiled rich kid with money problems who lashed out at his father who refused to again bail him out. Porco's defense maintained he was in Rochester attending college at the time of the murders and that it was an attack by someone possibly connected Peter Porco's legal work.

There was testimony by first responders that Joan Porco, on the night of the murder, indicated it was Christopher who swung the axe. But she said, under oath during the trial, she had no memory of that night.

Porco, now 36, is currently serving 46 years to life in the Clinton County Correctional Facility and becomes eligible for parole in 2052.

The Eagles crush Colonie 30-0

BETHLEHEM — In front of a large, loud homecoming crowd, The Eagles rolled over Colonie by a score of 30-0 on Saturday, Oct. 5.

Bethlehem moves to 3-2 with three games left and is on the bubble to make the Class AA playoffs with Guilderland also at 3-2 and CBA at 3-1.

Bethlehem will host the 4-1 team from Burnt Hills, who are playing in Class A, on Friday, Oct. 11. On Oct. 18, the team will travel to Niskayuna (0-5, 0-5) and will finish out the regular season on Oct. 25 in Schenectady (2-2, 3-2).

The game against the Raiders from Colonie (0-4, 0-5) could have been a bigger blowout.

The game started out with Nick Zigrosser sacking Colonie quarterback Cameron Avery in the end zone for a two-point safety and then Bethlehem quarterback Derek Martelle scored a touchdown on a two-yard run to give The Eagles a 9-0 lead after the first quarter.

Nick Gicewicz scored two touchdowns, a seven-yard run and a two-yard run, in the second quarter to give Bethlehem a 23-0 lead at the half. Martelle scored his second of the game

on a seven-yard run in the fourth to round out the scoring. Colonie will look for its first win of the season at home against Niskayuna on

New outdoor recreation retail store coming to the **Capital District**

COLONIE — REI is coming to Colonie Center.

The hiking and outdoor coop is looking to renovate some 21,500-square-foot of the interior of the old Sears store and enclose an additional 4,500-square-foot of where the garden center was located.

Joe LaCivita, director of the town's Planning and Economic Development Department, said the Washington state-based company is going through the change of tenant process now, but he said it should be a fairly simple process.

Retail is, obviously, within existing zoning and a demolition permit has been issued by the Building Department. Once the construction is complete, the town will need to inspect plumbing and electrical and then issue a CO.

"Everything should be done admistratively," LaCavita said. "With what they are planning, the Town Board and Planning Board are not involved."

REI, which stands for Recreational Equipment Inc., is a co-op which, according to its website, returns more than 70 percent of its profits back to its some 18 million lifetime members.

Since it was formed in 1938 by a group of 23 hiking friends, it has grown to 155 stores in 35 states and the District of



Columbia while boasting a huge online presence.

According to the company, in 1935 Lloyd and Mary Anderson were in the market for new ice axes

The going price was about \$20, or about \$366 in 2018 dollars, at the ski shops around their Seattle, Washington home, so the couple decided to bypass the middle man and order them right from Austria for about \$3.50, including postage.

Their hiking and outdoorsy friends caught on and wanted in so the group pooled their money to get more buying power. In 1938, the charter members of the REI co-op chipped in a dollar each to become lifetime members.

The nearest outlets to the Capital District are in West Hartford, Connecticut and Framingham, Massachusetts. In New York state there are outlets in Rochester, Long Island and in New York City.

"It's exciting to have a big brand name like that coming into the mall," LaCivita said. "These types of store help keep the mall vibrant and when they bring names like this into the area it helps the entire area. The new owners have really done a lot with Colonie Center."

Conceivable, the company could be open in time for the Christmas season, LaCivita said, but a timeline was not discussed with the town and it not the town's responsibility.

Colonie Center, the Capital District's first enclosed mall which was built in 1966, has undergone a number of changes over the years including a portion being sold to a new owner earlier

The sprawling, 1.5 millionsquare-foot retail mecca actually has three owners. Macy's, an anchor when the mall was built, built a new three-story store in 1988 and owns that portion of the building. Seritage Growth Properties, the real estate arm of Sears, owns the southeast portion of the mall, where Sears used to be located and is currently home

The company has renovated the former auto shop at the intersection of Wolf Road and Central Avenue to accommodate BJ's Restaurant and Warehouse and is looking for permission to build a Starbucks in the parking lot. In 2014, the company opened Whole Foods in a portion of the total 275,000-square-foot of space it owns in the mall.

