This is the first production in our area of Mr. Menotti's satirical opera which has been enthusiastically acclaimed by music critics and the opera loving public since its New York debut in 1947.

The second offering will be specially prepared reader's theater adaptation of Ethan Frome, Edith Wharton's powerful novel concerning the tragic lives of three simple New England people.

Completing the program will be Chekhov's delightful one-act comedy <u>The Boor</u>. In this play, considered one of the best of Chekhov's shorter works, the author pokes gentle fun at 19th century Russian life.

Tickets for this production, which will be given Saturday night only, can be obtained at the box office on the night of performance. Season ticket holders need not make advance reservations.

Mental Health Board Hearing

Seventy-five citizens of Albany County filled the Board of Supervisors room at the County Court house at noon on January 15, to declare themselves for or against the establishment of a Mental Health Board for this County.

At 12:10, Michael J. Powers, Chairman of the Board banged his gavel and formally declared the hearing open. In all 26 persons, representing a broad crosssection of religious groups, P.T.A.s, school, social and civic organizations throughout the County, spoke in support of the creation of such a Board. Two individuals, speaking in behalf of themselves, opposed the move.

The Hearing climaxed six weeks of dedicated work on the part of many groups and organizations throughout the County, following the failure of the Board of Supervisors to include any provision for such a Board in its 1959 budget, to bring about passage of legislation that would permit the establishment of a Mental Health Board. It is hoped that early in February, the preliminaries will be completed and the Board will be appointed. In the meantime a hearing will be held in the City of Albany before the City can vote to be included in the plan.

At stake in all this was the preservation of the Child Guidance Center; the bringing into the County of matching funds made available upon the creation of a Mental Health Board, under Community Mental Health Services Act; and it is to be hoped, the reestablishment of the Study Center for Learning Disability.

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



and it provides experiences for business students.

Edward Felter, a senior, is the manager of the store. He is aided by clerks David Cairns, Marilyn Drautz, Donna Irwin, Don Potter, Jim Snyder, and Carol Vagele. This staff keeps the records of stock, takes inventory, sells merchandise, handles the money, and plans and arranges the display cases. Hugh Brown, instructor, keeps the central books for the store and submits financial statements to the administration every two months.

The school store, which is open every school day from 7:55 a.m. to 2:45 p.m., gives the business students "some living business experience which better prepares them for the business world and for society," said Mr. Brown.

Thirteen girls from the secretarial practice class are working part-time in area business offices. Five banks, two professional men, two retail stores, two insurance companies, and one transportation agency are using the services of these girls, who leave the school at 12:55 each school day to go to their places of employment.

Mrs. Gladys Hosey, teachercoordinator of the work experience program, said the results of the program have been gratifying since its inception in September 1955. "It is a two-way street of learning. The girls get practical business experience and the employers have the opportunity to train beginning workers at a reasonable pay rate, " said Mrs, Hosey.
