Facing 15 to Life

Suspect Jacob Klein pleaded not guilty to New Scotland murder

NEW SCOTLAND — Faced with a minimum sentence of 15 years to life for murder, Jacob L. Klein entered a not guilty plea while he was arraigned in Town Court on Thursday afternoon, April 21.

Klein walked into the New Scotland Town Court handcuffed, wearing the county-issued red t-shirt and red and white checkered pants. The cleanly shaven scalp revealed days before in a Virginia mugshot was now showing hints of growth through a dark shadow. He answered just two questions, his plea and whether he received a copy of the felony complaint against him, a charge of second-degree murder that carries a maximum life sentence.

DELMAR — Bethlehem police responded to a report of a vehicle fire on Meads Lane on Friday, April 15. The responding officer

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spoke with the caller, Robert Davies, 28 of Slingerlands, who was standing outside his burning Ford Maverick Truck. According to reports, Davies said he was out for a joy ride in his brand new truck and got stuck in a ditch. Authorities believe that because the truck had been recently undercoated, a fire started underneath as he tried to get it out of the ditch.

The truck was fully engulfed in flames when police arrived and Davies had burns on his body.

The officer observed the strong odor of an alcoholic beverage on Davies' breath and his eyes were glassy and bloodshot. He said he had consumed some glasses of wine. The officer also noticed tire tracks in the field off Meads Lane.

Police administered field sobriety tests which Davies allegedly failed and an alcohol pre-screening device allegedly showed the presence of alcohol on his breath.

was arrested for the third time for not appearing for his court hearing.

Robert Tracy, 42, was arrested and charged with burglary, a felony, and conspiracy, possession of burglar tools and petit larceny, all misdemeanors, on July 20, 2020 after a year-long investigation. He

was sent to Albany County Jail, but Bethlehem Town Justice Andrew Kirby signed a bench warrant for Tracy on Sept. 8, 2021 after he did not return to court.

Albany police arrested him on Thursday, Jan. 6 on that warrant. Tracy was arraigned by Justice Ryan Donovan and was scheduled back on Tuesday, Jan 18. He was then released to State Police on another warrant. He was released after being processed on the State Police warrant.

Then on Friday, April 15, he was turned over by Colonie police on another Bethlehem bench warrant for failing to show up in January. This time, he was remanded to the Albany County Jail to await a hearing on Tuesday, April 19.

According to the Bethlehem Town Court, he appeared at that hearing and was sent back to the Albany County Jail to await a Tuesday, May 17 court return date.

Snow cripples region

A foot of snow dumped on hilltowns, a few inches at Albany International

ALBANY COUNTY — An early spring snowstorm that brought gusty winds and dumped more than a foot of snow in the hilltowns left thousands of residents without power on Tuesday, April 19.

Counties west and north of the Capital District suffered the brunt of the storm, dropping 18 inches of snow. Wind gusts of up to 50 mph in some areas left hundreds of toppled trees, tree limbs and downed wires in its wake. National Grid said the storm knocked power out for more than 200,000 state residents.

According to the National Weather Service, Albany International Airport recorded only 2.8 inches of snow by Tuesday morning, but areas west and at higher elevations received more. Altamont reported 6.2 inches. The towns of Knox and South Berne recorded 7.5 and 8.5, respectively. Rensselaerville recorded the highest snowfall with 12.6 inches.

Within 24 hours, National Grid crews had restored power to 200,000, or 90 percent, of the 221,000 upstate New York customers impacted by the severe weather that caused significant and widespread damage across central, northern and eastern New York this week.

Matt Barnett, Vice President of New York Electric Operations, said 3,600 employees were still working on restoring power by the end of last week.

Town agrees to county first response

DELMAR — The Bethlehem Town Board entered into an agreement another one-year agreement with Albany County in order to utilize its Advanced Life Support First Response Sevices.

The one-agreement runs through the calendar year, from January 1 to December 31, and carries a price tag of \$1,246,285.16. As one of the leading agencies in the region, the EMS unit teams lifesaving treatments with highly trained professionals to ensure fast and critical care is available, 24 hours a day. In addition to responding to 911 calls, the EMS unit provides personnel to support other specialty teams with the Sheriff's Office.

