

Climate concerns

States sees Selkirk as high risk of environmental burden while it weighs affects of climate change

ALBANY — The state Climate Action Council announced 10 hearings across New York to hear public comment on the draft scoping plan that's intended to target the reduction of greenhouse gases as guidelines under the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act.

Though SABIC is not specifically named on the State's interactive map identifying Selkirk as a vulnerable community, chemical processing is listed high on its criteria.

Northway crash claims life of Guilderland student

GUILDERLAND — An automobile accident on the Northway on Sunday, March 27 claimed the life of an 18-year old Guilderland High School senior.

According to State Police, Megi Hamza, of Guilderland was driving northbound at 4:46 a.m. in her 2006 Toyota Corolla when the car became disabled in the center lane. A tractor trailer stopped alongside Hamza and activated its hazard lights to assist her. Timothy Murphy, 72, of Glens Falls was driving a 2015 Chevrolet Tahoe in the right lane and changed lanes in response to the stopped tractor trailer, but failed to see Hamza stopped in the center lane and crashed into the back of the Corolla.

Hamza was transported to the Albany Medical Center hospital where

she died as a result of her injuries. Murphy was also transported to Albany Med with non life-threatening injuries. State Police are still investigating the crash.

In a letter to Guilderland Central School District Families on Sunday, Superintendent Marie Wiles said the district will provide support services for those affected by the loss.

"It is extremely difficult to face the death of a young person. Tomorrow, GCSD school psychologists, counselors and social workers will be available in the Large Group Instruction room at GHS to provide counseling and support to students and staff members," she said. "Students who would like to speak to someone in a more private setting should contact their school counselor or ask any staff member for help."

The letter also encouraged families to talk to their children and answer any questions related to the loss of Hamza. Discussing thoughts and feelings

is important in helping children work through grief, she said.

She said for families to contact Guilderland High School Principal Michael Piscitelli at 518-861-8591 if they need additional assistance.

"Megi will be remembered as warm and friendly, with a sweet disposition. Always positive and smiling, she lit up any room she was in. Many students were fortunate to call Megi their friend," Wiles said. "She touched many lives at GHS and will truly be missed."

Traffic stop leads to charges

GLENMONT — A traffic stop for license plate and tint violations led to the arrest of a Long Island man for DWAI on weapon and drug charges.

Matthew Denrich, 39, of Massapequa, was traveling on Kenwood Avenue on Sunday, March 19 when Bethlehem police performed a traffic stop for registration plate display and glass tint violations.

Denrich had a suspended license and the officer observed that he had slow and slurred speech as well as glassy, bloodshot and droopy eyes. According to reports, he said he had one beer.

When Denrich pulled his keys out of his sweatshirt, the officer noticed a small yellow bag containing a quantity of methamphetamine fall from his pocket. He was given and failed two of the standardized field sobriety tests and taken to the police station.

Police conducted a search of the vehicle and found two more glass pipes, one containing methamphetamine and the other marijuana residue. The search also found an open container of an alcoholic beverage, another bag of methamphetamine and a stun gun.

At the police station, Denrich refused chemical tests and was evaluated by a drug recognition officer.

He was charged with DWAI-drugs, criminal possession of a controlled substance, criminal possession of a weapon and aggravated unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle, all misdemeanors, and operation of a motor vehicle by an unlicensed driver, drinking alcohol in a motor vehicle, windshield/glass tint violation and registration plate display violation, all violations.

Denrich was issued a bill of particulars, traffic tickets and appearance tickets then released. He is scheduled to return to Bethlehem Town Court on Wednesday, April 5.

Felony Warrant

DELMAR — A Cohoes man charged with 15 offenses in October relating to a stolen U Haul and high speed chase was arrested again for failing to show up to Bethlehem Town Court.

The court issued a bench warrant for Jason Benn, 48, of Cohoes after he did not appear on Nov. 3.

Albany County jail officials notified Bethlehem police on Tuesday, March 15 that Benn was in custody and he was transported to Bethlehem to be processed.

He was sent back to the jail with a return to court date of March 27.

Then-Gov. Andrew Cuomo signed CLCPA into law in July 2019, committing the state to reduce carbon emissions to 40 percent below those of 1990 levels by 2030. It follows by further mandating levels to be reduced to 85 percent below 1990 levels by 2050. To reach net-zero emissions, the law calls on such acts as planting trees to offset the remaining 15 percent.

The law, which created the council, charged it with developing a scoping plan of recommendations to meet these targets. Part of that plan includes targeting 70 percent of its electricity from renewable sources, such as wind and solar, by 2030. It's also required to maximize reductions in disadvantaged communities.

Defining those communities relies on a criterion of factors that includes public health, environmental hazards and socioeconomic factors. It's a means of climate justice as certain socioeconomic groups are perceived to have been more harmed by pollution and climate change in relation to more affluent areas.

"Along with this draft criteria for disadvantaged communities, I encourage the public to review the Climate Action Council's draft scoping plan and participate in the public hearings to shape the final product as we work to implement a bold climate agenda," said Doreen M. Harris, New York State Energy Research Development Authority President and CEO, and Climate Action Council

Co-Chair. "These efforts are clearly and mindfully incorporating climate justice at its core to deliver opportunities and improved quality of life to under-resourced areas across New York State."

