

EUROPEAN VACATIONS TOP ESSAY CONTEST PRIZES

Prizes to be Awarded to Junior and Senior High School Students in Hudson - Champlain Fete

New York State's junior and senior high school students and their teachers were offered a wide range of prizes today - some 570 in all - including two-week vacations in Europe, a veritable treasure of gold, silver and bronze medals, and even wooden shoes guaranteed to fit by an expert cobbler from the Netherlands.

The prizes, announced by Senator Ernest I. Hatfield, chairman

of the State Commission on Historic Observances, will go to students writing prize-winning historic essays on state and local subjects and teachers originating special classroom projects as part of New York's Year of History, marking the 350th Hudson-Champlain anniversary celebration and several hundred other observances in all of the State's 62 counties.

The six essay contest winners, three in the junior high schools and three in the senior high schools, will receive a two-week July vacation in Europe via Royal Dutch KLM Airlines.

The grading and eliminations at the county level will be under the jurisdiction of the Commission's county chairman and a committee of prominent educators and civic leaders. Each County will submit to the Commission three winners in each division, a junior and senior who will receive gold, silver and bronze medals and certificates of achievement. Each student whose essay is submitted for county judging will receive a special certificate of achievement, Senator Hatfield announced.

A total of 186 medals will be awarded to the junior students

and a similar number to the seniors," he declared.

"Teacher participation in the program is designed to give recognition to the many unusual and stimulating classroom projects initiated for the Year of History, English and citizenship education teachers.

"The three most effective and inspiring classroom projects in each division will be chosen by each county committee and forwarded to the Commission for State-wide judging. Year of History medallions and certificates of achievement will be awarded the top three teacher winners in each county for both junior and senior high schools. A panel of judges in the State Department of Education will select two teachers, one junior and one senior high, for a two-week vacation in Europe. The teachers will accompany the six students winning the essay awards, Senator Hatfield said.

The student essays, to 1,500 words, and the summary by teachers must be submitted to the County Chairman no later than May 1, Senator Hatfield declared. County chairman will

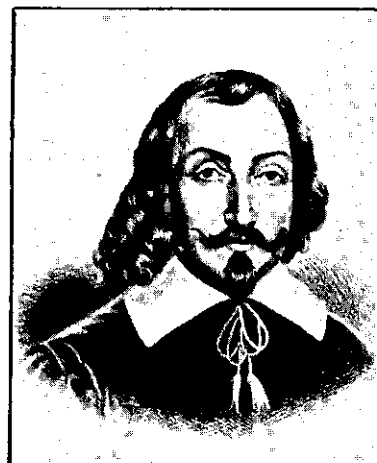
submit local winners to the Commission by May 15.

Senator Hatfield said the Commission has completed arrangements for the trip to Europe via KLM Airlines and details of the itinerary in Europe are being worked out by commission.

