Siena Poll finds 73 percent NY'ers excited about holiday season

Belief in Santa is high at 39 percent

LOUDONVILLE — Twenty-two percent of New Yorkers plan to spend more money on holiday gifts this year than last year, up from 17 percent in 2021 according to a new statewide survey of consumers released last week by the Siena College Research Institute.

Seventy-three percent are either very (34 percent) or somewhat (39 percent) excited about the holiday season up from 65 percent a year ago, the highest level of holiday excitement Siena has registered in 15 years of polling this question.

Up from 34 percent a year ago, 39 percent, now say that they believe in Santa Claus, the highest percentage recorded since Siena first asked New Yorkers about their belief in Santa in 2010. Seventy-eight percent will be putting up a Christmas Tree. Of those, 64 percent will be decorating an artificial tree while 34 percent will have a real tree in their home this holiday season.

Asked to name their preferred holiday greeting, a majority, 52 percent say 'Merry Christmas' while 34 percent most often say 'Happy Holidays.'

Domestic charges in Ravena

RAVENA — Albany County Sheriff's Department investigation leads to the arrest of a Coeymans man on charges stemming from a domestic incident.

On Saturday, Dec. 10 at approximately 3:45 p.m., deputies responded to a Oakbrook Manor residence in the Village of Ravena for a report of a domestic dispute involving a mother, father and two young children. There is an active full-stay-away order of protection against the father, protecting the mother and two young children.

According to police, The victim reported that Thomas J. Baffuto entered her home and, following a verbal altercation, did place his hands around the victim's neck in an attempt to strangle her.

Baffuto left the residence prior to deputies arrival with the 8-month old child. Baffuto was located by the City of

Kingston Police with the child in his custody.

Baffuto was charged with burglary and criminal contempt, both felonies, and criminal obstruction of breathing, custodial interference, and two counts of criminal contempt, all misdemeanors.

Baffuto was arraigned in the Town of Coeymans Court in front of the Judge Rocco Persico and was released on his own recognizance to appear back in the court on December 15.

Crash, charges at Rolling Hills

SELKIRK — On Saturday, Dec. 10 at approximately 8:08 a.m. Albany County Sheriff's deputies responded to a report of a personal injury auto accident at the Rolling Hills Mobile Home Park in the Town of Coeymans.

Responders located a Nissan 350Z with extensive damage that had struck a residence, causing injuries to two passengers in the vehicle. Witnesses reported the vehicle driving at a high rate of speed through the park immediately preceding the collision.

The driver, Sean P. Campbell Jr., was located near the scene and showed several signs of intoxication. Campbell failed several field sobriety tests and was arrested.

Further investigation and testing determined that he had been driving with a 0.22 percent BAC, as well as a revoked license for a previous DWAI by alcohol conviction. One passenger was transported to Albany Medical Center due to her injuries, and is currently in stable condition.

Campbell was charged with aggravated unlicensed operation, a felony, aggravated DWI, aggravated unlicensed operation in the second degree, and criminal mischief, all misdemeanors and reckless driving and imprudent speed, both violations. He was released on appearance tickets and is due back in Coeymans Town Court at a later date.

VCS voters approve \$27.2M for props

Growing enrollment leads district to act on needed capital improvement projects

NEW SCOTLAND — Voorheesville Central School District residents took to the polls and approved two capital improvement project proposals totaling \$27.2 million on Tuesday, Dec. 6.

Nearly 70 percent of voters approved the largest of two propositions, a \$25.2 million capital project that aims to address several needs for the everexpanding school district. It's to include updates at the elementary school, a new transportation facility and infrastructure updates.

According to the district, the voters' approval of the capital project will

protect the community's long-term investment in our school facilities by improving health, safety, ADA compliance, and security measures; advancing and improving our instructional programming; addressing growing enrollment needs and achieving energy efficiencies and cost-saving measures.

Residents approved the second measure by a larger margin — 81 to 19 percent — that is expected to help the district reduce its greenhouse gasses and energy consumption to the equivalent of 1,302 cars removed from the road annually.

"Thank you to our community for supporting our students, as well as our vision for our future," said Superintendent of Schools Frank Macri. "We are excited to get started on this important work."

