Students, parents let Bethlehem Central know they want a new, artificial field at high school

DELMAR — Student athletes and their parents dominated public comment on the debate as to whether or not Bethlehem Central should install its own artificial playing field.

The Bethlehem Central School District Board of Education finalized a list of projects on Wednesday, Aug. 11 under its 2021 Facilities Improvement Capital Project that will go before voters

The Board has approved \$40.7 million in infrastructure projects that it said will not create any tax increase as it will be funded through a combination of state aid and capital reserves. Board members have spent the previous six meetings starting in March developing the plan by weighing the merits of each proposed project.



Murderer sentenced to 51 mos for stealing, possessing handgun

ALBANY — Anthony A. Parker, 55, of Troy, was sentenced to 51 months in prison on Friday, Aug. 6, for unlawful possession of a firearm by a felon.

The announcement was made by Acting United States Attorney Antoinette T. Bacon; Janeen DiGuiseppi, Special Agent in Charge of the Albany Field Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and New York State Police Superintendent Kevin P. Bruen.

In pleading guilty, Parker admitted that on April 13, 2020, while employed as a driver at the Federal Express distribution center in Menands, New York, he removed a package from a conveyor belt that was addressed to a Capital Region gun store that contained a Ruger 57 5.7 x 28mm caliber semi-automatic pistol and two magazines. Parker later hid the pistol and magazines at his residence in Troy. At the time he stole and possessed the pistol and magazines, Parker had a prior conviction for second-degree murder.

Parker has been in custody since his arrest on a federal complaint on May 13, 2020.

Man pleads guilty to child pornography

ALBANY — Eric William Tompkins,

37, of Clifton Park, pled guilty to possession of child pornography on Wednesday, Aug. 11.

The announcement was made by Acting United States Attorney Antoinette T. Bacon and Janeen DiGuiseppi, Special Agent in Charge of the Albany Field Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

As part of his guilty plea before Senior United States District Judge Thomas J. McAvoy, Tompkins, a registered sex offender, admitted that on March 28, 2019, he possessed child pornography images on his cellular phone that included depictions of prepubescent children.

Tompkins faces at least 10 years and up to 20 years in prison, and a term of supervised release of at least 5 years and up to life, when he is sentenced on December 15, 2021. A defendant's sentence is imposed by a judge based on the particular statute the defendant is charged with violating, the U.S. Sentencing Guidelines, and other factors.

This case is prosecuted as part of Project Safe Childhood. Launched in May 2006 by the Department of Justice, Project Safe JChildhood is led by United States Attorney's offices and the Criminal Division's Child Exploitation and Obscenity Section. Project Safe Childhood marshals federal, state and local resources to better locate, apprehend and prosecute individuals who exploit children via the Internet, as well as to identify and rescue victims.

Bethlehem IDA votes in new leaders

Storrs named agency's newest chair since 2005

DELMAR — Victoria Storrs and Catherine Hedgeman were each elected as chair and vice chairperson of the Bethlehem Industrial Development Agency, filling a recent vacancy at the top of the agency.

Members of the IDA elected Storrs and Hedgeman to the top two positions last month. Storrs becomes the first person to serve as chairperson since Frank Venezia was elected in 2005. Venezia, who resigned earlier in the year, has been with the agency over the past 25 years.

The IDA provides financial assistance to eligible commercial and industrial projects in order to promote economic welfare and prosperity for the residents of the Town of Bethlehem. The IDA is responsible for the promotion, attraction and development of job and recreational opportunities and economically sound commerce within the Town's borders.

"I'm honored to follow Frank Venezia as Chair and [I] will always be grateful for both his leadership and his mentorship," said Storrs, who was appointed to the BIDA in 2012 and previously served as its vice chair. "He always encouraged us to engage.

Town of Bethlehem files

Port project soon to go before public

KENWOOD — The anticipated Port of Albany expansion now under the review with the Bethlehem Planning Board is on step closer to going under public scrutiny.

The Albany Port District Commission presented the Supplemental Draft Environmental Impact Statement for the proposed Marmen/Welcon Offshore Wind Tower Manufacturing Plant on Tuesday, Aug. 17.

Within the scope of the project is an 81.62-acre plot of land previously used by Niagara Mohawk to dispose of coal ash. Under the draft supplemental impact statement composed by MacFarland Johnson Engineering that coal ash is to be removed.

The proposed 562,000-square-foot facility is projected to manufacture 150 off-shore wind towers. It is also anticipated to create approximately 350 jobs locally.

A public hearing is likely to be scheduled at the Planning Board's next scheduled meeting at Tuesday, Sept 7.



District residents will be able to ask questions and discuss the plan at a community forum scheduled for Monday, Sept. 13. But that didn't stop the many of those supporting the artificial field from voicing their support on Wednesday.

The Board embarked on a spirited discussion over the proposed turf field, which was only one of eight items discussed. Nonetheless, the public comment period — exacerbated by two executive sessions pushed the meeting beyond to nearly four hours Wednesday night.

Shelly Goldman, a mother of a 10th grader, told board members how fields at Bethlehem Central caused the cancellation of lacrosse and football games last years because of poor conditions.

Academy], LaSalle, Albany Academy — schools that pour money and resources into their athletics," she said. She argued for the Board's support as scholastic athletes are "known for getting really good grades."

Field 2 is one of several fields on the high school campus, which includes two neighboring baseball fields and adjacent softball and soccer fields. The field has historical drainage issues. The proposed plan would include a stormwater facility system in addition to a new network of drainage lines underneath the playing field.