The Climate Justice Working Group, a subcommittee of the council, released an interactive map that establishes what communities need targeting under state criteria. Ravena and Bethlehem are named along with parts of Albany, Schenectady, Troy, Cohoes and Rensselaer.

By default, the map distinguishes disadvantaged communities in a plum color. A click on an individual area reveals two bar graphs, the first of which lists population characteristics and vulnerability. From here, the selected community is viewed as how it compares to nearly 5,000 others on bases of race, income, housing and health. The second graph covers environmental burden and climate change risk.

A swath of purple covers a part of Bethlehem, covering Glenmont, Selkirk and Cedar Hill, from the Albany City Line to the Town of Coeymans. Other than ranking above the 75th percentile under percentage of adults 65 or older (78) and percentage with disability (87), the community of 3,088 falls under a relatively low population vulnerability (22 percent).

Those numbers increase under environmental burden where the state ranks the community higher than 99 percent

than the rest of the state. Numbers are particularly high, at or above the 75th percentile, in seven subcategories; scrap metal processing (75), agricultural land use (75), inland flooding risk (79), wastewater discharge (83), driving time to urgent care (86), regulated chemical sites (96) and diesel traffic (96).

The Village of Ravena falls at 24 percent under population vulnerability and 94 percent under environmental burden; the highest of its factors include

industrial manufacturing/mining (96), driving time to urgent care (97) and scrap metal processing (98).

Once identified, disadvantaged communities would receive at least 35 percent of the overall benefits of spending on clean energy and energy efficiency programs. This would include such things as preferential placement of projects, employment programs and additional investments. One such example includes installing monitoring programs that would address air quality

problems as they arise.

Bethlehem Town Supervisor David VanLuven said he welcomes any resources the state can share to help his town.

"Climate change affects everyone in every community, but not everyone has access to resources to deal with new challenges or to take advantage of emerging opportunities," he said. Bethlehem Town Supervisor David VanLuven. "Our community has a wide

range of incomes and many would benefit from the support. I also appreciate the state's commitment to ensuring equitable distribution of resources and opportunities in Bethlehem and our neighboring communities."

The council released its draft scoping plan on Jan. 1. It can be viewed at <https://climate.ny.gov/>. Public comments will be received through June 10. A public hearing is called for Thursday, April 14, at 4 p.m. at the Empire State Plaza.

When this kid talks, people listen

Investment strategy earns national win for BC senior

DELMAR — Short-term losses but long-term gain.

That's the way you could sum up BC student Daniel Zhou's experience with this year's Stock Market Game and its culminating activity, the InvestWrite essay contest. While the Stock Market Game gives students the opportunity to build a virtual portfolio over a three-month period, the InvestWrite essay challenges the same students to address real-world financial issues and situations by writing about their long-term investment strategies.

And while Zhou's virtual short-term investments tanked over those three months, his essay soared.

The most recent InvestWrite competition challenged students like Zhou to describe an investment portfolio of stocks, bonds and mutual funds in sectors destined to transform the future, from technology to

medicine to transportation.

By choosing space exploration as the final frontier for young investors, Zhou described his investment plan as one featuring companies and investments that in his words will "back the innovation that catalyzes and supports the efforts to carry humanity into a new era." With captivating writing and ideas, the BC senior's essay wowed a panel of experts and has been judged to be the best in the country, out of nearly 2,800 high school entries.

The InvestWrite essay contest and the Stock Market Game are financial education programs sponsored by the SIFMA Foundation. SIFMA is the leading trade association for broker-dealers, investment banks and asset managers operating in the U.S. and global capital markets. For more than a decade, the programs have been part of the BC experience for students of Jason Majewski, who teaches economics at the high school.

Zhou and Majewski were both recognized Thursday, Mar. 24 with the surprise announcement that Zhou was

both the New York State winner and the national InvestWrite winner. That announcement was made by SIFMA Foundation representatives, including the foundation's president Melanie Mortimer.

"SIFMA Foundation congratulates Daniel and his teacher on this remarkable achievement," said Melanie Mortimer, President of the SIFMA Foundation, who joined the celebration via Zoom. "They are a powerful example of the impact our programs can have in classrooms nationwide. We are preparing youth to navigate the capital markets and financial decision-making, equipping them early on for lifelong success."

Zhou explained to Mortimer that his interest in space exploration came about through his role on the school's speech and debate team.

"I do public forum debate and one of the topics was about the Space Force," said Zhou, who runs a Speech and Debate summer camp. "My research into that was how I first came to understand the potential of

this industry and some of the companies that were involved with space exploration as a whole."

Zhou used some of that research to identify companies and investment funds that he thinks will be at the forefront of space exploration or space-based defense systems. His essay, which can be read below, and the 2,666 other high school entries were judged by a network of 2,000 investment professionals who work at institutions such as Fidelity Investments, Deloitte, Morgan Stanley and the European Central Bank.