Proposition 1 Scope Highlights

• Reworking existing space to create multiple general instructional spaces, including new music and arts classrooms, guidance suite, library makerspace and science labs

• Installation of a secure vestibule building entrance

• Centralizing the administrators' and health offices

• Creating a new cafeteria in the existing transportation facility space, that will double as self-contained community space

• Elementary stairwell replacement to include ADA-accessibility

• Utilizing green space to create an outdoor instructional classroom

• Fixing the failing drainage system on the district's soccer field • Constructing a freestanding transportation facility at the rear of the high school site with an entrance off Martin Road

One of the biggest factors in the district's decision to propose this project is growing enrollment. The district recently underwent two enrollment studies to examine its growing population and the effect that may have on school use.

The first study, a five-year district-wide school enrollment projection study, was conducted by the Capital District Regional Planning Commission. The district conducted a follow-up study that the Board of Education used to identify various elementary building configuration options that would accommodate the anticipated growth of the district. The findings of

both reports include the potential for the addition of 350 new students into the district over the next 10 years.

The reports looked at key indicators such as 20-year enrollment trends, birth rates, residential housing activity, and more, as a basis for developing these projections. The reports also took Guilderland's Albany Country Club project into consideration.

Proposition 2

The second proposition on the ballot asks voters to approve an energy performance contract for \$2 million. This proposal does not impact the district tax levy, and is paid for through state funding and energy cost reductions.

An EPC is an initiative that allows school districts to take budgeted utility and operational costs and reallocate them into energy-saving capital improvements without the need for increased taxes.

Bundling this proposition into the upcoming December vote is a fiscally-responsible way to switch to energy saving protocols across campus– retrofitting LED fixtures in the middle and high school and installing new fixtures at the elementary school.

Other highlights of the contract include approximately \$80,000 in annual energy savings, internal LED technology lighting fixtures and upgrades, updated temperature and ventilation control systems, weatherization, air sealing and insulation districtwide, and a new heating system for the high school pool complex.

The capital project proposition authorizes the district to use \$4.5 million in capital reserve funds to pay for this project.

A light dimmed, but not shut out

Community gathers to support fundraiser, honor memory of Bart Groudine-Goldstein

DELMAR — Bart Groudine-Goldstein was a bright light in the Delmar community. With his passing, the light has dimmed, but only slightly.

Bart died suddenly on Nov. 27 and his friends and family celebrated his life at Real McCoy Brewery on Saturday, Dec. 10. As part of the celebration, a fundraiser for The Brain Alternative Rehabilitation Therapies [BART] foundation was held. \$3,800 was raised in honor of Bart.

When he was 16, Bart was in a severe car accident that left him with a traumatic brain injury [TBI]. From that moment, twenty-one years ago, Bart's parents had to relearn their son while Bart was relearning everything.

Joel Goldstein, Bart's father, remembers that through everything, hope was a significant factor. "Bart had a lot of hope,"

Joel said. "He gave a lot of hope."

At the beginning of Bart's recovery, doctors told Joel and his wife, Dayle, that it would be better if Bart were institutionalized. However, Joel and Dayle pushed for Bart's independence. Through research and looking past doctors' answers, the start of Bart's new life began.

Bart began alternative therapies that went beyond traditional mainstream medicine. One of the game changers for Bart was Hyperbaric Oxygen Therapy, also known as HBOT. HBOT was originally used by divers suffering from the bends.

"It made a huge difference in Bart's life," Joel said. "In four or five

treatments, he could stay awake for the full school day. We couldn't believe it."

As Bart progressed greatly with alternative therapy, the BART foundation was created in 2012. The foundation focuses on highlighting and advocating safe alternative therapies for families and individuals facing TBIs. The foundation board comprises survivors, family members of survivors, healthcare professionals and physicians, lawyers, and academics.

The largest group to suffer from TBIs or acquired brain injuries [ABIs] are young people under the age of 45. The second largest group suffering brain injuries is senior citizens. Although these age groups are the largest sufferers, one community suffers the most from ABIs; military veterans.

