#### NURSERY SCHOOL TO OPEN 13th SEASON ON MONDAY

September 29 marks the opening of the 13th year of the Tri-Village Nursery School... and the largest enrollment to date! This cooperative organization will be serving 60 3 and 4 year olds this year as a result of a double session.


This is no glorified baby sitting service! It's eyes are on the child, not on the mother. The aims of the school are to increase the independence of the child, to give them objective, supervised play (for play is the business of the boys and girls of these ages), and to give them an opportunity to adjust and have fun with their age group. All this has been carefully planned by its regular teachers, Mrs. Ralph Smith and Mrs. John Paige, and a teacher's aide, Mrs. E.S. Dayter.

Today, the Nursery School is a going concern because of the persistence and work of the parents of the present and previous "students." Being a co-operative venture, each parent is expected to serve on a committee during the year. In order to keep the tuition low (presently \$45 per quarter) so that it is available to as many as possible the committees have taken on all sorts of jobs to keep the costs down.

The Tri-Village Nursery School now has its' headquarters in the Bethlehem Center School building, at the junction of Route 9-W and Feura Bush Road, where it rents the ground floor from the Board of Education. School buses transport the children and the nursery school pays for this on a mileage rate.

However, this has not always been the situation. Their history includes a continous succession of moving days – and many a desperate search for accomodations.

Beginning in 1946, in the Nathaniel Adams Post, they have been located in the Sunday school room of the Methodist Church in Slingerlands, the Elsmere school, Delmar Reformed Church, and the Elsmere Fire Hall. Car pools and taxis provided transportation in the early years. These methods proved either too expensive or too unstable. The use of the school buses has simplified this







A similiar program for 4 year olds is being planned for the spring.