The synthetic structure of the field will resemble those used at other schools, incorporating a "crumb rubber" filled surface. According to the district's demonstration, the loose crumb rubber

would be contained with "minimal spillage." The district also cited a 2009 state Department of Environmental Conservation report that said "crumb rubber may be used as an infill without significant impact on groundwater quality.'

Board member Jonathan Fishbein remained skeptical over promises that the field would be safe for the local environment, and the school children playing upon it.

"People have said that the [Environmental Protection Agency] says that its not a problem," Fishbein said, "but this is the same E.P.A. that said the air at the World Trade Center after 9/11 was not a problem. And now we have people dying of it."

Fishbein continued to assail promises over health with references to the once popular use of Teflon on cookware. Introduced in the 50s, the chemicals used in the manufacturing process has since been linked to developmental issues with children, along with liver disease and cancer.

"Now you can't find a Teflon pan because all of us, especially Baby Boomers and [Generation X], have Teflon floating around in our body, in our blood," he said. "Along with microplastics, I might add."

Fishbein suggested that the field be a separate referendum item from the capital project. District residents voted down an artificial turf in 2013. The board member feared the district could lose all of the projects if voters rallied against the turf option again.

State Ed drafts mitigation guide

Teacher's union urges schools to work with educators, parents

ALBANY — A week after state Health Commissioner Howard Zucker punted virus mitigation responsibilities to school districts, the state Education Department released a health and safety guide to help administrators plan for the upcoming academic year.

The safety guide released on Thursday, Aug. 13 is based on what the Education Department said is the "best health and safety information currently available" and will be updated as public health conditions change.

"As we prepare for schools to reopen in September, our priority must be to provide

leaders with access to information about practices that have proven effective throughout the pandemic," said Chancellor Lester W. Young. "The Department's health and safety guide is a concise resource that will assist districts as they mitigate risks to the health and safety of students, teachers and school staff while providing flexibility for schools to address their own unique circumstances in a manner that best meets the

needs of all students."

The guide provides strategies, based on information from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the American Academy of Pediatrics. It is designed to be used in conjunction with local, state and national resources available to schools.

The Education Department said it "strongly" encourages administrators to partner with health professionals when

developing policy. Through the summer, public schools throughout the Capital District have collaborated to formulate a reopening plan amid rising infection rates and concerns over a new, Delta variant.

Last week, Albany County Executive Dan McCoy reported as many as 260 new COVID infections in one of his daily updates. Among the county's new

NY opens Alcove Reservoir to hunters

Law opens restricted land to hunt over-populated deer, protects vital carbon sink for the City of Albany

COEYMANS — A new state law rescinds restrictions that had prevented deer hunting within the boundaries of the Alcove Reservoir.

Senator Neil Breslin (D-Albany) announced the passing of the new legislation on Wednesday, Aug. 11 along with Senator Michelle Hinchev (D-Kingston), who co-sponsored the bill. The new law repeals a section of environmental conservation law that kept hunters from taking wild game at the 1,400-acre reservoir.

"This bill is critical to protect the water supply of the City of Albany," said Breslin. "Furthermore, it addresses the issues of sustainable

forest management and the overpopulation of deer."

The Alcove Reservoir in Coeymans serves as an important component of the Capital District's regional watershed system. Located 20 miles south of Albany, it provides drinking water to the city's 97,000 residents.

The site, which is owned by the City of Albany, has become a source of revenue as a carbon sink for the city. In 2019, the Albany Water Board received \$94,502

through the sale of carbon credits for its agreement to keep the approximately 6,400 acres of woods surrounding the reservoir intact. The city anticipates it will receive \$1 million over the next 10 years.

The state Department of Environmental Conservation had recommended lifting the statutory prohibition of deer and bear hunting at the Alcove Reservoir when it composed its "Management Plan for Whitetailed Deer in New York State,

2021–2030" report in May.

"Albany's strategic reservoir in Coeymans provides important access to clean water for city residents. Outdated laws preventing wildlife management at the reservoir threatened this resource's long-term sustainability," said Assemblymember Patricia Fahy (D-Albany).

New York State Environmental Conservation Law had previously prohibited deer and bear hunting on the watershed property. The DEC could not recall why the law was instituted. Over time, the restriction has developed a population problem. As hunting is permitted directly outside the reservoir, a "doughnut" effect has led to a major proliferation of the deer population on the reservoir property.

"Consequently, excessive deer numbers have over-browsed the forest, compromising the watershed protection the forest is intended to provide," the DEC stated in its 85-page report.

The effect this has on surrounding vegetation puts the revenue the City of Albany receives for using the land as a carbon sink at risk. The Albany Water Board and Albany Water Department had previously used volunteers using DEC-issued Deer Damage Permit. However, that effort was not considered to be a long-term solution.

The new law now allows for the responsible taking of game at the reservoir, enabling DEC staff to measure and control the deer population.

"This legislation speaks to the role hunters and sportsmen can play in the conservation of our environment and natural resources. It will also help assure the Alcove Reservoir is able to continue serving as a safe source of water and as a carbon sink to offset the effects of air pollution," Assemblymember Chris Tague (R-Schoharie) said. "I am relieved that this legislation was able to pass this year, as the deer population around the reservoir was becoming a serious threat to the area."

Union receives National Archives grant

SCHENECTADY — A new project will make the historic papers of the College's most versatile alumnus more accessible to the public.

The National Historical Publications and Records Commission of the National Archives has awarded Union a grant to support the digitization of its massive John Bigelow Collection.

