## "FUTURE TEACHERS" PROJECT AT BCHS GIVES STUDENTS RESPONSIBILITY

With America's schools overflowing with children as a result of our nation's "population boom", the problem of recruiting people into the teaching profession has become critical. 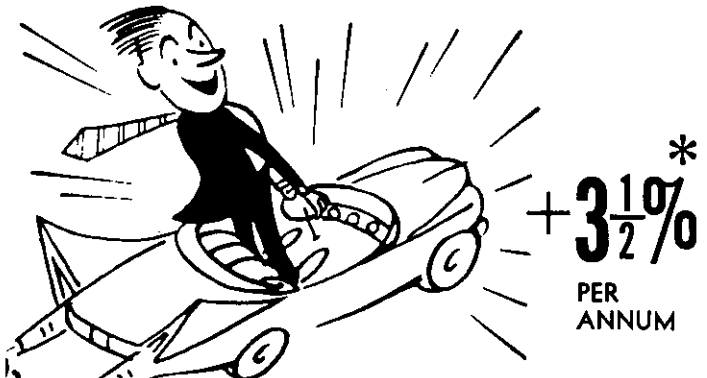

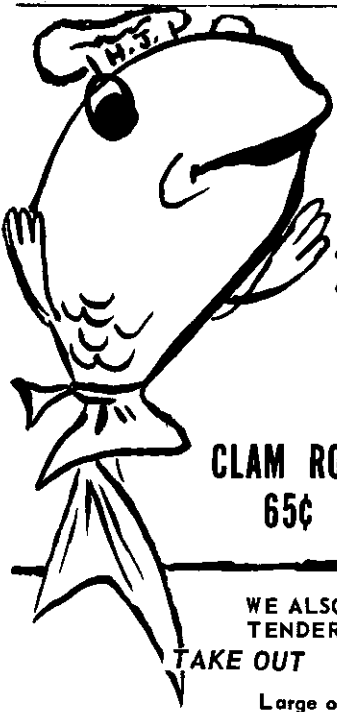

**DELMAR PROGRESS CLUB TO HEAR TALK ON COMMUNITY PLANNING**

On March 14, the general meeting of the Delmar Progress Club will be held at the Delmar Public Library at 8:00 o'clock.

An illustrated talk on Community Planning will be given by Prof. John F. C. Burdis of the School of Architecture of the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute.

Mr. Burdis has been a professor of architecture and city planning at R.P.I. for 11 years, and is now planning consultant to communities in this State, among them the Village of Colonie and the City of Saratoga Springs.

Since planning is so virtually important to our fast growing community, the Delmar Progress Club has extended invita-
