



RCS music department earns national recognition

RAVENA — Ravena Coeymans Selkirk's music department earned top honors with the Best Communities for Music Education designation from The NAMM Foundation.

The school district announced receiving recognition — the four consecutive year the foundation has bestowed the honor to RCS — in an online statement Thursday, April 22. The award goes to school districts districts that demonstrate outstanding achievement in efforts to provide music access and education to all students.

"We are so proud to receive this distinction," said K-12 Art and Music Curriculum Content Specialist and High School Choral Director, Michelle McLoughlin. "It truly represents the dedication of the entire RCS community to music education."

To qualify for the Best Communities designation, the RCS District answered detailed questions about funding, graduation requirements, music class participation, instruction time, facilities, support for the music program and community music-making programs. Responses were verified with school officials and reviewed by The Music Research Institute at the University of Kansas.

"Included in the 2020-21 school year's application process was a detailed look at how we have overcome the many obstacles presented by the pandemic safety restrictions to still provide quality music opportunities for our students," McLoughlin said. "Being recognized for those efforts is a testament to our incredibly hard working music students and teachers, as well as everyone involved who helped us to keep music alive in our schools."





Hunting accident rates went up

DEC releases state hunting safety stats for 2020

ALBANY - New York State Department of Environmental Conservation Commissioner Basil Seggos recently released the hunting-related shooting incident and tree stand or other elevated incident reports for New York's 2020 hunting seasons. The reports are consistent with the low incident rates observed in the state over the past two decades.

"Last year, more than 600,000 New Yorkers and visitors enjoyed the abundant hunting opportunities available in New York as people headed afield in search of outdoor activities during the COVID-19 pandemic," Commissioner Seggos said. "The success of our new online hunter education program and the ongoing dedication of DEC's hunter education volunteers have helped hunting continue to be among the safest forms of outdoor recreation."

DEC documented 22 hunting-related incidents in 2020, including three fatalities. While up slightly from the record-low 12 incidents documented in 2019, the number of incidents in the 2020 season continues the downward trend in HRSIs observed over the past 20 years. Nine of the 22 HRSIs that occurred last year were two-party firearm incidents, and 13 were selfinflicted. The three fatalities recorded in 2020 were self-inflicted and involved experienced hunters. All of these incidents could have been prevented if hunting safety rules had been followed.

Further examination of the nine, two-party firearm incidents in 2020 reveal that seven victims involved were not wearing hunter orange or pink when afield, which along

with identifying the target and beyond, are two major principles of DEC's hunter safety courses. For more information on hunter safety basics, visit DEC's

website. All first-time hunters, bowhunters, and trappers must successfully complete a hunter, bowhunter, or trapper safety course and pass the final exam before being eligible to purchase a hunting or trapping license or bowhunting privilege in New York State. In 2020, DEC offered a completely online hunter safety course when in-person classes were cancelled just prior to the spring hunting season during the State's response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The number of participants demonstrated huge success for the online platform in terms of certifying safe hunters. Nearly 67,000 new hunters were certified last year, compared to an average of about 24,000 in previous years. None of the 22 hunting-related incidents in 2020 involved a hunter who took the hunter safety course online.

When local public health conditions allow in-person instruction, DEC-trained and certified volunteer instructors will continue to teach inperson safe, responsible, and ethical hunting and trapping. Over more than 60 years of dedicated efforts, DEC's Volunteer Hunter Education Program Instructors have inspired a safety-conscious generation of hunters and trappers.

The state has recorded HRSI rates since the 1960s. For comparison, 166 incidents were recorded in 1966, 13 of which were fatal. The hunting incident rate (incidents per 100,000 hunters) continues to fall over time. Since the 1960s, the number of hunters in New York has declined about 20 percent, while the incident rate has declined almost 80 percent. The current five-year average is two incidents per 100,000 hunters, compared to 19 per 100,000 hunters in the 1960s.

For the past several years, DEC has also tracked and investigated Elevated Hunting Incidents, previously referred to as tree stand injuries. DEC now tracks all incidents from an elevated position. EHIs are under-reported and DEC is not always notified when these falls occur.

