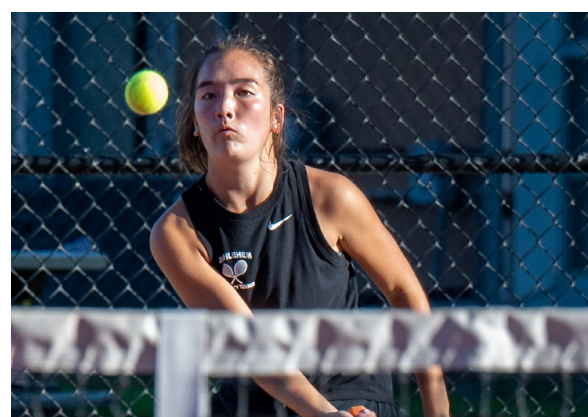

Man pleads guilty to bank robbery

Florida man admits to robbing Delmar bank in 2015, arrested weeks later before attempt to rob it again

ALBANY — Jesse Clarence Odum, 35, of Pensacola, Florida, pled guilty on Thursday, Oct. 8 to an indictment charging him with robbing a Pioneer Bank branch in 2015.

As part of his guilty plea, Odum admitted that on May 2, he entered the Pioneer Bank branch located at 184 Delaware Avenue in Delmar, New York, stopped at a counter, wrote a note, and approached a teller. Odum then passed the teller the note, which instructed her to be silent and give him \$10,000. The teller partially complied, and Odum fled the bank with \$5,000

in cash.

Odum was subsequently arrested on May 26, 2015, by BPD officers, in the vicinity of the same Pioneer Bank branch.

The announcement was made by Acting United States Attorney Antoinette T. Bacon; Janeen DiGuseppi, Special Agent in Charge of the Albany Field Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation; and Chief Gina F. Cocchiara of the Bethlehem Police Department.

Then Det. Sgt. Adam Hornick was the Bethlehem police officer who arrested Odum in 2015. In his report, Odum had stepped into the same Pioneer Bank wearing sunglasses and a hood. When a bank employee asked him to remove them, he turned around and walked away. Noting the act as suspicious, the bank called the police.

Hornick arrived in time to see Odum walking out of another bank and towards the back alley of the mall before

calling out to him. When Odum turned around, Hornick said he recognized him as the person wanted for the bank robbery a few weeks before. After a search and an arrest, Hornick reportedly found a note on Pioneer Bank letterhead stating a bank robbery.

Hornick would later receive the department's gallantry award. He is now a commander with the department.

This case was investigated by the FBI and the Bethlehem Police Department, and is being prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney Emmet O'Hanlon.

Odum faces up to 20 years in prison, a fine of up to \$250,000, and a term of post-imprisonment supervised release of up to 3 years when he is sentenced by United States District Judge Mae A. D'Agostino on February 4, 2022. A defendant's sentence is imposed by a judge based on the particular statute the defendant is charged with violating, the U.S. Sentencing Guidelines and other factors.

Ørsted and Eversource, Sunrise Wind's joint development partners, signed a \$86 million supply chain contract with Riggs Distler & Company, Inc. to construct advanced foundation components for wind turbines at the Port of Coeymans,

bringing construction and steel manufacturing work to New York companies located in the Capital District and Western New York, and creating 230 family-sustaining jobs.

The announcement was made by Lt. Gov. Brian Benjamin from the

Port of Coeymans and the agreement solidifies New York as a major construction hub for the Sunrise Wind project and positions the port to be among the first in the country to be mobilized for the construction of advanced foundation components for an offshore wind farm by U.S. workers.

"The development of the U.S. offshore wind industry is a once in a

generation opportunity that is providing significant economic and environmental benefits to communities across the state," Benjamin said. "In seizing this moment, we are creating a new workforce of skilled labor, which will be able to compete globally and attract new supply chain businesses to support the offshore wind industry, and in turn drive New York's green economy."

It is anticipated 115 local union workers will be based at the Port of Coeymans to construct hundreds of large-scale and specialized components that are fundamental elements of the wind farm's turbine foundations. These components, ranging in size from 12 to 120 tons each and as tall as 40 feet, include the foundations' internal and external platforms, railings, steel ladders, cages, and other key parts that will attach to the monopile foundations the wind turbine generators will stand upon.

Ljungström LLC, of Wellsville, in Alleghany County, New York, will manufacture the steel components and deliver them to the Port of

Coeymans. According to the governor's office, this will create at least 100 jobs in Western New York.

With the execution of this contract, Riggs Distler & Company, Inc, a leading union construction solutions firm with offices in Mt. Vernon and Saugerties, New York, and Cherry Hill, New Jersey, will serve as the general contractor to build the prefabricated advanced foundation components at the Port of Coeymans.

Once complete, the components will be shipped down the Hudson River and out to the Sunrise Wind offshore wind farm site, located in federal waters roughly 30 miles east of Montauk Point, N.Y. Riggs Distler is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Centuri Group, Inc.

The construction at the Port of Coeymans will be covered by a Project Labor Agreement. In accordance with the developers' commitment, Ørsted and Eversource will negotiate a Project Labor Agreement with the Greater Capital Region Building and Construction Trades Council, covering all construction work

performed at the port in connection with the advanced components by Riggs Distler.

"We're building a domestic supply chain and establishing a long-lasting industry that will be key to achieving the nation's green energy and economic goals," said David Hardy, Ørsted Offshore North America CEO. "We're delivering on our commitment to bring thousands of new, union jobs to New York by partnering with regional suppliers and locating Sunrise Wind's construction hub in the Capital Region, which provides access to a skilled workforce and a reliable port for transit needs."

Ørsted and Eversource, as part of Sunrise Wind, will also launch a \$1 million workforce training initiative under the strategic leadership of the Center for Economic Growth.

"This new partnership for New York's Sunrise Wind project will infuse \$86 million into New York's economy which directly benefits New York companies and creates quality construction and manufacturing jobs in local communities," said Hochul.

