Not through here

Truckers passing through Slingerlands find the former train bridge over New Scotland a difficult obstacle

POLICE, FIRE and EMERGENCY CALLS Sleepy driver hits home

GLENMONT — Several people were displaced after a car crashed into their home and collapsed the front balcony from the second floor on Saturday

evening, May 15. According to Bethlehem Police Cmdr. James Rexford, the car was traveling west on Corning Hill Road before the motorist allegedly fell asleep behind the wheel and left the roadway before 7:45 p.m. The car then crashed into the two-story home at 105 Corning Hill dislodging the front support beams on the home, causing its secondfloor balcony to fall to the ground.

No one was hurt from the accident, however, police said both families were displaced as a result



from the crash. The Red Cross reportedly helped both families to find temporary housing.

Firefighters from the Selkirk Fire Department removed a propane tank from the gas grill that was on the balcony before the car was towed off the property. National Grid also responded to cut the power as repairs were done on the powerline damaged from the crash.



Corning Hill Road was closed while crews operated at the incident and was reopened a few hours later.

The unnamed driver was issued a traffic ticket for moving from a lane unsafely.

The iron bridge, which now serves the Albany County Helderberg-Hudson Rail Trail and its approximate 19,000 pedestrians and bicyclists, has a clearance equivalent to the height of a regulation basketball hoop. At 11 feet, 2 inches off the ground, it can be a hazard to transport vehicles.

A wayward motorist wedged his tractor-trailer under the bridge late Thursday night for the first of two nearly identical accidents last week.

Rolando Carcases Ortiz, 57, was heading toward I-90 when he said he found his way into Slingerlands. Ortiz approached the bridge and scraped off the top off of his 13 foot, 6-inch trailer.

Ortiz told officers he did not see signs indicating the bridge's height.

The truck was cleared from the bridge around 3 a.m. Friday, and upon inspection, the truck was allegedly found to be in violation of federal "I can tell you we are called to that location frequently to assist tractor trailers with turning around,"

regulations that governs commercial vehicle operation.

Less than 48 hours later, it was nearly the same story as another truck driver learned his truck was too tall.

Bethlehem Police returned to the scene at approximately 7:20 p.m. on Saturday, May 22 when a Penske-owned truck struck the bridge.

The rental truck, operated by Wesley Reid, 52, of Clifton Park, was traveling east on New Scotland Road before he was suddenly stopped by the underpass. The impact with the bridge ripped a large portion of the box truck from its chassis. The roadway was closed for several hours while crews removed the truck and debris from the scene. Albany County Public Works, too, returned to assess the integrity of the bridge before reopening it to the public.

The Slingerlands Fire Department, whose firehouse is just two doors down from the bridge, responded to the scene in both cases.

"I can tell you we are called to that location frequently to assist tractor trailers with turning around," said Bethlehem Police Cmdr. James Rexford. "The roadway is marked properly yet there are still a lot of trucks that end up there."

Rexford speculated that drivers may be misguided by GPS equipment. Professional truck drivers, however, are often equipped with software that indicates routes with clearance hazards and weight limitations — as was allegedly the case in the first incident. Bethlehem police cited the driver of that incident for violations that included failing to obey a traffic control device.

Talk of the town

Residents speculate online whether or not there is more than one bear

DELMAR — One black bear trekking through Olde Delmar brought police to the neighborhood last Thursday morning, May 20.

Bethlehem and state Environmental Conservation Police spotted the bear and were able to keep the bear moving through the neighborhood without incident last week, but more residents have since reported more evidence of bear visits — if not seeing a bear in the flesh.

Witnesses throughout the heart of town reported seeing a bear. On social media, residents shared spotting the large mammal on Royal Boulevard, Forsten and Hasgate drive, and Mosher and Paxwood roads.

"Human-bear conflicts occur when bears are looking for food," Bethlehem Police Cmdr. James Rexford shared in a statement. "During the spring months bears are more active and are searching for food sources."

Residents have also reported trash tossed from dumpsters in Delmar and spotting one on the county rail trail in Elsmere. Yet another report claims a bear was spotted across the Albany City Line in the townhouse neighborhood of New Scotland Woods.

"We were away for about 36 hours and came home to find our new composter overturned in our fenced yard," Delmar resident Alison Calvagno shared on social media. "It had been anchored

to the ground so it's not easily blown over."

Bear sightings are relatively common in less developed areas of town. South Bethlehem and Selkirk residents often share seeing bears in backyards. However, it is not so uncommon to spot a bear within the clusters of homes within Delmar. In 2018, a resident reported that her family's bird-feeding station was destroyed after a bear visited her backyard neighboring Hamagrael Elementary School.

The town website has warned residents to avoid bear encounters, including tips on how to prevent encouraging bears from visiting their homes. Experts recommend removing bird feeders, to not feed household pets outside, removing grease from grills, and storing garbage cans indoors.

Wildlife experts say black bears emerge out of hibernation once winter temperatures thaw around mid-March. At that time, they will wander from their dens in search of food. A bear's sense of smell allows it to pick up a scent from a mile away.

According to the state DEC, bears are opportunistic feeders and will remember where they can find easy food. Once they find a source, they will return to that location. Intentional feeding of bears is illegal, and repeated access to human foods — without negative consequence — can condition bears to lose their fear of humans. Such bears can become bold and lead to humanbear conflicts.

If you should see a bear in your neighborhood, the Town asks you contact the Bethlehem Police

Highway Dept to present \$1.2M shopping list

DELMAR — Bethlehem Town Board members will vote on whether or not to allow its highway department to purchase a list of vehicles and equipment — in an amount not to exceed \$1.2 million — when it meets tonight, Wednesday, May 26.

The request from Highway Superintendent Marc Dorsey is explained in his memorandum to board members documented within the meeting's online agenda packet. The money is to be drawn from the Highway Fund Capital Reserve Fund, but must first be adopted through a resolution, and is subject to a permissive referendum.

The proposed purchases would be added to the highway department's fleet of vehicles. All but one of the items are to be bought through either the Onondaga County purchasing

Budgets pass across the region

Bethlehem Central surprised by voter turnout despite pandemic

All four public schools within our readership received passing grades from district voters who approved their respective budgets for next year on Tuesday, May 18.