In 2020, 13 EHIs were reported; one was fatal. That hunter was not wearing a safety harness and fell while descending from a ladder stand. Tree stand safety is integrated into DEC's hunter education course for first-time hunters because these incidents have become a major cause of hunting-related injuries. The proper use of tree stands and tree stand safety equipment will help prevent these injuries and fatalities. Used correctly, a harness keeps the hunter connected from the time they leave the ground to the moment they get back down.

Fed money to help municipalities, biz

Bethlehem to receive \$3.8M from American Rescue Plan Act

DELMAR — Bethlehem is slated to receive approximately \$3.8 million from the federal government after the recent passing of the American Rescue Plan Act.

The American Rescue Plan Act passed by Congress and signed into law by President Joe Biden last month allocates \$1.9 trillion into a stimulus package meant to speed the country's economic recovery. The package builds upon many of the measures in the CARES Act from March 2020 and in the Consolidated Appropriations Act from last December.

"The legislation gives

general guidelines on how these funds may or may not be spent, but we're still awaiting detailed directions from the U.S. Department of Treasury," said Bethlehem Town Supervisor David VanLuven.

The monies come as part of \$350 billion set aside within the law to help state, local and tribal governments bridge budget shortfalls and mitigate the fiscal shock. The New York State Association of Counties estimates the state lost \$15.5 billion from lost business and sales taxes.

"New Yorkers made huge sacrifices to flatten the COVID-19 curve, and our economy suffered dearly for it," said Albany County Executive Dan McCoy last August. "Now we need help from the federal government to stay in the fight against the pandemic, provide local services and assist local families through the worst of this recession."

In addition to extending expanded unemployment benefits with a \$300 weekly supplement through Labor Day, and paying individual taxpayers \$1,400 each, there were several more beneficiaries targeted through the legislation.

Locally, the American Rescue Plan Act has been viewed as a means to help bail out small businesses, many of whom shuttered doors or witnessed profound losses through a pandemic approaching its 14th month of mitigation protocols.

The law is to provide \$28.6 billion under the Restaurant Revitalization Fund. The grant program exclusive to restaurants and bars is meant to meet payroll and other expenses. Individual businesses will be eligible for \$5 million each. Another \$15 billion is allocated to Emergency Injury Disaster Loans, a long-term, low-interest loan program of the Small Business Administration, focused on small businesses with fewer than 10 workers.

Other provisions include \$7 billion to expand eligibility criteria to non-profit organizations previously excluded under the Paycheck Protection Program and \$1.25 billion to fund music halls and other concert venues.

"In addition to these funds, I understand there's legislation moving on the federal level that promises additional resources to support local businesses and to jump start the economy with desperately needed infrastructure dollars for water, sewer and transportation projects," VanLuven said.

Marynczak spins no-no

Bethlehem grad, Siena reliever turns first collegiate start into historic gem for school

LOUNDONVILLE — Arlo Marynczak pumped his fist in the air after striking out the last Saint Peter's batter, capping off a seven-inning no-hit victory for Siena College on Saturday, April 24.

Marynczak led the Saints to a 14-1 win over the Peacocks at Connor's Park at the Siena College campus. The pitching gem was the junior's first collegiate start after 28 appearances as a relief pitcher. It was just the third no-hitter in the program's history.

The 2018 Bethlehem Central grad struck out 10 Saint Peter's batters in an abbreviated seven-inning game. It was the first game of a double-header at Siena College. Collegiate rules for the season dictate the first game go only seven, instead of the regulation nine, innings. The lone run was unearned.

Siena would proceed the win the second game behind another commanding performance by Brooks Knapek who struck out 14 while allowing just two hits in a nine-inning, 7-0 win.

The 6-foot 8-inch righthander was an Under Armour All-American at Bethlehem Central. As a senior, he earned both Section II and Suburban Council First Team All Star honors. In that same year, he posted a 4-1 record, with a 0.78 ERA. He also notched 53 strikeouts in 40 innings.

Complete Streets petition circulating

DELMAR — When presented the question as to when the last time residents presented a petition against a referendum on petition, town attorney Jim Potter didn't have an answer.

It doesn't come up, he said. He couldn't even tell board members during its last meeting on Wednesday, April 14 the time limit or how many signatures would be needed.

Well, now we know.

A petition challenging the town board to present its \$5.2 millon bond issuance to a vote fund the Delaware Avenue Complete Streets and Road Diet is circulating in several businesses across the roadway. An advertisement referencing the petition is on Page 3 of this edition of *The Spotlight*.