A member of Union College's Class of 1835, Bigelow was a prominent author, lawyer, diplomat and distinguished man of letters in the 19th and early 20th centuries.

He played a major role in the creation of the New York Public Library and served as its first president. Appointed consul general to Paris by President Abraham Lincoln, Bigelow helped dissuade a number of European countries from supporting the Confederacy during the Civil War.

While in Paris, Bigelow discovered the lost manuscript of Benjamin Franklin's storied autobiography, which he edited and published in 1868. He served as New York's secretary of state, helped expose the political corruption of William "Boss" Tweed's Tammany Hall in New York City and resolved a dispute over the route of the Panama Canal.

Along with the poet William Cullen Bryant, Bigelow was an owner and editor of the New York Evening Post. An intersection in New York City (5th Avenue and 41st Street) bears his name, John Bigelow Plaza.

Bigelow was 94 when he died Dec. 11, 1911.

A two-year project, totaling \$266,510, is supported by a grant from the NHPRC of \$149,710, to allow the College to hire a full-time project archivist and student workers to digitize the popular Bigelow Collection. The College will also update and redesign the website, where the collection will be searchable

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia — SABIC announced last week the launch of its certified circular polycarbonate resin and blends made from the upcycling of post-consumer mixed plastic - a first in the industry.


This solution, based on advanced recycling, demonstrates SABIC's ongoing commitment to drive towards a circular economy for plastics, by increasing the availability of more sustainable products.

In its statement, SABIC claims the certified circular polycarbonate offers a potential carbon footprint reduction up to 23 percent in comparison to its incumbent.

Part of SABIC'S Trucircle portfolio of circular solutions, the certified circular polycarbonate is produced through the advanced recycling of post-consumer mixed plastic that could otherwise be destined for incineration or landfill. Through a process called pyrolysis, difficult-to-recycle used plastic is broken down into a liquid called pyrolysis oil. This is then used as a feedstock to create certified circular building blocks for high-performance plastics with the same properties as the virgin material – in this case, polycarbonate.

The polycarbonate is certified by an independent third party under the International Sustainability and Carbon Certification (ISCC PLUS) scheme using a standardized mass balance approach, which provides a method of asserting the recycled material content along predefined and transparent rules. In addition, the widely recognized ISCC PLUS accreditation provides traceability along SABIC's physicallinked supply chain, from the feedstock to the final product, requiring a chain of custody based on the mass balance system.

The Trucircle portfolio spans design for recyclability, mechanically recycled products, certified circular products from feedstock recycling of used plastics, certified renewables products from bio-based feedstock and closed loop initiatives to recycle plastic back into high quality applications and helps prevent valuable used plastics from becoming waste.

Consensus among healthcare professionals

ALBANY — Within the last several weeks, numerous hospitals around the U.S. and all hospitals in the Capital District have required that their staffs receive the COVID-19 vaccine.

Albany Med has joined with hospitals from the Hudson Valley to the North Country and the Mohawk Valley to ensure all health care workers—from those on the front line to volunteers, students and operations staff—are protected from the virus through vaccination

To that end, the following hospitals have released a consensus statement: Albany Med Health System, Albany Medical Center Hospital, Columbia Memorial Health, Glens Falls Hospital, Saratoga Hospital, Ellis Medicine, Nathan Littauer Hospital, St. Mary's Hospital – Amsterdam, St. Peter's Health Partners, St. Peter's Hospital, Samaritan Hospital and Sunnyview Rehabilitation Hospital.

Their position is based on proof that the vaccine is safe and highly effective at preventing COVID-19 and, in rare breakthrough cases, preventing serious illness. Experts believe the vaccine also keeps the virus from spreading. The more people get vaccinated, the stronger the protection for others who are at increased risk of contracting the virus due to underlying health conditions. The vaccine is also widely available. There are few if any barriers to access with scheduled and pop-up clinics occurring daily in many places.

Health care workers treat the most vulnerable members of our communities. Requiring a COVID-19 vaccine demonstrates a commitment to protect the safety and health all patients, visitors, coworkers, and our own families. Health care organizations are also among the largest employers in the Capital District. The health of our colleagues directly correlates to the health of the entire community.

In a news release, Albany Med President and CEO Dennis P. McKenna, M.D., said, "The science tells us that the vaccine works. Our staff has witnessed first-hand the unforgiving impact of the coronavirus on nearly every aspect of our lives and, in too many cases, on life itself."

The number of patients hospitalized for COVID-19 declined as more people became vaccinated. But in late July, the rate began to increase, and the overwhelming majority of patients with COVID-19 had not received the vaccine.

"We must continue to lead by example," Dr. McKenna said. "I thank all my colleagues for their untiring efforts and urge every member of our workforce—and our neighbors in the community—to get vaccinated. The vaccine will help put the pandemic behind us."

More than half of the U.S. population has been fully vaccinated as of Aug. 9, 2021. Nearly 60 percent of New Yorkers and more than 60 percent of Capital District residents have completed the vaccine series.

Capital District hospitals encourage other health care providers to require the vaccine for the health and safety of their communities. They believe those requirements should be made as soon as possible.

Each of these organizations will develop its own set of limited exemptions and deferrals for consideration.

American National acquired for \$5.1B

Brookfield Asset Management Reinsurance Partners vow to keep Glenmont offices open

GLENMONT — American National Group, Inc., and Brookfield Asset Management Reinsurance Partners Ltd. have entered into a definitive merger agreement whereby Brookfield Reinsurance will acquire American National in an all-cash transaction valued at approximately \$5.1 billion.

