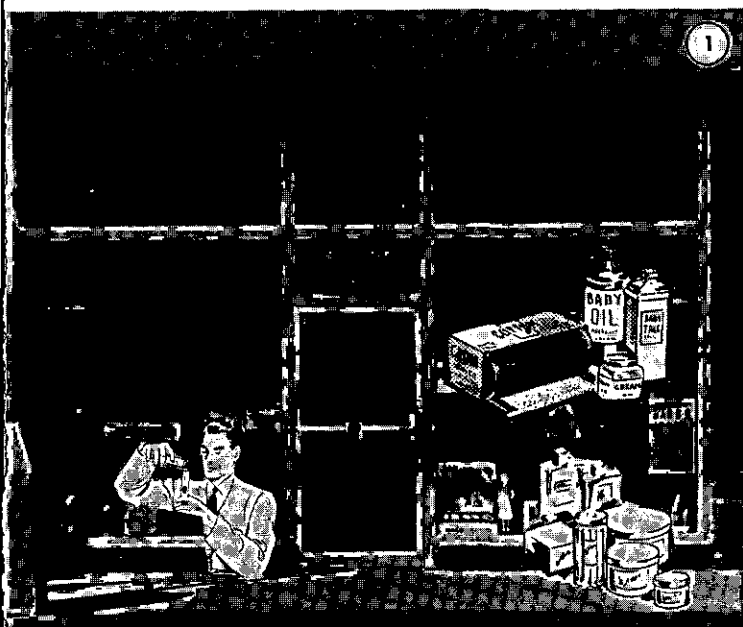

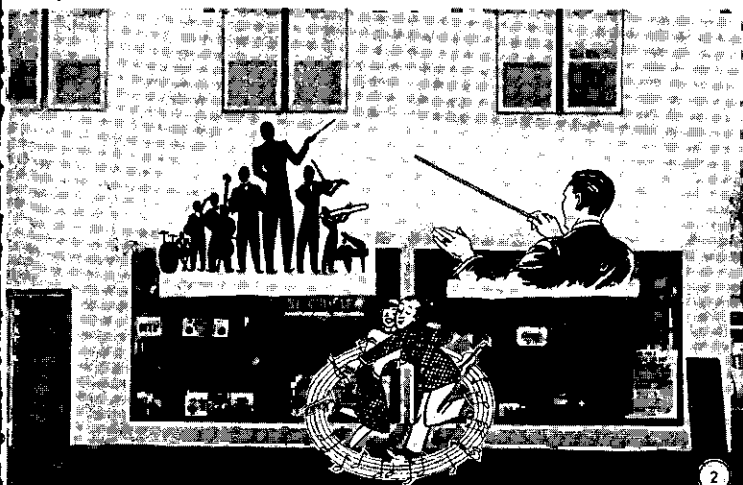

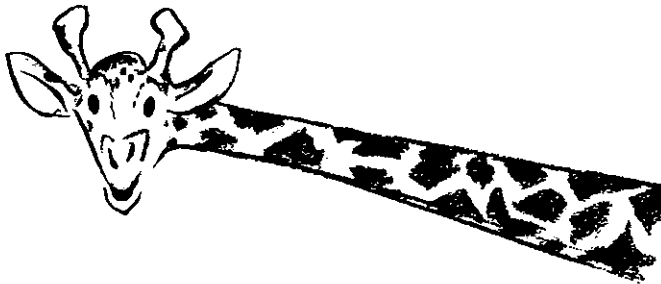

Nurses' Aides Needed

Red Cross Nurse's Aides are needed at the Veterans Administration Hospital, Albany, St. Peter's and Childs Hospitals, Mrs. Frank A. McNamee, Jr., Chairman of the program, Albany County Red Cross, announced today.

The fall session of day and evening classes, taught by registered nurses, will begin September 29 at the Chapter House, 3 Englewood Place, Albany. The course will cover 60 hours, including 30 hours classroom work and 30 hours on hospital floors under supervision.

Registration for classes will take place from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, and from 7 to 9 p.m., Monday and Thursday evenings, at the Chapter House, for the weeks of September 15 and 22. Women between the ages of 18 and 55, in good physical condition and able to give approximately a half day or one evening a week, can qualify. Nurse's Aides relieve the graduate nurse of many nursing procedures leaving her free for the duties only she can perform.

OPEN LETTER TO A BOY

BY SYDNEY J. HARRIS

Reprinted from the Chicago Daily News

This is an open letter to a boy, about 18, who forced me off the road while cutting in sharply and passing me on a hill yesterday afternoon:

Dear Son:

You may think you are a good driver, and perhaps you are. But I'd like you to keep in mind that most of your "skillful" driving is due to other motorists.

Anybody can whip along the road as fast and as carelessly as you were going. There's no trick to that - the new cars are loaded with power and pick-up - too much so, I'm afraid.

Just remember that it was my alertness that prevented an accident on the hill, not yours. And the driver who was approaching us also had to brake suddenly and swerve in order to save your life and his.

It is not your courage or dexterity that has kept you alive as long as this, but the prudence and politeness of other motorists. You have been trading on our good will and sense of self-preservation.

I wish it were possible to point out to you that your kind of driving is nothing but bad manners - it is not heroic, or adventurous or manly.

Suppose you ran down a crowded street, pushing people out of your way, knocking packages out of ladies' hands and kicking children into the gutter. What would be so heroic, or manly about that?

Nothing of course. Then why do you suppose that having 2,000 pounds of steel under you makes it any better? There's nothing

to be proud of in driving fast - any fool can do that. It's a form of cowardice to threaten other drivers, not courage.