"The cost to society of traumatic brain injury or acquired brain injury is substantially greater than cancer– it's the number one," Joel said. Joel Goldstein

In most Western countries, especially the United States, alternative therapies are just that; alternative, taboo, and often not recommended. Many factors play into why these doctors won't recommend these therapies and have gatekept them from standard treatment. Whereas in countries like Israel, HBOT is standard practice. Due to this, it leaves many families, and often parents, frustrated and not knowing where to turn to help their family member.

In most cases, it's difficult to even find the resources for therapy. This is where the BART foundation hopes to lend support. The foundation's website lists resources for centers and therapies across the country. All with the hope that something will work.

Although HBOT worked wonders for Bart in his recovery, that won't be the case for everyone with ABIs. Every ABI is different and unique, which

leads to treatment plans being different and unique. Oftentimes, even in Bart's case, therapies need to be combined to continue recovery progression.

"It doesn't work for everyone. Nothing works 100 percent of the time," Joel said. "These therapies work most of the time ranging from 85 percent of the time down to 65 percent of the time."

In the years following the accident, Bart continued alternative therapies and eventually met a life of independence. He moved to Delmar and became a part of a community that not only supported him, but Bart helped brighten. As much as Bart's family and friends are grieving his loss, Delmar has too.

Kenny Drew, one of Bart's many friends, reached out to Joel about celebrating Bart's life. Drew wanted Joel and Dayle to know that there were a lot of people who cared about and shared part of their lives with Bart. For many, Bart was a pillar in the community.

Bart worked part-time at Swifty's. He also began taking guitar lessons. For many, including Drew, it was always nice to see Bart out in Delmar and enjoying his life.

At the celebration of Bart's life, several local musicians donated their time and played in memory and honor of Bart. Not only did he impact his fellow TBI community, but anyone that crossed his path. For many, Bart reinforced how great a community Delmar is.

"Despite him having this horrible injury, he had an amazing ability to recite

donated gift cards to be raffled off throughout the night. The Stram Center for works in collaboration with the BART foundation and treatnow.org, donated a 10-pack of hyperbaric oxygen sessions. Swifty's also donated all of the food for the night.

After the fundraiser, some of Bart's friends went to O'Slattery's to continue the night of honoring Bart. The band playing dedicated a couple of songs in their set to Bart. Afterward, the entire bar toasted to Bart and his memory.

"The turnout was amazing," Drew said. "His family was able to see what an impact Bart had on people in town."

Although Bart's family and the foundation are still grieving his loss, they are anxious to continue advocating for safe alternative therapies. The foundation is also hoping to help further push the needle to the understanding and acceptance of alternative therapies. With the overall hope that one day alternative therapies will become more standard practice and more widely available to survivors.

Asked about their plans for holiday shopping, nearly onefourth of New Yorkers plan on spending no more than \$300 on gifts this holiday season, while 19 percent plan on spending \$1,000 or

Yorkers plan to shop in person at local independent retailers for their shopping this year and 65 percent plan to shop at small to medium-sized chain stores. Fifty-six percent will shop at big-box retailers, while 38 percent will buy gifts at local service businesses such as salons or gyms. Nearly half of New Yorkers, 47 percent say that they plan to conduct at least half to virtually all of their holiday shopping online and 61 percent say they have already or will shop earlier than usual this year.

"With nearly half of all New Yorkers and over 70 percent of those earning \$100k or more planning to spend more than \$500 on gifts, it looks like stockings will be full this year," Levy said. "Some are spending more because of how excited they are and how hopeful they are for a better year ahead, but some may simply recognize that inflation has hit Santa along with all New Yorkers.

Over half of residents with incomes under \$50k plan to spend no more than \$400 this holiday season."

Sixty-six percent plan to purchase gift cards as holiday gifts and over a third, 35 percent, plan to buy experience gifts like concert or sporting event tickets or spa gift certificates.

Asked which holiday traditions they are looking forward to or dreading this year, majorities of New Yorkers say they are looking forward to traditions including: spending time with family (73 percent), eating and eating some more (63 percent), cooking for the holidays (60 percent), decorating the house (57 percent), and going to holiday parties (51 percent). On the other hand, they are dreading the following tradititions: spending money on gifts (33 percent), eating fruit cake (32 percent), wrapping gifts (29 percent), and attending concerts, pageants, or ceremonies (24 percent).