Brookfield Reinsurance said on Monday, Aug. 9 that it intends to maintain American National's offices at Glenmont, where the insurance company employs approximately 570 people. The global asset management company said it also intends to keep American National's headquarters in Galveston, Texas, along with its offices in League City, Texas and Springfield, Missouri.

The merger is expected to close in the first half of 2022. In the joint statement announcing the

merger, Brookfield Reinsurance CEO Sachin Shah said he looks forward to continuing American National's longstanding involvement with its local communities.

"The acquisition of American National represents a significant milestone in the continued expansion of our insurance business," said Shah. "American National's management team has a strong track record of stable growth and disciplined underwriting. We are excited to partner with them, and the dedicated American National employee base and distribution partners, as we look to further grow the business and maintain a strong franchise for the benefit of all stakeholders."

The buyout is subject to certain customary closing conditions, including antitrust clearance and receipt of insurance regulatory approvals. The merger received unanimous approval from American National's Board of

Directors.

Following the execution of the merger agreement, stockholders representing more than a majority of the issued and outstanding shares of American National common stock delivered stockholder written consents adopting and approving the merger agreement. Each share of American National common stock will be converted into \$190.00 at the closing of the merger, a 55 percent premium to the unaffected share price of \$122.56 on May 11, and another 24.7 percent premium over American National's 30-day volume-weighted average price as of Aug. 6.

Market speculators reported in May that American National was exploring options, including a company sale. The insurer released a statement to say the company could not comment, falling short of denying market rumors.

"This is an energizing moment in American National's history.

and alternative raw materials for the production of new, more sustainable construction materials.

This research will utilize resources at Geocycle's Holly Hill Research Center in South Carolina and Holcim Ltd.'s Global Innovation Center in Lyon, France. Geocycle, a provider of industrial, agricultural and municipal waste management services worldwide, works to develop new, innovative waste management techniques combined with proven 'co-processing' technology.

The research team will begin by conducting a waste-characterization study at a number of military installations facing significant construction and demolition debris. Information obtained as part of this research will help the USACE identify ways to reduce waste, increase its circular economy, and avoid landfill costs and associated emissions.

development.

COVID infections identified between August 2 and August 6, 107 were vaccinated.

"At a time when schools are preparing to reopen and the COVID positivity rate is increasing, we must ensure our schools and districts have the most up-to-date resources and mitigation strategies available to keep our children and school staff safe," said Commissioner Betty A. Rosa. "Reopening amidst a pandemic for the second consecutive year is truly a daunting task. Our hope is that this guide, coupled with the input of local health officials will help the state's education community as they prepare for September."

The Education Department's health and safety guide addresses questions related to: COVID-19 vaccinations, monitoring community transmission, wearing of masks, physical distancing, sports and extracurricular activities, COVID-19 screening, health questionnaire screenings, contact tracing, COVID-19 related facilities projects, remote instruction, and funding sources available to schools and districts that may help with preparing for the upcoming school year and beyond.

"With the end of the state disaster emergency on June 25, 2021, school districts are reestablished as the controlling entity for schools," Zucker shared in a statement on Aug. 8. "Schools and school districts should develop plans to open in-person in the fall as safely as possible, and I recommend following guidance

from the [Center for Disease Control] and local health departments."

Gov. Andrew Cuomo's executive orders issued in response to the emerging pandemic were rescinded effective June 25, after the governor announced more than 20 million vaccinations were administered throughout the state. With more than 71 percent of New Yorker adults having received at least their first dose, the emergency powers were lifted.

New York State United Teachers President Andy Pallotta followed the Education Department's announcement by urging schools to work with educators and parents as they develop their mitigation plans. Nonetheless, he expressed his support.

"We applaud the state Education Department for stepping in and issuing statewide guidance on reopening schools. As educators, we know that the best place for students to learn is in the classroom," Pallotta said. "We must do everything we can to ensure every student has access to full-time, in-person instruction this year. That includes ensuring our schools are safe and healthy for students and the people who serve them."

Zucker has fallen under increased scrutiny amid the fallout related to Gov. Andrew Cuomo's sexual harassment accusations and his subsequent resignation. In a Friday email to Washington, D.C., he shared how he was ready to lift mask mandates at schools with less than two weeks remaining in the academic year following the C.D.C.'s announced guidelines pertaining to summer camps. One of the key takeaways from the recent events that have unfolded with Cuomo is that intent doesn't matter. The soon-tobe former governor states he didn't intend to harass his employees so therefore it wasn't harassment. NYS law clearly disputes the governor's beliefs. Defined by the labor department sexual harassment is a form of gender based discrimination, is unwelcome verbal or physical behavior based on a person's gender. It includes unwelcome or inappropriate touching of employees or customers.

As we have partnered with Pinnacle Human Resources on offering Sexual Harassment Prevention Training, we often hear from businesses owners that they work alone so they don't need the training. The laws cover employees, contractors,

and customers even sole proprietors need training. For assistance in creating and implementing prevention policies contact Pinnacle Human Resources.

We have also been monitoring the increase in COVID-19 cases in the county. Albany County is one of 33 counties in the state that the Center for Disease Control should recommend mask wearing indoors for all people to help stop the spread of the Delta variant. The Delta variant can be transmitted by asymptomatic vaccinated individuals. At this time we are asking visitors to the Chamber to wear a mask. Unvaccinated visitors are

required to wear a mask.