Town Justice David Wukitsch explained that the Class A felony prevented him from setting bail. Klein was remanded to the custody of the Albany County Sheriff. A preliminary hearing has been set for Monday, April 25.

The Cobleskill native is accused of driving from his Virginia home to Albany, where he allegedly stalked New Scotland resident Elana Radin for three days before killing her husband, Philip L. Rabadi on Wednesday, April 13.

"These are very serious allegations," said New York City defense attorney Mark A. Bederow, pleading with the public to allow due process to proceed before judging his client. He followed by expressing sympathy for the victim's family. "We feel terrible for the Rabadi family, his wife and family."

Klein was arrested last Friday, just two days after the 35-yearold Rabadi was found dead in his New Scotland home. A sheriff's deputy had found him bound and slain in his garage following a welfare check when Rabadi failed to report to work at St. Peter's Hospital.

Klein, a prior acquaintance of Rabadi's wife, was quickly named as a person of interest. He was taken into custody shortly after he crossed the border into Virginia Friday evening. He was later arraigned in federal court before returning to Albany.

Radin and Rabadi were married last September. Their home was purchased less than two months before, according to a real estate website. They both worked at St. Peter's Hospital as physician assistants. Rabadi graduated from Guilderland High School before attending the University at Albany and later completing Albany Medical College's PA Program.

Klein, who turns 41 next month, is also a physician's assistant. The Times Union linked a connection with Radin through the SUNY College of Medicine in Brooklyn, from which they both graduated just a year apart.

"I will not comment on motive," Albany County Sheriff Craig Apple said on Saturday, "but we have a very good chronological breakdown of when he was up here, what he was doing up here, and where he was."

Some of the information gathered during the investigation included obtained footage captured on neighbors' doorbell cameras around Rabadi and Radin's home.

Bederow said he had not yet reviewed evidence from the case and was only familiar with the details shared through recent news coverage. He said he anticipates receiving more information from the prosecution's discovery within the coming weeks, some of which will be revealed at Monday's preliminary hearing. He warned reporters after the arraignment hearing to not be swayed by what has been previously shared through press conferences and statements.

"I would just caution the public to presume innocence as anyone is entitled to, and wait for the details to come from the courtroom and not through press conferences and releases from the police officers," he said.

Tax levy to go up

Guilderland Central cites inflation, contractual obligations as factors leading to 2.98% increase

GUILDERLAND — The Guilderland Central School District Board of Education adopted a \$109.9 million spending plan for the 2022-23 school year on Tuesday, April 12 — a 2.98 percent increase in the tax levy just within the maximum allowed.

This is the budget that will go before the community on Tuesday, May 17.

The district included inflation as one of "several cost pressures" leading to its proposed increase in spending. in an online statement, the district also shared contracted obligations towards transportation services, the nationwide shortage of available bus drivers, and an influx of new students with disabilities requiring specialized placements as factors.

"As a result, the district must spend more to sustain and maintain programs currently in place to continue to meet the needs of our students," stated the district. "The 22-23 school year budget makes it possible to lower class sizes in grade eight, expands the Altamont Elementary School library position and overall, aligns with the district's goals of educating the whole student, to ensure each and every student is ready and empowered to succeed in the future."

The increased spending pushes the tax levy up by 2.98 percent — below the maximum 3.2 percent allowed before requiring a supermajority of 60 percent of district voters to pass the budget.

One week prior to adopting the 2022-23 school year budget, the Board of Education held a budget workshop meeting on Tuesday, April 5. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the development of the budget for the 2022-23 school year and to continue to refine the spending plan. At this meeting, the discussion focused on two topics, the 2022-23 general operating budget and an update on the district's use of COVID-related federal funds. These are two separate and distinct aspects of GCSD's spending.

General operating budget

Neil Sanders, Assistant Superintendent for Business, presented the board with a budget worksheet that outlined details of the 2022-23 general operating budget, such as the budget increase, tax levy and tax levy increase.

Sanders explained that the only change made to the budget proposal since it was presented on March 8, was the adjustment of the allocation for the Altamont Elementary School librarian from 0.6 FTE to 0.8 FTE. The district will offset the cost of increasing the allocation through salary breakage. Salary breakage occurs when a staff member retires or resigns and is replaced by a new staff member at a lower salary rate. Having previously budgeted for a higher salary, the changes in personnel can result in some savings for the district, thereby the addition of 0.2 FTE for the AES librarian is cost neutral and will not have an impact on the general operating budget.