The rest of the mall was sold by Feldman Mall Properties to KKR & Co, an investment firm out of New York City for \$106 million. That portion of the mall is currently back on the market.

One of the longstanding anchor tenants is LL Bean, itself a renowned outdoor company selling many of the same products as REI.

to women. While the American Cancer Society reported that the lifetime risk for men to get breast cancer is around 1 in 833, "breast cancer is about 100 times less common among white men than among white women. It is about 70 times less common among black men than black women."

Both men also said they have been personally affected by breast cancer too but in different ways.

Gough recalled how 15 years ago, his ex-wife had been diagnosed with stage three breast cancer when she was just 34. "I became, as much as I could, an expert on breast cancer, insurance and to be able to support her," he said, adding that many other men involved in Real Men Wear Pink have real-life ties to people who have faced the disease. "She was young and generally, the younger the woman is, the more aggressive breast cancer is, and that was her case. ... I took care of the household duties and everything else and my goal was to make sure she was as comfortable as possible."

Although he said that she has been doing well lately, he reiterated the importance of people regularly getting checked like with mammograms and that they need a support system from their friends and family.

While Bellini said he finds it disheartening that he knows "too many people" who have faced breast cancer, he appreciates receiving immediate feedback from his customers who notice his pink pint glasses and "they know exactly what it's for and they do not hesitate to express how they think it's such a great idea to do that." He added, "We use those glasses every day and all year-round so it's a daily reminder for those people who come in who had an experience with breast cancer. It does affect so many people."

Gough concluded, "When you break things down, every little bit counts."

She added that the obesity epidemic in the U.S. includes people who go through "yo-yo diets" where people go through a cyclical process of losing weight, gaining weight, going on a diet, and repeating the overall process — a phenomenon that is not sustainable.

miSci cooks up traveling exhibit

miSci exhibit debuting in October showcases the history of how humans prepare their meals.

Insatiable: Cooking Up Innovation officially launches Saturday, Oct. 12, at the Schenectady-based museum. From there, the exhibit will travel across the United States in a modified format, beginning in 2020.

"It's an exhibit that pretty much everybody – men, women and people of all ages – can relate to," said miSci President Dr. Gina Gould. "It's the story of humans harnessing the use of fire and heat to cook their food."

Gould concocted the idea with Chris Hunter,

miSci's Vice President of Exhibitions and Collections, when she interviewed with Hunter for the president's position in early 2018.

"He took me down to see the collections, and I was struck by the history of these [cooking] gadgetry," said Gould. "We started talking about this history, and during the course of this conversation, we thought wouldn't this be a great subject for an exhibition."

"Insatiable" starts at the very beginning of human existence, showcasing how the earliest humans used heat to cook their food – a trait unique to our species.

"We sliced and cooked food on hot rocks," said Gould. "This was especially important with grains because grain is very difficult to digest. So, humans used hot rocks to bake their bread."

Not many centuries later, humans began developing recipes utilizing standardized measurements to create their meals.

"The first recipes were recorded approximately 6,000 years ago on tablets, and this exhibition showcases how those recipes evolved," said Gould.

Insatiable also takes a look at the evolution of how humans preserved their food, and how the harnessing of electricity changed how they did so. "We talk about

everything from the use of fermentation, brining, sugaring and salting foods to the innovations that we came up with, such as refrigeration and freezing," said Gould. "We used to have to go to ice houses to pick up blocks of ice that we brought home to store in ice boxes, but with the invention of refrigeration, we no longer had a need for that."

Refrigerators aren't the only kitchen gadgets *Insatiable* showcases. From the earliest gadget – the toaster – to today's array of coffee makers, microwave ovens, juicers, blenders and more, the exhibit shows how humans developed the tools we use to cook our foods today.

"We investigate gadgetry – what gadgets were used before electricity and what were created after electricity," said Gould.

Insatiable concludes with a look at what humans eat and the carbon footprint that is involved from the

iscovering the gender of a baby before he or she is born is a big deal these days. Expectant parents are increasingly holding gender reveal parties in their homes and on social media. The sooner they know, the sooner they can let their family and friends know.

Shannon Nelson took note of this increased interest in early gender identification. A sonographer who spent more than a decade working at hospitals and clinics in central New York, Nelson opened her own business called Baby's Debut in 2013 outside of Utica and has expanded to Syracuse and, more recently, Colonie.

"When I was working at the hospital, I saw a lot of patients coming in, and they wanted to know what gender the baby was right away," said Nelson.