She began as the New York Times's nightlife columnist, covering 252 parties in eighteen months, and continued on to a career that has taken her from covering kidnappings by terrorists in Benin, West Africa, to wildfires in California, and everything in between

Plan to mask up at the theatre

Capital Region Arts Restart Coalition seeks to keep doors open while keeping patrons, artists, staff safe

ALBANY— Amidst rising cases of COVID-19 and the highly contagious Delta variant, the leaders of this Capital Region Arts Restart Coalition announced their decision to require patrons and staff wear masks at indoor events in the performance venues they represent.

The decision impacts all of the major stages within the Capital District, including Proctors Collaborative, the Palace Theatre, Saratoga Performing Arts Center's indoor spaces, Troy Savings Bank Music Hall, Cohoes Music Hall, Capital Repertory Theatre, The Egg Performing Arts Center, Universal Preservation Hall, Caffè Lena, Hudson Hall and



at all performances by Albany Symphony Orchestra.

According to a joint statement released last week, stage leaders have been hosting regular teleconferences to explore the impact of the pandemic shutdown on the region's creative economy and share best practices for reopening and operating.

"Arts venues are a vitally important cultural and economic asset to the Capital Region

community. The nearly sixteenmonth shutdown of live events had a devastating impact on our organizations and the arts and entertainment industry across the globe," the coalition stated. "While we have been pleased, in recent months, to begin reopening our doors to audiences, we must all acknowledge that the pandemic continues."

Albany County Executive Dan McCoy reported as many as 260 new COVID infections in one All of the major stages within the Capital District joined together in announcing that patrons and staff will be wearing masks at indoor performances.

of his daily updates last week. Among Albany County's 260 new COVID infections identified between August 2 and August 6, 107 were vaccinated. The majority of them were in their 20s and 30s.

"This confirms what health experts have been saying — the delta variant is able to be contracted and spread by the vaccinated, which is why we need people to wear masks while at indoor public spaces," McCoy said. "We also know that the

vaccine dramatically reduces your chances of getting seriously ill and hospitalized, so I continue to urge people to get the shot if they haven't already."

Stage leaders also "strongly" encouraged that all Capital District residents seek to receive their COVID-19 vaccination.

"Patron, artist, and staff safety is our top priority, and we have collectively decided, given the recent increased virus caseload in our region, to follow guidance from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention and require that patrons wear masks at indoor events at our venues, effective immediately," the coalition stated. Patrons were also encouraged to visit the websites of each individual organization for further guidance on other requirements and procedures that may be in place at various venues. "We appreciate the patience and understanding of our audiences as we take steps to continue bringing live arts events to our region amidst the current challenging circumstances."

Medicaid's potential ripple effect

Research uncovered provider growth in low-income and highpopulation counties

hen public health insurance like Medicaid expands its dental coverage, by increasing the types of procedures it covers and the total amount a dentist can spend on an individual patient, more dentists will locate to the expansion areas, therefore increasing access.

This finding comes from research recently published in the Journal of Public Economics by Jason Huh, an assistant professor in the Department of Economics at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. Huh found that Medicaid-induced financial incentives influence where providers choose to practice,

potentially expanding access into previously underserved areas.

"This paper provides the first empirical evidence that Medicaid expansion can affect the location choices of providers," Huh said. "Policy makers can use this information to devise alternate policies that can address provider shortage and geographic

distribution imbalances which have plagued the American health care system for decades."

Using a universal database of all dentists in America from 2006 to 2013, Huh found that expanding adult Medicaid dental benefits increased the number of dentists per capita in low-income counties by 13 percent. The

increase was larger in counties where the expansions generated greater financial incentives for dentists; for example, highpopulation density areas.


The study further revealed that the increase in dentist supply was primarily driven by those in private practice.

"One of the goals of public health services is to encourage the private health care sector to provide services to low-income populations rather than relying on community health centers or public clinics," Huh said. "By showing that private dentists responded to the financial incentives of expanded coverage by altering their practice locations, there is evidence that Medicaid expansion achieved one of its stated goals."

Future research for Huh will expand this line of research into the impact of Medicaid expansion on physicians and where they locate their practice.





uicy, mouthwatering, hamburgers are a warm weather staple that taste perfect right off the grill. Everyone can benefit from having a tried-andtrue burger recipe in his or her repertoire when entertaining a backyard full of guests or enjoying a cozy weeknight meal with the family.

Many things constitute a great burger, including flavorful meat, the right ratio of fat content, a crispy roll or bun, and fresh, cold toppings and condiments. That's all guaranteed and more in this recipe for "The Great American Hamburger and Cheeseburger" from "Mastering the Grill: The Owner's Manual for Outdoor Cooking" (Chronicle Books), by Andrew Schloss & David

The Great American Hamburger and Cheeseburger

INGREDIENTS: Yields 6 servings

- pounds ground beef chuck, 85 percent lean
- tablespoons ice-cold water
- 1 teaspoon ketchup
- teaspoon ground black pepper Oil for coating grill grate
- slices good-quality American, provolone, or cheddar cheese (optional)
 - hamburger buns, split

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Heat the grill to 425 F for gas or achieve light ash for charcoal or light ash for wood.
- 2. Using your hands, mix the beef, water, ketchup, and pepper in a bowl until well blended; do not overmix. Using a light touch, form into 6 patties no more than 1 inch thick. Refrigerate the burgers until the grill is ready.
- 3. Brush the grill grate and coat it with oil. Put the burgers on the grill, cover and cook for 7 minutes, flipping after about 4 minutes, for medium-done (150 F, slightly pink). Add a minute per side for well-done (160 F).
- 4. If you are making cheeseburgers, put 2 slices of cheese on each burger 1 minute before the burgers are going to be done.
- 5. To toast the buns, put them cut-sides down directly over the fire for the last minute of cooking.
- 6. If serving the burgers directly from the grill, serve on the buns. If the burgers will sit, even for a few minutes, keep the buns and the burgers separate until just before

The best garnishes for burgers are the classics: a slice of ripe beefsteak tomato, a mound of sautéed onions, a leaf of romaine lettuce, a dollop of coleslaw, or a few slices of dill pickles.

