


A TRIBUTE TO THOSE WHO DIED . . .



The Story of the Delmar Library Bookmobile


Books, 1,000; miles, 140; stops, 100 in 8 mornings: that is the Log of the Bookmobile of the Delmar Public Library, and of its driver, and librarian, Pearl G. Carman.

Since 1935 the Delmar Library has made books available to people within the school District who live more than a mile from the Library. Starting with a Station Wagon that quickly became too small for the job, and continuing with the present Bookmobile purchased in 1941 for \$2341, it has distributed books throughout Unionville, Clarksville, Van Wies Point, Slingerlands, Elsmere and Glenmont for 21 years. (The program was interrupted for 2 years during

World War II while the Library was trying to convince the Ration Board of their need for stamps.)

When Mrs. Carman first started her runs in 1944 neither hail nor snow nor anything else would stop the attempts to carry books to the waiting readers. However this has proved an extravagant, and at times, ineffectual policy, and now the Bookmobile goes forth only when school buses challenge the wind and the snow.

Mrs. Carman lived in Delmar from the time she was three years old until 10 years ago when she moved to Newtonville. In those early days when her name was Pearl Geurtze she attended the elementary school here which was located where the Masonic

Temple is now. Later, as there was no high school, she traveled to Albany each day to attend Albany High.

When her husband went into the service during World War II, Mrs. Carman, who has two children aged 21 and 16, took the job with the Bookmobile and has been with it ever since.

After one trip with a man from the Mack truck company, she mastered the four speeds and the manipulation of the bulky bookmobile, and was on her way. Incidents on the bus' mechanical

behavior have been comparatively few, but she has had her moments. The day the brakes failed on a hill and she rode it through safely with the horn braying all the way, was one moment she won't forget. Nor the time when at 20 below zero the gas line froze and she did a bit of freezing along with it until a mechanic was able to get through to her.

She reports, with pleasure, that, as yet, the tow truck has not had to solve her problems of getting stuck in the snow. She carries sand and gravel, and a snow shovel as well. These, with now and then the assistance of a welcome good Samaritan, have enabled her to keep her record.

On these winter trips Mrs. Carman and her assistant (the librarians of the Delmar Library take turns in riding with her on her trips) don furlined boots, furlined gloves and warm jackets, as the heater circulates through the whole of the bookmobile and is not always too effective for the driver. At one point Mrs. Carman confesses she wore a snow suit but finds she does her work better without quite so much bulk. The warm clothes are helpful too when the Bookmobile cannot reach a house and, as Mrs. Carman lets little get in her way of dispensing her books, she carries them through the drifts to the door.

In looking back over the 14 years of her work she says that one of the pleasantest parts of the job has been the friends she has made. In the cold weather a pot of coffee will often arrive with one or another of her "customers," and, while they are looking over books, the librarians have a chance to enjoy its warming effects. Many times women with their babies will be waiting at a regular bookmobile stop, and one woman arrives in her station wagon, as regular as clock work from her home high on a hill, to choose her reading for the next two weeks.

As Mrs. Carman starts forth she carries a regular group of books which stay on the Bookmobile for 5 or 6 months, a large number of books that have been requested (either by phone or on a previous run) and a selection of the new books from the library. As she prepares for the trip she has become accustomed to the wants

and the types of books her "regular customers" like, and has them in mind as she chooses.

A person who takes 1 or 2 books is unusual. It is far more likely that 4 or 5 to 20-25 will be checked out for each person. One woman who rarely takes less than 20, carries off one arm load and returns for a second. Mrs. Carman knows that one man likes sea stories and nonfiction, while one woman likes light romances and mysteries. As they both take a large number of books the "regulars" on the mobile library are soon exhausted and she sees that there are the needed books for them before she starts her run.

Small children (Mrs. C. says there are "lots of them") prefer to pick their own. They all know just the location of the shelves and dart for them immediately.

In the summer, when the older children are no longer in school and thus do not have access to the school library, the Bookmobile must take into consideration their wishes and include many teenage books which are not carried through the winter.

The Bookmobile often answers calls from people who are unable to leave their beds. It may be a child with rheumatic fever whose mother is unable to make the trip to the library and who chooses the books at the Bookmobile stop, or it may be an elderly person who calls in requests and whose family leaves last week's books on the porch for Mrs. Carman to exchange for a new batch. It may be a person who is no longer able to drive and who finds reading one of the pleasantest of pastimes. Mrs. Carmen knows them all and has suggestions and ideas for everyone who wishes them. The Bookmobile stops at houses, at a block or an area, wherever there is a lover of reading who needs its service.

Mrs. Barbara Rowe, Librarian, says that people have gone out of their way to let her know how much they appreciate Mrs. Carmen's friendliness thoughtfulness. "Delmar is indeed fortunate to have such an excellent person in charge of the Bookmobile!"






