Struck by vehicle

BETHLEHEM — A 59-year-old Slingerlands man attempted to use a crosswalk to cross Delaware Avenue when he was struck by a vehicle driven by a 17-year-old Delmar man.

The incident happened at around 5:14 p.m. last Thursday, Dec. 12 at the intersection of Delaware Avenue and Fisher Boulevard. According to the Albany County Sheriff's Office, the eastbound vehicle then stopped and the driver has been cooperating with investigators. The victim sustained traumatic injuries and was transported by a Delmar-Bethlehem ambulance to the Albany Medical Center. The Albany County Sheriff's Paramedics, Delmar-Bethlehem EMS, Delmar Fire Department and Slingerlands Fire Department responded to the scene.

The victim's and driver's identities have not been revealed but the latter was issued a traffic violation for failure to yield to the right

of way of a pedestrian in a crosswalk. Neither alcohol nor speed was considered as contributing to the accident.

A pool with a plan



With winter construction no longer an option, the town will eventually decide whether summer construction is an option in order to see a new pool built that replaces the original dive tank.

BETHLEHEM —

A new pool to replace the irreparable Elm Avenue Park dive pool may be open as early as late July 2020 but Paul Penman, the town's deputy commissioner of Public Works, said it is not a 100 percent guarantee.

Appearing before the town board, he presented a new timeline for how the town will move forward regarding the dive pool.

It was originally built in 1973 but was closed this past summer as it was discovered as being severely deteriorated beyond repair.

In past weeks, residents and the town board began to express their views on a new dive pool — this would be based on the original — and a new double-slide pool — anyone over 48 inches, or four feet, can use this and it requires two lifeguards.

Penman said bids for a new dive pool and a double-slide pool will be advertised on Dec. 23; the town will receive bids by Jan. 30, 2020; the town board will review the bids in its Feb. 7 meeting; a contract would be awarded in the Feb. 26 town board meeting; a notice to proceed will happen the day after; and construction is expected to begin on March 16.

"The first critical date is February 7. That's the town board meeting where we'd like to present the numbers that come in on the bid package for the two options," said Penman. "Then we would get some comments from the town board."

He also noted that the town will continue having discussions with the public about both pool options prior to making a decision "It may get the pool open by the end of July or early August but again, I don't want to promise that bcause this last year, we had horrible weather."

at the Feb. 26 meeting.

Town Supervisor David VanLuven said it is important to continue public discussions in the meantime.

Town Board member Dan Coffey said it would be helpful to put pool-related information on the town's website before Feb. 7 so that the public can have ample time to learn about it before the town board makes a decision on Feb. 26.

An ideal construction timeline was presented too where between March 16 and May 22, regardless of which pool type the town chooses by then, is when

Moratorium has six more months

BETHLEHEM —

The Town Board voted 4-1 in its Dec. 11 meeting to extend the existing moratorium on permitting new vape stores by another six months.

The moratorium, set to continue from Dec. 29 to June 28, 2020, had already been in place since June 26. It specifically concerns "the submission and processing of applications for building permits, certificates of

occupancy, and land use approvals for vape shops, smoke shops and the sale of marijuana or marijuana products, or the dispensing or distribution of medical marijuana," according to town documents.

The moratorium was

originally created as the town had received two building permit applications earlier this year for proposed stores that would sell products like vaping devices and medical marijuana.

One application was to be located on 243 Delaware Ave. close to Elsmere Elementary School and the other on 365 Feura Bush Road which was 1,800 feet from Glenmont Elementary School. This raised questions about whether such a store should be located near a school and young children. Bethlehem has one existing standalone vaping shop so far: Interstate Vapor, located on 340 Delaware Ave., which opened in 2015.

Town Board member Jim Foster has been the only one who voted against the moratorium both on June 26 and Dec. 11. In a phone interview, Foster said that he continues to be concerned about it.

He explained that once a moratorium leads the town to decide whether to amend existing zoning laws, create a licensing system or some hybrid of that, "a single decision can cause adult users to may not have a local option anymore and that could turn them onto the black market or online marketplaces where products may be much more dangerous. My concern is based on health concerns for both children and even adults and the danger related to the black market."

Foster added that he remains skeptical that a moratorium would have a meaningful impact on the community and people's health. "It looks good but it falls short," he said.

Robert Leslie, the town's Planning Division director, spoke before the town board on Dec. 11 about how town staff have already been researching ways to regulate vaping products

nd e-cigarettes.

He noted that vaping and tobacco products cannot be separately regulated because vaping products are a type of tobacco products. "Vaping is a delivery system for nicotine, no different than cigarettes are a delivery system for nicotine. So, you can't differentiate between the two in your zoning laws," he said. "Essentially, if you're looking to regulate vaping products, you have to regulate tobacco in a locality and regulate tobacco retailers."

As of Dec. 1, there are 16 locations in town that are state-registered tobacco and/or vape retailers, 14 of which include gas stations and convenience stores.

There are two main regulatory options that the town could consider moving forward: zoning and licensing.

With zoning, "It's

Albany County budget passes

Spending plan includes raises for everyone

ALBANY — The County Legislature, on Nov. 5, approved a \$733 million spending plan that increases spending but lowers taxes and gives all elected officials a raise, including themselves.

The legislature made some modifications to the plan initially proposed by County Executive Dan McCoy in October.

The bottom line, is that the new average tax rate will be \$3.49 per \$1,000 of equalized assessed value, a 1.8 percent decrease, about 0.5 percent less than McCoy's proposed budget.


