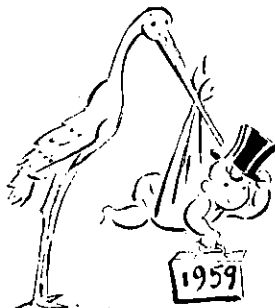
Community Festival Committee Reports Biggest Year To Date

"Community" is the word for the Bethlehem Christmas Festival, for the community supported the annual celebration as never before. The festival itself also reached a new high in inspiration and entertainment under the direction of Mrs. Sydney L. (Danny) Smith and Mr. Rolland R. Truitt.

Offerings at the three performances amounted to \$1,388.17 while contributions from numerous organizations thus far come to \$512.06, swelling the total to \$1,900.23, a substantially greater amount than in any previous year of the festival's seventeen year history. And this is not the final accounting; additional donations from other individuals and organizations are expected to bring the total to the \$2,000 mark. Contributions may be made payable to the Bethlehem Community Christmas Festival and mailed to Mr. Thurlow McWhinnie, Treasurer, 13 Herber Avenue, Delmar. As an indication of the interest in the festival by persons outside the Town of Bethlehem, a check has been received from a woman in Concord, N.H. who has never ever seen the festival but has learned about it from a friend in Delmar.

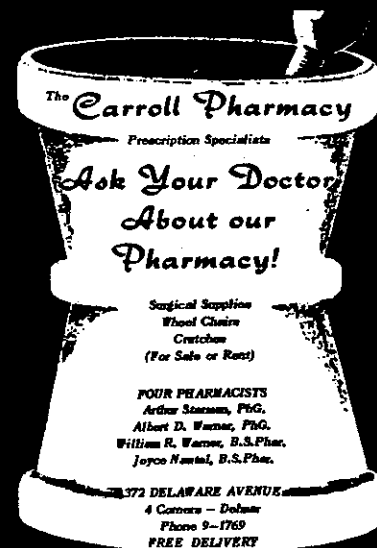

1958 INAUGURAL BALL

The Inaugural Ball is without a doubt the most "talked about" social of the holidays. Its' history dates back to the early 1800s, when the Albany Burgess corps first sponsored the affair. Later in the century, the board of managers of St. Margaret's Home and the Child's Hospital, all of whom were the 'elite' of Albany society at the time, assumed responsibility for this gala event. The proceeds were used for the maintenance of these two institutions. Although they have been held in various places including the TenEyck Hotel and the Vincentian Institute, the 10th Infantry Armory (as it was called in the early 1900's) is the perfect setting for such a tremendous party. The huge drill shed floor is adequate for a large crowd of dancers, the balcony allows a view of the entire pageantry, and there is no other building in the city that can accomodate as many people, who just want to sit on the side-lines and watch.

At the time, the late President Roosevelt was elected Governor of New York State for the first time, the board of managers gave up the sponsorship. The late General Charles E. Walsh, commander of the 10th Infantry, loved the traditional and felt that such a gracious custom should not be allowed to be terminated. And so for Roosevelt's 3 terms and Governor Lehman's first inauguration General Walsh and his men entertained in the grand manner; and the variety of dress uniforms made the Ball more colorful and spectacular, if possible, than before.

When Governor Lehman's second term began, during the first years of the War, he requested that no party be given at such a time. And it was a long 12 years before Albany again had the treat of an Inaugural

Ball. At that time, 1946, Colonel Charles E. Walsh, Jr. a veteran of the Pacific Theatre, and was commanding officer of the First Regiment of the New York Guard. His memories of the previous parties encouraged him to revive the custom in honour of Governor Thomas E. Dewey. More than 2000 people joyfully responded to the invitation to pay honor to their Governor - and once again it was a night full of music, elegance, and tradition.

However, the National Guard was being actively reorganized - headquarters were moved to Buffalo and the Inaugural Ball again became just a "lovely memory."