Owens Corning announces dividend increase, authorization for repurchase

TOLEDO, Ohio - Owens Corning announced its Board of Directors approved a quarterly dividend increase and new share repurchase authorization last week.

The Toledo-based company shared in a statement that the actions "reaffirm the company's capital allocation strategy" and "reflect the success of its disciplined commercial and operational execution to deliver sustainable performance in a dynamic macro-economic environment."

"The substantial increase in our dividend and additional share repurchase authorization reflect the earnings power of our company, strong performance across our businesses, and confidence in our ability to consistently generate strong free cash flow," said Chair and Chief Executive Officer Brian Chambers. "We remain focused on executing on our enterprise strategy and enhancing shareholder value."

The board declared a quarterly cash dividend of \$0.52 per common share, an approximately 50 percent increase compared with the prior quarterly dividend. The dividend will be payable on Thursday, Jan. 19, to shareholders of record as of Wednesday, Jan. 4.

Drop the municipal leaf pick up

of dry leaves. I remember being a part of a horde of kids playing "catch the leaf" at recess at Hamagrael. The smell of dry leaves might still be my most nostalgic trigger.

But the fact is that leaf removal is both economically and ecologically damaging.

For a sense of scale, on the Town of Bethlehem's website, they write that:

"Annually we collect about 20,000 cubic yards of just loose leaves — not counting other yard debris.

This is the equivalent of nearly 200,000 lawn bags and requires a major effort each fall, beginning in mid-October. Specially equipped trucks vacuum up piles of leaves placed by the roadside. It's a labor intensive process and takes several weeks just to go through the town once, but it can take much longer depending on the accumulation of leaves and weather conditions."

Looking at the budget, the cost of this program in 2020 was a little over \$1 million dollars. In a town of just about 35,000 residents, that's nearly \$120 per fourperson household. Whether you like leaf pickup or not, should you pay \$120 for it?

But the bigger question is where that money could go instead. Last year the city of Toledo, OH (pop. 268,508) spent only \$800,000 to wipe out \$200 million in medical debt for their residents. A ridiculous case, I know, but Bethlehem could pay elementary school teachers more money, put more money toward veterans support, toward native pollinator meadows, or for you libertarians out there, they could just simply cut taxes.

When it comes to the economics of it, leaf removal makes no sense. It should be reprivatized. We should not pay for leaf removal; you should pay. Not just because it's an enormous cost, but because that \$1 million is funding something that is ecologically damaging. Economics aside, our

trees are expecting the carbon recharge that leaves give the soil in their rainshadow. Deciduous leaves are meant to fall, decompose, and recharge the soil each year, giving life to the robust web of fungi and microorganisms that the trees live with. When leaves are removed, this input of energy is cut off, the soil becomes sterile, and our trees become unhealthy.

But who cares about the trees, right? This is America, the land of the sacred and pristine turfgrass lawn!

Well, extension schools across the country suggest that leaving leaves is healthier for both turfgrass health and weed suppression. According to a group of researchers at Michigan State, when one mows leaves ("mulches") rather than removes them:

"The decomposing pieces of leaves cover up bare spots between turf plants that are an excellent opening for weed seeds to germinate. Experience has shown that nearly a 100 percent decrease in dandelions and crabgrass can be attained after adopting this practice of mulching leaves for just three years."

Researchers at the University of Kentucky concur, and they add that mulched leaves almost entirely offset the need for added fertilizer. Mulching also prevents the threat of the often-cited reason for removing leaves in the first place: the smothering of the lawn. Rather than shading out the grass, the shreds will pretty quickly settle between the blades of grass, preventing competition from below. And finally, our landfills are already full!

Removing leaves from your property is just like throwing money to the wind. Keep your carbon! Instead of removing leaves, just fire up the lawnmower one more time and tear them apart. That way, in addition to everything else, the leaves won't be a threat to pile up in our sewers during the winter months.

If you think by removing the leaves from your yard each year you're taking care of your trees or your lawn, you're not—leaf removal is about paying to maintain some weird human culture, not about ecological care or financial prudence.

