

Nearly 40 hours of snow ruined plans

Town holiday parade canceled, tree lighting ceremony on Dec. 13

BETHLEHEM — The town received at least 22 inches of snow from Dec. 1 to 3, making it the largest since the March 1993 snowstorm dumped around 24 inches, according to the National Weather Service.

It also reported that snow kept falling for 39 hours and 14 minutes. Altamont received 19.1 inches, Ravena had 19.8 inches, Delmar got 22 inches, Glenmont was dumped with 23 inches, Voorheesville got 23.8 inches and Selkirk received 24.6 inches. While this snowstorm spurred some into action, it also impacted others' plans.

VanLuven said the snowstorm caused the planned annual holiday parade on Friday, Dec. 6 to be canceled. "This was an unusually heavy storm and we have 186 miles of roads in Bethlehem that

the town is responsible for maintaining and we had to plow both directions and there was lots of cleanup," he said. "I felt it was our higher priority for our highway department to deal with this, even with

sidewalks, rather than shift their focus to clearing it all for the parade."

He added, "It breaks my heart to cancel the parade because I love it but I feel like it was the right thing to do." The cancelation was

Electric car chargers proposed for town

A potential reality by spring 2020

BETHLEHEM — Town Board member Maureen Cunningham is working on introducing around four electric vehicle charging stations in town by spring 2020 as part of a vision for a cleaner energy future.

"It's a right way to move forward and we're also part of this New York state effort to get us away from fossil fuel infrastructure," she said. "I also believe we have to move off fossil fuels and the future is clean energy."

Saying that there are no electric vehicle charging stations on town property yet, she hopes to see some installed for both the public and town vehicular fleet. While this would encourage residents to



embrace electric vehicles (or could do." EVs) more, this also leads to her idea of converting the town's fleet into electric vehicles. "It's going to take time and I know there is not always the electric vehicle equivalent of a plow truck for example but there are electric police cars out there," she said. "There's a whole slew of things we

She also said she does not know where exactly the four charging stations will be located at yet "but they would be on town properties and they would be open to the public to use these stations." She added that it is possible to have more down the road.

Such a charging station

would supply electric energy to any plug-in electric vehicles. There are smartphone apps like Plugshare and Chargepoint that help people locate and use charging stations, keep track of how long recharging takes and pay for it electronically. Numerous charging stations are already available that the number of electric

throughout the Capital District, including at Crossgates Mall. A few new stations were also unveiled on Tuesday, Nov. 26 on top of Riverfront Garage in Albany.

According to the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA), Gov. Andrew Cuomo announced this past April

vehicles in the state has increased from 24,551 in 2017 to 36.854 in 2018. He also said the state has goals of having 850,000 electric vehicles by 2025 and two million by 2030.

The U.S. Department of Energy reported that some benefits of having an electric vehicle include giving a driver more fuel choices, not using fossil fuels, not being at the mercy of potential gas price spikes and supply disruptions, and reducing carbon monoxide emissions.

She added that throughout this past vear, she has been having discussions about this movement with Town Supervisor David VanLuven, the town's fleet technician Tim Seward, the Capital District Regional Planning Commission and New York Power Authority. She is planning

Continuing a late teacher's legacy

BC Chris Porter scholarship is now permanent

DELMAR — The Bethlehem Central School District raised \$3,980 last week for its Chris Porter scholarship, helping to reach its goal since 2018 of raising \$30,000 needed to make it a permanent annual scholarship for years to come.

The scholarship and its fundraising originally started in early 2018, taking its name from Chris Porter, a fifth-grade teacher at the Glenmont and Eagle elementary schools, who died on Nov. 12, 2017 after 20 years of teaching and a four-month battle with an aggressive brain tumor. Last week's fundraiser was held at the Glenmont Elementary

School, attended by Porter's family, supportive students and faculty, and it included entertaining games, a silent auction and a raffle. The scholarship is administered by the Bethlehem Central Community Foundation, a non-profit organization that offers classroom innovation grants to Bethlehem teachers and administers memorial scholarships to deserving high school seniors.

demonstrated drive, persistence, courage and resilience," according to the district's website. The BCCF is in charge of distributing scholarship applications every April and determining which senior gets it in May.



rotated between using snowblowers, sidewalk plows and snow plowing trucks. "We had numerous breakdowns with the equipment and our mechanics were working all hours to fix them," he said. "But we handled the storm pretty well. My guys are pretty tired but they did really good jobs and they didn't complain."