The legislature did spread out and trim raises proposed by McCoy for himself, Sheriff Craig Apple and Comptroller Susan Rizzo and gave themselves a pay increase.

McCoy had initially proposed bumping his salary from \$141,320 to \$163,900, Apple's salary from \$129,358 to \$149,900 and Comptroller-elect Susan Rizzo's salary from \$125,816 to \$145,900 the day she is slated to assume the office for the first time. The salary of District Attorney David Soares, the fourth official elected county wide outside of the judiciary, would remain at \$202,800.

Instead, the legislature modified the increases to represent an 8 percent bump for McCoy and Apple in 2020 with a 2 percent increase in 2021, 2022 and 2023. It nixed any increase for Rizzo in 2020 but did approve a 2 percent raise in 2021, 2022 and 2023.

Under the modified budget, by 2023 McCoy's salary will be \$161,969 and Apple's will be \$148,258.

In a separate resolution, the body of lawmakers gave themselves a \$1,000 raise, or about 4.2 percent, in 2020 with a 2 percent bump in 2021, 2022 and 2023. The base pay for a

legislator is 23,546 and by 2023 it will jump to \$26,049, a 10.6 percent increase.

"This budget puts our residents first. One of our main objectives when we received this budget was to find savings that we could use for programs or initiatives to address the needs of our constituents," Chair of the Legislature Andrew Joyce said in a statement.

The majority of other county employees not represented by a union will see a 2 percent salary increase, which is in line with those represented by a bargaining unit. There are about 2,685 county employees.

The budget funds 74 new positions including 18 in the Sherriff's Office, nine in the Public Defender's Office, seven in the District Attorney's Office, three in the Division of Alternate Public Defender's Office and five in the residential health care facilities.

This is the second year of the statewide implementation of the Hurrell-Harring indigent legal defense reforms McCoy fought for at the state level. An additional \$3.5 million will fund 30 new positions, including those in the Public Defender, Alternative Public Defender and 18-B Departments.

Also included in the budget are:

- \$250,000 for the rehabilitation of young offenders and help them avoid jail time.
- More caseworkers in the Department of Mental Health
- \$100,000 for Camoin Associates to create a regional economic development strategy.
- \$25,000 to help municipalities throughout the county with the 2020 Census.
- \$30,000 for a senior citizens employment summer program
 - \$250,000 for the Albany

Poll: 17 percent will spend more money

30 percent believe in Santa Claus

COLONIE – Nearly half of Christmas shoppers will spend \$500 or more on gifts this holiday season, according to a new survey by the Siena College Research Institute.

But, just 30 percent of New Yorkers believe in Santa Claus, down a point from last year.

Meanwhile, 34 percent are "very excited" for the holiday season, up 8 points from last year.

In all, 71 percent say they are either somewhat or very excited about the season, up from 66 percent last year.

In 2009 just 22 percent were "very excited about

the season and 64 percent were either somewhat or very excited.

"New Yorkers are a bit more excited about the holiday season this year. Holiday gift budgets have risen slightly and New Yorkers' collective view of their personal finances is up compared to a year ago," said SCRI Director Don Leby. "While only 30 percent of residents say that they believe in Santa, most will have a tree in their home and with over 80 percent shopping online, for some, the internet may be replacing the North Pole."

About 40 percent say they will do at least half their shopping online this year, about the same as last year.

In 2008, just 7 percent of New Yorkers did their shopping online.

One in five will spend

\$1,000 or more while 30 percent of New Yorkers plan to hold their gift spending under \$300.

While just over half of New Yorkers say they will keep their spending unchanged this year, 17 percent say they will increase their spending this year.

Also, 26 percent say they will spend less.

In 2009 and 2010, just 4 percent said they would spend more money.

In addition, 48 percent and 53 percent, respectively, said they would spend less.

The controversy over holiday greetings kicks up every year, although it doesn't seem as vehement this year.

According to the poll, 51 percent of New Yorkers most often greet others with "Merry Christmas."

Meanwhile, 38 percent

prefer "Happy Holidays."

"Season's Greetings" placed a distant third with just 6 percent of the people saying they prefer that salutation.

One of the more dicey decisions for any of the households that have a Christmas tree is what kind to get: real or artificial.

Of those 72 percent who do have a tree, 65 percent pick the fake tree out of the box rather than a real tree.

Sixty-three percent say they will make some sort of donation this year — either in the form of money, food or gifts — to charitable organization or to the needy this holiday season

However, 25 percent say they will not.

Last year, 68 percent said they would donate and 31 said they would not.

The number of people who say they will donate has steadily decreased since 2007 when 81 percent of those polled said they would donate to charity and just 17 percent said they would not.

Along those same lines, 32 percent said they would volunteer their time to organizations that help people in need while 56 percent say they would not.

The number who said they would volunteer has remained steady, fluctuating between 30 percent in 2009 to 37 percent in 2008 and 2016.

There is an equal number of males and females, 30 percent, who say they believe in Santa Claus while 33 percent of those between 50 and 64 years old say they do and just 28 percent of those 18 to 34 years old have the same type of confidence.

More Catholics, 41 percent, say they believe, while just 18 percent believe who are of Jewish faith.

More people living in the suburbs, 38 percent, believe in Santa compared to 28 percent in New York City and 28 percent upstate.

Thirty-four percent of Latinos believe compared to 30 percent of whites who responded and 23 percent of blacks.

The SCRI holiday spending poll was conducted from Nov. 19 to 22 by random telephone calls to 402 New York adults using a landline and cell phones.