Bethlehem Central

The Bethlehem Central School District received support across the board as voters approved both its \$102 million budget and three bus fleet propositions last night.

Approximately 82 percent of the 2,555 district voters approved the 2021-22 school budget. Support for each of the three bus fleet propositions was nearly as outright, allowing the district to go ahead with purchasing at least five electric buses next year. In doing so, Bethlehem Central will be among the first districts in the state with electric buses.

"We are so appreciative of this community not only for approving our budget and bus propositions but for its unwavering support of our schools especially this year and last," said Superintendent Jody Monroe. "We have been living in uncertain times but never once doubted this community's commitment to education or to the safety and well-being of our students and staff."

Voters approved the bus purchase proposition by a 1920 to 641 margin. The electric bus infrastructure proposition was passed by nearly the same margin (1,939 to 621). The third

on your paper when you purchase a product of the week Y proposition, which will outfit the district's fleet with GPS/Telematic hardware, was approved 1,948 to 604.

> The purchase of the electric buses in 2021-22 is contingent on grant funding from the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority. The district has announced its intention to transition its bus fleet to zeroemission electric buses and is currently awaiting a funding decision from NYSERDA.

> Voters also elected two candidates to serve on the Board of Education. Katherine Nadeau received 2,056 votes and Willow Baer received 1,990, each earning a seat on the Board for three years beginning July 1.

It will be the second term for Baer, a current member of the Board of Education. Nadeau will be new to the seven-member Board this year.

Monroe said turnout for the annual budget vote was greater than expected given the effects of the pandemic.

"It was wonderful to be able to welcome our community members back to BC," said Monroe. "We look forward to being able to do more of that when health and safety guidelines for schools allow it."

Ravena Coeymans Selkirk

Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk Central School District's \$48.6 million budget was approved for next year. Residents voted 497 to 118 – or 81 percent - in favor of it.

The budget proposal was below the district's assigned tax cap and required a simple majority of voters to pass the budget.

The \$48,637,301 budget for the 2021-22 school year calls for a decrease in total spending of 0.08 percent, or \$40,361, over the current school year.

Voters also approved a bus purchase proposition by a vote of 476 in favor and 144 opposed, as well as a proposition to increase the maximum amount of the capital reserve fund for construction costs by a vote of 457 in favor and 156 opposed.

Three incumbents were reelected to the Board of Education: Kristin Hill-Burns with 523 votes, Howard Engel III with 527 votes, and Edward Reville with 504 votes.

Guilderland

There was relatively less support for Guilderland Central's \$104.9 million budget, as 68 percent of residents approved the plan.

The budget, which carries a 1.89 percent increase in spending over the current year's budget, was approved by a 1748 to 829 margin. The budget will also increase the tax levy by 1.28 percent.

Residents also approved the purchase of eight 66-passenger buses and a district delivery vehicle, by a vote of 1794 (yes) and 782 (no). They also elected Seema Rivera (1707 votes), Blanca Gonzalez-Parker (1481) and Nathan Sabourin (1400) to the Board of Education.

Voorheesville

Voorheesville Central residents overwhelmingly passed the district's \$26.9 million budget.

Of the 492 voters, more than 75 percent approved next year's spending plan by a margin of 370 to 122.

Included on the ballot was a purchase plan for three buses, to which voters approved 382 to 111, and a proposition to increase the Capital Project Reserve, which passed 373 to 113.

No payment over phone

National Grid warns customers of scams

ALBANY - National Grid customers and local law enforcement are reporting utility billing and payment scams across upstate New York. National Grid is asking its customers to beware and know the signs of a scam.

Imposters claiming to be National Grid employees may tell customers that they have past due balances on their utility bills, even promising a savings on their next bill. Customers who reported the scams, say they were contacted by telephone and email, and in some cases automated recordings.

The scammers threaten that service will be shut off immediately unless the customer purchases a prepaid debit card in a specific amount, such as a Green Dot card, and

provides the caller with the card's account number, or in the case of business customers, by way of a Western Union money transfer. These calls are not officially from National Grid and instead are used by scammers to obtain account information.

National Grid but the goal of the scammer remains the same: scare customers into making hasty decisions that often include large payments.

National Grid does contact customers with past due balances by phone to offer payment options, but never demands direct The scenario can change, payment through the use of

a prepaid debit card and never accepts payment through these cards.

Scammers have become increasingly sophisticated in replicating National Grid's recorded messaging and directions for phone prompts, even spoofing the phone number on caller ID making it more difficult to differentiate an actual National Grid call from an imposter's call. Similar scams have been reported across the U.S. by other utilities.

Customers who believe they have fallen victim to the scam should contact National Grid and local law enforcement officials immediately.

DEC: Yield to turtles

State DEC urges 'Give Turtles a Brake'

ALBANY — The State Department of Environmental Conservation Commissioner Basil Seggos recently reminded New Yorkers that turtles are on the move in the months of May and June, and asked drivers to "give turtles a brake."

In New York, thousands of turtles are killed each year when struck by vehicles while migrating to nesting areas. Increasing public awareness of turtles' nesting behavior can help save this important species.

"A turtle's shell provides good protection from natural predators, but it cannot protect a turtle from being hit by a vehicle while crossing a road," Seggos said. "Vehicle strikes are a major cause of turtle mortality and New York's native turtles are more

active this time of year as they seek sandy areas or loose soil to lay their eggs, sometimes even near the side of a road."

If a motorist sees a turtle on the road, drivers are encouraged to slow down to avoid hitting it with their vehicle. If the vehicle can safely stop, motorists should consider moving the turtle to the shoulder on the side of the road in the direction it was facing.

Motorists are advised not to pick turtles up by their tails to avoid injuring the turtle. Most turtles, other than snapping turtles, can be picked up by the sides of their shell. Snapping turtles have necks that can reach a long distance and have a strong bite, so if motorists try to help a snapping turtle, they should pick it up by the rear of the shell near the tail using both hands or slide a car mat under the turtle to drag it safely across the

road.

DEC reminds people to never take turtles home. All native turtles are protected by law and cannot be kept without a DEC permit.

All 11 species of land turtles native to New York are in decline. Turtles are long-lived species and it takes many years for a turtle to reach maturity. Even losing one mature female can have a negative impact on a local population. Learn more about New York's native turtles at DEC's website.