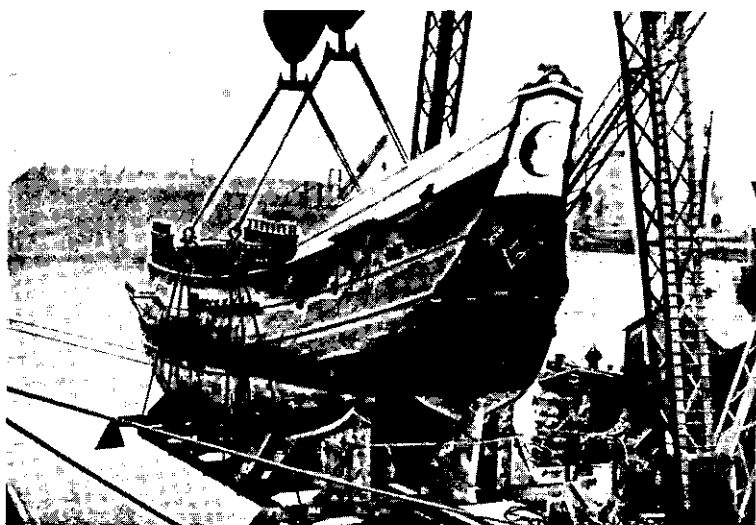

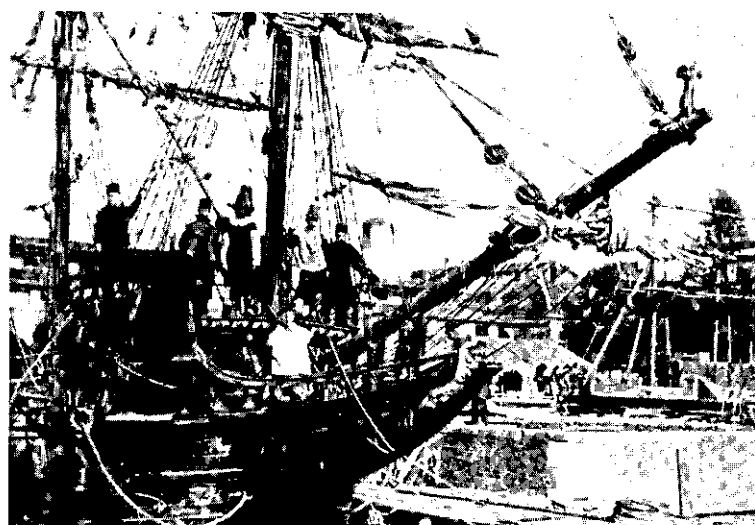

Rev. Fitzgerald Talks on Our Duties As Parents

Reverend William B. Fitzgerald gave an excellent talk at a Holy Name meeting last week at St. Thomas' Church in Delmar, on "Are Parents Doing Their Job?" He suggested that all parents should ask themselves these questions.

"Do I have a correct concept of parental authority? Authority in the correct sense is the acceptance of a truth and a rule because one loves that person and places trust in that person. Children will repeat parental authority only when they can respect their parents. Obedience depends upon the value, the example, the superiority, and the moral integrity of the one giving the command. Love, obedience and authority go together.

Many parents feel that they will never be loved if children are compelled to obey them. This is false reasoning; in fact, the contrary is true. If children are pampered, cuddled, and given complete freedom, their parents will never enjoy the love and respect which is their due. A cuddled child becomes a dependent child. A parent becomes useful - and where there is utility, there is little love.

Do I set a Good Example? It is possible for parents to have right principles in their minds but, in the presence of their children, to fail to set the example of those principles. Rigorous standards of conduct for their children must be set according to the Ten Commandments and the moral teachings of God. If

parents themselves do not follow the standards in their own conduct, their children will almost surely live and act as they do.

Do I foster a healthy attitude concerning the girl and boy relationship among teenagers? Strict rules for teenage dating should be enforced. The modern and pagan idea of not only allowing, but encouraging, high school and even grade school to "go steady" is absolutely wrong. Human nature does not change nor does the moral code change. Steady company-keeping is not for teenagers. It can be the cause of a great deal of harm spiritually, physically, and psychologically. It is pathetic when one views the sort of warped social life which results from this action. A constant vigilance should be present concerning teenage drinking and driving. This is a serious moral obligation and the responsibility of all parents.

Do I Spend Enough Time with My Children? Too many parents find all sorts of activities with which to fill their leisure hours with the result that they have little time to spend with their children. The first interest of parents must be their children. They must have a great deal of patience, coupled with a willingness to associate with them, thus gaining a greater understanding of their problems and needs."

The fruit topping is beautiful, golden canned cling peach slices with their syrup thickened, sweetened a bit, and flavored with a little orange. Festive looking "Valentine Shortcakes" with their flavorful peach sauce are delicious "as is" or topped with whipped cream.

- Valentine Shortcakes**
- 2 cups biscuit mix
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine
 - Milk (about 1/2 cup)
 - 2 tablespoons melted butter
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 1 teaspoon grated orange rind
 - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- Peach Sauce:**
- 1 (No. 2 1/2) can of cling peach slices
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 1 tablespoon cornstarch
 - 1/8 teaspoon salt
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons grated orange rind
 - 1 tablespoon butter or margarine

Combine biscuit mix and 1/4 cup sugar. Place melted butter in measuring cup, and add milk to make 1/2 cup. Stir into dry mixture to make soft dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board and roll to rectangle about 10 to 12 inches. Spread with a tablespoon butter, and sprinkle 1/4 cup sugar mixed with orange rind and cinamon. Roll up as for jelly roll to make 12-inch roll. Cut into 6 thick slices.

Cut each slice about half way through, and open cut as opening a book. Place on lightly greased baking sheet, and pinch uncut portion to a point for heart shape. Brush tops with remaining tablespoon butter. Bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.) about 12 to 15 min. until browned. Serve warm, topped with Peach Sauce.

