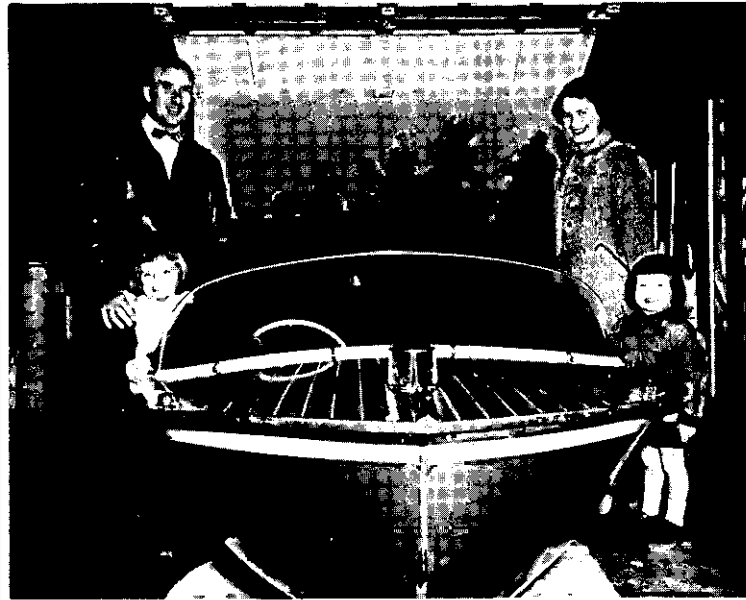

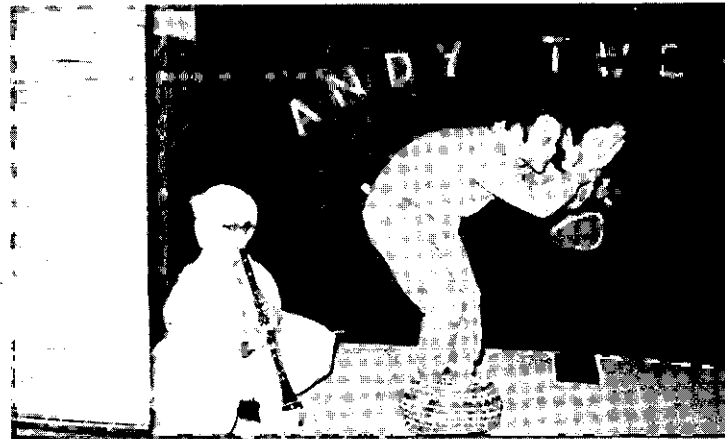

EDITORIAL—

It's a matter of planning before it's too late!

Spring is flirting with us these days and we are coming out of our hibernation, flexing our muscles, and taking a look at the yard. Raking, burning, planting and hosing are already making us look extremely industrious. The garden is sprouting with the removal of its winter blanket of leaves. Many a sore knee can attest to the vigors of loosening dirt, pulling weeds, cutting old stalks and planting seeds. The muscles also can make their comment on the spring and their feelings after a dormant winter. The lawns are clean, the gardens emerging, the sand box full again and we are sprucing up with a vigor.

But all this seems to stay in our own yard!

Perhaps it is time to look a bit further afield. Baseball in the back yard, though hard on the yard, is fine for the small boys and girls, and those learning to play. But when a bit of power comes into the arm and swing of the bat can put the ball through the hedge, into a window, or over the trees, it is another matter. The street is the next step and that is where the neighborhood game winds up. It was where the football wound up too.

Little League, wonderful as it is for the boys in the community, does not, of course, take away the impromptu game, the neighborhood game after supper (or before supper for that matter).

The school yards are a possibility. But to organize a group to go there is a major effort, and, after a try at it, the game starts in the road, others join and we're back where we started. (I doubt, too, that the school yards could hold them, if every road game landed there.)

Nearby play areas are needed for baseball and many other group sports. They should be considered in this rapidly growing area.