It's not just the parents who are in the room, either. Nelson said family and friends can be invited by the expectant couple to view the gender reveal, which is something that can't be done at a doctor's office or a hospital.

"It's not diagnostic. It's purely for entertainment," said Nelson.

The response has been strong in the markets Nelson has entered. The Utica and Syracuse locations have been busy, and she said she is hoping for a similar response to her new location at 6 Automation Lane in Colonie.

"It's a bigger area [than Utica or Syracuse], so it's taking a little more time than usual to take off. But, the people who have come in have given us great reviews," said Nelson.

Plans unveiled for theRep

Capital Repertory Theatre announces public phase of \$13.5 million campaign for new home

ALBANY — Capital Repertory Theatre announced Thursday, Oct. 3 the public phase of its \$13.5 million campaign to complete renovation on a new space at 251 N. Pearl Street.

At a press conference at the former National Biscuit Co. building, theREP's Board of Directors and Board President Harold N. Iselin unveiled the construction work underway and announced the goal of the public campaign as an additional \$650,000 in funding, in anticipation of a July 2020 opening of the venue with a production of the musical Sister Act.

Surrounded by Albany Mayor Kathy Sheehan, theREP's Producing Artistic Director Maggie Mancinelli-Cahill, Proctors Collaborative CEO Philip Morris; state, county and city elected officials; and Capital Repertory Theatre donors, subscribers and invited guests, Iselin said, "Today is the next step on a journey that began nearly 40 years ago."

"We take pride in our remarkable history while we move forward with our own building—a place to create, to nurture, to educate, a place we can truly call home."

Currently theREP—presenting Kenneth Lonergan's Lobby Hero through Oct. 20—is in its original digs, a rented space in a former Grand Cash Market at 111. N. Pearl Street that was recently acquired by Redburn Development.

"Capital Repertory Theatre began as a dream, in 1981," said Mancinelli-Cahill. "Now, just a few blocks up, we're transforming a bakery into what will be a glorious arts institution and a place for the entire region to come together to share thoughts and ideas and to tell their stories."

The new facility, Mancinelli-Cahill delineated, will feature a 300-seat MainStage with improved sightlines and traffic flow as well as a 70-seat black box theatre—The Lauren and Harold Iselin Performing Arts Studio which will house more intimate productions and serve as a MainStage rehearsal space. Improved amenities will include increased accessibility, a dozen restrooms, a fulltime café, convenient ticketing and additional office and work space for creative and administrative staff.

"Most importantly," Mancinelli-Cahill added, "this new home will allow us to further expand our rich educational offerings and accomplish our goal of ensuring that every student in the Capital Region experiences live theatre before graduating from high school."

Sheehan said, "Today's announcement is an important step in the development of the new Capital Repertory Theatre. Transformative projects that make the arts more accessible, especially in mixed-income neighborhoods, are essential to our community, our city, and our region, and I commend the entire Capital Repertory Theatre organization for working toward fulfilling that vision."

Iselin noted that theREP—the only professional theatre company in a 14-county range—has leased land for a proposed parking lot just north of the Livingston Square location, in addition to plentiful on-street parking and a Quackenbush Garage shuttle.

Ron White is a natural storyteller, and he's made a career out of it. It just so happens to be that he's funny. His stage presence is consistent with every show. You don't often see him without a cigar and a drink in his hand. Then, he proceeds to tell you something about himself. It never fails, that little something is off-color, embarrassingly personal or both. He's that best friend of yours who makes you laugh and shake your head, like the time he earned his nickname "Tater Salad."

"Well, I'm not saying that everything I say on stage is true," said White, with a laugh. "My goal is just to make you laugh."

White first rose to fame as the cigar-smoking, scotchdrinking funnyman from the Blue Collar Comedy Tour phenomenon. Today, he's a chart-topping Grammynominated comedian and a feature film actor. He's established himself as a star in his own right. His stories relay tales from his real life, ranging from growing up in a small town in Texas to sharing stories of his daily life to becoming one of the most successful comedians in America.

All four of his comedy albums charted No. 1 on the Billboard Comedy Charts. He has sold over 14 million albums (solo and with the Blue Collar Comedy Tour), been nominated for two Grammys, and over the past nine years (since 2004) been one of the top three grossing stand-up comedians on tour in America. He's in the middle of a tour now.

"Well, yeah. I don't know if it's the middle," said White. "It's been 33 years of non-stop touring, with a few weeks off every once in a while. It never stops.'