The sampling was done by asking for the youngest male in the household. It carries a margin of error of +/- 3.6 percent.







Effort to go green reveals old ash

Port of Albany expansion to create jobs, contribute to green initiative, but buried coal ash has local residents concerned for environment

GLENMONT —

Once fully approved, the Port of Albany's Expansion Project has the potential to create approximately 1,670 new jobs and generate an annual potential impact to Albany County of approximately \$295 million, based on the maximum build out of the 80 acres of property into a 1.13 million square-foot, two-story industrial facility.

Though still in the planning approval phase, the expansion site located off River Road has been shortlisted in the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority's

supply chain fulfillment assembly or manufacturing opportunity sites in New York State. This would mean that a project that would locate at the site would contribute toward offshore wind, a green or sustainable energy initiative that is currently swelling in New York and all along the Northeast United States, said Megan Daly, director of Economic Development and Procurement at the Port of Albany.

"The Port has been seeking to attract offshore wind supply chain companies that would help fulfill New York State's offshore wind initiative," she said. "The potential



at a Tennessee project that the Environmental Protection Agency had a hard time removing this type of burned coal waste. He also noted that the town's water plant is downstream from the Port and suggested that the town guarantee free water from the city of Albany, if contamination occurs. Still, Carriero was pleased with the potential job creation and said that the nearby thruway was built to handle such industrial traffic. He emphasized, however, that the natural resources must also be protected.

The town of Bethlehem's Planning Board chair, John Smolinsky, said that the generic plan as submitted did include ways to mitigate any issues with the ash on the site.

Traffic issues have also been discussed at town meetings as an item of concern. And Smolinsky said that the project would not be a drain on the

school system but it could impact the local public safety departments.

According to documents filed with the town, the project is not anticipated to result in a significant increase in greenhouse gas emissions. However, in an effort to reduce the potential effects of the project, any future tenants will be encouraged to promote green vehicle purchases and not allow truck idling to prevent over exhaust. In addition, future tenants will be encouraged to use the following mitigation measures onsite: high efficiency heating, a ventilation, and an air-conditioning systems; Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design Certification; local building materials, if available; a recycling program; Insulation to minimize heat loss; and use of public transportation, including rail and river access.

- Megan Daly, **Director of Economic** and Procurement Development at not yet been identified, four concepts have been proposed for the site including a 1.13 million square foot, two-story warehouse, a large singlestory warehouse at 900,000 square feet, multiple warehouses for a total square footage of 810,000, and an offshore wind assembly facility at 160,000 square feet, said Smolinsky.

The Port of Albany first applied for the expansion in November of 2018. Smolinsky said that a public comment period is ongoing into January, following public comment this past fall, and the planning board will continue to discuss the expansion plan into February and March. If the generic plan is approved, another specific plan would eventually need to be filed once a tenant or tenants is the Port of Albany found for the facility.

Board of education

Piecing together the facts to peek into the school days spent at Glenmont's District No. 7 Schoolhouse

GLENMONT —

The remnants of school days spent in a one-room building remain, though not as common.

A cobblestone structure with a quaint belltower still a fixed above the front door. resides in Guilderland. It, along with the Cedar Hill Schoolhouse in Selkirk, is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The latter has served as the

home for the Bethlehem Historical Association since it ceased to be a school shortly before 1965. Though the red schoolhouse has been modified over the years - split into a tworoom school and fixed with indoor plumbing — it allows a glimpse into what school days looked like for a near century.

Television also helps. Our imagination is aided by episodes of "Little House on the Prairie" and "Anne of Green Gables." Romanticised scenes of children in rural America running into the schoolhouse as the teacher rings the bell. And, while inside, these children in

various ages sat attentively to hear the lessons of the day. But, that's not likely how it went.

The Regents of the University of the State of New York was established in 1784. Its first order of business was to establish a network of schools. Some communities had already established schools, complete with headmasters whose salary was aided by tuition. But, schooling was voluntary. The State Legislature didn't require mandatory schooling until 1791, and it would be another fifty years before the state provided adequate funding to these free, public schools.

By 1866, there were 15 one-room schoolhouses spread across Bethlehem; Cedar Hill, Jericho, Bethlehem Center name a few. Each school was designated a district number. Bethlehem Center was No. 7 and it fell to progress with the erection of Bethlehem Center School in 1925. Bethlehem Center School stands today, across the street from where District No. 7 once stood.

Not much is known about District No. 7. From pictures, it resembles the cobblestone schoolhouse in Guilderland more than the one in Cedar Hill. The red schoolhouse was built in 1859, and Guilerland's Schoolhouse No. 6 was built a year later. By that time, Susan Leath said, Slingerland's District No. 9 had been in session since

Bethlehem's town historian recently earned insight on the caliber of lesson plans taught at these schools. Abel B. Wilder taught Slingerland's children in 1844, and "[He] kept meticulous records in his elegant handwriting," she stated. In an audit of his school's library, he had more than 100 titles, including Swift's Family Robinson, Life Sir Isaac Newton, Geology Elements, Counsels for the Young, Political Economy and Life of Dewitt Clinton.

Based on several accounts, a school teacher was tasked with orchestrating several lessons at one time. By law, the ages of these school children ranged from 5 to 21 years old or older. As the teacher worked in one corner with older students reciting history or arithmetic, younger students would be in another writing with slate and chalk.