Anastasi added, "People thought we didn't hit the sidewalks but we actually did. We brought guys in as early as 3 a.m. to do sidewalks and parking areas on Delaware Avenue, for example, and I was out there with them. A big setback, though, was that everybody was plowing their own driveways and they would throw the snow out on the road and sidewalks."

He continued, "The state and county plows also came through and they threw the snow onto our sidewalks. It's like a tug of war. People think the sidewalks aren't getting done but people don't realize they may not get it done as quick as they want."

VanLuven, however, expressed gratitude to the highway department and the long hours they put in to plow the streets and sidewalks.

"They've been working non-stop and they were out at 3 a.m. last Wednesday to get the Four Corners cleaned up to get a jump start on clearing more sidewalks," he said. "I appreciate how our residents have been patient and I hope they recognize it takes time. Our highways folks are the best."

to speak with incoming Highway Superintendent Marc Dorsey too and is hoping that this issue would be on a Town Board meeting's agenda by the end of the year.

While not able to go into specifics, she brought up how there are several rebate options for EV charging stations from NYSERDA, the state Department of Environmental Conservation and National Grid. 

It featured all four gymnastics teams in Section II, Bethlehem, who hosted the event, Guilderland, Shaker and Saratoga.


There were scores given by judges for each individual performance, but no awards were given. Instead participants and fans were asked to bring a non-perishable food item to help out area food banks.

The upcoming Guilderland restaurant will be at 1785 Western Ave. Waheed said she hopes construction for the Guilderland location will start in early January 2020 and its overall look

She added that she still wants "The root of our recipes and inspiration is Moroccan and we do a lot of traditional Moroccan food. My goal is to always make good food and look at what people like to eat. It takes patience, timing and finding the right geography so that you can set yourself up for success."

But why Guilderland? Waheed said that was a question she and her husband/co-owner, Muntasim Shoaib, pondered for some time and they had also looked into Latham, Clifton Park, downtown Albany and Saratoga. However, the chosen Guilderland location, she said, would take advantage of being close to Crossgates Mall, Stuyvesant Plaza, state

The Hudson River School

ALBANY — The Albany Institute of History and Art continues to exhbit the works of The Hudson River School with "Landscape Paintings from the Albany Institute.

The Albany Institute holds a large and important collection of nineteenth-century American landscape paintings, works often associated with the term "Hudson River School." They number more than ninety paintings and range in dimension from large wall-sized canvases to small business card-sized oil sketches on paper.

In the summer of 2017, the Institute opened a reinstallation of its Hudson River School paintings in the Hearst Gallery on the museum's third floor. For the first time, nearly all ninety paintings from this important collection is on view. These landscapes, painted by artists like Thomas Cole, Frederic Church, Jasper Cropsey, Asher Durand, and numerous others, capture America's scenic grandeur in all its magnificence from rugged coastal scenery to imposing mountains and rivers.

Many paintings in the Institute's collection depict the nation during decades of transformation from a country of small towns and farms to one of industrial works and sprawling urban centers. The nation was also in the midst of rapid westward expansion and political conflict that reshaped its social identity and cultural outlook. Developments in transportation allowed artists to travel more widely, frequently beyond the nation's borders, to Europe and more distant corners of the globe, and return to their home country with sketchbooks full of inspiration and new ideas.

The paintings on view reveal a visual history of the United States during the nineteenth century, including its aspirations and growing nostalgia for a simpler and more harmonious past.

Keep up with e-books

To the Editor,

Have you curled up with an e-book lately? Chances are good that you have. While print books continue to be a solid mainstay — 65 percent of readers nationwide prefer them, according to a September 2019 article by the Pew Research Center — the popularity of digital books has rapidly increased.

Two years ago, a 23-percent jump in e-book usage was noted at the Guilderland Public Library; last year saw a jaw-dropping 58-percent increase. This figure mirrors universal trends reported by CNBC in September 2019. It's clear that growing hordes are delving into e-books.

And why not? They're convenient and affordable. Patrons don't have to physically come to the library to obtain desired items. Convenience is king as cardholders simply download their literary selections onto their smartphones, tablets, and e-readers for free.

Libraries typically offer Libby for e-books and e-Audiobooks, Flipster to page through popular magazines, and Tumblebooks for access to children's books. They also lend digital audiobooks, tailor-made for commuters, as well as assistance getting established with all media.