At the announcement on Thursday, Zhou was presented with several prizes, including two large trophies, a \$750 Amex gift card, a banner and more. For his role, Mr. Majewski also received a \$750 prize. An additional \$100 is being made available to fund a classroom celebration.

Bethlehem Central High School has had several top InvestWrite and Stock Market Game finishers, including four other InvestWrite New York State first-place winners.

"There is quite the legacy at Bethlehem Central High School," said Liz Reidel, national director of the SIFMA Foundation, who delivered the trophies to Zhou in person. "You are at the top of the heap."

The goal of the InvestWrite competition is to ensure young people are exposed to the essentials of personal finance early in life and to encourage students to consider careers in financial services.

Zhou, who is planning to attend Dartmouth in the fall, admits he is considering a career path in business but also has aspirations that hit closer to home.

"I'm thinking I want to go into finance but ultimately I'd like to be a high school teacher," said Zhou.

Superintendent Jody Monroe, who attended the surprise celebration along with high school principal Dave Doemel, cheered Zhou's response by saying, "You're hired!"

State issues new fishing regs

Streamlined rule changes to take effect on Apr. 1

ALBANY — New York State Department of Environmental Conservation announced the adoption of new freshwater fishing regulations that will take effect on April 1.

Following a public comment period on the draft proposals earlier this year, the new regulations reflect the input received and the support of the angling community in DEC's efforts to make fishing New York's waters less complicated and easier to understand.

"The new regulations adopted today coupled with the reformatted Freshwater Fishing Regulations Guide reflect DEC's sustained commitment to ensuring the enjoyment of both novice and expert anglers in New York State by making fishing easy and accessible," Commissioner Basil Seggos said. "Amendments to freshwater fishing regulations provide greater consistency and significantly reduce special regulations while still maintaining protective measures to sustain the health of the State's

fisheries."

DEC is implementing changes to reduce the number of special regulations while still providing the protections necessary to ensure sustainable fisheries, including changing some statewide regulations for certain species and eliminating special regulations that are no longer necessary. Some of the new statewide regulations were already broadly applied via special regulations. Some special regulations are still necessary, particularly for waters that require unique management strategies to achieve desired fisheries outcomes, but DEC has significantly reduced the number of special regulations. Additional changes include opening the season for all sportfish on a hard date and allowing ice fishing in waters inhabited by trout in most of the state.

DEC also adopted more conservative harvest regulations for sunfish to protect populations from overharvest and increased the minimum size limit for crappie to 10 inches to improve the stability and size structure of populations. DEC also placed experimental

regulations on 11 waters to determine if larger sunfish can be produced under a 15-fish-per-day harvest limit and an eight-inch minimum size limit.

A complete compilation of changes and an assessment of public comment associated with the final rulemaking is available on the DEC website. Major regulation changes include; new

Poll: Inflation is weighing on our minds

Siena Poll says 70 percent sees inflation having 'serious impact' on personal finances

LOUDONVILLE — Seventy percent of recently polled New Yorkers say inflation is having a very or somewhat serious impact on their personal finances — 26 percent of which say “very serious.”

Meanwhile, 54 percent say the war in Ukraine and the international response to it will lead to long-term economic problems resulting in personal financial difficulties all American will face for years.

“Inflation had gotten New Yorkers’ attention, but now add in war in Ukraine and consumers

are very concerned, and many are planning to cut back,” according to SCRI Director, Don Levy. “While a third think the war will soon be over and that our finances will not be largely affected, over half believe the war in Ukraine will generate economic shock waves that New Yorkers will face for years to come.”

In light of current economic conditions and the war in Ukraine, 87 percent are concerned about food prices, 80 percent are concerned with the cost of gasoline, 76 percent with home utility costs, 71 percent with the worth of the American dollar and 68 percent with the value of their retirement accounts.

In response to price increases due to inflation, 69 percent say they will buy less, 67 percent will buy less expensive items and 28 percent plan to

dip into savings to pay everyday expenses. More than a third, 35 percent, plan to get a second job or generate another source of income while 34 percent say they will postpone or cancel a vacation. Just 10 percent say they will continue to spend as before.

“With the pandemic’s effects lessening, New Yorkers were ready to exhale, but economic conditions and war in Eastern Europe have us holding our breath again,” Levy said. “We will have to wait and see how the economy reacts this spring and summer and what the impact of war in Ukraine will be, but for now, New Yorkers weary from two years of COVID, are expressing economic concerns that will preoccupy their decisions and perhaps slow economic activity in New York.”


NYS added 39K private-sector jobs in February

ALBANY — According to preliminary seasonally adjusted figures released last week by the New York State Department of Labor, the number of private-sector jobs in New York State increased over the month by 39,800, or 0.5 percent, to 7,888,300 in February 2022. By comparison, the number of private-sector jobs in the U.S. increased by 0.5 percent in February 2022.

New York State's private-sector jobs (not seasonally adjusted) increased by 458,000, or 6.3 percent, over the year in February 2022. By comparison, the number of private-sector jobs in the U.S. increased by 5.4 percent over the year.

New York State's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased from 5.3 percent to 4.9 percent in February 2022.