G'land set to upgrade buildings, field

Guilderland voters approve \$21.8M capital improvement prop

GUILDERLAND — School district residents approved a \$21.8 million proposed capital project on Thursday, Oct. 7, welcoming several improvements throughout the district's seven school buildings, including a new synthetic athletic field.

Voters passed the item by a nearly two-thirds majority, contrasting against a similar measure three years ago when residents rejected a \$42.7 million proposal in 2018. Thursday's results revealed 1310 yes votes to 742 no.

"Thank you to all of the Guilderland voters for supporting our students," said Dr. Marie Wiles, Guilderland district superintendent. "We are so excited about what this result means for our students. This

work will improve all areas of our district including building environments, educational technology and outdoor learning spaces."

Many of the items in the current proposal were originally included in the 2018 voter referendum but were removed from the proposal that was eventually voted on and approved by the community in May 2019.

The approved project will address improvements in learning opportunities, enhancing safety and security for students and staff, and replacing or updating aging infrastructure in the district's seven school buildings.

The project is to focus on three overarching areas; infrastructure work that was eliminated from the 2018 proposal; outdoor space improvements that include upgrading or replacing playground equipment; and technology replacement and data security that includes improving instructional learning technology.

Among the improvements itemized within the proposal are \$4.9 million allocated to

outdoor spaces, including five new playground upgrades, seven outdoor classroom pavilions and a new track and synthetic turf field. Residents wary of safety issues were assured in a July presentation that the synthetic field, complete with rubber fill, would not be a health concern.

According to Director of Health/PE & Interscholastic Athletics David Austin, the field should last up to 15 years. Under proper maintenance, the field is guaranteed for 12 years and can be replaced at an approximate cost of up to \$950,000.

In October 2018, the district put a \$42.7 million capital project proposal before voters. That project was to enhance overall safety and security. The district also wanted to focus on making classroom environments healthier and modernizing learning spaces. Residents voted the proposal down by just 58 votes, with a tally of 1,375 to 1,317.

The district later revised the proposal, taking feedback from the exit survey and reduced the cost to \$30.9 million.

Certain aspects of the project, including modernized learning spaces, were eliminated from the revised proposal as a result. This proposal was included as a separate proposition during the May 2019 budget vote on the district's annual budget, which voters approved. The work of that project is ongoing across the district.

In May 2021, the district

formed a facilities committee that included community representatives to review the district's needs for capital improvements.

The group identified needs through an assessment of the district's building conditions and deferred improvements as a result of the failed 2018 capital project vote.

Residents to decide fate of district's \$40.7M facilities improvement project

DELMAR — Bethlehem Central residents will vote on the district's proposed \$40.7 million infrastructure project on Tuesday, Oct. 19.

The board finalized a list of projects under the plan early last month, including renovations to the Bethlehem Central Middle School auditorium and a proposed artificial playing field for the high school.

Despite the \$40.7 million price tag, administrators will secure funding through a combination of state aid and capital reserves. A complete list of projects can be found online at bethlehemschools.org/2021-capital-project-planning/.

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New York: \$15 min wage phase-in to continue

ALBANY — The New York State Department of Labor announced the state's \$15 minimum wage phase-in will continue, with the next stage taking effect Dec. 31.

The announcement follows a statutorily required report by the Division of the Budget that found evidence of pressure for wages to rise in the midst of a pandemic-driven labor shortage. The minimum wage will rise to \$15 per hour on Long Island and in Westchester, matching the \$15 hourly minimum already set in New York City. The Director of the Division of Budget, together with the Commissioner of Labor, determined that the minimum wage should rise to \$13.20 per hour in the rest of the state based upon economic factors and indices.

"Companies, particularly those that employ low-wage workers, are already raising wages and in some cases offering incentives to hire amid a labor-shortage that is showing no sign of abating, and it makes sense to raise the wage floor now and continue supporting New York's families while providing a predictable path forward for businesses," Labor Commissioner Roberta Reardon said. "With today's action we are continuing the work of building back with equity and justice."

The report produced by the Division of the Budget is required by the minimum wage statute to review the state of the economy and determine whether increases move forward as scheduled or should be delayed.

For 2021, the statute also requires the Director of the Division of Budget evaluate economic factors and determine, with the Commissioner of Labor, the rate of minimum wage increases outside of New York City, Long Island and Westchester. As the report describes, the minimum wage in that region is determined to increase based on the Consumer Price Index for all Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers as well as nonfarm business labor productivity, enabling low-wage workers to continue to afford the same basket of goods and services and then some based on rising productivity.

We were subjected to the unindicted criminal behavior of a current Town Board member, a current County Legislator and the still Zoning Board chair who conspired to try to steal ballot positions by filing falsified documents at the Board of Elections. Two lawyers and a notary public claim they did not know how to complete an affidavit. Then the Democratic Committee supported Working Families Party candidates

City dwellers looking to buy rather than rent an apartment may come across real estate listings categorized as "co-ops." While co-ops can exist anywhere, Realtor.com notes that they are most common in big cities. Co-op is short for "cooperative," and people who buy into a co-op are not technically buying property but shares in an entity that owns the property where investors will ultimately live. The bigger the apartment in the building, the more shares the buyer will own. Residents of a co-op typically elect fellow residents to serve on the co-op board. That board is tasked with making a host of important decisions, including choosing who will and will not be allowed to join the cooperative. Unlike buying a single-family home, duplex, townhouse, or condominium, people interested in buying into a co-op may have put down no less than 20 percent the value of the apartment where they hope to live.

