
THIS WAS the new Delmar Post Office which was opened officially on April 1, 1939, with Arthur I. Ryan as Postmaster.

On April 1, Arthur I. Ryan, Delmar Postmaster, will retire and move to Florida. A simple statement to some, perhaps, but not to those who have been the recipients of Art's kindness and friendship. His has been a full life and his retirement will be a distinct loss to our community.

Twenty-five years ago, on May 23, 1934, Art took over the Delmar Post Office from retiring Frank Patterson. At that time it was located on the ground floor of Mr. Patterson's home at 389 Delaware Avenue. Delmar, at that time, was a thriving community, but the volume of mail required only one clerk to assist the Postmaster and the revenue was approximately \$8,000.00 for that year.

Art has worked closely with the Post Office Department and the Town of Bethlehem to make our Post Office the smooth-running business it is today.

On April 1, 1939, he officially opened the present Post Office. Between that date and this he has seen the revenue grow to \$85,000.00 a year and the payroll has jumped to 26 full time employees.

Art is a graduate of Albany High School, Class of 1913; he saw overseas service in World War I; he was a demon salesman of Cadillacs and Packards during the Roaring 20's. His favorite past-time is driving to New Rochelle with his wife, Georgeanna, tovisit their daughter, Joyce, a physiotherapist, and their two grand-daughters. To those who know him well, he is a devoted and loyal friend.

It is a tribute to Art's ability that he was appointed under a Democratic administration and has retained his post.



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


Metropolitan Appoints Norris
