

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
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

Dear Sirs:

Enclosed is a pass issued by the Albany & Susquehanna R.R. in 1865 to John Bradt for use between Adamsville (now Delmar) and Albany. It might be of interest to some of the older residents of the Tri-Village area if you could show it in the Spotlight.

In the middle 1880's it seems that some of the inhabitants of Adamsville desired to have the name of their hamlet changed and the story goes that some timetables of British Railroads were looked over. The name Delmar appealed to them and so a change was made.

The first passenger train on the Albany & Susquehanna R.R. (now the Delaware & Hudson) passed through Adamsville in September, 1863. However the road was not completed to Binghamton until several years later and an excursion train was run from Albany to Binghamton on January 12th, 1869, to celebrate the event.

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
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
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EDITORIAL . . .

Although we, in the Tri-Village area, are most fortunate to have 4 immaculately efficient drugstores, it was of interest to read that the Pharmaceutical Society of New York has sponsored a bill in the State Senate that is designed to protect both the public and the pharmacists. The bill, introduced by Senator Earl W. Brydges, will tighten up the regulations on the sale and labelling of medicines, restrict sales of non-drug outlets, and put the responsibilties on the pharmacist of telling the customer if a given drug is potentially habit forming.

A good pharmacist is a trained technician. He is a graduate of Pharmacy College, with years of apprentice training. He is usually a good citizen because he helps to respect and enforce the law. If his business is drugs, he does not want his store to be a glorified 5 & 10 with the soda fountainhis main income. However, he needs protection. Only qualified persons such as pharmacists should be allowed to dispense drugs that are potentially dangerous. Such drugs must, under the law, be labelled. And outhe pharmacists would lie the responsibility of explaining to a customer exactly what the label involved and implied.

A good pharmacist does not want to replace a physician. However, they can make a wonderful team. He does not want to make sundaes or sell comics. He is a professional. He deserves the protection and the responsibility that the sponsorship of this bill intends.

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
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SCHOOL NOTES

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

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
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