But there's a bit of a catch: e-books are so popular that libraries are having trouble keeping up with the demand, and publishers are not making it easier. They often charge libraries more for an e-book than they charge consumers, and limit the number of times e-books can be borrowed.

Throughout the Upper Hudson Library System, which serves public library users in Albany and Rensselaer counties, if all copies are already checked out, patrons may place a hold to request a book. For printed books, the average wait time is seven days. But for e-books, it can be 35 days or more.

Under United States law, libraries (and individuals who buy books) generally have the right to lend out their physical books as long and as often as they choose, with no additional payments to the author or the publisher.

Publishers dictate the terms under which e-books can be lent out, which can vary widely. Many offered by major publishers come with licensing agreements that require each virtual copy to be essentially purchased anew after they've been lent out a certain number of times — 26 lends is quite common — or after a certain amount of time has elapsed.

This leads us to the flip side of e-books. For libraries as well as individuals, it can be a challenge to own and lend a digital book. Ordinarily, libraries might buy multiple digital copies of an expected

bestseller.

But for public libraries on limited budgets, some restrictive licensing agreements are forcing careful selection on what we can reasonably offer to the public. As a result, library users may find the excellent free resource of e-books impacted by agreements and industry policies outside of libraries' control.

Case in point: Publishing giant Macmillan announced that starting in November, library systems will only be able to purchase a single digital copy for the first eight weeks of circulation. This cap applies equally to smaller singlelocation libraries and sprawling multibranch systems, so that only a tiny fraction of readers would win the lottery, so to speak, and be able to borrow that digital book fresh from the publisher.

Macmillan's decision drew criticism from major libraries and the American Library Association, which launched an online petition urging Macmillan not to implement this restrictive policy. So far, it's garnered over 222,000 signatures.

The large library system in King County, Oregon is taking this a step further, boycotting Macmillan e-books all together. Suburban New York City-based White Plains Library has done the same, and others are sure to follow suit.

All of this makes e-book lending a more complicated proposition for libraries. While they strive to meet consumer demand, libraries need to carefully determine what's worth purchasing given these constraints, while also maintaining the still-popular print collection. It

becomes a balancing

act, which could also impact newer authors seeking exposure.

We are passionate about providing both traditional books and e-books. However, we must remain committed to responsible spending within our budget. Publishers certainly don't make it easy to serve the public with these restrictive policies.

What's the solution to this copyright conundrum? One possibility could be for Congress to create a standard royalty system for lending out e-books.

Right now, it's unclear what the demand would be for such a change, but, as more lenders become negatively impacted, calls for reform could grow louder. This type of proposed legislation would be a first in the United States, but perhaps the time has come for serious consideration.

Meanwhile, libraries continue to serve as valuable community resources where anyone can access books and other media free of charge. As libraries continue to augment the availability of media governed by the fine print of licensing agreements, they strive to uphold their mission of putting as many borrowed materials into patrons' hands as possible - in all their forms.

We will keep doing our utmost to provide both physical books and e-books. We want our patrons to know that we're doing our best, given publisher restraints. Tim Wiles, Director

to its customer base there.

She added that the third location ideally would be close enough to the other two locations "without cannibalizing those other places."

Waheed is originally from India and met Shoaib, who is from Pakistan, in Morocco. Waheed and Shoaib had lived in New York City prior to moving to the Capital District in 2009.

Then from 2009 to opening the first Tara Kitchen restaurant in 2012, the couple sold Moroccan food at the farmer's market in Schenectady.

"The root of our recipes and inspiration is Moroccan and we do a lot of traditional Moroccan food," Waheed said. "My goal is to always make good food and look at what people like to eat. Our food is super clean no preservatives or store-bought products and any ingredient we have is something we prepare onsite."

When asked what it has been like to work with her husband, Waheed initially chuckled. "We're just a really good team and we're each good at a lot of things," she said.

She explained that she mainly handles the recipes, manages the staff and does much creative thinking about how to elevate the restaurant brand; her husband focuses more on accounting and the buildings' infrastructure.

"Communication has been a huge key

success for us and we're good at making sure we're not overwhelming each other," she added. "We do enjoy each other's company so that's a bonus. He's a really supportive partner and it's a very delicate balance, especially being married."