Word of our past splendors must have reached the ears of Mr. Rockefeller and realizing the monumental work entailed in such an event, he has assigned the task to his own vast organization. They have surpassed all past glories in arranging for 2 bands, Cab Calloway and Meyer Davis . . . the Rockettes . . . military bands . . . fruit and wine punches . . . and on and on. There are few in the State of New York, who aren't breathlessly awaiting an invitation.

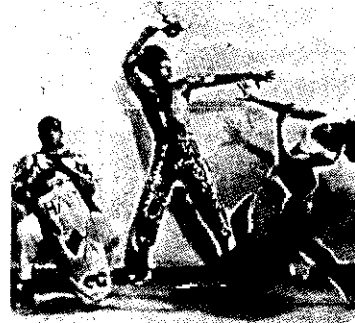

Mr. and Mrs. Becker Have Show At Albany Art Institute

Edwin and Florence Becker, of Nathaniel Boulevard, Delmar, have a combined show at the Albany Institute of History and Art now through January 4. His field is painting and hers is photography. Both have a strong feeling for movement and moods, and in their different ways, use it most effectively. (Mrs. Becker's photographs will be on display in the Delmar Public Library immediately following the Institute showing and will be reviewed by the Spotlight next week or soon.)

Edwin Becker is probably an impressionist but he runs the large range into which that category can fit. The larger group of his paintings at the Institute are water colors, though oils are well-represented with 11 paintings.

The water colors have a freshness and cleanness of line, which gives them a great deal of strength. Yet these water color paintings cover a variety of styles, moods, and subjects.

In "Conquistador's Church," the space and quiet are doubly enhanced by two figures in the foreground, at one side - they are not important in themselves but in the part they play in the composition. Whereas in "Afternoon in the Park," where space is, again, an important part of the composition, it is a busy and light spot in which the play of

lines: swing lines, fence lines and sun lines, enhance and create the mood.

Another "style," which is further afield in the "impressionism," is that of "Steel Drums." The drums are there . . . but so is an almost Hallowe'en party effect, in which a figure emerges and small faces peer. Here color and movement all add up to a pleasing response. However, it is difficult to put one's finger on the result. That, in itself, can be part of its' charm.

"Picnic Storm" is most effective with its' streak of lightning across a dark sky but the actual fascination of the picture lies in the quick wind, which has come up and is in the trees, the grass, the figures, and even the buildings seem to brace against it.

"Pink Rain" has an entirely different feeling, which again is in the figures and the entire painting.

At times, nostalgia is very present in many of Ed Becker's work. He can bring out memories in the style of a car and the dating of an object.

He can play with lines as in "Rooftops: Paris," to set an aura just right for a flower mart . . .

Moods and movement are everywhere dominant in Edwin Becker's paintings. He uses, repeatedly, composition, design, structure, color, and figures to obtain the distinct moods.

This letter could have been addressed to the Delmar Rescue Squad, but if it had been, the members of that organization would have been the only ones to read it; the primary purpose of the writing is to once more bring to the attention of everyone in our area just how fine an organization these men represent.

Just before Christmas we needed ambulance service from our house (between Unionville and Clarksville) to Albany Hospital. Volunteers Bill Hermance and Bill Contento took the call. They backed the ambulance over an icy lawn to within a few feet of the door; brought in the stretcher and handled their patient with all the gentleness and consideration of professionals. There followed a safe, sane drive to the Hospital - and once there, these men again took the extra time to take their patient straight through Emergency to the elevator, up to her room and placed her ever so gently in bed.

To the members of the Delmar Rescue Squad there is nothing new in this story. But to those of us who may have sought the sanctuary of a quick admission to a hospital, this is indeed a marvel. The thoughtfulness, kindness and consideration of these men stands out in our minds as a beacon of man's complete humanity toward his fellow man.

Our heartfelt thanks go out to these men who, in our new "space world," still find time for unselfish love and devotion to the comforts of the ill.