Author Beth Anderson was "amazed" by these common schools. The former educator recently investigated this time period for a book idea. She taught English at Bethlehem Central High School for 25 years and she wanted to learn more about the formation of the school district. She learned how the one-room schools provided the equivalent of an eight-grade education, but nothing beyond that. "That amazed me," she told The Spotlight in 2017, "and so I started looking into it." Bethlehem built its own high school in Delmar — know Town Hall — in 1925. Prior to that, students seeking a high school education took a train into Albany.

Otherwise, the child's parents decided when schooling was finished. For boys, lessons were done once they reached the age of apprenticeship at about 14, according to the

New York State Historical Association. Girls often stayed in school until they were 18. So long as their children could read, write and have an understanding of the world, schooling was secondary to work at home or finding a job.

To earn an understanding of the world, the schoolhouse was entrusted to establish good morals within each child. That involved reading from the Bible, and when the situation called for it, administering discipline.

Common recourse involved a slap on the knuckles with a ruler. Others were more creative. The state historical association cited a story told by a student from the 19th century. It involved, "[a student] standing in a stooping posture, with the finger on the head of a nail in the floor. It was teacher. a position not particularly favorable to health of body or soundness of mind, the head being brought about as low as the knees, the blood rushing to it, and the pressing unnaturally on the veins, causing a dull pain, and a staggering dizziness."

Unlike today, a school day would start at 8:30 a.m. and end as late as 5 p.m. during the summer. The day would be broken up by a few recesses and a longer lunch period. But, today's student would be envious over the lack of homework assignments assigned at the end of the day.

As the calendar rolled further into the 20th century, the one-room schoolhouse disappeared. The schools continued to serve a purpose in some communities, often teaching a grade or two. The one-room school in Jericho continued to teach kindergarten and first grade until about 1960.

the most "disruptive" work mainly happens. This is when demolition, the installation of piping and shell construction will take place.

Then, from May 25 to Aug. 7, gutters will be installed, the pool and deck would be finished, and dive or slide towers will be erected too.

This brings up the issue of whether summer construction would be allowed while the rest of the pool complex is open.

Penman said the gutter installation "is not really

disruptive. Same thing with the pool finish, they bring in pretty much pickup trucks and a little bit bigger vehicles and a small mixer. Again, it's not going to be very dusty or very disruptive."

Penman added that he recommends summer construction to be allowed based on the schedule and type of construction activity planned during that time.

In his presentation, he also wrote that a few days could be noisy at the pool complex but a possible compromise is closing the complex for one or two days, or having it open for half-days at a time.

Town Board member Jim

Foster recommended families, especially parents, should be informed in advance of maintaining safe distances between patrons at the pool complex and construction activity, if summer construction is approved.

Jason Gallo, the town's Parks and Recreation administrator, said some possible ways to inform the public about summer construction, if it gets approved, include having information on receipts at the pool complex, and having signs and pictures there that detail construction activity too.


The pool is then set to be commissioned in mid-August and site landscaping would take place between Aug. 10 and Sept. 11.

While Penman said this is all a fairly conservative schedule, weather can be unpredictable.

But if there is good weather overall, it may shave the construction schedule by one month.

"It may get the pool open by the end of July or early August but again, I don't want to promise that because this last year, we had horrible weather," said Penman, offering a few examples like how welders cannot weld and concrete cannot be poured when it's raining.

important to know that zoning essentially grants rights attached to land and zoning regulations allows certain types of uses, like residential uses, commercial uses and industrial uses in certain areas of the town to ensure compatibility with surrounding land uses," said Leslie.

If the town amends zoning, it can regulate tobacco retailers as a business type that is a separate use from retail business types; establish the use as a site plan/special use permit approval action by the Planning Board;

establish distance requirements of the business type from schools, youth facilities, daycare centers and even other tobacco retailers.

However, he added that "zoning cannot be used to regulate the sale of certain products." Zoning also cannot exclude tobacco retailers from certain zoning districts in town if it's based on moral concerns—in this case, if people don't like a product because they feel it is morally wrong.

"Vaping is a product we can't use zoning alone to regulate the sale or product. That's where licensing comes in," said Leslie. "Using a licensing system, from what we've learned, is the most legally defensible measure, should

we ever be challenged."

A licensing system would grant rights and the privilege to a person who has the license to sell a product; such a system would apply to existing and future tobacco retailers. Licensing can also regulate product sales based on a public health concern, like how physically close a retailer is to a school, for example.

Leslie explained that a public health concern differs from a moral concern in that the former is backed by proven secondary effects studies. He brought up the example of an adult business and how studies, covered by institutions including Harvard University and even the national Supreme Court, have reported

it can negatively affect property values, can cause public nuisance and increase crime rates. "There are no such studies that show tobacco as causing a nuisance or diminishing property values so we can't treat how we zone adult businesses the same manner that we may want to regulate tobacco retailers," Leslie said.

A licensing system can also limit flavored products, limit discounted sales and like with amending zoning, it can establish distance requirements of a tobacco retailer from schools, youth facilities, daycare centers and other tobacco retailers.

Looking ahead, the town also would consider policy decisions regarding tobacco, medical

marijuana dispensary, recreational marijuana and cannabidiol (CBD) retail use. The extended moratorium seeks to allow time for the town board to consider developing a licensing system, provide guidance on how to approach regulations and town staff to draft those regulations based on the board's guidance. Town staff would also refer potential zoning amendments to the Planning Board.

"This certainly isn't a planning-only decision, we're just trying to provide you [the town board] with all the information so you can make an educated decision as we move forward," Leslie concluded.