The number of private-sector jobs is based on a payroll survey of 18,000 businesses conducted by the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.



Nonfarm and private sector jobs within New York state increased in February after a sharp decline during the 2020 pandemic. Jobs, however, are still not at the same level as they were prior to mandated COVID-19 shutdowns.

statewide regulation for rainbow, brown trout, and splake in lakes and ponds. The season will now be open year-round, with a five-fish daily limit, any size, with a "no more than two longer than 12 inches" harvest rule.

Changes also include statewide Atlantic salmon regulations will now allow for a year-round open

season and ice fishing is permitted on all waters in New York unless specifically prohibited.

New state also declares specific dates rather than floating dates for statewide season openers.

May 1 - Walleye, Northern Pike, Pickerel and Tiger Muskellunge;

June 1 - Muskellunge. Note that in 2022, DEC

will allow for the fishing of muskellunge beginning the last Saturday in May to accommodate previously planned fishing trips; and

June 15 - Largemouth and Smallmouth Bass.

A five-fish daily walleye limit in Oneida Lake;

A new regulation to limit the growth of the walleye population in Skaneateles Lake. No daily possession limit; 12-inch minimum size limit, open year-round;

The statewide sunfish daily harvest limit has been

reduced from 50 to 25 fish; and

The statewide minimum size limit for crappie has been increased from nine inches to 10 inches.

New 2022 Freshwater Fishing Regulations Guide In 2021, DEC removed advertisements and articles from the annual fishing regulations guide to make it easier to use.

This approach and larger print size continues this year, along with more improvements to facilitate finding regulations.

Measuring 5 ½ x 8 ½ inches, the new guide allows anglers to keep a copy in their glovebox or tacklebox.

The new guide will be posted to the DEC website to download or print at home later this month. Hard copies of the guide are currently being produced and guides are anticipated to be available at License Issuing Agents by the second week of April. CSX Corp asks shareholders: reject 'mini-tender'

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — CSX Corp recommended to its shareholders to net tender their shares to an unsolicited "mini-tender" offer made by TRC Capital Investment Corp in a statement released Wednesday, March 23.

CSX Corp. announced it received notice of an unsolicited "mini-tender" offer by TRC Capital Investment Corporation to purchase up to four million shares of CSX common stock at a price of \$34.75 per share in cash.

The offer price is 4.43 percent below the \$36.34 closing price of CSX common stock on March 18, the last trading day before the mini-tender commenced.

CSX is not affiliated with TRC and does not endorse TRC's unsolicited offer.

"CSX recommends that CSX shareholders do not tender their shares in response to the offer because the offer is at a price below the current market price for CSX shares," the company shared in its statement. "The offer is also subject to a number of conditions, including TRC's

ability to secure sufficient financing to consummate the offer."

The railroad company also urged its shareholders to obtain current market quotes for their shares, to review the conditions to TRC's mini-tender offer, to consult with their brokers or financial advisors and to exercise caution with respect to TRC's mini-tender offer.

Mini-tender offers seek to acquire less than five percent of a company's outstanding shares. Consequently, these mini-tender offers can avoid disclosure and procedural requirements of U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission, or SEC, rules that apply to offers for more than five percent of a company's outstanding shares. As a result, mini-tender offers do not provide investors with the same level of protections as provided by larger tender offers under U.S. securities laws.

The SEC has cautioned investors about mini-tender offers noting that "some bidders make mini-tender offers at below-market prices, hoping that they will catch investors off guard if the investors do not compare the offer price to the current market price." The SEC also published investor tips regarding

these offers on its website at <http://www.sec.gov/investor/pubs/minitend.htm>.

GE to speed up software certification for military systems

NISKAYUNA — GE Research, the central technology development arm for the General Electric Company, is leading a \$10.5 million project through the Defense Advanced Research Agency's Automated Rapid Certification of Software program, to revolutionize the process of certifying software for critical military and industrial systems.

DARPA's ARCOS program is focused on accelerating new developments that reduce the time and cost of certifying new software or software updates to the Department of Defense's large military platforms. Today, this process is largely manual and highly dependent on a variety of human subject matter experts that must evaluate millions of lines of code and other verification data when reviewing the certification of software for a typical system. The ARCOS program is aiming to achieve a

more principled and automated certification process.

Kit Siu, a Principal Engineer on GE Research's Controls and Optimization team, and Dr. Abha Moitra, a Principal Scientist in the Artificial Intelligence Group, are leading GE's ARCOS project. Siu and Moitra are creating an automated assurance model that can quickly gather and curate the right data and evidence to analyze for certification. This is wholly different from a typical App update we might experience as consumers with our mobile devices or PCs. As part of GE's project, Siu and Moitra will be developing and demonstrating an assurance model for a complex aerospace system, which involves a much bigger, more complex and safety critical application.

"A typical aerospace platform contains tens of millions of lines of software code," Siu said. "If you want to make any software changes or updates to that system, you must build what is known as an assurance case where you gather and curate the right data and evidence much like a lawyer would do to prepare for a big court case."

