



To The Spotlight:

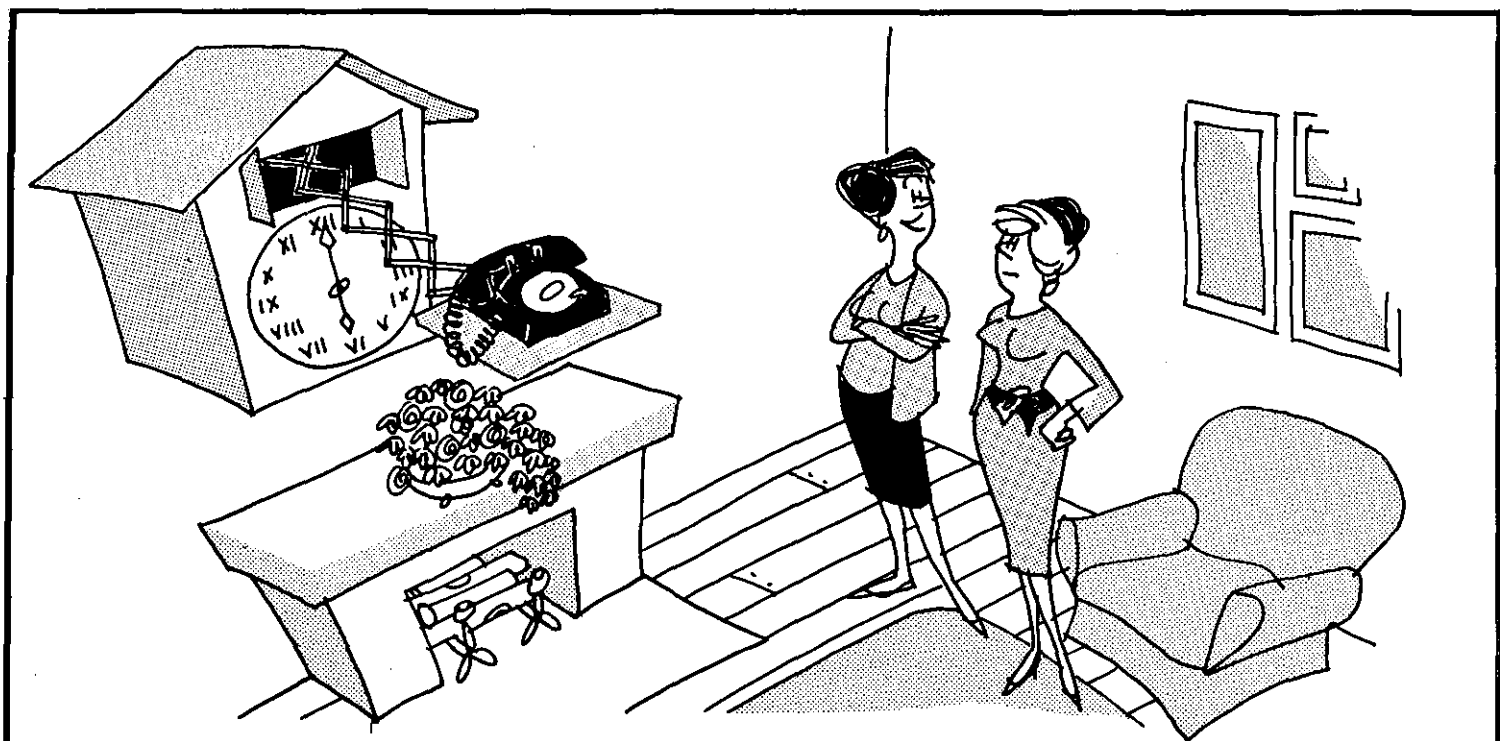

projects of the year, etching on glass.

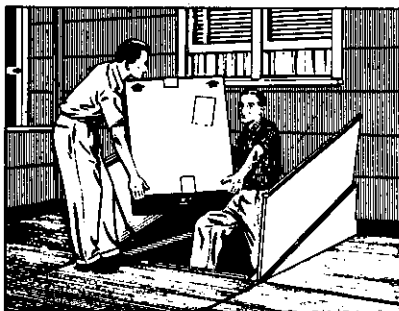