Coeymans Solar Farm

To comprise of photovoltaic solar arrays and access roads, it will be connected to the existing Long Lane-Lafarge 115-kilovolt transmission line at two new substations that will be located at the farm's southern area; no new transmission lines would be required. PV panels will use the sun's energy to produce direct current electricity that will flow to on-site electrical inverters, turning it into alternating current electricity that will go to the electrical grid to reach consumers.

It is expected to generate around 73,000 megawatthours of electricity annually which is sufficient to supply around 10,000 average New York state households.

The project is proposed by Hecate Energy, a Chicago-based developer of renewable energy power plants which has already developed 332 megawatts of solar projects throughout the U.S. Gabriel Wapner, Hecate Energy's director of development, said the

project still needs final approval from the state Department of Public Service and the town of Coeymans. He added, though, that it has already met with and received support from the town government.

When asked why Coevmans was chosen as a desired location, Wapner said, "Our siting efforts have been focused on accessing the transmission grid and this location has a transmission line running across it and that's why we chose it. It's close to a lot of industries too, near a quarry, a cement plan which also help make this an ideal location."

Regular communication with local residents will help inform them about the construction process moving forward, he said. If approved, construction is expected to begin in the second half of 2020 and last for eight months. The proposed site is currently used for agriculture.

Hecate Energy held

The proposed Coeymans Solar Farm suggests it will produce 40-megawatts from its photovoltaic solar facility.

two informational sessions during an open house on Wednesday, Dec. 11 at the Coeymans Volunteer Fire Company #1 building at 67 Church St. Hecate Energy officials were on hand to answer residents' questions and explain the project with posters and artistic renderings.

"This turnout has been encouraging and there's been questions about basic information about the project and some people are typically concerned about infrastructure projects. But it's been mainly positive



feedback," Wapner said. "Our website has frequently asked questions that seem to cover many questions for people too."

He added that the solar farm is projected to provide \$40 million in economic stimulus to the local community. "Solar farms are quiet and low profile and they're like quiet neighbors and there will be no burdens on the local community and school systems," he said.

According to the project's website, the

proposed solar farm will "bring a significant increase in property tax revenue for the locality than what is currently collected. The increased revenue will improve local government services like schools, which improvements have a positive effect on property values."

The website also indicated that 140 construction jobs would be created during the installation period and two permanent jobs will emerge to operate and maintain the solar farm.

The project's development began in 2016 with preliminary studies and an initial open house was already held about it in

"It will bring a tremendous amount of stimulus to local communities and it's very good for the environment as there are no emissions," Wapner concluded. "It also makes Coeymans a key player in leading the renewable energy movement in New York state."

Colin Quinn

The 60-year-old comedian hasn't slowed down since suffering a heart attack last February. The Irish kid out of Brooklyn got back up and kept on going. He hit the Twitter verse days later to let fans know he was okay, but if he were to keel over, "you would see a funeral like Al Capone!"


Quinn first garnered laughs from a national audience appearing on MTV's Remote Control, a campy television game show centered around America's fixation on television. He was the Ed McMahon to Ken Ober's Johnny Carson. His gravelly voice was distinctly from Brooklyn, aided by a smoking habit. To the college kids watching the show, he sounded like that frat boy a year removed from his five-year plan.

Quinn attended the University at Stony Brook, but not on a five-year plan. He quit and went on to do stand-up comedy after he couldn't get into law enforcement. After three years, he was in front of a national audience. A regular gig that broadcast from Spring Break each year.

Quinn ultimately followed Remote Control alum Adam Sandler to Saturday Night Live, and hosted his own talk show "Tough Crowd with Colin Quinn" on Comedy Central. Aside from that, he's continued his stand-up with tours and several television specials.

The comedian has observed the world. The social strife you and I witness on social media is more than just the fodder that fuels his sense of humor. You can find him riding with New York City cabbies and listening to them explain how Uber and Lyft is killing them. It's not funny. It's not meant to be. His latest one-man show, "Red State Blue State," is meant to be funny, but there is candor. It premiered in January and was later adapted into CNN's first comedy special before it started streaming on Netflix in August.

The headlines out of Washington have long provided punchlines for comedians, and these past few years have

been no exception. For Quinn, today's current events have turned into a senior thesis; one that calls for flipping the channel on America. As controversial as that reads, people from both sides of the aisle enjoy it.

"I think we should find a way to divide, and stay together at the same time," Quinn said. "At this point, it's just getting ridiculous. The whole point of this country is that people are supposed to live the way that they believe. And, everyone is trying to get other people to believe what they believe. That's not going to work."

Quinn's take on our freedom of speech is that, "it's an acoustic art; it wasn't meant to go electric," he said, adding that it was meant to be exercised by a person under an oak tree, in front of a handful of people. With social media, that same person now speaks to the world; and probably shouldn't be. He describes people as being "emotionally dug in" and unwilling to change their point of views.

"I've talked to a lot of people who would span the political landscape," Quinn said, "and, they've all got one thing in common: They all have this real anger and real fixed idea that this is the way

it is, this is what's wrong. They all think they know what's wrong, and they're just disillusioned."

Quinn is on the road with new material. He hits the Swyer Theatre at the Egg on Saturday, Dec. 21 with "Colin Quinn Live" before jetting off to London where they have their own problems. He'll likely touch upon those issues, too, while he's there. But, don't ask him to pick a side. He doesn't see issues as easily defined or remedied.

"The whole world has been grey area since Day One," he said. "If somebody had a solution, we'd all know about it."

