FONT GROVE RE-VISITED

ALMOST 100 YEARS AGO several acres of land were purchased six miles from the City of Albany near the present village of Slingerlands, which formed the nucleus of a vast country estate and farm that came to be known as Font Grove. Although in no way to be compared in size or method of operation with the famed Van Rensselaer patroon system, eventually Font Grove, nevertheless, grew into an immense enterprise which at one time was composed of approximately 600 acres of land, 12 cottages, several large dairy bams, hay barns, a carriage barn, stables, extensive greenhouses and a staff of 20 to 25 hired

To find out how this all begun and how it prospered through many years, we were most privileged recently to have interviewed in New York City where she now resides, Mrs. Charles Thaddeus Terry, born Katherine Lansing Hendrick, the last surviving child of Colonel James Hendrick, the progenitor of Font Grove. A most charming and gracious lady now in her eighties, Mrs. Terry's memories of Font Grove are keen and filled with nostalgic recollections of a bygone era of leisurely living.

James Hendrick (1825-1899) lived in Bath and Walsall, England and came to this country about 1837. He studied law and in due course was admitted to the bar in Albany, N.Y. In 1859 he married Judith Anne Wands, daughter of James Burnside Wands, who had come to the United States from Scotland and raised a family of six children. Col. Hendrick, whose military title resulted from service as aide to New York Governor Seymour owned a large Insurance company in Albany, was President of several corporations, among them the Albany Aniline &Chemical Works and the Jagger Iron Works, and was a Director of the Delaware & Hudson Railroad. He started acquiring land around 1863, first purchasing acreage from James Burnside Wands who had owned several hundred acres for many years, and later from Abram Oliver and | lar drive, be autiful spruce hedges |

Dr. Albertis Becker. Originally, of course, all this land had been part of the famed Van Rensselaer land grant and through the years had been sold to various people, the Slingerland family being large landowners in this section at the time Col. Hendrick began amassing his property.

Roughly, the boundaries of Font Grove ran from the lower railroad crossing on Font Grove Road, or "the lane" as it was then known, and fanned out to include this side north of the present development of Mayfair-then along New Scotland Road as far west as the old Boom property, presently owned by Robert Mac-Williams, opposite the Drive-in Theatre. It also included over 70 acres of land on the other side of New Scotland Road in the vicinity of where Heldervale is now located. This particular section was known as the "South Farm" and boasted a fruit orchard abundant with apples, peaches, pears and berries of all kinds. It extended north close to the old Bender Melon farm across the Delaware & Hudson railroad tracks to Upper Font GroveRoador the "back road" as it was then known.

The original "Manor House" was located on Font Grove Road just east where Raymond Hunter now lives. It was an imposing three story Victorian style mansion with a mansard roof, set back from the road with a circu-

and gardens. It was in this peaceful and impressive atmosphere that the name "Font Grove" happened to be conceived. We quote Mrs. Terry ". . . an early weekend visit to my parent's home was made by a man of letters, whose name I cannot, at this moment, recall. My father asked him to suggest a name, and when he discovered a bub-

modernized and enlarged by the present owners. The charming brick colonial on New Scotland Road now owned by William E. Simmons has an interesting background. It was in this house that Mrs. Terry's mother was born. The brick used in this historical dwelling was manufactured in a kiln which was located east of the house near a small creek. The framed colonial farther up New Scotland road, for many years the residence of Sidney T. Jones and now owned by Nathanial A. Boynton, was an original Hendrick holding. On Ridge road just off of Upper Font Grove Road there are four

"cottages" which were built a-

round 1905, These, incidentally were designed by Mrs. Terry herself. As was the custom in those days summer cottages were given names- "Clovercrest" the first cottage in, was named for one of Mrs. Terry's daughters, Ivanhoe," the second cottage was named for the famous novel, "Breezy Ridge" the third and "Honeysuckle Lodge," the fourth. All of these are now year-around houses.

Just north of the Delaware & Hudson tracks on Font Grove Road lies "Edgewood," originally built by Col. Hendrick, which later became the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Thaddeus Terry. Mr. Terry who died in 1923 was was a brilliant attorney, an authority on contract law and for

many years a Columbia University law professor and lecturer. The Terry's had four children two girls and two boys. The daughters were Betty and Clover and the sons, James and Thaddeus. This rambling colonial presently owned by George I. Applegate, who purchased it from Mrs. Terry five years ago, was acquired by Mr. and Mrs. Terry in 1905. Prior to that and for many years thereafter it was the gathering spot for prominent people. Statesmen, authors, journalists and many people of the social world were graciously entertained with "noblesse oblige,"

quaint little station at the Font Grove crossing. This was built by Col. Hendrick as a convenience for his hired hands and tenants and for his children who commuted to St. Agnes School and the Albany Boys Academy in Albany. Originally it was located on the north side of the crossing but years later was moved to the south side. When the old Altamont locals were discontinued around 1930 the little station with its weather beaten exterior and its interior the recipient of many youthful initials and dates painstakingly carved, was sold and now is a storage house on the farm of Sam Genovesi on nearby Upper Font Grove Road.

an important role in country living. Usually made up with four cars, there were as many as four trains into Albany starting at 7 a.m. and six trains out, the last being at 11:30 p.m. which accomodated late theatregoers. Toward the end the trains stopped at the Font Grove crossing on signal only - the signal usually being a waving handkerchief. During the late twenties this writer can nostaligically remember boarding a morning local with an Albany schoolteacher or two and Darwin Keyser a neighbor and schoolmate, paying the \$.16 fare and with boyhood delight settling back for a slow but exciting trip to Albany.





Delmar Ambulance To Have

Two-Way Radio Installed

The Delmar Fire Department has received approval from the FCC and the Town of Bethlehem to install in their ambulance a two-way radio. When the installation is completed, the ambulance will be one of the best equipped in the area. The Fire Department is paying for the installation out of the ambulance donations because they feel that in doing so it will enable them to render quicker service if it is needed while out on another call. It can also be used for calling for additional help from any place in the Tri-Village area.

In 1958 the ambulance answered 253 calls and in doing so it was driven 3300 miles. It is estimated that the members of the ambulance squad donated over 500 hours of their time in order to provide this free service. In addition to the ambulance the squad maintains a loan chest of hospital beds wheel chairs, crutches, and other sick room equipment that is loaned free to anyone in the area. All these things have been given to the squad by people who had no further use for them. (The squad would like to receive a pair of adjustable crutches.)