Update on GCSD use of federal funds

Sanders presented an update on the COVIDrelated federal funds GCSD received, the use of these funds to date, and the funds that remain to be used in the coming years. It is important to note that the federal funds the district has received are finite, meaning GCSD will receive them for a limited time period. Also, the use of these funds is restricted to specific purposes. Because of these parameters, GCSD will not use the COVIDrelated federal funds for ongoing or long-term costs. Federal funds have no bearing on the general operating budget proposed for the 2022-23 school year.

Coronavirus Response and Relief supplemental appropriations Act

GCSD is allocated \$4,995,166 for costs incurred from Mar. 13, 2020-Sept 30, 2023, with the purpose of preventing, preparing for and responding to COVID-19. CRRSA funds are intended to be used to:

• offer the opportunity to make the educational systems better for students, educators, staff, schools and their communities postpandemic;

• address the impact of lost instructional time due to the pandemic on all students;

• address pre-existing challenges that, if left unaddressed, will impede recovery from the pandemic.

American Rescue Plan

GCSD is allocated \$2,807,951 for costs incurred from Mar. 13, 2020-Sept. 30, 2024, with the purpose of safely reopening and sustaining the safe operation of schools and to address the impact of the coronavirus pandemic on students. ARP funds are intended to be used for:

• reopening schools safely and sustaining their safe operation;

• addressing students' social, emotional, mental health, and academic needs resulting from the pandemic.

The conditions associated with the use of ARP funds are that schools must reserve at least 20% of the funds to address learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based interventions. ARP funds must also address the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on underrepresented student subgroups.

Management of federal funds

When allocating the use of federal funds, Sanders stressed that these funds represent a one-time infusion of cash with the purpose of addressing specific, short-term needs the district has as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. If federal funds are not managed carefully, the district could be left in a difficult and precarious financial position when these funds are exhausted. Most importantly, these funds should not be used to offset recurring costs.

How GCSD has used federal funds

Dr. Marie Wiles, Superintendent of Schools, presented how GCSD has used federal funds to date. As the school year has unfolded, the district has assessed immediate student needs and leveraged the federal funds to address these needs with additional services. Some examples include academic intervention services, additional counseling support in the elementary school buildings, tutoring, reading interventions, literacy lessons, a floating nurse and teacher aides. By addressing the current needs of students and staff through federal funds, GCSD is able to assist these specific groups in recovery from the pandemic.

Presently many GCSD students are participating in New York State assessment tests, which will provide the district with a source of data on how well students are learning. This and other data will be used to inform a plan to best spend federal funds in the 2022-23 and 2023-24 school years to meet the most pressing needs. To engage students, GCSD will be using a portion of the funds to upgrade materials, including classroom books, Chromebooks and musical instruments.

The U.S. team competed on Saturday against Grenada. The U.S. team won 20-0. Hutton wears jersey number 13. The team competed against Puerto Rico on Monday, April 25, and Costa Rica on Wednesday, April 27.

House prices surge

Realtors: Inventory at 'critically low' levels

ALBANY – Median

sales prices rose once again in the Empire State in March while the number of homes available for sale has reached critically low levels, according to the housing report released today by the New York State Association of Realtors.

Inventory of homes for sale across New York State fell 22.6 percent from 39,707 homes available in March 2021 to just 30,724 units last month. Months' supply of inventory declined 25 percent from 3.2 months of inventory in March 2021 to just 2.4 months in March 2022. A 6-month to 6.5-month supply is considered to be a balanced market.

Median sales prices continued to rise, reaching \$410,000 in March 2022 compared to \$362,315 in March 2021. This represents a 13.2 percent increase. Median sales prices have now increased for 23 consecutive months in year-over-year comparisons.

New listings were down 4.7 percent in March – from 17,783 in 2021 to 16,951 new listings in 2022. Closed sales also fell from 11,412 in March 2021 to only 10,350 last month. However, pending sales increased slightly, inching up 3.1 percent in March – from 13,507 homes in 2021 to 13,919 units in 2022.