According to Section 91 of Bethlehem Town Code, residents have 30 days from April 14 to file a petition with the town clerk and force the issue to a vote.

The petition requires 5 per centum of the total vote cast in town for governor in 2018. Based on records from the Albany County Board of Elections, 17,309 residents had cast a vote in the 2018 gubernatorial race. The petition would require approximately 866 signatures.

After deliberating for ten hours, a jury found Chauvin guilty of unintentional seconddegree murder, third-degree murder and second-degree manslaughter on Tuesday, April 20. The accumulation of each maximum sentence has the former law enforcement officer facing 75 years in prison. He's to be sentenced on Wednesday, June 16.

Floyd died while lying facedown on the ground, handcuffed, and held in place with Chauvin's knees to his neck and back. The act was captured on video as bystanders pleaded for the officer to get off of the 46-year-old suspected of passing a counterfeit \$20 bill at a corner store

Chauvin, White, continued to press down as Floyd, Black, struggled for a total of 9 minutes and 29 seconds. According to examiners, Floyd died of low oxygen levels that caused a brain injury and arrhythmia, causing his

Moratorium amendment?

Bethlehem Town Board eyes amending law to help 72-unit affordable housing plan to continue on

DELMAR — Two weeks after denying one developer's request to waive its moratorium the Bethlehem Town Board is considering an amendment to allow another plan to continue through the review process.

NRP Group's site plan and subdivision application was under the planning board's review when the town passed its 12-month moratorium last December, halting the developer's plans for a full year. With the planning board unable to continue its review of the developer stands to lose tax

credit financing, which can't "housing cost burdened." be extended beyond this December.

NRP Group plans to build 72 affordable housing units at 939 Route 9W, south of Jericho Drive In and across the street from Elmwood Cemetery in Selkirk. The project is to provide housing for households earning incomes in the range of \$20,000 to \$56,000. Rents will range from \$500 to \$1,400 per month for apartments that vary between one and three bedrooms. The need for affordable housing was identified in a report the town commissioned in 2019.

In the report, the Capital District Regional Planning Commission stated how the average county resident would find it difficult to purchase or rent property in Bethlehem. It also stated that nearly half (47.9 percent) of renters are

The term means that more than 30 percent of a household's income goes to rent.

Of the applications held up by the town's moratorium, only NRP Group's addresses affordable housing. With the developer under threat of losing tax credits and jeopardizing the plan altogether, the town is considering the exception.

'Given the time sensitive nature of the awarded affordable housing tax credits and the need to address affordable housing in the town, staff recommends an amendment to the moratorium," wrote Director of Planning Robert Leslie to the town board.

This Wednesday, the town board will deliberate over the probable amendment before pushing it to the planning board for review. Should that happen, it will set into motion a series of steps that includes a public hearing Wednesday, May 12 and the town board's ultimate decision on Wednesday, May 26.

The board's discussion over a possible amendment falls two weeks after it denied Michaels Group Homes' request to waive the law that is restricting a residential development it first submitted to the town in 2017. The developer, who has a long history of building residential developments in Bethlehem, including Colonial Acres, Chadwick Square, Brookhill, Walden Fields, Newell Place and Bender Farms, is trying to build 87 lots on 57 acres of land owned by Carol Northrup off Selkirk's Elm Avenue.

t's that time of year again when the Tri-Village Little League fields at Magee Park in Glenmont come to life with hundreds of children learning the great American pastime. This year the McAvoy clan is diving into Little League, and we've picked up a few pointers to share with other newbies.

Meanwhile more

seasoned parents around me were better prepared with folding chairs and an ample supply of food and toys to entertain restless siblings. Now that I know I have to pack like I'm going on the Oregon Trail I'll be better prepared next time.

What to expect: Weather and hunger pains aside, the game was riveting. Picture it; bottom of the first. 7 outs. The batter, my son, has 23 strikes. This is going to be the pitch to hit! The pitch comes in - DONK goes the bat and the ball rolls lazily towards the mound. Pete, stunned that he got a hit, stares for a second and then snaps to. He starts running towards first.

