Crganizing a day camp for children was not enough for her so she took on a summer stock company. She signed up with the Actors Laboratory Theatre, directed by famous Madame Ouspenskaia, where she studied and did "everything else from running the switch board to cleaning sinks."

Acting in "Sandra" off Broadway, playing the dance lead in "Finian's Rainbow" in stock and continuing in further stock in New Jersey, she added modeling with Conover to her lines of Achievement.

Her marriage to Dr. Jesse Kaye, a practicing psychiatrist in Albany, put an end to this particular period of her life. However her enthusiasms and interests in stage and the dance field came right along with her when she came back to Albany to live.

Here is a letter from one of the area's oldest residents. Can you recognize him in the picture above? I am 80 years old. Was born July 1st, 1879 and started school in this build-(Slingerlands Grade School) in 1885. I had a mile and a half to walk; sometimes


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had 2 to 3 feet of snow to wallow through, as they had no equipment for opening roads then. It would sometimes be 3 or 4 days before they were opened up enough to get through. No automobiles then. The first year, they had only one teacher, a Mr. George Quay from Knox. There were 60 scholars and 8 grades on the register; he taught all the classes, from 9 to 4 P.M. Our studies were Reading, Spelling, Arithmetic, Writing, History and Physiology, with Drawing twice a week. Not all this other stuff they have now, When we wanted to take a bath or swim, we would use a wash tub or go to the creek. We did not need any gym exercise; we got all that walking to school and most of the children had chores to do after they got home in the afternoon, I had nearly a mile to go down in the woods after cows every night.

After Mr. Quay, there was a Miss Cary for 2 years, then Miss Katherine Wilson, We all got to class every day and there never, in the 8 years I was there, was any juvenile delinguency. My father would pay the school taxes of \$4 to \$7 and the children were taught common sense, not all the foolishness of nowadays.

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

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
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