Suppose you beat me at the getaway, or up the hill? What does that prove? Nothing, except that the car you bought is faster. You didn't make it; it's a commercial product. Anybody can buy one like it - and anybody can drive with a maniacal disregard for safety.

So don't take pride in your deadly accomplishment. A real man is considerate and polite - and takes chances only when it counts, when his honor and conscience call out for it. On the highway, most of all, it's easy to tell the men from the boys - for the men have to save the boys from the consequences of their foolish and needless bravado.

ARTIST HAROLD LAYNOR ONE-MAN SHOW NOW AT DELMAR LIBRARY

Tremendous vitality and tremendous energy were the first reactions that came in meeting Harold Laynor, whose exhibit of paintings opened last weekend at the Delmar Public Library.

Mr. Laynor's studio abounds in paintings which include oil, water-color, casien, encaustic and

enamel on a variety of surfaces. His styles travel from academic paintings to surrealism and most of his work fits into neither of these. He has been labeled a romantic realist but no label fits Mr. Laynor. His imagination is traveling too fast for that and his constant experiment with ideas and materials and their possibilities cause him to move in too many realms to allow a tag to be attached to his coattails. In his one man show at the li-

brary, his large pictures are done in laquer - a technique which he has developed in the past seven years, and which has become a very important part of his studio equipment. Only 6 or 7 professionals in the United States paint with laquer. Each seems to have developed simultaneously so that this was a purely experimental development for Mr. Laynor, in which he has found the technique of his own medium and tools and "canvass." He won the Tiffany Foundation Award with a laquer painting although there was no laquer category and he competed in the exhibit as an oil painting.

Mr. Laynor has quite a list of achievements beside this award. He has had paintings in exhibits of the Allied Artists of America, The Audubon Artists, The National Academy and the New York State Fair. He has had 2 one man shows at the Albany Institute of History and Art and at the Parnassus Gallery in Woodstock, and one man shows at the Creative Gallery in New York, at Taylor Hall at Vassar, and several shows at the Three Arts Gallery. Artist Harold Laynor
 of his paintings were shown in the Brattke Gallery in Luxemburg with other GIs, who all donated the proceeds from the sale of the paintings to the War Orphans. He was a judge for the Myers Show in Albany and another year, he had paintings in that show. In the fall of '57 his one man show of laquer at the Albany Institute brought Norman Kent, editor of American Artist Magazine, to see the results. He asked Mr. Laynor to write an article on his technique for the magazine. The article appeared in March of '58.

In 1956 he received a Huntington Hartford Foundation Art fellowship and for three months he joined the group of artists who concentrated on a definite work projects in many fields of arts. Here in a beautiful spot in California, everything is supplied to enable an artist to create without interruption.

Mr. Laynor moved to Albany only 3 months ago. He and his wife and their three children, Mark Dennis and Lois Anne live on Kenaware Ave. in Delmar. Since moving there, Mr. Laynor has made four pieces of furniture, decorated the kitchen with a fascinating design, arranged his studio, painted a number of pictures, readied pictures for a one man show due in New York in a few weeks, and carried on his

job which often takes him all over the state.

He is associate in art education for the State of New York. As assistant to the Art Supervisor the work has to do with the art programs in education throughout the state from kindergarten through adult education. It involves the problems of instruction, facilities, lectures, materials, and helping teachers with their programs. He finds it an exciting job and a big challenge. "New York State is one of the top states in high quality in Art Education," says Mr. Laynor.

Before assuming this job last year, he was supervisor of Art for the Board of Education in Poughkeepsie for 11 years. While there he and two others ran a day camp for 6 years and during another summer he helped with the stage sets at the Hyde Park Playhouse. While at the playhouse, he also sold jewelry and paintings. The jewelry was enamel on copper which he said "he made in the day and sold at night." One of his paintings interested Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt but he refused to sell it as it was of his son Mark at a young age investigating a squashed frog. (Mrs. Laynor commented that when she discovered Mark and the squashed frog her one interest was to get Mark's hands clean, but she had to wait while her husband finished the sketch.) Sloan Simpson and Chester Morris were interested in some of the paintings which did not involve his family and he made the sales.

During the war he served with the Camouflage Engineers. While

in Europe his unit spent much of the time as the "Ghost Army," of which a book has been written. Their purpose was to divert the enemy and make them believe that some 300 to 500 men were the attacking force of thousands. Recording devices were their cannons and artillery, inflated balloon-men their support. Again the imagination of Mr. Laynor was allowed full play even in the field of war.

While he was overseas he found time to paint and sent some of his paintings back to his wife. As he was working in the surrealist vein at the time, these paintings puzzled the censors office as they thought the canvases might be conveying a "message." He now has a number of paintings stamped "censored." Fortunately the censors had the good taste to put their stamp on the back of the paintings.

Mr. Laynor was born in New York City. After completing high school he studied at Parsons School for Design for three years. Then on to New York University and Art Students League. After the war he returned to NYU to work on his PHD at night and as a commercial artist by day.

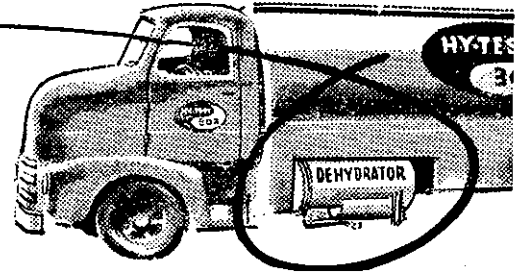
The library show does not cover all the media in which Mr. Laynor works, however it gives a good display to the laquer work which is of particular interest as a new approach. It is an exceedingly swift drying paint and requires a quick and sure hand. The surface is more luminous than that found in oils and presents a hard and beautiful finish. The exhibit will be there until the middle of October.