Meanwhile all the kids in the field on the opposing team spring to life, because something has finally happened. They're running without any rhyme or reason like those little players in 'electronic football' from the 1970s. (That's the game, in case you're too young to remember, where you'd carefully set up your tiny plastic players on a long metal field. One player would get the foam football wedged in his arm crook, and then you'd turn on the vibrating board - which would result in all the players scattering in different directions, like some kind of science experiment about how molecules behave. We'd spend ten minutes setting it up perfectly and then after two plays realize it was an enormous waste of time and zero fun. This, I tell my kids, is what was childhood was like before video games.)

I break my reverie and look over at the blanket. Three of the girls have collapsed with fatigue and hunger. It's been over FORTY MINTUES

since they've had a snack. They are saying their last goodbyes. Meanwhile the other parents, camped out along the outfield, are either corralling their own children in a kind of toddler rodeo or bundling up to survive the cold front that has just moved through. But Peter is on base! He beams with pride as his cheering fans (the two left unfrozen) offer a tepid huzzah.

After two innings the game ends, and both sides are thrilled – nobody more than the spectators. We collect our things and thank the coaches. They truly are saints, the way they teach and encourage with a bottomless supply of patience. Just seeing how they have helped mold my son into a sports player, after only a few practices, has been worth it. He takes such pride in his uniform, packing the red shirt away carefully in his drawer and

I tell him not to worry, everybody starts off learning baseball like this. We settle in to practice. He's still missing far more than he's hitting, but he's getting closer to getting it right. Pete puts the bat on his shoulder and hunches down, coiled and ready for my next throw. He squints, and suddenly the look in his eye is not a freckly seven year old practicing with his dad, but the steely focus of a pro ball player at the plate in Yankee Stadium. He nods to me. This is going to be the pitch to hit.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR Talk to the press, Cuomo

As New Yorkers, we've endured a long and arduous year. Luckily as COVID-19 restrictions loosen, our positivity rate declines and we progress closer to herd immunity, there's finally light on the horizon. That is, unless you're Gov.

Andrew Cuomo. For most of the pandemic, Americans drew hope and inspiration from

our governor and looked to him for a calm and levelheaded approach to a crisis that was quickly upending traditional life. Now, over 13 months since the first case of COVID-19 was reported in New York state, our once "fearless" leader has essentially vanished from public view and abandoned the historic Capitol red room, the site of his former highly-viewed daily COVID-19 briefings.

Plagued with allegations and investigations ranging from sexual harassment to his administration's handling of nursing homes during the early onset of the pandemic, Cuomo understands his days of basking in the spotlight are over and has declined to hold an in-person press conference since December. Ironically, he sites COVID-19 safety precautions as reason for his flagrant shift to Zoom and telephone conference calls. Yet he was happy to indulge the press last year when New York's COVID-19 deaths and cases peaked.

These days, reporters are seldom given the opportunity to question the governor. When they are permitted to join one of Cuomo's conference calls, a select few are selected to speak and the governor's aides usually cut off or monitor any follow-up questions. With passage of the state

budget, the governor's influence will likely become less and less visible. He will continue evading the press and avoiding the numerous scandals afflicting him. However, New Yorkers are still struggling and deserve the same level of visibility and accountability we saw a year ago.

The future is blurry for Cuomo, but if he truly has nothing to hide he should reestablish an open dialogue with the media and the residents of New York. I haven't read it, but I

doubt avoiding the press is a component touted in his leadership novel, "American Crisis: Leadership Lessons from the COVID-19 Pandemic." Freedom of the press is

a fundamental element of our democracy that ensures an open and transparent government, and we can't make an exception now.

Uncle Sam in the sky with diamonds

Saturday to feature socially distanced Trojan Horse Ceremony & Drone Light Show

TROY — On Saturday May 1, downtown Troy will offer socially-distanced and responsible outdoor spectacles.

"As we continue to move forward with vaccinations we also need to revitalize Troy's economy and make sure we reopen safely," said Sue Dunckel, who is organizing the day through her Sweet Sue's Copper Pot, LLC. "The question of 'public health or the economy' has always been a false choice—the answer must always be both."

Several of Gov. Andrew M. Cuomo's COVID-19 related executive orders are set to expire on April 25 and rules on social gatherings are expected to continue to relax throughout May.