White began performing comedy out of Dallas in 1986. He quickly earned opening acts for legendary comedians Sam Kinison and Jeff Foxworthy. After earning his own headlines, he joined Foxworthy for the Blue



Collar Comedy Tour, pairing him with alongside Bill Engvall and Larry the Cable Guy. The show toured for over three years to sold-out audiences in over 270 cities and grossed more than \$35 million.

White is not politically correct, and he has no plans to change. He avoids the college circuit. His audience can still laugh at Brooks, at Murphy, and at Larry the Cable Guy, who White traveled with under the Blue

Cosby, who dominated primetime television in the 80s with his portrayal of Dr. Cliff Huxtable, was once the bastion of wholesome comedy. No sex. No swearing. He was as trusted as Walter Cronkite and safe as Saturday morning cartoons, in which he often appeared in the Fat Albert Show. That image was soiled, however, by accusations and his subsequent conviction on three counts of aggravated indecent assault as a sexually violent predator. White's joke touched upon that. It wasn't well received. A sign of how times change.

Now, Eddie Murphy finds himself apologizing for his old comedic routine. The Saturday Night Live alum once elicited laughs off homosexual slurs, derogatory statements towards women and misconceptions of AIDS. As people name Murphy as a possible Oscar candidate for "Dolemite is My Name," he continues to address the jokes he dropped more than 30 years ago. He recently told the *New York Times* that he "cringes" at his old material.

On the other hand, Mel Brooks recently called political correctness a threat to comedy. The Blazing Saddles director told *Telegraph* that society's "stupidly politically correct" ways will lead to the "death of comedy."

"It's not good for comedy," said Brooks. "Comedy has to walk a thin line, take risks. Comedy is the lecherous little elf whispering in the king's ear, always telling the truth about human behavior."

For White, that candidness may take the form of a confession that includes watching television while naked in a bean bag and eating Cheetos. There's a touch of self-deprecating humor that gives the audience a personal connection with him. His "Tater Salad" story is a common thread that ties together a few stories in which White supposedly had run-ins with the law. He has been honest of his past in regards to a 2008 arrest for possession of 7/8 of a gram of marijuana. "I call that being out of marijuana," he's said on stage. He's also said that instead of an organ donor's card on the back of his driver's licence, there's a list of organs he needs.

In November of 2003, White released his breakthrough comedy CD Drunk In Public followed by his first one- hour TV comedy special "They Call Me Tater Salad." The special had the highest viewership for a Sunday program in Comedy Central history. The DVD version was released in 2004 and reached No. 1 on the Billboard Comedy Chart. audience in Comedy Central's history and the No. 1 show on primetime basic cable. The CD reached No. 1 on the Billboard Comedy Charts and remained there for nine consecutive weeks.

In June 2006, Penguin Books released Ron's first book "Ron 'Tater Salad' White: I Had the Right to Remain Silent...But I Didn't Have the Ability," which landed him on the New York Times Best Seller List. In 2009, Ron released his third album "Behavioral Problems," which reached No. 1 on the Billboard Comedy Chart. In 2013 Ron's fourth album, "A Little Unprofessional," also reached No. 1 on the Billboard Comedy Chart. All of White's DVDs are certified Platinum.

White made the switch from scotch to tequila seven years ago, "just because it's a better drug." He now owns a tequila label, Number Juan, with fellow comedian Alex Reymundo. A bottle of it is on stage with him on every show. It's in his promotional shots. It's in the picture on our front page.

"I had just started drinking tequila, and [Reymundo] and I just for fun went down to Tequila for a tour, go on a crawl," said White. "A buddy of his had been there his whole life and he knew of this one distillery, considered to be the best tequila in Mexico. It's an ugly, little, disgusting distillery with nearly dead dogs lying around... I didn't even want to go in. But, I went in there and tasted it and I was like, 'oh my god, I'm in Heaven.""

White serves as his label's best pitchman. It's available at Taters Tequila.com, he said.

"I am true to my nature on stage," said White. "So, I'm Ron White off-stage, and when I walk on-stage it's just me and I do a show. Off stage, I go to a bar, buy a drink and listen to live music. So, all those things about me that you've heard are very, very true as far as I drink too much, and smoke too much, and probably won't live to see 61.

But, I'm already 62, so I beat all those people," he said.

Is the fruit cleaner on the other side?

The benefits of organic foods

odern grocery stores are unlike the ones many of today's adults encountered when they were children. Grocery stores are not only bigger today than they were years ago, but they're also stocked with items that weren't available until relatively recently.