Four species of sea turtles can be found in New York waters, and these turtles are all either threatened or endangered. Visit DEC's website to learn more about sea turtles.

Turtles are everywhere in New York, which is why the state Department of Environmental Conservation asks you watch out.

WWII vet was a 'humble warrior'



ime, the relentless foe no one can escape.

Thomas J. Smith was born and raised in Schenectady's Goose Hill neighborhood. An excellent student and a standout athlete, he was 17 when Pearl Harbor was attacked.

Between Dec. 7, 1941 and Nov. 28, 1942, Tom burned the candle from both ends, playing football at Vincentian High School and working the midnight shift at American Locomotive, helping build tanks for the American war effort. After almost being rejected due to a vision problem, and then a slight heart murmur, Tom enlisted in the Marine Corps.

Upon graduation from boot camp, Tom learned that he had been selected to

4th Division became the first Marine Corps unit Raider battalions ultimately to go directly into combat from training. For Tom, this was "Operation Flintlock," Marshall Islands, Roi-Namur in the Kwajalein Atoll.

In June of 1944, Tom saw combat on Saipan, followed by Tinian in July. Tom had trained as

a rifleman and machine gunner, but was utilized more as a runner/scout. Because of his specialized Raider training, he was chosen to lead squads of 2-3 other Marines, usually at night, deep into enemy held territory.

February of 1945 brought Tom to Japan's doorstep — Iwo Jima. The which occurred over the course of one year, 19 days, resulted in nearly 18,000 casualties for the 4th Division alone. Tom was wounded four times and was the recipient of three Purple Hearts.

In 2017, Tom published his memoirs, titled Marine #419322. More information about Tom can be found on a Facebook page by the same name.

Tom carried the horrors of war, and the memories of brutal life or death hand to hand combat, with him for the rest of his life, but he never let those nightmares define him as a man. After the war he went to college, eventually earning a doctorate in education.

He married his high school sweetheart Connie in 1946. They settled in Miami, where Tom became a teacher, principal, and finally a school



district superintendent.

After retirement, Tom and Connie relocated to Tom's hometown of Schenectady, NY. Their marriage lasted 67 years, until Connie's death in 2013. In 2010, Tom had a chance meeting with a fellow Iwo Jima survivor, Sal Famularo, in the Glenville Walmart. They had gone ashore, their companies "F" and "G" side by side in the first waves at Saipan, Tinian and Iwo Jima 65 years earlier. The two Marines became and remained best friends, and would attend church together every Sunday. They regularly met at the Glenville McDonald's and the Glenville Queen Diner, where they were always welcome. Tom and Sal were the force behind the Iwo Jima Survivors group that regularly met at the Home Front Cafe in Altamont. The last time the whole group of area survivors met was for the 75th anniversary of the Battle of Iwo Jima on February 19, 2020, just before the pandemic hit. On November 10, 2020, he attended the 245th Marine Corps Birthday Bash at Glenville's Flightline Pub with fellow Iwo Jima survivors Ambrose "Cowboy" Anderson of Gloversville, and Nils Mocker of Westchester.

In 2013, Tom's neighbor, Sue Clark, convinced him to allow her to escort him on an Honor Flight to Washington, D.C. and

Arlington. Thus began a new chapter in Tom's life, and in the lives of all of us who would come to know and love him. For me, the moment I met Tom was captured in a photo by my friend Jim Diegel. Tom was in line at the Albany Airport TSA checkpoint when he spotted my granddaughters Sydney and Kaitlyn, who were 4 and 6 at the time. They were standing with me in a PGR flag line, holding signs with messages to the WWII vets. Tom stepped out of line and came over to us, bending over to talk to the girls. He thanked them for being there, and asked if they had "a hug for an old man". This simple gesture earned Tom a place in our hearts forever.

Tom passed away on May 13 after falling ill on April 16. To say he will be missed is a gross understatement. He will be laid to rest alongside his beloved Connie next week. He has been a fixture in so many of our lives and the void we are all left with is massive. We will never forget this loving, humble warrior, and the myriad ways in which he enriched our lives.

Rest in Peace, Tom.

GLENMONT — James Corbett, a longtime member of the Bethlehem Police Department and face of the law enforcement agency to generations of local school children, died on Monday, May 17, at the age of 68.

Bethlehem Police Chief Gina Cocchiara noted his time with the agency's Youth Bureau. The Youth Bureau would later develop into the department's Community Services Unit, on which Cocchiara served before ultimately becoming chief last year.

"Detective Supervisor Corbett will be remembered for the numerous outreach programs he conducted, spending much of his time educating and building relationships with the youth of the community," Cocchiara shared in a statement. "Our condolences to the Corbett family and he will be missed by all who knew him."

He retired from the department in 2000 after 23 years of service.

He was born in Albany, the son of Alice Smith Corbett and the late John Corbett. After retiring from the police department, he went on to work in the Attorney General's office, the Office of Medicaid Inspector General, and Albany Medical Center Hospital. Although he enjoyed ice racing, working in his garage, brewing beer, smoking meats and driving his tractor, his greatest joys revolved around his wife, children, grandchildren, other family members and friends.

He was the beloved husband and best friend of Eileen M. Burke Corbett; dear father of Elizabeth M. Tompkins and James J. Corbett II (Maura); cherished grandfather of Bentley Carusone and Maureen Tompkins; son-in-law of the late Chief Thomas H. Burke and Elizabeth Burke; and brother of Richard Corbett (Debbie), Michael Corbett, Jean Zaccagnino (Jack) and the late William Corbett (Lynn) and John Corbett.

He is also survived by his loving granddog Tipperary, and many nieces, nephews, grandnieces and grandnephews.

Relatives and friends were invited to visit with Jim's family at the McVeigh Funeral Home in Albany. Funeral services were in the Historic Church of St. Mary on Capital Hill in Albany, where his funeral mass was also celebrated. Not the kind of lost where your car is missing and the trees all look alike, but the kind of lost where your mind escapes your surroundings and you find peace in a place beyond your own being.

Diane Kavanaugh-Black and Carole Fults know this. The walking partners, who have been tackling trails and woods together for close to a decade, have a goal to walk 500 miles together. In 2020, they hit the 420 mark. While their soles hit the dirt, words flow from them like water

from a stream, creating miracles beyond the woods' vibration.