Regardless, Dunckel said anyone enjoying themselves in Troy on May 1 is expected to be safe, be mindful of others and follow whatever social distancing policies are in place at the time. All bars and restaurants will follow all SLA guidelines in place at the time.

The Trojan Horse

At 11 a.m. Saturday May 1, there will be a kick off ceremony at River Street Market at 433 River Street during which a modern "Trojan Horse" will be unveiled. The horse, handcrafted by Danny Killion of Weathered Wood, will be fitted with a hollow belly ready to receive special handwritten missives about people, events and feelings from 2020.

"In the original myth, the Greeks sent a wooden horse to the Trojans as a duplicitous gift full of enemy soldiers," said Dunckel. "In our Trojan ceremony, we are filling our horse with messages that we will let go of and send to the sky."

The horse will remain on display at River Street Market until noon when it will travel south along the



newly completed seawall promenade to Riverfront Park, adjacent to the Troy Waterfront Farmers Market. When the market ends at 2 p.m., the horse will move up to and along River Street, Monument Square and Broadway, where stores will have sidewalk sales and specials. Bars will be open, with ample outdoor seating, and will each serve a signature "Enjoy Troy Cocktail."

Drone Light Show

After dark (approx. 8 p.m.), Great Lakes Drone Co. will perform a choreographed drone light show with more than 25 drones over the Hudson River. The drones will launch from the former site of Troy City Hall at 1 Monument Square, and can be safely viewed from the newly completed promenade along the downtown seawall from Riverfront Park to 433 River Street.

The drone light show will last approx. 15 mins., during which the flying machines will form various shapes such as a heart, an American flag and a dancing person. For the finale, additional drones will take flight to spell the Photo provided

word "TROY," which will be visible from up up to five miles away.

The performance produces no noise, so it will not disturb any pets or those suffering from PTSD. There will be a synchronous radio broadcast on local internet station RadioRadioX that viewers can tune into as they watch the drones. The broadcast will contain music and special messages from Troy figures. To listen live, download the app at

"Discover Albany is thrilled to be able to honor the work that Dominick has done throughout this last year to support our community through Feed Albany," said Jill Delaney, president and CEO of Discover Albany, in a press release. "While there is no way to truly demonstrate just how greatly our board and partners appreciate his service, The Toby award is a genuine token that we hope he finds meaningful."

The Toby is named after the late Professor Strianese, an instructor and chair of SUNY Schenectady's School of Hotel, Culinary Arts, and Tourism and coauthor of several hospitality textbooks. The award gives special recognition to travel business as an integral part of this region's economy. While there are many regional awards, The Toby is devoted solely to highlighting those who represent the peak of planning, execution, and professionalism within the travel industry. This

award will continue to honor travel and hospitality entities for their leaders who display the core ideals of the industry and the role they play in our regional economy.

"As someone who long admired Toby's life and career I'm honored to win an award based on his legacy," Purnomo said in a press release. "Thank you for recognizing the tireless hard work of the hundreds of volunteers who have selflessly given and continue to give their service to Feed Albany over the last year. I'm humbled to accept this honor on behalf of our board and founding members, our staff and everyone in the community who has gotten us to the point we are today. Our hope is that Feed Albany will inspire others to serve our community and to spread love and hospitality."

Feed Albany is a project that was born at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. Purnomo formed Feed Albany last March. The father of three learned many lower-income families rely on school-subsidized meals to feed their children. He said he couldn't let kids go hungry once schools closed. Dominick Purnomo

Purnomo, who learned that many Capital District families rely on schoolsubsidized meals to feed their children, put out a tweet on March 14, 2020 asking his network if there was anything they could do to help feed some of the area's children.

"As a father of three, the thought of a child not having food because they're not at school broke my heart," Purnomo said. "Many of these students' only meals are those they get at school, and I knew I wanted to help fill the void once schools shut down."

Purnomo connected farmers and distributors and started working with some school districts. As the days wore on, he noticed many families were going without because parents were being either

furloughed or laid off and many workers, including those in restaurants and hospitality, were forced into the cold.

By March 23, Purnomo had gathered a network of people from all over the area and started a GoFundMe. The group includes Jason and Kay Pierce, Matthew Peter, Christine Tate, Joe Bonilla, Francesca Pardi, Dennis Pitaniello, Christine O'Neil and Tiffany Orner, amongst the dozens of team members from downtown's various businesses. With the money, the group, now named Feed Albany, made 1,000 meals on the first day.