In some communities in the country, these have been a part of an overall planning: for a certain amount of land developed, it has been required that an allotted amount of space is left for a play area. This has solved

many of the problems for the car driver as well as for the children and their parents. It has brought a decrease in the number of children hurt, it has encouraged group play where everyone is accepted. It has enabled children of all ages to play together and even accept the limitations with which "younger" players are "afflicted."

We have grown so fast and furiously that spaces for play seem to have been overlooked in our community. With spring whirling at us and baseball in full swing, it seems time to think along these lines.

Someone in Albany many years ago had the foresight to lay out parks near the (what is now) center of the city, and it has added immeasurably to the living conditions as well as to the beauty of the city. It is extremely easy to overlook such ideas until the land is gone, and the park must be located at a distance which requires transportation. This way it loses many of its uses.

And so, before it is too late, a park as well as the play areas, might add to the layout of the Bethlehem area. Ideally a park for each of the communities would enhance their beauty as well as their real estate value in the years to come.

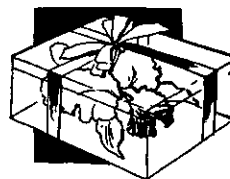

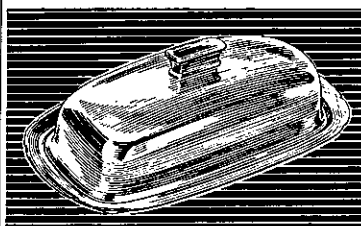

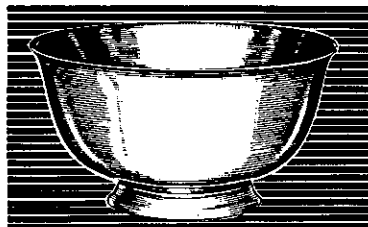

A Subscription to the Spotlight brings you more and more

Enameled Copper Display at Library

Pin and earring sets, earring and necklace sets, bracelets and ash trays, all make up the latest display at the Delmar Public Library. They all have in common the fact that they are created in their various designs by a process of enameling over copper.

The three units of the Home Demonstration Units of Albany County whose work is shown include the Elsmere Day Unit, the Elsmere evening Unit and the Delmar Evening Unit.

Enameling on copper is a process which starts with a copper base and, with colors and a formula, creates designs and effects which are glazed. The effect is often achieved by many firings of the one piece as color and designs are added.

One shelf of the exhibit in the library shows the tools and materials used in the work. Some of the objects will be recognized easily. A few of the others that might be clarified is the knife which is used, primarily, for the removing of objects from the kiln, the carbarundum stone which is used to smooth the copper before enameling, and after the firing it is used to clean the glaze. The long instruments with a bend on the end are called swirling tools and are for one method used in the process of designing. The colors are of glass and, when fired, melt into the desired effect.

Of the methods which are used in design beside that of swirling, is the thread method and the

lump method. All of these have been used in the articles on exhibit at the Library.

A pin and earring set of a snow scene is particularly eye-catching and the intricacy of the design show well the composition and effects which can be used in this work.

The three leaders of these groups, Mrs. Richard Young, Mrs. William Delaney and Mrs. Rosell Fairbank, have had training at the Work Center of the Home Demonstration group in Albany. In turn the instructors of the Work Center, which has many other units beside the Enameling on copper, have received instruction at Cornell.

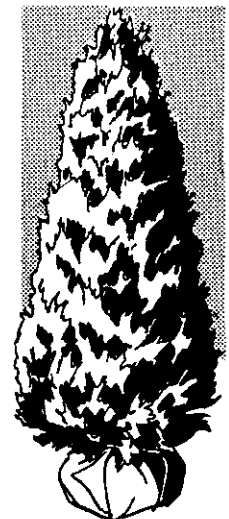

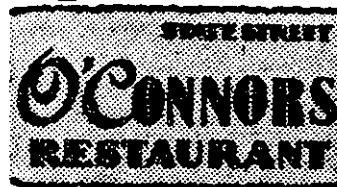