I don't expect the Town of Bethlehem to stop their Fall Leaf Pickup program, regardless of how stupid it is. But maybe if we can stop the cultural inertia in its tracks, over time the politics will follow.

So, leave the leaves! It helps the trees, the grasses, and your pocketbook.

Port receives permits to begin limited site work

ALBANY — The state Department of Environmental Conversation has permitted the Port of Albany to commence with limited site work in preparation for North America's first offshore wind tower manufacturing facility.

The port has proceeded with developing access haul roads, grubbing and mowing activity in isolated areas and grading the site. Early work also includes installing groundwater monitoring wells.

Prior to site work beginning, the Port of Albany implemented a stormwater pollution prevention plan. This prevents soil from entering surrounding lands or waterways. In addition, all brush, vegetation and trees remain along the shorelines. The port recently installed a community air monitoring plan on site. This allows for real-time monitoring of any vapors or particulates at the perimeters of the site.

"This is an exciting step in moving forward with the project," said Rich Hendrick, CEO of the Port of Albany. "We continue to work diligently with the permitting agencies and our project partners on making progress to bring the nation's first offshore wind tower manufacturing facility to New York."

The port has contracted with a local construction company to perform this initial phase of the project earthwork valued at just over \$30 million. This phase of work is expected to last into the new year. The project is expected to generate approximately 500 jobs in just the construction phase alone.

Since the areas of work fall within the state's jurisdiction, federal permitting is not required. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers remains the lead agency for the National Environmental Policy Act review process, and the Port of Albany eagerly awaits their final review.

Riverkeeper, a non-profit environmental organization dedicated to the protection of the Hudson River and its tributaries, has blasted the state's review of the plans surrounding Beacon Island. In an October statement, the organization said the state "failed in its oversight of the Beacon Island site, and must do better."

The 40 photographs in the exhibition focus on the powerful images of children and families that Parks created throughout his career and particularly during his time at LIFE magazine, where he crafted some of the most impactful journalistic coverage of issues and personalities connected to the Civil Rights movement.

LIFE hired Parks in 1949 as its first African American staff photographer and writer, and he stayed there until 1972. This exhibition highlights pieces from seven of the stories Parks produced at LIFE, as well as two portfolios created before and after his time at the magazine.

Throughout his career, Parks used his camera as a weapon in the struggle for social justice as he sought to expose the impact that the interconnected social evils of racism and poverty had on the most disenfranchised and vulnerable people both in the United States and abroad. As the works in the exhibition demonstrate, Parks' capacity for unflinching yet deeply empathetic engagement with his subjects and his desire to improve their lives reached its greatest heights in his images of children, whose experiences Parks grasped intuitively bases on his memories of growing up amid poverty and violence in segregated Fort Scott, Kansas.

The title of the exhibition comes from a line in the 1926 poem I, Too by Parks' friend Langston Hughes. The poem captures the mixed emotions of justified hurt,

as well as self-assured pride and hope felt by a Black child in America. The poem opens: "I am the darker brother. / They send me to eat in the kitchen / When company comes" before envisioning a time when "They'll see how beautiful I am / And be ashamed -/ I, too, am America." In his opening of a 1968 essay about the life of the Fontenelle family in Harlem, Parks repeated the line as he also expressed a mix of rage and hope: "I am you, staring back from a mirror of poverty and despair, of revolt and freedom. ... There is something about both of us that goes deeper than blood or black and white. It is our common search for a better life, a better world.

... My children's needs are the same as your children's. I too am American."

Through his words and images, Parks sought to demonstrate the universality of his subjects' experiences and their centrality to America's identity. This was both bold and vitally needed work in his time, when struggles against racial injustice shook up and reshaped America.

Part play, part mock trial, the show features two lawyers arguing whether "A Visit from Saint Nick" was authored by Clement Clark Moore or Henry Livingston Jr. and has the audience decide as the jury.

Madison casts an old costar, Connor (Holtz), who is struggling to balance time for acting and his young daughter, Josie. Despite feeling a spark with Connor, Madison has a rule to never date an actor.

The production features

two over zealous cosplayers, depicting Moore and Livingston, who are remarkably convincing when they can be found. Lena, Madison's leading lady, proves less convincing since she's only "acted" as a hand model and is the producer's girlfriend.

