LETTER

A Reader Writes on a National Holiday

Dear Spotlight:

The spirit and meaning of all our holidays have become so watered down they have almost no significance. Easter is a day to dress up; Christmas is a day to give and receive gifts; and Veteran's Day is a day off for some, an ordinary working day for others.

When the Armistice became lost in the mists of time, November 11th was changed to Veteran's Day; a day set aside by the President to honor those who had participated in all our wars. True, there are some dedicated groups and individuals who observe the day by a prayer or a backward look; but for most part, the reason for its being, is ignored. At best, all most of us do is suffer a brief pang of guilt for our disinterested attitude.

It makes one wonder if the true meaning of war should be taught children in their tender years. How much protection should they be given from the thorny side of life? They're tougher and more realistic than we think. Maybe it's time they knew wars are more than brass bands and flying banners. As a starter, they can be taught the significance of Veteran's Day. In many cases. war exerted a great influence on the lives of their fathers and mothers, and affected their own verv existence.

Just talk to a child who was born within the shadow of World War II, and you might as well be talking about the War of Roses. How, then, can you expect him to appreciate the significance of Veteran's Day? Strip war of its glamour, and we may breed a generation that will discover the magic formula for peace.


World Community Day



SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL EXPANSION PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

The extent of the proposed expansion of the Bethlehem Central Senior High School was revealed today in a report by the district board of education to the 9--member Citizens Advisory Committee that studied the educational program and building needs over the past year. Accepting the committee's findings on the educational program and school population growth, the board has restated the requirements for building expansion. These requirements will serve as the working guide for Henry Blatner, the architect who designed the original building, in developing plans to be submitted for voter approval later in the school

Differences from the recommendations of the citizens study group on the building and grounds were characterized by a spokesman for the board of education as those "of degree, not of principle." Eliminated from the citizens committee recommendations were a greenhouse for the agriculture and biology departments, an additional homemaking room. the largest of the recommended music rooms, a larger team room, and one chemistry recitation room. A recommendation to relocate the dining room and kitchen to permit enlargement for feeding in three shifts was replaced by a plan to increase the present dining room from 250 to 350 seats and to plan, utimately to feed in four shifts.

The board went beyond the citizens committee recommendations in providing 10 classrooms for English in place of the 9 recommended. In other respects. the board concurred in recomdations for classrooms, the enlarged building to provide a total of 9 for citizenship education, 8 for science, 7 for mathematics, 5 for languages, 3 for business education, 2 each for art, industrial arts, music, and 1 for agriculture, driver education, and study hall. No change will be made in the existing auditorium, and one small gymnasium, to provide one additional teaching station, will be constructed.

The size and book capacity of the school library will be doubled, providing 100 seats and space for 9,000 books. Work rooms will be provided for individual and small group work, 9 adjacent to academic classrooms and 3 preparation-storage-work rooms for the sciences of biology, chemistry physics. Grounds development of 10 acres, in addition to the 30 already developed, will leave 44 acres for future use. Additional office and storage space is alos called for in the plan.

The existing building, completed in 1954 for 550 students, has already felt the pressure of increased enrollment and wider course offerings. With enrollment standing at 654, growth to 1,040 in ten years has been forecast by the citizens committee. Nine classes with 30 or more pupils are being taught and 9 other classes are being taught in undersized rooms. Courses have been added in German, Latin, English, mathematics and business education. The number of students taking courses in science has increased from 205 in 1954 to 411 this year.