Mortgage interest rates jumped over a quarter of a point in March. According to Freddie Mac, the monthly average on a 30-year fixed-rate mortgage rose from 3.76 percent in February 2022 to 4.17 percent in March 2022. This is the first- time interest rates have averaged over four percent since May 2019.

Albany County could see plans for Selkirk Reserve as soon as May

SELKIRK — Bethlehem could send the proposed 72-unit Selkirk Reserve project to the Albany County Planning Board as early as May.

Robert Leslie, Director of Economic Planning, said as much before the conclusion of last week's Planning Board meeting on Tuesday, April 19. Sending the project to the county review board would be just one step towards development. The proposal still requires SEQRA review before a public hearing.

Board members deliberated over the merits of connecting the development to Jericho Road. There were concerns the access road would create an unwanted cut-through for motorists driving between Jericho Road and U.S. Route 9W.

Selkirk Reserve is the only residential project going through the review process since the Town Board passed a development moratorium in December 2020. NPR Group, the Cleveland-based property group, received a waiver to continue its plan by a 4-1 vote of the Town Board last December.

NPR Group resubmitted a waiver request after pulling its request last May. It property management group returned once the Town considered extending its one-year moratorium another six months. Masks recommended

New COVID strain prompts St. Peters Hospital to restrict number of visitors again

ALBANY — Because of a spike in COVID-19 cases, the county Department of Health is "strongly recommending" everyone, regardless of vaccination status, wear a mask in all indoor public spaces, including private businesses.

The directive falls short of a mandate and there is no indication such an edict will be issued. Philadelphia was the first major city to to reinstate a mask mandate but rescinded the order just days later. Also, last week, St. Peter's Health Partners again limited the number of visitors at its locations in the Capital District including Samaritan Rehabilitation and Samaritan Memorial and St. Peters hospitals.

Six Albany County residents have died from the virus in just over a week, according to County Executive Dan McCoy.

The spike in Albany County mirrors other places across the country and the world.

As of Sunday, April 24, there were 65,758 confirmed cases in the county since the pandemic

took hold in March 2020, an increase of 1,018 from seven days prior.

Albany County's most recent seven-day average of COVID cases per 100,000 is now up to 33.1 (with an average percent positive rate of 10.6 percent), and the Capital Region's average of cases per 100,000 is now up to 31.8 (with an average percent positive rate of 9.4 percent) said McCoy in a statement. The county's seven-day average of new daily positive cases is now up to 134 from 119.1.

Statewide, on Monday, April 25, 5,931 people tested positive for COVID 19. The seven day average of cases per 100,000 is 32.2, a level not seen since February.

The death toll in Albany County stands at 547 since March 2020. The most recent fatalities include a man in his 50s, a woman in her 60s, a man and woman in their 70s, a woman in her 80s and a man in his 90s.

"My thoughts and prayers are with the families who lost loved ones to COVID complications," McCoy said. "This virus continues to spread at a rapid rate, though the number of individuals in our hospitals is remaining relatively low and stable for now. I'm happy to see the percentage of people getting their booster shots growing

quickly, which was down at 64.3 percent just three weeks ago."

As of Friday, April 22, there were 24 county residents hospitalized with one in the ICU.

More than 81 percent of all Albany County residents have received at least the first dose of the vaccine and nearly 75 percent are fully vaccinated. Statewide more than 90 percent of all residents have received at least the first dose and 77 percent are fully vaccinated.

Among the eligible population, 69.2 percent have now received at least one booster shot in Albany County.

Albany County Residents can receive free Pfizer, Moderna and Johnson & Johnson vaccines (including booster shots) Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., at the Albany County Department of Health located at 175 Green St. in Albany.

Homebound residents, which includes seniors, disabled individuals, those lacking childcare and those with other accessibility issues can get a vaccination delivered by calling (518) 447-7198.

Poll: State should reform bail reform

LOUDONVILLE — An overwhelming majority of voters, 67-14 percent, support the state's recent modification of the 2019 bail reform law, according to a recent poll by the Siena College Research Institute released earlier this week.

But, 38 percent say the amended law will have no impact the crime rate compared to 32 percent who say it will decrease it and 16 percent say it will decrease it.