Moitra adds, "You must build a solid case that proves the changes being made will

not compromise the system. To make this process faster, we will be using AI, semantic technology, natural language processing, automation and data analytics to gather and curate the right evidence to build a thorough assurance case in an expedited manner."

GE Research is collaborating with GE Aviation Systems, a leading manufacturer of avionic systems; Galois, a leading developer of software to assess the trustworthiness of critical systems; and Guardtime Federal, which has developed a unique implementation of blockchain technology to secure the integrity of data used to manage critical systems.

Leading the team at Galois is Dr. David Archer, an expert in data-intensive systems and particularly in curating data and its provenance — the story of its origins, evolution, and resulting confidence in the data. "Unlike computer programs, which you can evaluate by formal methods or testing, data can't speak about its trustworthiness. A key piece of our work in ARCOS will be to give users of assurance evidence data a quantifiable confidence based on where the data originated, who touched it, and when it was modified."



Eddies names musical acts for April

SALEM — Greenwich-based band Eastbound Jesus and Guthrie/Bell Productions are back on Irwin Farm for the Eastbound Throwdown on Sept. 9 and 10.

The festival features two days of music and camping on the Irwin Family Farm. Erin Harkes to return to Proctors stage as emcee

SCHENECTADY — The musical line-up for the 4th annual Capital Region Thomas Edison Music Awards has been announced.

Erin Harkes, Buggy Jive, Nite Train w/ Thomasina Winslow, Hot Club of Saratoga, Rich Ortiz and Super 400 will perform during the 6 p.m. Sunday, April 24 Eddies Music Awards on the MainStage at Proctors.

Also announced: Erin Harkes is returning as emcee. Harkes, a musician and comedian, hosted the first Eddies Music Awards in 2019 and was a musical performer at the 2020 Eddies Music Hall of Fame induction ceremony.

This year's ceremony marks the first return of the Eddies to Proctors since its debut in 2019. The pandemic necessitated that the 2020 event be broadcast from a closed set and in 2021,

the Eddies was held in front of a limited audience at Universal Preservation Hall.

"This year's ceremony represents a little bit of the old and new," Eddies producer/founder Jim Murphy said. "While four performers are new to the Eddies stage, we brought back Rich Ortiz and Erin Harkes to recapture some of the magic of our pre-pandemic, high-spirited inaugural ceremony in 2019."

Buggy Jive is a soul rock singer-songwriter who describes himself as "equal parts (Led) Zeppelin and D'Angelo and Prince and Joni (Mitchell)." He has been nominated each year of the Eddies Music Awards including a record five nominations this year, and was a winner of Video of the Year in 2021 for "Ain't Going Anywhere."

Nite Train w/ Thomasina Winslow is a seven-piece blues outfit that has been active in the Capital Region for 19 years; singer-guitarist Winslow joined the band in 2019, the year that the band was an Eddies Music

Award nominee for Best Blues Act. The band released the album "Cat on A Mission" in late 2020.

Hot Club of Saratoga is a gypsy swing collective that plays a repertoire that reflects the spirit and style originated by Django Reinhardt and Stéphane Grappelli in The Quintet of the Hot Club of France that was prominent in the 1930s. The act is a 2022 Eddies nominee for Best Jazz Artist.

Rich Ortiz is a singer-songwriter who has opened for Chicago, REO Speedwagon, Styx and many other touring artists. He is a three-time Eddies nominee for Solo or Duo Performer of the Year (covers category), having won in 2019.

Rock trio Super 400 has released one live and four studio albums in their 26 years. All proceeds from their sold-out Troy Music Hall benefit concert on March 23 will be donated to Ukraine humanitarian relief.

How to overcome mental fatigue

Fatigue and exhaustion are often discussed in terms that characterize the physical effects that they have on the body. However, mental fatigue can be just as draining as physical exhaustion, even if its symptoms are not as evident as achy muscles or tired feet.

The online medical resource WebMD notes that mental fatigue typically arises when individuals focus on mentally challenging tasks for extended periods of time. Many individuals also experienced mental fatigue during the pandemic. Pandemic-related restrictions forced individuals across the globe to confront a number of unforeseen, unexpected challenges, including a sudden shift to remote work and school closures that forced working parents to juggle the rigors of their careers with the difficulties of remote learning. That upheaval contributed to prolonged mental fatigue for many individuals.

Much like athletes need routine breaks from exercise

to let their muscles recover, individuals need to look for ways to give their overworked minds a chance to recuperate from fatigue. Each person is different, but these strategies can help people overcome mental fatigue.


- Take breaks from the news. Overconsumption of news is one potential contributor to mental fatigue. That's especially so in the digital age, when the latest headlines are never further than a smartphone away. The Johns Hopkins Women's Mood Disorders Center notes that limiting news consumption during stressful times can be an effective way to reduce symptoms of stress, including mental fatigue.

- Schedule time to relax. The pressure to feel as if you should always be doing something, whether it's working, taking care of your family or tackling a to-do list around the house, can contribute to mental fatigue. Schedule time to relax and make a concerted effort to keep that time open. Avoid using scheduled relaxation time to work on household chores or check work

emails. Instead, use this time to do something you find genuinely relaxing, even if that activity feels like you're doing "nothing."

