



After reading 'The Spotlight' for October 2nd from letters to classifieds I went to bed. But the homeless kittens kept me awake so I got up to write a letter myself.



COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION **REPORTS FIRST MEETING**

How a community formulates, adopts and carries out a comprehensive plan for its future growth was presented by a panel of two speakers at the Bethlehem Community Association's first meeting this fall, held Wednesday evening at the Delmar Public Library. The speakers were Dr. George B. Robinson, director of the Bureau of Planning, New York State Department of Commerce, and Jerome L. Smith, local representative of a planning firm.


The usual planning process was described by the speakers. The town board usually appoints a planning board to draw up a master plan for the community. The planning board then employs a firm of planning consultants to help it gather data on land use, the economic base of the community, its traffic facilities, its public utilities, and its recreational facilities. These data are then analyzed to determine the community's present status,

Careful thought is then given to the community objectives to what kind of community it wishes to become. The plan for achieving these objectives over a period of years then becomes the master plan of the community. This plan is then adopted by the town board, and is constantly referred to by the town board in making its decisions. Out of it grows the zoning ordinances of the community.

It was pointed out that a master plan aids in attracting desirable industries to a community, that it aids private developers of residential property, and that it enables communtiles to purchase land for recreational and highway purposes when it can still be had at reasonable prices, and before other buildings are erected upon it.