'We wanted this to be a no questions asked kind of scenario," Purnomo said. "We arranged it so anyone who needs food can stop by and grab it. We didn't need the reason why they needed it, we just wanted to help."

Feed Albany quickly grew to more than food; Beekman 1802 donated personal care items. Nine Pin Cider donated beverages. DeCrescente Distributors donated goods. Cookie Therapy was sending cookies by the hundreds.

One day last year, Feed Albany had as many as 23

drivers on the road and delivered 4,000 meals. Drivers were also dropping off groceries to families.

"We wanted these meals to have some dignity," Purnomo said. "We wanted these people to feel special. The personal care items, the desserts, the groceries; it contributed to this effort to bring some happiness to those who were really struggling."

McGeary's owner Tess Collins was one of the many in Purnomo's ranks. The beloved "Mayor of Albany," as her regulars lovingly coin her, was working off the grid. She was coordinating things like paper towels and toilet paper and working to trade with other restaurants when stores went down. When Purnomo had extra meals, she would reach out to her contacts in the area and hit some of the lowerincome areas with meals in hand.

"I remember one day it was raining and I had loaded up my convertible and was driving around delivering meals," Collins said. "Dominick would make sure I had some extra ones and I would deliver meals to those who were homebound or had other

Feed Albany aims to provide people food with dignity; the group utilizes grocery drop offs, donations from local places like Cookie Therapy and Nine Pin Cider, and social media to let people when they can pick up a meal., no questions asked. circumstances preventing them from getting to the distribution point."

Collins said Feed Albany provided her and her network with an outlet to see one another despite restrictions. As team members would load up their cars, they would

be able to talk and check in with one another. The circumstances brought downtown closer and allowed the team to get the heartbeat of the city in perspective. She was also receiving help from Albany Mayor Kathy Sheehan, the Downtown Albany BID

and Capitalize Albany, who helped her and her neighbors navigate some of the rules involving patio dining and the restrictions that were being handed down by the state.

"Especially after this, I don't want to be anywhere else but in my neighborhood," Collins said. "The bonds we've built with our customers are second to none. The people who have moved in and become regulars to McGeary's are


Get out

Institute to serve slice of Americana

NYSWI to host Albany Film Festival through May 3

CAPITAL DISTRICT — At the crux of it, films are stories with moving pictures instead of words.

The New York State Writers Institute (NYSWI), which calls the University at Albany, SUNY, campus home, understands this. While the organization is known for its elite programming of top-notch writers and storytellers, it understands that the stories behind a camera are just as impactful as those written with a ballpoint pen.

The New York State Writers Institute will host the inaugural Albany Film Festival throughout the Capital District from April 24 to May 3. While

the festival is currently live, there are many events upcoming that film lovers will not want to miss; the Malta Drive-In will host a free movie night, with juried shorts, tomorrow, April 29. The festival will also host projection mapping, a first for the Albany area, from Friday to Monday, at the Science Library on UAlbany's uptown campus. Panels will also continue through the weekend, bringing some of the country's best talents to

the Capital District. "We believe stories connect us as humans and communities," Paul Grondahl, director of NYSWI, said. "These stories begin as scripts, as visions, much like the written word. The experience of a moving picture in the dark, like a movie theater provides, is something that has been lost in the past year with COVID-19 shuttering movie theaters."

Grondahl said the event, with it being mixed between digital and live options, allows for the collective shared experience film provides while still adhering to COVID-19 guidelines such as mask wearing and social distancing.

"The drive-in is such a slice of Americana and it's amazing we have four working drive-in theaters in our area," Grondahl said, "since there are only about 200 in the entire country. Sometimes that retro feel and going back to basics is a great way to bring the community together."

NYSWI floats on the donations of its community. A majority of its programming is free — an astonishing feat when you realize the organization pays for the travel of each person it hosts for an event. While it hasn't hosted live events in a year — last year's planned Film Festival was ditched two weeks before its start due to the virus — NYSWI's marketing and communications director, Michael Huber, said the pandemic has actually helped the organization continue its mission.