Kavanaugh-Black and Fults are the authors of "A Walking Friendship: The First 500 Miles," which will be released on June 11. Right now, "A Walking Friendship" is in pre-order, with the ability to snag a copy of the under-100 paged masterpiece on Book Baby, Barnes and Noble or Amazon. The book centers around walking in Partridge Run, a wildlife preserve in Berne. While it's not the only place the outdoor enthusiasts traverse, it became the canvas of one of their most impressive journeys.

The book isn't your typical novel. Unlike many works, "A Walking Friendship" is heavy on the photography — which is fitting, since both women are fans of the lens. Photos grace over half of the book's pages depicting various discoveries on their journeys: bear scat, frozen leaves, frogs, trail heads, treacherous hills. Each photo corresponds with a short essay or poem in the book. None of the works are longer than four pages, giving the reader plenty of freedom to pick up and read at their leisure.

"For me, the process of writing is the process of listening," Fults said. "Diane and I met in a writing group and we're always putting pen to paper. When I walk, the words come. Putting these pages into a book just felt like the natural progression of both our walks and who we are as writers."

Kavanaugh-Black agreed; she's always listening for what nature is telling her. Both women firmly believe to observe the woods is to inherently be observed, something many forget when they brazenly walk into some of nature's

most untouched locations. Life in all forms is present in all places, even if human beings aren't settled.

"These walks help me process what is going on in my life and the various things around me," Kavanaugh-Black said. "I often really can't grasp how I'm feeling about something until I put it on paper. Writing is my way of making sense of the minutiae of the world."

Kavanaugh-Black and Fults are close friends. Both said they were committed to their friendship beyond the publication of the book, an agreement they made before they started getting into the business of publishing "A Walking Friendship."They first started gathering materials about three years ago; Kavanaugh-Black said Fults, in her confident fashion, is the reason the pair finally pulled the stops and decided to release now. Fults' ability to get stuff done, without sweating the small stuff, is something Kavanaugh-Black, a selfadmitted anxious person, said she admires about her good friend.

"Watching Carole in the woods is amazing to me because she has this wisdom and calmness to her," Kavanaugh-Black said. "When we get turned around, she's the one who assures us we are still intrinsically safe. Writing some of these stories and sitting back, I was able to laugh at the differences of how Carole and I handle things and how wound up I can be."

An example of their differences is in the root of a worn-in trail. Fults like to walk off the beaten path — literally — because magic lies just beyond the boundaries of human touch. Kavanaugh-Black is more rigid; she likes the paths. They're safe, they're marked and there's a reason for them.

The compromise? One time, the women stepped off the path toward an unnamed pond. It was one of the many times Fults pushed her friend to color outside of the lines.

"I think what makes us work so well as friends and as walking partners is because we are so different," Fults said. "Diane is amazing with small details and precision. I cannot stand any of that. She's the mapkeeper and the one that deals with absolutes."

As veteran trail travelers, so much better."

both women acknowledge the beauty of Partridge Run while cautioning the advanced nature of its paths. Partridge Run isn't quite like The Crossings in Colonie; it's much larger and you're a lot less likely to run into other people on its 600-plus acre grounds. The bugs are unforgiving during the summer months, which keeps the two away from the preserve during the hottest times of the year. It's also an avid hunting spot; when walking the trails during the season, it is imperative bright clothes are worn, trails are strictly adhered to and guests make plenty of noise as they travel through. Fults and Kavanaugh-Black acknowledge they've had quite a few close calls at Partridge Run with animals and anything else they can think of.

"It's imperative in any place you walk, you take the time to notice and be receptive to what is happening around you," Kavanaugh-Black concluded. "Not just what humans are doing, but what are the other forms of life doing? Having someone with you to experience those observations makes it so much better."

Rensselaer algorithm can identify risk of cardiovascular disease using lung cancer scan

TROY - Heart disease and cancer are the leading causes of death in the United States, and it's increasingly understood that they share common risk factors, including tobacco use, diet, blood pressure, and obesity. Thus, a diagnostic tool that could screen for cardiovascular disease while a patient is already being screened for cancer has the potential to expedite a diagnosis, accelerate treatment, and improve patient outcomes.

In research published last week in "Nature Communications," a team of engineers from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and clinicians from Massachusetts General Hospital developed a deep learning algorithm that can help assess a patient's risk of cardiovascular disease

with the same low-dose computerized tomography scan used to screen for lung cancer. This approach paves the way for more efficient, more cost-effective, and lower radiation diagnoses, without requiring patients to undergo a second CT scan.

"In this paper, we demonstrate very good performance of a deep learning algorithm in identifying patients with cardiovascular diseases and predicting their mortality risks, which shows promise in converting lung cancer screening low-dose CT into a dual screening tool," said Pingkun Yan, an assistant professor of biomedical engineering and member of the Center for Biotechnology and Interdisciplinary Studies at Rensselaer.

Numerous hurdles had to be overcome in order to make this dual screening possible. Lowdose CT images tend to have lower image quality and higher noise, making the features within an image harder to see. Using a large dataset from the National Lung Screening Trial (NLST), Yan and his team used data from more than 30,000 low-dose CT images to develop, train, and validate a deep learning algorithm capable of filtering out unwanted artifacts and noise, and extracting features needed for diagnosis. Researchers validated the algorithm using an additional 2,085 NLST images.

The Rensselaer team also partnered with Massachusetts General Hospital, where researchers were able to test this deep learning approach against state-of-the-art scans and the expertise of the hospital's radiologists. The Rensselaer-developed algorithm, Yan said, not only proved to be highly effective in analyzing the risk of cardiovascular disease in high-risk patients using low-dose CT scans, but it also proved to be equally effective as radiologists in analyzing those images. In addition, the algorithm closely mimicked the performance

of dedicated cardiac CT scans when it was tested on an independent dataset collected from 335 patients at Massachusetts General Hospital.

"This innovative research is a prime example of the ways in which bioimaging and artificial intelligence can be combined to improve and deliver patient care with greater precision and safety," said Deepak Vashishth, the director of CBIS.