"The changes the governor and Legislature made to the bail law — including giving judges more discretion on setting bail in certain instances — enjoy strong support from voters across the board, with at least 58 percent of voters of every party, region and race supporting the changes," said Siena College pollster Steven Greenberg. "While the original bail reform law is still viewed as bad for the state, 54-34 percent, down a little from 56-30 percent last month, that largely depends on which side of the aisle you sit on. The overwhelming majority of Republicans and independents continue to say the law has been bad for the state, and Democrats, by a narrower but growing margin say the law has been good for New York."

By an even larger margin, 73-16 percent, voters approve of the state suspending the 16 cent per gallon gas tax through December.

"For New Yorkers, reducing the gas tax appears to be in the same category as mom and apple pie," Greenberg said. "At least two-thirds of voters of every demographic group — party, region, age, gender, race, income, religion, ideology - approve of the state suspending its share of the gas tax between June and December."

There is also little doubt on where the majority of voters stand on the state contributing \$600 million towards a new stadium for the Buffalo Bills - 63 percent disapprove and 24 percent approve of the measure.

"Also uniting voters is their disapproval of the state kicking in \$600 million for a new Buffalo Bills stadium. It's opposed by at least 55% of every demographic group," Greenberg said. "Interestingly, upstaters are even less approving than downstaters of the stadium deal and are also less supportive of three New York City area casinos."

\$3M grant supports plague vax research

ALBANY — Albany Med scientists were awarded a \$3 million, five-year grant from the National Institutes of Health's National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases to develop a vaccine that could protect against plague.

A highly contagious disease caused by the bacteria Yersinia pestis (Y. pestis), plague has killed millions of people throughout history. Bubonic plague is the most common naturally occurring form of the three main types of plague, which also include pneumonic plague and septicemic plague. In the U.S., plague is most common in rural areas of the southwest, particularly New Mexico, Arizona and Colorado.

For the most part, plague today is treated with antibiotics; there is no vaccine currently available that provides long-term defense against it.

"While plague in humans is relatively rare, we've begun to see strains that are resistant to antibiotics and there are concerns it could be used as a bioweapon," explained Wei Sun, Ph.D., associate professor in the Department of Immunology and Microbial Disease at Albany Medical College, who is leading the study.

Dr. Sun and his team will attempt to modify another, lesslethal bacteria in the Yersinia family – Y. pseudotuberculosis (Yptb) – into a carrier for protective antigens against Y. pestis. After testing the protective immunity of this strain in animal models, they'll work to decipher the mechanisms of the immune protection it induces

SABIC sees way to carbon neutrality

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia — SABIC is of the view that digitalization will play a key role in improved plant reliability and performance, supplychain efficiency, and enhancing Environmental, Social, and Governance transparency, besides making decision-making more agile and well informed, especially with the initiation of artificial intelligence and advanced data analytics.

It could also avoid thousands of injuries from improved safety and tens of millions tons of CO2 emissions, he told a group of global leaders from the petrochemical industry participating in the discussion.

Speaking on promoting collaborative innovation more broadly around the world, he said SABIC has adapted the Circular Carbon Economy Framework as a key enabler to achieve carbon neutrality ambitions. It will continue expanding its own carbon-neutral solutions portfolio, including its sustainable products, its leading worldscale CO2 capture, purification, and utilization process in Jubail. It will also continue the development of low-carbonemitting technologies as part

of the World Economic Forum partnership with industry peers, including Dow, BASF, and others, besides the SABIC-BASF-Linde collaboration on electric cracking for olefin production as examples. Collaboration across the whole value chain, as well as with industry partners, will be essential to the success of this journey.

Al-Benyan cited the example of SABIC's TRUCIRCLE portfolio that focuses on not only certified-renewable resins and chemicals from bio-based feedstock, but also certifiedcircular resins and chemicals made via advanced recycling of used plastics and mechanical recycling solutions as well. This portfolio, he said, was essential for SABIC to drive circularity through its value chain and to help mitigate the potential effects of climate change.

Speaking specifically on supply chains, he said they were also expected to play a crucial role in bringing emissions under control – toward net-zero. In this regard, SABIC is working closely with logistics providers to reduce the carbon footprint of transporting supplies, equipment and products – whether through more-efficient routing or by using modes of transport that have lower carbon intensity.

The Clay People's turn

Local metal band inspires graphic novel

Local metal band, The Clay People, have received an honor that only a few other musicians belong to as they are immortalized in a comic book.