"We've been able to reach people we normally wouldn't because everyone is now home," Huber said. "While travel used to be something we had to navigate around for many people due to scheduling, we can now use technology to facilitate these conversations."

Grondahl agreed with Huber. He said his team has recorded dozens of conversations with writers and filmmakers so events can keep streaming out.

"The nice thing about this has been how we can access so many more people," Huber said. "Parents who might want to see an event but have so many moving parts, including children, work obligations, other demands, weren't as easily able to make events because they had to keep so many plates spinning. Now, they can tune in while on the couch with some ice cream after the kids go to bed. Or they can watch while working around the house. It gives people options and allows us to reach even more people."

Huber said since the beginning of the pandemic, every single metric the organization gauges its engagement by has skyrocketed. As NYSWI pivots back to live events — Grondahl is aiming for the fall, pending COVID-19 numbers continuing to decline — it hopes to continue the momentum and give its audience the full experience again.

"We did our best with the situation that was presented to us," Grondahl concluded, "but the core of our work is the interaction between our guests and our community. So much of that has been erased and we are looking forward to bringing it back."

Getting a scholastic leg up

Brown School teams up with SUNY Schenectady

SCHENECTADY — All AP students know the frustration of devoting hours to a class expected to give you a leg up in college, only to find out the credits you literally poured blood, sweat and tears into isn't going to transfer.

The college journey can be tough. Not only are freshmen thrown into a vortex of experiences they weren't privy to in high school, but the process is intense. How do you graduate in the four years that's expected? How do these credits equal a degree? Why didn't anyone mention if I took this elective, it would push graduation off by three lousy credits?

Brown School and SUNY Schenectady are trying to mitigate some of college's most infamous gripes. The K-12 independent institution, known for its hands-on approach to education and its ability to gear

its curriculum to each student, is teaming up with Schenectady's most famous community college to offer classes to its students. These classes, which will contribute to a student's associate's degree, are guaranteed to transfer to either SUNY Schenectady's matriculations or other higher institutions.

The goal? Make college as affordable as possible

for every student and allow some to walk across the stage with both a high school diploma and associate's degree in their hands.

"The reason why this works so well is because we have the support structure to make sure these students are able to get the college experience while still being at Brown School," Steady Moono, president of SUNY Schenectady, said. "Allowing students access to credits from SUNY Schenectady gives them a chance to explore specialized programs in a format that is at minimal or nominal cost to them."

Moono said his staff prides itself in its 360-degree support system, which allows students, including those at Brown School, access to resources that will improve both their academic careers and lifestyles. Because college can be a stressful time, his staff takes pride in offering students a safe haven to work through life problems in the same capacity as they would a complicated math problem.

Two of Brown School's students, juniors Owen Morley and Kabir Pabla, are excited at the prospects coming from the partnership between the schools.

"Compared to last year, I am able to focus more on my own studies and the things I want to learn more about," Morley said. "In this program, I've focused more about how I can learn and grow as a student and become more independent." Pabla agreed, calling his

experience delightful. "It's been a really nice ice breaker into what college

will be like for me," he said. "It gives me a chance to explore engineering and see if that's potentially where I can end up or if I want to try a different career path."

Teresa Burke, head of upper school at Brown, said the program is in line with Brown's philosophy on learning. She said both Morley and Pabla have grown significantly as students since joining the program, and because it is open to any Brown student who wants to participate, it gives her students another option.

"All of the possibilities this partnership offers is groundbreaking for independent schools like ours," Burke said. "It gives us something to hang our hats on and another service we can offer our students as we continue their academic journey."

Burke added she's excited to see students continue making schedules and eventually being able to spend most of their days on SUNY Schenectady's campus.

"Our students have really hit the ground running with this," Burke concluded, "and there have been bumps along the way, but this is a safe place for those bumps because we're here to help them shoulder some of it."

Switch up summer cocktails with a fizzy find

As the seasons change, it's time to freshen up food and beverage offerings so they align more closely with seasonal vibes. Light, fresh and fizzy cocktails seem tailor-made for warm evenings. Some cocktails get their effervescence from sparkling wines. as bellini or mimosa devotees can attest.

This summer also may be a great time to try a Frisco 49, which is not to be mistaken with a similarly named drink, The Frisco. The Frisco 49 was created by mixologist Brandon Chandlor and it was inspired by fruit cocktail dessert cups and a French 75 cocktail. The drink has a few hands-on steps, but the result can show off your mixology skills.