Yan was joined in this work by Ge Wang, an endowed chair professor of biomedical engineering at Rensselaer and fellow member of CBIS. The Rensselaer team was joined by Dr. Mannudeep K. Kalra, an attending radiologist at Massachusetts General Hospital and professor of radiology with Harvard Medical School. This research was funded by the National Institutes of Health National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute.

COLONIE — Squat racks at the gym are tempting.

"Athletes tend to have really great core stability already because it's how the body is able to pivot quickly," Lukacs said, "so what we want to do with those who aren't athletes is work on moving those muscles so whatever they do in life, they are less likely to end up getting hurt."

Lukacs said functional fitness is a goal that Best Fitness assigns its clients both short and long term. For those who are tackling larger scale goals, the gym's staff works to create smaller, micro-goals so the client stays on track. As functional fitness increases, it becomes easier for people to execute the basics, allowing them to scale up their workouts. Lukacs said one of the biggest benefits of functional fitness is increasing the relationship between the cardiovascular and respiratory systems, as one cannot work without the other.

It was the first time he had ever spent Christmas without his family. The 518 native had just moved to Oregon two months earlier; he had spent the previous two-and-a-half years anchoring Wyoming's popular morning show, "Good Morning Wyoming." In that time, Floyd, 25, was given free reign to promote the community he loved, create skits to make people laugh and bring forth news that people actually wanted.

Floyd describes himself as one of the most positive people you'd ever meet and said his time as a morning news anchor enlightened him to his purpose. While reporting on repetitive, dark stories is essential, Floyd said his expertise lies in the promotion of the communities and people he loves most.

Oregon was different. No longer the head honcho, the 2018 Marist College graduate had been your stereotypical morning news anchor for 60 days. The stories are dark and repetitive; COVID-19, heightening tensions, shutdowns. There was no room for Floyd, one of the most positive people on the planet, to showcase his talent. It was all gray.

As he wallowed in the deepest loneliness he ever felt, it hit him.

Could he get his station to do something similar to "Good Morning Wyoming," where he'd have his own platform? He'd interview other news personalities and get some humanity from the people who are taught to be as noncontroversial as possible.

"I made a demo where I interviewed Amy Lanski, who became my first subject for my podcast now," Floyd said. "I brought it in and my bosses didn't even listen to it. They shot me down. They said we couldn't be promoting other news people who weren't working for us. Something about a conflict of interest? They just completely denied it."

Floyd didn't know it yet, but his days were numbered at the station, by his own choice. Because his bosses wouldn't take a chance on him, he quickly quit his job, packed up everything he owned and trekked back to the Capital District. He now lives with his parents and is working different jobs to fund "Who's On The News," his podcast that gives him the ability to interview the connections he's garnered while on the morning news desk for three years across two different states.

"When people watch the news, many don't know the first thing about the people who are reading that teleprompter or those who are out there doing the reporting," Floyd said. "These people also have stories. I want to highlight that."

Each episode of "Who's On The News" is centered around a theme. One might talk about life as a meteorologist, who Floyd said are some of the most fascinating people to watch live. Another might center around the art of the teleprompter. He invites people whose stories not only lend to the theme, but have life stories that will make people think twice about the person you see each night being the vehicle for your evening newscast.

What makes "Who's On The News" so special is Floyd himself. The "hot, spunky, energetic soul," as he calls himself, is a natural at relating with people. He's unabashed and unafraid to be

totally himself with a laser focus on what he wants. Talkative, intelligent, magnetic, present: he's a human fireball wrapped in blonde hair and perfect teeth. Talking to Floyd is like talking to an old friend, even if you just met him three seconds ago. He's not interested in finding love right now or doing anything he's not 100-percent invested in; if it doesn't intellectually and emotionally stimulate him, it's a waste of time. It's all about the show and the dream of one day hosting his own show, bringing back the success and happiness he had with "Good Morning Wyoming."

Floyd works with local producer Danny Ball, who is also one of the minds behind Brian Rhatigan's "The Back 9 Show." Floyd and Ball met in school and were once sports rivals; they were eventually forced to talk and quickly figured out they were "pretty much the same guy." The two now meet weekly to talk about ideas for each show of "Who's On The News." Floyd said while he does the stuff in front of the camera, there would be no show without Ball.

"I called Danny on Christmas when I had that original idea for my station and he loved it," Floyd said. "Danny and I do completely different things, but we do it together. Everything we do works together. He does the editing and graphics on his own laptop. He's as important to this project as I am. I would not be anywhere close to this if it weren't for Danny."

While leaving "Good Morning Wyoming" was difficult for Floyd, he acknowledges he wouldn't be doing his show today if the contract didn't end. He fully admits going through that dark time in Oregon, where he experienced loneliness in a form he never thought possible, was what made him jump in the deep end and go after his dreams.

"Sure, being the morning news anchor might constitute success to more people," Floyd said. "I'd be getting paid better, I'd be considered successful by society's standards. Everyone knew me in Wyoming. But I wasn't happy.

"I quickly learned no one really cares that much what you're doing," Floyd continued. "I knew I had to make myself happy. I was smart enough to know I wasn't going to live like this. I knew almost immediately Oregon wasn't what I wanted. But the fact that the job wasn't benefitting me in the way that my employment was benefiting them was what ultimately pushed me to take the shot."

"Who's On The News" is up to 10 episodes. He had to re-record Lanski's episode for the new platform, but he said the released version was by far the stronger of the two. He and Ball have tackled interviews with Drew Dees, Olivia Young, Julia Yarbough, Elizabeth VanMetre and Scot Pilie, amongst others. While many of Floyd's subjects are news figures from out of the state, he's insistent the common thread is clear: whether his guests are your morning traffic sources, your evening lullabies or your lunchtime companion, they're way more colorful than the news they're delivering.

"I've never considered myself a journalist because I wasn't in the trenches like many of my coworkers were," Floyd concluded. "But I have ideas, I have confidence and at the end of the day, anything I do, I don't want anyone to say anyone else had any hand in it succeeding but me."

"Who's On The News" is produced by Danny Ball, the talent who is also behind Brian Rhatigan's "The Back 9 Show." Floyd and Ball could not be more different in skill sets — Floyd and Ball agree they hated one another in high school before realizing they were literally the same person — but they use their individual expertise to create a solid podcast authentic to Floyd's personality.