That vibe's coming back

The popular band has a fanbase that stretches across the northeast to points west, enabling it to keep busy throughout the year, outside of a raging pandemic. Since live music venues started opening up in March, Mateo Vosgianian and his bandmates have played a handful of shows spanning from North Creek in March to Powers Park this past weekend.

"As a band, we hadn't really played any shows for almost 12 months," Vosgianian said. "We just couldn't wait. So, we took every offer that came our way and did our best with it."

But to appreciate the work stoppage they suffered one must account that they usually book approximately 250 gigs each year. In 2020, that count was at 10.

This year marks the band's 10th anniversary as a group. The boys are driving around in a relatively new touring bus, one in which Rich Derbyshire loves to demonstrate the head space. It was an investment in which Vosgianian said the band could use another "15 years" after their old van up and died on them in 2019. The bus is relatively new, as it was a few months old when shutdowns were implemented.

Vosgianian is a career musician. There are players within the scene who work a 9-to-5 and let loose on the weekends. He's the opposite. When he's not behind the drum kit for Wild Adriatic, his priority is to perform on a stage with someone else before doing a non-music job. He is associated with as many as five different projects, some of which still involve singer and guitarist Travis Gray or keyboard player Dustin DeLuke.

The constant act of performing creates a habit. When that habit was taken away last year, he said it didn't feel right. Like so many other people, he went down the rabbit hole after downloading TikTok. He's got three channels he feeds



into, including one that features epic skateboard fails. "Nothing gruesome or anything," he said. "I always turn away just before it happens, but then I go back to see the aftermath."

Vosgianian isn't the type to wish bad things upon anyone. Quite the opposite. Last year, he said he was on a vacation to Wisconsin with his mother when a stranger recognized him

on the street. "Mateo?" the man asked, an apparent fan of the band. "Can I have a hug?" Without missing a beat, he agreed to the hug before the stranger went off on his way. He then looked at his mother, who was confused by what she saw. Her son's a serial hugger. He's developed that reputation at shows. He's a bit of a teddy bear standing with his envious full beard at the merch table dishing

Hugs aside, Vosgianian said he's "all masked up" and invested in the hand sanitizers. The first few shows he's played have been

out hugs to those who ask.

shows he's played have been done with an abundance of caution. He and Travis have played shows "behind shower curtains," he said, for the added protection. Nonetheless, coming back to that habit of playing live music has him feeling right

again.

"I remember the first time we really played out to a crowd after COVID started — about a full calendar year after — the vibe was such a release for both ends," he said. "And now, it's very much like that same image."

As current headlines point to another surge in the infection rate, Vosgianian said there is a bit of uncertainty clouding what may lay ahead. This time of year, the band is usually out or plotting their course out west. But as the Delta variant plays out in other parts of the country, "we still can't plan for the future. We can't book a whole tour not knowing whether or not we'll be able to execute it."

However, Wild Adriatic fans can anticipate a new album release this fall. The full length album will be the follow-up to its 2017 release "Feel." In a podcast episode of "Boom Chuck," Vosgianian told Chris Phillips that the band was drifting back to its roots. Though a track list has yet to be finalized, he said a few tracks should feature some of the riff rock sound of the band's earlier days.

Live: The Dadtet at Jazz On Jay By MICHAEL HOCHANADEL

SCHENECTADY — They're all dads: trombonist/leader Ben O'Shea, pianist David Gleason, saxophonists Brian Patneaude (tenor), and Dave Fisk (tenor and alto), bassist Mike Lawrence; and drummer Andy Hearn.

Their Dadtet band name signifies parenthood more than any oblique reference to Louis "Pops" Armstrong. It serves instead as a convenient, collective marquee label for these established area jazz cats. A prior name, the Ben O'Shea Quintet, confused a woman who came to a gig expecting an Irish St. Patrick's Day vibe

However, she stayed for most of that gig, just as everybody stayed for the Dadtet's Jazz on Jay show Thursday under a pounding sun. And they did play "Summertime," a song Satchmo famously recorded with Ella Fitzgerald.

Four of the dads – O'Shea, Gleason, Patneaude and Fisk – played regularly with Keith Pray's Big Soul Ensemble before it went on hiatus during the plague. In Pray's 17-piece crew, all adopted workmanlike personas. Thursday, however, O'Shea flexed his funny bone at times in a relaxed and self-deprecating way.

This gave the noontime gig a cool, easy feel; not because it was too hot to play



fast or hard but because the guys shared the confident flair of walking through the tunes together, swinging everything.

Meanwhile, fans arriving for the show fled the sun's hot glare for the shady side of Jay Street.

"Summertime," indeed.

The Dadtet's slow, dramatic early-set take on this classic featured strong solos by Fisk, whose statement of the familiar melody launched from a higher register than usual; Gleason, with an energetic rhythmic authority, and Patneaude running the changes with his typical grace and aplomb. O'Shea modestly soloed last, and with clarity and drive, before Fisk took the

tune back to the head.