- Spot the signs of mental fatigue. Another way to overcome mental fatigue is to learn to recognize its symptoms. Recognition of these symptoms allows individuals to use them as alarm bells that alert them when it's time to take a step back and unwind. WebMD notes that mental fatigue symptoms include mood-related issues like increased irritability or anger; difficulty concentrating that makes it hard to finish tasks; zoning out; difficulty sleeping; and engaging in unhealthy behaviors, including overconsumption of alcohol.

The signs of mental fatigue may not be as instantly recognizable as the symptoms of physical exhaustion. But mental fatigue can be just as dangerous as physical tiredness if left unchecked.



Did you know?

A comprehensive review of research published between 1990 and 2020 studying the link between physical activity and mental health outcomes determined that nearly 90 percent of all peer-reviewed, published research reported a positive, statistically significant relationship between exercise/physical activity and mental health. Conducted by the John W. Brick Mental Health Foundation, the review found that 1,029 of the 1,158 experimental studies examined reported significant positive relationships between physical activity and mental health outcomes. General physical activity, a broad descriptor referring to the amount of daily or weekly physical activity people engage in irrespective of type, had the greatest number of positive studies of any type of physical activity, followed by cardiovascular and aerobic activity and yoga. Authors of the review concluded that their findings illustrate that exercise and movement can now be considered mainstream elements of mental health care.

Park and hike

The AMR is a privately owned 7,000-acre swath of land that begins at the Ausable Club off Route 73 in the Town of Keene. It runs along Lake Road and features a number of trail heads that lead to popular High Peaks like the Great Range, Dial, Nipple Top, Calvin and Blake mountains and smaller mountains like Noonmark. It also leads to destinations like Indian Head and Fish Hook Cliffs that overlook Lower Ausable Lake, as well as a number of streams and waterfalls.

Parking at a lot located about a quarter mile from AMR's iconic wooden gate was a first come first serve basis until the DEC and

the AMR initiated the parking permit system. The AMR has a long standing conservation easement with the DEC that allows the public to use the private land for hiking.

Years ago, there was a bus that took public hikers up and down Lake Road, dropping or picking them up from various trailheads, but today the bus is reserved for just Ausable Club members and the public must walk up the road that terminates some three miles from the parking lot at Lower Ausable Lake.

"DEC and the Adirondack Mountain Reserve are gearing up to launch the second year of our parking reservation partnership using the valuable input shared by hikers, local leaders, and other stakeholders committed to making the Adirondacks safer and more accessible," DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos said. "Tens of thousands of hikers and visitors successfully used

the system last year and we will continue to work with AMR and others to build upon the progress we've made to encourage the safe, sustainable use of our trails to benefit both the recreating public and our natural resources."

The permit system was met with mixed reactions from the hiking community with some saying the DEC should follow the national park system and parks in other states that require permits and/or fees for some activities in order to cut down on use and help preserve the land and others saying it should remain as is, forever wild and on a first come first basis. Parking, though, at the popular St. Huberts lot on the AMR was often unruly and overrun with hikers using "unofficial" spots on AMR land and along Route 73.

Last year, the pilot parking reservation system accepted registrations from 14,200 New Yorkers, 6,600 registrations from people residing out of state, and 138 people from other countries. While the Adirondacks are a popular spot for Canadian hikers, just 113 from north of

the border registered last year, a reflection of travel restrictions implemented because of the COVID-19 pandemic. That number is expected to increase this year.

Parking reservations at AMR are available at no-cost, and must be obtained for single-day or overnight use, getting dropped off or picked up in the AMR lot by a vehicle, or arriving by bicycle. Seventy reservations, including overnight reservations, are available per day. Walk-in users without a reservation are not permitted unless these users can provide a Greyhound or Trailways bus ticket from within the past 24 hours. Up to eight people can be included under one reservation.

Reservations can be made as far as two weeks in advance. New bookings for 2022 will open on April 17, and users will be able to make reservations 14 days out on a 24-hour rolling basis.

The system was put in place as interest in outdoor recreation activities, including hiking, ballooned in the past decade and illegal parking along Route 73, one of the most

picturesque roads in the country that stretches from the Northway past Lake Placid, became a safety issue. Also, the more popular trails in the Adirondacks are heavily used, particularly on weekends and holidays, leading to concerns about preserving certain areas of the 2.6 million park and having too many people on the trails also diminishes the outdoor experience.

"We are very pleased with the results of the first year of the reservation system which was able to meet and exceed the three primary goals of the pilot: (1) to improve the safety for all those who travel the Route 73 corridor, (2) to provide fair and equitable access to parking for all levels of the hiking community and (3) to preserve and protect both public and private lands for future generations," said John Schuler, general manager of the AMR. "The mission of the Adirondack Mountain Reserve, as stated in our conservation easement, is to preserve and protect the forests, lakes, mountain streams, and wildlife on our lands, and we believe

that our partnership with the DEC on the pilot parking reservation system is supporting our efforts to continue to carry out our mission. We are confident the second year will be even more successful."