A new exhibition at the Albany Institute offers a visual overview of Palmer's life, travels, and artistic output. The exhibition includes works from all three of Palmer's major series: the early interior views where Palmer lavished attention on the textiles, ceramics, furniture, and wall decorations that filled well-furnished homes; his Venetian scenes that capture the luxuriant colors of the sea, sky, and buildings of this island city; and the snow scenes that continue to enchant viewers with their masterful tonal subtleties. Ancient Egypt

Egyptologist and Guest Curator Dr. Peter Lacovara has incorporated the research and scientific discoveries revealed in the GE Presents: The Mystery of the Albany Mummies exhibition into a new exhibition about Ancient Egypt. Visitors to the museum will continue to enjoy the story of the Albany mummies, learn about the history of Ancient Egypt, and see how the intersection of new science, technology, and scholarship changes how we learn. In addition to the story of Mummy Ankhefenmut, theme and topics in the new galleries include: Egyptian History and Civilization; the Nile and the Environment; Crafts and Professions; Food and Drink; Gods and Goddesses; and Preparing for the Afterlife. The Jabbur Gallery now features the story of Albany's 3,000 year old mummy, Ankhefenmut, a priest and sculptor in the Temple of Mut, along with his recently discovered priest's robe, his coffin hase from the museum's collection, and his beautiful coffin lid on loan from the Kunsthistoriches Museum, Vienna. The museum's Ptolemaic Period mummy and his coffin are now on view in the Heinrich Medicus Gallery with a selection of over seventy objects highlighting ancient Egyptian daily life, afterlife, and animal mummies. Joining objects from the museum's collection are loans from


the Phoebe A. Hearst Museum of Anthropology, Museum of Natural History, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, the Semitic Museum, Harvard University, University of Pennsylvania, Williams College, and a number of private collections. Also included are a timeline and a slide presentation highlighting the trip the Albany Mummies took to Albany Medical Center for x-rays and CT scans, which revealed new information about the age, gender, and occupation of these mummies. Ancient Egypt is an ongoing exhibit. Albany Institute of History and Art is located at 125 Washington Ave., Albany.

people call Fort Orange" Fort Orange was the first permanent Dutch settlement in New Netherland, built as a trading post by the West India Company in 1624 at the location of present-day Albany along the Hudson River. Between 1624 and 1664, the fort's role in the development of New Netherland changed—from a point of contact and trade between Native Americans and Europeans, to an enclosure with dwellings and private enterprises, and finally an abandoned space consumed by the development of Albany. Centuries later, Fort Orange on the surface had long disappeared. But in a six-month period in 1970 and 1971—just ahead of Interstate 787 construction—a small archaeology team from the State Historic Trust (predecessor to the Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation, or OPRHP), headed by Paul Huey and composed mostly of volunteers, made remarkable discoveries about life in the Dutch colony at Fort Orange. In 2016, a collection of 36,000 artifacts from Fort Orange was transferred from OPRHP to the New York State Museum. This exhibition examines the momentous discovery of Fort Orange and the lasting impact of events occurring there 400 years ago that shaped the character of the region. New York State, and the nation. The exhibition title is a quote taken from The New World by Johannes De Laet, a director of the Dutch West India Company, recorded in 1625. Select artifacts, film footage from the excavation, and four decades of historical and archaeological research are highlighted—including renderings of the fort by Historical Artist Len Tantillo. Dutch ceramics on loan from the Albany Institute of History & Art help bring life to the story. This exhibition is supported as part of the Dutch Culture USA program by the Consulate General of the Netherlands in New York and in partnership with Historic Albany Foundation. Enterprising Waters: New York's Erie Canal (Phase Two)

The Erie Canal directed the course of New York and American history. When it opened in 1825, this "boldest and biggest American engineering project of its century" unlocked the Western interior for trade and settlement. Boomtowns sprang up along the canal's path and New York City, with its deep harbor connecting to the Hudson River, grew to be the nation's most powerful center of international trade. One of the largest public works projects in American history, the Erie Canal inspired a nation-wide transportation revolution. Thousands of people poured into New York to work on or along the canal, or just to pass through. Though the canal



would eventually be superseded by the railroad, a heady mixture of innovation and determination, and the industrious seeking and creation of wealth, was cemented in the American character. In honor of the Ricentennial of the Frie Canal's construction, New York State's Office of Cultural Education will present this rich story with the first phase of Enterprising Waters: New York's Erie Canal at the New York State Museum. In collaboration with organizations on the canal corridor and across the state, the State Museum will tell the Erie Canal's story with unique objects, documents, and images. Dominating the exhibition space is a gigantic windlass—a pulley mechanism that easily lifted and lowered heavy cargo from both sides of a warehouse with only one or two men. From 1831 through 1866, this windlass operated in the H. G. Root and Company Warehouse in the Village of Mohawk on the Erie Canal. The owners of the warehouse, Humphrey G. and Elias Root, also ran a general store and other small businesses along the canal. Phase Two of Enterprising Waters continues the story of the Erie Canal with components on the Canal's growth, politics, industries, social reform, and the Canal legacy. Enterprising Waters: New York's Erie Canal (Phase Two) will be presented in the New York State Museum's Exhibition Hall from now until Sunday, Oct. 25, 2020. New York State Museum Cultural Education Center is located at 222 Madison Ave., Albany.