Other musicians who have joined the honor include Alice Cooper, KISS and Rob Zombie. The band's song, "Colossus," became the muse of the EP1T0ME and Top Cow Production collaboration titled "The Clay People: Colossus." This wasn't the first collaboration for the two companies, but the process surrounding Colossus was probably one of the easier ones.

"Normally something like this would be a huge pain in the ass because of approvals and licensing but these guys were so easy to work with that I've already agreed to do two sequels," Matt Hawkins, president and COO of Top Cow Productions said.

EP1T0ME's Founder and Executive Producer Richard Leibowitz originally wanted to use the song as the backing track for a video game trailer; however, that deal fell through. Leibowitz couldn't shake the song and made Hawkins watch the music video. Leibowitz had an idea to turn songs into comics, games and possibly film or television which Hawkins was completely behind and already wanted to write

the comic.

Four years ago, EP1T0ME and The Clay People made a deal to use the song in multiple media with comics being first. The comic follows a biracial boy in the Midwest using a supernatural gift from his grandfather to fight back against bullies. The story also features themes of intolerance, drug addiction, and boredom only feuling the story of revenge for the main character.

"Their dark lyrics spoke to me," Hawkins said. "I've had some issues with addiction and I felt something when I read the lyrics."

Dan Neet, the band's frontman, told Top Cow Productions that the comic interpretation wasn't what he had in mind when writing the song, but was in full support of. Throughout the creative process the band also collaborated with the two companies. Neet also surprised Top Cow Productions with his developed knowledge of comics as the storyline or art direction was still being figured out.

"As a result, a lot of business people participate in the game-making process; that wasn't the case with the comic," Liebowitz said. 'I suppose with the band when it struck gold with Colossus."

The comic is now available on thetopcowstore.com for \$4.99. Christian Dibari provided the art for the story. Simon Gough and Troy Peteri were the colorist and letter artist, respectively.

For nearly 50 years, his Skip Parsons' Riverboat Jazz Band filled the room every second weekend of the month at The Fountain on New Scotland Avenue. It was a tradition that ran from 1971, when the venue's original owner gave the band its original two-night residency, to soon after the restaurant changed ownership in 2019.

"Skip was a very humble guy who had a lot to brag about," said musician and Blue Sky Studio owner Scott Apicelli. "I had the pleasure of knowing Skip for over 4 decades, and I respected him greatly as both a person and as a player."

For 20 years, Parsons owned a music store next door to the Saragota Shoe Depot on the corner of Groesbeck Place and Delaware Avenue. From there, he helped repair and match instruments with local high school students. The store closed in 1998.

"I always thought I'd hear him play one more time," said Michael Benedict, whose first job was working at Parsons' music store. He said there was nothing better than the time spent "in between students," where Parsons made him laugh like no

other. In later years, Benedict would sub in to perform in the jazz band. Parsons, as a bandleader, "was very particular," he said. "He

was sort of like Buddy Rich in that he expected perfection from his band and never gave less than 100 percent in his own performances."

Parsons and his band are forever linked to the 1980 Winter Olympics and the celebration that followed the United States hockey team's 4-3 victory against the heavily favored Soviet Union squad. ABC's Al Michaels helped dubbed the game, "The Miracle on Ice." For Parsons, he never played to a more jubilant crowd.

"Then all of a sudden, the doors flew open and [fans] come screaming. And I thought, well they must have won,"

Parsons told The Spotlight's Rob Jonas in 2016. "Anyway, they came over and they tried to pick up Ernie (Belanger) with his sousaphone ... and this was all on the front page of the New York Post the next day."

Parsons is survived by an extended family that includes his wife Linda; daughters, Stacey Plante and Jill Wilson; and grandsons Alex and Josh Plante.