When compared to previous years, 2021's reservation system resulted in visitor use at AMR more equally distributed throughout the week. This information is valuable in helping DEC and AMR determine if the pilot system is reducing the heavy use typically experienced on weekends or holidays, and if dispersing visitors will help both minimize natural resource impacts from crowded trails and provide visitors with a more natural experience.

Parking at other trailheads, like the Garden, the Adirondack Loj and Upper Works remain on a first come first serve basis. Those owned by the Adirondack Mountain Club require a fee.

In 1956 Thomas Hart Benton was commissioned by Robert Moses, chairman of the New York Power Authority, to create two murals for the powerhouse building of the state's first hydropower facility in Massena.

They feature Jacques Cartier's explorations of the St. Lawrence River and the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Alternately titled The Seneca Discover the French and Jacques Cartier Discovers the Indians, the murals depict the 16th-century encounters from two points of view. These life groups were on view at the Museum when it was at the State Education Building.

The original building in Massena where these murals were displayed is now closed to the public. They were removed and conserved beginning in 2018 and are on loan to the New York State Museum until Dec 31. Also, "a small fort, which our people call Fort Orange." This exhibition examines the momentous discovery of Fort Orange and the lasting impact of events occurring there 400 years ago that shaped the character of the region, state, and the nation. A healthy twist to classic Sloppy Joes

Sweet yet savory ground meat served on a bun is a comfort food classic that has been a staple for restaurants and home cooks for decades.

Sloppy Joes are beloved sandwiches that feature meat paired with a lip-smacking, tomato-based sauce. Some attribute the original Sloppy Joe to a café in Sioux City, Iowa, where in 1930 a cook named Joe added tomato sauce to his “loose meat” sandwich. Others say the sandwich evolved from sandwiches that were introduced by Floyd Angell, the founder of the Maid Right Restaurants, in 1926. Others attribute the recipe to a bar and café in Havana, Cuba, called “Sloppy Joe’s.”

Though the origin story is debatable, most people agree that the sandwiches are delectable. Sloppy Joes are called by many different names in various parts of the country, including yum yums, steamers and slushburgers. While it’s traditional to make them with ground beef, any other meat can be substituted, including ground turkey for a leaner take. Try this recipe for “Turkey Sloppy Joes for a Crowd” from “Taste of Home Healthy Cooking Cookbook” (RDA Enthusiast Brands, LLC) by the Taste of Home Kitchen.

Turkey Sloppy Joes for a Crowd

INGREDIENTS: Serves 16

- 3 pounds lean ground turkey
- 3 medium green peppers, chopped
- 3 medium onions, finely chopped
- 2 1/4 cups ketchup
- 3/4 cup water
- 3 tablespoons white vinegar
- 3 tablespoons spicy brown mustard
- 1 jalapeño pepper, seeded and chopped
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 16 whole wheat hamburger buns, split

INSTRUCTIONS

In a Dutch oven coated with cooking spray, cook the turkey, green peppers and onions over medium heat until the meat is no longer pink and the vegetables are tender; drain.

Stir in the ketchup, water, vinegar, mustard, jalapeño, and pepper. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer for 20-30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Serve on buns.






Upgrade the safety features in your bathroom

Bathrooms can benefit from updates that improve their form and function. While styles and color patterns may inspire bathroom renovations, improvements to safety also should be considered.

Bathrooms can be one of the most dangerous rooms in a house. Bath and shower areas account for about two-thirds of accidental injuries in these spaces. Many other injuries involve the toilet. In 2008, a thorough investigation of bathroom dangers conducted by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found that mishaps near the bathtub, shower, toilet, and sink caused an estimated 234,094 nonfatal injuries in the United States among people aged 15 years and older.

Seniors are particularly vulnerable in the bathroom due to reduced mobility and flexibility, visual impairment and other factors. However, some key modifications can make bathrooms much safer for aging populations.

• **Raised toilet seat:** Install an ADA-compliant



raised toilet seat. Standard toilet seats are roughly 15 inches high, but elevated seats can raise the bowl an additional two to four inches. Another option is to invest in risers that can be attached to an existing toilet.

• **Grab bars:** Seniors may use towel holders as grab bars, which don't have stability and can dislodge from the wall. Install secured side grip bars by the toilet and inside the shower to make maneuvering easier.

• **Water temperature:** Seniors may be vulnerable to hot water temperatures. Lower the water temperature setting on the hot water heater. StaySafe.org recommends 120 F.

• **Faucets:** Change faucet handles to paddle-style handles rather than knobs. Knobs can be challenging to grip for those with arthritis in their hands. Also, handles that are easier for seniors to use can reduce the risk of the elderly losing their balance as they attempt to gain leverage to turn the water on and off.

• **Nonslip mats:** Nonslip mats or tape strips can be

used in showers and tub bottoms, as well as outside of the shower to reduce the risk of slips and falls. Rugs should have rubberized, slip-resistant backing.

• **Rounded corners:** Choose counters and fixtures with rounded corners. Should a senior fall against something, the rounded corner may prevent serious injury.