Added stress not bringing you to doc

New research reveals disconnect between increased stress and lower behavioral health diagnoses rates in New York

NEW YORK — While people in America have shared that the pandemic and other stressors like social injustice, elections, and the economy negatively impacted their mental health in 2020, there wasn't a corresponding increase in people seeking mental health treatment, according to the inaugural State of the Nation's Mental Health report, commissioned by Anthem, Inc., parent company to Empire BlueCross BlueShield and Empire BlueCross affiliated health plans.

In New York, children and older adults appeared to have the largest overall decrease in mental health diagnoses in 2020 compared to 2019. Younger adults and adolescents also had a decrease in mental health diagnoses for the full year of 2020. However, diagnoses and treatment for anxiety and PTSD for adults were among the few mental health diagnoses that grew in 2020.

"While normally a decline in mental health diagnoses would signal something positive, we know that given the current circumstances, the need is there," said Dr. Craig Hersh, Chief Medical Officer, Empire. "We're concerned that there are many people who may benefit from mental health services, especially children and older adults, who either aren't being identified or aren't reaching out to get the help they might need."

These findings, part of a new State of the Nation's Mental Health report based on Empire affiliated health plan claims from 1.9 million New Yorkers, show the pandemic disconnect between feeling stressed and depressed and being diagnosed and seeking treatment.

Recent studies have shown that many more adults reported symptoms of anxiety or depression. Further, 42 percent of people under 30 years old were experiencing anxiety and depression symptoms, according to a CDC survey from August 2020 through February 2021.

"This is a call out for all of us. We are working to help others get the COVID-19 vaccine to protect themselves from the



virus, and at the same time, we must help people find the mental health services they need as they cope with the pandemic, which is equally important to their overall health. This is critical as we work toward our mission to materially and measurably improve the health of all New Yorkers," said Hersh.

The results of the study are supported by other

Anthem national data from IngenioRx, its pharmacy benefits manager. While the overall utilization for medications to treat

depression was up in 2020, much of that increase can be attributed to existing users being more adherent to their dosing regimens, according to IngenioRx medication adherence data. New users of these medications increased at the same rate as 2019.

The State of the Nation's Mental Health report showed the following drops in 2020 rates for those treated for mental health diagnoses compared to those treated in 2019 in New York:

• 11 percent overall drop for young children

• 5 percent overall drop for adolescents

10 percent overall drop for adults older than 75
14 percent drop for

young children diagnosed with ADHD

• 5 percent drop for adolescents diagnosed with ADHD • 17 percent drop in adults older than 75 diagnosed with dementia, and a

• 6 percent drop for Baby Boomers and 10 percent drop for adults older than 75 diagnosed for depression.

"While we don't know for sure why children and older adults had fewer diagnoses, we speculate that they weren't interacting as often with people in our communities who have increasingly become the starting point for mental health diagnoses," said Hersh. "Children learning virtually had less face time with teachers, who often recommend testing for mental health or attention concerns, and older adults may not have been able or were more reluctant to see their primary care provider in 2020, which may play a role in the decrease

in dementia diagnoses, and perhaps, decreased diagnoses for depression."

Nearly three out of four mental health specialists and primary care doctors estimated in an Anthem commissioned national survey that mental health repercussions from the virus will last up to three years or longer and almost twothirds believe their patients' mental health declined in the second half of the pandemic (September 2020-February 2021) compared to the first half (March-August 2020).

"When people face more stress, it's logical to expect trends for mental health diagnoses to increase. However, for many, such as children who may be learning virtually and isolated seniors — that hasn't been the case," said Hersh. "This subsequent 'mental health' pandemic could have impacts for years to come, reinforcing the need for mental health and physical health to be addressed equally and simultaneously."

On a positive note, nine out of 10 healthcare professionals surveyed said that COVID-19 has made them more aware of the mental health conditions their patients are experiencing. Seventy percent of healthcare professionals said their patients have been more willing to proactively bring up mental health concerns during appointments.

A majority of healthcare professionals said that patients who were already seeking therapy or in a support group prior to the start of the pandemic have more successfully coped with their mental health concerns. And, many noted they are seeing an increased emphasis in patient selfcare and better work/life flexibility.

"People in general and young people in particular should not be reluctant to seek mental health help when they need it," said Paul Gionfriddo, President and CEO of Mental Health America, the nation's largest mental health advocacy organization. "We know from the millions of helpseeking people who have reached out to us this past year that more people than ever are in need of help, and we want them to know that it is a show of strength, not weakness, to seek that help as early as possible, and the first step on the pathway to recovery."

Information about how to recognize the signs and symptoms of mental health conditions is available at the State of the Nation's Mental Health report web site and the Mental Health America web site.

Survey, claims methodology

The State of the Nation's Mental Health report is based on claims data from 27 million members in Anthem affiliated individual, employersponsored, Medicare and Medicaid health plans in all states. Prevalence of behavioral health diagnoses each year (2019 and 2020) was determined by the number of individuals with at least one claim containing a behavioral health diagnosis during the calendar year divided by the number of members enrolled in the plans.

The Anthem online survey was conducted among a national sample consisting of 552 healthcare professionals, broken out into 285 behavioral health specialists and 267 primary care physicians/general practitioners living in the United States, with an oversample of 100 rural healthcare professionals. INSTRUCTIONS:

To make the sauce: In a food processor, purée the mayonnaise, chili sauce, ketchup, olive oil, garlic, onion, Worcestershire, lemon juice, mustard, black pepper, hot sauce, and paprika. (Or use a medium bowl and whisk to combine all the ingredients.) Season with salt, if needed, cover tightly, and let the sauce sit overnight in the refrigerator before serving.

To make the okra: Place several layers of paper towels atop a paper bag or platter. Keep it close to where you'll be frying. In an electric fryer, Dutch oven, or heavy cast-iron skillet, add canola oil to a depth of 2 to 4 inches. Heat to 350 F. (If you're not using an electric fryer, use a fry/candy thermometer to ensure the temperature stays consistent.)

In a medium bowl, soak the sliced okra in the buttermilk and set aside. In a large paper bag or large plastic zip-top bag, combine the flour, cornstarch, 1/2 teaspoon salt, black pepper, garlic powder, and cayenne (if using).