Madison worries her first directing effort will flop, but hopes that determination and support from the town -- and from Connor -- can make it

work.

The Troy Christmas Connection

The beloved poem beginning with "Twas the Night Before Christmas" first appeared anonymously in The Troy Sentinel newspaper on Dec. 23, 1823. An instant classic, the happy rhymes and rhythms created a distinctly American Santa Claus.

Decades after the poem's first publication, wealthy biblical scholar Clement Clarke Moore claimed authorship and has been officially credited ever since. But gentlemen farmer Henry Livingston, Jr., of the Hudson Valley, may be the true, unrecognized author, according to his descendants.

Crary and Casey first staged their mock trial to determine the true poet on Dec. 18, 2013 in the Rensselaer County Courthouse in downtown Troy. Casey and his daughter Molly Casey, both practicing attorneys, represented the Livingstons suing Moore for committing "literary piracy." Troy attorney E. Stewart Jones defended Moore. A jury selected

from the packed courtroom was unable to reach a verdict in '13, so the case was retried the following year during Troy's Victorian Stroll. Both courtroom spectacles made news around the world.

Crary and Casey plan to watch the Hallmark movie together for the first time when it premieres Saturday, Dec. 17.

"I love that Hallmark leaned into the quirky charisma of our original production," said Crary,



a publicist known for promoting Troy to the world. "This will add a lot of excitement for our city's connection to this beloved poem as it turns 200 years-old next Christmas."

In addition to being the "Hometown of Uncle Sam," Crary says he'd like to see Troy promote itself as the birthplace of Santa.

"Two centuries ago Troy gave this Christmas gift to

the world," said Troy native Casey, an attorney and novelist. "I remember the magic in my children's eyes as I read it each Christmas Eve, and they imagined a sleigh pulled by reindeer and Santa leaving them toys. If not for a humble Troy newspaper editor, this masterpiece might be collecting dust in some forgotten archive.' The premiere of 'Twas The

The documentary is titled after an Eastbound Jesus song that pays homage to Bell. In addition to the documentary, attendees will get to enjoy the band performing live music at the premiere. Tickets are available at palacealbany.org.

Grapplin' Greg is directed by Frank Cavone, who is passionately involved in his production company, Mirth Films. Mirth Films creates original video content, live music, news, and podcasts.

During the pandemic, Cavone collaborated with The Palace and the City of Albany to create "The Palace Sessions." He was freshly inspired to create a new documentary after his previous one explored various urban landscapes.

For his new one, he said that he "wanted to do a documentary that had a good story; I thought Greg had a great story. I felt that there was enough to be told, and this city has history with him."

He had met Greg Bell at Bell's shows that he promoted. As Cavone eagerly photographed and filmed, Bell remembered his enthusiasm for music. Cavone made it a point to speak to Bell. About three years ago, Cavone approached Bell with the idea for his documentary.

Bell responded to the concept with his signature wit and good humor. "I told him to knock himself out."

Cavone began interviewing friends and family; Bell's legacy as a music promoter and with Guthrie Bell productions has had an expansive community effort. "Personally, I'd rather hear what other people have to say and hear their perspectives," said Bell.

"Nothing I've done has been in a vacuum," he added. "It's been a community effort to do what I've done over the years."

"What really makes me happy about this documentary is that when you watch it, it's almost like other people are telling the story for him," said Cavone. "It's really heartwarming."

Co-producer Kim Neaton streamlined the process as Cavone had to narrow down a list of 200 suggested interviewees. The Palace became one of the interview locations, making it a fitting home to debut the documentary.

Bell has been doing shows at the Palace since 1998. He explained their relationship as "more of a friendship than a business relationship.

His shows at the Palace are part of the landscape of Albany's music scene. Cavone commented that what makes going to a Bell show special is that it is like a "family outside a family."

"Being able to premiere the documentary at the

place where he brought so many memories in through those doors- I can't wait," said Cavone.

"We jumped at the chance to be able to host it here and spend an evening honoring a great local promoter and music lover like Greg Bell!" said Sean Allen, Director of Marketing for the Palace.