• **Shower benches and transfer seats:** Benches and transfer seats make it easier getting in and out of the shower. Also, sitting while showering reduces the risk of becoming light-headed or losing balance.

• **Walk-in tubs/showers:** Minimizing the threshold to the shower or bathtub is an important safety feature. Some manufacturers make walk-in tubs with doors that secure and make watertight seals. Showers that don't have a lip or tub to scale also are better for seniors.

Get Ready: Early Spring landscaping tips

During the cold months of winter, many people stare longingly out of the window dreaming of spring and time spent outdoors. For those with green thumbs, images of tending to the garden and other aspects of their landscapes no doubt dominate such daydreams.

Draw inspiration from those budding crocuses and daffodils pushing through the last remnants of snow and employ these tips to prepare for the upcoming gardening season.

Speak with representatives at a local lawn and garden center about which types of amendments you can add to the soil in your particular area to enrich it.
- Lawn and garden experts at The Home Depot suggest filling in bare patches of lawn now by mixing a

few shovelfuls of soil with grass seed. Then apply this patch to the bare areas, water, and continue to care for the area until the spot fills in.

- Spend a day in the garage or shed tending to the lawn mower and other gardening equipment. Clean all tools and ensure that everything works, repairing parts as needed.

- Give outdoor entertaining spaces a good scrubbing, clearing away dirt and grime that may have accumulated over the winter. Use a leaf blower to blow away any leftover leaves.

- Check if the front porch, railings or decking need painting and/or staining. Tackle these projects when the weather is cooler so everything will be ready for those peak spring days.

- Think about any annuals you might want to plant in the landscape this year that will complement any existing shrubbery or perennials. Come up with a theme so that the entire yard is cohesive.

Before homeowners know it, winter is gone and it is time to once again enjoy long days spent outdoors. Get a jump start on spring lawn prep as soon as you can.



The Psychedelic Furs, Royston Langdon at Empire Live

ALBANY — Former Spacehog, former Arckid, former Leeds and ex-son-in-law of Steven Tyler, Royston Langdon took the Empire Live stage solo armed with his acoustic guitar, cowboy hat, and white sunglasses on Monday night, March 21, breaking the ice with his new song about his “Nazi Girlfriend” from his 2021 release “Chains.” He followed with the Spacehog hit “In The Meantime,” Tin Machine’s “Amazing,” and Arckid’s “Germany.” He ended the set with a cover of David Bowie’s “Ashes to Ashes,” after a tribute to the late icon — and the loss of a guitar string which failed to slow down his strong opening set.

Backlit and rocking, The Psychedelic Furs commanded the stage from the start with song after song. “The Ghost In You,” “Pretty In Pink,” “Love My Way,” “President Gas,” “Heaven,” “Heartbreak Beat” — a strong of songs reminding the John Hughes-bred crowd why these songs were in constant rotation as they struggled through art school in the ’80s.

Richard Butler’s corrosive rasp was in fine form as he raffishly draped himself over band members, raised his arms in artful poses, and easily lowered himself into deep bows belying his 65-year-old knees.

New songs “Wrong Train,” “The Boy That Invented Rock And Roll,” and “Don’t Believe” from “Made Of Rain,” the band’s first release in almost three decades fit right in stylistically with their classics. The night was drenched with synth and sax. With hardly a beat between songs and minimal banter, the Furs delivered a tight, propulsive presentation encoring with Sister Europe and India, both from their excellent 1980 eponymous debut.

Nektar at The Linda

ALBANY — Cosmic, man. The venerable Nektar trundled into The Linda on Thursday night, March 24 to treat a small but devoted audience for a two-hour-plus set of their psychedelically tinged prog rock.

Amazingly, this is the 53rd year of the band’s existence. Even more notable is that 3 of the original 5 members are still in place; drummer/vocalist Ron Howden, bassist/vocalist Derek “Mo” Moore, and lighting technician (or as he is grandly titled “Visual Environment”) Mick Brockett, non-playing yes, but always considered an essential part of the team. Moore proudly stated of his rhythm section partner: “Ron and I have been playing together for 60 years!”

The band is rounded out by newer recruits Randy Dembo — bass/guitar/pedals, Ryche Chlanda — vocals/guitar, Kendall Scott — keys, and MaryAnn Castello — backing vocals.

Unfortunately, Chlanda (replacing original frontman Royce Albrighton, who passed away in 2016) struggled to meet the requirements of the role. Maybe he was just having an off night, but his vocals did not seem up to the task, constantly veering off-key, out of time, and in some instances missing lines altogether. The same can be said for his guitar solos, overly relying on his wah-wah pedal and whammy bar, and often failing to mesh with the rest of the band. Castello, in darkness at the back of the stage, was under-utilized. I suggest that she could have been given more vocal responsibility to help Chlanda out. Or maybe give more passages to Howden, who handled his few vocal sections with more confidence.

Regardless, the majority of the audience (mostly bearded prog grey hairs, er, like myself) appeared to have no such misgivings and gave the band a warm and appreciative reception throughout.

And, I too, was pleased to see a veteran band, whose music I have long enjoyed, still treading the boards. Even if they didn’t play “Astral Man.”