Drain the buttermilk-soaked okra and dredge it in the flour mixture. Carefully shake off any excess flour. Fry in batches of seven or eight pieces for 2 to 3 minutes or until crispy and light golden brown, turning them carefully midway through. Use a fry basket or slotted spoon to remove the okra to drain on the paper towels. While still hot, season the okra with additional salt, if desired.

Serve the okra fries immediately with the sauce.

Joint Preservation Surgery: **Sometimes LESS is MORE**

ver 54 million people in the United States have arthritis, with symptoms ranging from mild aches to debilitating pain.

More often, patients and their doctors are turning to joint replacement to help treat severe symptoms of arthritis. Over 1 million joint replacement surgeries are performed annually in the US, and the patient population looking to them for relief is getting younger. Research suggests that joint replacement implants last an average of 20 years, with a likelihood of earlier wear for younger and more active patients. This leaves many patients wondering if traditional joint replacement is right for them.

Joint preservation

procedures including partial replacements and resurfacing techniques can provide pain relief, while allowing an active lifestyle. These techniques minimize bone loss through minimally invasive techniques, and preserve options if other procedures are needed down the line. With over 35 years of clinical data, partial knee replacements



have proven to be an excellent option for the right candidates. What has changed is who we believe may be a candidate for a partial knee replacement. Through continual research and advancement in technology, we now consider up to 48% of patients to be eligible

for such procedures. Partial knee replacement patients are 2.7 times more likely to be satisfied with the ability to perform activities of daily living than total knee replacement patients. 98% of partial knee replacement patients return to work, and up to 97% were able to return to sports. Partial knee replacement also has a significantly lower post-operative complication

> rate than total knee replacement. Similar advantages exist for

resurfacing techniques in the shoulder. In order to restore the smooth surface of the shoulder, traditional shoulder replacement removes the ball, inserts a stem into the shaft of the humerus, and attaches a new ball. This approximates the size and position of the native ball, but



typically doesn't recreate it perfectly. On the cup side, a piece of plastic is attached onto the

surface of the glenoid, changing the position of the joint line. Resurfacing techniques of shoulder replacement aim to solve these problems. On the humeral side, the ball is not removed, but reshaped and "capped"

with a smooth metal surface. On the cup side, the plastic component is placed within the glenoid. minimizing the risk of loosening.

These modern techniques are less invasive with lower risk, allowing surgery to be performed as an outpatient, avoiding costly hospital stays and

exposure to hospitalacquired infections. These procedures often cause less pain and can reduce the need for opioid medications. Whereas traditional techniques place significant restrictions on a patient's post-operative activity level, resurfacing

You have seen your children (and grandchildren) grow up there and recall memories of watching sunsets over the water, roasting marshmallows over a campfire, and teaching the kids how to swim. It may be difficult to think that this home will be sold out of the family when you die and would like to

preserve it for enjoyment of generations to come.

• How can you best insure this property will be there for future generations to enjoy (and at times cohabitate), as your family tree grows or in future after your passing?

• Who will be responsible for paying the Insurance? Taxes? Repairs? Maintenance? Fees?

• Who decides which family members or friends use it and when?

• What impact would future divorces or bankruptcies have on the property?

• How can you protect the property from a Medicaid spend down?

While all of your children probably would like to inherit the property and enjoyed the vacation home growing up, some may no longer live in the area or use it



on a regular basis. Other relatives may also like to use the property when it is not in use. If you leave

the vacation property as part of your estate and divide it among the children, the risk is that some or the majority of siblings may want to sell it. Some of your



children may not want to pay to maintain an asset they rarely use. Those that do want to keep it may not be able to afford to buy the others out. I t can also create sibling squabbles when it comes to its use, cost of repairs or allowing non-family members use

the property. To alleviate your concerns, there are a number of Estate Planning options you should consider for the transfer and management of a vacation property.

Transferring a Vacation Home to the Next Generation

You can always transfer the property to one of more children during your lifetime, or leave it as a bequest upon your death. However, this "direct" or outright gifting strategy comes with many risks and potential tax implications. Since no one can predict the future, your family's vacation home may become a part of future divorce proceedings, bankruptcy, lawsuit or probate. Without proper planning, a vacation home may need to be sold to pay for long-term care costs. The asset may now also be counted for purposes of college financial aid. Worse vet, due to second marriages or death, the house may be inadvertently inherited by in-laws and not stay in the family. The situation may become more complicated

if the property is or foreign country.

There may be a better legal solution that might work for your family. Several options include:

• Co-ownership. located in a different state Ownership among family members could include being tenants in common or joint tenants with rights of survivorship. Risks above may still apply,

especially if siblings do not get along. • A Trust. You, the grantor, set up a trust and appoint a trustee to carry out your wishes. Your children (and possibly grandchildren) play a fairly passive role while you are alive. Decisions about the property come



Questions to Consider

Here are just some of the questions that families should answer when deciding on a structure for transferring a vacation home to future generations:

- 1. Do family members get along and want to keep the vacation property in the family? If no one is interested in keeping the property, it could simply be sold after your death.
- How should siblings pay for regular maintenance and expenses of the 2. property? Should there be a property manager or will each person pitch in to help with routine and emergency repairs, cleaning, yard work, winter storage, etc.? How are real estate taxes, insurance and utilities paid for? What about remodeling or improving the home or other structures on the property?
- How will disputes be handled among family members? Sometimes 3. conflicts arise on the use of the property or if someone doesn't contribute their share as agreed upon. Arbitration may help resolve some conflicts.
- How will time at the vacation home be scheduled? Often, summer months 4. or school vacations can be particular popular times for its use. Will families stay together (space permitting) or will each sibling get a certain number of weeks? Is scheduling time first-come, first-served, rotational or do families "draw straws" for popular times? Will other family members or friends be allowed to use unused times?
- Can the home be rented to non-family members to help pay for the 5. expenses? Are there tax, insurance, or liability implications in doing so?
- What if one sibling wants to sell or cannot afford to pay his or her share of 6. the expenses? Can the others buy him or her out? Can one family member force the sale of the home? Keep in mind that family dynamics can change and life circumstances happen (job loss, divorce, death, disability, bankruptcy or even fights among relatives).
- What will happen in the case of a death of one of the family members? 7. How will his or her share of the property be transferred? The share of the property could be transferred to the surviving spouse, grandchildren or split among the remaining siblings.
- 8. Will the property arrangement (trust, LLC, joint ownership, etc.) provide any asset protection in case of financial problems or government benefits (such as disability or Medicaid)?
- Can the trust, LLC, joint ownership agreement be easily modified or 9. terminated?
- 10. If the property is sold, how will the contents of the home, watercraft and other equipment be divided? Often, there are sentimental items that have been in the family for years that may need to be addressed. Will the sale trigger any federal and state estate tax or capital gains tax implications?

