





COLUMBUS STORY**
(Please pardon our tardiness!)

The message was long and excited and part of it blew over across the river, so that all the Chief could make out was that something had happened to a bus. Then the first bulletin was repeated, and he learned that a fellow named Columbus claimed to have discovered the country recently.

Anyway, he didn't think the information worth passing along to the rest of the Delawares and Mohawks and Mohicans. Everyone knew, he thought, that this country had been discovered about 500 years earlier by a Viking named Kirk (or was it Lief?) the Lucky.

But the Chief was wrong. Everyone didn't know that Lief Douglas (or was it Ericson?) had discovered the country. (In fact, historians are still arguing about it today, and archeologists turn over a new Lief every now and then.) Columbus had a good press agent, you see, while Lief just sailed for kicks. (According to the Vineland Grapevine, he was kicked out of Greenland a month or so before arriving here.)

Then the commentator went on to say that the country wasn't even going to be named North or South Columbus despite all the overtime the man had put in discovering it. It seems that a little later, a paisano of his, one Amerigo Vespucci, had also discovered a new place: Brazil. An eager-beaver printer, looking for a few fast ducats, published a broadside attributing the discovery of the new continents to Amerigo. He was a small printer and his selection of type was limited, so he was obliged to spell the name "America" because he was all out of "g's" and "o's."

Vespucci enjoyed his undeserved acclaim. They say that he and Columbus are still keeping score, with honors about even. Amerigo has two continents and some songs named after him; while Columbus has a Circle and a good many villages, towns and cities.

At any rate, the Chief of the Delawares didn't tell anybody about Columbus except his own braves and the people in the village of Slingshot, an arrow flight away. He almost didn't tell them because they claimed to be the most Original of all the Original Inhabitants, and he thought this news might unsettle them.

So the news didn't get around very fast, and that's one of the reasons why the name of Grasshopper Soup Day -- which had been popular for centuries -- wasn't changed to Columbus Day until long after the palefaces had taken over.

THE STORY OF THE 6TH ANNUAL JOHN G. MYERS COMPETITIVE SHOW

Edward Cowley, of Altamont is one of the 10 finalists in the John G. Meyers 6th annual Competitive Show.

Anxiously awaited is the November judging which will determine the first, second and third prizes.

This show, to which John G. Myers contributes the prize money and the wall space for exhibition, is co-sponsored by the Albany Institute of History and Art and is open to artists residing within 100 miles of Albany. Each year, there is a central theme around which artists mould their ideas for the paintings. This year, the Hudson-Champlain Celebration opens up many vistas for the imagination of the contestants. Every effort will be made to have the paintings incorporated in the New York-Vermont celebration of 1959, in which Henry Hudson and Samuel Champlain are being honoured.

It was in 1953 that the John G. Myers store began to think about the idea of an art competition. In an effort to encourage local artists, they approached Mr. Robert Wheeler, then director of the Albany Institute of History and Art, to consider the possibilities of an art exhibition on the first floor of the store. Mr. Wheeler responded enthusiastically. Clover Mikol, of Fernbank Avenue, Delmar, was then consulted in an effort to get the view-point of the artists. She was most excited about the idea, considering it "the most gracious gesture to the artists of the area." Since that time, Mrs. Mikol has represented both the store and the artists in the plans and preparations with the Institute.

The possibilities of displaying paintings has always been a difficult one for artists. The remunerations for work done are often few and far between. So, it is both exciting and valuable to the artists to have their paintings on display where many people, unused to art galleries, have a chance to see them. It is hoped that this will encourage more interest in original art and the artists themselves.

There is little doubt that the publicity and prestige, which Myers receives on the show, is beneficial. More important, as Roy Myers, the president said: "The paintings have given much more character to the store."

The process of choosing these paintings takes some time. In June, the first jury chose 10 pictures from a group submitted by 34 area artists. The ten that were selected have been repainted during the summer on canvasses 4' x 6'. Then, again, in November, they will be judged. Myers will award a 1st prize of \$300; a 2nd prize of \$200; and a 3rd prize of \$100. Beside this, all ten receive a \$100 for their labors of the summer, and in many cases, their pictures will be hung in the store or donated to civic public buildings in Albany.


Prominent among the artists, who have submitted paintings to the exhibit over the past few years, from our Tri-Village area are Ed Becker, of Delmar, who won first prize in the first exhibition of 1953; Ed Cowley, of Altamont, also, a past prize winner and who is in the first 10 this year; Virginia Perez, who recently moved from Elsmere; and Joe Todak, of Delmar, known to most of us, not only for his paintings but for his endeavors with our children in the Junior High School.

It is of interest to note that, when a store in Texas developed this type of show, it was given nation wide publicity. It is something which should be encouraged throughout the country and we salute John G. Myers for their foresight in instituting this show in our area.