One stroll through the produce section reveals just how different modern grocery stores are from those of yesteryear. Organic fruits and vegetables now take up ample real estate in grocery store produce sections. Many shoppers may wonder if they're better off choosing organic versus traditional products, and research suggests they are.

Organic foods contain less pesticides and toxic materials.

A 2014 meta-analysis published in the British Journal of Nutrition found that organically grown crops were less likely than conventionally grown crops to contain detectable levels of pesticides. The analysis also found that organically grown crops were 48 percent less likely to contain cadmium than conventionally grown crops. Cadmium is a toxic heavy metal that can accumulate in the liver and kidneys, which the Global Healing Center says can affect blood pressure, induce bone damage and affect renal and dopamingeric systems in children.

Organic crops contain more antioxidants than conventional crops.

The same analysis also found that organic crops had significantly higher levels of antioxidants, which promote strong immune systems, than conventionally grown crops. Organic crops were found to contain 69 percent higher levels of flavanones and 51 percent higher levels of anthocyanins than their conventional counterparts. The extra antioxidants in organic foods is nothing to scoff at, as the National Cancer Institute notes that antioxidants neutralize free radicals, excess levels of which can potentially lead to the formation of various types of cancer and other diseases.

Organic products cannot contain synthetic hormones.

Conventionally raised animals are sometimes injected with synthetic growth hormones so they will gain weight more quickly and produce more milk. Residue from those substances, which cannot be used in the production of organic meat and dairy products, is believed to contribute to widespread antibiotic resistance, according to the Biodesign Center for Environmental Security at Arizona State University. In addition, some studies have suggested a strong connection between the hormones given to cattle and cancer in humans.

Organic dairy products can promote cardiovascular health.

A 2013 study from researchers affiliated with the Center for Sustaining Agriculture and Natural Resources found that organic milk contained 25 percent less omega-6 fatty acids and 62 percent more omega-3 fatty acids than conventional milk. The Organic Center notes that's a considerable benefit, as higher amounts of omega-3 and lower amounts of omega-6 fatty acids helps promote cardiovascular health and support the immune system.

When choosing organic products at the grocery store, consumers may be benefitting their overall health in various ways.

The versatile sandwich

istory suggests that the sandwich — a go-to, lunch-hour staple — was named for John Montagu, the Fourth Earl of Sandwich. Lord Sandwich was an 18th century English aristocrat who asked his valet to bring him meat tucked between two pieces of bread while Sandwich was embroiled in a cribbage match he just had to play through.

Even though Lord Sandwich wasn't the first to enjoy meat or cheese between bread, he was the one to help solidify the moniker "sandwich." Since then, all types of sandwiches have been designed and enjoyed, and these portable meals are a favorite for breakfast, lunch and dinner. Enjoy this take on the sandwich, a "Grilled Adobo Turkey BBT Sandwich" from "Simply Scratch" (Avery) by Laurie McNamara.

Grilled Adobo Turkey BBT Sandwich

Ingredients: Makes four sandwiches

- 11/4 pounds turkey tenderloins
- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 11/2 tablespoons Adobo Seasoning (see below) slices thick slab bacon 9
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 8 slices sourdough bread
- 6 tablespoons romesco sauce
- thin slices Manchego cheese 12
- fresh basil leaves 16 Thinly sliced tomato

Adobo Seasoning

- tablespoon onion powder 1
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- teaspoon dried oregano, crushed in your palm 1
- teaspoon ground turmeric 1/2

Combine all ingredients for the adobo seasoning. Place the turkey in a large bowl or resealable bag. Add the oil and seasoning, toss to coat and set aside on the counter to marinate.

In a large skillet, cook the bacon until crispy, about 30 minutes.

Heat a grill pan between medium and medium-high heat. Place the seasoned turkey on the pan and cook for 2 to 3 minutes per side, adjusting the heat so as to not burn, 12 to 14 minutes total. Transfer to a cutting board to rest for 5 minutes before slicing.

Reduce the heat under the grill pan to medium or medium-low. Butter one side of each piece of bread. On one of the unbuttered sides, spread 11/2 tablespoons of the romesco sauce. Place the bread, sauce-side up, on the grill pan and top with 2 slices of cheese, some basil, a few slices of tomato, bacon, sliced turkey, remaining cheese, and a second piece of buttered bread, sauce-side down. Grill for 3 to 4 minutes, or until grill marks form, then carefully flip and repeat.

Cut in half and serve with more romesco sauce for dipping.