As They Saw It - Images have long been an accompaniment to war, whether to document fast-paced events in the heat of battle, to sway public opinion through propaganda, or to convey deep emotions like grief and fear. As They Saw It presents four centuries of war imagery from Europe and the United States, with an emphasis on the period 1820-1920. The artists featured in this exhibition were not simply bystanders. Many of them served as soldiers or had been expressly commissioned as war artists. To a great extent, artists' nationality and backgrounds influenced the version of events they chose, or felt compelled, to present. Even those who worked far from the front lines were engaged in one side or the other of a battle of images with representations of war playing a substantial role in how the parties to a conflict were perceived and how military and civilian experiences were interpreted, both in the moment and long afterward. From a modern perspective, photography may seem like the most powerful tool for documenting war because of its assumed truth-value. Yet we know this is far from guaranteed. Nonphotographic media like drawings and prints may sometimes convey greater intensity of feeling. Even in the era of photography, there was still a demand for handmade, "interpretive" images of war. Artists continued to rely on more traditional media to tackle wrenching subjects like violence, cruelty, bodily injury, loss of loved ones, and death—which suggests that perhaps there were certain places that the camera could not go, or certain aspects of war that photography was

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Tempeh, Lettuce and Tomato Sandwich (TLT)

INGREDIENTS: Makes 1 sandwich

- tablespoon untoasted sesame oil 1 ounces tempeh, cut into slices 31/2 no more than 1/2 inch thick
- 2 slices favorite bread
- 1 teaspoon extra virgin olive oil
- teaspoon favorite mustard 1
- 2 lettuce leaves
- 1 tomato, sliced
 - Dash of tamari and/or hot sauce

INSTRUCTIONS

Heat the oil in a frying pan (skillet) set over medium

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heat. Add the tempeh slices to the pan and cook for about 7 minutes on each side, until they are golden brown, aromatic and with a hint of crispiness.

Meanwhile, toast the bread. Drizzle both pieces of toast with olive oil and then spread a thin layer of mustard onto each slice.

Arrange the lettuce and tomato on one of the slices, and top with the cooked tempeh. Sprinkle a little tamari and/or hot sauce onto the hot tempeh.

Close the sandwich and serve hot.

The Gospel Jubliee at **Proctors By DON WILCOCK** nippertown.com

SCHENECTADY — A chance to look up as you're getting down.

Logic almost demands that this event be labeled an oxymoron. How can 60-some singers facing a 3000-seat theater full of people create a three-hour event as intimate as a oneon-one between a preacher and one of his parishioners? The Gospel Jubilee has had eight years' experience tweaking this annual event, and they made that oxymoron happen Saturday night, April 23, at Proctor's Theatre.

The Gospel Jubilee Mass Choir created the foundation for this event. Under the direction of Reverend Dr. Elgin Joseph Taylor. Sr., pastor of Sweet Pilgrim Missionary Baptist Church, the choir is comprised of singers and musicians from various churches in the Capital Region. They sat, stood and raised their voices and arms in praise of Jesus across four rows of chairs that completely took over the large Proctor's Theater stage.

"Holy, holy, holy is The Lord," proclaimed musical guest Lorraine Stancil-Lawson in a clarion call, her soprano voice hitting notes higher than I thought humanly possible for the highlight of the evening that had the choir standing

and providing the wings under her flight into heaven at the close of the first set. A minister in the Pentecostal Church whose been compared to the great Shirley Caesar, she testified, "I'm not supposed to be here tonight." A year ago, she spent 12 days in the hospital with Covid. She shook free of the devil in that hospital room, and she proclaimed "I promised Jesus, I'm gonna give 'em all I've got.'

If Proctor's had rafters, she'd have raised them as she soared into a climactic "Now and forever, Holy is the Lord," the choir near to levitating behind her while the audience raised its collective arms in praise.

The audience was 95% African American and included mothers holding infants, toddlers, teenagers in sweatpants, men in black suits, and women dressed to the nines. "Call and response" is the term for the way an all-black audience interacts with artists like B. B. King on his iconic "Live at the Regal" album. A fervent gospel crowd is almost connected at the hip

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with the musicians who've been a part of Sunday worship from infancy. This annual show is the largest gospel event in the Capital Region. The give and take back and forth between the attendees and the musicians on stage is unmatched by any of the fervor I've seen at iconic rock shows, even The Stones. As a member of the audience, you enter the fourth dimension. You become the centerpiece of the performance, an integral part of the happening.

Gospel Jubilee founder Sara Hill has learned over nine of these events to pay homage to community church leaders without dragging down the energy of the moment. This particular event paid homage to past trailblazers Dr. Georgetta Dix, Rev. Dr. Minnie L. Burns, Annette De Lavallade, Margaret Cunningham and Artis Kitchen, as well as Wes Holloway, and Reverend Albert J. Holman, to name a few.