Allen has known Bell personally since 2003; he recalls Bell's loyalty to his bands and keen ear for excellent music. "Greg has brought so many incredible shows to our stage over the years that it's only right that we put him up there in lights for a change," said Allen.

For Bell, it's a collaborative process that builds the foundation of his story. "It's been a community effort, everybody working together to help benefit the Albany music scene and the public," he said. "That's what it's all about, bringing people together and providing people with good music and fun people to hang out with."

Cavone didn't plan for Grapplin' Greg to premiere the same year as Greg Bell's 30th year of promoting, but the timing was serendipitous. "Greg should be honored, especially in his 30th year," said Cavone.

"More than anything with this documentary, it's awesome to be able to do something like this, but it's even more of a privilege for Greg to let us go down this road and tell this story," he continued.

Imaginary City- The large-format, abstract paintings of Tomm El-Saieh (b. 1984, Port-au-Prince; lives and works in Miami) teem with dense and dynamic marks that evoke ornament, language, and architecture. By variously layering and erasing his linework, and using vibrant color to optically push or pull his pictures, El-Saieh creates rhythmic, all-over compositions from which larger forms appear to emerge-testing both the limits of our perception and our expectations about abstraction. The exhibition title, which comes from one of the works in the show, refers to a cityscape theme common in Haitian art (Vilaj Imaginé). El-Saieh's paintings, which resemble informal urban plans, likewise develop intuitively, without the use of preparatory studies or outlines. For the artist, who has been unable to return to his birthplace in recent years as a result of the instability there, Port-au-Prince now also exists mainly as a figure in his memory and imagination—a

uncertainty.Tomm El-Saieh was born in Haiti and grew up in Miami; he is of Haitian, Palestinian, and Israeli descent. He was the subject of a solo show at the Institute of Contemporary Art (ICA) Miami in 2018 and was included in the New Museum triennial in New York that year. He is partner at the artist-run gallery CENTRAL FINE in Miami and long directed the El-Saieh Gallerv in Port-au-Prince, a venue for contemporary Haitian artists that his grandfather established in the 1950s. This yearlong exhibition appears in public spaces around the Clark and is free and open to the public. It is organized by the Clark Art Institute and curated by Robert Wiesenberger, associate curator of contemporary projects. This exhibit goes from January 29th through December 31st. 



Elio Villafranca at The Falcon By RUDY LU

MARLBORO, Mass. – Sophisticated yet roots-oriented Elio Villafranca performed at the Falcon this past Sunday, featuring portions of his suite "Cinque" as well as several other of his compositions.

The performance is a sound collage of the story of Cinque, who started life as a free man in what is now Sierra Leone but was pressed into slavery and transported to Havana, Cuba. Then aboard the coastal schooner Amistad, he led a revolt of the slaves on board that took the ship on a long circuitous voyage that ended in Long Island. After legal cases up to and including the Supreme Court, Cinque eventually made his way back to Sierra Leone.

The recorded suite itself is close to two hours long and includes a plethora of musicians, including a chorus and singers. It incorporates many of the rhythms and sounds of the African diaspora along with flourishes of classical music and post-bop jazz. This abridged version was performed with a quartet with the aid of recorded narration and field recordings in between the quartet's performances.

The opening three compositions painted a musical impression of Cinque's early life, from his birth in Sierra Leone through the Middle Passage to the Americas.

"Cinque" opened as a somber march on the piano with the rest of the band slowly following in, and the rhythms becoming more syncopated as the composition progressed.

"Capture" was as dramatic and scary as it should be, depicting the chase of Cinque through the jungle. The piano playing leads the description of Cinque's desperate flight in vain from the slave traders, with bass and drums with a short interlude of flute giving close support.

"Passage" depicts the tortuous transatlantic passage from Africa to Havana. Notes of pathos, desperation, the swirling sea, and forward movement created a bed of sound from the piano, bass, and drums. The tenor sax represented the cries and misery of the human cargo making the voyage.

The remaining performances consisted of music that more

closely inspired Villafranca's own Congo-Cuban events, as well as Congolese and Haitian traditions.

"Maluagda" is a Congolese-Cuban chant to a deity from EV's hometown in San Luis in Pinar Del Rio.

"Madre de Agua" (Mother of Water) is a ballad-like tribute to the goddess of water.