Since Moroccan cuisine is not easily accessible in the Capital District, Waheed said Tara Kitchen has benefitted from how she and her husband often listen to customer feedback, review their financial reports every month, discuss ways on how to improve and they see themselves as "very hands-on business owners."

Looking ahead, Waheed said she envisions Tara Kitchen to be a global brand one day and she wants to expand it "in every market." She also said that they are planning to open a Moroccan hammam spa, called Tara Hammam, in downtown Schenectady in late summer 2020.

"In Morocco, the hammam is a tradition that has been around for a long time and it's a huge part of that culture and country, and it's something every person takes part in," she said.

But for now, while people can still go to the Schenectady and Troy restaurants, Tara Kitchen cooking products and jarred sauces are also available at numerous stores and groceries across the Capital District as well as in New York City and New Jersey.



Future in doubt for Move

Festival organizer places brand for sale

ALBANY — After seven years, the Move Music Festival appears to be all but done, as its organizer placed his rights to it for sale.

"This is it. I am sorry to say but the time has come for me to pass the torch...," stated Bernie Walters on the festival's Facebook page. The announcement was posted on Friday, Nov. 22, but only recently caught the attention of local musicians and media outlets.

Walters organized seven festivals. At the height of its popularity, the festival stretched over a three-day weekend, hosting seminars in the day and live music at night throughout various venues across the Capital District.

Walters is selling the festival's brand, which includes logos, trademarks, videos, website and social media. The social media includes an Instagram account and a Facebook page that boasts more than 10,000 followers. All "for an unbelievable price," he stated.

"My goal is to keep Move alive, not to get rich," stated Walters. "I just want to pass it on to someone who can do the brand right."

In January, Walters placed the festival on hiatus to restructure it to something "more current with today's music business."

Modeled after SXSW in Austin, Texas Walters' festival hosted some of the best alternative bands in the country. July Talk, the Wombats, Sean Rowe, The So So Glos, The Arkells and Sawyer Fredericks.



Through the years the Move Music Festival has also given over 600 bands and musicians the opportunity to perform for new audiences and to learn from some of the industries. Top music professionals through workshops, panel discussions and clinics.

In addition to being a showcase for contemporary music, it lent insight into the music industry. Over the years the Move Fest has paired musicians with top managers, booking agents, festival promoters, radio program directors and industry experts.

The scale in size for the annual festival has contracted in recent years. At its peak in 2015, it was a three-day event featuring 100 bands in several venues throughout the city. Last year, the festival showcased only one night of music.

As an ensemble skater for Disney on Ice, Mario Castro can be lost among the faces skating by. His story, however, stands out from his peers. Where most of his castmates draw their earliest childhood memories from time spent on ice, Castro recalls buying his first pair of skates at the age of 28.

A native of Brazil, Castro was 28 years old — lifetimes older than his peers before he laced on his first pair of ice skates. The warm-climate country known for its rain forests, its beaches and its love for soccer, has no reputation for winter sports. In fact, Brazil has amassed 128 Olympic medals to date, but none of them were earned while participating in the Winter Games. Ice, is just not common.

Castro is a natural athlete. Aside from his love of ice skating, he picked up skiing shortly after moving to the United States.

"On the same day I learned to ski," he said, "I was going down the black diamond slopes."

Castro was in the midst of a professional acting career before he took to skating. After studying theatre in high school, he proceeded to earn roles in commercials, radio and television dramas.

One day, he said he was in a shopping mall that had an ice rink. One visit to the rink was followed by another, and then another. He soon realized he had a passion for skating.

The pursuit of a career in ice skating presented a large obstacle for Castro. In Brazil, he said, there are no ice skating coaches. Instead, he relied on video cassette recordings of Kurt Browning, Kristi Yamaguchi and other skaters. When that wasn't enough, he decided to move to the United States. He was attending a Disney on Ice show in Florida when he found his first opportunity to skate professionally.

Castro answered an open invitation printed on the back of his program to audition for Disney on Ice. After skating in front of the casting directors, he was encouraged to hire a coach and to come back once he improved his technique.

"You have the potential to skate in our show," he remembered hearing.

A year later, Castro auditioned and landed a role on the production of "Aladdin." Nearly 25 years later, at 57, he continues to skate for Feld Entertainment. Retirement, he said, is not in his immediate plans. He said he continues to do what he does because of one thing.

"My story is an inspiration to the people," said Castro. "It doesn't matter which profession, wherever you may go, you have to have passion. Passion for whatever you do. ... You don't go with passion, you can not go anywhere."