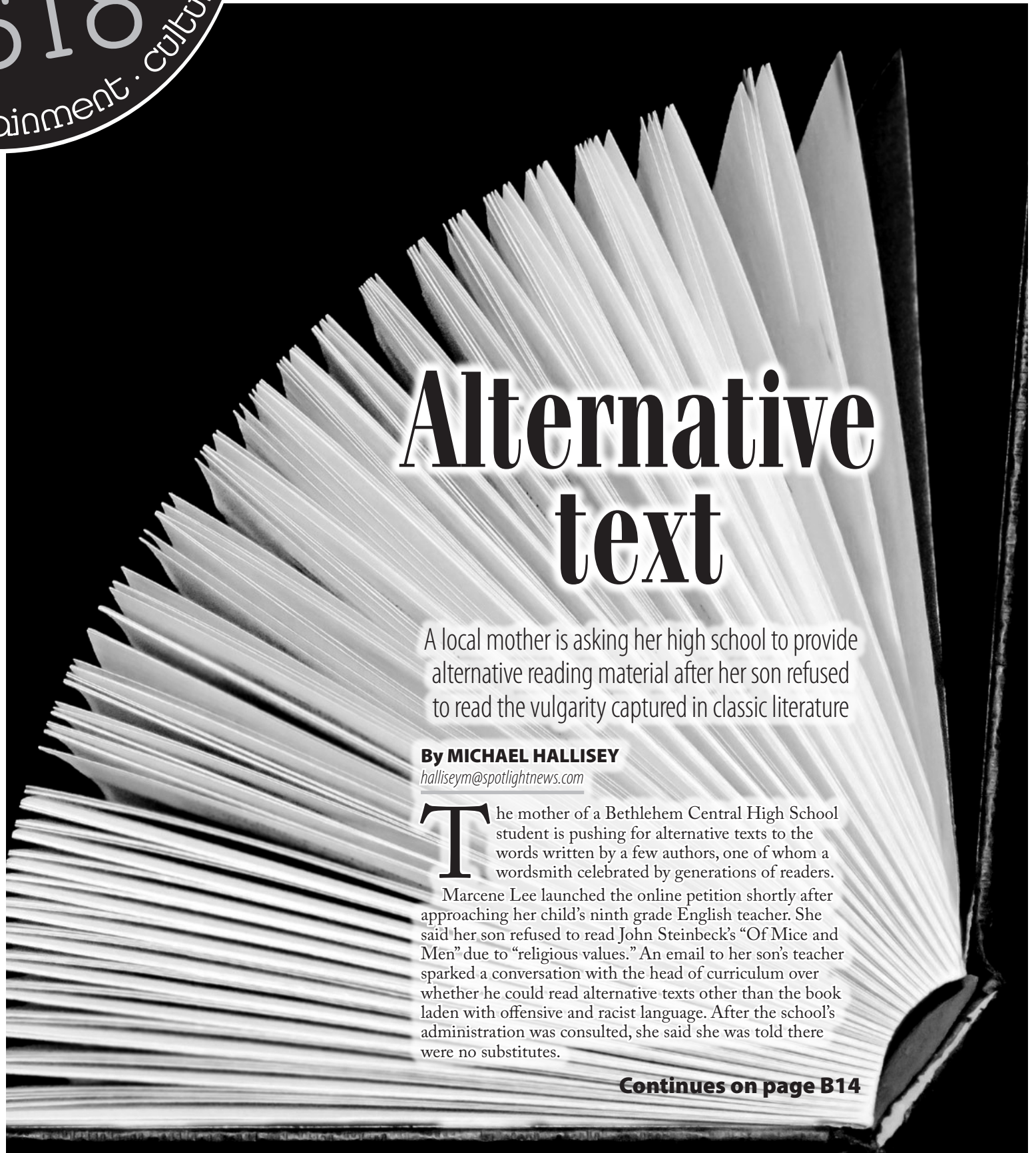

Alternative text

A local mother is asking her high school to provide alternative reading material after her son refused to read the vulgarity captured in classic literature

The mother of a Bethlehem Central High School student is pushing for alternative texts to the words written by a few authors, one of whom a wordsmith celebrated by generations of readers.

Troy catches a big Phish for December

Mike Gordon, Leo Kottke to play Music Hall in December

TROY — The Troy Savings Bank Music Hall just added a phenomenal show to the December calendar.

On Wednesday, Dec. 15, guitar pioneer Leo Kottke and Phish bassist Mike Gordon take the stage.

The unlikely partnership between acoustic guitar pioneer Leo Kottke and Phish bassist Mike Gordon continues with the long-awaited “Noon,” their first new album in 15 years, which they are touring in support of.

Couching late-night melancholy in a summer lilt, “Noon” features 11 tracks of warmly askew folk-pop, intricate playing, and the intimate third voice created by Kottke and Gordon, two

of the most accomplished and idiosyncratic instrumentalists in American music. As creative as it is dextrous, under other circumstances, Noon might be hailed as a breakthrough third album from a young band.

The return of an American guitar legend, “Noon” marks Leo Kottke’s first studio record since his last collaboration with Gordon, 2005’s 66 Steps, though he’s continued to tour constantly. Beginning his career on John Fahey’s Takoma label in 1969, Kottke virtually invented his own school of playing with his distinct, propulsive flatpicking.

As a co-founder of Phish in 1983, launching a solo career in the early ‘00s, Gordon’s own big-eared musical vocabulary has created both a boundary-pushing discography of studio and live releases, and helped shape a generation (or two) of improvisers. The pairing of Kottke with Gordon began some two

decades ago, when Gordon — a longtime fan — audaciously overdubbed a bass part over Kottke’s 1969 solo track “The Driving of the Year Nail” and hand-delivered it to the veteran Minnesota guitarist. The result was 2002’s acclaimed Clone.

“Noon” also finds the duo joined by Phish drummer Jon Fishman on five tracks, including a bopping low-key cover of Prince’s “Alphabet Street.” For Kottke, bringing Fishman into the fold has been a long time coming, having first struck up a friendship with the Phish drummer prior to his collaboration with Gordon when the drummer approached him after a gig and struck up a conversation.

Though “Noon” largely captures the sound of an acoustic guitar playing with an electric bass, and there are a lot of live-in-studio performances, it is also far more than the sound of Leo Kottke and Mike Gordon playing in a room together. Recorded in New Orleans and Vermont, with music exchanged by file, tape-sealed boombox, sheet music, and face-to-face, “Noon” is the musically visible part of a conversation between Kottke and Gordon, his junior by 20 years. A panoramic collection of small, strange moments to parallel the serendipitous turns of its extended five-year creation, “Noon” is a collaboration as singular as its musicians.