"Summertime" followed "Filthy McNasty," one of the great song titles and the first song by or about Horace Silver in the Dadtet's mostly upbeat, hard-bopinspired set. O'Shea took the lead here in a mid-tempo swing mood that built like a storm surge to crest then signal short swapping riffs that set each player in turn against Hearn's drums. Unshielded by the tent over the rest of the Dadtet, Hearn was rescued from the sun by Jazz on Jay chief Betsy Sandberg or one of her volunteers, holding a beach umbrella over the otherwise melting percussionist.

"Ladybird" kept things breezy; another swing-time stroll where Patneaude

especially shone but Lawrence also made the most of his first solo of the day; again, solos flowed before riff-swaps stacked up brisk and brash short cameos.

After "Summertime" came "In Walked Horace" by J.J. Johnson – O'Shea made sure to let us know the composer was also an eminent trombonist – where Fisk's alto led the way but section playing sparkled, too. This brought smiles all around, on the bandstand as much as in the crowd.

Saxophonist/trumpeter Benny Carter's "A Walking Thing" started almost like a reprise of "Summertime" in its sassy

stroll beat that soon picked up heft as the soloists ganged up on it. This felt too short since it swung with such charm, especially when Gleason ping-ponged playfully with

Gleason intro'ed "What Is This Thing Called Love" as a brash bossa blast, but O'Shea gave this chestnut its biggest push and highest polish and the all-in resolution really rocked the place.

Then came blues-time in the wellpaired "Blues in the Closet" of (bassist) Oscar Pettiford, then "Mo' Bettah Blues" by (another bassist) Bill Lee for his son Spike's film. In "Closet," a walking bass line summoned first drums and piano then the horns, into a powerful swingbus that picked up everybody. Patneaude was brilliant here, conducting a two-part conversation with himself. Slower and steady, "Mo" mellowed things out in slowdrag fashion; low-pressure, maybe; but not low-energy.

They closed with (pianist) Horace Silver's shimmering, simmering "Nutville," a mid-tempo swing number like the earlier songs in the set. All the horns got good solos, then welded together in a brassy farewell.

Throughout, the soloists cooked quotes into the songs, as both spice and ingredients. The Dadtet not only knew the tunes in this 90-minute set inside out, they also knew how to distill, deconstruct and decant them into new containers.

The usual suspects showed up on Jay Street and had a fine time. That nappy dude in black from shiny shoes to fedora set aside the Bible he'd been studying, tracing the words with his finger, to crouch Nippertown at nippertown.com.

before the band to shoot some video. A wiry woman of a certain age took over the dance floor all by herself in "In Walked Horace." She had the moves and, like the band, she had the confidence, holding all eyes until she waved herself off as the crowd applauded.
















How school shopping has changed in the pandemic

Shopping close to home and online are the trends

ack-to-school shopping sales have long been indicators that the summer vacation season is coming to a close. Students and their parents may visit area stores or browse online looking for items to make

the coming school year a success. Those lists have looked similar for decades, but shopping for school supplies in the pandemic era may prove to be a unique experience.

Though hundreds of millions of adults and adolescents have now been vaccinated against COVID-19, there figures to be some lingering effects of the pandemic during the upcoming school year. That could affect which school

· Reassessment of what's

may have changed which items consumers consider essential. For example, clothing became less significant as a greater number of students were enrolled in virtual learning. Backto-school shoppers may purchase less clothing and focus more on tech items, among others.

 Traditional supplies become less necessary: In 2020, Deloitte forecasted that a shift in preferences and intentions would result in parents buying fewer traditional supplies, such as notebooks and office to supplement children's education. That shift likely will continue into this school year.

- Support for local retailers: Community spirit grew in the early days of the pandemic and continues now.

Many people prefer to shop in locally owned stores. Eighty percent of customers surveyed feel more or as connected to their communities, according to the business industry consultant company Accenture.


• Customers are trying new brands and products: Shoppers are trying new products out of curiosity as well as necessity. Back-to-school shopping may include novel brands and other items that may not have

How students can transition to life on a college campus

Some students may be a little anxious as they prepare to return to campus this fall

uch has been made of the challenges that have faced students and their families during the COVID-19 pandemic. The shift to remote learning and shortened school days was difficult for many families, forcing students to adapt to virtual school on the fly as their parents adjusted to working from home full-time while doing their best to keep kids engaged in their studies and occupied when school let out each day. circumstances as the 2021-22 school year begins. That includes the adjustment from remote learning

contact with peers to a return to more traditional academic and

> social settings. Navigating that transition alongside other incoming freshmen can make it a little

easier to handle. • Plan ahead. Parents and their college-bound children can prepare for the coming school year by learning about on-campus policies over the summer. Will masks be mandated? Will classrooms remain socially distanced? Are vaccinations required to attend class in person? The sooner families learn these policies, the sooner they can begin planning for life on campus. Parents also can look into on-campus resources designed to help students readjust to being back among their peers.

Knowing where to go for help should students need it can ensure any issues that arise are addressed promptly.

• Encourage students to share their concerns. Opening up about any concerns they may have can help students as they emerge from the pandemic. Many parents were concerned about returning to the office in person, and they can share those concerns and the ultimate outcomes of their returns with students concerned about moving onto a

college campus. Parents are urged to periodically check in with college students about any anxieties they may have about being on campus.

Combatting more than just summer learning loss

Students also may be affected by deficits that developed due to virtual learning

azy summer days are great for lounging around the pool. Though such afternoons are synonymous with summer, failure to flex cognitive muscles along with physical ones may lead to struggles when children return to classrooms.