ALBANY — Everyone has a little Charlie Brown in them.

The little boy Charles Shultz introduced to the world more than 50 years ago is a caricature of childhood. All the trivial challenges of growing up - school, girls, sports, plays — and the attempt of overcoming young insecurities. His daily cartoon strip was published in more than 2,500 newspapers, and boasted more than 350,000 readers worldwide. Millions continue to sit and watch the animated specials on broadcast television each holiday season.

Next Wednesday, Dec.18, Gershwin Entertainment rolls its traveling production of "A Charlie Brown Christmas Live On Stage" into the Palace Theatre. The live-action performance is a fresh take on a classic storyline. It encompasses favorite scenes from the original animated television show, and expands the storyline into greater detail.

Hays Hankinson says he can relate to Charlie Brown. The actor tasked with portraying the beloved cartoon character landed the lead role in his first professional production since graduating from Savannah College Art and Design. He was told he had a look about him, that he was the answer to their prayers.

"I don't know where that came from," Hankinson said while laughing,"because that is definitely not my thought process."

Hankinson grew up in Thomasville, a small Georgia city just north of the Florida panhandle. A region fanatic about its collegiate sports, people often identify themselves by Bulldog, Gator or War Eagle. Nonetheless, Hankinson said his hometown was "pretty good" at supporting the arts.



The Albany Institute of History & Art holds the largest public collection of works by artist Walter Launt Palmer (1854-1932), son of Albany sculptor Erastus Dow Palmer. It includes oil and watercolor paintings, pastels, pencil drawings, a rare painted ceramic cup, as well as letters and photographs. A new exhibition at the Albany Institute offers a visual overview of Palmer's life, travels, and artistic output. Egyptologist and Guest Curator Dr. Peter Lacovara has incorporated the research and scientific discoveries revealed in the GE Presents: The Mystery of the Albany Mummies exhibition into a new exhibition about Ancient Egypt. Visitors to the of the Albany mummies, learn about the history of Ancient Egypt, and see how the intersection of new science, technology, and scholarship changes how we learn. In addition to the story of Mummy Ankhefenmut, theme and topics in the new galleries include: Egyptian History and Civilization; the Nile and the Environment; Crafts and Professions; Food and Drink; Gods and Goddesses; and Preparing for the Afterlife. The Jabbur Gallery now features the story of Albany's 3,000 year old mummy, Ankhefenmut, a priest and sculptor in the Temple of Mut, along with his recently discovered priest's robe, his coffin base from the museum's collection, and his beautiful coffin lid on loan from the Kunsthistoriches Museum, Vienna. The museum's Ptolemaic Period mummy and his coffin are now on view in the Heinrich Medicus Gallery with a selection of over seventy objects highlighting ancient Egyptian daily life, afterlife, and animal mummies. Joining objects from the museum's collection are loans from the Phoebe A. Hearst Museum of Anthropology, Museum of Natural History, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, the Semitic Museum, Harvard University, University of Pennsylvania, Williams College, and a number of private collections. Also included are a timeline and a slide presentation highlighting the trip the Albany Mummies took to Albany Medical Center for x-rays and CT scans, which revealed new information about the age, gender, and occupation of these mummies. dia Company in 1624 at the location of present-day Albany along the Hudson River. Between 1624 and 1664, the fort's role in the development of New Netherland changed—from a point of contact and trade between Native Americans and Europeans, to an enclosure with dwellings and private enterprises, and finally an abandoned space consumed by the development of Albany. Centuries later, Fort Orange on the surface had long disappeared. But in a six-month period in 1970 and 1971—just ahead of Interstate 787 construction—a small archaeology team from the State Historic Trust (predecessor to the Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation, or OPRHP), headed by Paul Huey and composed mostly of volunteers, made remarkable discoveries about life in the Dutch colony at Fort Orange. In 2016, a collection of 36,000 artifacts from Fort Orange was transferred from OPRHP to the New York State Museum. This exhibition examines the momentous discovery of Fort Orange and the lasting impact of events occurring there 400 years ago that shaped the character of the region, New York State, and the nation. The exhibition title is a quote taken from The New World by Johannes De Laet, a director of the Dutch West India Company, recorded in 1625. Select artifacts, film footage from the excavation, and four decades of historical and archaeological research are highlighted-including renderings of the fort by Historical Artist Len Tantillo. Dutch ceramics on loan from the Albany Institute of History & Art help bring life to the story. This exhibition is supported as part of the Dutch Culture USA program by the Consulate General of the Netherlands in New York and in partnership with Historic Albany Foundation. Enterprising Waters: New York's Erie Canal (Phase Two)