New York State Museum Thomas Hart Benton

In 1956 Thomas Hart Benton was commissioned by Robert Moses, chairman of the New York Power Authority, to create two murals for the powerhouse building of the state's first hydropower facility in Massena. They feature Jacques Cartier's explorations of the St. Lawrence River and the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Alternately titled *The Seneca Discover the French* and *Jacques Cartier Discovers the Indians*, the murals depict the 16th-century encounters from two points of view. These life groups were on view at the Museum when it was at the State Education Building.

The original building in Massena where these murals were displayed is now closed to the public. They were removed and conserved beginning in 2018 and are on loan to the New York State Museum until Dec 31.

Also, "a small fort, which our people call Fort Orange." This exhibition

examines the momentous discovery of Fort Orange and the lasting impact of events occurring there 400 years ago that shaped the character of the region, state, and the nation. 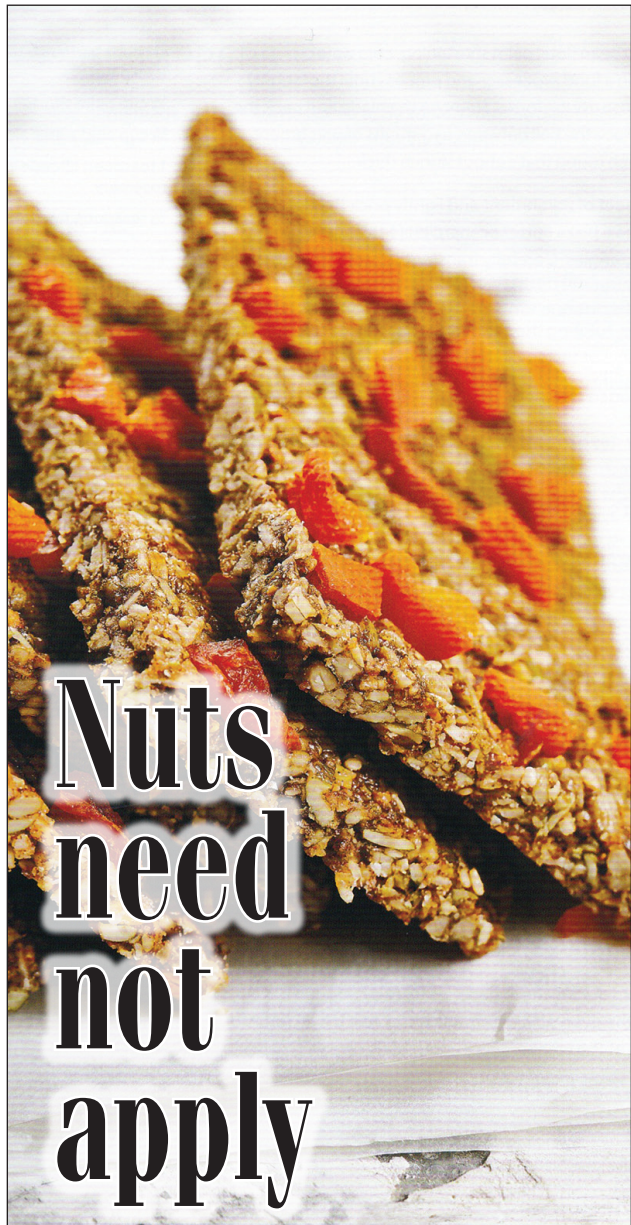

While store-bought granola bars are convenient, they tend to be made with nuts or oats, which are not ideal for those with food allergies or intolerances.

People can easily whip up homemade granola bars that are chock-full of vitamins and minerals and can be customized to food preferences and tastes. This recipe for “Nut-Free Granola Bars” from “Eat What You Want” (Ten Speed Press) by Danielle Walker can be enhanced with raisins, chocolate chips or dried fruits.

Nut-Free Granola Bars

INGREDIENTS: Makes 12

- 2 tablespoons warm water
- 1 tablespoon chia seeds
- 1/3 cup light-colored raw honey
- 1 tablespoon virgin coconut oil
- 2 tablespoons unsweetened sunflower seed butter
- 3/4 cup raw pepitas
- 3/4 cup raw sunflower seeds
- 1 cup unsweetened coconut flakes
- 2 tablespoons sesame seeds
- 2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt
- 1/4 cup chocolate chips, raisins, or dried fruit pieces

INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat the oven to 350 F. Lightly grease the short

sides of a 9- by 13-inch baking dish or rimmed baking sheet with ghee or coconut oil. Line the bottom and long sides of the pan with parchment paper so the ends hang over the sides.

Whisk the warm water and chia seeds in a small bowl and set aside.

Melt the honey in a small saucepan over medium-high heat. Turn the heat to medium and simmer for 5 to 7 minutes, until a candy thermometer reads 225 F. Stir in the oil and sunflower seed butter and remove the pan from the heat. Let cool for 10 minutes.

Place the pepitas and sunflower seeds in a food processor and pulse once or twice until coarsely chopped. Add the coconut flakes, sesame seeds, vanilla, cinnamon, and salt and pulse a few more times, until coarsely chopped and incorporated. Add the chia mixture and the honey mixture and stir by hand until just combined. Immediately spread the mixture into the prepared baking dish.

Place a piece of parchment paper on top and use a flat-bottomed measuring cup to press the mixture firmly and evenly into the pan. Remove the top piece of parchment and bake for 15 minutes, until golden. Sprinkle the chocolate chips over the top. Let cool in the pan for 30 minutes, then transfer the pan to the freezer for 1 hour, until set.

Remove the pan from the freezer and lift the parchment flaps to remove the slab from the pan. Using a sharp knife, cut into 12 rectangular bars. Serve the bars chilled.

Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator for 2 weeks, or in the freezer for 6 months. Defrost in the fridge overnight.

Heading HIV off at the pass at UAlbany

UAlbany receives \$1M for program to prevent HIV, substance abuse

ALBANY — The University at Albany was awarded nearly \$1 million towards the creation of a five-year, comprehensive program aimed at preventing HIV infections and substance use disorders among students.

The Achieving College Completion through Engaged Support Services program will provide timely and responsive HIV prevention services to students, particularly those from the LGBTQ+ community and racial and ethnic backgrounds that are historically at higher risk for HIV and substance use disorders associated with health disparities.