"Night of Fire" painted a musical picture of the August 19, 1791 slave revolt in Haiti that ultimately resulted in the independence of Haiti. Sam Dillon's powerful shrieks on tenor provided the feelings of anger and power from the revolting slaves. Drums and bass depicted the organization and spreading of the revolt. Piano represented the fire.

The closer was "The Kingdom," a new original that EV composed during the pandemic. It was perhaps the most organic of the pieces. He explained that he was inspired by the feeling of tribal energy; with the idea being the entire human race. Bass and drums were together as one. Sax and piano dueled with each other over the beat, providing many variations over the same theme.

EV's piano was lyrical throughout, delivering rapid-fire notes with a powerful right hand when appropriate. Drummer Ferenc Nemeth exhibited joy in his playing, always providing a groove with occasional displays of flash. Ed Perez was rock solid on bass, but never forgot the Latin influences of his music. Sam Dillon was sparingly used during the set. However, his playing on tenor sax and flute was both

Bill Kirchen's Honky Tonk Holiday Show at The Hangar On The Hudson By DON WILCOCK

TROY – Bill Kirchen's Honky Tonk Holiday Show made its annual stop at the Hangar on the Hudson Saturday night. I can sum up the sumptuous two sets by saying Bill and his Silent Knights (Jack Saunders on bass and drummer Rick Richards) were perfect but never perfunctory.

Perfection in rock and roll in most cases is an oxymoron. By its very nature, the best rock and roll is rowdy and, if it's done right, far from perfect in the classic definition of the word. But Bill Kirchen is unique in his style. In his 60-year career, he's perfected a kind of twisted rock and roll. His sound has been labeled psycho folk-rock, twangcore, dieselbilly, and most recently Americana, a catchall moniker for any sound that cuts across genres. He slams every song home, but never hits a sour note. And while performing the right notes, he takes his fans on a ride in his "Hot Rod Lincoln."

That's his best-known number, recorded originally with Commander Cody and His Lost Planet Airmen. Writing about the tune in 2013, I said the song cemented the image of the band as hellraisers painting broadstroke caricatures of southern life with a kind of energy that was all rock, but with a nod to a lifestyle that until that point had nothing to do with long hair. "Anybody who writes takes a stance where they're not necessarily that character, "Kirchen explained to me.

Saturday night Bill sang, "Dee says you're gonna drive me to drinkin' if you don't stop drivin' that hot rod Lincoln." Dee is John Tichy's wife. Tichy founded Commander Cody's Lost Planet Airmen with Cody (the late George Frayne) and Kirchen and got on stage during both sets. His wife sat next to me in the audience. Not knowing who she was, I asked her if she'd ever seen Kirchen before. "I've known him since I was 19," she responded. We talked about Kirchen's colorful history, with her noting that "each year Kirchen gets better." It's not hyperbole to say that he was spectacular Saturday night.

Kirchen told his fans he was going to sing "holiday songs of questionable taste," which he did on numbers that included "Reindeer Boogie," "Truckin' Trees for Christmas," "Louisiana Holiday," Merle Haggard's "If We Make It Through December," "Chuck Berry's "Run Reindeer Run" (with Tichy), and "Santa Claus Wants Some Lovin" by Sir Mack Rice (who also wrote "Mustang Sally.")

Some of his best numbers were songs unrelated to the season. "Ain't Got Time for the Blues" was originally recorded in England with Maria Muldaur and showcased Kirchen's talent on an uncharacteristic ballad. He dedicated his original "Rocks Into Sand" to John Tichy. A tour de force on guitar, it contains the lyrics:

- Now the sands will shift and the earth's gonna roll
- The rocks and the rain will collect their toll
- And all I'll take is what I brought
- And I may not get what I sought
- Whether I sink or I fall That's up to the shifting sands after all
- Before fish ever walked on
- land Time was turning rocks into
- sand "Word to The Wise," from
- Asleep at The Wheel's 50th

'Cause the battle outside ragin

Will soon shake your windows and rattle your walls

For the times, they are a-changin'

It was one of those nights where everything clicked perfectly and worked: the artists, the band, the fans, the venue. Live music is the substance for our souls.