The Erie Canal directed the course of New York and American history. When it opened in 1825, this "boldest and biggest American engineering project of its century" unlocked the Western interior for trade and settlement. Boomtowns sprang up along the canal's path and New York City, with its deep harbor connecting to the Hudson River, grew to be the nation's most powerful center of international trade. One of the largest public works projects in American history, the Erie Canal inspired a nation-wide transportation revolution. Thousands of people poured into New York to work on or along the canal, or just to pass through. Though the canal would eventually be superseded by the railroad, a heady mixture of innovation and determination, and the industrious seeking and creation of wealth, was cemented in the American character. In honor of the Bicentennial of the Erie Canal's construction, New York State's Office of Cultural Education will present this rich story with the first phase of Enterprising Waters: New York's Erie Canal at the New York State Museum. In collaboration with organizations on the canal corridor and across the state, the State Museum will tell the Erie Canal's story with unique objects, documents, and images. Dominating the exhibition space is a gigantic windlass—a pulley mechanism that easily lifted and lowered heavy cargo from both sides of a warehouse with only one or two men. From 1831 through 1866, this windlass operated in the H. G. Root and Company Warehouse in the Village of Mohawk on the Erie Canal. The owners of the warehouse, Humphrey G. and Elias Root, also ran a general store and other small businesses along the canal. Phase Two of Enterprising Waters continues the story of the Erie Canal with components on the Canal's growth, politics, industries, social reform, and the Canal legacy. Enterprising Waters: New York's Erie Canal (Phase Two) will be presented in the New York State Museum's Exhibition Hall from now until Sunday, Oct. 25, 2020. The Historic Woodstock Art Colony: The Arthur A. Anderson Collection

Long before the famous music festival in 1969, Woodstock was home to what is considered America's first intentionally created, year-round arts colony-founded in 1902 and still thriving over 100 years later. Collecting the remarkable range of work produced there has been Arthur A. Anderson's focus for three decades, resulting in the largest comprehensive assemblage of its type. The artists represented in it reflect the diversity of those who came to Woodstock, including Birge Harrison, Konrad Cramer, George Bellows, Eugene Speicher, Peggy Bacon, Rolph Scarlett, and Yasuo Kuniyoshi, among many others. Anderson recently donated his entire collection-some 1,500 objects by almost 200 artists-to the New traordinary collection, which represents a body of work that together shaped art and culture in New York and forms a history of national and international significance. The Historic Woodstock Art Colony: The Arthur A. Anderson Collection is presented in the West Gallery of the New York State Museum from now until Tuesday, Dec. 31. The Hudson River School: Landscape Paintings from the Albany Institute

The Albany Institute holds a large and important collection of nineteenthcentury American landscape paintings, works often associated with the term "Hudson River School." They number more than ninety paintings and range in dimension from large wall-sized canvases to small business card-sized oil sketches on paper. We know from visitors the Hudson River School paintings are among the Institute's most popular collections, and other museums request to borrow them for exhibitions more often than other collections. With such great interest in these works of national significance, the Institute is making them more accessible. In the summer of 2017, the Institute opened a reinstallation of its Hudson River School paintings in the Hearst Gallery on the museum's third floor. For the first time, nearly all ninety paintings from this important collection is on view. These landscapes, painted by artists like Thomas Cole, Frederic Church, Jasper Cropsey, Asher Durand, and numerous others, capture America's scenic grandeur in all its magnificence from rugged coastal scenery to imposing

from a country of small towns and farms to one of industrial works and sprawling urban centers. The nation was also in the midst of rapid westward expansion and political conflict that reshaped its social identity and cultural outlook. Developments in transportation allowed artists to travel more widely, frequently beyond the nation's borders, to Europe and more distant corners of the globe, and return to their home country with sketchbooks full of inspiration and new ideas. The paintings on view, therefore, reveal a visual history of the United States during the nineteenth century, including its aspirations and growing nostalgia for a simpler and more harmonious past. The Hudson River School: Landscape Paintings from the Albany Institute is an ongoing exhibit. Albany Institute of History and Art is located at 125 Washington Ave., Albany.