Young adults under age 24 comprise more than one-fifth of all new HIV diagnoses in the United States, according to Dolores Cimini, director of the Center for Behavioral Health Promotion and Applied Research.

Compounding the issue is that young people between the ages of 16 and 25 years of age are also at risk for substance use-related negative effects, making it important for researchers and service providers to address both concerns using a comprehensive prevention approach.

As part of Project ACCESS, trained students who have experienced substance abuse disorders or HIV firsthand will assist their fellow students

by linking them to specialized behavioral health services and vital medical services. In addition, Project ACCESS will hire a “prevention navigator” to support BIPOC and LGBTQ+ students in accessing these behavioral and medical services in a timely and responsive manner, thus supporting students in accessing broader higher education opportunities, completing college and continuing progress towards advanced study and entry into the workforce.

“This funding comes at a very timely juncture at the University at Albany,” said Cimini, who is leading the project with associate professor Jessica L. Martin, of the University at Albany’s School of Education. “Our BIPOC and LGBTQ+ students are voicing the need for specialized services across areas that align with this grant, and it is also responsive to the current focus on health disparities by the University at Albany and New York State,” Cimini continued.

Martin, who also serves as counseling psychology division director, added, “We believe that this is the first grant under this funding mechanism that is housed within a higher education institution, uniquely positioning the University at Albany to advance innovation aimed to support both health and well-being and diversity, equity, and inclusion.”

Albany Medical Center, the Alliance for Positive Health and the Damien Center will partner on the project, which began in August and is expected to

continue through 2026.

The new program joins the growing list of comprehensive and innovative initiatives at the University at Albany. In September, the University officially became a Health Promoting University, a designation bestowed on only nine universities in the country.

A comprehensive public research university, the University at Albany-SUNY offers more than 120 undergraduate majors and minors and 125 master’s, doctoral and graduate certificate programs.

The University at Albany is a leader among all New York State colleges and universities in such diverse fields as atmospheric and environmental sciences, business, education, public health, health sciences, criminal justice, emergency preparedness, engineering and applied sciences, informatics, public administration, social welfare and sociology, taught by an extensive roster of faculty experts.

We've got a bad connection here

Researchers aim to improve coexistence between radio astronomy, wireless networks

ALBANY — Radio waves — a type of electromagnetic radiation that is longer in wavelength than infrared light and can carry information over vast distances — have been used as a vehicle for communication for more than a century. Radio waves have also been detected in space, including from our sun, planets and beyond our solar system that are essential to study the evolution of our cosmos.

While radio frequency transmissions have long been governed by the International Telecommunications Union, the growth of wireless cellular networks in the 21st century has created substantial congestion along the radio frequency spectrum.

A new project led by University at Albany researchers

Aveek Dutta and Dola Saha aims to enhance coexistence in shared frequency bands between wireless cellular networks and passive radio telescopes.

The project, "Collaborative Interference Cancellation for Radio Astronomy," supported by a \$635,901 grant from the National Science Foundation, also involves researchers at the Deep Synoptic Array telescope at the Owens Valley Radio Observatory — part of the California Institute of Technology.

"Our project aims to address challenges created by growing congestion of the radio frequency spectrum," said Dutta, principal investigator, and assistant professor of Electrical and Computer Engineering at the University at Albany's College of Engineering and Applied Sciences. "If successful, it will improve radio telescope capability by reducing interference problems, as well as improve wireless networks by reinforcing the high bandwidth and ubiquitous connectivity needed for continued growth in the

benefits of telecommunications."

Interference problems between communications and radio telescopes have existed for a long time. One approach studied to overcome them has been active interference cancellation, in which the telescope receiver estimates the interfering communications signal then subtracts it from the astronomical measurement to expose the desired information.

Most prior work on active cancellation assumes no cooperation from the cellular networks; this work studies how the telescope and cellular network could work together to improve cancellation performance.

"While previous research usually measured the interfering signals at the telescope site, our project measures the interfering signals at their transmission location," said Saha, co-principal investigator and assistant professor at CEAS. "Our work characterizes the interference in the digital domain of the

"I hope that by petitioning the Bethlehem School Board and other administrators they will see that there is a need for alternate texts in their ELA curriculum for students that have religious objections to reading profanity, vulgarity or sexual content," Lee stated in her petition. "Students should not have to choose between doing their required reading and maintaining their religious or moral values."

Steinbeck's 1937 book is no

stranger to controversy. Nearly a century after its first publication run, it appears on American Library Association's list of the Most Challenged Books of the 21st Century.

The Pulitzer Prize-winning author penned 33 books, many of which took place in and around his California hometown of Salinas during the turn of the 20th century. The former journalist championed the

struggles of the common man, as was the case with "Of Mice and Men."

Steinbeck based the story between George Milton and Lennie Small on his own experience while working alongside migrant farm workers as a teenager. The colloquial phrases the author uses often targets the book for vulgarity.

Lee explained that it's not just Steinbeck that she's concerned with. Her son's class is also to read Sherman Alexie's "Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian." Between the two books, she said the class' required reading contains profanity, vulgar

language, sexual references, sex acts and racist language.

Ethan Eldridge, a former Bethlehem Central student and present-day English teacher outside of the district, said he speaks with his students about the issues before his class starts reading the text.

"Yes, [vulgarity and racism] are issues our society could certainly do without. As teachers we focus on the reasons these issues are brought up," he said. "The use of vulgarity and racism help make a more colorful character, more relatable. There is also the idea that we must learn about the past, however dirty it may be, or we are doomed to repeat it."

Eldridge has taught classrooms for 24 years. Despite the scrutiny over its language, he said he uses the book because it covers important themes — discrimination, love, personal worth and caring for one another. "It's a story about humanity," he said.

"It is a beautiful piece about one man caring for another and show's that even men labeled as 'retarded' or 'slow' have gifts," he said. The issue of the N-word — this must be addressed before reading." He shared how his students are asked to skip the word during in-class reading. "This word has an absolute negative connotation and should

be banned from the English language."