Summer learning loss, also dubbed "summer slide,"is a term used in reference to the loss of academic skills and knowledge during summer vacations. However, in addition to the potential for lost skills from being away from school during summer breaks, students also may be affected by deficits that developed due to virtual learning. This summer may be one best spent catching up on studies.

Researchers have been looking at summer slide



at least when one of the first comprehensive studies on the phenomenon was published. That study indicated children lose significant knowledge in

reading and math over summer break. More recently. a 2020 NWEA(MAP Growth assessment found children in third to fifth grades lose, on average, 20 percent of their school-year gains in reading and 27 percent in math during summer break. NWEA is a research-based, notfor-profit organization that creates assessment solutions that premeasure growth and proficiency.

While summer learning loss has been widely recognized for years, a new issue has developed due to the global pandemic. A shift to hybrid or all virtual learning for significant portions of the last two school years could have

In addition to the potential for lost skills from being away from school during summer breaks, students also may be affected by deficits that developed due to virtual learning. This summer may be one best spent catching up on studies.

Office of Research and Strategic Improvement in Virginia found that middle and high school students have had less academic success as a result of online learning. The percentage of students with two or

more failing marks increased by 83 percent in the first quarter of the 2020-21 school year. Certain demographics of students struggled even more, including students with disabilities, Hispanic students and

English learner students, according to the report. When separating middle school students from high school students, the former had higher incidences of two or more failing grades, a

300 percent increase versus 50 percent increase among high school students.

There are physical consequences to consider as well. A recent study from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention that included 1,290 parents whose children were engaged in online instruction found that students receiving virtual instruction were more likely than those who received in-person instruction to report decreased physical activity, fewer opportunities to socialize with friends and worsened mental or

emotional health overall.

Parents who are concerned about their children's educational opportunities over the last year-plus may want to emphasize more smart play this summer. Encourage children to read more, even if it'sbooks of their own choosing, which they are more likely to complete than books selected for them. Families also may want to work with tutors to bring their children back up to level in math and reading proficiency so students are ready for the new school year when it begins in August and September.



How to improve focus on their studies

The struggles students can have with focusing on their studies was apparent during the pandemic

eachers strive to create supportive and challenging classroom environments for their students. Such settings can bring out the best in students and help them overcome obstacles, including an inability to

The struggles students can have with focusing on their studies was apparent during the pandemic. A 2020 survey of more than 400 college students found that 64 percent were concerned about their ability to maintain their focus and discipline in remote instructional environments. Though educators, students and parents are hopeful that remote learning will soon be a thing of the past, no one is certain about what lies ahead in regard to the 2021-22 school year. Ideally, students will be back in school time fulltime five days per week by the start of the new academic year. However, there no guarantee that

Emphasize one activity at a time. Various studies have shown that

multitasking adversely affects performance and makes it hard to concentrate. A recent study from researchers at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology found that performing two or three activities simultaneously puts significantly more

demand on the brain than simply doing those tasks one after another. All students, and especially those who are struggling with focus, should be encouraged to take on one task at a time.

· Take breaks. The Cleveland Clinic notes that various studies have found that periodic breaks improve mood, boost performance and increase a person ability to concentrate and pay attention.

Many students are well acquainted with lengthy cramming sessions on the eve of a big exam, which can feel like a

rite of passage for high schoolers and college students. Parents and educators can emphasize the importance of taking breaks during such sessions and how periodic rest can help improve performance.

 Take a piecemeal approach to big tasks. The Child Mind Institute notes that breaking big tasks down into smaller. more manageable pieces can help kids effectively tackle more challenging tasks. The piecemeal approach can make big tasks seem less daunting, and the success kids have at each smaller task can provide some needed momentum as they draw



closer to solving the problem.

Many students struggle to focus on their studies. Some simple strategies can help students overcome such challenges and fulfill their academic potential.

When it's time to call in a tutor

Here are some indicators that a tutor may be needed

usy schedules, hybrid learning and demanding coursework have affected students' academic performance over the last year-plus. The months since a pandemic was declared in March of 2020 have been unlike any other, and confronting the academic challenges of

the pandemic may have adversely affected some students' grades.

A recent report from the Fairfax County Public Schools Office of Research and Strategic Improvement in Virginia found the number of middle and high school students with two or more failing marks increased by 83 percent in the first quarter of the 2020-2021 school year compared to the

year prior. But students' grades may slide or they may find certain school work overly challenging even in normal years. Since many parents have not seen a periodic table or had to solve high school math problems in decades, tutors may be just what students need to regain their academic

footing.

Failing grades are not necessarily the most notable indicator that students can benefit from the services

of a tutor. The Princeton Review says 25 percent of high school students say homework is their biggest source of stress, and homework progress can help parents determine if it's time to call in a tutor. Students who find their homework is taking too long, particularly double or

triple the amount of time it once required, may need some extra help. Here are some additional indicators that a tutor may be needed.

• Declining test scores: Some students are simply poor test takers,

are any problem areas.

• Poor time management or focus: Students who are struggling may have their attention drift or they put off doing tasks because they don't grasp the

assignments.

• Lack of homework help at home: Parents may have prior commitments during the times of day when their children are doing homework. Even when parents are home, they may discover that the concepts covered in school are not being taught in the ways parents


learned them and they may have difficulty assisting their children. Tutors can step in and help students when parents cannot.

• Learning disorder: Certain students learn

and notify parents if there differently from others due to a diagnosed or undiagnosed learning disorder. A child who is struggling with reading, phonics, spelling, and writing may have dyslexia, according