The Historic Woodstock Art Colony: The Arthur A. Anderson Collection

Long before the famous music festival in 1969, Woodstock was home to what is considered America's first intentionally created, year-round arts colony-founded in 1902 and still thriving over 100 years later. Collecting the remarkable range of work produced there has been Arthur A. Anderson's focus for three decades, resulting in the largest comprehensive assemblage of its type. The artists represented in it reflect the diversity of those who came to Woodstock, including Birge Harrison, Konrad Cramer, George Bellows, Eugene Speicher, Peggy Bacon, Rolph Scarlett, and Yasuo Kuniyoshi, among many others. Anderson recently donated his entire collection—some 1.500 objects by almost 200 artists—to the New York State Museum. This exhibition introduces to the public for the first time just a sample of the highlights of this extraordinary collection, which represents a body of work that together shaped art and culture in New York and forms a history of national and international significance. The Historic Woodstock Art Colony: The Arthur A. Anderson Collection is presented in the West Gallery of the New York State Museum from now until Tuesday, Dec. 31. New York State Museum Cultural Education Center is located at 222 Madison Ave., Albany.

The Hudson River School: Landscape Paintings from the Albany Institute

The Albany Institute holds a large and important collection of nineteenth-century American landscape paintings, works often associated with the term "Hudson River School." They number more than ninety paintings and range in dimension from large wall-sized canvases to small business card-sized oil sketches on paper. We know from visitors the Hudson River School paintings are among the Institute's most popular collections, and other museums request to borrow them for exhibitions more often

than other collections. With such great interest in these works of national significance, the Institute is making them more accessible. In the summer of 2017, the Institute opened a reinstallation of its Hudson River School paintings in the Hearst Gallery on the museum's third floor. For the first time, nearly all ninety paintings from this important collection is on view. These landscapes, painted by artists like Thomas Cole, Frederic Church, Jasper Cropsey, Asher Durand, and numerous others, capture America's scenic grandeur in all its magnificence from rugged coastal scenery to imposing mountains and rivers. Many paintings in the Institute's collection depict the nation during decades of transformation from a country of small towns and farms to one of industrial works and sprawling urban centers. The nation was also in the midst of rapid westward expansion and political conflict that reshaped its social identity and cultural outlook. Developments in transportation allowed artists to travel more widely, frequently beyond the nation's borders, to Europe and more distant corners of the globe, and return to their home country with sketchbooks full of inspiration and new ideas. The paintings on view, therefore, reveal a visual history of the United States during the nineteenth century, including its aspirations and growing nostalgia for a simpler and more harmonious past. The Hudson River School: Landscape Paintings from the Albany Institute is an ongoing exhibit. Albany Institute of History and Art is located at 125 Washington

The statue will be unveiled in New York City's Central Park in 2020—the first statue in the park to honor a woman. In 2013, longtime women's rights activists Pam Elam and Coline Jenkins formed the Statue Fund to create the first statue in Central Park that both honors and depicts real women. Sculpture Meredith Bergmann's design was chosen out of several entries and honors Stanton and Anthony, two leaders at the forefront of the women's suffrage movement. The working model of the statue will be on display at the State Museum in the West Hall Corridor through Sunday, April 26, 2020. New York State Museum Cultural Education Center is located at 222 Madison Ave., Albany.

The Schuyler Sisters and Their Circle

Sparked by the phenomenal success of Hamilton: An American Musical, the Albany Institute of History & Art has organized the exhibition The Schuvler Sisters and Their Circle. Catharine Schuyler was the great-great-granddaughter of Killian Van Rensselaer, the original founder of the Dutch colony of Rensselaerswyck. Catharine's marriage to Philip Schuyler linked two of New York's great landholding families. A rarely exhibited John Trumbull portrait of Angelica Schuyler Church with her child and servant is on loan to the exhibition from a private collection, and there are additional significant loans. Effort to go green reveals old ash

Port of Albany expansion to create jobs, contribute to green initiative, but buried coal ash has local residents concerned for environment

GLENMONT —

Once fully approved, the Port of Albany's Expansion Project has the potential to create approximately 1,670 new jobs and generate an annual potential impact to Albany County of approximately \$295 million, based on the maximum build out of the 80 acres of property into a 1.13 million square-foot, two-story industrial facility.

Though still in the planning approval phase, the expansion site located off River Road has been shortlisted in the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority's

supply chain fulfillment assembly or manufacturing opportunity sites in New York State. This would mean that a project that would locate at the site would contribute toward offshore wind, a green or sustainable energy initiative that is currently swelling in New York and all along the Northeast United States, said Megan Daly, director of Economic Development and Procurement at the Port of Albany.

"The Port has been seeking to attract offshore wind supply chain companies that would help fulfill New York State's offshore wind initiative," she said. "The potential



The expansion project is in the final stages with

the town of Bethlehem's Planning Board and going through the generic environmental impact statement state and local review.

Some public discussion

at a Tennessee project that the Environmental Protection Agency had a hard time removing this type of burned coal waste. He also noted that the town's water plant is downstream from the Port and suggested that the town guarantee free water from the city of Albany, if contamination occurs. Still, Carriero was pleased with the potential job creation and said that the nearby thruway was built to handle such industrial traffic. He emphasized, however, that the natural resources must also be protected.

The town of Bethlehem's Planning Board chair, John Smolinsky, said that the generic plan as submitted did include ways to mitigate any issues with the ash on the site.

Traffic issues have also been discussed at town meetings as an item of concern. And Smolinsky said that the project would not be a drain on the

school system but it could impact the local public safety departments.