Nonetheless, he understands the purpose behind the author's use of the word. The educator said he believes Steinbeck uses it to help the reader understand the character. Not to be vulgar.

"It's a story about humanity," he said.

Lee said she explained to the school that her son's religious faith led him to decide that reading the content and language as presented in the book was not in his best interest. She suggested the use of alternate texts, an independent study option or accredited online classes.

In an attempt to reassure her of the book's value, she said she agreed to re-read "Of Mice and Men." She noted 52 uses of profanity in one chapter. She now has a goal of 100 signatures for her online petition. Since its Oct. 1 launch on Change.org it has accumulated 60 names.

"My child expressed concern to the teacher that he did not feel comfortable reading books that contain those elements but was told there was no choice but to read all the assigned texts for the year," Lee said. "I am not suggesting that these texts be censored or removed from the school. This is a plea to educators to support their students by allowing alternative texts."

transmitter — these attributes of the approach give a clearer picture of the interfering signals at much less cost, but also create challenges that the project will seek to overcome.”

“CEAS faculty continue to expand their partnerships and the scope of their investigations, in keeping with our mission of ‘Science in Service to Society,’” said Kim L. Boyer, Dean of the College of Engineering and Applied Sciences.

“The work of Profs. Dutta and Saha will, of course, improve imaging conditions for researchers in radioastronomy. But the implications of their

work go well beyond to the intelligent mitigation of electromagnetic interference in a wide array of domains, promising improved wireless connectivity and spectral efficiency everywhere.”

Dutta and Saha’s research will focus on active interference cancellation at the telescope supported by bidirectional collaboration between the telescope and neighboring cellular networks.

Key aspects of the study aim to characterize cellular system signals using software running inside the cellular base



stations that analyzes the digital representation of the transmissions, and decompose the cellular signals at the base stations into an orthogonal stochastic component representation employing a neural network architecture for computational efficiency. It will also focus on intelligently aggregate information about multiple emitters in the cellular network using topology-aware distributed learning, and perform the same decomposition on the

astronomical signal at the telescope then combine it with the aggregated information about the cellular signals to cancel the interference. Furthermore, it will use continuous quantitative feedback from the cancellation algorithms at the telescope to the cellular network to optimize the performance of the decomposition and aggregation algorithms.

The research will be validated with a prototype deployment of the interference measurement and cancellation apparatus at the Deep Synoptic Array telescope (DSA-110) at the Owens Valley Radio Observatory, operated by Caltech.

walk out the door and find it elsewhere. "No," Wall said. "They can't get it, either."

Just two weeks ago, Washington attempted to address the overall issue through an executive order. The mandate from President Joe Biden's desk intended to promote competition, drive wages up, push prices down and

stimulate growth. It was meant to target both the railway and seaway carriers that have increased freight rates with rising demands on supply. Some experts, including the freight line lobby group World Shipping Council, said that won't fix the problem.

The price of wood, for example, has skyrocketed since the outbreak of the pandemic. The cost of plywood has jumped 252 percent since last March. According to PolitiFact, the price for Fir 23/32-inch sheathing for the first week of April was \$1,500 per thousand square feet in some parts of the country — up 230 percent from \$455 a year ago. In some corners of the country, that same amount of plywood is selling for \$1,610 — or

287 percent more than 12 months earlier.

The WSC said U.S. supply chains are "facing unprecedented pressures — there is a lack of rail and truck capacity, warehouses are full, and ports are bursting at the seams." Ocean carriers claimed these issues are driven by raised import demands from U.S. consumers with 11 of the past 12 months having seen consumer spending growth of more than 10 percent. "To put this into perspective, in the 18 years before the pandemic, the average growth rate was 4.7 percent," the lobby group said.

At Star Roofing, Wall said the first step is to always listen to the customer. His sales staff will assess the customer's wants

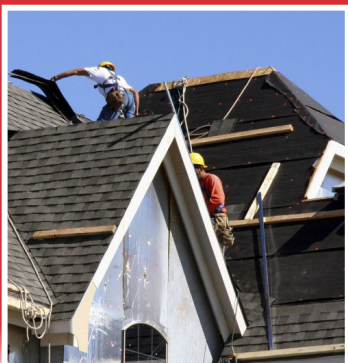

against what's available. It could be a matter of switching out colors, or it could be more. But, Wall said, that's the education process his sales team is able to provide.

SCHENECTADY— For generations, Capital District families have walked through The Costumer’s doors to piece together the most unique costume among friends.

The Costumer has grown significantly from its humble beginnings in 1917. It started as a small costume shop in Schenectady by Anna White, who started the business by trading garb for her daughter’s dance lessons. The local business is now the nation’s leading source for providing

costumes to scholastic theatre productions.

“I think a lot of people are trying to get as much

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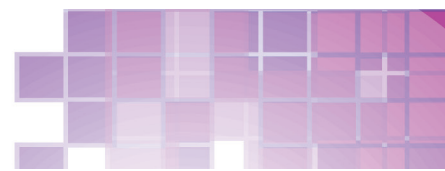

More than just good taste to the table

Garden Bistro's 24 has a Farm-to-Table menu that promises a feast for the senses

— Speak to John Grizzaffi about food and taste won't be the first sense he references, neither will it be the second.

It's a conversation the chef often has when people ask him to describe the contrasts between everyday food and his Farm-to-Table menu at Garden Bistro 24. The difference, he said, is first detected by the eyes and the nose.

"There's a lot more aroma, identifiable aromas to certain things," he said, explaining how herbs and

berries enhance the flavor of a dish instead of other staples people are used to in processed foods. "I think a

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lot of the aromas are lost in transport. When you turn around, aromas are what follows next after sight, and I think it just makes a major difference."

Garden Bistro 24 opened its doors as the first eatery in Slingerlands' Vista Technology Campus nearly a decade ago. He opened it with his father, Charles, in 2013 as a casual restaurant with French

influence. Over the years, patrons have recognized it as a place they can go to shrug off cooking dinner, throw on sandals and a pair of jeans, and grab either a signature crab cake, burger or something else off the seasonal menu.