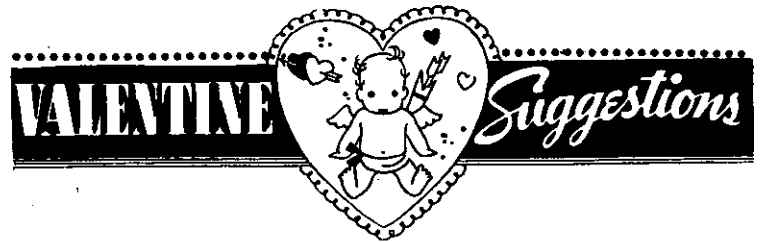
Peach Sauce: Drain peaches, reserving 1 cup syrup. Heat syrup. Blend sugar, cornstarch and salt; blend into hot syrup and cook and stir until mixture boils thoroughly and is thickened. Add orange rind, butter and peach slices, and heat a minute longer, until peaches are warm.

Makes 6 servings.

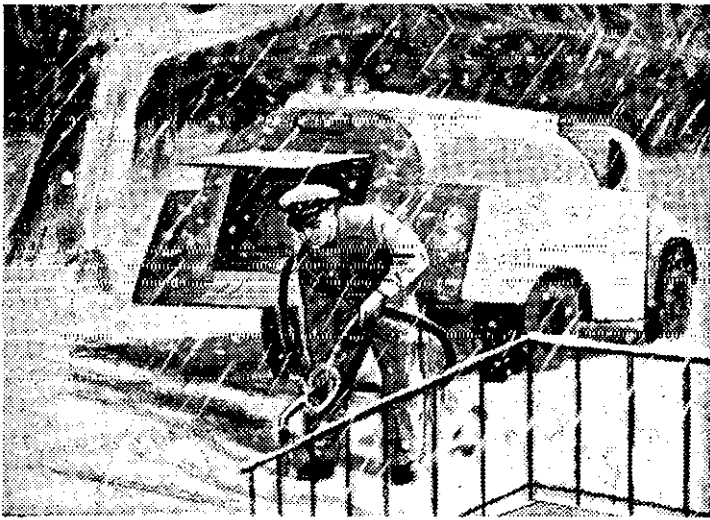

They discussed plans for demonstration days which take place in early April and the Dress Revue which is in June.

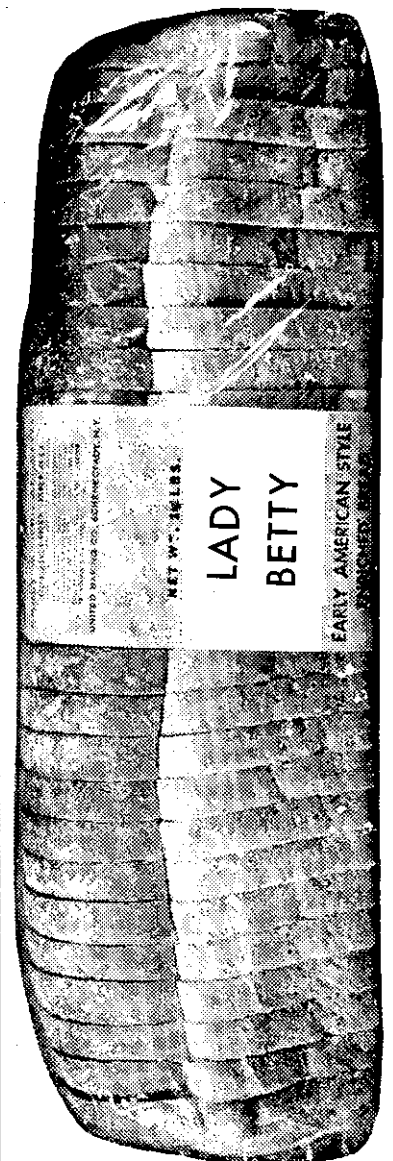

**URGENT NEEDS OF TRINITY
INSTITUTION OUTLINED**

"I wish I could say what Trinity's Thrift Shop means for my family - warm clothing - and most of all, warm friendships. I can't buy new clothing but don't have to beg for charity here."

This is one of many comments that are overheard at Trinity Institution's Thrift Shop which is operated by Trinity Institution, a Community Chest agency, at 19 Trinity Place each Tuesday.

Most people like to help themselves. No one likes to feel like an "object of charity" - a "case" on the rolls of our Welfare Agencies. But often they need a helping hand before things get too hopeless. Often it is just a small thing - a little boost like getting a warm snowsuit for 50¢.

This is where the Thrift Shop fits in. It began about two years ago when the agency recognized that there was a tremendous head among people with limited income to secure usable warm clothing for their families. They could not afford to buy enough of this needed clothing in the stores. The Institution has many friends who have contributed usable clothing which has very little market value but has much human value and also is a most practical solution to the problem many families face.