According to documents filed with the town, the project is not anticipated to result in a significant increase in greenhouse gas emissions. However, in an effort to reduce the potential effects of the project, any future tenants will be encouraged to promote green vehicle purchases and not allow truck idling to prevent over exhaust. In addition, future tenants will be encouraged to use the following mitigation measures onsite: high efficiency heating, a ventilation, and an air-conditioning systems; Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design Certification; local building materials, if available; a recycling program; Insulation to minimize heat loss; and use of public transportation, including rail and river access.

Since a tenant has

- Megan Daly, **Director of Economic** and Procurement Development at not yet been identified, four concepts have been proposed for the site including a 1.13 million square foot, two-story warehouse, a large singlestory warehouse at 900,000 square feet, multiple warehouses for a total square footage of 810,000, and an offshore wind assembly facility at 160,000 square feet, said Smolinsky.

The Port of Albany first applied for the expansion in November of 2018. Smolinsky said that a public comment period is ongoing into January, following public comment this past fall, and the planning board will continue to discuss the expansion plan into February and March. If the generic plan is approved, another specific plan would eventually need to be filed once a tenant or tenants is the Port of Albany found for the facility.

The Cedar Hill Schoolhouse served the children and families of Selkirk as the center of their education for more than 100 years. First built in 1859, it was among 15 one-room schoolhouses throughout Bethlehem. It ceased to be a school shortly before 1965. Today, it is preserved and maintained by the Bethlehem Historical Association, and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Board of education

Piecing together the facts to peek into the school days spent at Glenmont's District No. 7 Schoolhouse

GLENMONT —

The remnants of school days spent in a one-room building remain, though not as common.

A cobblestone structure with a quaint belltower still a fixed above the front door. resides in Guilderland. It, along with the Cedar Hill Schoolhouse in Selkirk, is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The latter has served as the

home for the Bethlehem Historical Association since it ceased to be a school shortly before 1965. Though the red schoolhouse has been modified over the years - split into a tworoom school and fixed with indoor plumbing — it allows a glimpse into what school days looked like for a near century.

Television also helps. Our imagination is aided by episodes of "Little House on the Prairie" and "Anne of Green Gables." Romanticised scenes of children in rural America running into the schoolhouse as the teacher rings the bell. And, while inside, these children in

various ages sat attentively to hear the lessons of the day. But, that's not likely how it went.

The Regents of the University of the State of New York was established in 1784. Its first order of business was to establish a network of schools. Some communities had already established schools, complete with headmasters whose salary was aided by tuition. But, schooling was voluntary. The State Legislature didn't require mandatory schooling until 1791, and it would be another fifty years before the state provided adequate funding to these free, public schools.

By 1866, there were 15 one-room schoolhouses spread across Bethlehem; Cedar Hill, Jericho, Bethlehem Center name a few. Each school was designated a district number. Bethlehem Center was No. 7 and it fell to progress with the erection of Bethlehem Center School in 1925. Bethlehem Center School stands today, across the street from where District No. 7 once stood.

Not much is known about District No. 7. From pictures, it resembles the cobblestone schoolhouse in Guilderland more than the one in Cedar Hill. The red schoolhouse was built in 1859, and Guilerland's Schoolhouse No. 6 was built a year later. By that time, Susan Leath said, Slingerland's District No. 9 had been in session since

Bethlehem's town historian recently earned insight on the caliber of lesson plans taught at these schools. Abel B. Wilder taught Slingerland's children in 1844, and "[He] kept meticulous records in his elegant handwriting," she stated. In an audit of his school's library, he had more than 100 titles, including Swift's Family Robinson, Life Sir Isaac Newton, Geology Elements, Counsels for the Young, Political Economy and Life of Dewitt Clinton.

Based on several accounts, a school teacher was tasked with orchestrating several lessons at one time. By law, the ages of these school children ranged from 5 to 21 years old or older. As the teacher worked in one corner with older students reciting history or arithmetic, younger students would be in another writing with slate and chalk.

Author Beth Anderson was "amazed" by these common schools. The former educator recently investigated this time period for a book idea. She taught English at Bethlehem Central High School for 25 years and she wanted to learn more about the formation of the school district. She learned how the one-room schools provided the equivalent of an eight-grade education, but nothing beyond that. "That amazed me," she told The Spotlight in 2017, "and so I started looking into it." Bethlehem built its own high school in Delmar — know Town Hall — in 1925. Prior to that, students seeking a high school education took a train into Albany.

Otherwise, the child's parents decided when schooling was finished. For boys, lessons were done once they reached the age of apprenticeship at about 14, according to the

New York State Historical Association. Girls often stayed in school until they were 18. So long as their children could read, write and have an understanding of the world, schooling was secondary to work at home or finding a job.

To earn an understanding of the world, the schoolhouse was entrusted to establish good morals within each child. That involved reading from the Bible, and when the situation called for it, administering discipline.

Common recourse involved a slap on the knuckles with a ruler. Others were more creative. The state historical association cited a story told by a student from the 19th century. It involved, "[a student] standing in a stooping posture, with the finger on the head of a nail in the floor. It was teacher. a position not particularly favorable to health of body or soundness of mind, the head being brought about as low as the knees, the blood rushing to it, and the pressing unnaturally on the veins, causing a dull pain, and a staggering dizziness."

Unlike today, a school day would start at 8:30 a.m. and end as late as 5 p.m. during the summer. The day would be broken up by a few recesses and a longer lunch period. But, today's student would be envious over the lack of homework assignments assigned at the end of the day.

As the calendar rolled further into the 20th century, the one-room schoolhouse disappeared. The schools continued to serve a purpose in some communities, often teaching a grade or two. The one-room school in Jericho continued to teach kindergarten and first grade until about 1960.
