

Clinton Square Neighborhood House Works Modern Miracles

Come in out of the cold and let's visit a while in Clinton Square Neighborhood House. First, let's go upstairs. It's eleven-thirty in the morning and from the kitchen come the first tentative whiffs of the vegetable beef soup that soon will be filling empty lummies.

The volunteers are here ahead of us, hard at work setting tables and helping Cook prepare the lunch. You'll know some of them, I'm sure, for more than forty women from the Tri-Village alone volunteer for service at Clinton Square. Sure enough, her comes Betty Cornelius, in charge of volunteers, making certain that things are ready for the sixty youngsters from 5 to 12 years of age who will be trooping in shortly for lunch, from the school next door.

The food they will consume is the special province of Marge Spuck. Every week, Marge parlays \$17.00 into 300 filling lunches designed to form the basis of a balanced diet for kids who know little of such things save for the fact that they are hungary. You can only stretch \$17.00 so far by depending on friends, the Bakeries for day-old bread, the Ice Cream Companies for specials left over on holidays, a friendly Butcher for a gift of soup bones or a special price, the Federal Government for certain basic surplus commodities, and the Church women for gifts of meat and special treats of cupcakes or a bushel of apples.

Everything is under control up here, so let's take a quick tour of the rest of the building. It is a curiously charming turn of fate that what was once the Third Precinct Police Station is now the center of community life for the families that live around it. The "tank room" is now a gym: the cell block is used for ceremics; there is a woodworking shop, a room with a juke box for teen-age activities, and a Jack and Jill room where the thirty odd Kindergarteners work and play.

Neighborhood House is one of the 32 Red Feather Agencies, but I'm sure you are already aware of that. Let's go on and meet the wonderful staff that works under the direction of Mr. Norman Clarke. You will like them, for each of them are devoted to the dream of making the neighborhood around 224 No. Pearl Street a better place in which to live, not only for the youngsters but for their parents.

Neighborhood House has only been in its new quarters for a short time and its needs are many. Over the Christmas holidays, the ceramic kiln was accidentally plugged in by one of the youngsters and the unit burned out. This puts a cramp in the program, as does the scarcity of materials for the woodworking shop. In the teen room, the six foot windows are still covered with paper because the budget won't stretch to include drapes. But as people learn about the work being done 'down on North Pearl, surely ways will be found to solve these problems.

The women who serve as volunteers at Neighborhood House are seeking at least a part of the answer by forming a Women's Auxiliary. On Friday, February 13, at two o'clock in the afternoon, the doors of Neighborhood house will be thrown open to all interested women in the area. Come in and have a cup of tea, meet your friends, and see for yourself what Clinton Square Neighborhood House is and what it does!

Minstrel Show Needs Workers

A minstrel show is in the making in Glenmont. The committee is seeking talent. Last year a minstrel show was produced by only about two dozen people and one able director, Dick Schoch of the Glenmont PTA. The faculty chorus line was a knockout - so described by those who attended.