Model of Statue Honoring Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony

In celebration of New York State History Month and in commemoration of the 101st anniversary of women's suffrage in New York State, the Museum is proud to display a model of a statue honoring Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony. The statue will be unveiled in New York City's Central Park in 2020—the first statue in the park to honor a woman. In 2013, longtime women's rights activists Pam Elam and Coline Jenkins formed the Statue Fund to create the first statue in Central Park that both honors and depicts real women. Sculpture Meredith Bergmann's design was chosen out of several entries and honors Stanton and Anthony, two leaders at the forefront of the women's suffrage movement. The working model of the statue will be on display at the State Museum in the West Hall Corridor through Sunday, April 26, 2020. New York State Museum Cultural Education Center is located at 222 Madison Ave., Albany.

After all, the Institute was founded in 1791, when their dear friend and house guest, George Washington was President. The Albany Institute is also partnering with Schuyler Mansion State Historic Site, which is presenting a Women of Schuyler Mansion tour. Catharine Schuyler was the great-great-granddaughter of Killian Van Rensselaer, the original founder of the Dutch colony of Rensselaerswyck. Catharine's marriage to Philip Schuyler linked two of New York's great landholding families. Philip Schuyler was known to care about the education of his daughters and paid for lessons in French, geography, history, writing, arithmetic, music, and dancing. Catharine Schuyler raised their daughters with an awareness of their colonial Dutch New York heritage and their connections to members of the prominent Ten Broeck, Livingston, Bayard, Van Rensselaer, and Van Cortlandt families. The exhibition discusses the wide-ranging interests of Catharine and her three eldest daughters Angelica, Elizabeth, and Margaret (Peggy)- sisters who witnessed history unfold in Albany, New York, Philadelphia, Paris, and London. As the wife of Alexander Hamilton, Eliza had a front row seat to events that shaped this country in the years immediately

following the Revolution. For many years, Angelica lived abroad where she entertained royalty, diplomats, and artists in Paris and London. She maintained life-long friendships with the prominent figures she met, like Thomas Jefferson, and patronized artist John Trumbull. Peggy married Stephen Van Rensselaer III who ranks 10th on Business Insider's list of wealthiest Americans of all time. The Schuyler Sisters and Their Circle also explores the men the Schuyler sisters married, hosted, and befriended. Military, political, and intellectual luminaries of the day including George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, and the Marguis de Lafayette visited the Schuyler home in Albany. The exhibition uses clothing, decorative arts, portraits, and manuscripts from the Revolutionary Period to the Federal Period to tell the stories of the Schuyler women. Twentyfour public and private institutions and individuals have lent their treasures for display. A rarely exhibited John Trumbull portrait of Angelica Schuyler Church with her child and servant is on loan to the exhibition from a private collection, and there are additional significant loans from Columbia University (including Eliza Hamilton's wedding ring from the Rare Book and Manuscripts Library), Fort Ticonderoga, Seth Kaller, Inc., New-York Historical Society, Metropolitan Museum of Art, and the Museum of the City of New York among many others. The Albany Institute is thrilled to bring these objects associated with the Schuyler sisters together in their hometown and showcase them in a special exhibition sure to thrill visitors- from history buffs to Hamilfans! The Schuvler Sisters and Their Circle will be presented from now until Tuesday, Dec. 29. Albany Institute of History and Art is located at 125 Washington Ave., Albany.



Cozy up to a slow-cooked meal

low cookers are a handy tool for any home chef, particularly those who juggle busy daily schedules. With slow cookers, meals can be prepared in advance and then left to simmer for hours while they develop deep flavors as meats become tender and succulent.

When cooking recipes in a slow cooker, it's best to choose cuts of meats and poultry that can stand up to long cook times. These cuts tend to be more fibrous and tough, but will tenderize with time. Short ribs, for example, are a prime option for slow cooking magic. They're the star of this recipe for "Bacon, Onion & Stout Braised Short Ribs" from "Crock-Pot® 365 Year-Round Recipes" (Publications International, Ltd.) from The Crock-Pot Kitchens.