Grizzaffi is a graduate of the prestigious Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park Known for its food focus and world-class resources, the college is renowned for offering degrees in applied food studies, culinary science, food business management and hospitality management. His kitchen is devoid of microwaves and freezers.

Grizzaffi curates fresh food from a dozen different farms, all of whom are listed on the restaurant's

website. Outside of the fish made available along the East Coast, meat and vegetables are obtained from farms within the Capital District. One of those places in which he obtains vegetables is from the Bethlehem Central

Middle School.

The middle school gardens produce thousands of pounds of produce every year. Fresh lettuces, spinach, bok choy, radishes, garlic scapes, Swiss chard and kale are grown and used

throughout the school district's seven schools. The food the students cultivate are regularly donated to the Town of Bethlehem Food Pantry, and used in the dishes Grizzaffi creates every October since he opened his

restaurant. Every Tuesday in October, Garden Bistro 24 offers three-course meals featuring vegetables from the school's gardens.

"The students, they learn how to sow it, and grow it, and care for it," he said.

"Then, as we like to say, we make sure they learn how to finish the product, how to prepare it. . . . It's just a great, great learning process for the kids."

For Grizzaffi, there's nothing fancy about his restaurant. The food is welcoming and authentic, and it brings kids to the table. And, if it's to be a night without the kids, venture on to Garden Bistro's heated patio for a chicken pot pie, a craft beer or some wine.

"We hate the word 'fancy,'" he said. "When I was a kid, a nice restaurant had to be considered a fancy restaurant. As an adult, absolutely not. I don't crave fancy food. . . . A great restaurant is a simple restaurant; and that is, to provide a great environment and food."

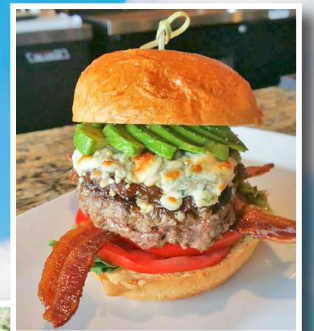

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THEATRE REVIEW

'Shirley Valentine' at Berkshire Theatre

STOCKBRIDGE, Mass. — "Shirley Valentine" is another one person show, this one about a dissatisfied, middle-aged, Liverpudlian housewife but this 1986 comedy by Willy Russell ("Blood Brothers," "Educating Rita") may just have the power and grace to speak most directly to your heart.

We are greeted at the Berkshire Theatre Group's Unicorn Stage by a terrific bright, yellow and airy kitchen (superlative set design by Randall Parsons) with no walls, in front of a floor to ceiling cyclorama of Liverpool row houses. My partner overheard a patron's comment on how the kitchen didn't look very British. How appropriate for an evening when a woman, alone, will investigate and suffer how others perceive her. The woman who appears magically center stage after a blink of a blackout is Shirley Valentine played in an astonishing performance by BTG favorite Corinna May.

We join her mid-conversation

with her wall on a particularly anxious evening. She's directly addressing the wall and telling it how she gave up her husband Joe's steak dinner to the vegan Bloodhound at work. Her man will have to settle for chips and egg for dinner because it was just too worth it to see this dog eat meat for the first time. Shirley's having a glass of wine and nervously chatting about her grown children who've left the house, how she and her school sold herself short and how she has wound up here in such an unsatisfying marriage. "Marriage is like the Middle East, isn't it? There's no solution. You jiggle things around a bit, give up a bit here, take a bit there, deal with

the flare-ups when they happen. But most of the time you just keep your head down, observe the curfew, and hope that the ceasefire holds."

Beyond her disappointment with sex (she has a lovely monologue about discovering the clitoris which predates Eve Ensler by a decade), Shirley has a dissociative reaction to her name and who she is, to the point where she breaks down and cries and tells the wall she doesn't even recognize herself anymore. "If you were to describe me to me, I'd think you were telling me a joke." Her single friend Jane has bought her a ticket for a fortnight in Greece. Her husband comes

home and reacts badly to her dinner of chips and egg, which we watch her prepare onstage in real time, leaving the theater with a greasy, buttery cooking smell. At the beginning of the second scene in the first act, she leaves a note on the kitchen table. "Gone to Greece. Back in two weeks."

The second act opens with a purring Shirley seated on an Aegean cliff, at a taverna café in sunhat, shades and delightfully colorful leisure pants. Great work by costume designer Elivia Bovenzi Blitz. Her satisfied tilt of the head earns the audience's approval and applause. She now addresses her monologue to Rock.

Corinna May is no stand-up comic. There are opportunities to mimic voices in Shirley's life but she takes them easy and natural, never pushing or overselling the abundant humor in the script. She is someone you might pass by on the street or in the shop never imagining the treasures within. Her Shirley is easily relatable and altogether winning with sly asides showing a fierce intelligence and enormous sensitivity. She broke a wine glass early in the first act on the night I attended and she cleaned up the mess, repoured a fresh glass retrieved from the cupboard as

easily as she dispatched Joe's eggs and fried chips at the end of the scene which had been staged adroitly by Eric Hill to coincide with her short, embittered speech on love. It's a charming, lighthearted performance that can stun and wound you with its deep reservoirs of feeling and intelligence. I am indebted to Ms. May for such a graceful performance.

After a year and a half of enforced solitude, Shirley Valentine's plight can feel universal although there is no mistaking the feminist power of the piece. After all we've been through as a family, an audience and a country, we could do worse than listen to her: "We say we're fine. An' we carry on an' on until we die. An' most of us die...long before we're dead. An' what kills us is the terrible weight of all this unused life that we carry around."

"Shirley Valentine" is a restorative tonic that will move you, make you laugh and it has the power to set a fire in your soul.

"Shirley Valentine" is scheduled to play at the Berkshire Theatre through Sunday, Oct. 24.