Frisco 49

- For Pear-Infused Gin:
- 1 Bartlett pear
- 1 D'Anjou pear
- 1 750 ml bottle gin, like Citadelle

Cut the pears into slices and place in a mason jar.

Add gin to cover the pears.

Allow to steep for one to three days (according to taste) in a cool, dark place. Strain out the pears and bottle the gin

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For Roasted Honey Peach Syrup:

- 2 peaches
- 2 to 3 tablespoons ground cinnamon
- 3/4 cup honey
- 3/4 cup warm water

Preheat oven to 400 F. Cut the peaches in half and sprinkle with cinnamon. Roast in the oven for 20 minutes.

Add the roasted fruit, honey and water to a food processor or blender and blend well.

Strain well to remove any solids, bottle and store in the refrigerator. The syrup will keep well for about two weeks.

For the cocktail:

- 11/2 ounces pear-infused gin
- 1⁄2 ounce lemon juice
 - 1/2 ounce roasted honey peach syrup
- 3 ounces sparkling wine
- Maraschino cherry garnish

Combine the gin, lemon juice and syrup in a cocktail shaker with ice cubes.

Shake and strain into a Champagne flute.

Top with sparkling wine and garnish with a maraschino cherry in the bottom of the glass.



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
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

A Rising Tide of people returns to music

C.K. & the Rising Tide, Julia Alsarraf light up Lark Hall

ALBANY - When I collapsed into bed at 10:30 p.m. after watching C.K. and the Rising Tide's Saturday set at Lark Hall, I shed a few tears.

Live music is back. For the first time in 13 months, the light at the end of the tunnel seems to be getting brighter.

The four-piece Americana rock band, comprised of Curtis Flach, Matthew Copperwheat, Chris Brant and Rob Piccola, made a splash at Lark Hall with rocking tunes and a ton of fancy lights, which made photographer Ann Kielbasa's job extra fun. Although the line-up has



changed a bit since the band's last live appearances - Copperwheat is back after a brief hiatus and keyboardist/violinist Danny Boudreau departed in 2020 — the local musicians didn't miss a beat from the very first song.

I've always been a massive fan of C.K. and the Rising Tide. Its first release, American Romance, was an extremely strong release for a new band and its second

release, "Perfect Stranger," turned up the heat and solidified the band's presence in the local music scene.

Saturday's set was opened by Julia Alsarraf, whose smooth crooning and moody songs were a fantastic complement to the harder rock that was to come. Her single "Mixed Feelings" demonstrated the nuances of human emotion. with Alsarraf's two band

mates effortlessly providing a canvas for her to paint on. Alsarraf is no stranger to C.K. shows; she opened Perfect Stranger's release show at Lost and Found Albany in 2019. She was a solid performer then, but time has only done her well, as her vibe and gorgeous voice is becoming more and more authentically her.

As the night wore on, there were plenty of mentions of the past

year's happenings. Many members of the audience hadn't been to a live show since 2019, evidenced by an applause Alsarraf courted and questions Copperwheat asked. While the band was able to unmask, members of the audience were asked by Lark Hall to stay masked for the duration of the show. This didn't stop the warm welcomes friends gave to one another and the lingering sense of hope as each song flowed effortlessly into one another.

C.K. started with "Drive," a softer, sensual love song that was quickly offset by "Trigger Happy," a rocking beat that is one of my favorites from the band. Although Perfect Stranger is still the new baby, it didn't hesitate to break out some tunes from American Romance and even some songs that have yet to be released. The four-piece has teased an album could

be coming soon, although details have yet to be announced.

Also, in typical Flach fashion, the banter with the audience was light and spontaneous. Compliments about a "sick motorcycle" and jokes with Lark Hall staff peppered Flach's chatter with his band mates. Brant, forever a hat connoisseur, earned an applause for his black and white choice, while Copperwheat's brown cap received a lukewarm recognition — something Flach teased him about.

As live music continues its inklings back into 518 culture, it's clear what's coming is going to showcase the improvements local bands have made during the quarantine. The evolution of Flach's voice, and the confidence his band mates and Alsarraf have showed while on stage, showed promise for the new era of local music.

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
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