Short Ribs

Ingredients: Makes 4 servings

- pounds bone-in beef short ribs, well trimmed
- teaspoon salt, plus additional for seasoning
- teaspoon ground black pepper, plus additional for seasoning
- tablespoon vegetable oil ounces thick-cut bacon cut
- into 1/4-inch dice
- large onion, halved and cut 1 into 1/4-inch slices
- 1 tablespoon tomato paste 2
- tablespoons all-purpose flour

- 2 tablespoons spicy brown mustard
- 1 bottle (12 ounces) Irish stout
- 1 bay leaf
- cup beef broth 1
 - tablespoons finely chopped parsley leaves Hot mashed potatoes or cooked egg noodles (optional)

Instructions

Season beef with salt and pepper. Heat oil in large skillet over medium-high heat until almost smoking. Working in batches, cook short ribs in skillet, turning to brown on all sides. Transfer each batch to a slow cooker as it is finished. Wipe out pan with paper towels and return to heat.

Cook bacon, stirring occasionally, until crisp, about 4 minutes. Transfer with a slotted spoon to a paper towel-lined plate to drain. Remove and discard all but 1 tablespoon drippings from pan. Reduce heat to medium and add onion. Cook until softened and translucent, stirring occasionally. Add tomato paste, flour, mustard, 1 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Cook, stirring constantly, 1 minute. Remove from bottom of pan. Pour over short ribs. Add drained bacon, bay leaf and beef broth. Cover and cook on low 8 hours, or until meat is tender and falls off the hone

Remove beef and skim fat from cooking liquid. Remove bay leaf and stir in parsley. Serve with mashed potatoes or egg noodles.

Tip: This recipe can be cooked ahead and refrigerated overnight.



The museum's Ptolemaic Period mummy and his coffin are now on view in the Heinrich Medicus Gallery with a selection of over seventy objects highlighting ancient Egyptian daily life, afterlife, and animal mummies. Joining objects from the museum's collection are loans from the Phoebe A. Hearst Museum of Anthropology, Museum of Natural History, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, the Semitic Museum, Harvard University, University of Pennsylvania, Williams College, and a number of private collections.



This is not for you

After 25 years, 'Vitalogy' signifies when Vedder and Co. grew up and took charge against obstacles

earl Jam induces a level of obsessive compulsive behavior. Shortly after "Ten" was released, I found myself scrounging for more material. My efforts lead to Temple of the Dog, which tripped me further down the grunge scene that defines my generation; good, bad or indifferent. The band's relevancy throughout the years is credited to its willingness to adapt its sound despite pressure from its fanbase or label representatives. In 2019, that fanbase knows its place — as do corporate heads — but those boundaries were not well established when "Vitalogy" hit the shelves in 1994.

"Vitalogy" celebrated its 25th anniversary last month, and it marks a significant threshold. Sonically, it differs from the band's previous two releases: "Ten" and "Vs." Eddie Vedder and Company rejected the fuzzy, distorted guitar of that Seattle Sound. Vedder took the reins of songwriting duties and proceeded to lash out against Madison "Vitalogy" sat in my dorm room collecting dust as tracks debuted on the radio. Avenue and his loss of privacy. The album was also a manifestation of the band's collective frustration boiled over from a gauntlet of touring, writing and recording three albums in five years.

The sound was different. "This is not for you," Vedder sings on the album's third track, and I remember feeling he was speaking to me as the tape cassette spun through my stereo. Its very purchase broke my self-imposed "three-song" rule: If you like three songs from the album, buy it. Pearl Jam had earned an exception; a significant achievement to earn such trust in a college student with little money to spend. But, as I listened through, I found myself betrayed. The goose-honking of an accordion on "Bugs" prompted me to stop listening.

Musicians are people, and as such, they grow and change with life experiences. For those same reasons, I've since come to consider "Vitalogy" to be among my favorite albums. Somewhere in those 25 years I, too, caught a bolt of lightning and had cursed the day I let it go. Lyrics I could not appreciate as a college kid have a profound meaning to the man I am today. In retrospect, the album passes the Epic records

"three-song" rule. For the dysfunctional relationship portrayed in "Better Man," for the familiarity in the sound of "Corduroy," and that punk homage I hear in "Spin the Black Circle."

"Vitalogy" marked the beginning of the end for grunge. One of the genre's founding fathers walked away from the Seattle Sound just as it became a commercial commodity. For those who were not ready to leave it behind, this release was jarring, unexpected, and in my case, unwelcomed. But, within the context of Pearl Jam's robust catalog of music, "Vitalogy" fits. And, on a grander scale, the introspective voice captured on some of the aforementioned tracks gravitates towards a matured audience who, too, grew up and walked away.