There was a special salute to the late Regina "Gina" Parsons (member of Refreshing Springs

Church, Schenectady, NY daughter of the late Paster Elder Eugene W. Dix and Georgetta Dix who founded Refreshing Springs Church of God and Christ in Schenectady) and Antonia "Toni" Brown(member of Metropolitan New Testament Mission Baptist Church, Albany, NY active in theater community). Both women were the Capital District's legendary voices and members of the Gospel Jubilee Mass Choir.

"After our generation, there will be no story about what we know of," said event director Sara Hill. "You understand what I'm saying? And the reason I'm focusing on paying homage to Antonia, Tony Brown and Regina Parsons... not only do they share a musical gift, Don, they were singing and directing music in the church at a young age of phenomenal women, foot soldiers and trailblazers. These were women who had the same history that Artis Kitchen and Pee Wee Harris have, the cloth of this Capital Region that we'll never, ever, ever, see again."

Warden and Co.'s 'Somewhere' **By LUCAS GARRETT** nippertown.com

Having released their debut record, "Somewhere," on April 8th, Warden and Co. have not only cemented their genres of Americana and Roots-Rock but have also displayed a strong songwriting ability within such veins. Song after song, Seth Warden demonstrates his ability to blend delicious acoustic riffs with chord progressions that bounce into the ears with conviction and demand attention. Combining this with Doug Moody's prowess on both violin and viola, as well as the rhythmic backbone and punch provided by drummer Brian Melick, Warden and Co. - for lack of a better phrase, albeit bordering on cliche

- really have something here. While most of the record does stick to a fairly straightforward formula, once the listeners become acquainted with their style, it is a formula that doesn't wear on the ears. As the album finishes, it becomes clear the band has created an extremely cohesive body of work.

Take for instance the album's opener, "Living for Love." The acoustic intro, which is soon joined by a very prominent violin motif, serves as a great example of how the band enjoys paring these two instruments. As the whole band enters, a strong vocal begins that dances along with the chord progression. When the chorus hits, it becomes obvious the tune will get stuck in your head quickly with its phrase, "You're not living if you're not living for love." The violin motifs and chorus melodies also pair nicely; the viola adds a nice

texture to the arrangement. One characteristic of Warden's writing style – as far as this listener is concerned - is to keep the parts fairly tight and in lockstep with one another.

This is especially true on songs such as, "Stay Strong," "Middle of Madness," and "P.S.A.," tracks two, four, and five, respectively. In the former example, the arrangement conveys this idea thru the drum and acoustic guitar patterns, as well as the falsetto sections mirroring the melody heard in the chorus, albeit an octave higher. In "Middle of Madness," the repeating acoustic pattern helps hold the song together quite well, and with "P.S.A.," the band utilizes a classic chord progression that ties the piece together, giving the viola room to shine. The lead part performed by the viola playfully bounces off the melody; the ear gains a sense of familiarity and

nostalgia with this performance. Warden showcases his ability to deliver nostalgia not only through the music but through lyrics as well.

The title track, "Somewhere," track three is a prime example. Not only is there a nice interplay between acoustic and viola, the song really stands out on the record: there's a tender duet between Seth Warden and his daughter, Lovella. Another example of such a song, despite the fact there're no more duets - something this listener really would've liked to hear more of is the song, "Lifeguard," track six. As we make ourselves through the latter half of the album, the energy really blows up.

Featuring a quick drum intro, "Without a Word," track seven, pivots the album from nostalgia to a much more energetic emotion. The acoustic guitar riff

that enters in this track really grabs my ear, and the strings matching the guitar's part is effective, further bolstering this section. One of the more exciting tracks on the record, the vibraslap definitely caught me off-guard near the middle of the tune, inserting a brief moment of musical humor. Another song on the record with a similar delivery, feel, and flair is "Save Me," track nine.

As "Without a Word" concludes, the album's energy is temporarily brought back down with "Miss Fortune," track eight. What really stands out in this piece is Warden's use of double entendre with Miss Fortune not only sounding like misfortune but also in the fact it represents the meaning of that word, as well. This is a very nice lyrical and songwriting move.