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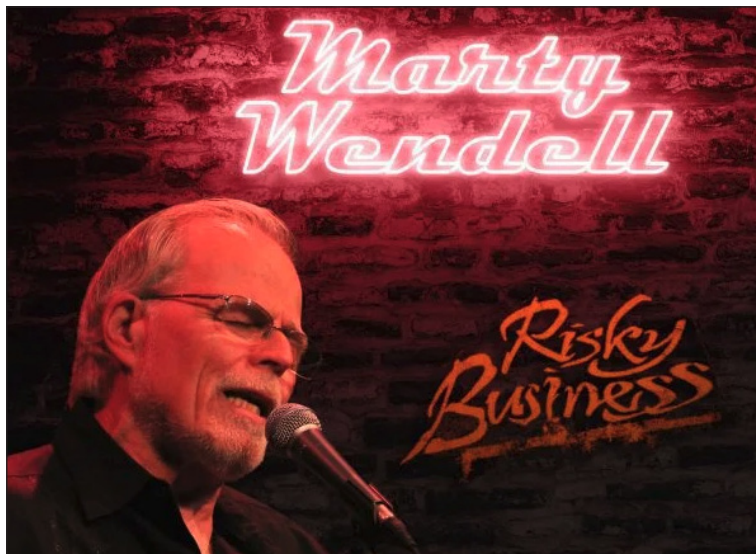
Marty Wendell's 'Risky Business'

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — Marty Wendell, following on the success of his last record, *Rock & Roll Days* – which was considered for a Grammy nomination for Best Americana Album – released his latest record, “Risky Business,” last week.

Celebrating a long and storied career, Marty has truly crafted an amazing piece of art. The first Nashville record he has created in 57 years, *Risky Business* features an incredible sense of songcraft, and production. Co-produced by Chris Scruggs (grandson of the legendary Earl Scruggs, and member of Marty Stuart’s band), as well as featuring his granddaughter, Lindsey Scruggs on “Cutting Room Floor” and “Like a Ghost,” tracks three and nine, respectively, a sense of Nashville royalty pervades this record. Chock-full of Americana and Country Western flavors, and with a booming voice reminiscent of the late, great, Johnny Cash, there’s a lot to be received from this record.

With a rollicking guitar intro

in the opening and title track, “Risky Business,” (featuring Jerry Fox on guest vocals), one thing was clear: this record takes no time getting started. Containing songwriting that indicated a strong and steady practice in the craft, each song was delivered in an amazingly efficient way that felt neither too short, nor long. Other songs, such as “Grandpa,” (track two, featuring Marty’s granddaughter, Emily Quinn on guest vocals) which tackled the hard topic of familial shortcomings, were done in such a way that demonstrated Marty’s ease with painful honesty.

Though there were some

clipped phrases occasionally found in the record, this was largely combatted by the strong sense of unique imagery – at least to this listener – in certain situations. For example, in track three, “Cutting Room Floor,” (featuring Lindsey Scruggs on guest vocals) Marty discussed the life of an ex after the relationship, and how a movie of them would invariably be missing anything to do with their relationship. A realization from both sides of the partnership, this song dealt with the fact that although our loved ones can be the center of our damned universe during the course of said relationship, this

truth vanishes upon splitting, and we have to realize they’ll leave our mutual memories on the cutting room floor of their minds.

Much of this album felt largely autobiographical, especially the tunes, “Chasin’ a Dream,” “The Lovelight,” and “The Writing on the Wall,” tracks four, five, and six, respectively. That being said, there were some sonic textures, such as the twelve-string guitars in “Chasin’ a Dream,” that at times gave the record a brief roots-rock feel to it; a nice change of pace. Judy Rodman delivers a great guest vocal on “The Lovelight.” As an aside, local bluegrass favorite, Melody Guarino, can be heard as a featured vocalist on “The Writing on the Wall.” With “All That’s Left,” (track seven, featuring Tim Brick on guest vocals) listeners get a chance to hear some higher registered notes that really complement the overall rustic baritone for which Marty is known. “Second Chances,” (track eight, featuring Linda McKenzie), contains the curious oxymoronic line, “Every day there’s always second chances.”

Perhaps my favorite track on the whole album, “Like a Ghost” (track nine, featuring Lindsey Scruggs on guest vocals) was incredibly unexpected to this listener. Bolstered by a Bolero groove right from its start,

this song changed up the pace of the record that was for the most part fairly laidback and straightforward. The closing track, “Growing Old,” involved a narrator reminiscing on how the industry – for which he’s been a part of for six decades – used to be. With a sense of change that was promised and never came, the song tackled the perceived feelings and worries of irrelevance in a world that seems to make less and less sense to the narrator. It felt like a great concluding statement for this particular album.

There’s a lot to be said from such an album, whose every track includes at least one guest musician. In terms of guest spots, I thought it awesome that Sean Wendell, Marty’s son, was another huge part of this record, serving as co-producer along with guesting on some of the songs: “Chasin’ a Dream,” and “Growing Old.” On the former track, Sean’s wife Hillary also makes an appearance. This album was one hell of a team-effort; a fact which was more and more obvious as the songs continued on. Continue reading below to catch our discussion.

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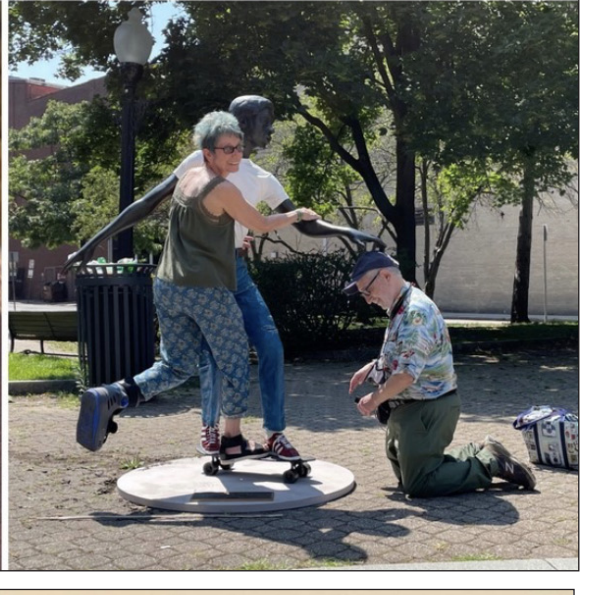
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