If your dream is to keep your cherished vacation home in the family for years to come make sure you have created a plan.

from you. The trust would have to be funded with enough assets to pay expenses. With the property held in trust, it may be sheltered from future divorces, an unforeseen bankruptcy, a child who needs public benefits, becomes disabled or in case of their unfortunate death, while simultaneously keeping strategic tax benefits. After your death, the property could continue to be managed within the trust.

• A Limited Liability Company (LLC). The LLC can own the home

and would be managed by its members (the beneficiaries – ie. your children) or an independent property manager. The rights and responsibilities of the members are spelled out in the LLC operating agreement. An LLC can contain specific provisions on the use of the property, sharing of costs, and the transfer, inheritance or selling of member interests. An LLC helps centralize the management function for the property.

Any structure for a

vacation property should account for the possibility that eventually, the family may no longer want to own the property, it has become cost prohibitive, or receive an offer that they can't refuse. Whether it be a modest cabin in the Adirondacks, a beach house along the Jersey shore, a condo in Florida, or a ski chalet in the Swiss Alps, a plan needs to be in place.

Pivots and Pirouettes

providing services for older adults after the Pandemic

s a new normal is discussed once our prepandemic lives are allowed to slowly open, Colonie Senior Service Centers (CSSC) has moved beyond the recovery conversation and is focusing our energies on a transformational discussion.

During the darkest days of the pandemic, we stepped up when the community needed us. We re-engineered ourselves. Our growth strategy of 2020 was the pandemic pivot. We thought outside the box, listened to people's needs and held on to a "can-do, we got this" attitude. CSSC fundamentally changed.

Beginning in mid-March 2020, CSSC staff and volunteers worked seven days a week often 10 or 12hour shifts making sure older adults in the community were well fed and remembered. We delivered over 37,000 hot home delivered meals throughout Albany County called "Grab and Go's" in a five month period, did hundreds of grocery and pharmacy runs for any senior who asked,



made tens-of-thousands of reassurance calls to shut-ins and delivered hot meals to quarantined homeless individuals throughout the area. Once the vaccines became available, we helped over 1,200 older adults get vaccinated. We drove individuals wherever we needed to, Gloversville, Wynantskill, UAlbany, the Times Union Center as well as holding four community clinics ourselves at The Beltrone Living Center. We stayed connected by partnering with many including fellow nonprofits, community organizations, government agencies, educational institutions and for-profit corporations.

Here is the latest:

A take-out congregate lunch has been available to seniors Monday

through Friday continually throughout the pandemic. Starting May 17, the Beltrone Living Center opened for in-person sociallydistanced dining. Reservations and registrations are required.

Since last September, The Center at CSSC began to offer dozens

of programs, everything from virtual tours of art museums and botanical gardens to book club offerings and cooking demonstrations. We zoomed musical concerts and yoga sessions. We taught knitting and rubber stamping over the computer. Now our

creative and educational "V programs are going hybrid. by Participants in can choose co whether they will participate in person or virtually and the list of fo opportunities is impressive. Trying to

reconnect with the community? May we suggest volunteering for one of the eighty plus fellow non-profits CSSC works with through the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP)? Volunteerism is a form of social capital, promoting inclusion while enhancing community connections. Often as we wallow in our own universe, pitying ourselves for our faults and insecurities, there are others right around us who are in much greater need. Find out where you can be of help.

We aspired to hear what older adults throughout our community hoped to do once the world opened up. We believe that in dark times there is usually a silver lining and in our business that silver lining can be new opportunities.

We are looking forward to a stable summer where we don't have to pivot and pirouette as much, but at least now we know we can do it.

Keeping your mind sharp

Simple ways to maintain memory as you age

dults confront various age-related side effects as they transition from middle age to their golden years. Skin may begin to wrinkle and hair may turn gray, but those are just the visible side effects of aging. Many additional effects are unseen, but those changes can have a profound effect on adults' quality of life.

According to the Mayo Clinic, various parts of the body are affected by aging. For example, the

cardiovascular system changes as people grow older. Blood vessels and arteries stiffen as adults age, forcing the heart to work harder to pump blood through them.

Though many changes are linked to aging, other changes commonly associated with aging, such as a decline in memory, reasoning and other thinking skills, are not natural. The Alzheimer's Association (notes that dementia is not a normal part of aging. There are many different types of dementia, including Alzheimer's disease, and these are the result of damage to brain cells that affect a person's ability to communicate. That damage is not



inevitable, even if it's commonly associated with aging.

The Harvard Medical School notes that fleeting memory problems experienced with aging often reflect normal changes in the structure and function of the brain. But it's important that those changes not be mistaken for dementia, and it's equally important that adults recognize there are many ways they can protect and sharpen their minds as they age.

• Continue learning. HMS notes that a higher level of education is associated with improved mental functioning in old age. The reasons for that are unknown, but experts theorize that advanced

education compels people to remain mentally active, which in turn helps them

maintain a strong memory. Even aging men and women who are still working in challenging fields can benefit from pursuing a new hobby or learning a new skill.

• Use the tools at your disposal. It may seem counterintuitive to suggest that organizational tools like planners, maps and lists can help people



maintain their memories. However, HMS notes that expending mental energy on finding car keys or trying to remember what to buy at the store makes it harder to learn new and important things.

• Let all your senses play a role. HMS reports that the more senses a person uses to learn something, the more his or her brain is involved in retaining a memory. HMS cites one study in which adults were shown a series of emotionally neutral images that were each presented along with a smell. Participants were not asked to recall what they saw, but were later shown a set of images and asked to indicate which they had previously seen. The participants had excellent recall for the odor-paired images, and researchers believe that's because additional parts of the brain were activated when participants were asked to use more than one sense.

Memory loss is not an inevitable side effect of aging, especially for adults who take steps to maintain their memories as they age.
