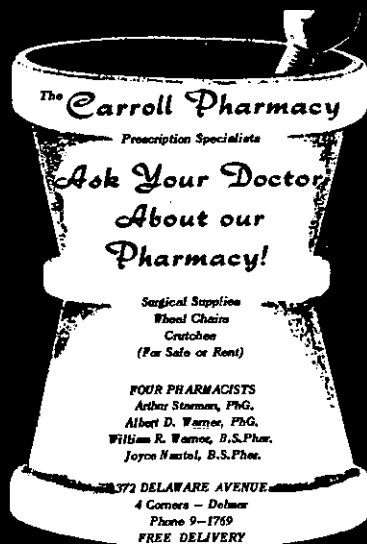

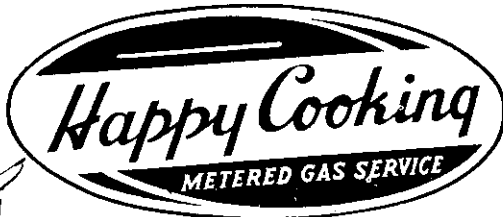

Meeting to Consider Education Needs Scheduled for April 8

On Wednesday, April 8, a meeting to consider the educational needs of children and youth will be held in the Bethlehem Central Senior High School in Delmar. This is an Albany District K.U.A. meeting (K for Knowledge, U for Understanding and A for Action), sponsored by the New York State Congress of Parents and Teachers and the New York State Teachers Association, and is one of several such meetings which are being held in each of the Nineteen Districts of the State Parent Teacher Association.

Mrs. Elizabeth O'Rourke, Public Relations Zone Chairman, of Hudson, will represent the State Teachers' Association and Mrs. Douglas S. Rider, Vice President of the State Congress, will represent the P.T.A. Teams consisting of the P.T.A. president, vice president and community relations chairman, the principal of the school, the president and public relations chairman of the local teachers' association and, whenever possible, the chief administrator and a member of the Board of Education, from each Parent Teacher unit within Albany District will attend this meeting. In schools where no P. T. A.

exists persons will be delegated to represent the various schools.

A Dinner will be held in the school cafeteria at six o'clock at which Mr. Ray Lindbloom, Supervising Principal of the Elmont Schools, will deliver the keynote address. After the dinner the team members will break up into discussion groups to consider the question "What kind of an education do we want for our children and how can we secure the climate and will to support such education?" Following the group discussions, a panel of seven members will answer questions developed in the discussion groups. Members of this panel are Mr. Ray Lindbloom,

moderator, Mr. Hamilton Bookhout, school administrator, Mr. Howard Gould and Mr. Clayton Rose, of the New York State Teachers' Association, Mr. Kenneth Fleischer, a school board member, and Mrs. Edwin Mulbury and Mrs. Harold Hogan, P.T.A. members.

Everyone interested in the education of children and youth is invited to attend the open meeting and to participate in group discussions.

Clara Belle Deitrich's first one man show of paintings opened in the Delmar Public Library just before Easter. Work in oil, water color and charcoal are all represented in the exhibit which will continue until the end of April.

Mrs. Deitrich has worked primarily in oils and in many instances prefers them, however she says she "likes to experiment in many mediums and to

become so at home in the different techniques that she can use that which will obtain the best effect for the subject at hand."

The works in the library cover a number of years of her painting in which she has moved from a smooth realism to what might be called a cross between impressionism and expressionism. "To put into the picture how I feel about the subject and not just the subject matter alone" is her aim.

Working with palette knife much of the time she finds a freedom which the brush did not give her. Her vibrant color is extremely effective whether it is used in the very realistic style of some of her earlier paintings or in the newer freedom she has found more recently.

Mrs. Deitrich prefers to work, from memory and sketches, at her easel which is placed in her daughter's bedroom. Her daughter Mary Lou has just finished her nurses' training at Strong Memorial in Rochester and thus the room lends itself to the ready easel, the neat pile of canvas, finished and unfinished, and the many tubes of paint.

works for the Telephone Company and is his wife's severest critic.

In answer to the question of how and when she first took up her brush and palette knife Mrs. Deitrich answered that she expects the desire was with her a long time before she did anything about it directly. She had always enjoyed doing creative things with her hands and did a great deal of needlework which helped for a time to carry out this urge. Her sister is a painter and one day said: "here's paint, here's the canvas, get to work." And she did. The first years were years of real struggle for she believes it took her longer than many to master the fundamentals, but she couldn't leave the easel despite discouragement and frustration. She doubts these ever leave one completely, and in fact feels that if they did much of the quality of the painting might leave too.

Mrs. Deitrich has studied under Betty Warren (who taught me so much about color"), Stanley Bates, Henry Hensche and Elizabeth Rostum. She has sketched and painted at York Harbor, Maine, in Provincetown and Rock Point, Massachusetts, and of course around Albany. In trips to Colorado and Mexico she sketched and came home to work from memory.

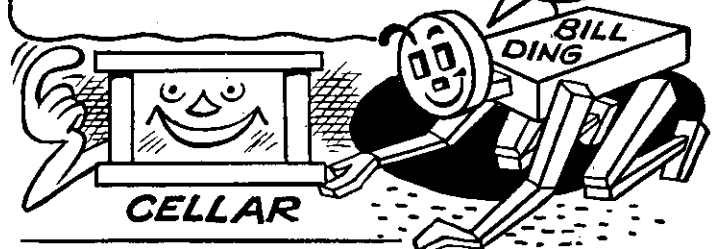



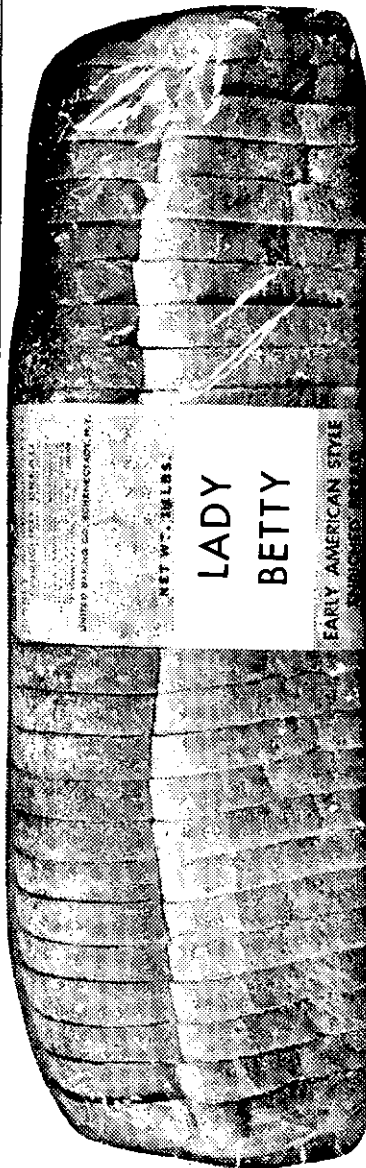
